School Board adopts three energy saving plans

Saving Energy seemed to be the theme Monday night as the St. Johns School Board voted to adopt three energy saving projects for St. Johns High School this year.

The projects, presented to the board by Birmingham engineer Jim Partridge, include purchasing automatic digital timing devices to turn approximately 70 pieces of equipment on and off at set times throughout the building. He said the devices will reduce energy consumption when people neglect to turn equipment off.

Heat recovery devices will also be installed on the pool heater, as well as on a water heater. Partridge explained that the devices would use the energy that is now lost through the flu of the schools incineration system.

At the same time, condensing units will be installed to reduce the amount of cold outside air used in the pool dehumidification process.

Partridge also introduced the idea of vestibules at the entrance of the west side of the building. He said the project will reduce the cold air flow into the school.

Trustees said the projects total \$82,883, with \$40,000 being paid from a federal grant. The balance will be paid from the half-mill approved earlier by voters that was earmarked for repairs.

Also, the board voted to remove asbestos and monitor the air at Rodney B. Wilson Junior High School and Central Elementary School, a project totaling \$13,883. The project is expected to be completed by the first day of school.

The board also stated that the high school will meet new state standards this year in order to qualify for state aid's extra \$28 per student. Qualifications include six class periods of 55 minutes each; four years of English; three years each of mathematics, science and social studies; two years of foreign language; a fine arts and/or

performing arts or vocational program; and one year of health and/or physical education.

Nothing has been added to the curriculum in order to qualify for new standards, as St. Johns High School has offered the classes for many years.

Ten computers were also approved for the Community Education program for \$22,425, a cost that

will be offset from the increased enrollment which will result in increased state aid.

The school board also approved the support of a Michigan Association of School Board resolution that opposes Legislature calling for a National Constitutional Convention to amend the U.S. Constitution to require a balanced federal budget.

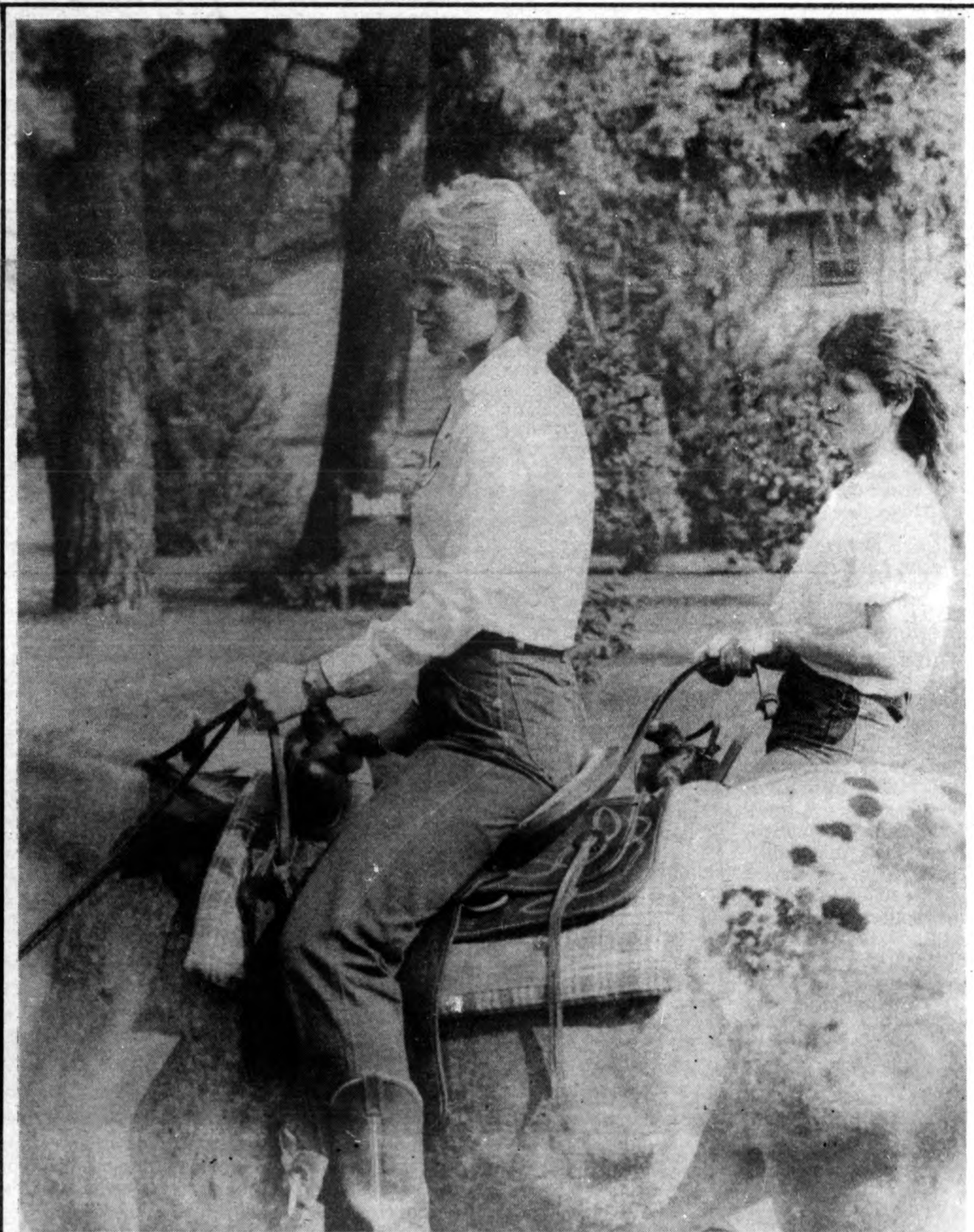
Schedule change in publications

Contract set in Fowler

According to James Andros, superintendent of Fowler Public Schools, negotiations between the Fowler Board of Education and the Fowler Education Association, affiliate of the Ingham County Education Association, have just concluded. Tentative agreement was reached August 8 and both parties have ratified the contract changes. Head negotiator for the Board of Education was

Superintendent James Andros and for the Fowler Education Association, Barbara Roberts Mason.

The contract calls for a two year settlement. Salary increases for both 1984-1985 and 1985-1986 are six percent. Due to severe economic troubles, two years ago all employees of the district in 1982-1983 accepted a total wage freeze, without increment.

Board members explained that they were not opposed to a balanced federal budget, but they support the MASB position that a constitutional convention is not needed to accomplish that. Superintendent Earl Gabriel said the MASB position is that the president and Congress have the power to mandate a balanced budget and that a Constitutional Convention cannot be limited to one

Ag Secretary to be guest at fundraiser

Agriculture Secretary John R. Block will be the guest of honor at the Bill Schuette for Congress fundraiser, Wednesday, August 29th. The fundraiser, a hog-roast, will be from 7 to 9 p.m. at the farm of Rex and Kathy Crumbaugh, 4333 E. Breckenridge.

Bill Schuette, the Republican Congressional Candidate running against Democrat Don Albosta said, "It is a great honor to have Secretary Block come to the district on my behalf. I certainly encourage the people of this area to take advantage of the opportunity to talk with Secretary Block about ag issues and the '85 farm bill, that are so important to all of us."

Block, a hog farmer from Illinois, was significant

in the administration's decision to end the Soviet grain embargo. Block is an advocate of free trade and has visited 21 nations, both to protect existing markets and to lay the groundwork for new markets.

"I know how important the decisions we make in Washington are to the farmer in Michigan," Block said, "and I also know how dedicated Bill Schuette is to the needs of agriculture, so I am delighted to campaign in his district on his behalf."

Tickets for the hog-roast are \$10 per person and are available from B and W Co-op in Breckenridge, or can be purchased at the door.

Teachers to continue without contract

The Fulton Education Association, in a meeting Aug. 16th, has decided to return to work for the start of the 1984-85 school year on Aug. 27, despite the lack of a contract.

Acting president Kathy Parker stated that the teachers have agreed to wait for the fact-finding report. "If no contract is settled within 10 school days after the report is received, the teachers will meet to take a strike vote according to the decision passed at the meeting," Parker said in a statement released by the Fulton Education Association Aug. 20.

Fulton teachers have been without a contract

since Sept. 1, 1983, when the Board of Education declared an impasse in negotiations, she explained. After mediation attempts failed, the fact-finding procedure was started. The fact-finder's judgement was expected earlier this summer but has been delayed until early September.

She also said that the judgement will not be binding because of the Board's refusal.

Parker added that while waiting for the fact-finding report, negotiators from both sides met four or five times during the summer to attempt to resolve differences. However, most key issues remain unresolved, including working conditions, class size, wages and the school calendar.

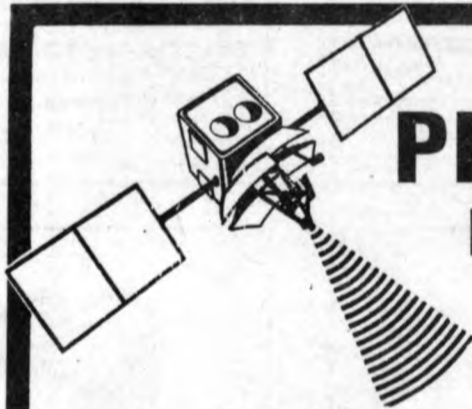

Rice-Onstad Double ring ceremony

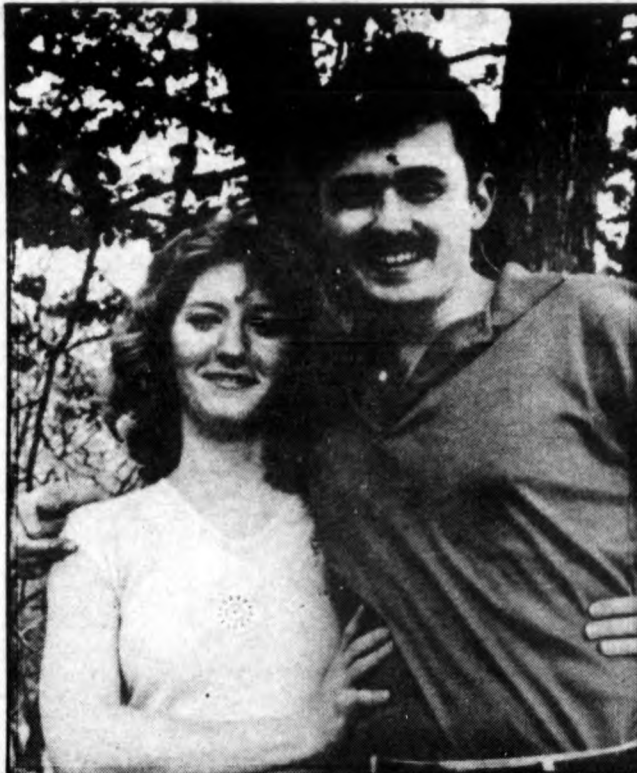

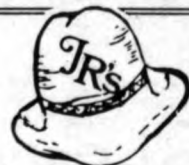

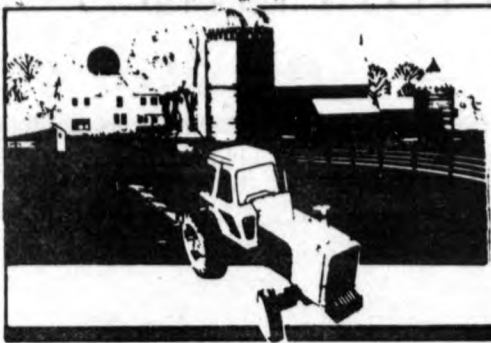

Farm News

Michigan milk production down five percent

Milk production in Michigan during July was estimated at 459 million pounds, down 5 percent from one year ago, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Milk cow numbers averaged 392,000 head, unchanged from June but down 14,000 from July 1983. Milk output per cow averaged 1,170 pounds, down 15 pounds from a year earlier. Grain feeding rates were down from a year ago and hot, dry weather in late July also contributed to reduced milk output per cow.

The value of milk sold in Michigan during July averaged \$12.90 per hundredweight (cwt.), down 30 cents from a year earlier. Replacement cow prices averaged \$940 as of July 1, down \$160 from one year ago. However, replacement prices have increased slightly since last spring. Slaughter cow prices averaged \$41.00 per cwt., down slightly from a year earlier.

Nationally, milk production during July totaled 11.6 billion pounds, down 4 percent from a year ago. Accumulated milk production during the first 7 months of 1984 was down 2 percent from the com-

parable 1983 period. Production per cow averaged 1,069 pounds during July, 15 pounds below a year ago. Milk cow numbers averaged 10.8 million head during July, down 3 percent from the previous year. July milk production was below the previous year's level in 31 of the 33 states preparing monthly estimates.

Dairy manufacturing plants in Michigan produced 2.9 million pounds of butter during June, down 40 percent from a year earlier. This was the lowest monthly butter output in Michigan since August 1981. Increased shipments of milk from Michigan to dairy manufacturing plants in the Southern states contributed to the reduced butter production. Extremely dry weather in the Southwest and the impact of the dairy diversion program resulted in reduced milk supplies to dairy plants in Southern states. American cheese production in Michigan, at 1.3 million pounds, was down 31 percent from a year ago. Ice cream output, at 4.0 million gallons, was up 11 percent from the previous year.

The club grounds are located four miles north of St. Johns on U.S.-27 on Mead Road, then 1 1/4 miles west on Mead Road on the south side.

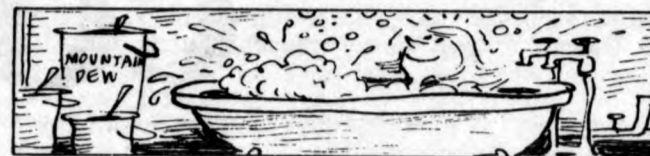
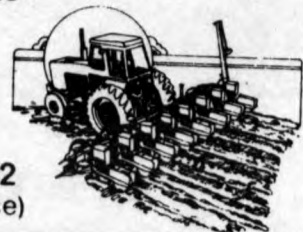

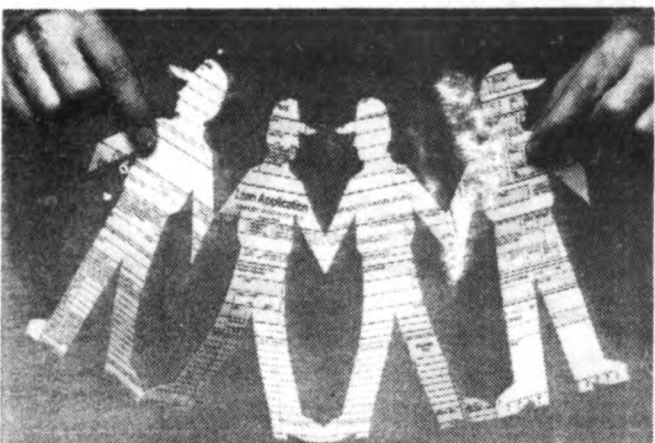
Man sought in abduction attempt

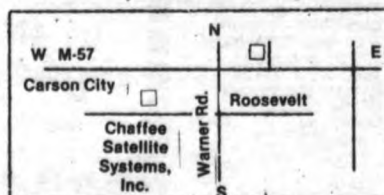

Negotiations end for DeWitt teachers

Coaches were back on the field Monday morning after negotiations between representatives of the DeWitt teachers and the school board broke down over the weekend, with both sides agreeing to call in a state mediator.

President of the DeWitt Education Association, Leila Whiting, is reported as saying the negotiations are close to being completely settled, with only the issue of salary to contend with.

She added that DeWitt teachers desire to return to work without public conflict but won't without a "fair" wage. She reportedly said the district's fund balance was approximately \$1 million for a \$5 million budget, an amount she feels could be increased to properly support the teachers.

The DeWitt Education Association, composed of 80 teachers, had a similar situation occur in November of 1982 when the union decided to strike. At that time, teachers agreed to a two-year contract which gave them 5.9 percent the first year and 6 percent the second.

Presently, the teachers have agreed to begin classes on Tuesday, Sept. 4, with the following information pertaining to opening day:

• All children attending elementary schools will attend only a half a day on Sept. 4. School will start at 9 a.m. at Scott School and 8:50 a.m. at Fuerstenau School. Kindergarten, a.m. only, will

meet on Sept. 6. On Sept. 7, both kindergarten a.m. and p.m. will meet, with grades 1-5 resuming their full day schedules.

• The Middle School will also be open to students for a full day of classes on Tuesday, Sept. 4. The daily schedule calls for the building to be open at 7:30 a.m. and classes to begin at 8 a.m. Dismissal will be at 2:40 p.m.

• DeWitt High School will also open for students on Sept. 4, for a full day of school. Students will receive their schedules and books on the first day of school.

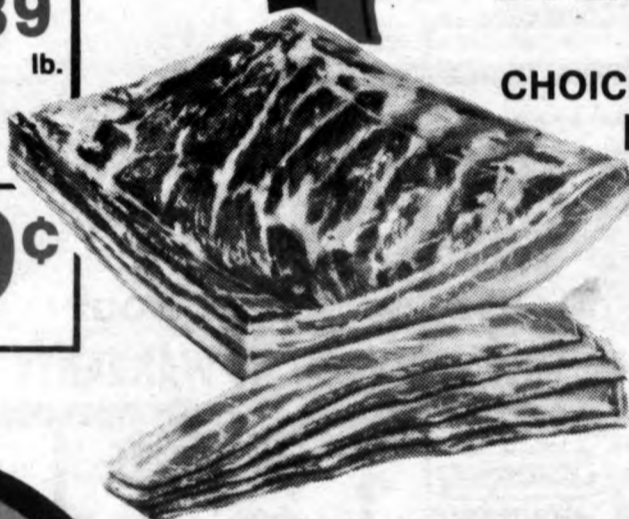

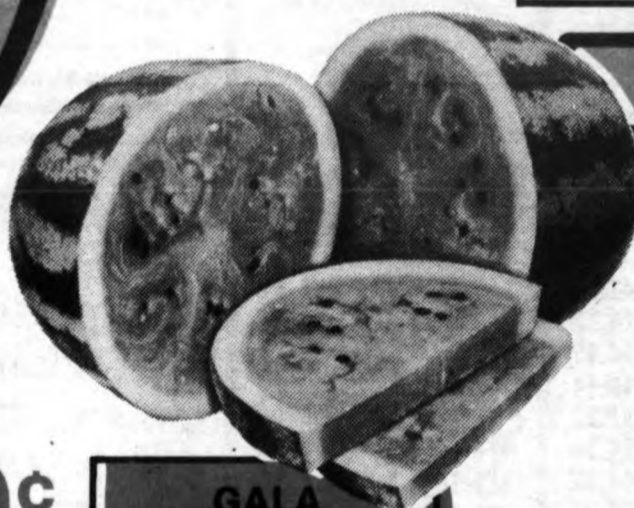

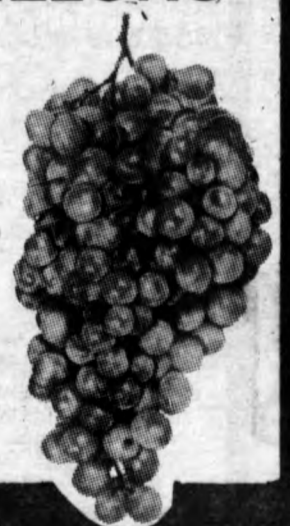

4-H Rodeo finals held at Corunna's McCurdy Park

McCurdy Park in Corunna will be the site of the 1984 Shiawassee County 4-H Rodeo finals on September 1, at 4:00 p.m., and on September 2, at 2:00 p.m.

The two performances will feature the top 10 cowgirls and cowboys in each rodeo event, ages 9 through 19, who have competed during the 1984 4-H Rodeo season throughout the State of Michigan.

The members will ride in two age divisions: Juniors, 9-14 years, and seniors, 15-19 years. These members will compete in bareback bronc, saddle bronc, bull riding, goat tying, and barrel racing.

Four-H Rodeo in Michigan had its beginning in 1977 and has continued to grow rapidly. It is not uncommon for a single 4-H Rodeo to have 150 entries.

Members travel with their families and leaders across the state during the summer months competing at 4-H Rodeos at various county fairs and festivals where the majority of 4-H Rodeos are held. During the winter months, the members practice at workouts, attend workshops and clinics and compete in jackpots to ready themselves for the upcoming season. Many of the 4-H Rodeo members are also involved in other 4-H projects from horse clubs to beef clubs to sewing clubs.

At each 4-H Rodeo, the competitors vie for point standings which are carried over to each succeeding rodeo and added on. At the end of the season, the points are totaled and the top 10 scoring cowboys and cowgirls are gathered together at the finals to compete against each other to decide the top "hand" in each event.

At each 4-H Rodeo, there are two judges on the arena floor. They each judge the rider up to 25 points and the animal up to 25 points, for a total of 100 points for a perfect ride. This score has never been reached in rodeo, professional or amateur.

The judges score the cowboys on their style, marking the animal out (in broncs-the cowboy must leave the chute with his heels on the points of the horses shoulders.) The spurring action (all cowboys in rodeo wear blunt roweled spurs that are free rolling-they do not tear the horses skin.) The free hand must not touch the animal in any manner during the 8 second ride.

The animal is also scored on how high he kicks, if he turns back, how hard he bucks and generally, how hard he was to ride.

In 4-H Rodeo, every cowboy gets a score, regardless of how long he rides. A full ride, though, takes precedence over a "short" ride. Juniors must ride their bulls and broncs for six seconds. Seniors must ride theirs for eight seconds.

The highest recorded score in 4-H Rodeo is a 90 point ride made by Tom Adams of Shiawassee County 4-H Rodeo Club.

The Michigan State Rodeo Club has been very instrumental in assisting the 4-H Rodeo program. They have held clinics and workouts with the 4-H's and have played a very key role in the development of this project area.

Tickets for the 1984 Shiawassee County 4-H Finals Rodeo will be available at the gate. All pro-

ceeds from the finals go to the Michigan 4-H Rodeo Developmental Committee to help finance the 1985 4-H Rodeo season and its finals.

They stopped by a formation called "jump rock", about ten feet high. Everyone got out to do a high jump into the river.

The second night of camping, they had a cook-out of steak, boiled potatoes, and all the trimmings. Everyone was tired after their eventful day on the river and retired early.

The last day of the trip began with a rainy morning. If they thought their river clothes weren't dry the day before, they were dripping today. After eating breakfast and breaking camp in the rain, it's back to the river, no matter if it is raining.

The work includes cleaning, sandblasting and applying three coats of paint on all surfaces of the tank. The anticipated time required to complete the tank project is approximately four or five weeks. (Beginning Sept. 2nd and ending Oct. 8th.)

During this project the elevated tank will of course be out of operation. This process should not effect the volume of water supplied to residents. However, variations in pressure and qualities could be noticed. The quality change means that the water could appear somewhat discolored due to the pressure variations. There is no need to be concerned regarding any health hazards because the water will be, as it always is, chlorinated and tested daily.

It would be wise to observe your water before doing laundry. If you see discoloration, postpone the task until the water clears. Normally, clearing takes only a few hours.

We do not anticipate any significant problems during the project. We do want our water customers to be aware of this necessary circumstance. Your anticipated cooperation is greatly appreciated.

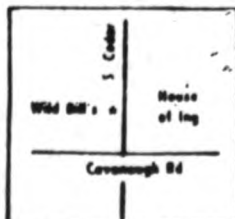
