Commissioners decide to set millage levy

On Tuesday, County Commissioners decided to keep things as they are by voting to set next year's millage levy at 5.6 mills.

During the hour long meeting, Equalization Director Leon Thelen said the levy will generate more than \$3 million next year, due to the increased valuation of property.

Commissioners reported that the state equalized value of property in the County is approximately \$595 million, up 2.04 percent from this year.

The Clinton County Board will meet again on Oct. 30 to adopt a budget and determine how the revenue will be spent.

Promotes festival

Winner of Logo Contest chosen in county

As part of a planned Mint Festival by the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce, chamber officials felt an official logo was necessary to represent the event scheduled for the summer of 1985.

Some weeks ago, Joan Schmaltz, office manager of the Clinton County News, was appointed by the Mint Festival Steering Committee to chair a committee responsible for establishing a mint logo. Schmaltz, along with Sue Kiley White, staff writer for the St. Johns Reminder, and Bill Morriss, area attorney, established a contest throughout Clinton County for a suitable mint logo.

Last week terminated the search. Out of a list of 21 applicants who submitted sample drawings of their individual mint festival interpretations, Gerald Dietz, 45, of 3715 W. Price Rd., St. Johns, won the honors.

Dietz' entry was selected after much deliberation by Judges Richard J. and Jane Duncan Larson of Okemos. Both Larsons are credentialed artists in their own right having widespread educational backgrounds in the art field.

In addition to being an art history instructor at Lansing Community College, Richard is also a tour coordinator and art history instructor at East Lansing Arts Workshop. Earlier, he had been a graduate teaching assistant at Michigan State University and was a former gallery aide at Kresge Art Center Gallery at MSU.

Jane is program director at the East Lansing Arts Workshop and was a former gallery lecturer at Kresge Art Center Gallery. She also possesses experience as a former art history instructor at LCC and MSU as well.

Both judges possess master's degrees in art history from MSU.

David Evans of Pierre, South Dakota listed the following Ten Commandments of Hunting:

Council opposes legislation

To the Editor:

The members of the Capitol Area Substance Abuse Advisory Council would like to express their strong opposition to the Voter's Choice Constitutional Tax Amendment which will be before Michigan voters on the November ballot.

The proposed amendment would return all local and state taxes to the levels of December 31, 1981. It would prohibit increases in taxes without voter approval. User fees, licenses, and government permits could not be increased without a four-fifths approval by the appropriate governmental body or a popular vote. It would also limit non-resident city income taxes to one-half of one percent.

The Advisory Council feels this amendment would have a devastating effect on the delivery of

drug and alcohol services in the Clinton, Eaton, Ingham and Gratiot county area at a time when all state-supported services have been reduced due to the depressed Michigan economy.

Current estimates indicate that if this amendment passes, state funding to local substance abuse programs would be reduced by approximately 26 percent and local support would be severely curtailed. This, at a time when local programs are experiencing waiting lists for those individuals seeking services.

While we agree that we need fiscal responsibility and accountability in government, we do not feel that it should be at the expense of those of our citizens in the greatest need.

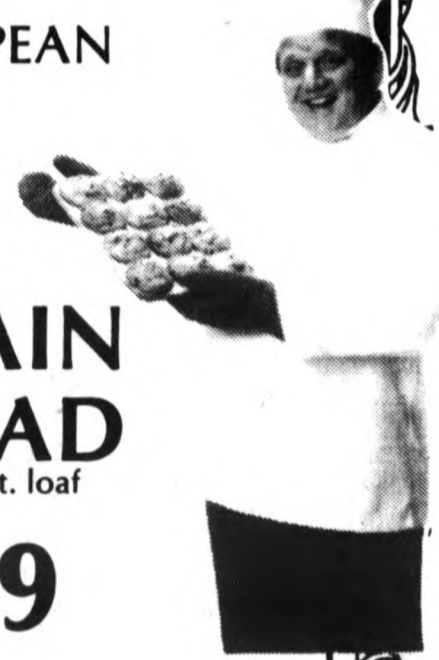

Badge Beat

The DeWitt Township Police are currently investigating a reported stolen vehicle from the home of Lawrence Hinton, of 316 N. Crest. According to police, Hinton reported that his 1978 Olds two-door Cutlas was taken from his residence on Oct. 6. It is light gray over dark gray with a license plate number 989GNB. Anyone with information regarding the automobile should contact the police immediately.

On Oct. 8, Township Police were called to the scene of an accident occurring on West Grand River, just west of Felton. Police say a car driven by Daniel Bajema, 29, of Grand Rapids, struck another automobile driven by Richard Brandell, 26, of Lansing.

Brandell was eastbound on Grand River when he reportedly realized that he was traveling too fast to make a left hand turn onto Felton. Swerving over to allow room for Bajema to pass on the left from behind, he collided with Bajema who also swerved to the right. Brandell's car rolled over on impact.

No damage was done, however, and the children were released to their parents and assigned cleaning detail for the city.

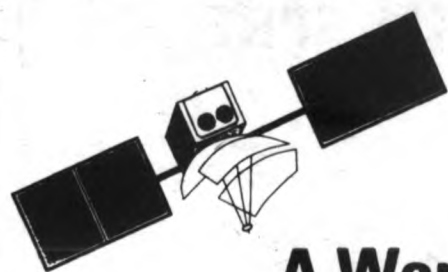

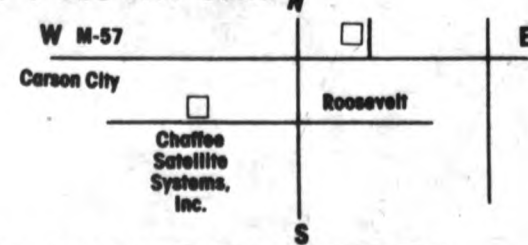

Morning Musicales presents "Sweet Freedom's Song"

For the program: to continue this year's theme "Sweet Freedom's Song." Mrs. Kenneth Johnson gave a comprehensive report of the "Musicales

Beginnings" in the United States. The earliest record we have is the music of the Psalm Singing of the New England Colonists. Probably folk music of the Indians was in existence, also the Negro slave ships no doubt brought their own songs, but there is no record of this. The Psalm Singing was in church. The first organ imported into New England was in 1711. This organ was left to King's Chapel in Boston, and still exists and is in the St. Johns Church, Portsmouth, New Hampshire.

The first organ built in the U.S. was started by

Edward Bromfield Jr., of Boston. He died at the age of 23, in 1746, without the organ being completed.

Other musical instruments were added slowly and Musical Societies were formed to play for other groups other than church services. During the Revolutionary War, all musical events were banned as being too expensive and frivolous.

The meeting was closed by the members singing several Revolutionary War Songs.

The next meeting will be held Oct. 25 at the home of Mrs. Richard Jacoby.

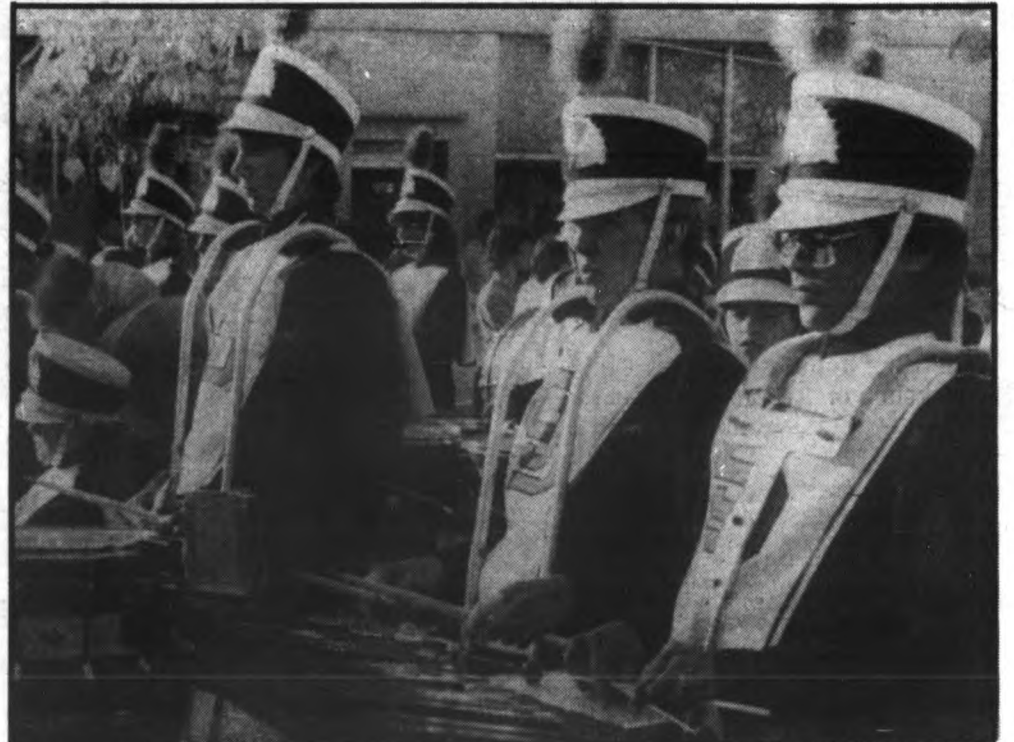
Flu vaccine continues in county

Carson City Hospital to begin fund drive

Carson City Hospital has announced the beginning of its annual fund raising drive to provide additional modern patient care equipment. Funds collected during this drive will be used to purchase a modern child birthing center for the Obstetrics Department.

According to David Z. Nareski, R.N., B.S.N., Development and Community Service manager, "This year's fund raising effort will focus on one specific equipment purchase for the benefit of our patients. The estimated cost for this child birthing center is \$25,000, which is our goal."

The purchase of equipment for the Obstetrical Department was chosen as a goal for this drive, as part of the hospital's commitment to meet the health care needs of expectant parents and newborn children in the mid-Michigan area. This commitment involves the active recruiting of a specialist in Obstetrics and Gynecology, the Level II Nursery arrangement with Butterworth Hospital, the expansion of Expectant Parent instruction to daytime hours and to outlying communities, and the development of a plan to

educate and care for teen-age expectant parents and their newborn children. The latter has been submitted to government and private agencies with a request for financial support.

The childbirthing center will include furniture designed to create a home-like atmosphere for the newborn baby's family.

The highlight of the new center will be a Birthing Bed, which is described by its manufacturer as "the most versatile birthing bed ever developed." Jan Guenther, R.N., Maternal and Child Health head nurse, states that "this equipment assures the mother total comfort and care during labor, delivery, and bonding."

A 20-minute videotape program which describes the equipment in detail can be viewed at the hospital. Call the Development and Community Services Department at 517-584-3131, extension 236.

The fund drive will be a combined effort involving everyone who is interested. Employees, businesses, community organizations, and individual citizens are invited to participate.

Employees of Carson City Hospital will have the opportunity to donate a one time gift or through a payroll deduction plan. Last year, CCH employees pledged approximately \$13,000 which will provide furniture for a new Operating Room/Intensive Care Unit Waiting Room.

Generous gifts to the hospital in recent years from public and private donors have allowed for the construction to begin on a new Chapel, and for the purchase of a C-arm X-Ray machine, which makes a wide range of surgical and medical procedures safer and more cost efficient. The hospital administration expresses appreciation to those who have contributed to past fund raising drives.

All gifts to CCH are tax deductible. All donors are recognized in the quarterly CCH Express newsletter.

Spiritual care given to patients at area hospital

Providing spiritual care to patients and families is the purpose of a recently organized chaplaincy program at Carson City Hospital.

Clergy members from the area will serve rotating one-week terms as the hospital chaplain.

The chaplain of the week will visit the patients who are new admissions, on a daily basis. The chaplain will offer to contact the individual patient's pastor, and inform the pastor of the patient's admission to the hospital. The patient's home pastor will be given first consideration as the person to provide pastoral care at all times.

If a patient is from out of the area, the chaplain will offer to contact a local pastor of the same religious affiliation of the patient. If the patient has no church affiliation, the chaplain

will offer to minister to the patient's spiritual needs, whether by talking, praying or offering encouragement and support.

All chaplain services will be provided according to the specific wishes of each individual patient.

At the chaplaincy organizational meeting, chaired by the Rev. Jim Kendall, the clergy members developed a set of guidelines for the program's implementation. Pastor Kendall, of Mt. Hope Brethren Church in Carson City, will serve as hospital chaplain during the first week of the chaplaincy program, beginning Oct. 8.

This co-operative effort by the clergy members, in the interest of patients and

families, demonstrates pastoral profession. The their commitment to the Carson City Hospital

Parents can teach kids to care

Raising children who are helpful, considerate and sensitive to the needs of others is no easy task. An article in the October issue of PTA Today, the National PTA's magazine, offers suggestions for how parents can teach children to care about others.

According to Thomas Lickona, a professor and developmental psychologist, and author of the article, the following ideas can help raise caring children:

- Use the power of positive example. Parents can influence children's moral development by setting a good example, and by using sources such as children's books that feature kind and caring characters. At the same time, parents should limit children's exposure to bad examples. One way is by controlling television viewing.
- Give children plenty of love. Build a strong bond of love between parent and child by spending time together. It will help children value themselves, and in turn learn to value others.
- Foster a caring atmosphere in the home. Share and discuss everyday experiences at the dinner table. When conflicts arise within a family, try to solve them fairly, in a way that meets everyone's

needs. When problems develop outside the family, members can offer support to one another.

- Give children responsible family roles. (A Harvard study shows that the more responsibilities children are assigned the more they learn to care for others.) To become a contributing family member, youngsters can share the housekeeping, help in the kitchen, care for a pet, play with or read to a youngster sister or brother, or pitch in on the yard work, gardening or house repair. Parents should not pay children for such duties because it will take away the experience of being helpful.
- Extend caring beyond the family. Teach children to become responsible members of the neighborhood by shoveling snow or cutting the grass for elderly neighbors. Children can contribute to the community by working for causes or charities.
- Sensitize children to other's feelings. Help children understand the hurt of a child who is locked out of a game or made fun of by others. Tell children that putdowns hurt people inside where

you can't see it, but it's real. Teach them to put themselves in the other person's shoes.

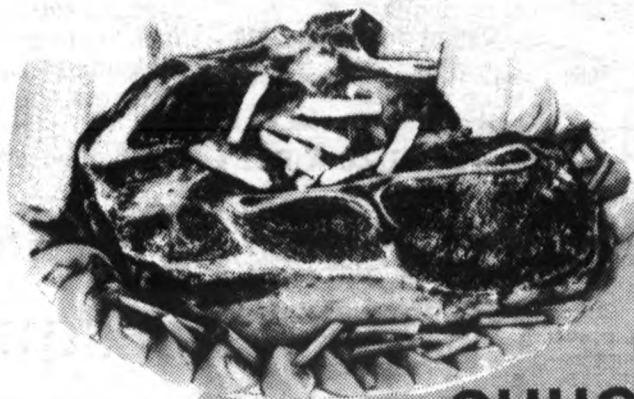
