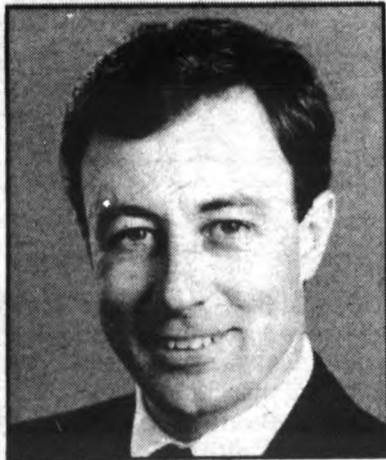
Clinton county's vote

Clinton County voters, like those around most of the nation, elected to keep our president, by almost a three to one margin; 17,468 to 6,261.

If the Clinton County voters had their way in Michigan's U.S. Senate race though, we would be replacing Carl Levin with Jack Lousma. Lousma beat out Levin 13,730 to 9,045 in Clinton County.

Residents of the 10th Congressional District will have a new U.S. representative the first of the year. In a victory suprising to most outside the Schuette camp, Republican Bill Schuette won the hotly contested race with Democrat incumbent Don Albosta by 1,406 votes district-wide. Inside Clinton County, that margin was a little larger,

with Schuette gathering 11,131 votes to Albosta's 9,463. Albosta is reportedly considering asking for a re-count of that election.

Gary Randall, Republican incumbent for the state legislature's 89th district representative seat, surprised few with his close to 3 to 1 victory over democrat Harold McCastle. Randall tallied 15,412 votes in Clinton County to McCastle's 5,815.

In the hotly contested 65th District judgeship, the race that had most of Clinton County's residents hurrying for one side of the fence or the other, Jeff Martlew defeated incumbent Fred Lewis 10,494 to 7,963.

Clinton County agreed with voters around the state about Michigan's ballot proposals. Proposal

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Local businessman dies suddenly

"He had a lot of parts, and I'm sure he had a lot of friends," said local attorney James Moore, of Jackson "Jack" Travers, owner of Travers Auto Parts, a St. Johns business since 1946.



Travers suffered a heart attack at home and was taken to the Ingham Medical Center by his wife, Connie, last Wednesday Nov. 7. He died at the center. Travers was 68 years old and had been ill for a time before his death.

"I'd known Jack ever since day one," said Willis Hettler, of Willis Hettler Motor Sales, a "business acquaintance" of Travers. "He was excellent, the world needs more people like old Jack," said Hettler. "We'd been on speaking terms ever since he came to town."

"Life seemed to go out of Jack after his brother Frank died," said Moore. The brothers co-founded and ran the business until Frank's death five years ago. "He missed his brother terribly," said Moore. Hettler agreed.

"As far as being a businessman is concerned, I don't think I've ever heard anyone say anything meanfully about old Jack," said Hettler.

"To a young kid needing a part, or an old mechanic, he'd always just say 'well go on back'," said Moore, talking about Travers' business. "He must have had 30,000 bumpers. You've never seen such stuff."

Hettler, who deals primarily in Chrysler products, remembers steering luxury cars, big Cadillacs and Lincolns, over to Travers' business. "I'd let him know about the ones he might not know about," said Hettler.

"Jack had one love in life and that was Lincoln Continentals," said Moore. "He couldn't pass up the opportunity to buy a Lincoln Continental." Travers did not collect the cars, however, said Moore. He would usually just drive them for a while and then sell them.

Travers, who is remembered as "an easygoing guy," also owned rental property in the St. Johns area.

RAVE aids after domestic violence

To the Editor:

As I write this, I am shocked by the fact that of the homes this letter reaches, one of three of those homes someone will take offence. These persons will be offended because in a third of our homes there is a person physically abusing other family members. I find this statistic to be appalling, but nevertheless the truth. In a third of our homes, someone is now saying, "What I do in my own home and to my own spouse is of no consequence to anyone else." Domestic violence is perhaps the most destructive force to the family unit. Such violence leaves the abused spouse scarred emotionally and sometimes physically for life. This destructive action is often seen and therefore, taught to the children who either become abusive themselves, or will become victims of abuse of their future marriage partners.

This problem would be unexcusable even if it were only an "inner city" or "other culture" problem, but it is not. Domestic violence is happening here and it is happening with an ever increasing frequency. There is now a small group of people

working with an organization called R.A.V.E. (Relief After Violent Encounter), but it is a small group. Our community has thus far been unwilling to admit the problem and even more reticent to work to stop this problem. Are we all that afraid to help? Do we really feel that "A man's house is his castle" and that what happens within those walls is of no consequence or importance to anyone else? If you are a victim of another person's violence, R.A.V.E. is willing to help. If you are emotionally or physically abusing another person, I ask you to seek help. To the rest of you, I ask you not to close your eyes to one of the most serious problems of our time. R.A.V.E. needs your help. Be a volunteer to help victims of domestic violence. Give your financial support so that help will continue to be available. A hotline will soon be operational with your help. Contact P.O. Box 472, St. Johns, to help bring peace to our homes and self worth and respect to all people.

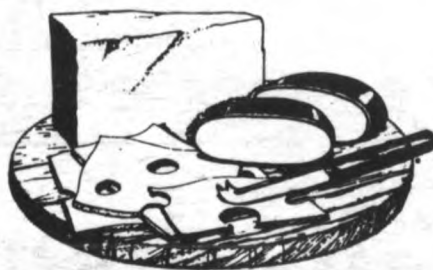

Sinking of Bradley

Editor's Note:

Sunday, Nov. 18, marks an infamous date to remember in marine history for it was Tuesday, Nov. 18, 1958 that the Carl D. Bradley, a 615 foot limestone carrier of Bradley Transportation Lines in Rogers City, Michigan sank just off Gull Island in Lake Michigan. The month of November often brings violent storms in the Great Lakes and with it, many times death and destruction. This is a story of that incident as authored in its original text in 1968, the tenth anniversary of the happening by this writer.

As I walked down the icy sidewalk in Ypsilanti, Michigan, with winter's unmerciful chill coursing throughout my body, I knew something ominous lurked in the air. A few steps further proved my anticipation of certain disaster. I can still see the headline on that newspaper as it prominently displayed itself on the newspaper rack: "Two Survivors, 18 Bodies Recovered; Bradley Sinks".

That fateful day was Tuesday, Nov. 18, 1958, exactly 10 years ago. I presume that the reason for remembering the incident so well was the fact that I had known some of the victims personally and in some cases, members of their immediate families.

The Bradley was a proud ship of the Bradley Transportation Lines in Rogers City. It measured 615 feet long and was a giant of the line. Its home port was Rogers City, just 39 miles down highway 23 from the town of Cheboygan where I had been residing that summer. With the two northern towns being neighboring communities and not much in between, a blending of friendships existed between the townspeople of both. The tragedy of the Bradley was, therefore, not Rogers City's alone.

Thirty-three members of the crew perished that night when the angry waters of Lake Michigan tore the once gallant ship of the lakes in half and sent her plunging to an icy grave. Two members survived from sheer willpower to live. Several others fought for their lives, but near-freezing water and howling gale winds that piled mountainous waves denied them their right to live.

The Bradley, built in 1927 and then the largest ship on the Great Lakes, had a cargo capacity of 14,800 tons. She flew the flag of Bradley Transportation Co. of Rogers City.

The firm is a subsidiary of U.S. Steel Corporation and hauls iron-making limestone (calcite) to steel mills in the Chicago area.

The Carl D. Bradley was on its 46th trip of the shipping season in which she had covered 27,000 miles and was making her final trip of the season. She had delivered cargo to Gary steel mills at Buffington, Indiana and was on her way home.

At 5:20 p.m. that Tuesday, the Bradley radioed its home port that it estimated that it would arrive at 2 a.m. Wednesday morning. Then at 5:31 p.m., just 11 minutes later, Captain Roland Bryan, the ship's skipper, shouted into his radio, "Mayday, Mayday, Mayday! This is the Carl D. Bradley. Our position is approximately 12 miles southwest of Gull Island. We are in serious trouble!"

Next, a voice was heard saying, "Get the jackets! Run, grab life jackets. Mayday, the ship is breaking up!"

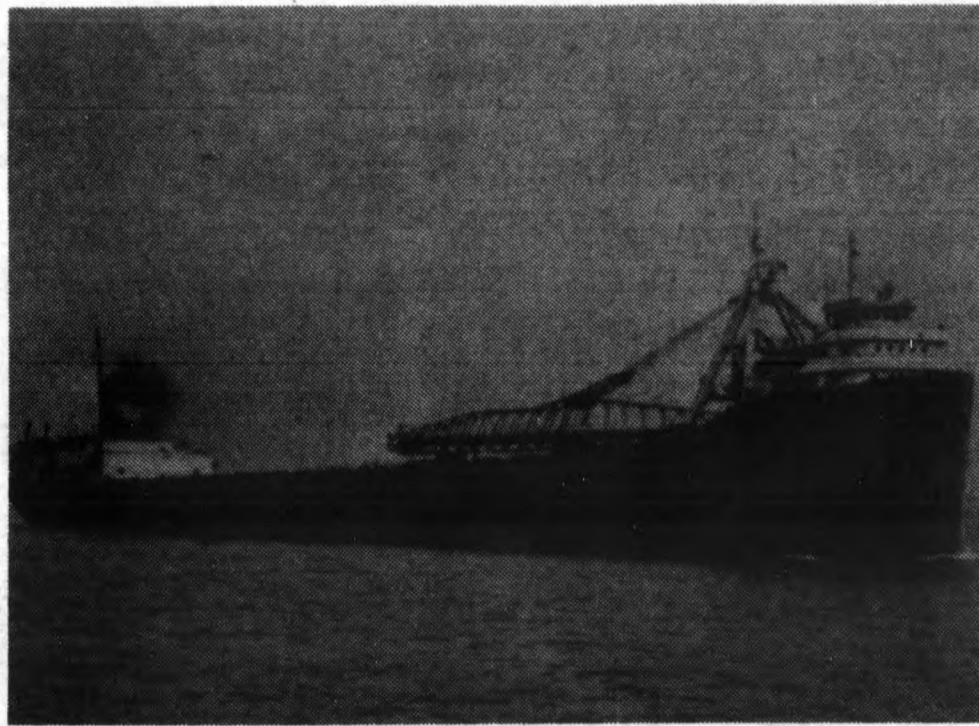
The term "Mayday" is the voice version of the modern-day S.O.S. signal that Great Lakes vessels used when in distress.

The German vessel, Christian Sartori, was just three miles away, but in 68 mile per hour winds and 20 foot waves, it took the ship over an hour to reach the scene. Upon arriving at the point of the Mayday signal, the Sartori's captain, P. Mueller, reported, "I believe all hands are lost. No lifeboats are visible."

The Coast Guard cutter Sundew sped out of its home port at Charlevoix but was unable to find any survivors until after dawn Wednesday morning. A Coast Guard plane from Traverse City finally spotted 8 bodies on a raft, but was unable to tell whether there was any life aboard it.

Finally, a rescue helicopter from Traverse City spotted a raft with only 2 men aboard. The survivors were First Mate Elmer Fleming, 43, and deckman Frank Mays, 26. They gave a vivid account of how they had clung to a life raft for 14 nightmarish hours and tried time after time to pull their shipmates back on to the raft when hungry waves would pull them back into the icy sea. On several occasions, the raft actually did complete flip-flops, dumping their occupants into the sea. They managed to pull themselves back onto the raft, but on one of the flips, one of the four did not return. Young Gary Strzelecki, 21-year-old deck watchman, apparently lost his will to survive as he reportedly just let go and sank into the icy depths and was engulfed by angry

A, constitutionally guaranteeing legislative review of rules implemented by state agencies, failed 12,025 to 7,627. Proposal B, setting aside a trust fund for state natural resources, was approved 14,365 to 6,305. The infamous Proposal C, amending the state's constitution relating to taxes, failed, 13,583 to 7,824.

Seventy-one percent of those registered to vote in Clinton County turned out for the Nov. 6 elections.

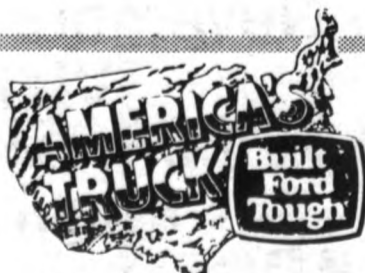

waves. One other hopeful survivor perished in like manner.

Both survivors, when picked up by the Sundew, were suffering from extreme exposure, but other than that, both survived the grueling ordeal much to the amazement of other experienced seaman.

Fifteen of the 33 crewmen were never found and were judged legally dead after a specified time.

What actually caused the destruction of the mighty carrier was never determined although complete investigations of the incident were done. Several experienced seamen seemed to be under the opinion that if the ship had been loaded at the time of the storm, the disaster probably wouldn't have happened. The fact that the giant hulk of steel was riding high out of the water indicated that much strain and stress was applied to the middle portion of the ship. It was thought by some of the experts that with the way the waves were piling up that night, that the ship apparently became perched atop two waves, one under the stern and one under the bow (front and back of the ship). This caused the ship's weakest point, the middle, to sag and bend under the weight and according to theory, just snapped in two pieces. Whether this theory is correct or not will never be known.

Thus ends the story of one of the greatest and most tragic shipwrecks in Great Lakes history. Unfortunately, the story cannot really ever be forgotten, as 52 fatherless children were left to remember that grim and terrible night in Rogers City and Cheboygan. And also left to remember the pain and suffering created by the incident are the two towns who lost loved ones as well. Whenever November rolls around, very few persons hardly ever mention much about the Bradley, but the memory is there, you can believe that... Looking out at the horizon of the Straits of Mackinac during shipping season and seeing billows of black smoke erupting forth from the stacks of the passing limestone carriers doesn't make it any easier to forget.

EPILOGUE:

According to Betty Klaus of the Presque Isle County Advance in Rogers City, the local newspaper

there, Elmer Fleming eventually went back to sailing and rose to the rank of captain from his first mate post on the Bradley. He reportedly could not take the pressure of the captain's duties and requested to be relieved of command and be reinstated to his old rank of first mate. Fleming died a few years ago, the exact date not known by sources contacted. Before his death, he had retired as first mate.

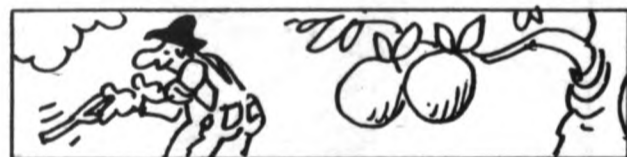
Frank Mays, the other survivor, according to reports, never quite recovered from his narrow escape with death. He immediately left the employment of the Bradley Shipping Lines and sought employment at a lumber company in a nearby town of Posen, where he stayed for about four years. According to sources, Mays now resides somewhere in Pennsylvania, totally removed from any sea-going activity whatever.

The Bradley was not the last carrier to be lost by the Bradley Lines. In 1965, another giant of the fleet, built in the same year, 1927, the Cedarville, was lost in a mid-day collision in the Straits of Mackinac, just off Mackinac Island, with an ocean-going freighter. There were about 12 lives lost in that incident. The Cedarville reportedly was not blamed for the disaster following Coast Guard inquiries.

Ironically enough, it was just nine years ago last Saturday, November 10, that the heralded Edmund Fitzgerald went to the bottom of Lake Superior in one of the fiercest Great Lakes storms ever recorded. This ship was eulogized by the ballad singer Gordon Lightfoot and is still heard periodically on the airwaves. The Fitzgerald was not a limestone carrier as was the Bradley, however, it did carry large quantities of iron ore and was a ship of the Bradley type. It measured 729 feet long and up to this time is the largest ship to ever sink in the Great Lakes. Twenty-nine perished aboard the Fitzgerald.

The Bradley Transportation Company now operates under the new name of Great Lakes Fleet and is headquartered out of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania.

It goes without further comment that indeed Sunday, November 18, will be a sad day for Rogers City residents.

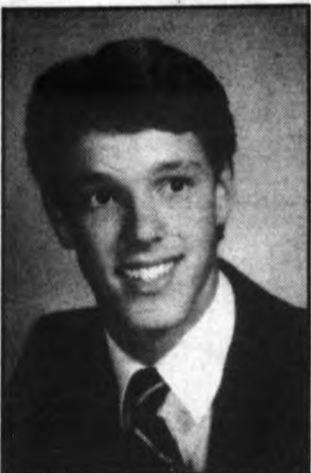
Students attend training academy

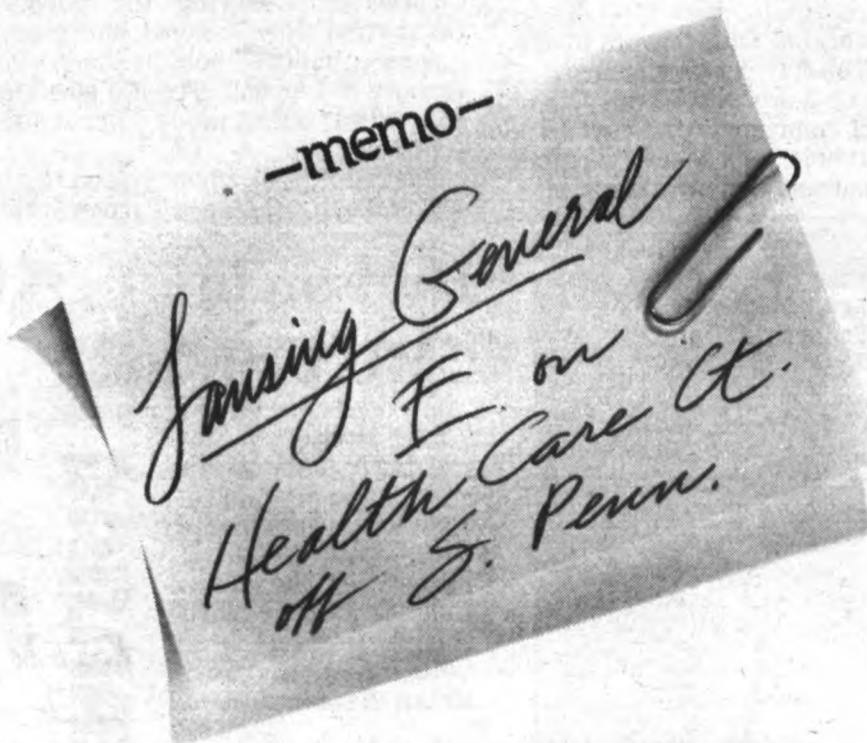

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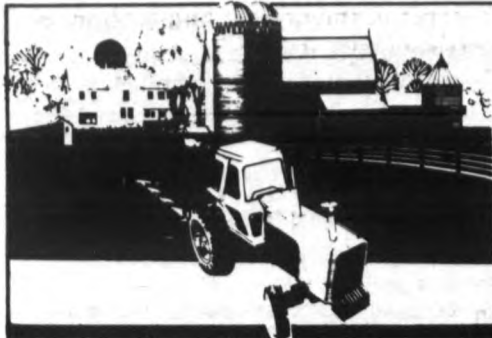

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Price index declines

The Index of Prices received by Michigan farmers for all farm products averaged 124 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending October 15. This represents a 4 percent decline from the September level, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Prices during October were 8 percent below the comparable month a year ago. The Index of Prices paid by farmers, nationwide, for commodities and services, interest, taxes, and farm wage rates for October was 164 percent of its 1977 base, down 1 percent from September. Prices for feed and fertilizer were lower. Higher prices for feeder cattle and calves and diesel fuels were partially offsetting. The index was up 2 percent from a year earlier.

In Michigan, overall farm prices were generally weaker in the crops sector and mostly steady in the

livestock sector. Dairy products and cash field crops were the only commodity groups with higher price levels than September. Individual commodities with stronger prices were dry beans, calves and milk.

However, these increases were not enough to offset the price decreases for corn, oats, soybeans, potatoes, eggs, hogs, steers and heifers. Winter wheat, hay and slaughter cow displayed no price change from the previous month.

Nationally, the October All Farm Products Index of Prices received by farmers decreased 1 percent from September to 138 percent of its 1977 average. Lower prices for cattle, hogs, corn, broilers, and eggs were partially offset by higher prices for oranges, grapefruit, milk, lettuce and strawberries. The Index was 3 percent above a year ago.

GIVING FRUITCAKES FOR A HOLIDAY GIFT

Fruitcakes are traditional Thanksgiving and Christmas treats. They are usually butter cakes with just enough batter to mold together a combination of fruits or fruits and nuts.

If you are planning to make fruitcakes for your holiday gift giving, here are some helpful tips:

--When preparing a fruitcake, slice citron, orange and lemon peel finely. Cut candied fruits into larger pieces. Currants and seedless raisins are left whole. Nuts are usually coarsely cut. Commercially packaged candied fruits are also available as a time-saving convenience.

--Fruits are easier to cut if you dip your kitchen scissors or knife in water occasionally.

--Fruitcakes can be made in a variety of sizes and shapes. You might like to bake them in a tube pan, muffin pan, loaf pan, juice or coffee can, or a fancy fluted mold. Almost any container can be used if it is properly prepared.

--Small loaf pans, fancy molds or juice cans should be well greased. Muffin pans can be greased or lined with baking cups. For large loaf cakes, line the pans with brown paper and grease with shortening.

--Bake fruitcakes in a slow oven (300 degrees) until the cake tests done in the center. Place a shallow pan of water on the floor of the oven to give it a softer crust. Use the following baking times as a guide.

--Cool the cakes thoroughly before wrapping them, then wrap carefully in heavy foil, plastic wrap or plastic bags. Store in a cool, dry place.

--Most fruitcakes need to be aged a month or longer to mellow the flavors. Decorate or frost the cakes after aging and cut with a sharp, thin-bladed knife.

EVERYTHING BUT THE SQUEAL

As producers and promoters of Ag products, it is up to you to know all you can about your product! With pork, knowing all there is to know is quite an undertaking!

Most notably, hogs provide pork chops, ham, bacon, spareribs, sausage, Canadian bacon, Boston butts, lard, picnic hams, pork loin roasts, hog jowls, pigs' feet and chitterlings (chitlins), to mention a few of the more familiar delicacies.

But pork is just one hog product. Another is replacement heart valves for humans. Still another is paint brushes made with bristles, the short stiff hair of the hog.

There was a saying once that, "They market everything of the hog but the squeal." That's still

true. However, some of the newest applications of the hog are fairly sophisticated.

Who would have guessed, for instance, that surgeons at Stanford University Hospital would develop a technique for replacing human heart valves with heart valves from hogs? Perhaps those scientists who have worked with hogs as substitutes for humans in medical tests would have guessed. Or the surgeons who have been using pig intestines for sutures.

Because the cardiovascular and respiratory systems of hogs are similar to humans, and the nutritional needs of hogs and humans are about the same, hogs have served as subjects in experiments on alcoholism at the University of Missouri and Iowa State University. Hogs are also involved in experiments on exercise and heart disease at the University of Arizona.

The hog is no stranger to the medical world for other reasons. Adrenal glands from hogs and other animals provide adrenal cortex extract used to treat Addison's disease, and provide the drug epinephrine, used to treat bronchial asthma and whooping cough.

Pigskin is not only used in the form of gloves, shoes, hats, billfolds, coats, pants, suits, vests, and topcoats, but also is an aid in the treatment of severe burns.

Hog pancreases provide insulin for the treatment of diabetes.

A list citing the hog's medical usefulness could become quite long.

But what about the hogs as food? Pigskin is a major source of quality gelatin used in desserts, ice cream mixes, and other products. Pigs' stomachs are a prime source of the enzyme pepsin used in chewing gum.

What do you know about the 4-H program? For the past three weeks and hopefully for many weeks to come, I've been writing this weekly news column. I plan to write about a variety of things that will be of interest to youth and to their parents and very often I'll write about some of the things that are happening in the Clinton County 4-H Youth Program. As I was sitting here today thinking about what to write, I began to wonder about you and how much you really know about the 4-H program.

The Clinton County 4-H Youth Program is a dynamic program and one that all of those involved in are proud and so, I'd like to tell you a little more about 4-H in this county.

Did you know that in 1983-84, there were 2,134 youngsters between the ages of 10-19 who were involved in some phase of the local 4-H program? There were 522 adult and teen volunteers who worked with these members to help them learn a wide variety of skills.

4-H is an educational, exciting and fun-filled program for young people. 4-H aims to develop the potential of youth through the involvement of parents and volunteer leaders, who provide young people with a variety of learning experiences within their own communities. Through these experiences young people grow and acquire the skills necessary for meeting the demands of today's world.

Nationally, the 4-H program is a part of the United States Department of Agriculture. In Michigan, 4-H is a part of the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service which maintains offices in eighty counties. Because of that university connection, we have a wealth of resources and materials available to people through our office.

The Cooperative Extension Service and the 4-H program is funded by federal, state, and county appropriations. The program is also supported by public and private sector grants and donations.

The 4-H program is free to all interested youth and adults. Of course, there may be some project expenses or registration fees for field trips, but there are no lesson fees or anything like that. 4-H members learn from teen or adult volunteers who are interested in youth and are willing to share what they have learned with others.

It's the relationship that develops between the youth and the volunteer leaders that make the 4-H

program so special. Both boys and girls are involved in the 4-H program and both men and women are recruited as leaders. Because of this, the Clinton County 4-H Youth Program has something for everyone and it is truly a family affair.

Since the time, more than 70 years ago, when 4-H began as a rural youth organization, 4-H programs and activities have expanded to meet the needs and interests of young people in both rural and urban areas. Last year 737 youth in Clinton County were enrolled in animal and/or poultry projects, the largest of which was horses with 184 members. Two hundred and forty-nine members were involved in mechanical sciences including

Hayes swam with four relays that finished first in Green Bay and with two that placed second. NMU won the meet for the fourth straight year.

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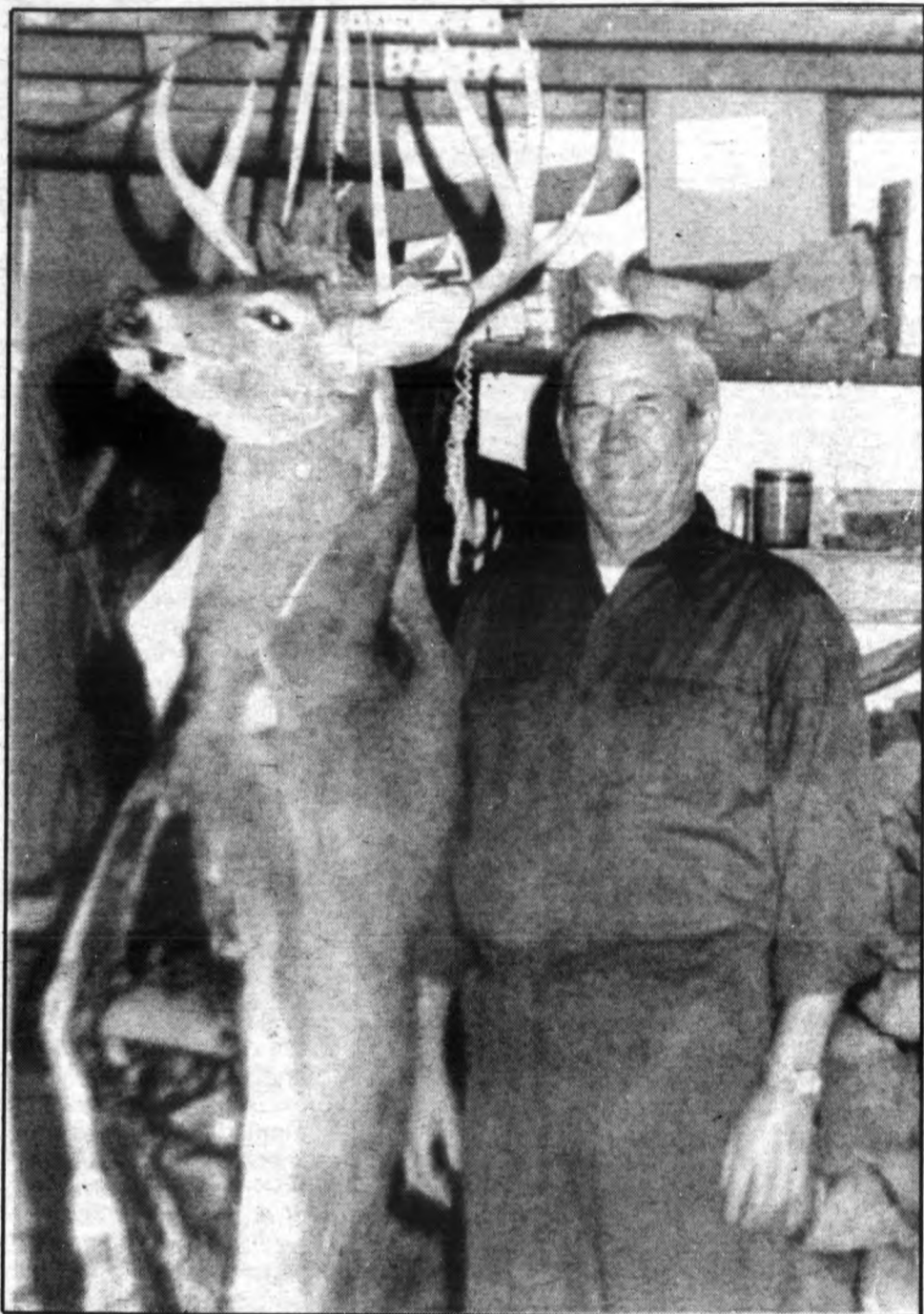

Deer for 1 in 6 says DNR expert

"It's looking good" for Michigan's firearm deer season, which starts Thursday, says Al Stewart, Michigan Department of Natural Resources habitat biologist at the Rose Lake Field Office, near Bath.

"This fall, one out of every six Michigan deerhunters should bring home venison," says Stewart, quoting state-wide figures.

In Clinton county, according to all the signs, the herd population is up from last year, Stewart says. The DNR estimate comes from sightings and projections on this spring's birth rate. The number of car-deer accidents in the county is an additional indicator. DNR figures show 56 car-deer accidents in the county from Jan.-April this year, up slightly from 54 during the same period last year.

The north half of Clinton County, near Maple River, has the highest deer concentration, because of the river area and agricultural lands, says Stewart. The southern part of Clinton County has a "moderate" deer population.

"Deer came out of the winter in excellent condition," says Stewart, citing the milder weather. More deer came out of the winter than in previous years also because of colder, wet weather during the first weeks of last year's hunting season, so the harvest was less than the DNR expected. Because of the mild winter, says Stewart, deer were able to put more energy towards antler growth, rather than maintaining body weight. "There should be a substantial number of good racks," he says. "Five-point racks should be about average."

"Southern lower Michigan is only now gaining recognition from deerhunters," says Stewart. "Since the early 70s, our deer harvest has exceeded the Upper Peninsula's harvest. This can be attributed to our fairly mild winters and widespread agricultural land, which produces large bodied, large antlered deer throughout the region."

The 1983 hunting season was the ninth best in recorded Michigan history, with 119,000 deer being harvested. That figure is double the number of deer brought in by hunters just ten years ago. The 1981 and 82 seasons were the first and second best in history, respectively.

Michigan boasts well over 1 million deer, and consistently ranks in the top three deerhunting states, along with Texas and Pennsylvania.

The Department of Natural Resources' Rose Lake Field Office, near Bath at 8562 E. Stoll Road, will be checking deer during business hours throughout the season. Hunters bringing in deer will be awarded "successful deer hunter" patches, and their deer will be weighed, aged, and checked for growth and development for the Department's records.

Clinton County deputies handled a total of 127 complaints during the week ending Nov. 4. These included 32 property damage accidents, mainly car-deer, 5 complaints of

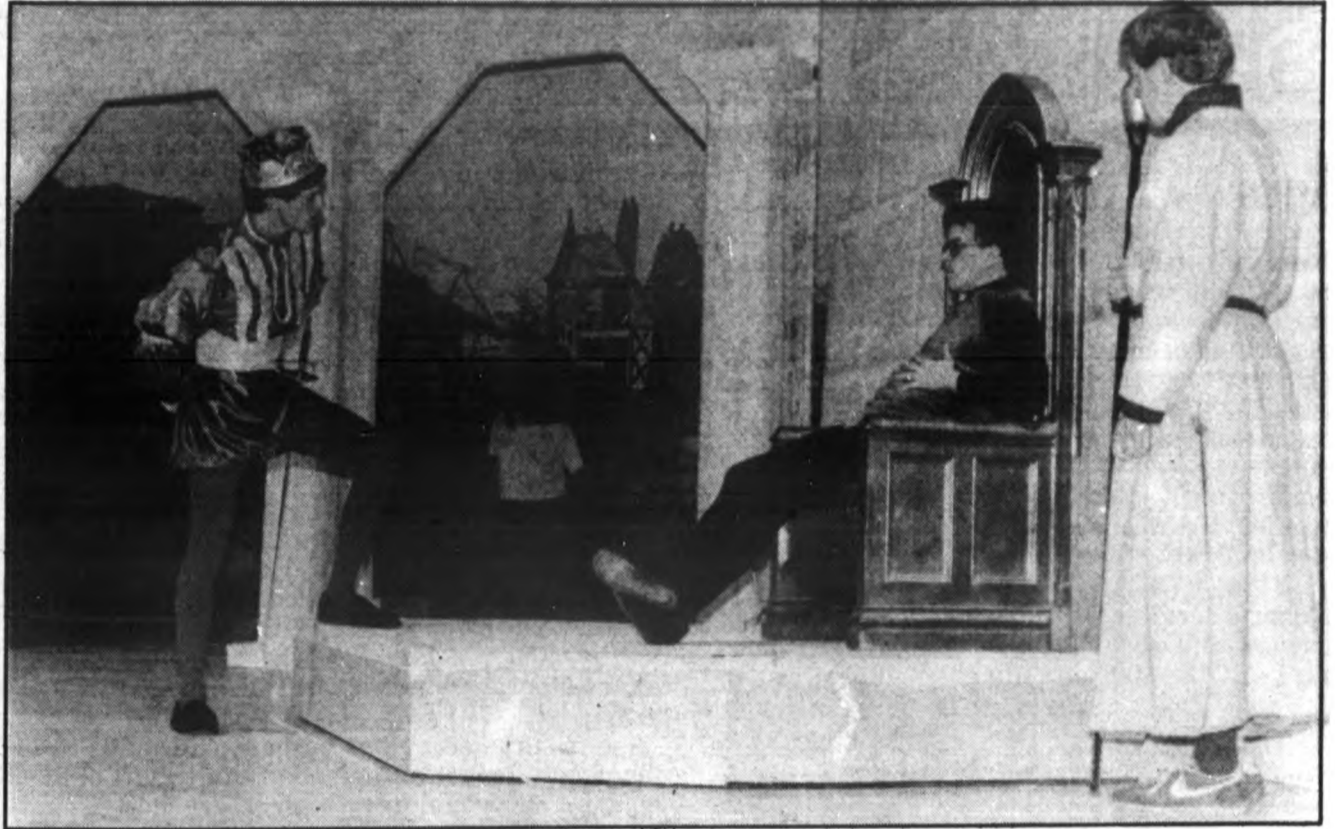
shiners/poachers, 12 assists to other departments, breaking and enterings, 5 personal injury accidents, and 3 assault and batteries.

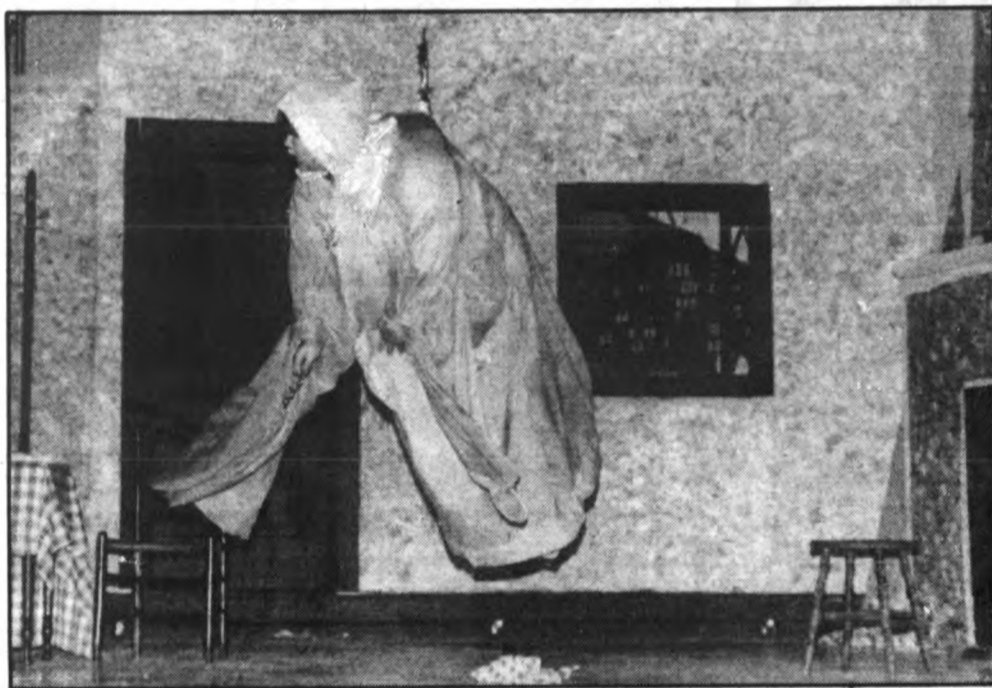
