Candidates square off

Albosta - Schuette debate here

During the time allotted for closing remarks at a chamber of commerce sponsored debate, held Oct. 18 in St. Johns, 10th District Democratic Congressman Don Albosta called on his Republican opponent, Bill Schuette, to immediately stop the airing of a television ad stating "Don Albosta missed every single vote. Every single one." in references to Albosta's attendance of subcommittees of the House Agriculture Committee.

"It looks like my opponent has decided to use a right wing extremist lie and buy technique in an attempt to fool the people. These types of right wing tactics have no place in the 10th District and both Republicans and Democrats deplore them." In the St. Johns debate, Albosta also said that the ad was "a shame and a lie" and that Schuette should be ashamed and that Schuette's parents would be ashamed of him.

Schuette's campaign based the advertisement on seven roll call votes for the Agriculture subcommittees Albosta was a member of. In a post-debate meeting, Schuette's press secretary restated the advertisement's message as Albosta being present and voting not once.

Albosta was not present at the seven meetings. He was absent once, and voted by proxy the remaining six times. Albosta's press secretary emphasized that a vote by proxy is still a vote, and proxy voting is often used by congressmen so they can "be in two places at once."

DURING THE MAIN course of the debate, before Albosta's vehement closing comments, the candidates stuck mainly to the issues. Schuette was more flamboyant and broad-based in his answers, speaking in the style of Pres. Reagan, while Albosta was more subdued, sticking basically to specifics. While Schuette never made specific mention of Albosta, usually referring to him as "the other candidate" or "my opponent," Albosta often directly spoke to Schuette, usually addressing him as "Bill," in the debate styled after those sponsored by the League of Women Voters. Audience members at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon provided questions after each candidate's opening statements.

Albosta opened the debate, dwelling chiefly on his six years of experience in congress, and his service to constituents "both rich and poor." His main point in the opening was the nation's deficit. "The fastest growing part of our economy is the interest on the national debt," said Albosta. "And the money from that interest is going to the richest people in the country." He also said that our problems are not going to be solved by political rhetoric, but by "bi-partisan cooperation, honest effort, and a campaign based on the issues."

Schuette spoke more animatedly, outlining his repeating themes for the election.

The first of those themes was taxes. People are overtaxed, and they do not want a tax increase, said Schuette.

Schuette's second point was that government needs to be run like a business. "We should put the business ethic into our Constitution, with an amendment to balance the budget," Schuette said.

Schuette's third point was government waste, which there is too much of. He specifically pointed out the "Cartergate" investigation, involving

Reagan's possession of then-President Carter's briefing booklets before the 1980 Presidential Debates. Albosta headed that investigation in congress. Schuette said that the cost for the investigation and the two-thousand page report on the committee's findings cost half a million dollars. Albosta said that the figure is below the 80 or 90 thousand dollars budgeted to the committee.

Schuette's final point was that he wanted to be on the house Agriculture Committee, a position which Albosta resigned to work on committees with which he would have more seniority.

Positions on issues raised during the debate were as follows:

What can be done to reduce the federal deficit?

Schuette: reduce spending, adopt a constitutional amendment to eliminate waste, keep the economy rolling, and no tax increase.

Albosta: stop building "gold-plated sacred cow weapons," channel money to strong conventional forces, stop the flow of money out of this country. "If you cut everything but social security and the defense budget, that's only 20% of our national budget."

National Defense

Schuette: supports proper prudent technology. "We need to bargain from a position of strength, never of weakness."

Albosta: also supports a strong defense, but is against the "gold plated weapons." "The MX missile system is a waste." Puts emphasis on strong conventional forces.

Abortion

Schuette: adamantly opposed to abortion. Doesn't want state or federal dollars going to it, but individuals should be able to make choice.

Albosta: against all abortion. Does not support any funding for abortion.

Agriculture

Schuette: adopts the Reagan line. "One question—are you better off than you were four years ago? I think the answer you'd have to make is yes."

Albosta: "The farmer is as well off today, or as bad off, as he was in the 30s, and that's about as low as you can get." Supports a two-price system for agricultural products, one for private use, another for commercial.

Schoolboard; No on Proposal C

The St. Johns School Board, in its Oct. 15 meeting at the Rodney B. Wilson Middle School Library, unanimously voted to adopt a resolution expressing its "strong opposition to the contents and concepts of Proposal C, an amendment to the Michigan Constitution."

Proposal C, also known as the Voter's Choice Amendment, if approved, would prohibit increase

or adoption of new taxes unless approved by voters, and roll back all taxes, licenses, permits, or user fees to 1981 rates unless increases were approved by voters.

The school board is against Proposal C because, in the words of their resolution, "...such extraordinary restrictions on the authority of state and local legislative bodies constitute a very significant structural change in the concept of represen-

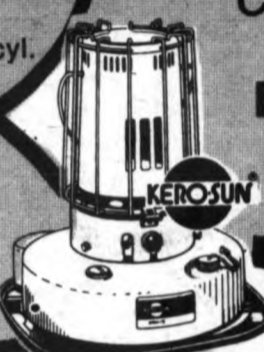

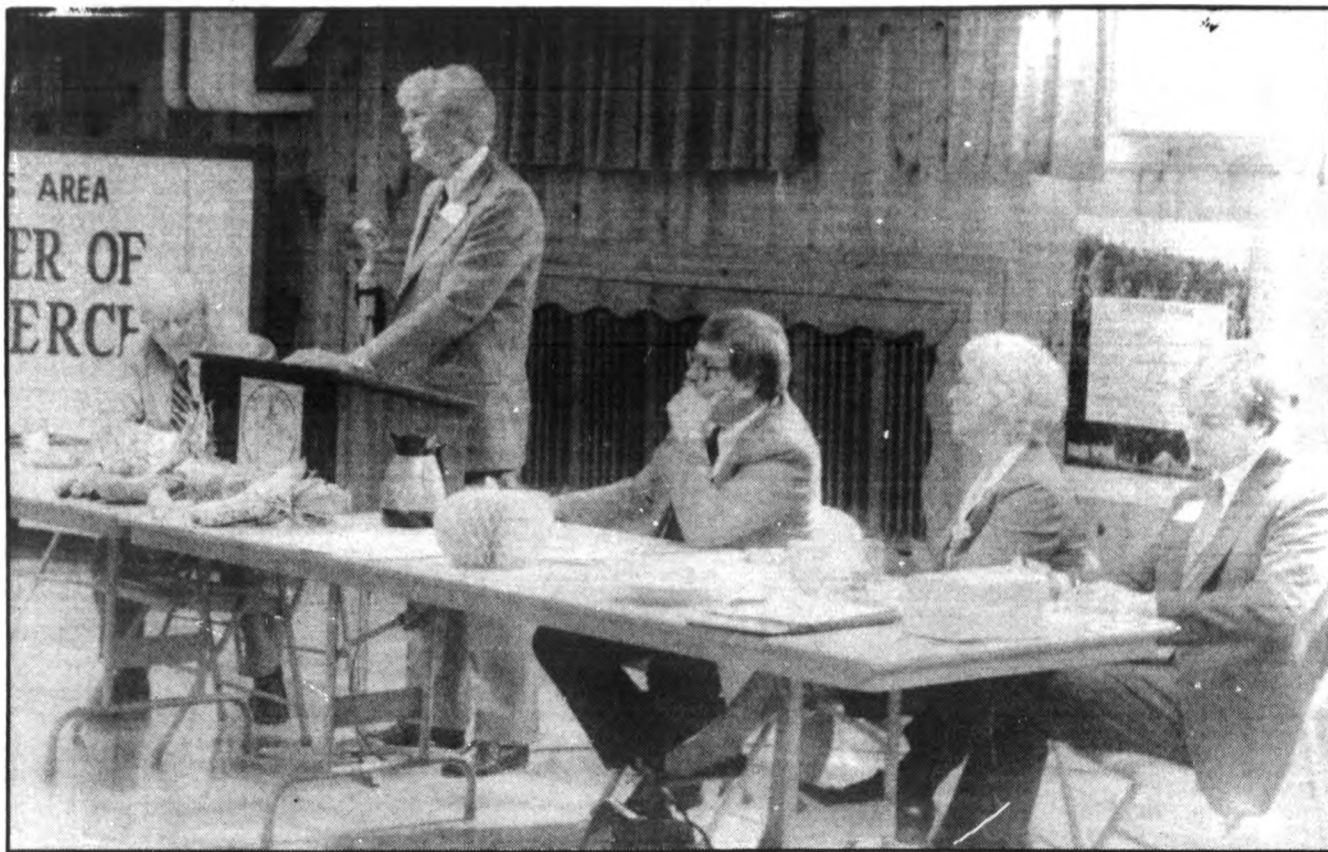

Mint provides local flavor

In 1927, Alden Livingston and his family began sowing new seeds in St. Johns. After more than 57 years of reaping the harvest, he contends that mint farming is still a way of life for him and his family.

The Livingstons are among 16 families in Clinton County who harvest mint annually. Each family provides leading national manufacturers with their precious oil, with 40 percent used to improve the taste of gum and 30 percent to sweeten toothpaste and mouthwash.

Seventy percent of the U.S. produced mint oil is consumed in the United States. It was introduced to the nation in colonial times and was first grown in Massachusetts. Mint growing gradually moved westward with the settlers. The soils and climate of southern Michigan and northern Indiana were so well suited to mint culture that these areas became the major mint-producing areas of the nation by 1920.

According to Livingston, his family became interested in mint farming during those early years after recognizing the potential for success.

"It was just coming in the neighborhood at the time," he said. "And we thought it would be a good idea to give it a try. It appeared to be a good money crop."

The Livingstons started out with 15 acres and now own up to 900. On 200 additional acres they farm beef and dairy products. Livingston said that they had a good year this year, getting up to 40 pounds of oil per acre.

The prices for the oil reach up to \$30 a pound, but Livingston explained that those prices have never been fixed throughout the years. What was once dealt with on contracts is now being used as an open market. Buyers are waiting until after the oil is produced to purchase the product.

The product becomes available after a unique harvesting process that actually distills the cut mint plants. Modern mint distilleries consist of mint distillation tubs, condensers, receivers and often redistillation units.

The mint tubs are, for the most part, custom built by the growers. At least two tubs are needed for each station at the distillery, with one being filled with the mint and the other being distilled.

The boilers are high pressure boilers for the generation of steam in a distilling unit. Excessive amounts of steam after the charge is heated will cause some oil to pass through the condenser without condensing. About one hour is generally required for distillation of a tub, but this time varies with the tub size, hay condition and steam pressure.

Once the mint oil is vaporized from the mint charge, it passes through a vapor hose, along with water vapor, into the condenser. The condenser is a continuous series of pipes immersed in water so that vaporized oil and water will recondense for collection in the receiver.

Receivers are designed to collect water and oil from the condenser and allow the lighter mint oil to separate and float on top of water so it can be drawn off in relatively pure form.

Many growers now install a small unit on their distilleries consisting of a small steam-heated distillation chamber and condenser to recover additional oil from the effluent from the receivers.

Livingston explained that the process has changed a great deal since when he first began growing mint. He said that not only are the stills bigger, but there is a great deal more equipment to be concerned with.

He added that not only is the field expanding technologically, but also a greater knowledge is needed for chemicals to help ensure the best growth from the plants.

In honor of the success of mint production in St. Johns, the Chamber of Commerce is currently arranging plans for a 1985 Mint Festival to be held in August. At one time, the festival was a popular annual event in the county and Chamber Director Joann Martis said she feels it can be again.

Sheriff gives Halloween tips

Some of the gremlins that come out at Halloween are very real, warns Clinton County Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel.

"These are the people who have no fun in their hearts and seek to discourage or injure children who come to their homes for trick-or-treat night," Sheriff Hufnagel explains.

Parents are cautioned to be extra aware of their children's safety during the Halloween season, especially with so many activities taking place after dark. The Clinton County Sheriff's Department offers these safety thoughts:

-Parents should escort small children to homes in the neighborhood, visiting only people they know.

-For older children, it is a good idea to put safety reflecting tape on their costumes, to make them easier to see at night by motorists.

-Remind children to look both ways before crossing the street and to use the crosswalk wherever possible.

-Avoid dark streets and alleys; stay away from strangers and cars or trucks you do not recognize.

-Make sure a child's vision is not blocked because of a mask or overhanging wig or hood.

-Advise youngsters to approach neighborhood pets with caution; wearing a costume may frighten the animal and cause it to attack.

-Once children have brought home their bags of goodies, allow them to eat only those candies which are in wrappers; inspect each piece before permitting your child to eat it.

-Do not allow your child to eat any homemade candy or cookies from the goodie bag, unless you know for sure they are safe.

-If your child brings home fruit, such as apples, pears or oranges, be sure to cut each one into pieces and inspect it for dangerous objects, such as razor blades, and for any unusual discoloration.

If you should find any contaminated foods or other safety violations, please report them to the Sheriff's Department.

Extension Agriculture News By Marilyn Loudenslager



This week's column is the first of hopefully many years of columns coming to you from the Extension office, offering you pertinent news and information.

To begin with, I would like to introduce you to Extension by giving you a brief review of our history and philosophy. This should give you a better understanding of Extension's role in agriculture and maybe even our role in your operation.

Extension began in 1914. Over the years, Extension has been involved in addressing the needs of their clientele and through this has been in one way or another involved in either initiating or working closely with many organizations you are familiar with today. Extension was involved in the beginning of the Soil Conservation Service, Farmers Home Administration, as well as many commodity groups. Through the 1920's, Extension was involved with coordination, interpretation, and advisory work with the national Dairy Herd Improvement program, which developed into what we now know as DHIA. Extension has also worked closely with general farm groups such as the Grange and Farm Bureau. It is the intent of Extension to continue to work with these organizations, not to provide a strong regulatory or leadership role, but to serve an educational role offering unified recommendations for progress in achieving efficiency in production and marketing.

Extension is, as it says, an extension of the land-grant colleges and universities, designed to provide continuing education for anyone interested. Extension is an informal educational program. There are no pre-described courses, no set curriculum and best of all, no tuition. This informal structure allows the county agents to "tailor" programs specifically to meet the needs of the clientele. Extension is structured to provide a broad resource base. The base reaches beyond the county office to the university where there are Extension Specialists in a wide variety of disciplines. This structure allows Extension to address a wide variety of problems. By pooling professional expertise, Extension is capable of working as a team to solve problems showing up, for example, in production, but having roots in the financial, management, or family relations end of the business. By

correcting all phases of the problem, the results are greater and longer lasting.

Extension offers programs on an individual basis, in group meetings and through the media. To offer programs which address the needs of the clientele, Extension needs input from the clientele. The articles I provide here are no exception! I intend to provide information that you are interested in and/or have an immediate need for, so please feel free to send me suggestions of topics you would like to see covered. Area man creates Viking message stick

John Mesh, 19, of Papa Bear's Woodworks in St. Johns, recently contributed to the beginning of a national cooperative exchange by creating a traditional wooden message stick in which greetings and seeds were exchanged with Norwegian 4-H members.

The stick was exchanged recently when the viking ship Saga Siglar docked in Manistee, interrupting its around-the-world itinerary to offer a symbolic beginning to a cooperative forestry project undertaken by the Norwegian government and a U.S. forest products company.

The company, Packaging Corporation of America, sponsored the visit of the viking ship and its crew to Manistee, site of PCA's Filer City mill and of the forestry project to commemorate the beginning of the cooperative venture. Under the direction of A/S Skogstre, a Norwegian/American corporation, PCA will establish a seed orchard for Norwegian spruce that will supply seeds to help replenish the forests of Norway.

Packaging Corporation already conducts forestry operations in northwest Michigan, where it owns or controls over 150,000 acres of woodlands.

The Saga Siglar also carried an environmental message from the 25,000 4-H members in Norway, which was presented to two representatives of Michigan 4-H clubs.

The crew of the Sage Siglar, which has recently replicated Norse explorer Leif Ericson's voyage to the New World, was met at the docks in Manistee by a representative of the governor's office, city fathers, PCA and 4-H officials, and were welcomed with the Norwegian national anthem played by the Manistee High School Band. David Dempsey, advisor on natural resources to Michigan Governor James Blanchard, presented the Saga Siglar's crew with an executive declaration from the governor welcoming them to Michigan and noting the cooperative forestry effort.

Fred Fragomeli, Packaging Corporation vice president, greeted the crew, headed by Norwegian adventurer Ragnar Thorseth, in their

native tongue. The presentation of the 4-H message, carried in a traditional Norwegian message stick, followed.

Manistee County 4-H members Laura LeSarge and Bill Schoedel received the message from Capt. Thorseth and presented him with a gift of North American white pine needles and a reply to the 4-H youths of his country.

A luncheon for the crew and guests followed at the Manistee Golf and Country Club, after which the group returned to the craft for a hands-on tour and brief voyage on Lake Michigan.

The Saga Siglar is an authentic replica of a 1,000-year-old viking ship that was used by early Norwegian explorers and traders. The ship was built by a master boatwright under the sponsorship of a group called "Operation Viking." Operation Viking is pursuing a cultural and scientific research project aimed at proving theories about the travels of early vikings and the trade routes they developed. The project is headed by Thorseth.

Packaging Corporation of America is one of the nation's leading producers of corrugated containers, recycled paperboard, folding cartons, molded fibre packaging and pressed aluminum and plastic containers.

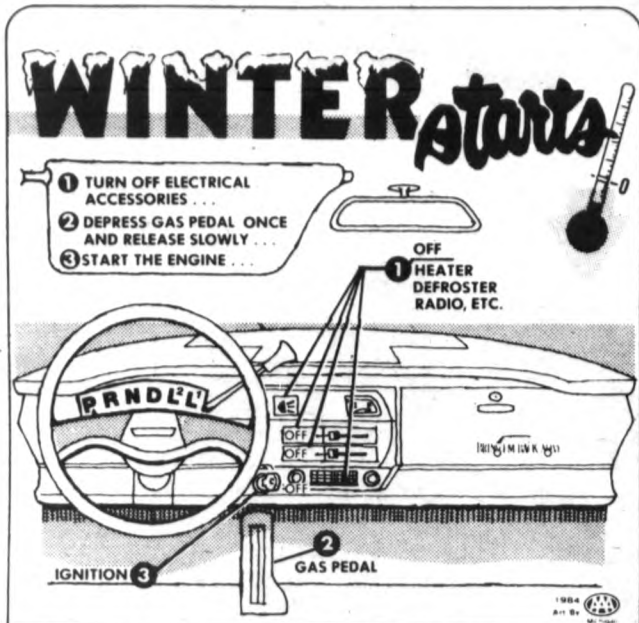

For added ease in winter starting, the Automobile Club of Michigan suggests this simple 1-2-3 method: (1) With the transmission in park, turn off electrical accessories so there is no extra strain on the battery. (2) Push the gas pedal to the floor and let up slowly to set the automatic choke. The accelerator should not be pumped since this will flood the engine. (3) Engage the starter for 10 seconds. Should the engine fail to start, wait 30 seconds and repeat steps 1 and 2. If you flood the engine, depress the gas pedal to the floor, hold and engage the starter. The accelerator should be kept down until the engine starts. Motorists should keep their fuel tank full to avoid fuel line freezing.



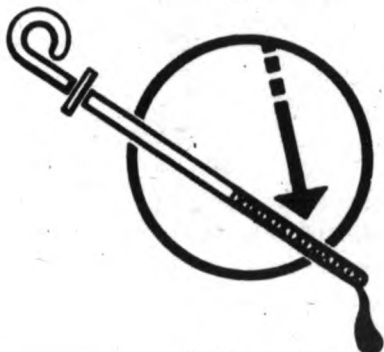

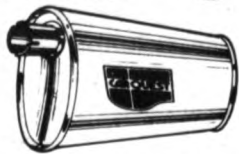

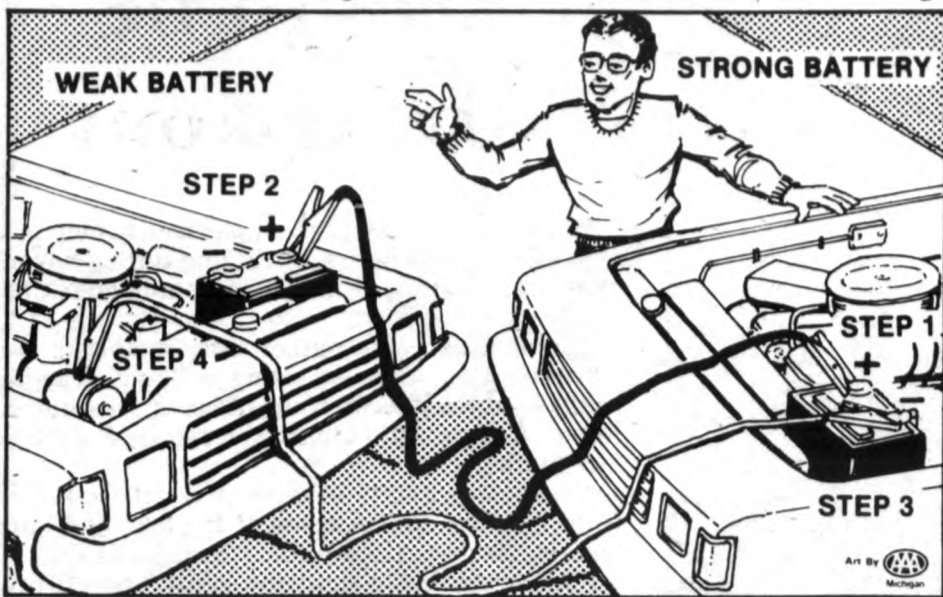

How To Jump Start Your Car Safely



Jump starting can boost a weak battery to get a car's engine running, but it is critically important to use the proper procedures to avoid injury or damage to a vehicle's electrical system, the Automobile Club of Michigan advises. Both cars should be in "park" and not touching each other before booster cables are attached. The ignitions and all electrical accessories should be turned off on both cars. Step 1) connect one end of a cable to the positive terminal of the strong battery; Step 2) attach the other end to the positive terminal of the weak battery; Step 3) connect one end of the other cable to the negative terminal of the strong battery; 4) attach the last clamp to the engine block or generator mounting bracket of the disabled car as far from the battery as possible. Start the vehicle with the strong battery and let it run several minutes before starting the disabled car. Remove the cables in reverse order. If the battery has water cell caps, remove them and place a damp cloth over the openings before jump starting. Motorists should never smoke and wear some type of eye covering when working near a battery.

CHECK HEATING SYSTEM NOW FOR COLD WEATHER

Now is a good time to check your vehicle's heating and cooling system to avoid the inconvenience and expense of a broken heater, cracked radiator or other serious heating or cooling problem.

The following checklist of items to look for is recommended by experts at Everco Industries, Inc., a leading supplier of heating, cooling and air conditioning parts.

- Turn on the heater and check to see that the blower works and that the heater control switch works properly at all settings.
- Check for and remove bugs and debris caught in the fins of the radiator.

(Such debris could restrict airflow!)

- Check for spongy, brittle or cracked hoses and look for signs of water leakage around hoses and radiator connections and clamps.
- Check to see if the thermostat is opening by holding the hose at the radiator outlet while the vehicle is warming up. If it is opening properly you will feel a rush of water through the hose as the engine warms.
- Drain and replace the antifreeze and coolant if it has not been changed in over two years. Check for extremely rusty coolant which can be an indication that the radiator cap is defective.

Noxious fumes

The most serious form of car sickness results from carbon monoxide poisoning. An odorless, colorless and invisible gas, carbon monoxide is in the exhaust that comes out of the vehicle's tail pipe. If the system is leaking, usually signalled by the rumbling or roar of unmuffled exhaust, these fumes can seep into the car.

Even a small amount of carbon monoxide is enough to make the occupants drowsy and nauseous. In sufficient quantity, it is lethal.

Keep windows at least partly open on a car with leaking exhaust, the Council recommends, and replace leaking parts as soon as possible.

Bumpy ride

Car sickness also can be brought about by a floating or bobbing ride, caused by worn shock absorbers. This motion becomes exaggerated by weaving or zig-zagging due to loose steering parts.

Distraction caused by squeaking, chattering windshield wipers combined with impaired vision due to ineffective wiper action can have an adverse effect on a person's ability to drive safely.

The added handicaps of inoperative or improperly adjusted headlights plus the annoyances of thumping tires or rattles can affect a driver's stamina and judgment.

Observe the warning: give your car the best brakes you can

When a car's brakes fail, the result can range from an annoying fender-bender to a tragic crash. Brake failures nearly always are due to poor maintenance and/or improper repair.

A car's brakes often will give warning that they need service. Do they squeal loudly, shudder or pull to one side when applied? Does the pedal drop further than it used to or pulsate up and down under your foot? Does the pedal sink slowly as you hold pressure on it at a stop sign? Do you feel you are pushing harder and harder to stop your car? These are some of the brake distress signals that you should heed.

If you decide to have your brakes re-

paired by a professional repair shop, discuss them thoroughly with the shop manager or service adviser. Ask for a complete brake system inspection, a description of the necessary repairs and an estimate of the cost.

If you plan to do it yourself, purchase a copy of your car's factory service manual through your nearest dealership. It will give you all the information you need to do the job correctly.

Since your life and safety — and those of your family, friends and fellow motorists — depend so often on your brakes, quality brake maintenance and repair are extremely important.

The objective of quality brake service is to restore the entire brake system to like-new condition for best brake performance and for long brake life.

While those old brake linings were wearing out, a lot of other parts of the brake system were wearing out with them. When linings are replaced you may find that the brake drums or disc brake rotors are scored, cracked, out of round, warped or have developed hard spots.

If they are not too far gone, they may be machined to restore the friction surfaces, but always in pairs to retain brake balance.

New mounting hardware may be needed with disc brakes, and new return springs with drum brakes. The wheel bearings will need to be repacked with fresh grease and the seals replaced. Trying to save a few dollars on these small parts could cause the whole job to wear out sooner.

A complete brake system inspection should include the hydraulic system. The master cylinder and wheel cylinders or calipers should be inspected and overhauled or replaced as needed.

Don't be frozen out

Motorists can take precautions now to help prevent car door locks from freezing during severe winter weather, according to the Automobile Club of Michigan.

"Before the cold-weather hits, motorists can winterize their cars by using a liquid graphite solution to keep locks from freezing," cautioned Robert Tellier, Auto Club's Emergency Road Service manager.

"Using a graphite solution prohibits moisture from forming on the inside of the lock and later freezing during extreme cold," he pointed out.

"Motorists should apply the solution now to protect their locks before the extreme cold weather arrives," advised Tellier. "The solution is available at area hardware stores and locksmith shops and should be applied once a month during the winter."

To help prevent frozen locks, Tellier said cars should be parked in a garage, if possible, especially during sub-zero temperatures.

"If a lock is frozen, one way to thaw it is to heat the key several times with a match or lighter," he said. "Motorists may have to repeat the heating process several times to thaw the lock completely."

There are also several products on the market to help unstick frozen door locks. They come in aerosol spray cans and are generally a mixture of alcohol and a lock lubricant and can be squirted into the keyhole. The mixtures contain alcohol and should not be used near the flame.

If the latch mechanism on the door edge is frozen, motorists should close the door as far as possible and run the car heater on high. The heat should eventually warm the door enough to thaw the latch mechanism.

The Auto Club warns motorists not to pour hot water down the side of the car window and door handle to thaw the lock. The water freezes again very quickly and can crack the window glass and ruin the car's finish.

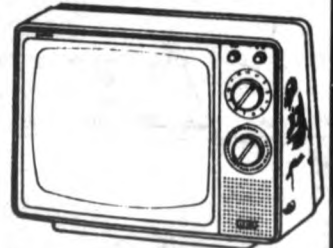
McKee of St. Johns. All but four of the above had Pewamo-Westphalia figured to win over Fowler.

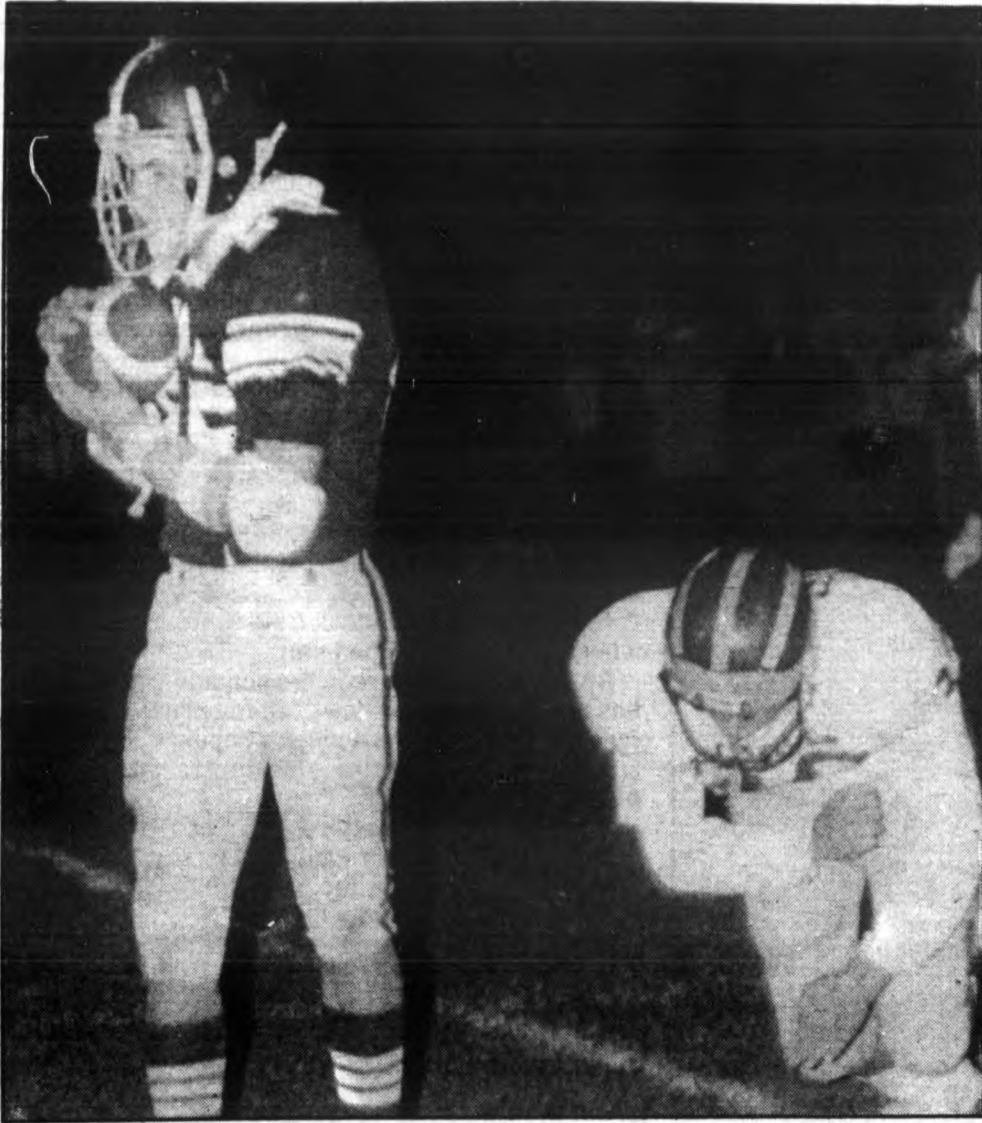

Redwings now Scot gridders

Three St. Johns High School graduates are among the 36 returning lettermen on the 1984 Alma College Scots football team. All three are regular contributors to the team.

Senior Bruce Fedewa, one of four co-captains, is a starting defensive linebacker and sophomore Steven Gonzales is an offensive starter as a wide receiver. Sophomore Jamie Werbish is Alma's kicker/punter.

Alma opened the season with a 41-17 win over Taylor University, followed by 26-24 losses to two Division II schools, Valparaiso and Northeastern Illinois. Buoyed by a record-breaking 61-30 victory over Olivet Nazarene, the Scots take a 2-2 non-conference record into Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (MIAA) action.

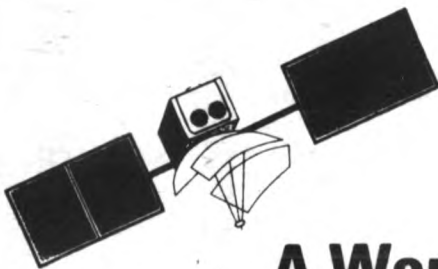

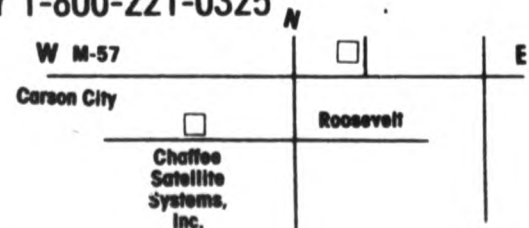

tative government in Michigan by effectively removing from these bodies authority to make the revenue and expenditure decisions for which they were elected; and

"...the immediate withdrawal of tax resources to finance essential state programs and services contemplated by Proposal C would worsen an already seriously diminished level of state investment; and

"...the potential loss of revenues to the St. Johns Public Schools if tax rollbacks were not restored would amount to over \$571,000."

In other actions by the board, Superintendent Earl Gabriel was granted authority to accept the offer from Community Resource Volunteers to transport special education students in the CRV's wheelchair-lift equipped van.

An agreement between the schools and the CRV has been drawn up which exchanges use of the van for gas, oil, and service discounts at school transportation facilities. The contract has yet to be signed.

In non action matters, the board received reports on the fourth Friday enrollment for St. Johns Schools and on the East Olive Elementary School Library.

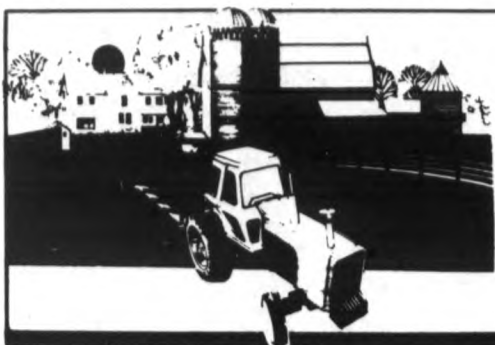

4-H isn't just for kids. It thrives on adult volunteer leadership. As the local youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service at Michigan State University and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, 4-H relies on the help, resources, and expertise of 522 volunteers in Clinton County who work with nearly fifteen hundred young members between the ages of ten and nineteen. These volunteers are among the more than 620,000 volunteer leaders nationwide, who work with nearly five million 4-H members throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands.

Marilyn Beck, a volunteer leader in Lenox, Iowa, said, "Not only do 4-H'ers build on experience, so do leaders." That is very true. In 4-H, adults can also gain valuable training and learn new skills. Youth and adults working together learn by doing in 4-H. Youth plan what they want to learn and then put the plan into action through 4-H projects and activities under the guidance of adult volunteers and parents.

Volunteers do not need to be experts in a specialized subject. They just need a willingness and a desire to work with young people and help them develop life skills. Volunteers can attend training workshops at the county and/or the state level and several different sessions are planned next year.

In Clinton County, some volunteers serve as Organizational Leaders to make the 51 clubs run smoothly throughout the year. Other volunteers serve as project leaders, camp counselors, trip chaperones and workshop resource persons. Project leaders, for example, share their skills with 4-H members in a variety of subject areas.

Do you know how to sew? Do you like to cook? Are crafts your favorite personal hobby? Would you like to learn more about small animals? Would you be willing to share a few hours a month to help some young people in your neighborhood learn those same skills? If you answered any of these questions with a "yes" or even with a "maybe", call the Cooperative Extension Service.

Clinton County needs to identify some new adult volunteers who would be willing to work with a few young people in their area. There are lots of youth who would like to be involved but who need some supporting adults to serve as leaders. The

St. Johns and DeWitt areas are two that especially need volunteers. The 4-H program has a lot to offer to both youth and adults and if you'd like to know more about becoming a volunteer leader, I'd like to tell you.

4-H is for kids, for adults, and for families. That's right. 4-H gives families a chance to learn together, be together, grow together. 4-H teaches young people skills they can use throughout their lives...and values that they can use to become more productive, responsible members of the community and of the family. So get involved. Explore 4-H and the many ways it can be your new family affair.

In recognition of this week, the St. Johns Wastewater Treatment Facility is inviting the public to tour their treatment operation.

Bean purchase increased

Congressman Don Albosta recently announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has decided to double last year's

purchase of dried beans for use in the Federal school lunch program, and will also be increasing purchases of canned beans. A total of 480,000 pounds of dried beans will be bought this year, compared to the 160,000 pounds that were purchased in 1983. Additionally, 642,000 cases of Number 10 cans of beans will be bought, up from 600,000 cases last year.

Albosta went on to emphasize that beans are a rich source of protein which is a vital nutrient in the diet of every American.

The beans will be delivered November 16 through February 28.

Family Focus

In just one week Halloween will be here again. If your child doesn't have a costume yet, you might consider making it this year. Homemade costumes are not only easy and inexpensive to make, they are also more comfortable for the children to wear.

I'll never forget the fun and excitement of creating my own Halloween costume. I can remember stuffing my dad's overalls with pillows and straw, adding a little make-up and a straw hat, and voila! I was from the Wizard of Oz! Other creations (with a little help from my mom) were a princess, a hobo, and a rag doll. I am sure you can think of lots too.

Your closets and drawers probably hold costume basics like leotards, belts, bathing caps, string, aluminum foil, construction paper, rubber boots, and maybe an old wig or two. These simple things can be turned into glorious outfits when creatively colored, covered or cut. For instance, a plain brown belt wrapped in aluminum foil is transformed into a symbol of power.

One way to create an offbeat look (say that of a punk rock singer or a star of the silver screen) is to use temporary hair dye that washes right out. (This idea would be best for older children.)

Remember, the trick to making a costume is getting kids involved, letting them do as much of the work as possible. Here are some suggestions for great and simple get-ups.

-Commander of the Space Shuttle: If your child owns a space helmet, she/he is ahead of the game. If not, it's easy to fashion one by covering the outside of a plastic bowl, gallon milk jug, or football helmet with aluminum foil; leave enough foil hanging loose on the back half to reach their neck. Your astronaut can wear white, gray or navy blue pants and white, gray, or navy blue shirt and zipper jacket (a bomber jacket would be ideal). Write your child's last name on a small rectangular piece of paper and tape it on the left side of his/her shirt. Write NASA on another piece of

paper and put it on the right side.

-Gypsy: You can turn your daughter into an exotic nomad by pinning the waist of a brightly colored skirt to fit her. She can knot together some scarves or scraps of material for a belt, and top off the outfit with a black T-shirt or sweater. Add lots of bangle bracelets, beads, chains, and some hoop earrings. Don't forget to tie a scarf around her head.

-Big Moose: All brown attire works best for this forest dweller. Stuff a brown knee sock with newspaper to create a tail, attach it to the seat of the pants with safety pins. A brown beanie or bathing cap with some small twigs taped to it will make ideal antlers.

-Miss Piggy: To make her snout, cut a cardboard toilet paper tube in half. Color it pink by using paint, crayons, or by wrapping it with construction or tissue paper. Cover one end of the tube with some pink paper and punch out two nostril holes. Pull a string through the two holes at the opposite end of the tube and tie the string at the back of the child's head. Cut some ears out of pink construction paper and clip them to your child's hair with hair clips or bobby pins. Powder her face profusely, dot rouge on her cheeks and spread some bright pink lipstick on those beautiful smackers. Use lots of mascara on her eyelashes or dip some old false ones. Miss Piggy could wear a frilly dress with shoulders for a regal appearance, or she could pin together a red felt cape with glued on epaulets made of fluffy white cotton.

-Clown: An old flannel nightgown, can be quickly converted into a loosefitting clown's outfit. Simply slit and stitch up the skirt part to make legs. A ruffle, hat and yarn balls can then be added to complete the outfit.

-The Great Pumpkin: Inexpensive orange fabric can be easily made into a pumpkin outfit by sewing two rectangular pieces of fabric together at the sides, leaving openings near the top for arms. Gather the top and bottom with a drawstring and tie at the neck and hips. Eyes, nose and mouth can then be cut from black construction paper and fastened to the body of the pumpkin. When trying to pad out the costume always think of safety first. Newspaper stuffing can be a fire hazard. A coat or jacket worn under the costume will probably provide enough padding.

**Justice Boyle
speaks to Rotary**

Michigan Supreme Court Justice Patricia J. Boyle brought her campaign for re-election to St. Johns last Tuesday, speaking to the luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club at the Shangri-La restaurant.

"I've been doing a lot of traveling," said Boyle, in an interview prior to the luncheon. "The effort is to meet as many people in as many places and see as much of this state as you can." Voters all over Michigan will be voting for State Supreme Court Justices. Boyle is running directly against former U.S. Senator Robert Griffin in the non-partisan race.

One of the problems with the race for Michigan Supreme Court is that people often have a hard time knowing who to vote for, says Boyle. "Even the most concerned citizens often don't know," she says. "My job is to meet as many people as I can, so that they can make an informed choice."

Supreme Court Justices are elected for six year terms. Three of the state's seven supreme court seats are contested in election this year.

Boyle made four main points at the Rotary Luncheon.

Her first point was that Michigan's judiciary system is too slow. When so much time elapses between arrest, trial, sentencing, and appeal, there is a greater potential for miscarriage of justice, says Boyle.

Boyle's second point was that the supreme court has sometimes failed to give lower courts guidance. Boyle cited the fact that out of 38 decisions the court has made while she has been a member, only 19 have been unanimous. This, says Boyle, makes for uncertainty on points of law in the lower courts, which have to rulings following supreme court guidelines. Boyle feels that the record on split decisions is improving, however.

The third point on the current workings of the Supreme Court made by Boyle was that the precedents for trials, and the impact of decisions made, are too often ignored. "More has to be taken into consideration than the judges' feelings toward a case," said Boyle. "I am not to presume that I am more enlightened than any other mind that has examined the question," she said. Precedence in cases should be investigated not only for consistency's sake, but also so as to more sensibly guide lower court decisions.

In making her fourth point, Boyle said that "Partisan decisions have to be confronted and examined." Boyle recognized that some valid criticisms have been made in this area. She also noted that the justices hold their positions only through the consent of the people. "That is why the respect of the citizenry is critical to us," says Boyle.

In addition to the problems outlined at the Rotary luncheon, Boyle adds legal system overcrowding, an overly complex legal system, a system that is too expensive, and a judiciary clogged with often frivolous lawsuits that prevent people with meritorious claims from getting the courts attention as major difficulties faced by Michigan's Supreme Court.

However, Boyle has no quick and easy solutions. "Anything proposed as reform has to carry the burden of proving that it would make things more efficient," says Boyle. She does not believe that passing more laws will cure things. "Every time we have a problem, we try to solve it with legislation," says the Justice. "Often legislation has created its own problems. When rules are proposed to us, we have to ask how necessary they are. Will they end up being simply another tool for lawyers to use to make the system more complex?"

Of her judicial race with Robert Griffin, Boyle says "I have a proven record as a judge. I have been a criminal court judge, a federal court judge, and a supreme court justice. I was voted the best of 20 judges when I was in Detroit Recorder's Court. It's not the name you want to vote for, it's the credentials you want to vote for."

Boyle has been a supreme court justice for 15 months. She took office April 20, 1983 after Gov. James Blanchard requested that she give up her life tenured federal judgeship. Boyle holds the Supreme Court seat originally intended for Dorothy Comstock Riley, who was appointed by Gov. Milliken before he resigned.

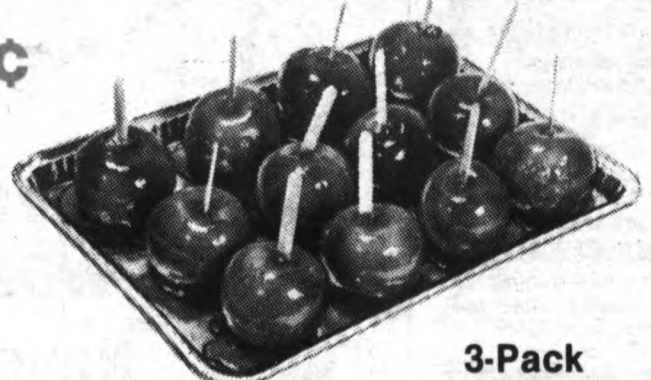
