## Parade Nov. 30

# City begins holiday festivities

Downtown St. Johns will be host to a Christmas parade with Santa Claus arriving in a parade down Main Street and being greeted by a city official at 6:30 p.m. next Friday, Nov. 30. Santa will also turn on the city's Christmas decorations and visit with children at the Senior Citizen Drop-In Center after the parade.

Christmas lights in St. Johns will be going up the same day, and they will be on from 4 p.m. to the close of business hours every night until Jan. 2 with the lights going on all day Christmas Eve, Dec. 24.

Downtown parking will be free from Thanksgiving until Christmas.

All of this holiday cheer comes to St. Johns courtesy of the Chamber of Commerce, which requested it all, and from the City Council, which granted the Chamber of Commerce' requests in its November 13 meeting.

"I'm glad that we're waiting until after Thanksgiving to begin our Christmas season," said City Manager Randy Humphrey. "This makes it seem more traditional."

"We chose not to rush the season," said Joann Martis, executive director of the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce. "Some people go right from Halloween to Christmas. Speaking personally, I think Thanksgiving needs to be celebrated before we begin our Christmas season," said Martis.

In other City Council business Nov. 13, the council followed the recommendations of the City Planning Commission and voted to change Gibbs Street, from Swegles to Morton, to a major street. It was previously classified as a local street. Swegles Street will maintain its local street status and not be made into a major street.

Locally, the only difference in Gibbs Street will be that parking will now be allowed on only one side of the street. The city, however, could get an additional \$4,600 a year under the State's Act 51, according to City Clerk Richard Coletta. Act 51 shares revenue from the state gasoline tax with local governments to pay for road upkeep.

"We try every year to see if the traffic count would warrant the change from local to major," said City Manager Humphrey. Traffic count and routing are the two major factors determining road classification.

In other action, the council elected to accept the low bid of \$26,411.75 from Keelean Buick-GMC for a new GMC dump truck for St. Johns' Department of Public Works. An order has been put in and the city should receive the truck in 90-100 days.

The City's present dump truck, a 1973 Ford, will be sold at state auction.

More than 140 crafters will be showing their Christmas items at Southpoint Mall.

Opening their homes for the tour are: Tom and Mary Rossett, 305 E. Walker St., 1901 Queen Victorian; John and Kathy Bond, 101 N. Ottawa, 1863 modified Greek Revival; Ken and Nadine Catlin, 201 E. Gibbs St., 1853 Victorian farmhouse; Mike and Maggie Watson, 504 E. Walker St., 1920 Colonial Revival; and Rev. Alfred and Fran Nelson, 104 N. Sturgis St., 1920 Colonial.

Public lunches will be served at the St. Johns Senior Citizens Center and the Masonic Temple. Coffee and refreshments will be served all day at the Masonic Temple.

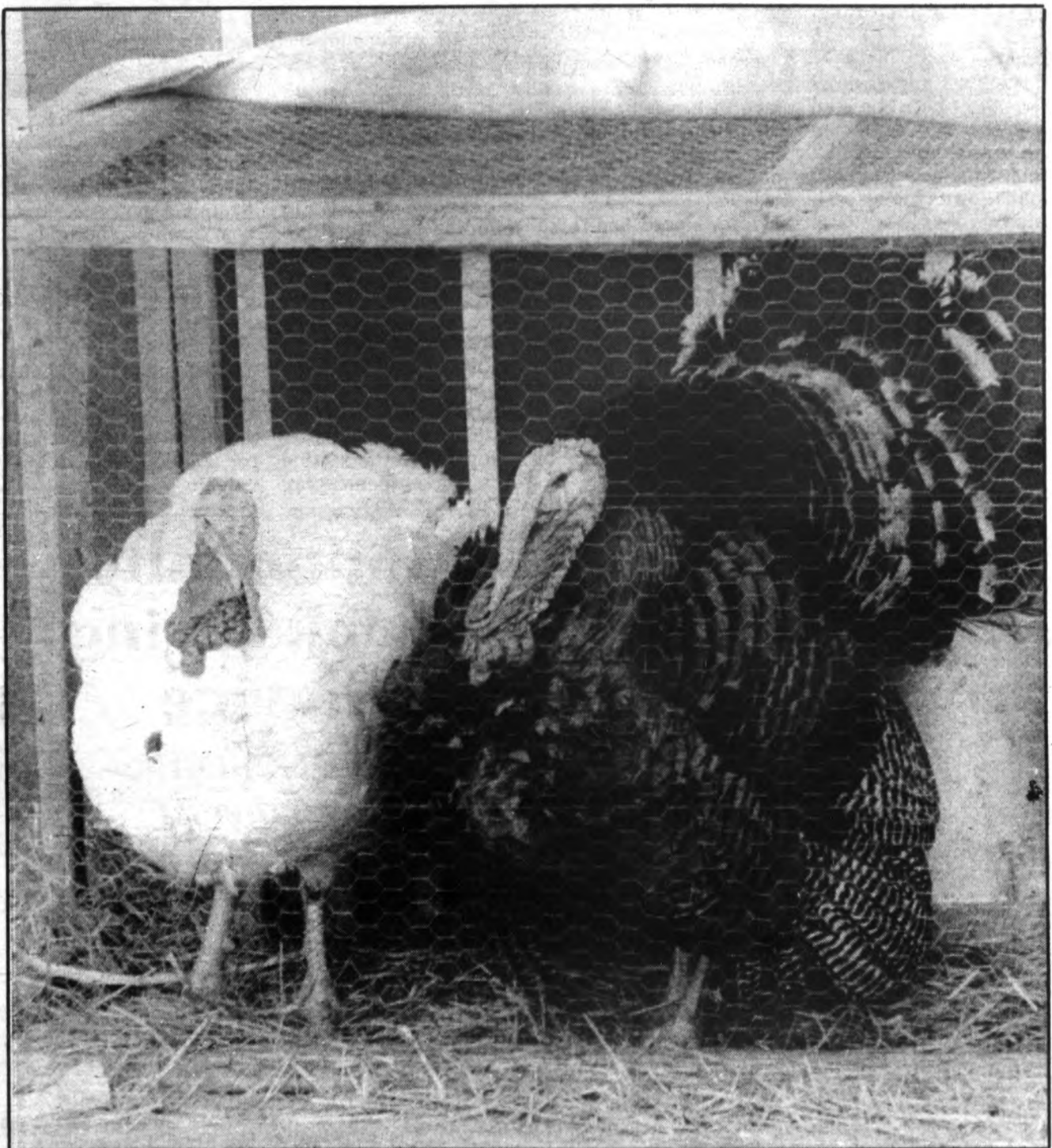
## Arts chairperson speaks to club

White, "we're starting small but we're rejuvenating."

One of the ways White is using to revitalize the council is holding meetings all over Clinton County. "My idea is to make the Clinton County Arts Council the Clinton County Arts Council," said White. Formerly, the council's meetings were held exclusively in St. Johns.

The rejuvenated council is promoting artists in Clinton County. "We don't have to go to New York, Chicago, Detroit, or even East Lansing to bring in some very talented artists," said White. "We have them right here in Clinton County."

The first big project for the rejuvenated council, according to White, is going to be held during the St. Johns Mint Festival, this coming August. The council plans to have a juried art show of Clinton County artists, a performing arts tent, and a children's activity tent at the festival.

# Remodeler's Council provides service

On Nov. 10, the Remodelers Council, which is part of the Greater Lansing Home Builders Association will be undertaking its fifth annual community project.

This year's project is the construction of a fire exit and escape and repair or replacement of wall surfaces and rooms to bring the home in compliance with fire codes at a home in East Lansing which is operated by the Community Mental Health Board of Clinton, Eaton and Ingham Counties.

This home is one of 41 highly successful foster care homes in the Tri-County area. The home will house 6 developmentally disabled adults 18 or older who will be given individualized, in-home treatment by staff under the supervision of Community Services for

the Developmentally Disabled. Training will focus on daily living skills such as meal planning and housekeeping as well as leisure activities and socialization. The program is designed to meet the specific needs of each client in the least restrictive setting available to them.

The purpose of this project is to make the public aware that there is a Remodelers Council, and that its members are genuinely concerned about the communities they serve. Community projects have been a regular activity of the Council since it formed in June, 1980.

Past projects include building playground equipment at the Wexford Elementary School; insulating and repairing windows at the Glass House, which is a halfway house sponsored by the National Council on Alcoholism; constructing a ramp for the handicapped at the Turner-Dodge House in

Lansing; and replacing windows and making repairs to a home for autistic children run by Community Mental Health.

The Remodelers Council began in June, 1980 and its members include builders, subcontractors, various supply companies, and financial institutions.

The council was formed with two purposes in mind--one, to make the public aware that there is a place people can call to find a licensed and credible remodeler, and two, to strengthen the local Builders Association by increasing membership through the remodeling segment of the industry.

# Students warned of shoplifting dangers

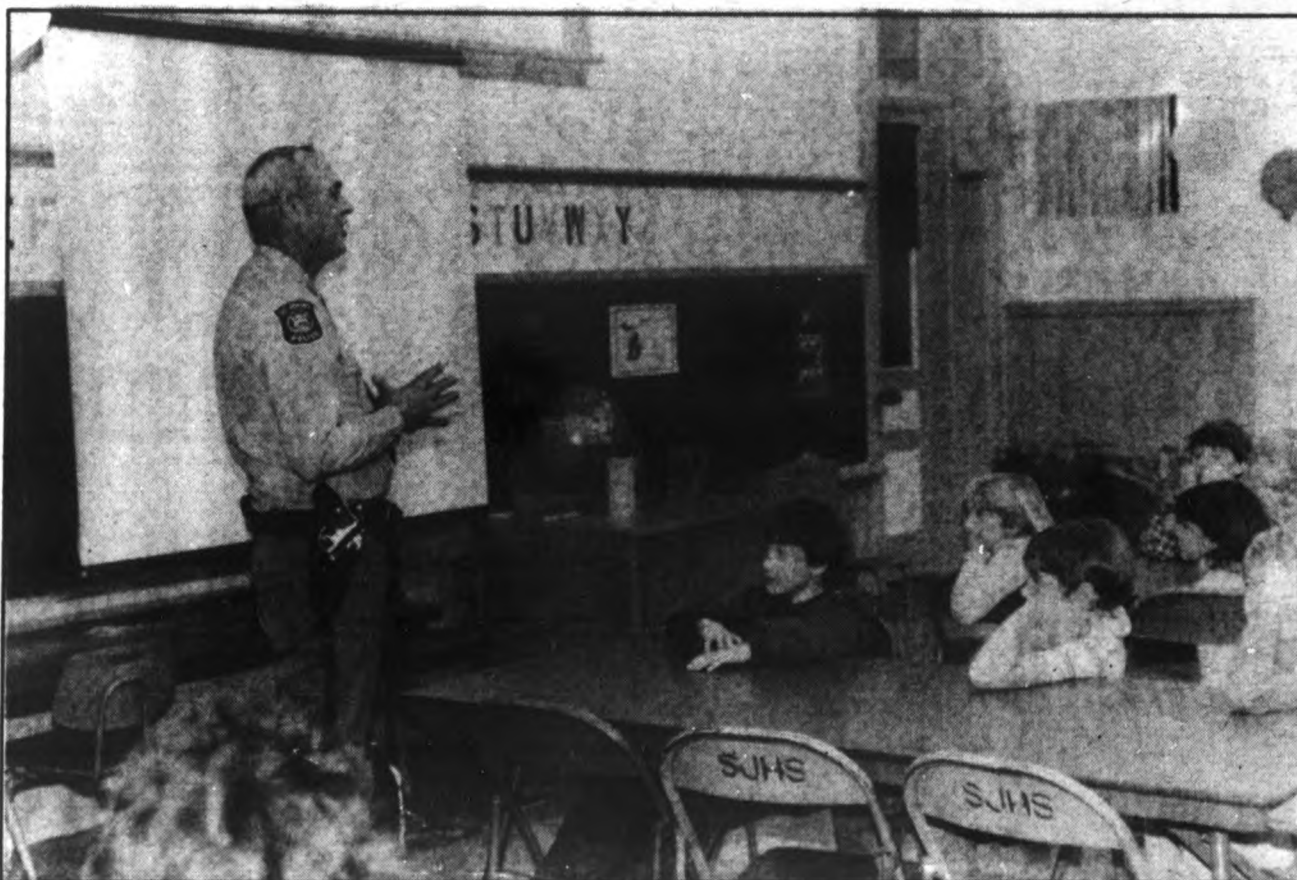
Rehmann's portion of the program focused on the harm done to businesses by shoplifters, and the methods a business uses to prevent shoplifting.

## Agriculture News

Farmers need to sharpen their business management skills. Farm managers are currently faced with continued high costs and with lower yields and low prices. Typically, farmers can allow for and adjust operations to carry over one, two and maybe three years of unfavorable net income. Better than average farm operators that keep records on the MSU Telfarm system, however, report substantial negative labor income for the past three years. With the rather dismal outlook for this years net profit to farms, managers likely will need to cope with a fourth bad year in a row.

Average labor income for more than 425 farms in Michigan during 1981, 1982 and 1983 was about minus 15,000 dollars each year. Although cattle feeders and swine producers each had one good year in the past three, all types of farms, common to Clinton County came out about the same. Typically in a low income year, farmers cut new purchases of equipment etc., then they reduce operating expenses. After one or two years of this ag related businesses along with the farmers, suffer from the reduced business level.

Unfortunately, many farm operators are carrying a high debt load in relation to their equity or to their income or both. When this happens, interest payments alone often become a major expense and on top of regular expenses put the entire farm business in jeopardy. These farmers are faced with some hard decisions, among some rather unattractive alternatives, most necessitating considerable change in that farm operation. New purchases will be delayed another year, operating expenses will be trimmed even more if possible. Maybe some land or livestock will be sold to reduce payments, save interest and increase equity.

Some farmers will look to off farm income to help support the farm business and yes, some may leave farming. Those survivors in the farm business will likely be those with a very low debt and those managers with superior management skills put to use looking at the record books. Decisions that farm managers make for the 1985 crop year may be ones they must make rather than ones they would like to make.

### Keeping Healthy

#### Cutting Down on Tooth Decay

Dental decay rates among school-age children in the U.S. has declined dramatically in recent decades chiefly due to the fluorides in water, foods and toothpaste, according to a report in the American Family Physician.

A study conducted by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and designed to determine the effectiveness of school-based programs employed a number of techni-

ques including application of sealants to decay-prone tooth surfaces, regular use of mouthrinse and tablets, and classroom dental hygiene education.

Fluoridation of community water supplies continues to be the most effective method to prevent tooth decay in children, according to the study. When that is not possible, fluoridation of school water supplies is suggested as "a reasonable alternative."

## Family Focus

### YOU CAN PREVENT A CHIMNEY FIRE

A wood fire is something that can be enjoyed on a cold winter night. But, unless you operate your wood-burning appliance properly, a chimney fire may be the result.

When wood burns, a black tar-like substance called creosote is deposited along the chimney walls. Deposits of creosote can cause a chimney fire if ignited.

According to Underwriters Laboratories (UL), these steps can be taken to reduce the risk of a chimney fire:

--Choose a wood-burning stove or fireplace that has been investigated by a recognized testing organization like UL. This means the unit has met product safety standards set by UL in conformance with the applicable National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Installation Standard.

--Match the amount of space you want to heat with the proper stove or fireplace sized to heat that space efficiently.

--Check local fire and building codes, read the manufacturers' instructions carefully and have a local building department official inspect your home before installing a wood-burning appliance.

--Inspect your chimney for creosote build-up. The NFPA suggests that you allow no more than 1/4 of an inch of creosote to build up before cleaning. Using your fireplace two to three times a week during the winter may accumulate that 1/4 inch every two years. Fireplace stoves and room heaters used regularly can accumulate creosote in a short period of time.

--BE SMART. Have your chimney cleaned and inspected periodically by a professional chimney sweep to help prevent a fire.

--Keep all combustible materials at least three feet from the fire. Be sure to open the damper of your stove or fireplace before lighting it.

--Burn small, hot fires to cut down on creosote build-up and increase the efficiency of your heating.

--Only burn wood or other recommended solid fuels.

--Extinguish the fire before going to bed.

--Deposit all ashes in a metal container with a lid to reduce the risk of igniting smoldering coals.

--Do not start the fire by using flammable liquids.

--Be sure not to add insulation in the air spaces around a fireplace or chimney. These air spaces are needed for proper air flow.

--Have smoke alarms installed and keep a multi-purpose (ABC) fire extinguisher nearby.

--If a chimney fire does occur, in all cases call the fire department immediately! Get others out of the house! If it is a small fire, you can try to put it out yourself, but it is best to leave this to the firemen.

--If you do try to put it out on your own, directing the fire extinguisher discharge up the chimney and then closing the damper can be effective.

--After a chimney fire, be sure to have the chimney or stove inspected for damage before using it again.

--It's the season to enjoy your wood-burning appliance, but it's up to you to use and maintain your heating equipment safely, including the chimney.





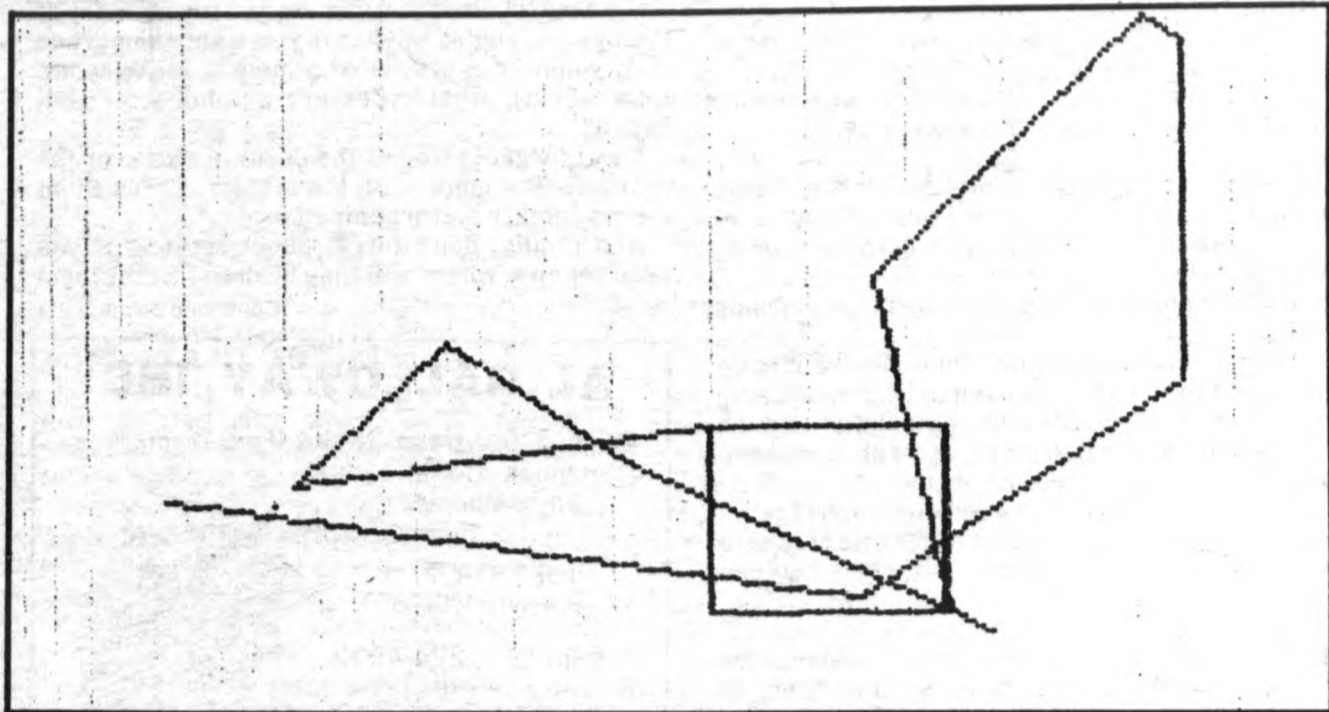

### THINKING OF A HOME COMPUTER FOR CHRISTMAS?

With all the ads for home computers, many families will be considering a computer as a family Christmas present this year. The first time you go shopping, don't be surprised if you're slightly confused by the many brands and the computer jargon you hear.

How can you make a wise decision? Here are a few tips to make shopping easier.

No matter what the manufacturers who produce hardware say in their ads, the most important part of the home computer purchase is the software--the programs that are available. Unless you plan to do all your own programming, you will be buying software that turns your home computer into a machine that does what you want it to do. That brings up the first consideration--what are the major uses that you want for your home computer? The possibilities include:

1. Word processing--ability to type, edit and format a wide variety of documents such as letters, school reports and club minutes.
2. Data management--any application that would replace paper usually kept in a file drawer with an electronic file.

3. Family education--programs for all ages, from pre-school children's learning colors and shapes to adults' learning a foreign language.
4. Home management--financial management, energy management or food management.
5. Games!
6. Telecommunications--ability to link a home computer to another computer in a distant location to do work at home, get into a data base, or do banking or shopping at home.
7. Artistic applications, such as art, graphics or music.

Once you have determined what you want to do and found the software that you need, it's easier to select the hardware (the actual machine) and the devices that go with it to make a complete system. Some of your considerations include:

- Type of storage--disks, cassette or cartridge.
- Type of screen--color, black and white or green--and the number of lines and characters you can see on the screen at one time.
- The arrangement of the keyboard.
- The number of input/output ports to add on such extras as printers, light pens, graphic pads or game paddles.

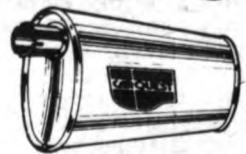

## Harvest progress slow to normal

October started with near perfect weather which allowed farmers to make good headway in this year's harvest. As the month progressed, heavy fog and periodic rainfall slowed harvest operations. Overall, Michigan harvest progress was normal for corn but lagged behind normal for soybeans and sugarbeets, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

With corn picking over half finished, the Michigan crop is forecast at 221 million bushels, 33 percent above last year's crop. Yield per acre dropped 5 bushels from the October 1 report to 85 bushels per acre. Dry conditions earlier in the growing season caused problems in ear development and growers are finding that yields do not measure up to pre-harvest expectations. Soybean production is estimated at nearly 32 million bushels, 6 percent less than last fall. Soybean yields are expected to remain the same as last month's forecast of 28 bushels per acre. Dry bean harvest moved into the wind-up stages in mid-October. Production for all classes is pegged at 4.3 million hundredweight (cwt.), 6 percent below last year. Yields are expected to average 1,100 pounds per acre, 50 pounds below last month's forecast. Overall quality is good. Anticipated sugarbeet tonnage at 2 million tons is up 3 percent from last season. Yields are expected to average 19 tons per acre.

Nationally, corn for grain production is forecast at 7.53 billion bushels, up fractionally from October 1 and up 81 percent from last year's drought-stricken crop. A crop of this size is 9 percent below the record high crop of 1982. Soybean production is forecast at 1.90 billion bushels, 4 percent less than October 1, 13 percent below 1982 but 16 percent above last year.

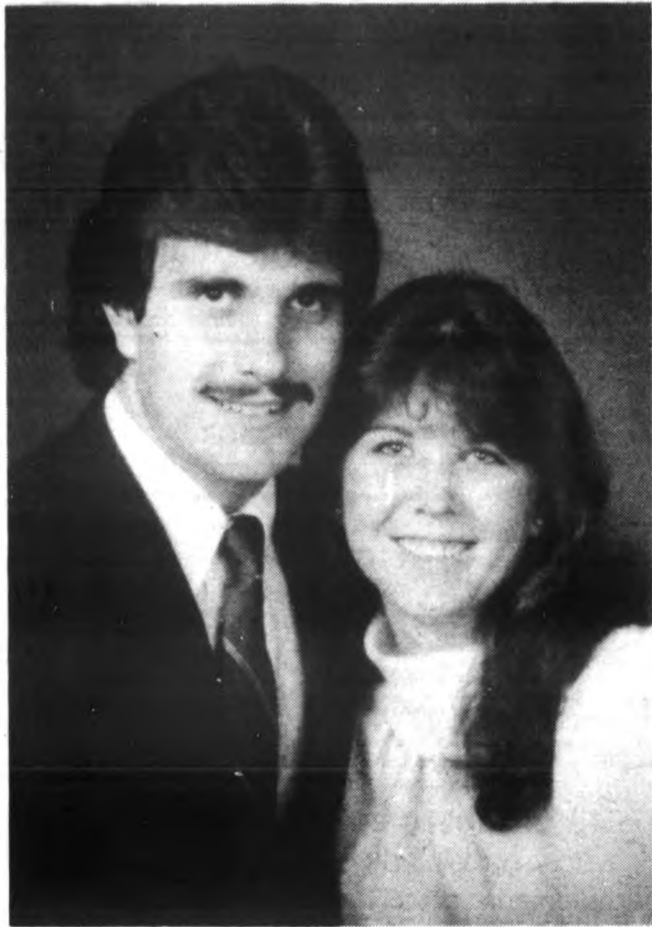

## Traveliers hear Danish student

The Travelier's Club met recently at the home of Ruth Marshall. There were 11 members present and two guests. Dessert was served by the hostess and her committee, Ethel Durkee and Edna Stedman.

The Club Collect was repeated and the roll call answered by members responding with some memory of Armistice Day. The hostess then introduced the guests and an exchange student from Denmark, Britt Andersen from Aalborg. She is attending Ovid-Elsie High School while living with Sally and Russell Kioski of rural Ovid.

Andersen gave a very interesting talk about herself, her family, home, and country. She has one sister, but no brothers.

The text of her speech was as follows:

Denmark is a small country, but has a population of about 5 million people. The country is more like an island surrounded by water except for about 42 miles, which is bordered by Germany. It is quite level, no mountains. The highest peak is 568 feet. They have many very good and popular beaches with many German people visiting them. Wheat and corn are their main crops and the main exports are foods, beer, machinery and textiles. Much dairying is done even though Denmark is

a small country. There are very good highways, but traveling is done mostly by railways and buses. There are 13 different political parties and one has to be 18 years of age to be eligible to vote. You must also be 18 before you can have a drivers license.

The education process is nine years between the ages of 7 and 16. After 16 years of age, a person can go on to further their education by attending universities or colleges. Some students go from 15 to 20 years.

They learn many languages, mostly English and Swedish. Some holidays are not celebrated in Denmark as in the United States. Christmas is celebrated on the 24th of December, but just with

the immediate family. On the 25th and 26th, it is observed with other families and friends. Thanksgiving, Easter, and New Years are not observed as they are in the U.S. The discipline in the schools is very different, much stricter. Crime is not prevalent.

Foods are mostly Danish and there are no artificial ingredients or preservatives used. They believe in using only true foods. The weather is similar to ours, but summers are cooler and winters warmer. The religion is 90 percent Lutheran with a small amount of other denominations.

Old age pension is provided the older people and medical expenses are free, being included in the tax program.

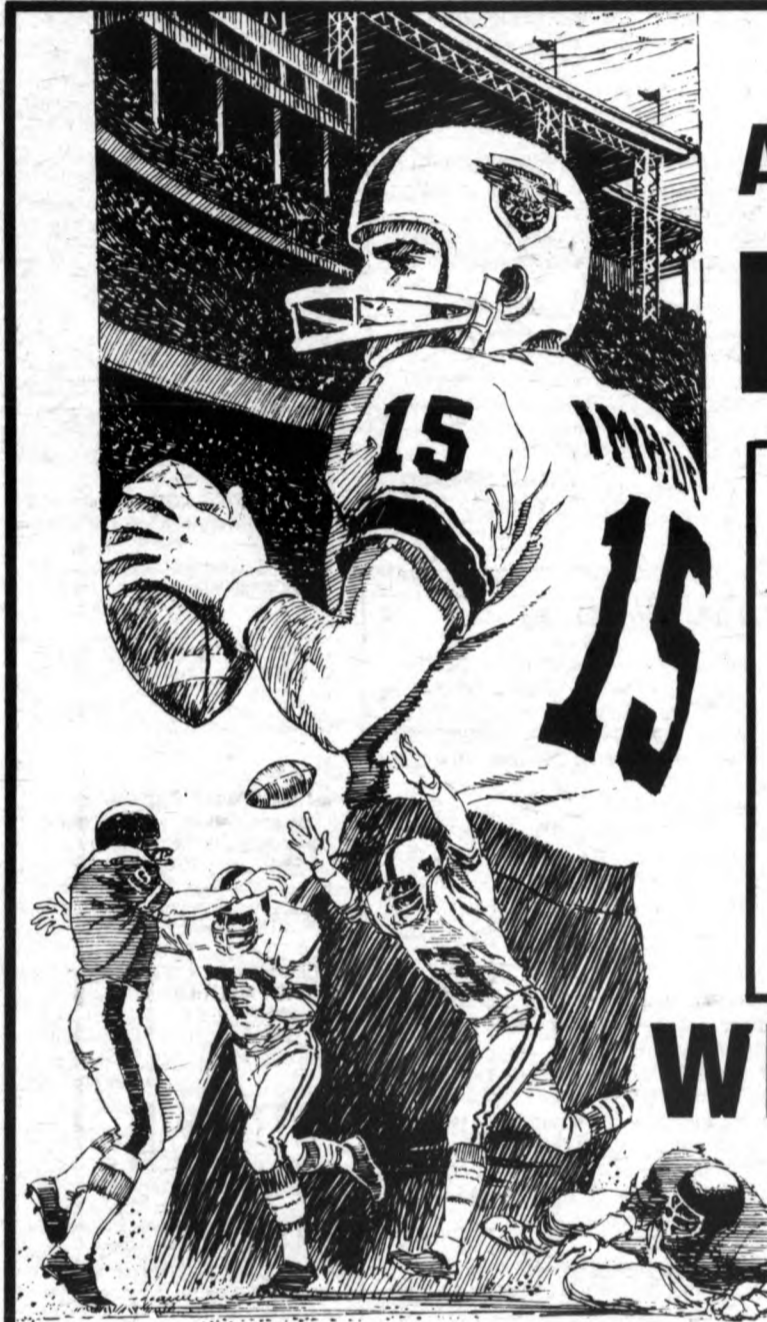
Besides one prognosticator who missed only one

**ORDINANCE NO. 26**

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR "SATELLITE TELEVISION ANTENNAS", "DISH ANTENNAS", OR "GROUND STATION SYSTEMS" AND TO PROVIDE REGULATIONS WITH RESPECT TO THEIR CONSTRUCTION, ERECTION AND USE WITHIN THE VILLAGE LIMITS OF THE VILLAGE OF FOWLER.

THE VILLAGE OF FOWLER ORDAINS:

Section 1. "SATELLITE TELEVISION DISH ANTENNAS". No satellite television antenna, dish antenna, or ground station antenna apparatus shall be erected, constructed, maintained, or operated within the Village Limits of the Village of Fowler, except in conformance with the following regulations:

(1) Definitions.

(a) A "satellite television antenna" is an apparatus capable of receiving communications from a transmitter, or a transmitter relay, located in planetary orbit.

(b) Satellite television antennas also are commonly defined as, and it is the intent of the within ordinance to provide for those apparatus commonly known as satellite earth stations, satellite dish antennas, earth stations, satellite ground stations, and dish antenna, all of which apparatus are used to receive communications from a satellite transmitter or transmitter relay station.

(2) Satellite Antenna Location.

(a) The installation of a satellite earth station in any designated zoning district within the Village of Fowler shall be in compliance with a set back requirement of twenty-five (25) feet of the front property line and at least ten (10) feet of each interior side property line, regardless of what other set back provisions are provided in that district.

(b) In the event that a usable satellite signal cannot be obtained by locating the satellite earth station on the rear side, or front yard of the property, such antenna may be placed on the roof of the dwelling structure or on the roof of the commercial structure provided a building permit is obtained prior to such installation and the construction and erection thereof is otherwise in compliance with Village building and electrical codes.

(3) Antenna Size.

(a) A satellite earth station, located in a non-commercial zone, shall not exceed twenty (20) feet in height, including any platform or structure upon which the antenna is mounted or attached, and such antenna shall not exceed fifteen (15) feet in diameter.

(b) Not more than one satellite earth station shall be allowed in any non-commercial zone on any parcel of land less than one-half acre in size.

(c) All satellite earth stations, and the construction and installation thereof, shall conform to applicable building codes, electrical codes, regulations and requirements of the Village of Fowler, as well as the provisions set forth herein.

(d) Except in a commercial or industrial district, any satellite earth station constructed in a residential or multi-family residential zone shall be located and designed to reduce visual impact from the surrounding properties at street level, and to reduce the visual impact from public streets and right-of-ways, and shall be properly screened by other structures, painting or decorating and/or plantings and greenery to blend so much as is practicable with the surrounding lands.

(e) Every satellite earth station must be adequately grounded for protection against a direct strike of lightning.

Section 2. The Village of Fowler has predicated this ordinance upon its need to protect and preserve the public health, morals, and welfare of the Village residents.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

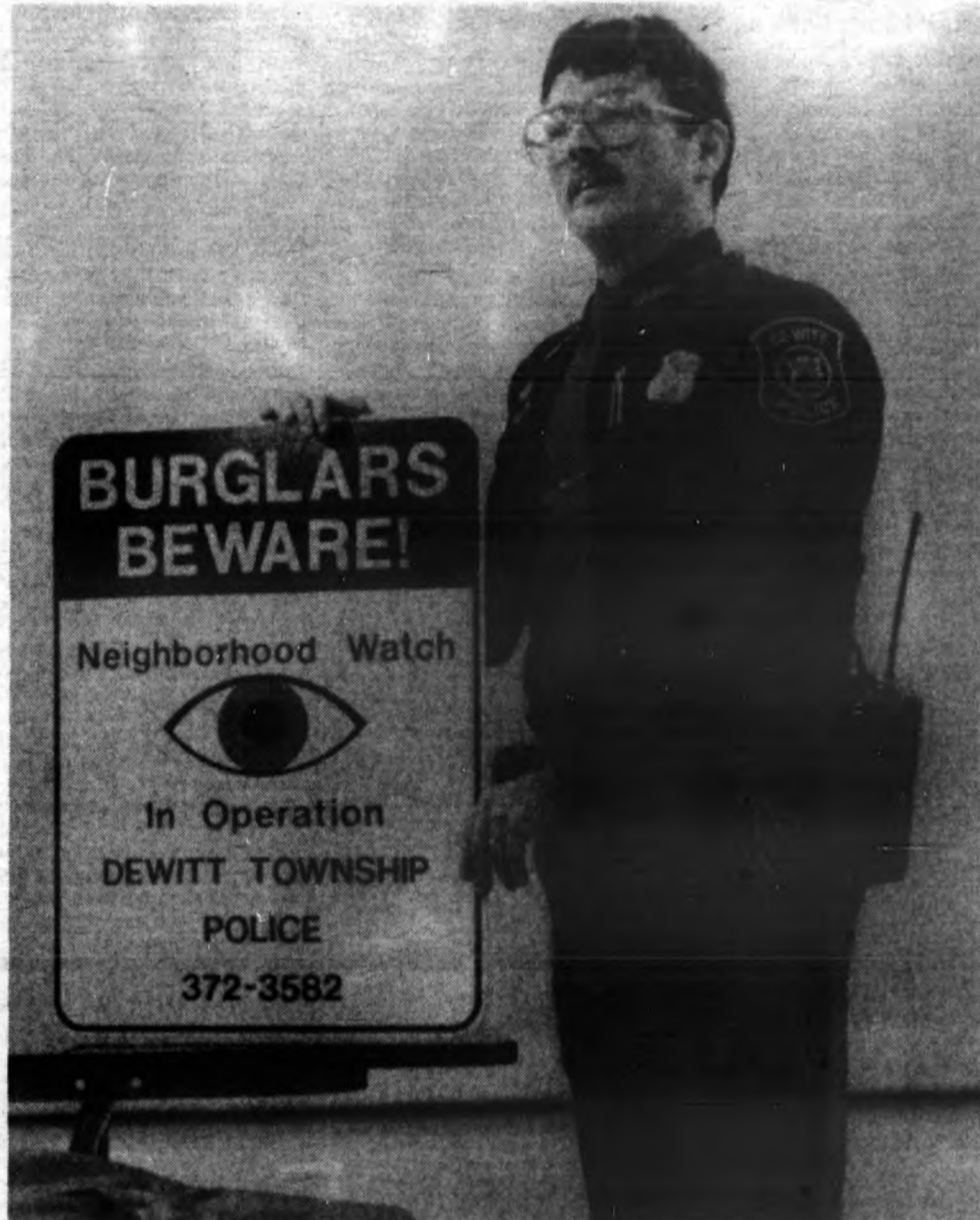

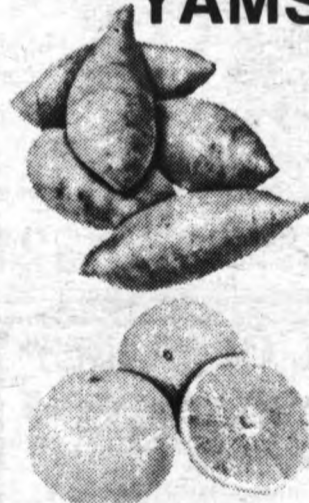
