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Commission reopens bids for Fire Hall project

After spending the last month reassessing the plans for the proposed Fire Hall, St. Johns City Manager Randy Humphrey announced Monday night that no exclusive problem was determined as cause for the high bids on the stalled project. Instead, he said the problem has a number of contributing factors.

When presenting the Fire Hall project Architect Herminio Roldan estimated the entire cost would not exceed \$91,740. However, the lowest bid the city received for the project was \$106,131, approximately 14 percent over the estimated cost. The other bid was \$154,000.

Plans for the new Fire Hall were recently adopted by the Commission after the Flint architect presented a plan that included building a concrete skeleton adjacent to the St. Johns Police Department on M-21. Inside work for the Fire Hall would be completed on a volunteer basis by firemen and others in the community.

After investigation of the cause for the high bids, Humphrey discovered several reasons including an over optimistic architect estimate, lack of sufficient time for the contractors to bid, busier schedules for contractors, competition with Sealed Power bids and a late starting day for otherwise weather conscious contractors.

Upon reviewing the results of the investigation, the commission voted to reopen bids rather than develop a new plan. Humphrey stated that he felt that because of the uncertainty of all the circumstances and the general feeling that the basic building, as designed, is in the long-term best interest of the city, the rebidding is the best alternative. He described several reasons why including the minimal cost of rebidding, better scheduling for contractors, possible redesigning if the bids are again out of range and a planned fireman's fundraiser to help generate furnishing and equipment costs.

Rebids will be taken in October with a tentative award slated for the first meeting in December.

The Commission also approved the special assessment roll for the Clinton Avenue/Central Business District Improvements, as well as approved the low bid for the project, Searles Construction at \$136,156.15.

The improvements are being made jointly with the city, private business owners and \$47,200 recently received from the Small Cities Public Works Grant. The city will be paying \$61,622, approximately 39 percent of the project, while private business owners pick up the balance of \$49,133 over a five year period. The assessment for the property owners break down to \$27.085 per front foot.

Included in the downtown improvements will be refurbishing sidewalks, curbs and gutters, repaving the roads and restoring the water leads on the three blocks of Clinton Avenue, from M-21 to the railroad crossing.

Searles Construction has stated they will wait until Spring before starting on any construction work. The water department has however, begun on the water service leads.

In other action, the Commission agreed to allow a road block on Cass and Linden Streets, and Cass and Wight Streets, each school day between 7:45 a.m. and 8:05 a.m., and 2:35 p.m. and 2:45 p.m.

Since Cass is heavily traveled by cars and St.

Surveillance team arrests three area men

Three area men were arrested Sept. 10 after a surveillance team made up of six police and sheriffs departments watched the men reportedly break into Baker's Foodland, of 127 E. Main Street, Elsie.

Josh Allen Eldridge, 19, of 401 Church Street, St. Johns; Daniel Fox, 18, of 214 N. Second Street, Elsie; and Michael Lee O'Dell, 18, of 114 E. Main Street, Elsie, were arrested after breaking into the store through the front main window at approximately 3:51 a.m. Making several trips, the men took stolen beer and cigarettes to a pick-up truck parked in the dead end alley across the street.

According to Detective Sgt. Richard May, of the Clinton County Detective Bureau, the truck then

failed to start, causing the men to move the stolen items to two additional cars and an apartment owned by O'Dell.

May said the three men were arrested inside the apartment and almost everything was recovered. All three were taken to the Clinton County Jail and arraigned Monday with Judge Fred Lewis presiding.

The surveillance team was created after police received calls of four area breaking and enterings and eight attempts. The Clinton County Sheriffs Department, the Clinton County Detective Bureau and the St. Johns Police Department joined the Gratiot County Sheriffs Department, Ithaca State Police Post, Elsie Police Department and the Shiawassee County Sheriffs Department in watching the area businesses.

Schuette welcomes Vice-President to convention

Bill Schuette, 10th District Congressional Candidate, led 200 district delegates and alternates to the Michigan Republican Convention in Detroit recently. He also took time to meet an old friend.

Schuette welcomed Vice President George Bush to the convention, attended by nearly 2000 party loyalists at Detroit's Cobo Hall. Bush was the keynote speaker. The two have known one another since 1976.

"It was great to see Mr. Bush again," Schuette said. "I was able to bring him up to date on the progress we are making. We've campaigned a lot together over the years."

Schuette, who is challenging Democratic incumbent Don Albosta in November's general election, served with Mr. Bush's campaign for the presidential nomination in Michigan, Florida and Washington during 1979-1980. In 1980, Schuette was political director for the Reagan/Bush campaign in Michigan.

"I discussed with Mr. Bush how important it is for the voters in the 10th District to have a voice in Washington not shouting for higher taxes and higher government spending," Schuette said. "I told him the voters in mid-Michigan need a voice on the House Agriculture Committee."

United Way sets goal for county

The 1984-85 Capital Area United Way for Clinton County is being kicked off on Sept. 17. The goal for the CAUW is \$4,748,653. The goal for Clinton County is \$57,000.

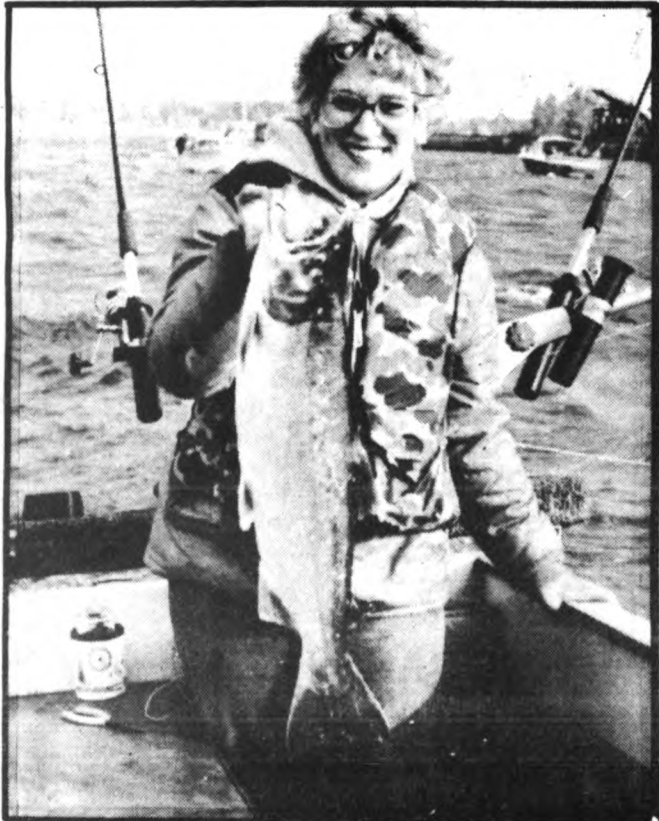
Outdoor Life

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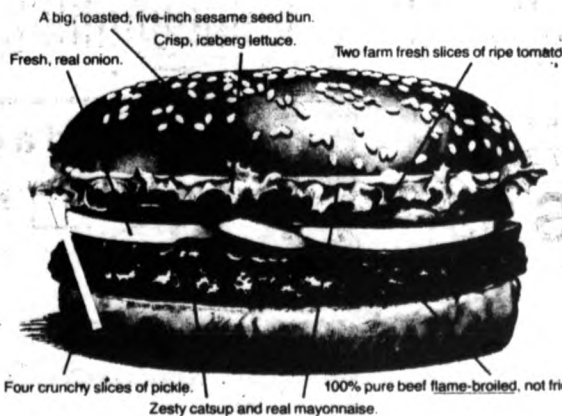

Clearing begins on Maple

Work will begin this week on the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers clearing and snagging of the Maple River. "Just as soon as the necessary contract documents are in order," according to D.A. Kloote Contractor's Project Manager Jack Kennedy. "At the present time we are moving our equipment

on site, in anticipation of the final formalities. Our goal is to be completed with all our work by October 1st," he said. The work consists of clearing and snagging 1.5 miles east of the north bound bridge on US-27 and sedimentation removal at four other sites along the Maple River which are

as follows: Area No. 1) Located approximately 2 miles west of Maple Rapids where the Maple River and the Hayworth drain meet. Area No. 2) Is located at the Maple Rapids Road bridge. Area No. 3) Is situated east of the south bound bridge on US-27. And Area No. 4) Is at the Blair Road bridge and the Maple River.

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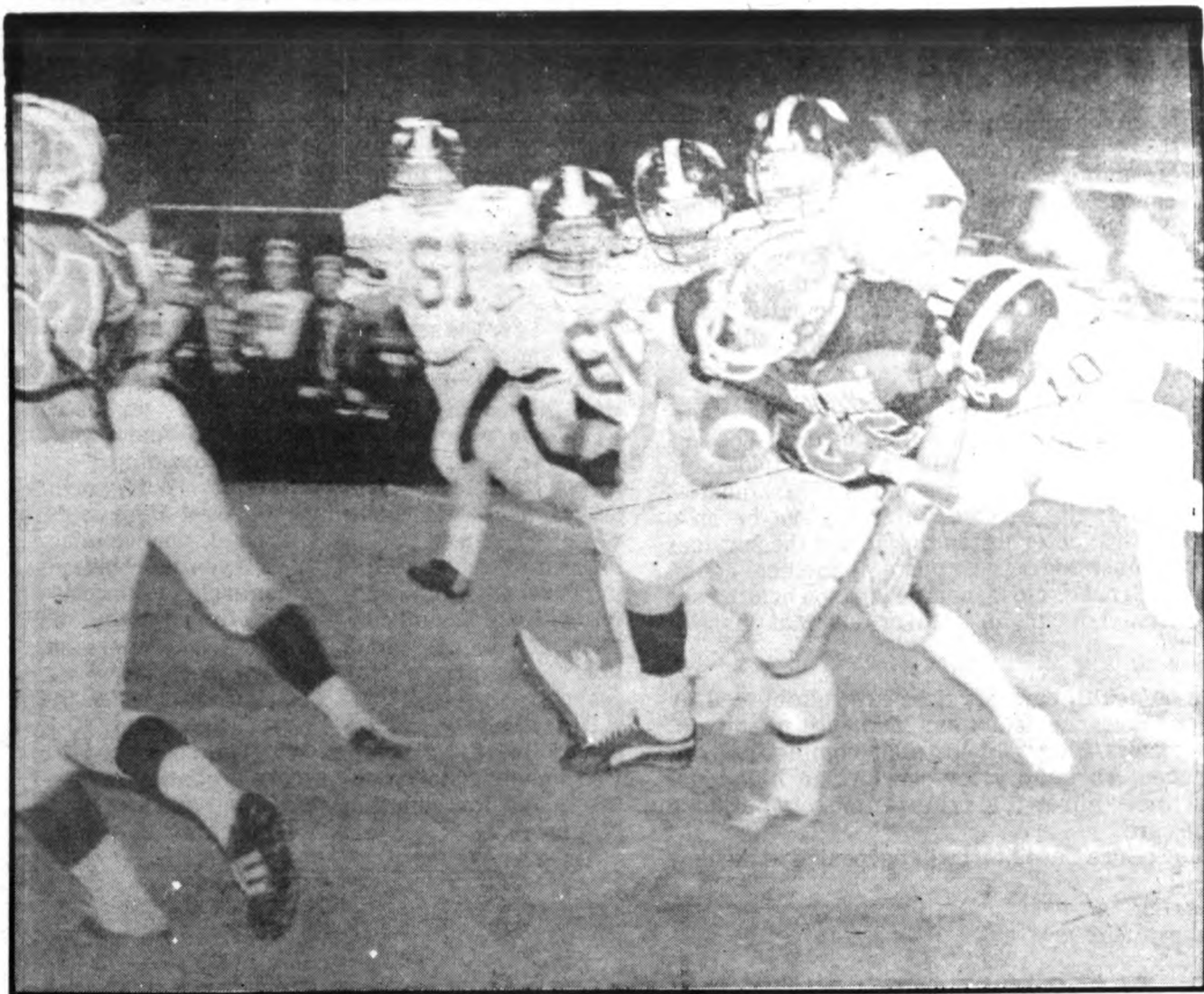

Food program begins for children

The Capital Area Community Services-Head Start announces the sponsorship of the Child Care Food Program. This program is designed primarily to provide meals to children in child care centers, outside school hours programs and family day care homes. and very pleasing to hear from persons who have a sentimental feeling for the Colony and its buildings. Many have written to tell of their connection through an ancestor and have enclosed memberships and memorial money.

Mrs. Marjorie Proctor of Carson City writes: "My great-grandmother, Adelia M. (Smith) Densmore, attended the first Colony school and later taught the children there,

possibly 1854 to 1859-- well before the "old" school was built. Her parents were Methodist Circuit Riders--Sidney L. Smith

and Phoebe (Scott) Smith; they came from Washtenau County in 1838, settling on a small farm east of the Colony.

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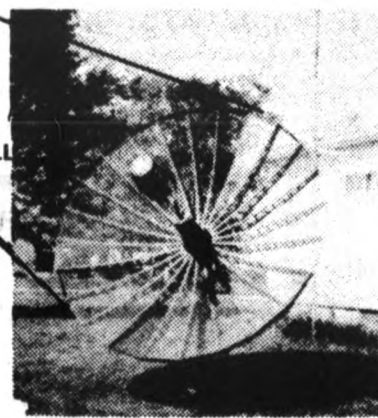


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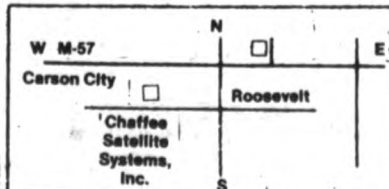

SeCure Care will offer a full range of services to homebound patients in an area including Montcalm, Gratiot, Ionia and Clinton Counties, and parts of Shiawassee County. Services will include nursing, home health aide/homemaker, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, medical social service, nutritionist and pharmacy consultation.

These services can only be provided on a physician referral basis. When a referral is received from a physician, a Registered Nurse will visit the individual in the home within a 24-hour period.

The nurse will complete a comprehensive evaluation of the client and establish a plan of care. Professional Registered Nurses offer the following services: Nursing Assessments, Treatments, Referrals to other community resources, Assistance to individuals and families in coping

with and managing illness at home, Health education, Monitoring of unstable medical conditions and Care of the terminally ill.

At times, a referral will be received for rehabilitation services only. The rehabilitation team offers the following service: Exercise programs after illness or surgery, Assistance in the use of adaptive equipment to perform activities of daily living and Assistance with communication skills.

In order to qualify for home health care services, the following criteria must be met: The services offered must be ordered and be under the direction of a physician; the ill individual must be homebound; the services offered must be on a short term or intermitten basis; and the services offered must address an unstable medical condition which needs close monitoring by a health care professional during an acute or terminal phase of illness.

Home health care services are reimbursed by major insurances such as: Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross/Blue Shield and commercial insurances. To qualify for service, an individual must meet all of the criteria for reimbursable home care.

The SeCure Care Staff will be located in the new

Carson Regional Health Services Building, when completed.

Carson City Hospital has always been a leader in meeting the health care needs of the community. The new home health care program is a response to such an identified need. The goal is improved accessibility and continuity of health care services for those in the Carson City region.

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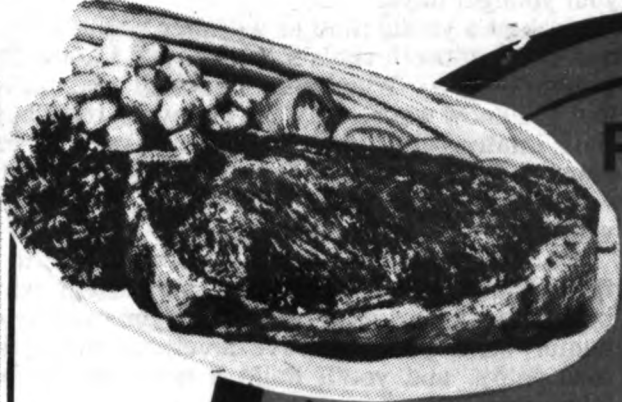
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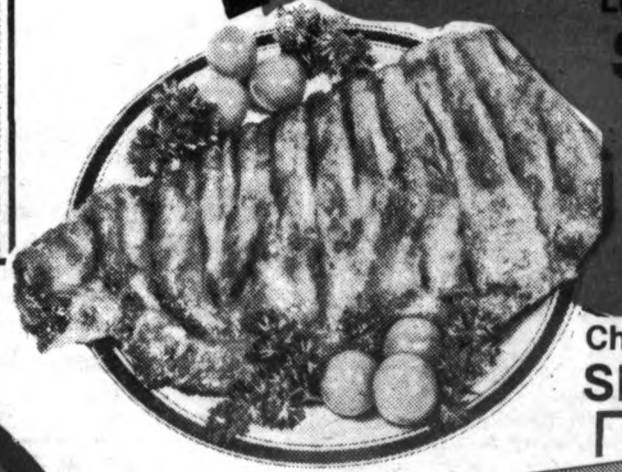
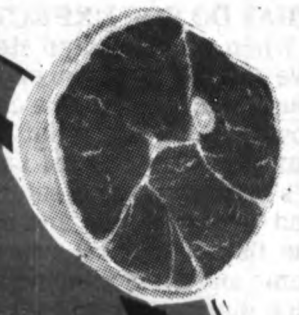
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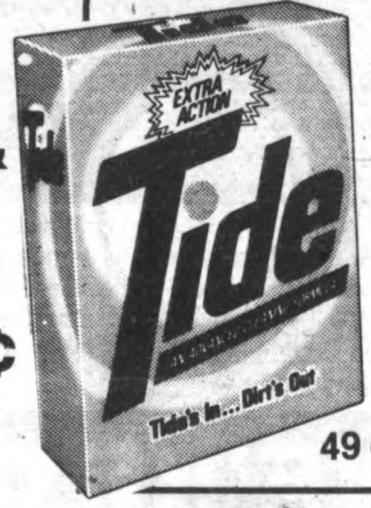
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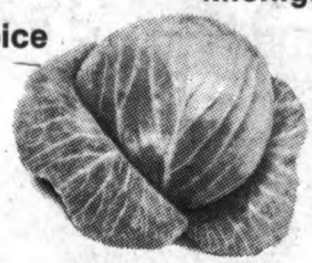
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Whitford honored as top fund-raiser in contest

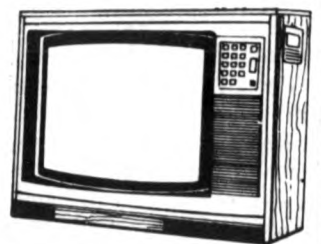

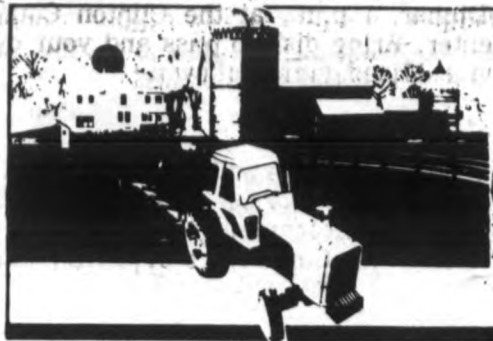

Grange Policy to be set at Session

Farms and sales increase in census

The number of small farms and the value of all agricultural product sales increased between the 1978 and 1982 agricultural censuses, preliminary data from the Commerce Department's Census Bureau shows.

Farms less than 50 acres increases 17 percent to 637,000, according to the 1982 census, conducted in 1983. Their growth helped to keep the total farm loss under one percent, one of the smallest declines in recent decades. The new count is 2,241,000 compared with 2,257,000 in 1978.

At the other end of the scale, the number of farms with 2,000 acres or more rose by 1,224 between censuses to a total of 64,525.

The market value of agricultural products sold amounted to \$131.8 billion compared with \$107.1 billion in 1978, up 23 percent. Average sales per farm grew to \$58,855 from \$47,424. Farms with sales of \$100,000 or more gained by 80,723 for a total of 302,964. The dollar figures have not been adjusted for inflation during that period. The Bureau points out that the Consumer Price Index (CPI), based on the costs of food and beverages, was up 35 percent for food for the same period.

Livestock, dairy and poultry products in 1982 accounted for 53 percent of the sales, or \$69.5 billion; livestock alone brought in 33 percent or \$43.5 billion. Other totals were dairy products, \$16.3 billion or 13 percent; and poultry, \$9.7 billion or seven percent. Crop sales totaled \$62.3 billion, or 47 percent of all sales; grain accounted for more than half.

Small farm growth was the greatest in Texas, which saw an increase of 14,109 farms under 50 acres to 44,587. This was a 46 percent gain from the 1978 census and small farms now account for one-fourth of the state's farms and ranches. Vermont's increase was 59 percent, to 1,026.

The census data show that large operations continue to dominate sales and production. Here are some figures:

- Only one percent of farms sold 500 or more head of cattle and calves but they 43 percent of cattle sold.
- Those selling 500 or more head of hogs totaled 16 percent of farms selling hogs but captured 70 percent of hogs sold.
- Farms with 20,000 or more hens and pullets comprised only two percent of producers but had 79 percent of inventories.

Other findings from the 1982 Census of Agriculture:

- The farmland total of 984.8 million acres was down from 1 billion acres from 1978.
- Harvested cropland was 326.3 million acres, up three percent.
- There was relatively little change in the number of acres irrigated between 1978 and 1982. This is against the background of an expansion in irrigation from 39.1 million to 49 million acres from 1969 to 1982. In that period, the West gained 14 percent to 26.1 million acres, 8.5 million of it in California. The North Central Region's irrigation doubled, from 5.1 million to 10.9 million acres.
- In acres harvested, wheat edged out corn, 70.9 million to 69.9 million. Soybeans increased from 61.3 million in 1978 to 64.8 million acres in 1982.
- The milk cow total rose from 10.2 million to 10.9 million.
- Broilers sold rose from 3.1 billion birds to 3.5 billion, but producer farms declined from 31,743 to 30,104.

Residents along Park Lake Road were left in the dark early Friday morning after an East Lansing resident lost control of his automobile and struck a utility pole.

According to Bath Township Police, Robert Bruce Gray, 20, of 212 Milord, was southbound on Park Lake Road at approximately 1:30 a.m., when his automobile left the road after taking a curve too fast. The car not only struck a utility pole, but also approximately 14 mailboxes and a street sign.

Power was restored to the Park Lake Road residents after Consumer Power officials worked more than seven hours on the downed lines. Gray was issued a citation for reckless driving.

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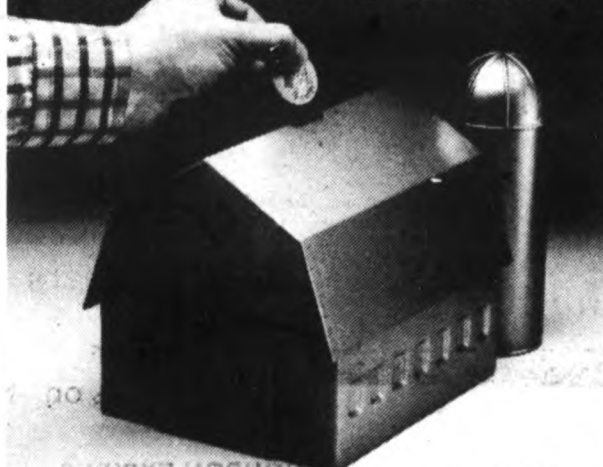

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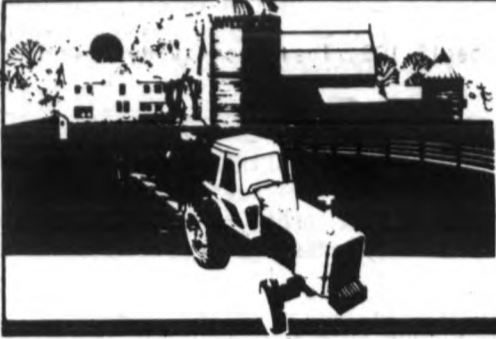
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Farm News

Index of Prices falls four percent

The Index of Prices received by Michigan farmers for all farm products was 133 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending August 15. This represents a 4 percent decline from July, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Despite this month's decline, farm commodity prices remain 2 percent above a year ago. The Index of Prices paid by farmers, nationwide, for commodities and services, interest, taxes, and farm wage rates for August was 165 percent of its 1977 base. This was unchanged from July but 3 percent above a year earlier. Index increases from July to August of this year for family living items and feeder livestock were offset by decreases for feed and fuel.

Overall, crop prices dropped 5 percent from a month ago and livestock prices declined 1 percent. Price levels were down for most commodities in-

cluded in the monthly index. Winter wheat, dry beans, and hay showed no price change. Milk was the only commodity that showed a price increase during the month. Price declines were noted in corn, oats, soybeans, steers and heifers, cows, calves, hogs and eggs.

Nationally, the August All Farm Products Index of Prices received by farmers was unchanged from July at 144 percent of its 1977 average. The index was 4 percent above a year ago. Higher prices for oranges, lettuce, tomatoes, milk and tobacco were offset by lower prices for cattle, corn, soybeans, broilers and hogs.

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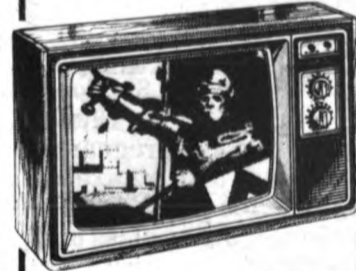
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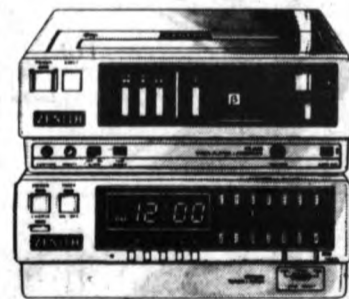

RENEW begins in area

Roman Catholics in the 93 parishes of the ten county Diocese of Lansing will be asked to sign up this week end for the first of five semesters of a diocesan renewal program. Each semester will last for five weeks and will include discussions, presentations, prayer and action.

The entire program is entitled RENEW and is an effort to stimulate greater involvement on the part of Catholics in the life of their parishes.

"While many Catholics attend Mass each week and observe the church's laws, involvement in the life of the parish is not so impressive," a spokesman

said. "A much smaller percentage see the parish as a center of learning, or as a place of concern for the needs of others. The RENEW program seeks to change the image of the parish and to involve more Catholics in its life."

The RENEW program has been adopted in many dioceses across the United States and has been most successful in achieving its goals. The diocese provides training and materials for the three year program but the focus is on the individual parish for leadership and for the success of the program.

Fund-Raising pace set for United Way campaign

Mr. Douglas Milbury (President, Story, Inc.) President of the Capital Area United Way Board of Directors opened the kick-off news conference by introducing the CAUW General Campaign Chairperson, Dr. Marylee Davis (Assistant Vice President for Administration & Public Affairs-MSU).

Lansing Dairy employees also are conducting a pacesetting campaign, raising \$1,600 to date with a corporate gift of \$1,000 -- a 76% increase in funds raised from the '83/'84 campaign. In addition, Davis introduced the chairperson of the State Government campaign, Elizabeth Howe, Director of the MI Dept. of Licensing and Regulation, who announced the results of the first, pacesetting division campaign.

Howe announced that to date, state government employees have raised \$410,301 -- 7% more than the results of their '83/'84 campaign. Howe commended the employees of various departments of state government for their outstanding efforts.

The pacesetting division and pacesetting company campaigns have resulted in \$502,116 in pledges for this year's fund drive. Other early pledges have added an additional \$21,900 to the amount kicking off the campaign.

Harvest can continue past Labor Day

Labor Day need not spell the end of the gardening season. If you planted frost-tolerant crops for a fall harvest and protect tender crops such as beans, peppers and tomatoes against frost, you can extend the gardening season well into September and even October.

"Gardeners who didn't plant lettuce, spinach, peas, cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage and the other cole crops for a fall harvest miss out on weeks of fresh produce," says Lee Taylor, Extension horticulturist at Michigan State University. "They could also be enjoying a late harvest of snap beans, cucumbers, summer squash and other short-season, warm-weather crops."

These have to be protected from frost, but some varieties mature so quickly that you can usually plant them well into July and still get a crop before a hard freeze kills them.

Several sheets of newspaper, straw mulch, even plastic trash bags can protect crops against low

temperatures, he notes. They work by trapping warm air around plants to insulate them against

TOWNSHIP OF VICTOR CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN

ORDINANCE NO. 12

THE TOWNSHIP OF VICTOR ORDAINS:
PREAMBLE

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE CEMETERIES WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP OF VICTOR, TO ESTABLISH HOURS OF OPERATION, TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION HEREOF, TO ESTABLISH RATES AND CHARGES, TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NO. 5 HERETOFORE ADOPTED ON THE 17th DAY OF MAY, 1967, AND TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF.

SECTION I. TITLE

This Ordinance shall be known as the "Victor Township Cemetery Ordinance of 1984."

SECTION II. REGULATIONS

A. HOURS OF OPERATION.

The cemeteries of the Township of Victor shall be open to the public between the hours of 8 o'clock a.m. and 8 o'clock p.m., daily. No persons shall be permitted therein at any other time unless prior written consent of the Township Clerk or said Clerk's designee shall have been obtained.

B. BURIAL PERMIT.

No burial shall be permitted in any Township cemetery except pursuant to a valid burial permit.

C. FUNERALS, NOTICE.

No funeral service shall be conducted in any cemetery operated by the Township of Victor except upon not less than twenty-four (24) hours notice to the Township Clerk.

SECTION III. FEE SCHEDULE, MODIFICATION

All rates, charges and fees levied by the Township in connection with the sale of its lots, registry thereof, grave openings, construction and maintenance, if any, shall be as established from time to time by resolution of the Township Board of Trustees. A copy of all current rate schedules and resolutions shall be kept and maintained at the office of the Township Clerk. All such fees and charges may be amended and modified from time to time by subsequent resolution of said Board of Trustees.

SECTION IV. PENALTIES

Any person found present within any Township cemetery between the hours of 8 o'clock p.m. and 8 o'clock a.m., without written authority as set forth above, shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof may be fined not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or incarcerated for not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION V. SEVERABILITY

If any section, paragraph, clause, phrase or part of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, or any agency, department or commission empowered by state law for such purposes, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance; and the application of those provisions to any person or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION VI. REPEAL

Ordinance No. 5 of the Township of Victor heretofore adopted on the 17th day of May, 1967, shall be and is hereby repealed.

SECTION VII. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days from and after its publication as required by law.

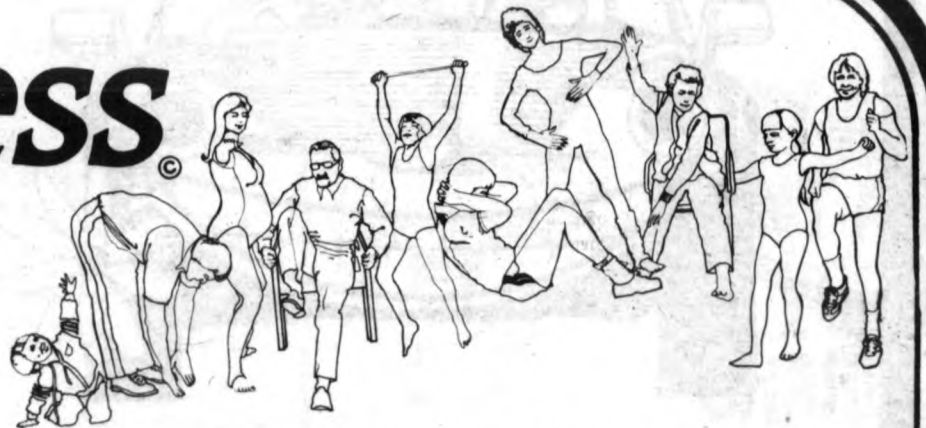

Analysis available

The Michigan DHIA Board of Directors at its meeting on August 21, 1984 voted to make Forage Analysis available to Michigan farmers. Arrangements have been made with the Wisconsin DHIA Forage Analysis Lab in Bonduel, Wisconsin to provide this new service. Near Infrared Spectroscopy (NIR) equipment will be used to analyze Hay, Haylage, Silage and Corn while the chemical analysis method will be used for complete feeds. Sample bags will be made available through DHIA Technicians, County Extension Agents and Local Feed Dealers. Payment for the analysis will be sent with the sample as it is mailed direct to the lab. Results will be returned direct to the herdowner. Average turn around time is five working days.

The cost of this new service is \$16.00 per sample for the standard NIR test or for the Chemical Analysis test. Other analysis may be requested, in addition to the NIR or chemical analysis.
