A rise from the honkey tonks

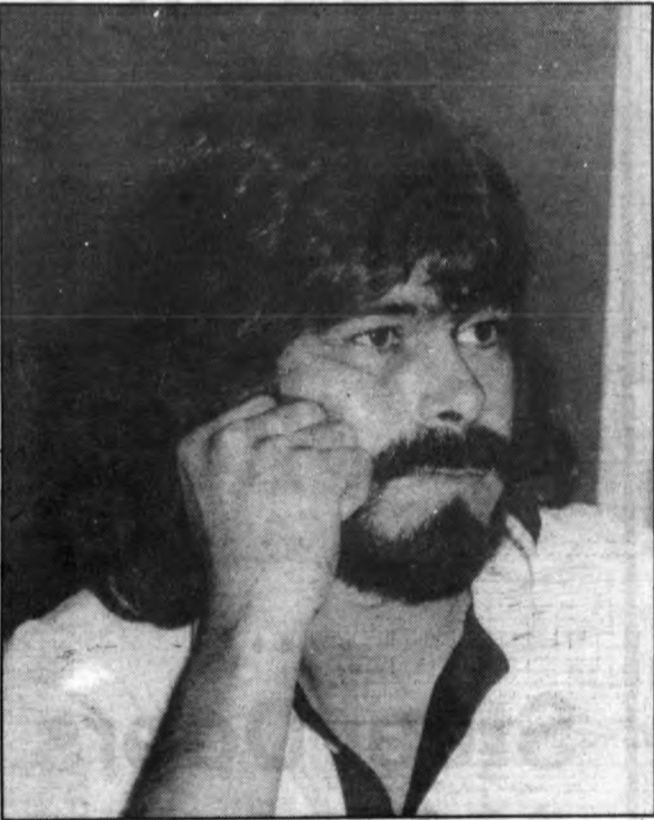
Editor's note:

Until three years ago, the name Alabama, perhaps, meant two things to most people. The State of Alabama and the University of Alabama football team. Now, the name takes on an entirely new dimension. This story is meant to give you a new insight into the meaning of Alabama.

It's been many long miles and several months since a family group of boys named Randy Owen, Jeff Cook, and Teddy Gentry left the dingy, smoked-filled barrooms of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina where they played guitar and sang to a group of drifters and other unnotables from the wrong side of the tracks. Their presence at Myrtle Beach was an almost end of the road situation for a group of guys struggling for recognition in the country music field. They had been known as Wild Country and other group names and somehow just couldn't seem to get things together. They found themselves in a predicament known to most country music aspirants trying to make the "big time in Nashville". Playing for tips and whatever handouts they could get wasn't paying the bills, much less supporting each of their individual families back in Fort Payne, Alabama. The end of the road was near, sensed Randy Owen, leader of the singing group.

It is often natural for musically inclined people when caught up in depression to write a song. Owen did just that. He wrote the song, "My Home's In Alabama". When he wrote the song he was homesick for Fort Payne, his wife and kids and his mother. He was also in a quandry what to do with his dreams for his musical group that seemed to be going nowhere. All in all, his mood suggested just what the words in the song said, no matter where he laid his head, his mind and thoughts were on his beloved state of Alabama and his group "Alabama", a new named attached to his group in search for some magic that would work.



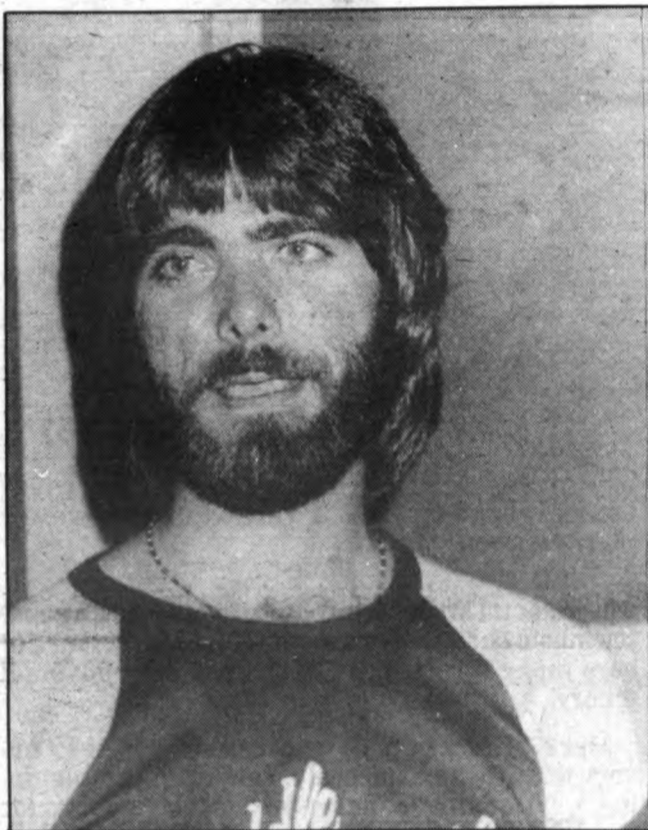

Owen's song hit the airwaves of radio stations everywhere and suddenly the group name, "Alabama", became a household word almost overnight. Since that time, very few folks need to be reminded of the fame and fortune discovered by three farm boys from the mountain areas of northeast Alabama, just off Interstate 59, 75 miles south of Chattanooga, Tennessee.

"Alabama" has been unique from other country groups in that they supplied their own music, along with the singing. Groups such as the Oak Ridge Boys, Statler Brothers, and Larry Gatlin

and the Gatlin Brothers have backup bands. Alabama has accomplished most of their fame with the foursome so familiar to country music lovers.

It seems that some of Alabama's overnight success would have to be attributed to a new member of their group added at Myrtle Beach, a young fellow by the name of Mark Herndon. Prior to Herndon's joining the group, Owen's troupe had trouble finding a drummer who could provide just the right touch to what they were trying to accomplish. Herndon came on the scene and Alabama's music took on a new flavor. From that point, Alabama has had only one direction in coun-

try music and that is up.

Since the songs, "Why Lady Why", "Tennessee River" and "Feels So Right", Alabama achieved greatness in album after album, most of which have hit platinum proportions in popularity in sales. The song, "Mountain Music" as well as other songs on the album of the same name boosted their popularity to even higher heights. Their fan club building in Fort Payne is filled with trophies received as Country Music's best. They have been honored on numerous occasions on national television as the Top Entertainers of the Year, in addition to other awards for Top Vocalists of the Year and so many others it would be hard to document their achievements.

Michigan's knowledge of "Alabama" all started in 1981 at a rodeo in the Grand Rapids suburb of Wyoming. Following a performance in Pontiac, the group eventually appeared at the Eaton County Fair in Charlotte, then in 1982 and 1983, appeared in successive years at the Ionia Free Fair. It was the first time in Ionia Fair history that any entertainment group appeared two years successively. That should bear some light on Alabama's popularity. Alabama's most recent Michigan appearance was a few weeks ago at the Jackson County Fair.

Little did Randy, Jeff, Teddy and Mark realize when they left the Myrtle Beach scene that their life was to turn to a traveling schedule that would take them from California to New York and all points between over the course of a year. That schedule would repeat itself in ensuing years ahead. All admit that the traveling gets grueling and tiresome, but commitment to their purpose has taken precedence, even over family. At this point, neither of the foursome know where the top actually is for them. It seems when they have attained what they thought would be as far as they could go, new successes drive them even higher up the ladder. Who knows where the top is for Alabama? They certainly don't know.

Interestingly enough, the boys from Fort Payne do have lives apart from the music world, although severely limited. They do manage to get back home via the airlines between engagements as often as possible. There have been occasions,

such in their appearance last summer at the Ionia Free Fair, that the buses loaded with their instruments and sound equipment will arrive several hours before the entertainers themselves. And along with this, it's not unusual for one or another of the entertainers to fly in separately to whatever location they're appearing. Such is the life of most country music performers.

For the past two summers during the month of June, Alabama took time out of their busy traveling schedule to perform benefit concerts for their own home folks in Fort Payne. On both occasions, the boys had help from such names as Lee Greenwood, Reba McEntire, T.G. Shepard and other country music notables. And from their combined efforts of a full day of entertaining, raised nearly half a million dollars which they donated to local charities, scholarship funds at Fort Payne High School and other worthwhile community programs bettering the lives of their friends and neighbors. These are the kind of folks that make up the group, Alabama.

"Alabama" is composed of four musicians. Randy Owen is the lead singer and plays the rhythm guitar; Jeff Cook plays lead guitar as Teddy Gentry plays the bass and also sings with the other three. Mark Herndon, the only single member of the group, plays the drums and sings occasionally, also. Each of the four are extremely talented and creative songwriters in their own right. When they first formed their group, long before the name Alabama meant anything to them but the state they lived in, Alabama called themselves by two names, "Wild Country" and "Young Country". They eventually settled on the name, "Alabama" and have stuck with it ever since.

In their early beginnings, they started performing at a park in Alabama called Canyon Land. They really became serious with their musical pursuits when they moved into the Myrtle Beach area in 1973 and started playing regularly at a night club known as The Bowery. They performed there on a regular basis from 1973 till 1980 with the exception of 1976. Of course, most of this time was spent without the current drummer, Mark Herndon.

Records and are under contract to them.

Although Alabama meets the public in a four-some, the group actually contains quite a few more personalities. Some are sound setup crewmen, others are security and public relations persons, while several work on the road trips selling concessions such as T-shirts, albums and other Alabama fan items. All in all, what started out to be a small enterprise eventually has mushroomed into a massive empire of operations. Alabama presently has a Fan Club building in Fort Payne, the second such one since the original one was opened on Main Street a short distance off the Interstate into town. A full staff of employees work there daily just to keep up with the group's popularity with passing tourists.

Each of the original three of the group are cousins. They admit to being nothing but "ole country boys" and are as common as your next door neighbor to meet. According to Randy, that's the way they intend to keep themselves.

Randy is nearing 34, if not already. He is married to wife Kelly and has a daughter, Alison, 6 and a son, Heath about 3 years old.

Jeff is about 35 and is married to wife Josie. He has a daughter, Crystal who's about 9 now.

Teddy, the sentimental father of the bunch, as indicated by the number of songs he's written about his own kids, is about 33. He has a wife, Linda and two children, Sally, 7 and Joshua, nearing 5.

Mark is the only bachelor of the group and according to a conversion held a couple years ago, intends to keep it that way. He said traveling around as a musician is no life for a married couple. The other three admit to the same thinking Mark has, but realizing things have to be the way they are, work hard at keeping their marriages intact. At this point, no problems have reportedly existed.

Although one would have to admit, all four members of Alabama have interesting personal life stories, Mark's story would have to top the list. It goes like this:

Unlike Randy, Jeff and Teddy who were raised on farms in rural Fort Payne, Alabama, Mark came from an entirely different background. His roots originated in New England.

His music started at a young age from encouragement from his mother who was a classical pianist and his grandmother who had been a former concert pianist at Carnegie Hall. It was only natural that Mark would start piano lessons at a pre-school age. Attempting to follow the footsteps blueprinted for him, Mark sat hour after hour at the keyboard gaining musical expertise. Mark soon lost interest in the obvious boredom plaguing his life and at 15, developed an intense interest in girls and cars. He eventually gained a pilot's license at the age of 16.

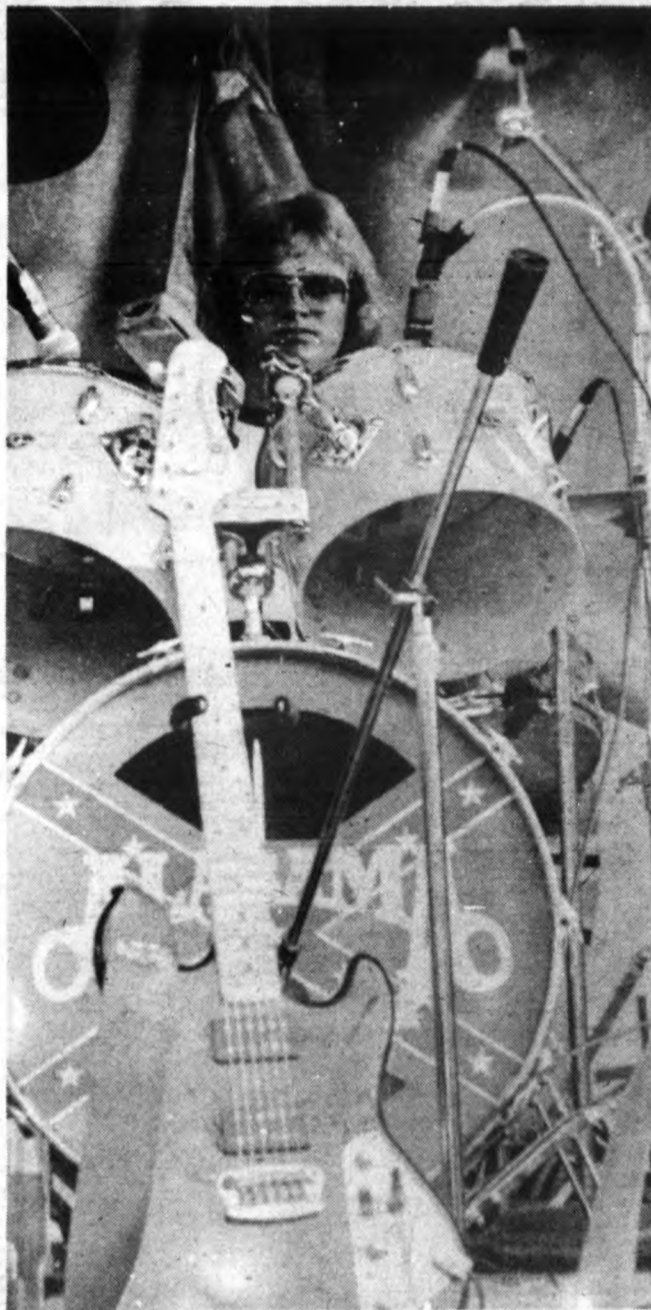
Destiny did have something in store for Mark along the music lines, when one night while attending a high school dance, he watched a good friend of his having lots of fun on the drums. As he put it, "It hit me like a bolt of lightning that drums were what I wanted to play."

Not being able to afford drums at the time, Mark said he bought a set of drumsticks and started banging around on his knees, pillows and everything around that would tolerate his need for rhythm making.

"I guess I was just a late bloomer," he said, as he modestly admitted being a professional musician for only 3 years at the time we first talked.

Looking back over the years, Mark mused at his earlier dreams of wanting to perform in a concert hall, not realizing what real fame laid in wait for him.

An inspiration to any teenager today, Mark proved that success in life can be gained without booze and drugs, especially in the music field

where social attitudes promote ideas that all country music performers are "into it." Mark, and I'm sure many others, have disproved that universal theory.

Mark, who originally expressed himself to me very warmly and sincerely, said from the beginning, "Alabama" had set forth goals for themselves. First it was to make the "top 40" on the music charts, then it was to achieve the "top 10". Since they achieved both those goals a long time ago, Alabama has few goals humanly left to achieve. They've about done it all now.

Since Alabama's first appearance in Michigan at the Wyoming Rodeo, the tempo of their popularity has soared. Their successive appearances at Ionia, plus their numerous other appearances throughout Michigan since 1981 have proved that "the little ole country boys from Fort Payne" are indeed here to stay, at least in the hearts and minds of many Michiganians.

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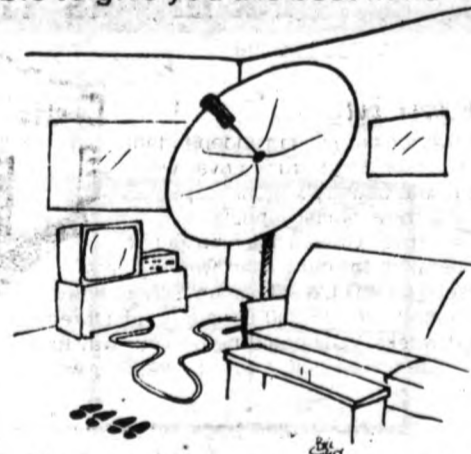
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Fulton tames the Huskies

Fulton High School's tailback, Andre Bergeron scored both the touchdown and the 2-point conversion run to give the Pirates a victory in their home opener Friday night against the Breckenridge Huskies, 8-6.

In addition to Bergeron's heroics, another Pirate came in for his moment of glory also. Teammate Dave Stephens was credited with perhaps making the play of the night when he stopped a Breckenridge attempt

at a 2-point conversion following a touchdown. This, if it had been allowed, would have placed the conclusion of the game in a possible tie situation. Stephens' heads up play stymied the Huskies effort and the Pirates held on to take the non-league win.

Bergeron's touchdown came in the third quarter with about 10 minutes to play. He quickly followed with his two-point play to give his team the lead.

Fulton now prepares for their next opponent as they host the Clare Pioneers this Friday.

Suggestion award shared at GM

Two solution attendants from Oldsmobile's Plant 3 will share the division's first General Motors Suggestion Plan Maximum Award of \$20,000.

The award, the maximum amount which can be presented for a suggestion, goes to Richard L. Ettinger and Larry L. Williams. The men suggested that a nickel sulfate solution be recycled instead of being removed by a waste disposal company.

The suggestion is estimated to save the division nearly \$134,000 annually in solution and hauling costs.

Williams, a Middleton resident, has been employed by Oldsmobile for nearly 20 years. Ettinger, who lives in St. Johns, has worked for the division since 1952.

The GM Suggestion Plan was created in 1942 with Maximum Awards of \$1,000. In 1968, a \$10,000 Maximum Award was established, and that figure was increased to \$20,000 for suggestions submitted on or after May 1, 1983.

The lady has grace and dignity

She could fairly be described as a classic beauty. Thick curls frame strong yet serene features—well-spaced eyes, long Roman nose, generous mouth and clearly defined chin. Tall, full-figured and stately in bearing, the Statue of Liberty's face and form are familiar to millions all over the world.

Her curls—some of them close to 8 feet long—surround a noble head that is 10 feet from ear to ear and 17 feet 3 inches from cranium to chin. Each eye is 2 1/2 feet wide, her nose is 4 1/2 feet long and her mouth measures 3 feet across. Liberty is 151 feet tall without her pedestal.

It is her pedestal, however, that anchors the lady firmly to old Fort Wood on Liberty Island in New York City's windy Upper Bay. The granite-faced pedestal is 89 feet high with a 65-foot-high base, making the entire statue 305 feet tall. Until the turn of the century, Liberty alone dominated the New York skyline. Today, she remains the most colossal statue in the world.

For almost 100 years, the classical goddess, designed by French sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi and created in the image of his mother, has watched over New York's harbor. She bears a torch symbolizing liberty and wears a seven-spiked crown radiating to each of the seven continents and the seven seas. At the statue's feet are broken shackles signifying freedom from tyranny. In her left hand, she clasps a 24-foot tablet marking America's birthdate, July 4, 1776—in Roman numerals, of course.

All in all, it was quite a birthday gift that the United States received in Paris on July 4, 1884, when Ferdinand de Lesseps, president of the Union Franco-Americaine, presented the statue of "Liberty Enlightening the World" to Levi P. Morton, U.S. Minister to Paris. On that festive occasion, de Lesseps noted that France's gift

Maple River Game area expanded

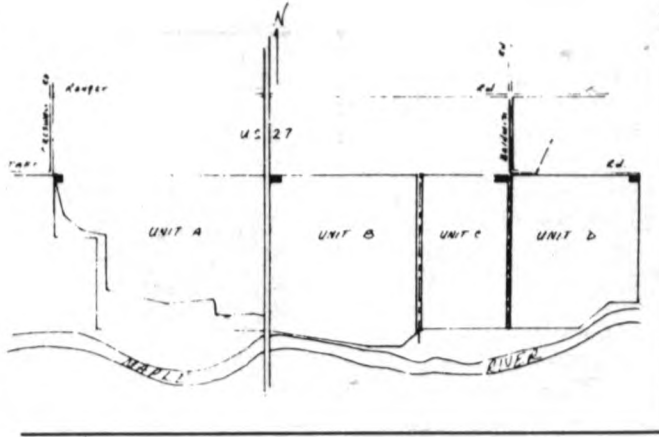
This year the Maple River State Game Area has been incorporated into waterfowl hunting zone II. This includes the managed units located east of US-27. Season dates are from September 29 through October 4 and October 13 through November 25.

Reserved Hunting: Reservations are required for managed hunting units A, B and C on September 29. Permits may be obtained by sending reservation application cards to the Wildlife Division headquarters in Lansing no later than noon, September 10. Permits are not required to hunt in unit D or in other portions of Maple River State Game Area "west."

Restrictions and other information: Hunting will be open daily on all units throughout the season. There will not be a hunting closure on even or odd days as has been done in the past years. No hunting is allowed from any dike. Hunters are asked to comply with all hunting and shooting hour regulations and to report all violations.

Unit B has succeeded nicely from the 1981 drawdown and is approaching near 50:50 cover to water. Motoring may be somewhat difficult but hunting opportunity and waterfowl staging should be greatly improved. Hunters are cautioned of the deepboat access channels in unit A.

Steel Shot: Although preferred, steel shot is not required this season. A proposal to include the managed units in the steel shot zone for 1985 is pending.

Only with this cooperation is it possible to compile dependable data for decision making.

Survey results are expected to be released in June 1985.

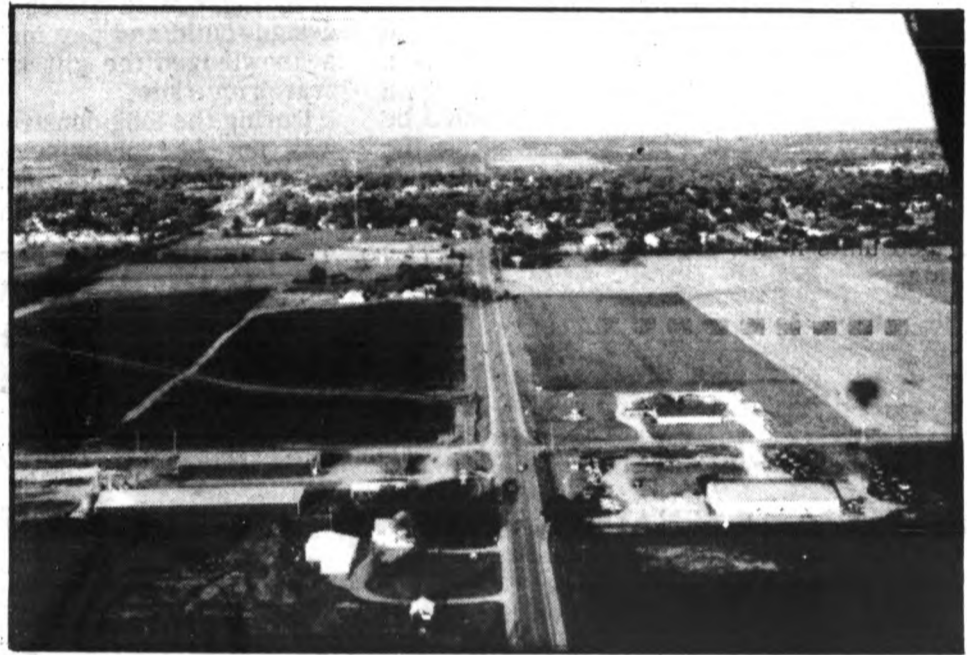

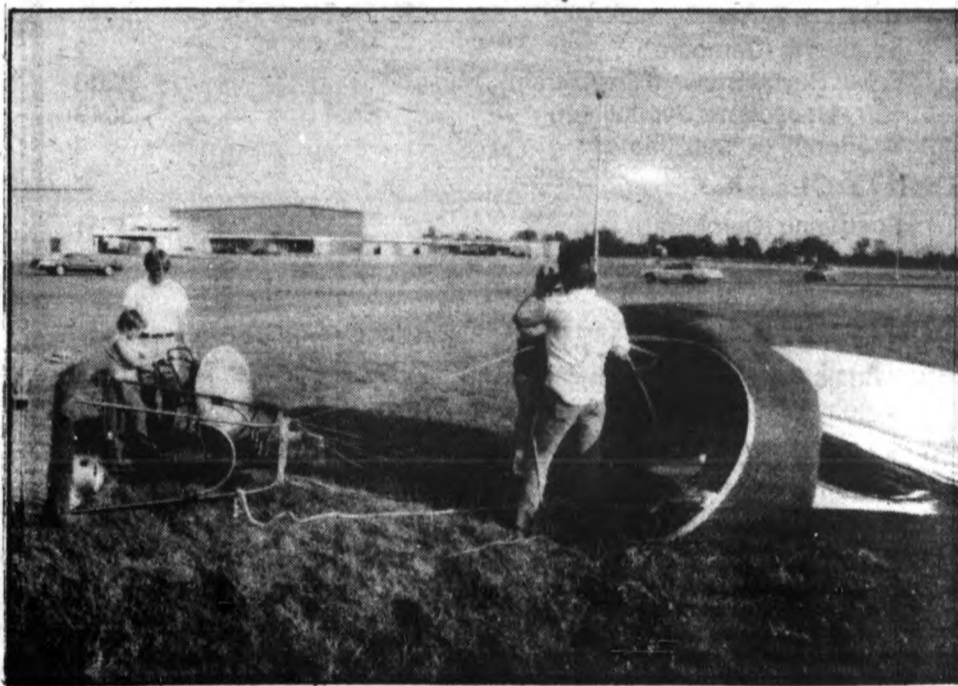

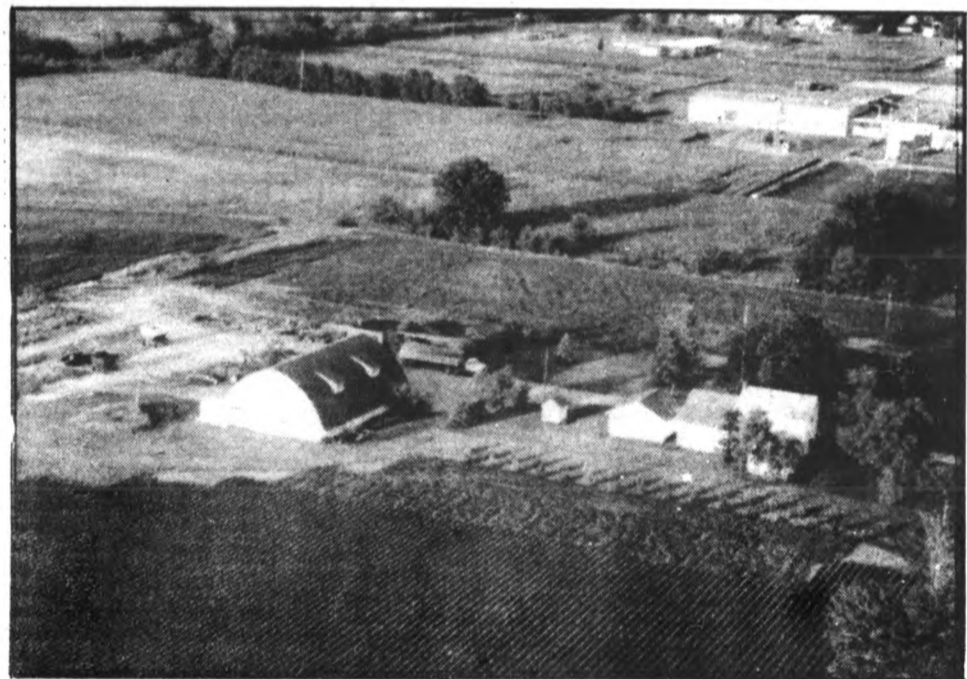

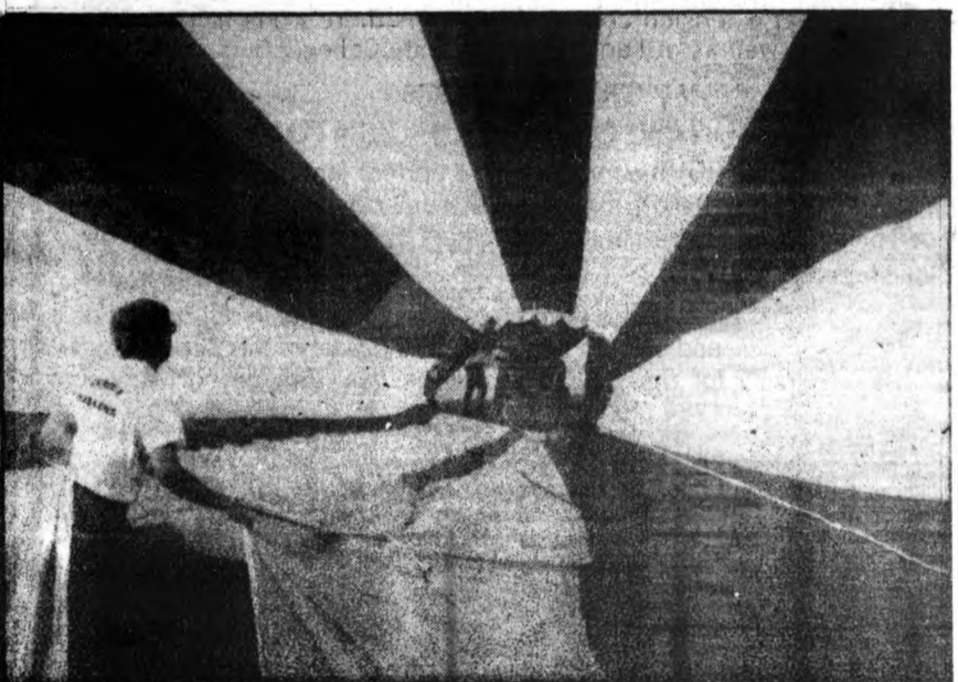

Statue of Liberty needs everyone's help

represented the contributions of 180 cities, 40 general councils, a large number of societies and more than 100,000 subscribers. "We commit it to your care, Mr. Minister, that it may remain forever the pledge of the bonds which should unite France and the great American nation." What de Lesseps didn't know then was that, by the time the statue was on her way to America, the French committee would be relieved to be rid of the 450,000-pound lady.

Liberty Enlightening the World wasn't even a gleam in her creator's eye until the evening in 1865 when Edouard de Laboulaye gathered a small group of French intellectuals around his dinner table. Laboulaye, a distinguished jurist, academic and ardent admirer of the republican form of government, believed passionately in America. To his dinner guests, he sang the praises of that long-lived republic which stood in contrast to monarchical Europe and to a France in constant political upheaval.

According to sculptor Bartholdi's account, Laboulaye speculated about a joint French-American project, a monument "to be built in America as a memorial to their independence." It would have been politically dangerous for French republicans to erect a statue to liberty in Paris in Napoleon III's Second Empire, but America was a different matter. Government at home could be more safely criticized through a statue across the sea.

Bartholdi set sail for America in the spring of

1871 in search of what Laboulaye had called a "happy idea," a plan for a monument that would "excite public enthusiasm." That summer, he traveled everywhere, making new American friends for himself and the monument. The sculptor visited the poet Longfellow and smoked a cigar with President Grant.

Bartholdi sent Laboulaye a report of his first impressions of America, right down to her peas: "Everything here is big, even the petits-pois..." As he traveled, the monument took definite shape in his mind. Liberty Enlightening the World would be "a statue of colossal proportions which would surpass all that have ever existed since the most ancient times." Bedloe's Island in New York harbor, gateway to the New World, became his choice as an appropriate site for the American colossus.

But monuments take time to rise and colossal monuments take lots of time. Meant for America's 1876 centennial, Liberty would not come to these shores for another decade.

Committees were formed on both sides of the Atlantic, the Union Franco-Americaine in 1875 and the American Committee in 1877. The French would raise funds to build the statue and transport it to the United States. The Americans would design, build and pay for the pedestal. Congress acknowledged the gift in 1877 and authorized a search for a site.

During the long construction period, the statue was not idle. Liberty did her part in self-promotion and fund-raising. Her right forearm and torch made a hit in Philadelphia at America's

Centennial Exposition. Her head appeared at the Paris Universal Exhibition of 1878. And in the summer of 1882, when she was completed to the waist, Bartholdi gave a little luncheon for 20 journalists in her right knee. Tireless promoter though he was, sometimes even Bartholdi grew impatient. He wrote to his mother: "One cannot imagine all I have had to do and especially to wait, it was like the cooking of a poor crawfish."

In 1879, the project's original architect, Viollet-le-Duc, died, and a new engineer was chosen. "Gustave Eiffel was the logical choice for Bartholdi," observes Robert Vogel, curator of mechanical and civil engineering at the Smithsonian's Museum of American History. "Even before his famous tower, he had an excellent reputation based on his bridges—spectacular in their size, span and scope."

Like any classic beauty, the Statue of Liberty has good "bones." Her innovative iron skeleton, designed by Eiffel, is the framework which supports a fragile copper skin approximately the thickness of two quarter-dollars. Bartholdi chose copper because it is light, strong yet easily worked, attractive and resistant to salt-laden air. Because his giant work would have to travel across the ocean, he constructed it in 300 pieces.

No part of Liberty's shell rests directly on the parts below; each is hung independently on the iron skeleton, foreshadowing the development of the skyscraper in the late 19th century. Thanks to

Statue of Liberty: a lady of grace

the genius of Eiffel's design, the statue has been able to adjust to temperature and atmospheric changes and to resist the strong winds that buffeted her.

Liberty has withstood the winds of adversity and change as well. After her formal presentation to the American envoy, she stood for months in lonely majesty, towering over Paris rooftops, in back of Bartholdi's workshop. She then spent long months on French docks packed in 214 custom-made crates marked for reassembly in New York's harbor. Liberty lacked the promised American pedestal still on the drawing board of its designer, Richard Morris Hunt, dean of American architecture. There wasn't enough money to start the job.

Boston, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Chicago, Cleveland, St. Louis, Minneapolis and Baltimore newspapers editorialized that their cities would raise the money in no time should the statue be offered to them. The New York Times expressed moral outrage: "This statue is dear to us, though we have never looked upon it, and no third-rate town is going to step in and take it from us."

It took another New York paper to act. Joseph Pulitzer, publisher of the New York World, began a relentless "people's campaign" that didn't stop until the necessary amount remaining for the pedestal's construction, \$100,000, had been raised. Daily he recorded every contribution, no matter how small, and printed letters like this one: "I am only a sewing girl but I am in full sympathy with your effort." She sent 50 cents.

On the great day of Liberty's dedication, October 28, 1886—a day so wet and foggy that the fireworks had to be postponed—it is unlikely that President Cleveland, Bartholdi or any of the dignitaries and guests gave any thought to the hundreds of immigrants unloading their scanty belongings at Manhattan's Battery. They certainly in no way connected the immigrants with the statue. But two poets foresaw what Liberty would come to mean to the millions of immigrants who came to America in great waves from the year of her dedication until the mid-1920's.

Emma Lazarus, a young poet with a growing literary reputation, had written an ode to Liberty to help raise money for her pedestal. In Emma's poem, the Statue of Liberty became the "Mother of Exiles." Famed poet James Russell Lowell

write to Emma, "Your sonnet gives its subject a reason d'etre"—literally, a reason to be—"which it wanted before."

In an irony of history, the Statue of Liberty became a national monument in the same year, 1924, that the National Origins Act set a ceiling on immigration and established a national origins quota system. Once again, Liberty's meaning was transformed. The tide of immigration ebbed, and, in two world wars, American men sailed to battle. Most of them came home—to the Statue of Liberty's welcome.

And so it came to pass that Lady Liberty—a handsome Parisian immigrant—became the symbol of America herself. Even in this day of women's liberation, she is one lady everyone wants to keep on her pedestal.

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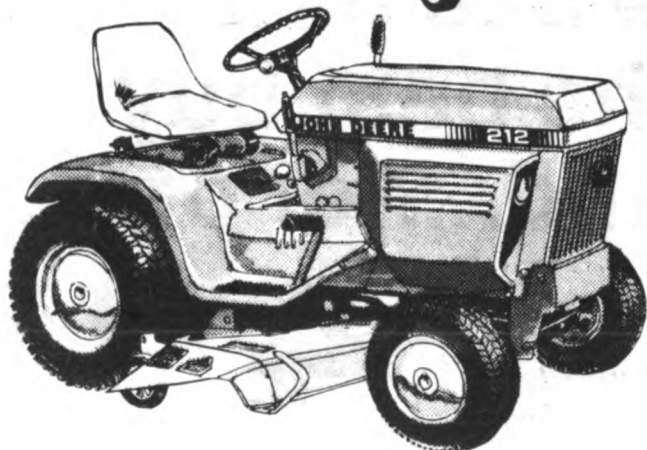
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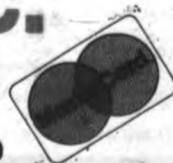
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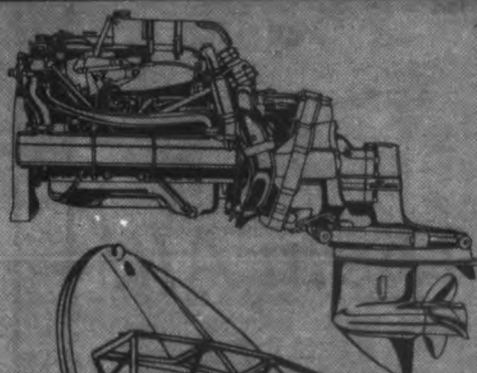


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
