# St. Johns home devastated

"It all happened so quickly, there wasn't time to be scared," said Bruce Welton, whose home was destroyed in an apparent tornado that skipped through the county Thursday morning. "We just kept hearing the house creaking and groaning and knew we had to get out of there."

Bruce and his wife Rose, who live at 3176 E. Francis Road, had gotten up at approximately 4:50 a.m. to get ready for work. Upon hearing the

mounting storm outside his bathroom window, Bruce decided to shut the window, hoping to keep out some of the rain. He said that as he reached to close it, he felt the window begin to shake and knew that it was going to blow into the room. As he began to step away from it, it shattered from the vacuum like pressure inside the home.

He said he immediately headed for the steps of the two story home knowing that his wife was downstairs preparing breakfast. Falling from the stairs as the house shook, he said he found his wife lying on the floor next to the basement door,

screaming in apparent terror.

"We tried getting down into the basement but couldn't because the whole partician had moved," he said.

From there, the couple went to the front door of their home. After pulling open the door, the couple found that their home had moved several feet from its foundation, leaving a gaping hole between the house and the front porch. With no other alternative, they jumped to the front porch and headed for their car.

# Downtown project faces delay

The streets of downtown St. Johns may remain intact this fall according to the Downtown Improvement bids recently received by the five area contractors.

The lowest bid, coming from Searles Construction, Inc., placed the total cost of the project at \$136,156.15, approximately \$9,000 over the City's estimated cost. At the same time, their bid indicated that construction could not begin until the spring of 1985 due to a full contractors schedule.

According to City Engineer Doug Weir, the prices submitted were slightly inflated due to the fact that the contractors must comply with the Federal Wage Guidelines. He added that the costs were reasonable for the type and extent of the project.

The improvement project, previously estimated to cost \$141,884, is being jointly funded by the city, private business owners and a Small Cities Public Works Grant. Improvements include refurbishing sidewalks, curbs and gutters, repaving of the roads and restoring water leads on three blocks of Clinton Avenue, from M-21 to the railroad tracks.

The City plans to pay 37 percent of the project - approximately \$52,800 - while the grant pays \$47,200. The balance of the project is expected to be paid by downtown property owners according to an upcoming special assessment. Currently, assessment figures are estimated to include 29.51 percent of the project - approximately \$41,876 - of the total project.

According to City Assessor Diane Edwards, costs for the property owners is currently estimated at \$23,085 per front foot, and the average property owner has 25 feet of frontage. Figures indicate an estimated total cost of \$577.13 for each owner. The amount would be paid initially by the city with property owners having five years to pay off the expense.

City Manager Randy Humphrey Monday night recommended the City Commission continue with the project as planned, while investigating ways to raise the additional nine percent to meet the low bid.

"We could chip away items on the project to save money, but I feel that the things taken out would only diminish the quality of the project," he said. "Money is certainly available to front the costs of our partners and to pay our share."

The bids for the improvements were tabled at the meeting, pending further action at a Public Hearing scheduled for Sept. 10, at 7:45 p.m.

In other action, the commission referred plans to convert Swegles and Gibb Streets from local to major streets, to the Planning Commission and Parking Committee.

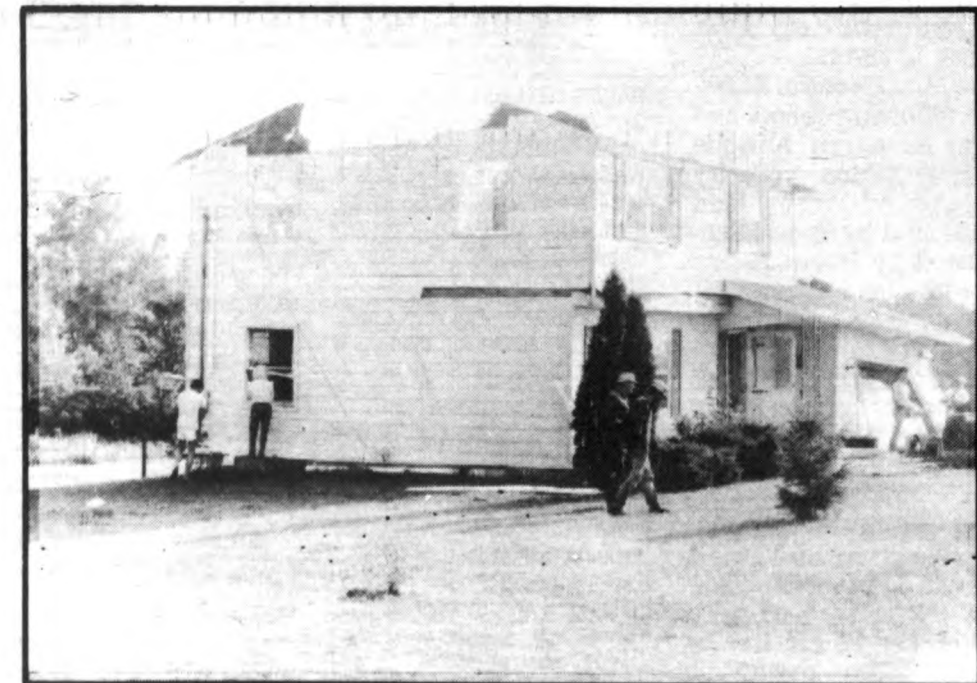
Such a transfer would allow the city to receive approximately \$13,000 annually from the Act 51 funds. According to Humphrey, the switch would involve alterations in street parking and truck route alterations.

Also, the commission voted to authorized the purchase of two additional police cars in a program with the State of Michigan. Estimated costs are \$9,700 per car.

# Clinton Memorial awarded grant

Clinton Memorial Hospital has been awarded a \$1,000 grant by the Greater Lansing Foundation for the purchase of capital equipment. The foundation was established in 1947 and promotes the well-being of residents in Clinton, Ingham, and Eaton Counties by providing support to various charitable, public, and educational institutions.

According to Paul McNamara, chief executive officer of CMH, the grant monies will be applied towards the purchase of a non-invasive blood pressure monitor to be used in surgery.

"There was glass all over," he said. "It was dark and raining and we couldn't see anything. I got in my side of the car, but she couldn't get into her side. We couldn't figure out why until we noticed that the chimney had fallen on her side of the car and jammed the door."

With no where else to turn, the couple, still donning a night gown and a pair of pants, ran towards their neighbors home. At that time, Bruce saw a car coming down the street and began signaling with his flashlight for it to stop. Fortunately, it was a deputy sheriff of the Clinton County Sheriffs Department who happened to be patrolling the area. He picked them up and took them to their parents home.

"The whole thing happened in less than ten minutes," Bruce said. "It was the most incredible thing I've ever seen."

At daybreak, the couple was able to see the damage that had occurred to their home. Their roof was peeled from the home and thrown into a wooded area approximately 500 yards from their home. The right side of the garage was completely missing, with many items from both the garage and the home strewn about. The house itself was totally destroyed with an estimated loss of \$50 to \$60,000.

# New temptation beckons

How would you like to borrow all the money you want, anytime you wanted to, and never have to worry because you could always borrow more to pay back what you already owe?

It sounds pretty tempting, doesn't it?

The policy makers in the federal government know how attractive it is. They have fallen to the temptation for more than two decades. And the only way to keep them from falling again and again is to take the temptation away. As the record shows, they cannot handle it.

Since 1961, the federal government has experienced 22 deficits and just one surplus in its budget.

As a result, it is more than \$1.6 trillion in debt. Furthermore, if things don't change, it will be adding in the neighborhood of \$200 billion to that debt year after year for the foreseeable future. At that rate, the total debt would double in just seven years.

If you divided \$1.6 trillion among every man, woman and child in the U.S., each individual would receive almost \$7,000. That is almost \$28,000 for the traditional family of four.

In 1982 prices, \$1.6 trillion would buy more than 24 million new homes and almost 270 million new automobiles.

Furthermore, it would take nearly every dollar on deposit in domestic offices of America's banks to pay that debt off. In other words, we would almost wipe out all the savings in U.S. banks to pay the debt.

The numbers are frightening, but the speed at which the government has racked up this debt is even more frightening.

In 1970, the entire federal budget was \$200 billion and the government had overspent by \$2.8 billion. In other words, our current deficit just about equals all the money spent by the government just 13 short years ago.

Government deficits affect our everyday lives, they help determine how many Americans are working, how much the value of the dollar is eroded by inflation, and how difficult it is for businesses and consumers to get credit.

How?

These deficits must somehow be financed. To do this the government can borrow money or it can simply increase the amount of dollars in circulation.

If it borrows, it will absorb new savings needed for the private investment necessary to keep our economy moving and our standard of living rising: investment for plant and equipment, research, technology and consumer goods.

Traditionally, the federal government has used about one-quarter of our national savings pool.

If the deficits continue at their current high level, this figure will be closer to one-half to two-thirds of that pool, year after year.

The obvious result of this course is that interest rates will be pushed higher and higher, since there will be greater competition for the same amount of funds. Think about that the next time you or someone you know wants to purchase a car or a home.

As an alternative to borrowing, the federal government may decide to finance its deficit by creating more money. Then we will suffer from inflation. In the classic economic definition, we will have more dollars chasing the same amount of goods.

When inflation is on the rise, no one has any incentive to save and invest. Industry becomes starved for capital, savers watch their nest eggs disappear and recession returns to the horizon. In addition, interest rates rise.

Whichever course the government takes to finance its deficit, borrowing, creating money or a mix of the two, interest rates rise, bringing higher unemployment in their wake.

Fortunately, since we live in a democracy we can deal with the deficits.

Democracies are vulnerable to deficit spending because it is far more pleasant to raise spending than to reduce it.

Elected officials know that Santa Clauses get re-elected and Scrooges get rejected.

In Scrooge's day, individuals who could not pay their debts were thrown into debtor's prison.

Our accumulated deficits are slowly, but surely, incarcerating our entire population, and our children for years to come, in what soon may become an inescapable debtor's prison. The walls of this prison are not made of brick, concrete and steel. Instead, they are composed of high interest rates, inflation, unemployment and sluggish investment.

Our key to escape can be found in legislation introduced in both the U.S. House of Representatives and the Senate that would provide for a congressionally initiated constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget. The requirement would not apply in case of national emergency.

This amendment is necessary to provide Congress with the incentive to make the tough decisions that must be made to eliminate the deficit. Without such direction, the Congress would continue to spend, spend, spend, far beyond the country's means.

For that key to work we must convince Congress to use it now, before we are locked into this debtor's prison forever.

A little more than two centuries ago, 58 Americans stood up to create this country. Now the members of the House and the Senate must stand up to save it. When you stand in the voting booth in November, think about how they stood on this legislation.

# Police report



# Superb salmon season forecast for area fisherman

When Michigan's 1984 salmon season ends, it is expected to be the most productive ever with a record 370,000 anglers trying their luck for the silvery fish, according to the Automobile Club of Michigan.

The Department of Natural Resources expects sales of trout and salmon stamps to be 1 percent above the record number sold in 1982.

Great Lakes salmon fishing should peak from now through mid-September. Streams should have heaviest pressure between mid-September and mid-October. By the end of November, anglers will find few salmon along Great Lakes shores and in streams.

Some two million coho and chinook, the same number as last year, should return for spawning runs across Michigan. Forty-two "hot spots" are listed on the Auto Club's 1984 Salmon Guide.

Best West Michigan results are expected on Lake Michigan at Charlevoix and at the mouths of the Betsie, Grand, Manistee, Muskegon, Pentwater, Pere Marquette, Platte, and St. Joseph rivers, according to a survey of DNR offices. Best runs in East Michigan should occur on Lake Huron at Port Hope and in Southwest Michigan on the Huron River south of Flat Rock.

Major Upper Peninsula runs are expected from Lake Superior into the Black, Big Iron and Dead rivers and from Lake Michigan into the Manistique River.

Fisherman will find limited action in some areas where weirs block salmon runs. Those streams include: the Jordan and the Little Manistee rivers in West Michigan and the U.P.'s Ana River. Portions of the lower Platte River in West Michigan and East Michigan's Au Sable river also are blocked.

Anglers will find few salmon in the Detroit River, where the DNR has ended plantings.

When anglers began searching for salmon 16 years ago, they fished primarily along streams and piers in fall. Presently, about 70 percent of all chinook and 90 percent of all coho are taken by trollers from ice-break through September.

The popularity of trolling has evolved as fishermen learned that salmon take lures more readily in lakes than streams. Another discovery is that the firm, fresh meat of lake-caught salmon tastes better than that of those fish in streams for spawning.

A few weeks before beginning spawning runs, the fish eat ravenously and grow about two pounds per week. At maturity, chinook reach up to 35 pounds while coho usually grow to no more than 15 pounds.

Most salmon trollers will use lures which have been popular for years: Northport Nailers, Huron Herrings, J-Plugs, Canadian Plugs, Squids, Sparkle Flies, dodgers, Flutter Chucks, and Zippers.

Stream fishermen use a variety of Mepps Spinners, Little Cleos, Salmon flies and spawn.

The DNR will permit liberalized salmon fishing from September 10 through October 25 on five Michigan rivers this year and in 1985. They are the Au Sable River in East Michigan and West Michigan's Big Manistee, Pere Marquette, Muskegon and Sable rivers.

Anglers on those streams' designated areas are allowed to keep foul-hooked or snagged Pacific salmon.

The DNR's 1984 Michigan Fishing Guide lists the liberalized areas for each stream.

Salmon fishermen planning a Great Lakes charter boat trip should budget \$50 to \$60 per person for a half-day's fishing. Most charter boat captains require at least four passengers. A free Fishing and Speciality Charters Directory is available from the Michigan Travel Bureau, Department of Commerce, Lansing, Michigan 48909.

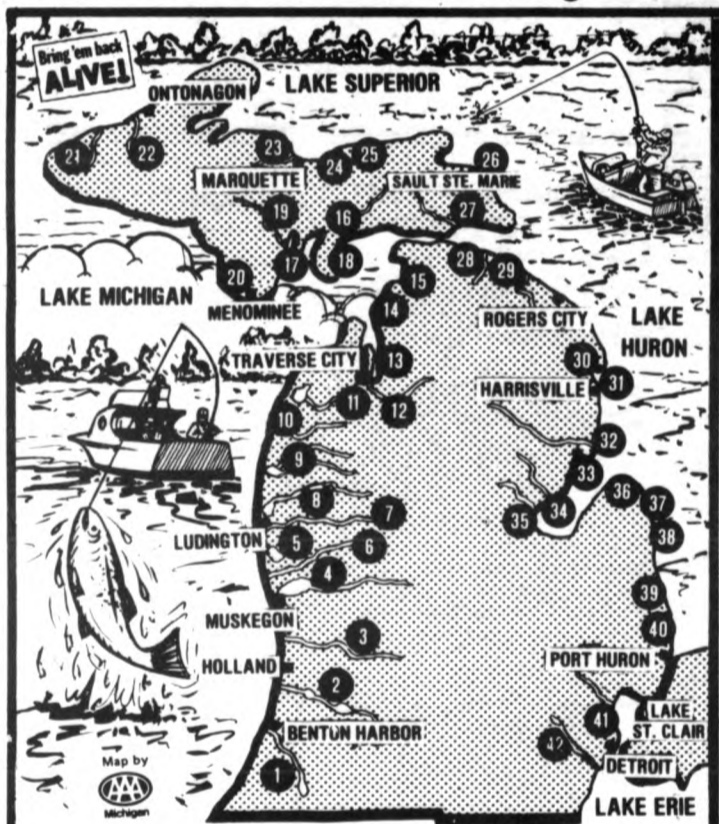

# Blueberry picking has an interesting side

Pick 'em while the pickin's good.

Picking your own produce seems to be becoming a favorite seasonal past time with more and more individuals taking time out from their busy schedules to pick their own products at numerous U-Pick Farms scattered across the nation.

Oak Ridge Blueberry Farm, on Meridian Road in Elsie, is one such farm that is gaining in popularity. Dick Rees, who co-owns the seven acre crop with his wife Louise, said they have seen an influx of people at their farm this year, with a particularly strong representation of young adults joining the picking ranks.

Wholesome indeed. It's easy to see why blueberries have become a favorite among nature's candies. They are high in manganese and iron, while low in sodium. And for the calorie counter, there is only 40 calories per one half cup.

At the same time, there are several "tried and true" ways one can prepare the fruits including a good old fashioned blueberry pie, blueberry pancakes and muffins, or simply eating them fresh off the vine. Louise added that one of the more popular ways is eating the frozen berries, with milk and sugar poured over them.

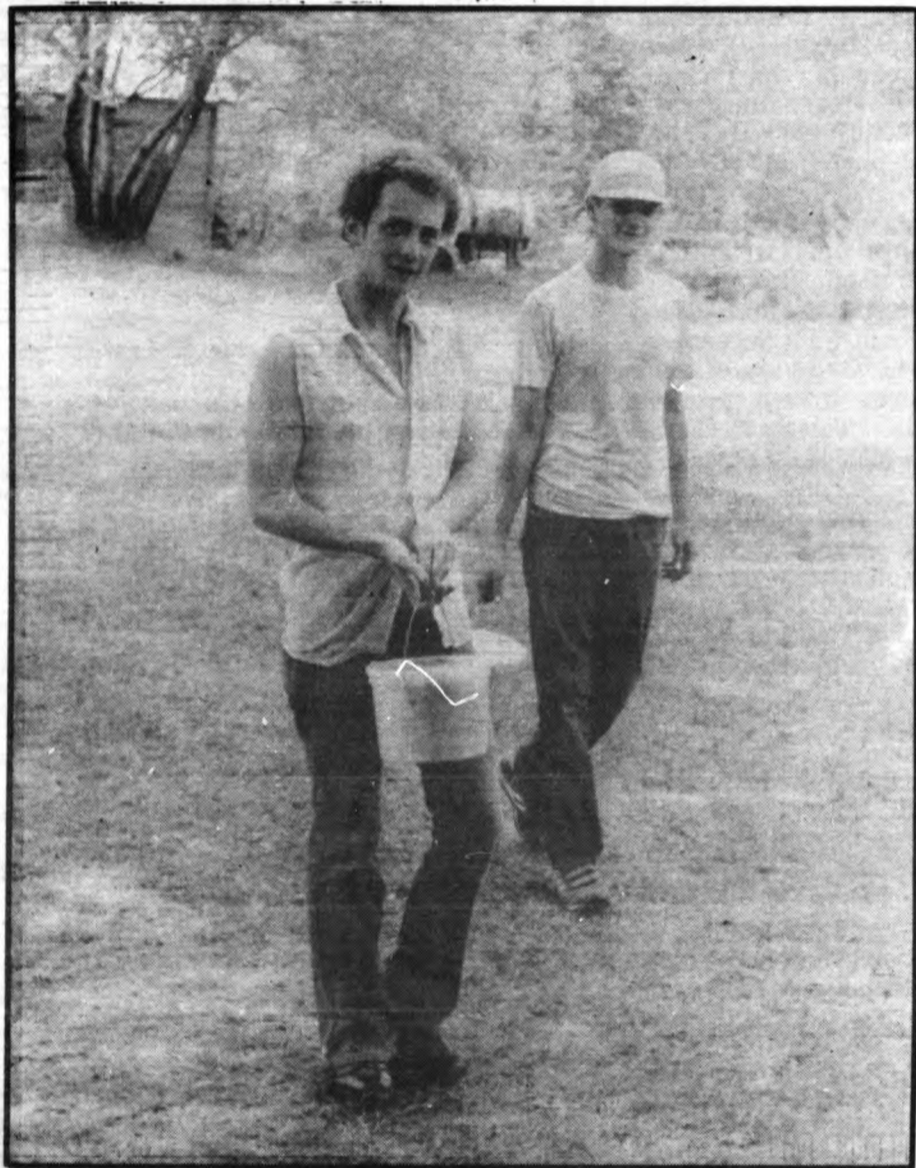
Currently, the couple is experiencing the best crop of blueberries they have had in five years. Louise said the heat and dry weather has hastened the ripening process and has proven to produce the best blueberries this side of Michigan. She ad-

ded that the current crop of sweet Jersey berries should be prime for the pickin' up until the first frost.

The first set of blueberries actually became available in early July, followed closely behind with another variety of mid-season berries. She said that most people aren't aware of the long duration that blueberries have, thinking that they follow the same pattern as the shorter lived fruits produced in Michigan.

For those not interested in picking their own, Louise said that people can also order the berries rather than spending the average 30 minutes to pick a bucket or a quart. With up to five thousand bushes of fresh blueberries, one can be sure to get exactly what they want.

The farm is open daily from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. On Sundays, 12:30 to 5:30 p.m.

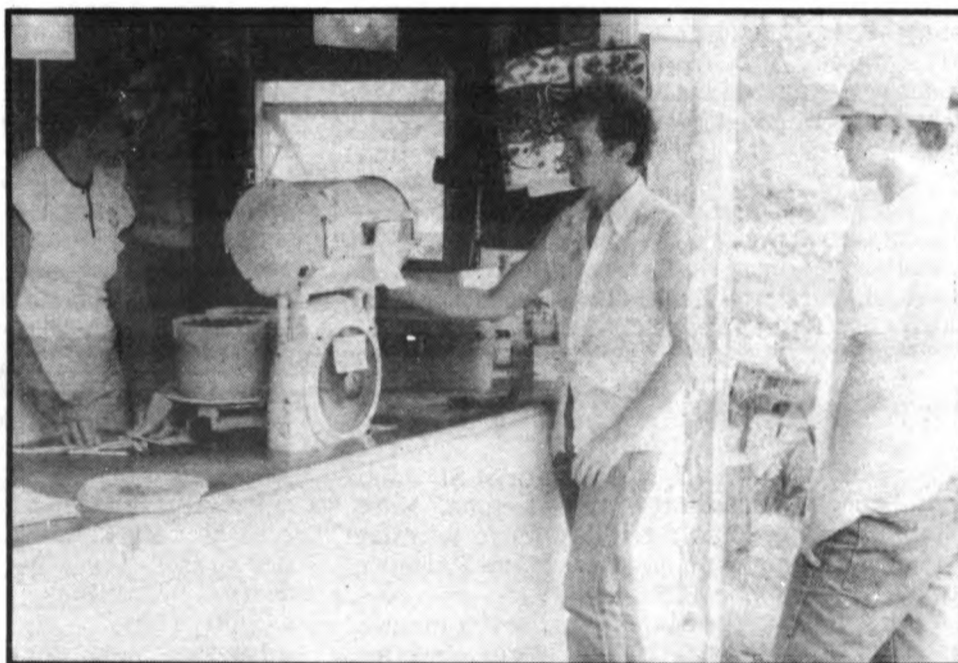

## Immunization Month reported in progress

Immunization Action Month is in progress. The statewide effort is to have all children properly immunized before school, and to urge college students to check their status while preparing for classes.

Joseph Latoff, Director of the Mid-Michigan District Health Department, is leading his efforts and that of the health department staff to the goals of this month, joining other health departments across the state.

Requirements for school or day-care entry, for new students, are as follows: Five dpt (diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus), four opv (oral polio vaccine), one measles, one mumps and one rubella.

Protection from these seven diseases is vital since all can lead to serious and lifelong disabilities or even death, according to Joseph Latoff.

Immunization clinics are offered by the health department at no charge. Here is the schedule:

the doctor, you get up and at least keep the basic needs going and grab a nap on the sofa in between.

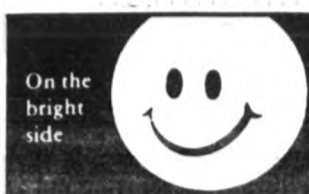

section of Hank Lower's car putting him out of the race for the rest of the evening. Marks was able to repair his car in time for the feature.

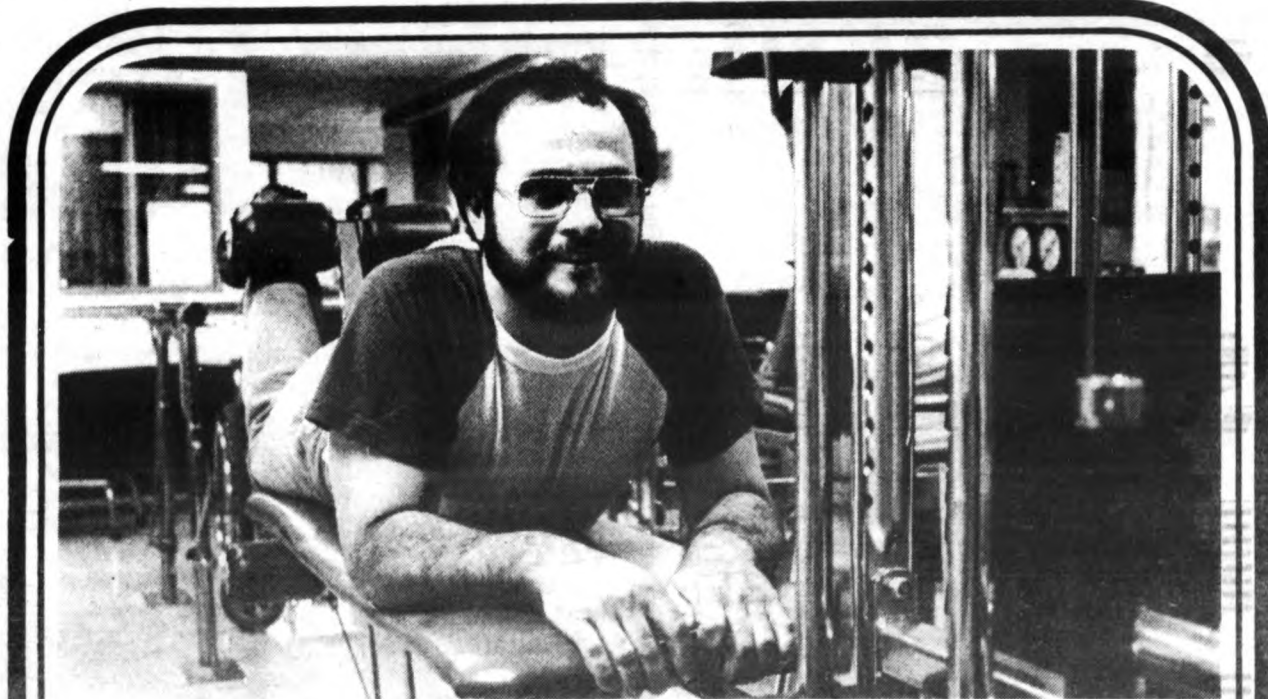

# St. Johns looks to rebuilding gridiron year

The St. Johns Redwings, according to Head Coach Joe Gonzales, lost heavily through graduation last year and therefore, faces a rebuilding situation.

Quoting Gonzales, the head coach said, "This year's team has good size and if some of our key personnel can have a good year, we will have a representative squad. Once again, our two toughest teams are right at the beginning of our schedule. We are a dark horse contender at best. The teams to beat in the MMB from my vantage point are Chesaning, Corunna, and Ionia."

In nine games last year, St. Johns won five and lost four. Of these five wins, three were MMB victories and two of the losses were conference teams. The last time St. Johns won an

outright conference title was in 1982 and prior to that, championships were won in 1977 and in 1975 when the team was a member of the old West Central Conference.

Gonzales, in heading up the Redwing squad, puts his 59-30 varsity record on the line. His overall record as a football mentor at all levels is an impressive 124-51 mark.

Fifteen returning lettermen will be carrying the winning hopes of this year's Redwings. All are seniors and are listed below along with comments on their behalf by Coach Gonzales:

Brian Bates is one of our captains. He has small college potential, both at quarterback and at defensive safety.

Fred Fleming shows real promise as an offensive

guard and also at the offensive fullback position.

Pat Makara is in his third year as a starter on the varsity. He is very good-sized and will probably start at defensive end.

Rick LaBar is another small college potential. He is quick, smart and aggressive. He was an All-MMB selection last year.

Scott Feldpausch is an all-around good utility player.

Alain Ebert is a two-way potential starter at center on offense and noseguard on defense.

Mark Bush is quick, tough and a good hitter. He'll be a possible starter at offensive guard.

John Bush is versatile and is a good special teams man.

Kevin Aylesworth is a good one. He's big, quick,

smart and aggressive and a real team player. He'll start at offensive guard and will probably also start at linebacker on defense. He was an All-MMB pick last year.

Mike Goodman is a possible starter at offensive tackle. A starter last year, Goodman is quick and aggressive.

Kevin Hufnagel will start as an offensive tackle. He started last year until he was injured. He could be a good one to watch this year.

and defensive lineman.

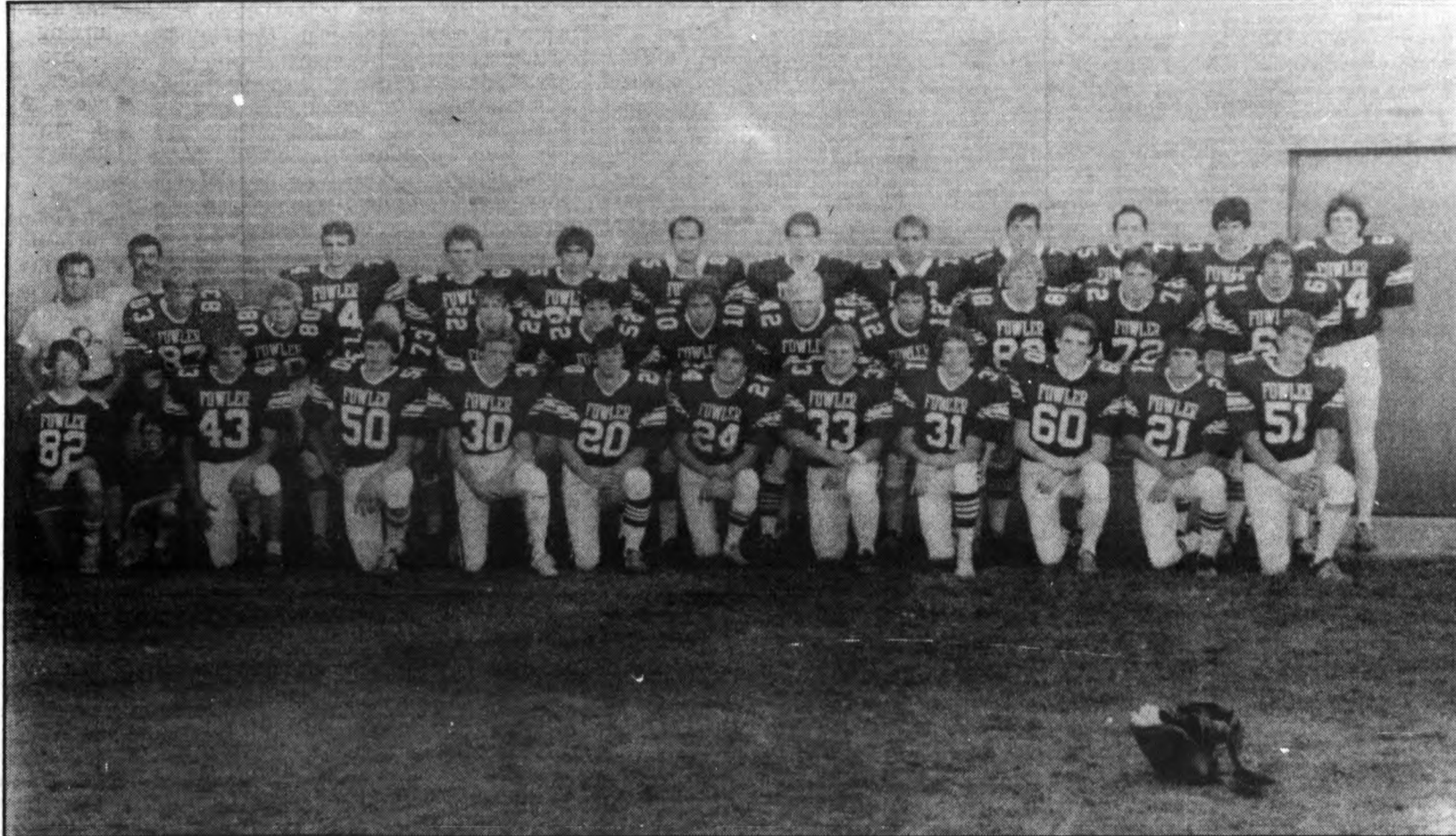

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## Hired farm workers up in Michigan

During the week of July 8-14, 122,000 people were working on farms in Michigan, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. This is up about 2 percent (2,000) from the corresponding week a year ago. This total includes farm operators, family members and hired employees working on Michigan farms.

Self-employed operators and unpaid family members remained stable at 79,000 workers, the same as last year. Hired farm workers rose almost 5 percent to 43,000 workers. The majority of the hired farm workers (74 percent), were considered less than full time, working fewer than 149 days per year.

Wage rates for hired farm workers in Michigan continued to rise during 1984. The wage rate for workers paid on an hourly basis rose 7 cents, to \$3.97, above the 1983 level. Other wage rates followed suit, as wage rates for field (\$3.96) and livestock (\$4.47) took similar increases.

Nationally, about 42 percent of the hired workers received perquisites such as meals, housing or motor vehicles in addition to the cash wages in July 1984. In July 1983, only 41 percent of the farm workers received some type of perquisite. Data from the 1983 Farm Production Expenditure survey showed that the value of perquisites represented 15 percent of the total national farm and ranch labor expenditures.

Parents' Night will be celebrated during the

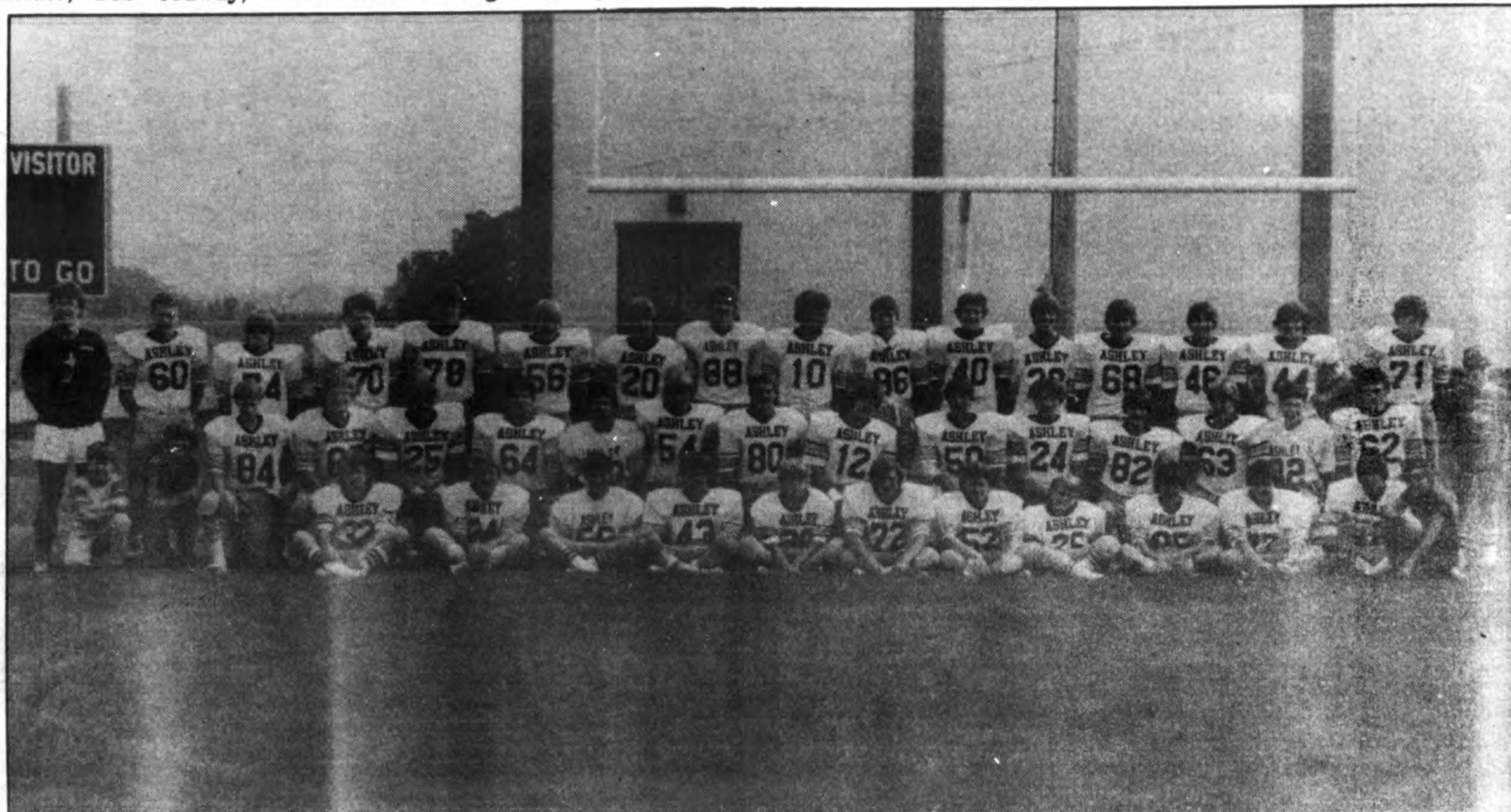
game between the Bears and Flint Academy, September 14, while Homecoming this year will take place October 19 during the game with Michigan School for the Deaf.

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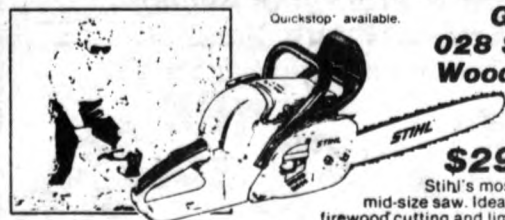
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# Marauders foresee tough season schedule

Head Coach Russ Pope makes no bones about it, his Ovid-Elsie Marauders are going to have their work cut out for them this year. Pope's concern is based on the rugged schedule his Marauders face this season. Both Pope and Coach Dennis Baratono see St. Johns and last year's MMB conference champ, Chesaning as the powers in the Mid-Michigan B league this season.

Equipped with only four starters from last year's varsity squad, Pope said Chesaning, who had an undefeated junior varsity crew last season, will "really help out" the varsity's chances for league supremacy once again. Scott Winans, a 6-1 senior at 160 pounds is the quickest man on the team. Had 34 tackles at his defensive corner spot. Will see

Eddie Coleman, a 5-11 senior at 160 pounds, had 100 yards rushing and also was in on 35 tackles at his linebacker post.

Rick Grieve, at 5-11 and 190 pounds, is a senior and last year played offensive tackle or guard and played defensive tackle. Started last four games and accounted for 37 tackles.

Dave Stoneman, a 6-2 senior at 160 pounds, will start this year at left end. Should be the best receiver on the team. Had 25 catches on junior varsity and caught four passes last year for 65 yards.

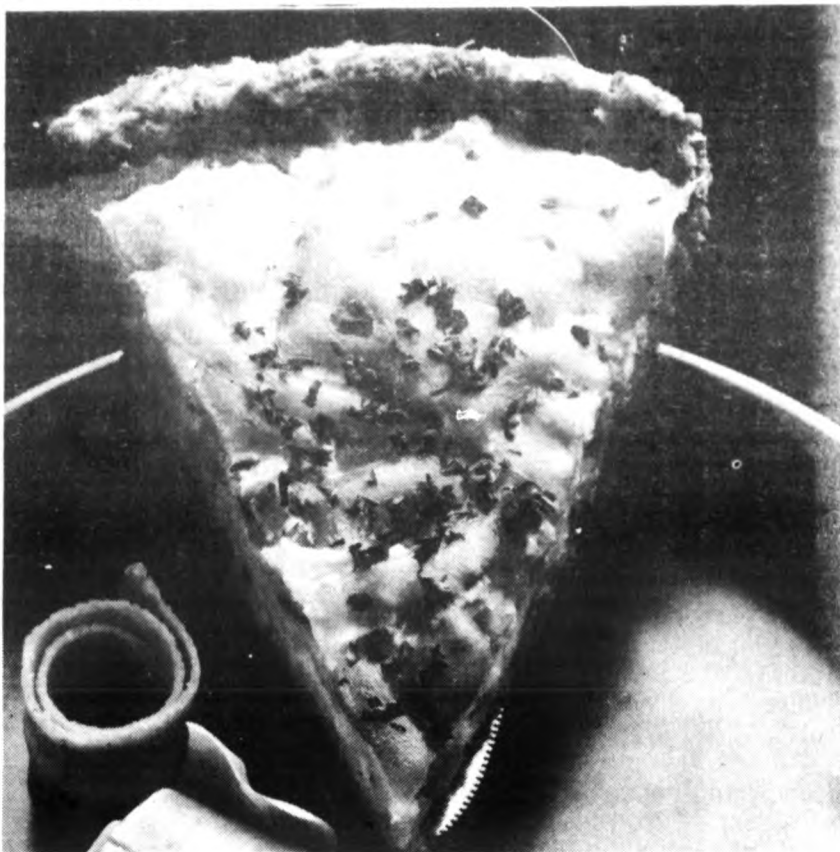

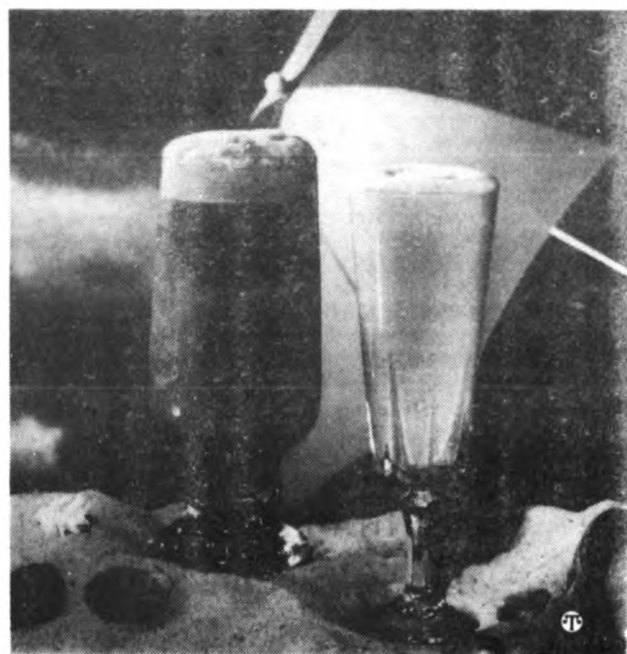

The purpose of this is to enable the painting contractors to paint the interior and exterior surfaces of the tank. The tank has not been painted since it was new in 1964. The work includes cleaning, sandblasting and applying three coats of paint on all surfaces of the tank. The anticipated time required to complete the tank project is approximately four or five weeks. (Beginning Sept. 2nd and ending Oct. 8th.)

During this project the elevated tank will of course be out of operation. This process should not effect the volume of water supplied to residents. However, variations in pressure and qualities could be noticed. The quality change means that the water could appear somewhat discolored due to the pressure variations. There is no need to be concerned regarding any health hazards because the water will be, as it always is, chlorinated and tested daily.

It would be wise to observe your water before doing laundry. If you see discoloration, postpone the task until the water clears. Normally, clearing takes only a few hours.

We do not anticipate any significant problems during the project. We do want our water customers to be aware of this necessary circumstance. Your anticipated cooperation is greatly appreciated.
