School Board reviews policy

The St. Johns School Board Monday night tabled further action on the adoption of a new Public Schools Transportation Policy, voting to resume discussion of the policy at the next Committee-of-the-Whole meeting on Oct. 1.

The policy underlined the purpose of the transportation, eligibility, limitations, administrative responsibility, operation of the system and student conduct.

The document states that the primary purpose of the transportation system is to provide transportation for those eligible pupils from the vicinity of their homes to the school they attend. First consideration shall be to provide safe transportation to eligible pupils, while careful consideration will also be given to efficiency and economy of operation.

Elementary students eligible to benefit from the system must live a half of mile or more from the school they attend, with the exception of the City of St. Johns. Those within the following boundaries or address ranges of the City of St. Johns will not be bused to their school of attendance unless they are assigned to a school that is outside the normal attendance area of the majority of the students within the neighborhood.

- South of Walker Road, on the north;
- South of Steel Road, on the north, with the exception of 100-1000 N. Scott Road;
- North of Townsend Road, on the south;
- West of Scott Road, on the east, with the exception of 1000-1999 S. US-27;
- West of US-27, between Walker Road and Steel Road;
- And east of Dewitt Road, on the west.

Within the address ranges listed above, secondary students will be eligible for transportation from a designated bus stop to and from their school of attendance, if they live one mile or more from their assigned school.

The document went on to state that those students enrolled in a non-public school shall be eligible for transportation to the public school that the pupil would otherwise attend. The transportation shall be along the regular routes according to the same eligibility provisions and schedules in ef-

fect for public school students, except that the non-public school student shall then be eligible for transportation from the public school to the closest non-public school located in the district that the pupil is eligible to attend.

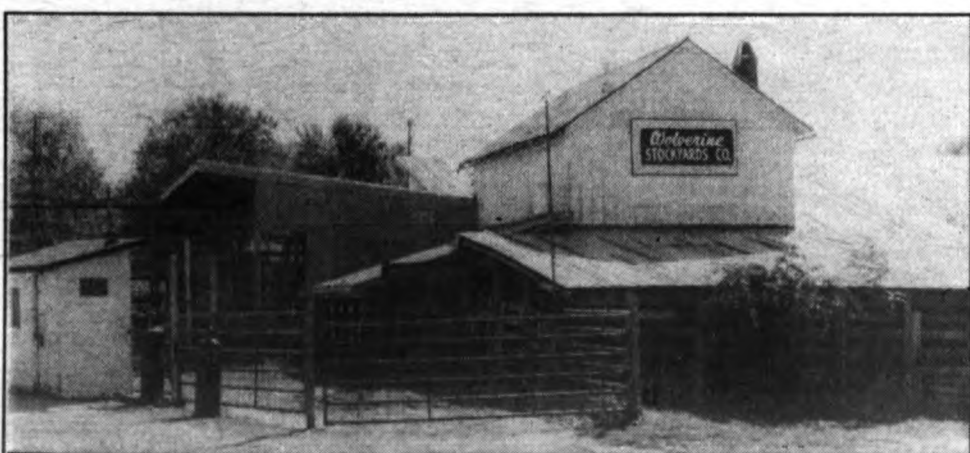
Routes are to be planned to keep individual riding distance and time to a practical minimum. One hour should be considered as the maximum allowable riding time for a pupil going to or from school. Transportation shall not be considered a personnel taxi service, meaning that most riders will find it necessary to walk some distance to the designated bus stop.

The policy states that it is the objective to arrange for buses to arrive at school approximately 10 minutes before the scheduled time for the beginning of scheduled activities in the morning and to leave within approximately 10 minutes after the scheduled dismissal time.

Transportation will be furnished by the schools to students assigned to a school outside their normal school of attendance. These students shall be required to ride a bus assigned by the Director of Transportation.

Stockyards to close its doors in St. Johns

One of St. Johns' landmark businesses will be ending its reign Wednesday with their last livestock auction in the area.

Wolverine Stockyards, located at the railroad tracks on north Mead Street, began operation 50 years ago when a Detroit livestock dealer decided to start his own livestock sales operation. After recognizing St. Johns as a promising agricultural community, Erie O. Prince bought some land and started his own business.

His son, Jim Prince, took over operation of the stockyards after his father died in 1961. As the number of

small livestock farmers began to decrease in the area, as well as the nation, the number of sales for the business also decreased. According to Prince, there is no longer enough business to keep the operation going.

Prince reported that he expects the 3.5-acre parcel will eventually be sold and converted into another industry or warehouse use.

The Clare Stockyards, an additional operation owned by Prince, will continue conducting business in the northern area where there are reportedly more farmers and farming business.

The Wednesday afternoon auction will begin at 4 p.m. at the stockyards. The public is invited to attend.

Acid rain debate continues in nation

The debate over acid rain continues to generate more heat than light. Environmentalists, public officials and the news media have been quick to identify fossil-fired power plants in the Midwest as the principal culprits -- and have demanded immediate enactment of drastic legislation to curb sulfur dioxide (SO₂) emissions.

But does it make sense to throw vast sums of money at a problem still far from being fully understood?

"How much acidity in the lakes of the Adirondack Mountains, or in New England, can be attributed to the SO₂ emitted by coal-fired plants in the Midwest, or to nitrous oxides emitted by automobiles, trucks and buses in, say, Detroit? It is difficult to say with any degree of accuracy."

This is the current nub of the ongoing acid rain debate, says writer and energy consultant Romney Wheeler in the current issue of "Focus Views on Energy."

"It is a highly charged issue, especially in the Northeastern United States and the adjacent provinces of Canada, where acid rain is claimed to be the cause of serious damage to lakes and aquatic wildlife," he said.

But what is not spelled out with precision is exactly what the touted controls may cost -- and who is to pay for them.

"More importantly, it is not known how such controls should be applied and whether they would produce the results expected and

thus justify their expense.

"To be specific: Would a 50 percent reduction in SO₂ emissions from Midwestern power plants guarantee a corresponding reduction in acidic rainfall in the Adirondacks in upper New York state? Could it guarantee significantly deposits in the New England states further east? No one can say, pending careful and continuing field research. Until such research is completed, we cannot be certain whether the sulfur dioxide emission reductions which Michigan utilities have had to make will produce any measurable reduction in acidic rainfall in the Eastern and New England states."

Core samples of lake sediments, which reveal a lake's accumulated chemical history, show that some of these lakes have been acidic for hundreds and even thousands of years, long before exposure to man-made emissions. Moreover, comparative studies of Adirondack lakes show that they can differ markedly in pH readings (the scale used to measure acidity), even when the acidity of their rainfall is the same.

"Such findings do not rule out a contribution from acid rain, but they do make it clear that acid rain is not the only factor contributing to lake acidity," Wheeler said.

The reason for this is that lakes watersheds are complex geological-biological-chemical laboratories that can

Letter to the Editor

To the Editor;

Since being recently contacted regarding environmental issues, I would like to take the opportunity to update you on the status of current legislation.

The Clean Water Legislation passed by the House; On June 26, the House passed H.R. 3282 which I was pleased to have supported. The new bill authorizes over \$24 billion in clean water projects. For example, H.R. 3282 more than doubles authorized spending levels for the water pollution control program. The Clean Water Act gives the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) power to regulate discharges of industrial waste water into lakes and streams; it also provides federal funds to help cities and counties build sewage systems.

I am particularly pleased about the provisions which would authorize \$4.5 million for the EPA and the Great Lakes states to conduct a study of control measures that could be used to reduce consumption of water from the Great Lakes without adversely affecting economic growth in the area. In addition to its other sections, the bill authorizes grants to the states of up to \$25 million a year for fiscal 1985-89 for the clean-up of acidified lakes. Furthermore, it established an office within the EPA for Great Lakes Studies and clean-up plans under the U.S.-Canadian Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement of 1978.

It is important for us to continue the critical endeavor of restoring the quality of America's lakes, rivers and streams. I feel confident that H.R. 3282 will make great strides in furthering our efforts in this area. Hopefully the Senate will move quickly and pass this important bill.

House clears Superfund Reauthorization; H.R. 5640, the Superfund bill, was cleared by the House on August 10. I was pleased to have voted for this \$10.2 billion bill which will continue the vital task of cleaning up America's toxic waste dumps.

Here are some provisions which significantly strengthen the existing Superfund law:

- Includes a section which requires federal facilities to be held responsible for their toxic waste within the context of Superfund laws currently on the books;
- Establishes uniform national standards for

both produce and consume acids. Bedrock, soil depth and composition, live vegetation, organic debris and the habits of local wildlife play roles in the fluctuating pH balance.

"Even though soil and bedrock conditions in Michigan generally tend to limit the impact of acidic precipitation, the state's utilities and its coal-burning industries already have improved emission controls and reduced the output of sulfur oxides from their plants," he said.

Between 1975-1982, Consumer Power reduced its system-wide SO₂ emissions 56 percent by converting to lower sulfur content coals.

"But the picture is far murkier in some neighboring states. This has created anxiety lest residents of Michigan be taxed unfairly for clean-up elsewhere. The heaviest SO₂ emissions occur in a region extending from Tennessee and Kentucky, northeast through southern Indiana, all of Ohio, West Virginia and Pennsylvania. Right behind in tabulations of SO₂ emissions are New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts and Maryland.

waste-site clean-up;

- Holds persons or companies responsible for toxic wastes at a Superfund site to be strictly liable and jointly and severally liable for clean-up costs;
- Gives citizens the right to sue EPA or any state or local agency to compel duties prescribed under the Superfund law;

- Provides that individuals exposed to hazardous substances may petition EPA to conduct a health effects study at that site and to provide emergency relief; and

- Establishes a new program to clean up groundwater contamination caused by leak from underground storage tanks used to store hazardous fuels or materials.

The bill contains many other sections but I believe that these are some of the most important. Although H.R. 5640 is far from perfect and though it does not have some other provisions which I was hoping for, it is a much needed improvement.

EPA Dioxin Study moves forward: The national dioxin study being conducted by the EPA is moving quickly ahead. Results on Michigan from the testing done in Michigan should be available this fall, according to EPA officials. The Michigan test results will be put into a national context through comparison with other tests data on dioxin from New Jersey, Ohio, West Virginia and other states around the country where testing is being conducted.

As I have said from the start, the EPA needs to establish a proper standard for dioxin so that if the chemical is discovered by a community in a river, in the soil or in the air, the residents can quickly assess the potential danger and the problem can be quickly dealt with. I am pleased by assurances received from EPA Administrator William Ruckelshaus and other top agency officials during a June meeting, that the national dioxin study is being conducted on a sound scientific basis. People need to know what are acceptable levels of chemicals in the environment and what kind of clean-up actions are needed if a high level of toxic chemicals are found in the community. The national dioxin study will, I strongly feel, achieve these goals when it is completed.

Meijers clean shelves

Pornography taken from area food chain

Anyone looking for a Penthouse, Playboy or Playgirl magazine needn't go to Meijer Thrifty Acres. The three-state chain stop-

ped stocking those magazines last week.

"They're gone," Jim Montgomery, store director of the Meijer Pennsylvania Avenue in Lansing reportedly said. No Meijer store in Michigan, Ohio or Kentucky will be selling those magazines.

David Lukens, Meijer public and consumer affairs coordinator, reportedly said that the removal of the magazines was "prompted by the fact we had to make a business decision concerning those items and decided they did not warrant space on our shelves by the sales they were having."

The decision was reportedly hailed by Jean Ruhlman, a spokeswoman for Citizens Against Pornography of Ferndale. Speaking at the Capitol last week, during a rally for a tougher state anti-pornographic law, Ruhlman urged listeners not to shop at stores selling what she called "pornographic" magazines.

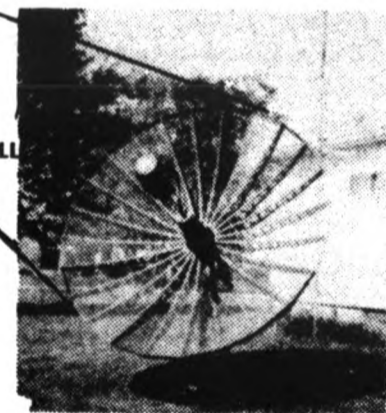

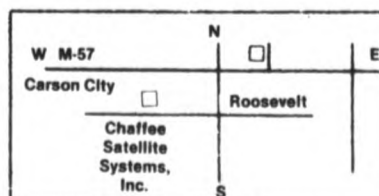

"This suggests that contributions to the problem of acid rain cannot be attributed solely to the Midwest. Indeed, it tends to confirm the calculations of some researchers that local sources of sulfur dioxide may be significant contributors to acid rain. Interestingly, all four Eastern states mentioned have significant SO₂ emissions."

The big concern is that the lengthy and painstaking research still needed into the causes of acid rain may be elbowed aside by what "Newsweek" has called "the bitter politics of acid rain."

Industry studies sug-

gest that compliance with the emissions controls that have already been proposed would involve capital costs of \$22.7 billion, plus \$39.1 billion for operating and maintenance costs, low-sulfur fuel premiums and replacement power costs -- or a total of \$61.8 billion between 1984 and 2008.

"Those are big numbers. They represent an enormous investment, and one that, in the end, would have to be borne by the users of electric energy," Wheeler said.

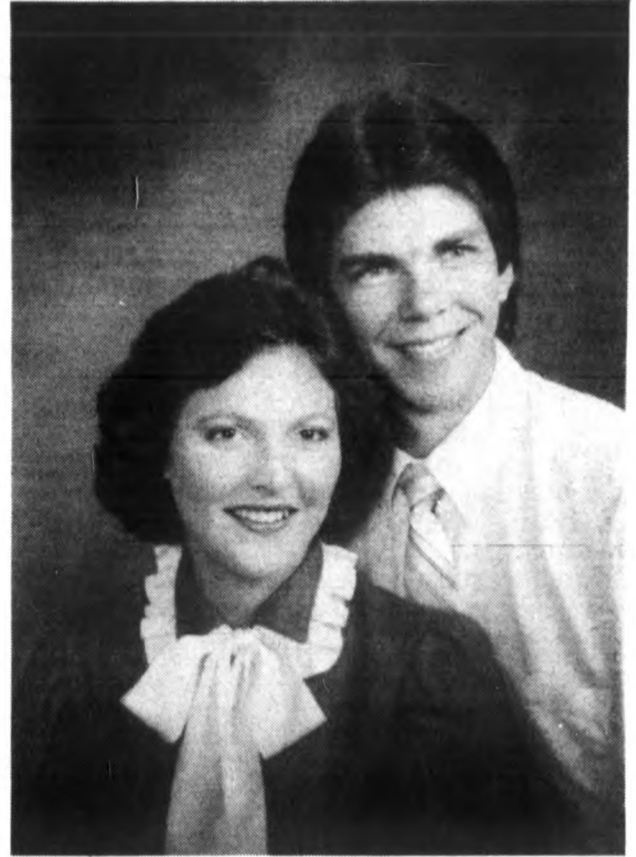

Parents urged to check identifications

Recent attempts to kidnap or molest children by imposters posing as Children's Protective Service workers from the Michigan Department of Social Services (DSS) have been made in eight counties.

Clinton County Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel urges residents to treat unknown individuals claiming to be from DSS with caution.

"If you are visited by a Children's Protective Service worker of anyone else you do not know, do NOT let them into your home until you check them out," instructs Sheriff Hufnagel.

"First, call your local DSS office and give authorities a physical description of the worker as well as the worker's name," he advises. "If you are suspicious about the person, immediately call us or your local police. Second, get a good description of their car and especially the license plate number."

Sheriff Hufnagel also cautions residents to keep their doors locked. "In one case, an imposter went around to the other doors in the home trying to get in, and there were three small children at home. Fortunately, the doors were locked."

Lastly, Sheriff Hufnagel reminds county residents that a DSS worker cannot remove a child from its home unless there is a court order in hand and a uniformed police officer present.

Since May 15, attempts to kidnap or molest children by DSS imposters have been reported in Gladwin, Gratiot, Hillsdale, Presque Isle, Alcona, Kalkaska, Barry and Ottawa counties.

Sheriff Hufnagel says that persons with information about the imposters should call him or local police. "Or they can call Crime-Stoppers in Saginaw at 517-752-STOP, and give an anonymous tip," he suggests.

Federal Mogul donates money

A contribution to Clinton Memorial Hospital by the Federal Mogul Corporation of St. Johns will help streamline food service in the hospital's Dietary Department, according to Registered Dietitian Michaeline Raczka.

The \$1500 donation, presented by Plant Manager Robert Claycomb, was used for the purchase of a hot food table. It replaces one that will now be used solely for the preparation of Homebound Meals. The hot food table has separately-held insulated compartments that are able to maintain proper temperatures for individual food items.

The Dietary Department prepared over 112,000 meals during 1983 and this year -- through the first six months -- has already prepared close to 70,000. These numbers represent meals prepared for hospital patients, visitors, employees and Homebound Meals clients.

"With the number of hospital-prepared meals continuing to increase, the purchase of this equipment will help us to ensure quality in our total meal program. We're extremely grateful for Federal Mogul's contribution," Raczka said.

Area hospital sets up satellite network

Clinton Memorial Hospital in St. Johns has joined over 70 other Michigan hospitals in establishing a statewide communications satellite network. The network, under the direction of the Michigan Hospital Association, will link Michigan hospitals, other trade associations, universities and colleges through satellite-delivered education and management information programming.

Clinton Memorial itself has already undergone several necessary steps in becoming a "receiving" station, the most recent being the placement of a satellite dish on hospital property. Actual program transmission is scheduled to begin November 1.

One of the major advantages of the satellite network--Michigan Hospital Association Communication System, Inc. (MHACS)--is that the available programming can reduce the expenditure of both time and money by participating hospitals.

Programming available through MHACS includes in-service training for employees, required continuing education for physicians and nurses, and programs for other health care professionals. With the availability of these programs, employees and staff will be able to receive required training at Clinton Memorial, thereby reducing travel and time away from the hospital.

Additional programming includes live and pre-recorded conferences from both local and national sources, patient and community health education, trustee education, management and finance information, and regular updates on trends and practices in health care.

Participating hospitals such as Clinton Memorial will also be able to videotape programs for playback at later times and dates. When appropriate, many of these taped broadcasts will be shown to local residents via Public Access Channel 2.

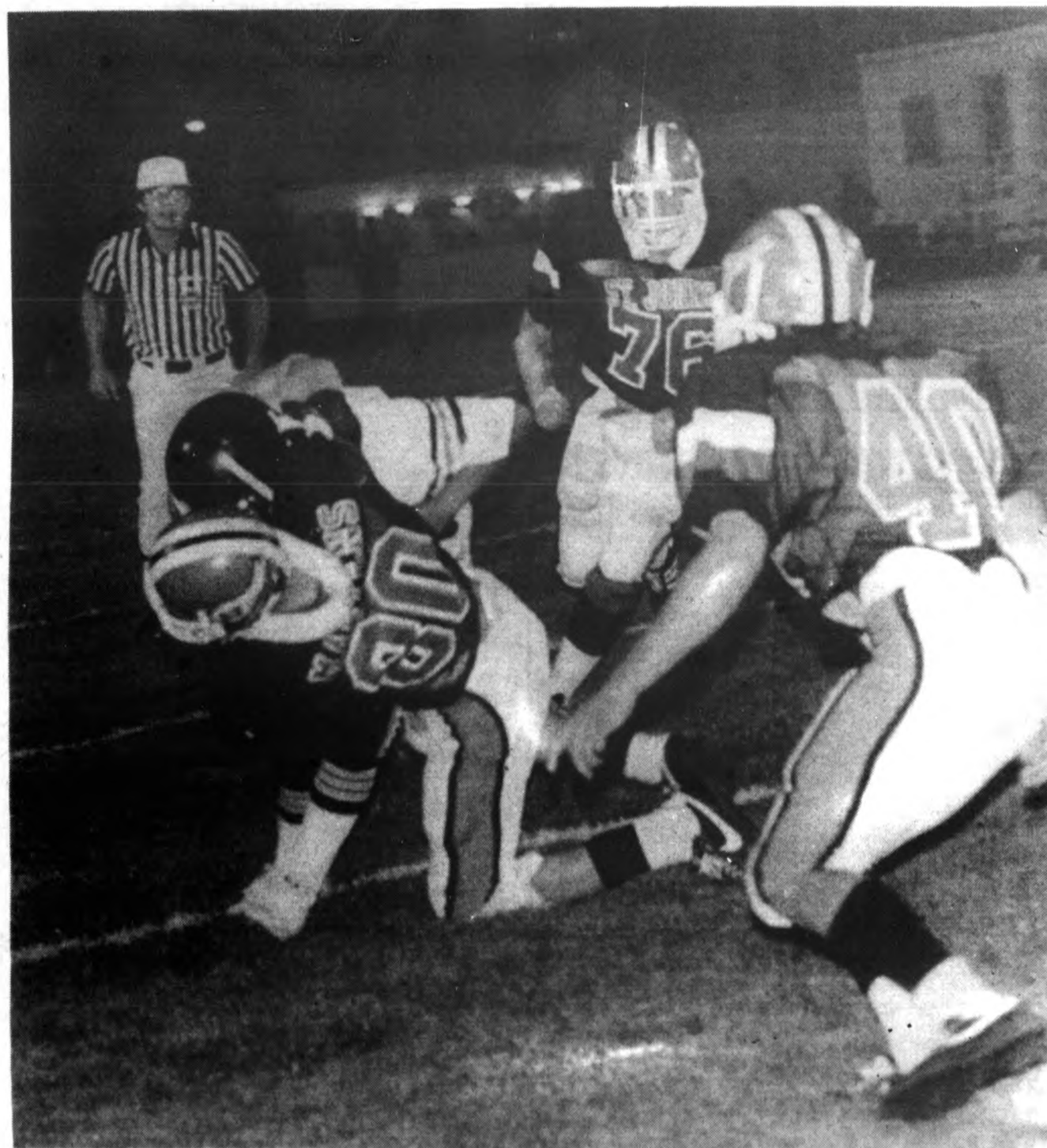

Place steaks on grill and cook 5-6 minutes per side for rare, 7-8 minutes for medium and 9-10 minutes for well done. While steaks are barbecuing pour reserved marinade into a small saucepan. Cook over medium heat allowing sauce to come to a boil. Lower heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove steaks from grill. Spoon some sauce over meat and garnish with pineapple slices. Pass remaining sauce. Makes 4-6 servings.



Stir-fry dishes made with beautifully colored vegetables cooked only until the texture is crisp-tender are both wonderful to look at and taste. Pictured above is a carrot and broccoli mixture with a tang of orange. But its special crunch and exquisite flavor comes from the addition of coarsely chopped macadamia nuts, that elegant snack from Hawaii. The ingredients are assembled ahead of time, then stir-fried a few minutes before serving.

MACADAMIA-BROCCOLI STIR-FRY

- 1 bunch fresh broccoli (1 lb.)
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/2 cup water, divided
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup carrots, sliced diagonally
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1/2 cup chopped macadamia nuts

Cut broccoli tops into florets and stems into 2-inch strips 1/4-inch wide. In a large skillet heat oil until hot. Add broccoli florets and stems; stir-fry until lightly cooked, about 1 minute. Combine orange juice, 1/4 cup of the water, sugar, ginger and salt. Add to skillet. Cook and stir until broccoli is almost tender, about 1 minute. Add carrots; cook and stir until tender, about 1 minute. Mix cornstarch and remaining 1/4 cup water. Stir into skillet. Cook and stir until sauce thickens, about 30 seconds. Stir in macadamia nuts. YIELD: about 5-1/2 cups.

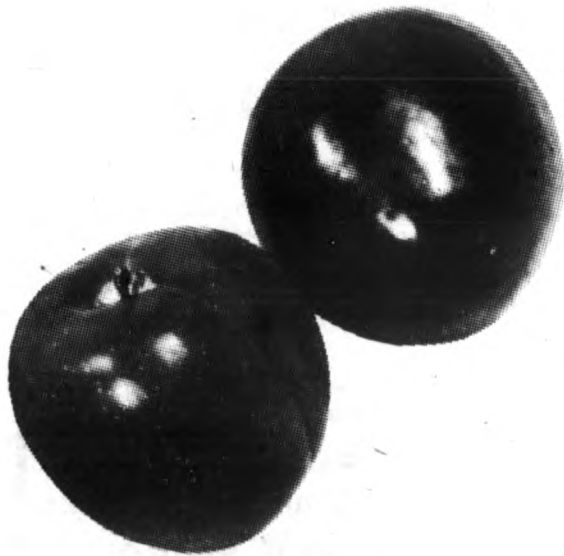
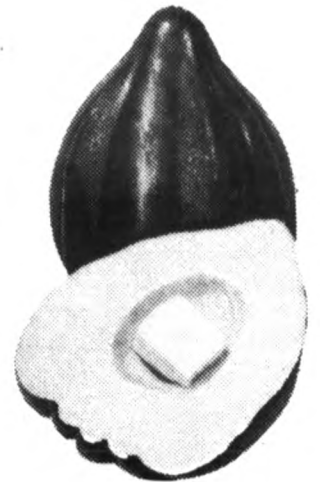

In the transportation service limitations, bus routes shall be planned to achieve maximum economy of operation with reasonable safety. For example, the policy states that bus routes will not be extended or stops scheduled unless an eligible elementary student would otherwise be required to walk in excess of a half of mile to a bus stop or a secondary student in excess of one mile to a bus stop.

Also, bus routes will not deviate for the purpose of taking students to a babysitter.

In the operation of the system, it states that a designated bus stop for a kindergarten youngster eligible for transportation shall be at their home address unless they can be accompanied by an older student.

Also, the transportation director may grant permission for a pupil to ride a different bus or use a different stop. Such permission may be granted only upon receipt of a written request of a parent, guardian or other responsible adult for a specified period of time. No request will be approved for purposes of entertainment or for simple convenience of the parent or child.

Further discussion of the Transportation policy will continue at the Committee-of-the-Whole meeting, where action is expected to be taken.

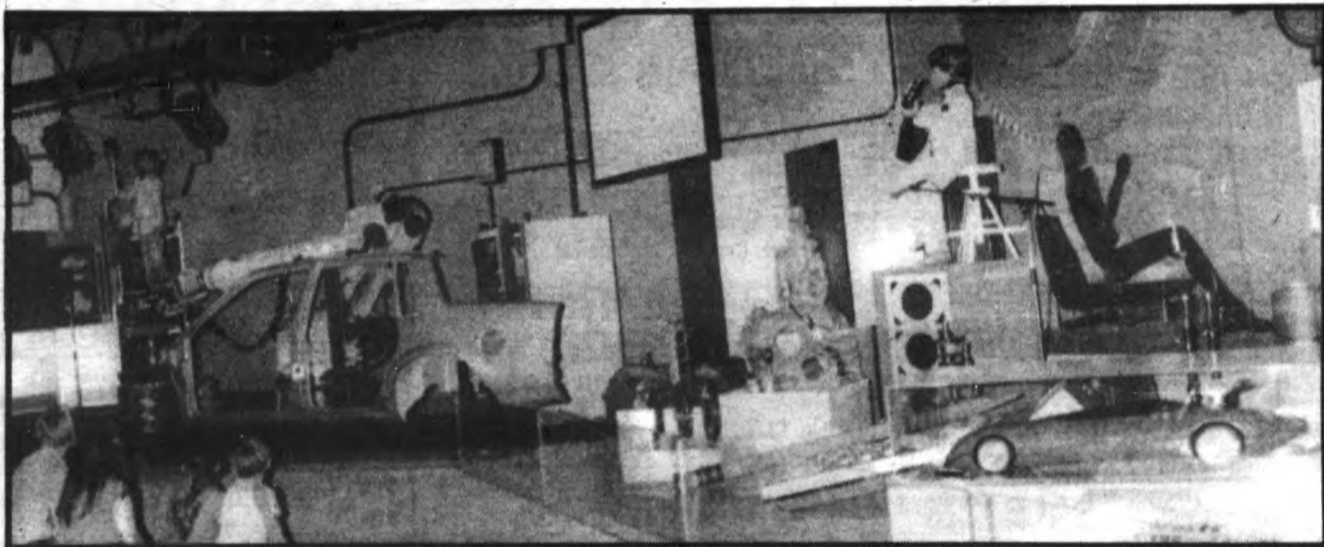

Handicap club to offer activities

For many, the most disabling characteristic of a handicapped individual is the loneliness and lack of active socialization in our American culture as a whole. Often times, people who are confined to a wheelchair or walk with a white cane, are viewed in both pity and fear by others whose disabilities aren't so apparent.

But, according to Gary Gearhart, a St. Johns resident who has been left both legally blind and wheelchair bound with a bout of multiple sclerosis, those attitudes are changing and he is doing all he can to promote it.

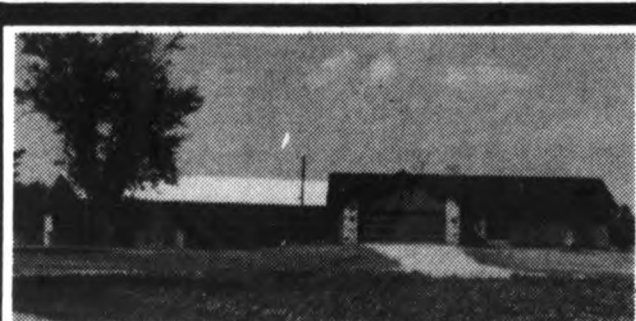
"The first step comes from within the handicapped individuals themselves. We need to see ourselves as normal as possible in order for others to see us as normal as possible.

"We're as handicapped as we let ourselves be," he continued. "We've got to have the attitude that we're worth something. If we

can look at ourselves positively, then other people will look at us in the same respect. We want to help others realize that."

Gearhart has teamed up with another St. Johns resident, Dick Carpenter, in a crusade to activate other disabled persons in and around the Clinton County area. Together, they want to develop a program in which both disabled and temporary abled bodies (TAB's) can join together twice a month for an afternoon or evening of fun. (Gearhart explained that anyone can lose the use of their body at anytime, thus explaining the term "temporary abled bodies.")

"We're searching in Clinton County for handicapped people who want to get out and do something," he said. "A handicap is what you make it. Too many times, the best friends of a disabled person are the four walls. We want to change that. If we let ourselves be confined by the walls and other people's attitudes, we can't gain the positive at-

titude needed to do something with our life."

On September 15, the first activity of the newly forming club was held at Spartan Stadium in East Lansing. Several handicappers and TAB's piled into the new Community Resource Van to cheer on the fighting Spartans. Despite the Spartan defeat by Notre Dame, everyone attending had an exciting afternoon.

Football games are

only one of the many activities planned for the group. Carpenter said trips to amusement parks, evenings of games and other activities will also be featured.

Currently, the club will be combining with a Lansing club that maintains the same goals for handicappers. Eventually, as more people get involved in the program, the Clinton County branch will begin their own program.

"We want to get the basics down by interlocking with the Lansing program," Carpenter explained. "We'll join their meetings and represent Clinton County on their Board of Directors."

The Lansing Club is funded by the Easter Seals, which will also fund the Clinton County branch.

"The club will give us an opportunity to do things we couldn't do

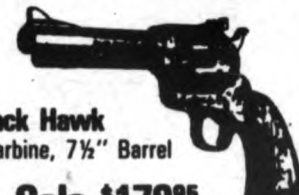

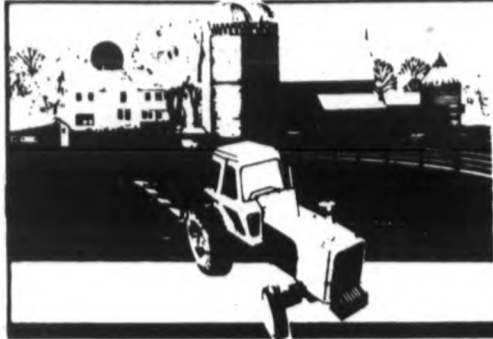

Farm News

Production forecasts show ups and downs

Above normal temperatures and limited precipitation characterized August weather. Soil moisture supplies were short in Southern portions of the Lower Peninsula throughout most of August. Corn and soybean yield prospects were reduced by the dry weather, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Based on conditions as of September 1, corn production is forecast at 234 million bushels, 5 percent below August 1. However, this year's crop is expected to be 41 percent larger than last year. The increase in production is attributed to a 44 percent increase in harvested acres. Yields are expected to average 90 bushels per acre, 5 bushels below last month and 2 bushels below a year ago. Due to dry conditions ears have not filled properly. Soybean production is expected to total 31.9 million bushels, a 4 percent decline from last year. Yield expectations have dropped to 28 bushels per acre, 4 bushels below August 1 and last year. Pod set and development was affected by the shortage of moisture.

Michigan's dry bean production is estimated at 4.7 million hundredweight (cwt.), 3 percent above last season. Yields are forecast at 1,200 pounds per acre, 100 pounds below last year and the lowest since 1978. Timely rains in the "Thumb" improved yields by 100 pounds per acre from expectations last month. Oats production is estimated at 18.6 million bushels, a 19 percent increase from a year ago. Yields are expected to average 62 bushels per acre. Summer potato production remains at 2.6 million cwt., a 17 percent increase over 1983's crop. Sugarbeet production at slightly over 2 million tons is unchanged from August 1.

Nationally, corn for grain production is forecast at 7.55 billion bushels, down 2 percent from August 1, but 81 percent above last year's drought stricken crop. A crop of this size is 8 percent below

the record high crop of 1982. Soybean production is forecast at 2.03 billion bushels, 29 percent larger than the 1983 crop. Dry bean production is expected total 20 million cwt., 29 percent above last year.

Quality crops expected for grapes, plums pears

Excellent quality crops are expected for Michigan grapes, prune-plums and pears. Harvest is in progress or about to begin in most areas, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Fruit growing conditions have been generally favorable in the state this season, though Southern Michigan has been drier than normal. Grape production in Michigan is forecast at 50,000 tons, a 10,000 ton reduction from a year ago. Grapes were the only fruit crop in the state to suffer any significant freeze damage this spring. The dry weather has reduced sizing somewhat but helped make this one of the highest quality crops in years. Nationally, grape production is expected to be down 8 percent to just over 5 million tons.

Michigan's prune-plum crop is forecast at 12,000 tons, a 1,000 ton drop from the August 1 forecast and last year's output. The reduced crop estimate stems mainly from smaller sizing due to the dry weather. Nationwide, prune-plum production for the four major producing states (Idaho, Michigan, Oregon, Washington-excluding California) is pegged at 53,400 tons, down 14 percent from 1983.

Pear production in Michigan is forecast at 10,000 tons, 25 percent larger than a year ago. Nationally, pear output is expected to total 687,500 tons, 11 percent less than 1983.

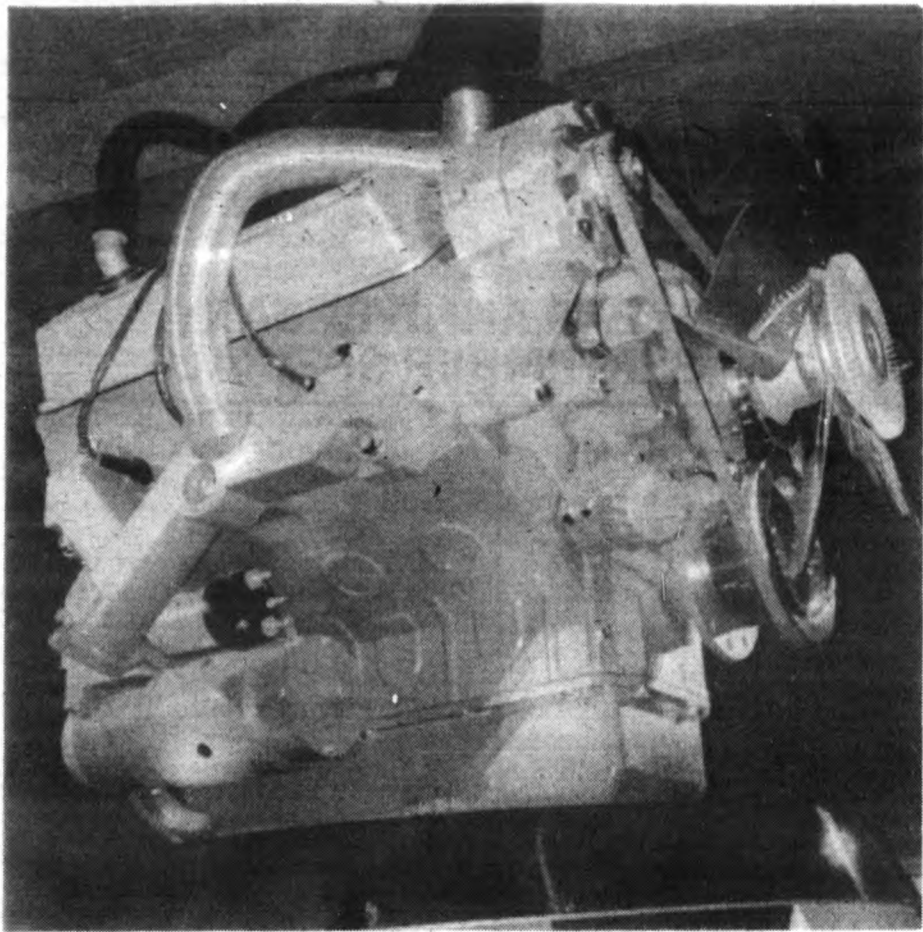
