

Watertown Twp. faces recount

Watertown Township Supervisor candidate Janice Case, Clerk candidate Phyllis Rathbun, and Treasurer Liz Houghtaling, all Democrats, filed petitions for full investigation of the Nov. 6 election in Watertown Township at the Clinton County Courthouse last Tuesday.

"These were the only races in the township, period," said Case, who lost by 80 votes, the same number of votes that the other two candidates lost by. Case says that 160 votes are unaccounted for. This figure was determined by Case and the other candidates from the total number of voters who voted and reports of poll watchers who were part of the trio's campaign.

"We knew something happened and was wrong," said Barbara Boughton, who worked as a poll watcher during the election and was present when the petition was filed last Tuesday. Boughton cited "procedure problems" in the past with Watertown Township elections as the reason for implementing poll watchers. According to Boughton, one of the township's biggest past pro-

cedure problems was with the voting machines.

Watertown Township Clerk Charlene Borgeson admits to problems with the past election. One hundred twenty-four votes were miscounted after the initial canvassing. Many of Case's allegations; that someone other than the chairperson of

Santa here Friday

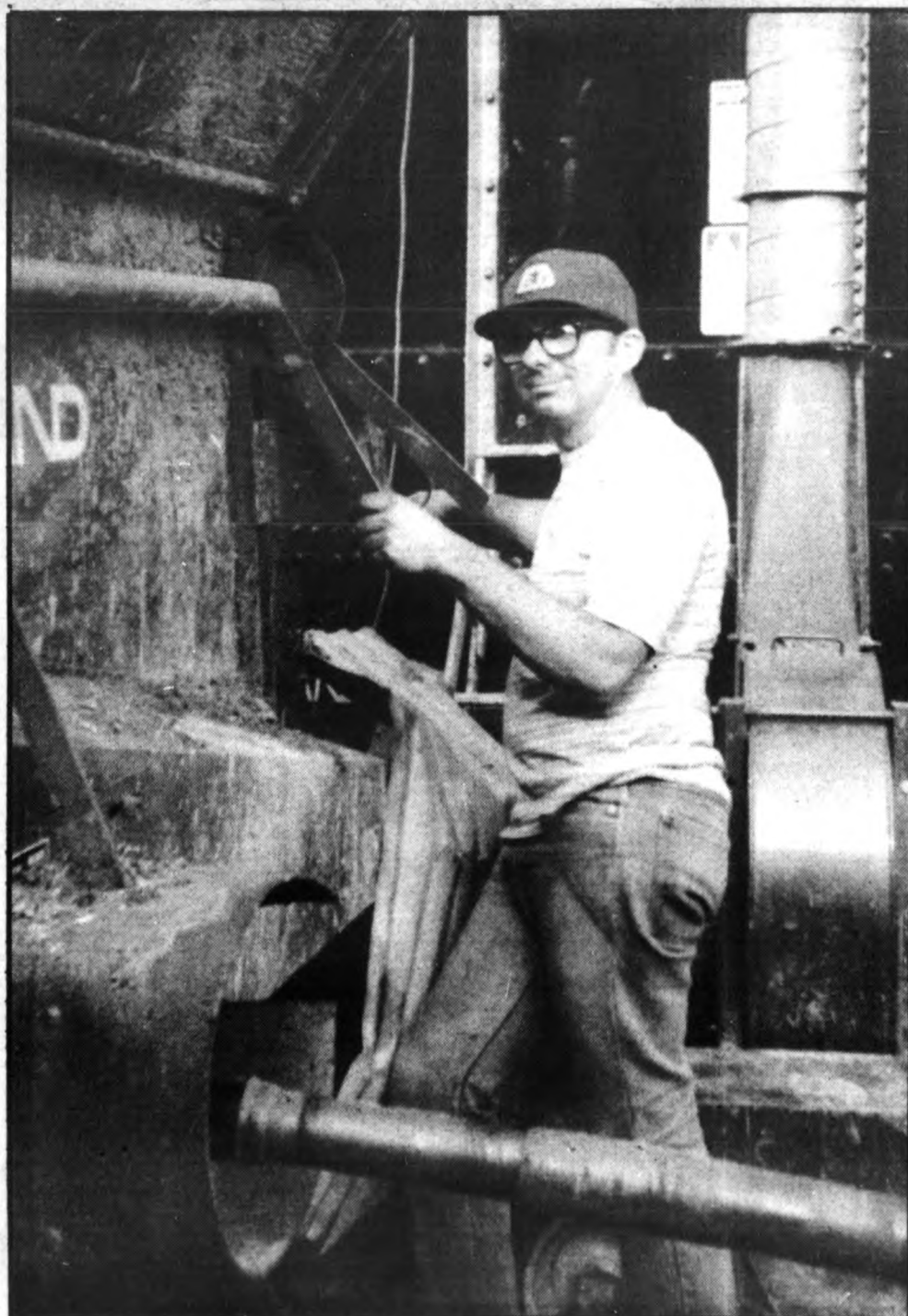

the election board called the votes received; that no one checked the person making the calls; and that after the initial canvass had been made the board members did not change places and repeat the canvass, are true, said Borgeson. "My investigations have proven that these things have not been done," said the Township Clerk. "But my investigations have shown that the corrected tally is correct," she said.

Borgeson blames the mistakes on human error. "Additional training for our election workers should take care of that," she said. "We are doing everything in our power to prevent an event of that seriousness ever happening again," she adds.

Borgeson feels that fatigue played a big part in the mistakes made. "The local races were heated and there was a lot of stress on the election workers," she said. According to Borgeson, by the end of the night, many of the workers had worked 16 hours.

"No one intentionally did anything and I do not question the integrity of my workers at all," said the Watertown Township clerk. Borgeson stands by the corrected tally of votes, and says she has no idea what the three Democratic candidates are basing their petition for a recount on.

The petition filed by Case, Rathbun, and Houghtaling does question the integrity of the elections workers, however.

The petition charges that: "the pattern of understating votes for Democratic candidates by a substantial margin suggests more than mere inadvertence on the part of the election inspectors; that said pattern suggests a clumsy attempt to tamper with the outcome of the election; and that said pattern casts suspicion over the integrity of the election for the offices of Supervisor, Clerk and Treasurer in Watertown Township."

The petition also formally states the trio's grievance as "the votes reported by the election inspectors of Watertown Township to this Board (the Board of Canvassers) for petitioner's election to the office of Supervisor were understated by at least 100 votes; and that said election inspectors also understated by at least 100 votes the returns made to this board for the Democratic candidates for Clerk and Treasurer in Watertown Township."

All three petitioners had to pay a fee of \$10 for each of the three precincts in which they want the recounts.

Elizabeth Nobis, senior member of Clinton County's bipartisan Canvasser's Board says that the next step is for the canvassers to go ahead and physically recount the votes in Watertown Township. This will involve breaking the seals on the voting machines and counting the votes recorded on the rolls inside them, and also tabulating all absentee and paper ballots.

Clinton County's last vote recount was in 1981, for a school millage proposal.

The recount did not change the results of the election.

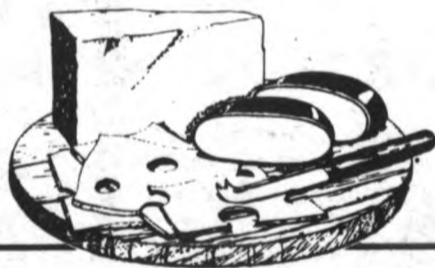

Wells has been specializing in the good home cooked food at her restaurant at Bath's Friendly Corners now for almost a full month. Darlene's opened Nov. 1. Since the restaurant opened, it has had a few "growing pains," said Wells, but most of those are over now. "We're glad to be here," she says, "and we're still excited and things are changing all the time."

Using all of its rooms, the lounge, dining room, and banquet room, Darlene's can seat about 560 people. The lounge has booth and table seating along with a bar. The dining room features table seating in a family atmosphere, with hanging plants and artistic prints on the wood-paneled walls. "I really wish people could have seen this room here," said Wells, gesturing around the remodeled dining room. "Basically it was a bar before. We made it into a dining room because there are a lot of people in this area who don't like to sit in where there's a bar," said Wells. She talks about a dart board in a wall surrounded by holes. "Occasionally they might have hit it." Before it became Darlene's, the restaurant was The Bath House.

Darlene's Banquet Room, in the basement of the restaurant, has hosted mainly wedding receptions so far. The room can seat between 350-400 people. In the future, Wells would like to hold dances featuring country and western bands in the basement. She is enthusiastic about using the room for community events. Wells talks of the possibility of holding an arts and crafts fair in the hall sometime in the future. "As long as we get the response, we're willing to do it," she says about possible uses for the room.

For smaller gatherings, Wells points out that her dining room is ideal. She would like to set up Darlene's as the meeting place for several area community service clubs. "We can pretty well take care of anybody," says Wells. "Small parties, big parties, we're really quite flexible. We just hope that the area people just continue to come and use the facilities."

Wells has owned Darlene's since mid-September. She has had no restaurant experience, but she has been a caterer for "many years." She still does catering outside her restaurant.

Last summer, Wells was ready to build her own hall for a restaurant near her home in South Lansing, when a government small business loan didn't work out, so she opened up a bridal shop,

Bride's Dreamworld of Lansing, on South Washington in Lansing. Her new bridal shop had been open two weeks when she got the offer to buy her restaurant at her daughter's wedding reception.



"My daughter was married the 19th of May, and then at her reception, Daryl Kesler, who was working with me on building a hall, sprung this on me. I could have killed him," said Wells. "He said 'do you want to buy the Bath House' I said not right then, because I just opened the bridal shop, but it kept heavy on my mind because I've always loved to cook. So I finally called him around the middle of September and it was still for sale, so here I am," she said.

Wells is a graduate of Lansing Community College's hotel/motel management program, as is her daughter, Darla Jenks. When she isn't working at Red Lobster, Jenks also works at Darlene's. Wells' son, Deo Jr., and his wife, as well as Wells' son-in-law, all work at Darlene's when they aren't working at their other jobs. Deo Jr. is also an assistant manager at the J.B. Robinson Jewelry Store at the Genessee Valley Mall and runs Wells' bridal shop. Wells' husband, Deo Sr., has worked for Oldsmobile for 21 years.

"Eventually this will all be for the kids," says Wells. She hopes to get the business running well before he husband retires, in either four or nine years, depending on contract negotiations, "then we'll turn it over to the kids and just go," said Wells.

Darlene's Restaurant is owned by a corporation set up by Wells and her husband.

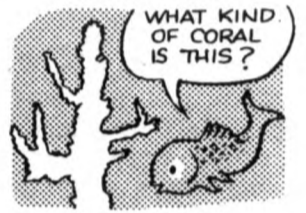
There will be sloppy joes, hot dogs, chips and drinks available at the coffee shop, along with homemade pie.

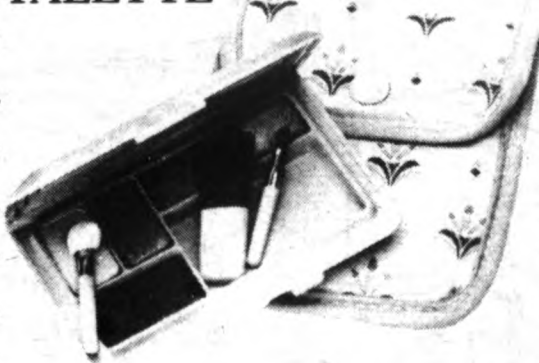

Agricultural News

Farms may have to provide first aid site

The Michigan Department of Public Health will hold a hearing December 11 on a proposal that would require all farms and orchard operations to have what essentially amounts to an operating first aid center.

Howard J. Doss, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service agricultural safety specialist, says that it is important that farmers make their opinion known on the proposal, which he believes is ill-conceived.

"Overall, I do not believe that this proposed MDPH agricultural first aid standard would have any positive effect on Michigan's agricultural work accident rate," Doss says. "The reasoning or justification for this health standard for agriculture is unclear."

If enacted into law, the proposal would require all farmers to have at least one person on the farm who is formally trained in first aid and be immediately available to respond to accidents.

All farmers would be required to maintain a first aid station on the farm site and a substantial first aid kit in every licensed motor vehicle that is used in the line of work on the farm or in an orchard.

"I can agree in principle with the proposal, in that all farmers should know how to treat accidental injuries, have supplies with which to treat injuries and know how to reach emergency help," Doss says. "But attaining this level of proficiency is going to be more effectively done through education, not an enacted law."

"The authors of this proposal are looking upon farm operations as if they were conducted in an industrial setting where work stations are confined to a relatively small area, and that simply is not the case with Michigan agricultural operations," Doss says.

He says that such a law would probably be largely unenforceable.

"The complications beyond this proposal are enormous," Doss says. "Not only is there the problem of enforcement because of the diversity of farms in Michigan, but there's also the matter of trying to determine who, in fact, is qualified to administer first aid, whether a first aid review on the farm was proper and making sure someone trained in first aid is always available on the farm."

If farmers cannot give oral opinions during the hearing, they should send written opinions to: Michigan Department of Public Health, Division of Occupational Health, Box 30035, Lansing, MI 48909.

Buying educational computer software for your child

All the ads show a happy family gathered around a home computer. Many of them also suggest that education for children is one important reason for buying that home computer. Is that an idea that appeals to you? How do you select good educational software once you've bought the hardware? (Remember that the hardware purchase is only one step in buying and using a home computer.)

In "Computers and Reading Instruction," Leo D. and Olga P. Geoffrion offer these guidelines for evaluating educational software:

--Children learn best when they're actively involved. The best educational programs require frequent interaction.

--Be sure the program is appropriate for the age of the child. While older children may want complicated graphics, they may overwhelm a young child. Does the program make good use of the computer's abilities with graphics, movement, sound and color? The computer has the capability of being much more than a static book on a screen.

--Does the program have different skill levels that let the child progress? If not, you may find the child can master it very quickly and then be bored.

--Can you add or delete information to make the program more personal? Spelling programs may allow words to be added so that it teaches what that child needs. Or perhaps it's math skills.

--Can the child direct the pace of learning? Or do the screens of information move at a predetermined pace that may be too fast or too slow for that child?

--Does the documentation that comes with the program suggest other activities that can be used as followup? Does it include illustrative examples or sample screens that help the first time through?

--Does the program handle errors well? Children

(as well as adults) may not always find a keyboard easy to use in the beginning. What happens when an incorrect response is made? Does the program help you give a correct response, or does it stop with no directions?

When purchasing software, remember to check out the hardware requirements for each package. Does it need a joystick or anything else to really make it work to full advantage? Always check its requirements against the system you own or are thinking about buying.

Where can you find out about software that is well written and currently available? Many of the computer magazines review software every issue. Look at current issues. There is even a new magazine now devoted to family computing. Ask other parents--they can be a wealth of information. With the price of software today, you want to be sure that you are making the best investment possible for your child.

Don't overlook exciting possibilities such as word-processing programs or data management programs that all members of the family can use, or the software that helps children learn to program the computers, such as LOGO or learning BASIC. Don't expect all software to be right for every child, but start getting involved--the world of educational software is growing rapidly.

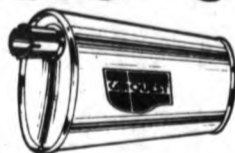

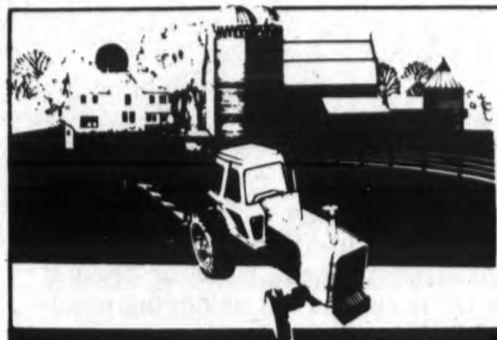

Oct. milk output down from '83

O-E ag. class uses Stauffer Seeds

This year the Ovid-Elsie High School agricultural department worked with the Stauffer Seed Company in planting their corn plots. Five different Stauffer varieties were planted on May 11 with a Stauffer representative on hand to assist. Local representative Earl Seybert and District Manager Clare Bouton were also present at harvesting time to determine final population, moisture level, and dry bushel yields.

The entire land lab experience was educational for vocational-agricultural students. Individual students earned S.O.E.P. credit working the land lab to gain production skills. Several class visits proved to be fruitful as Bouton took time to explain several things to the students. He talked to them about plant population, the importance of soil testing, how to check for insects, root rot, and nutrient deficiency symptoms. During a September field day, attended by vocational-agricultural classes and local farmers, Mr. Alaga, Vo-Ag instructor, outlined the management prac-

tices that were used on the land lab and the value of the learning experiences to the students.

Corn harvest took place on November 14. Stauffer's District Manager and local representative were very pleased about the results of the plot. In their opinion, much of the success of the plot was due to sound management practices, a timely rain, and the cooperation of the students.

The other crop grown on the land was a G.L.H. variety 1937 of soybeans. This crop gave students experience in growing legumes. The final yield proved to be above average for the year at 34.6 bushels per acre.

The Ovid-Elsie High School agricultural department and F.F.A. offered their thanks to the Stauffer Seed Company, St. Johns Co-op, Great Lakes Hybrids, Ovid-Roller Mills, Anderson Fertilizer, Agrico Chemical Co., the faculty and support personnel of the Ovid-Elsie School District, and Dick and Connie Thornburg for their help and interest in this year's program.

Milk production in Michigan during October totaled 437 million pounds, down 7 percent from a year earlier, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Milk cow numbers, at 392,000 head, were down 16,000 from a year ago. Milk output averaged 1,115 pounds, down 35 pounds from October 1983. Michigan's milk per cow average was still over 100 pounds above the U.S. average.

The value of milk sold in Michigan during October averaged \$13.80 per hundredweight (cwt.), unchanged from a year earlier. This price reflects the total value of milk at the dairy plant or receiving station before deductions are made for hauling and dairy support program charges. Slaughter cow prices averaged \$36 per cwt., the same as a year earlier. Replacement milk cows averaged \$930 per head, down \$70 from a year ago.

Nationally, milk production during October was 10.9 billion pounds, down 4 percent from the previous year. Milk production for the first 10 months of 1984 was down 3 percent from the same period in 1983. Production per cow averaged 1,010 pounds during October, down 14 pounds from a year earlier. Milk cow numbers averaged 10.8 million head, down slightly from September and 3 percent below last year.

Dairy manufacturing plants in Michigan produced over 2.3 million pounds of butter during September, down 34 percent from a year ago. American cheese output, at 1.1 million pounds, was down 38 percent and ice cream production, was down 3 percent from a year ago. Nationally, September production totals for most manufactured dairy products were below year earlier levels.

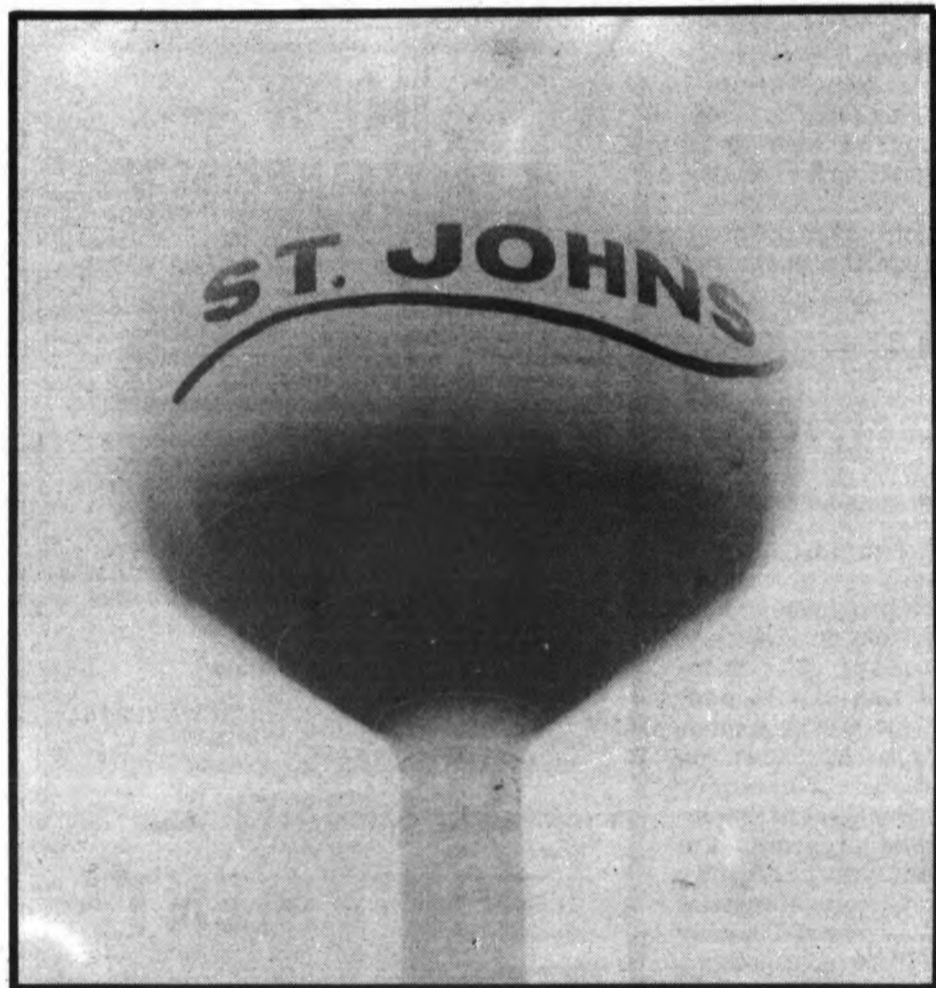

DeWitt man teacher of year

"I never thought of winning an award for just doing something I'm supposed to be doing in life," says Thomas Sawyer, DeWitt High School's teacher/consultant for students with learning disabilities, and Michigan Association of Children and Adults with Learning Disabilities (MACLD) state-wide Teacher of the Year. "I wasn't expecting the award at all," said Sawyer.

Sawyer was nominated for the honor by the mother of one of his students. Sawyer received the award in early November after being checked out by the MACLD's awards committee. He was also presented with the many letters of recommendation gathered by the MACLD at the presentation, and has just recently finished reading them all. "It was a real tearjerker," said Sawyer, "they just really affected me."

Those letters came from fellow teachers, others involved in state learning disability programs, but most specially, from the parents of students and the students themselves that he has taught in his 14 years at DeWitt High School.

Sawyer was hired to develop a program for the learning disabled at DeWitt in 1970, after having received a Bachelor's Degree from Michigan State University in 1967. He received a Master's Degree from MSU in 1974. When he was first hired, he alone was the whole program. Now the program has two teachers, two aides, and a full range of support services, including a speech therapist, psychologist, and social worker available to the students.

In addition to designing the program, Sawyer also designed the wing of the high school that his classrooms are housed in. "It was really fun," he says. While not describing himself as an architect, Sawyer says that he had an idea of how he wanted things laid out, and then worked out the design with the architect for the new wing's contractors. Sawyer's section of the high school is made up of two large classrooms divided by a windowed office/administrative area. The classrooms themselves are divided up into traditional classroom areas, study areas, and private carrels. Each classroom also has a computer, donated by the Booster Club.

"The facilities themselves are great," says Sawyer. "We have the ideal situation." So ideal, in fact, that DeWitt's program for students with learning disabilities is known throughout the state. "This has got to be one of the showcase facilities in the state of Michigan," says Sawyer.

But setting up this type of program is not the type of thing one person can do alone. Sawyer cites high school Principal Fred Goers as being particularly supportive. But for Sawyer, it has been the community as a whole that has built up the program. "We just have super support from our community," he says.

If the community supports him, though, Sawyer also supports the community. "You can't sit in a classroom and teach the kids and whine and plead because you don't have the things you need," says the teacher of the year. So he gets out there and involved; with plays, politics, and selling tickets at all the basketball and football games. Sawyer makes himself known as well as the needs of his program.

Just as the program itself is so well looked-upon, so are the students who have gone through it. In a 1980 follow up study of students he had taught in the past ten years Sawyer found that his ex-students had a 94 percent employment rate. In 1980, the employment rate for the whole country was less than that, and in Michigan it was far worse, as we were heading into our economic recession. "I think that this speaks for a high quality program that really does change people's lives," says Sawyer. The study found DeWitt High School's learning disabled students to be in all levels of the workforce, including a pharmacist

and several college and community college graduates.

Having a learning disability is totally separate from a person's intelligence, says Sawyer. "Often, students with a learning disability are as smart, or many times have an intelligence even greater than most students." The difference between a learning disabled student and other students is in how they learn, not their ability to learn. Often, a student will have one area of learning that gives them difficulty, says Sawyer. After learning about learning disabilities, Sawyer found that he himself learned math differently from other people, and that was why that subject had given him more trouble than others while he was in school. After applying the teaching methods he uses with his students to himself, Sawyer now has no problem with mathematics.

"What we teach are coping skills to work with each particular student's learning style," says Sawyer. Under Sawyer's program, students who have difficulty with reading are given their tests orally and study through talking books, students who have auditory difficulties and are not able to follow lectures are taught visually, through films, slides and charts, the key word here is Adapt.

The student with a learning disability's most common problem, says Sawyer, is an extremely poor self concept. He blames this on the over-emphasis on achievement of our education system. The students know that they are intelligent, they just aren't able to perform, and this is very frustrating, says Sawyer. "There is nothing wrong with learning differently," he emphasizes. Knowledge of the learning process is an important part of accepting this. "I wish they would teach kids about learning to learn in about 4th grade," says Sawyer.

"Early identification is the whole key to the problem," according to Sawyer. DeWitt's program seeks to identify students with learning

disabilities beginning in elementary school. "Students whose achievement is lower than it should be" are those singled out as having possible learning disabilities.

The stigma of having a learning disability, at least in DeWitt, has been greatly reduced through the program. "I think the student body is starting to accept the program," says Sawyer. "No. Not starting to, we really have arrived. It's been two years since we've had any trouble, any unkind remarks, and that's wonderful." Sawyer points out students who have actually come to him, thinking they might have a learning disability.

Students in Sawyer's program usually spend one or two periods of their seven period days in the learning disability classrooms. "Everybody is in regular programming," says Sawyer.

Sawyer has been published in the ACLD journal, Newsbriefs, on how the learning disabled need their own programs, rather than being lumped in with mentally and physically handicapped students. Currently, funding for learning disabled programs follow handicapped student guidelines. "My major role is an advocate for the kids," says Sawyer, not just of his publishing efforts but of all of his activities.

He has been married to his wife Sherry fifteen years and has one daughter, Elizabeth, 11. Sawyer was born and raised in Dimondale and lives near there now.

Deer season appears to be good overall

As far as the 1984 deer firearm season goes, "the big picture is pretty well known within the first three days of the season," said Barry Loper, Department of Natural Resources game area manager for the Maple River and Gratiot-Saginaw areas. The majority of deer are taken in the begin-

ing days of each season, Loper said, and although the first three days of this year's deer season were wet, windy, and cold, Michigan overall is expected to have a deer harvest of around 100,000 deer. "We expect to have a 'good' deer hunting season this year," said Loper. There will be a significant reduction of deer killed in the Maple

River area, due to a 10-15 percent drop in the number of hunters hunting there, said Loper. There was also a reduction in the number of antlerless permits issued for the area. In the Gratiot-Saginaw Game Area, there was a slight increase in hunters. DNR spotters counted 560 hunter-filled cars Nov. 15 this year, compared to 511 last year. Loper

estimates that each car averages 2 hunters. There were also more hunting camps in the Saginaw area than last year, up to 72 from 63. "The kill figures are up proportionately," said Loper, citing an approximate 10 percent increase in deer harvested. Thursday the 15th was described as a "heavy opening day" by Loper. Over 200 fewer cars

were counted in the game area Saturday. The decrease in hunters, however, might be traced to the increase in the wariness of the deer. "They really smarten up in a hurry," said Loper. "If they're not taken in that first day or two they'll really lay low." The deer themselves are showing better developed antlers this year than in previous seasons. "The last two

winters were really good on deer, and that shows in antler development," said Loper. He reports that most of the deer brought in to DNR offices so far have at least four, and often six or eight point racks. "We've had very few spikehorns," said Loper. The DNR game manager says that there have been no safety problems in the area he manages.

Family Focus

Whether you're ready or not, Christmas is fast approaching. Many people will soon be buying poinsettias, the traditional Christmas plant.

Proper care will keep your plant healthy throughout the Christmas season and beyond.

Start by selecting a plant that has dark green foliage. Be sure the plant is well wrapped when you take it indoors. Exposure to low temperatures, even for a short time, can cause leaves and bracts (the red, pink or white leaves) to turn brown and fall.

Place your poinsettia near a sunny window or other well lighted area. Don't let any part of the plant touch cold window panes, and keep it out of warm and cold drafts from heaters and registers and doors and windows. For maximum blooming time, place the plant where daytime temperatures are between 60 and 70 degrees and move it to a cooler room at night (55 to 60 degrees is ideal).

Check the soil daily and water only when it is dry to the touch. Always water until water runs out the bottom of the pot. Apply a house plant fer-

tilizer once a month according to the manufacturer's recommendations.

For a well shaped plant next year, cut back the original stem to 4 to 6 inches in height, removing the old flower and one or two side branches. Do this in February or early March. Keep the plant in a sunny window at temperatures between 60 and 70 degrees and water and fertilize as needed.

When the danger of spring frost is past and night temperatures exceed 50 degrees, plant your poinsettia, in its pot, outdoors. If the plant is too large for the old pot, repot into a larger container before planting outside.

Between July 15 and August 1, cut off the top

portion of all shoots. These can be rooted in a mixture of half peat moss and half sand and flowered for next Christmas.

Take your poinsettia plant inside before the first frost (usually around September 15 in lower Michigan). Place it in a sunny window, as before. To induce it to flower, keep the plant in complete darkness between 5:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. daily from the end of September until color shows in the bracts (almost mid-December). The temperatures again should remain between 60 and 70 degrees.

This procedure should bring your poinsettia into flower by Christmas.

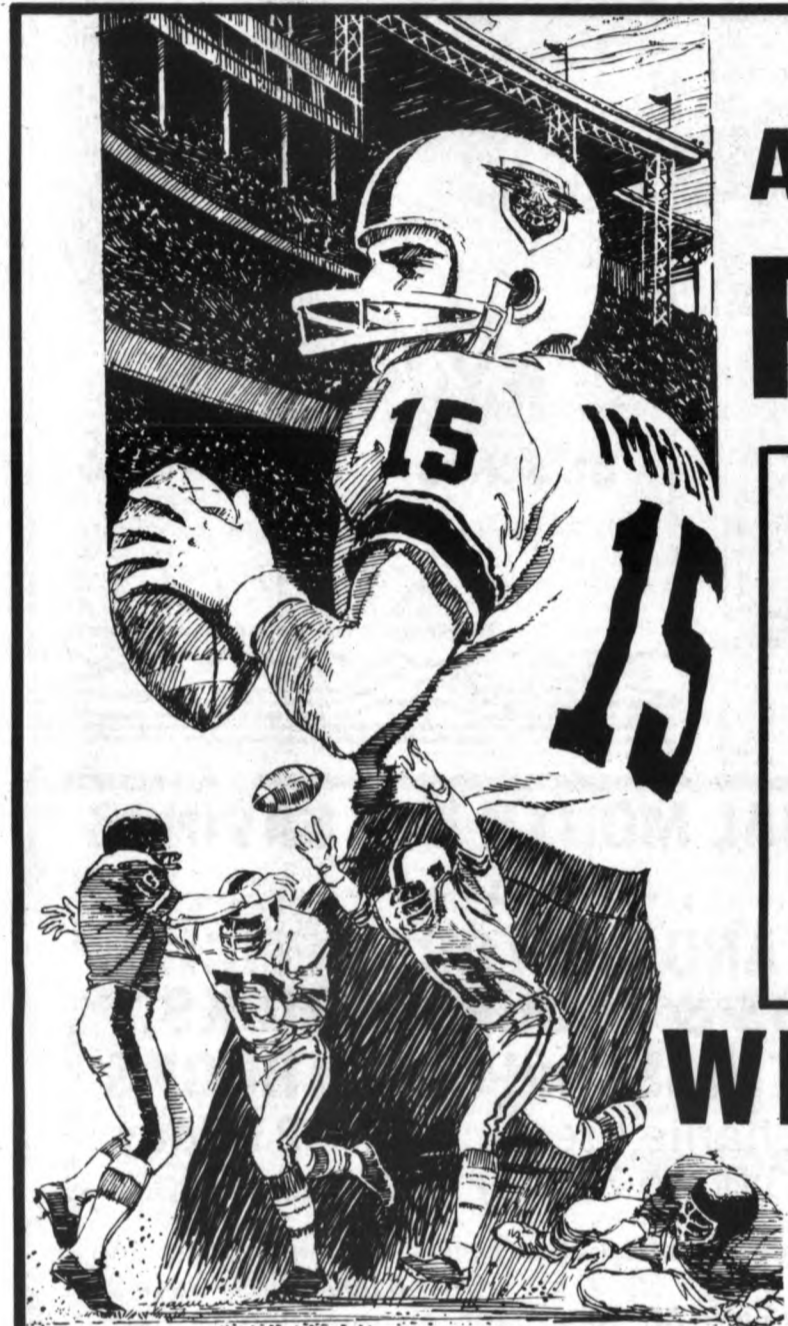

House Plant Toxicity

About five to ten percent of all calls to poison control centers concern ingestion of house plant material, according to an article in the *American Family Physician*. 85% of the cases occur in children less than three years old. More than 95% of cases involve ingestion. The rest are mainly confined to contact dermatitis or eye irritation.

A list of "safe house plants" includes among others, african violets, begonias, boston fern, coleus, peromia, prayer plant, rubber plant, spider plant, sweetish ivy, wandering jew, and weeping fig.

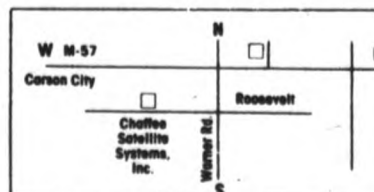

Be thankful if you live in Michigan

At the risk of sounding like a bumper sticker or a Chamber of Commerce slogan, let me pause for a moment in my weekly monologue to say, "I'm thankful I live in Michigan."

I know it's the seasonally proper thing to do, but I feel like doing it anyway. I've always loved our state with its changing seasons and wondered about people who rush away to escape our winters. I've been lots of places, beautiful places, but not a one that I prefer on a permanent basis to Michigan.

Let's look at a typical year and a few of the things we can enjoy.

Beginning with the deer season, we have a herd in our state that is large enough so that most any group of hunters can at least share some venison. And on through the cold months the hunting for cottontails and snowshoe hares is usually excellent.

If hunting isn't your thing, how about maintaining and watching a bird feeder? And the ice fishing that is available. Everything from bluegills to pike and lake trout bite readily, and during the winter months the bugs don't bother the fisherman and the algae doesn't bother the taste of the fish.

And, finally the winter months offer thousands of miles of cross country ski trails and hiking trails, and numerous down-hill ski resorts. Even the end of a day spent in front of a roaring hardwood fire is a by-product of our state.

Then spring comes, bringing perhaps the most versatile menu of special events of the whole year. From the discovery of the first pussy willow, the first leaks, the first smelt run or the sound of the first toads singing, there is something new almost every day. Mushrooms pop up in the first warming rain, young birds and animals add life to the trees and woods, the wild flowers perfume the breezes and the fish build shallow water beds which call the fly fishermen into action. Pike and trout seasons open, wild asparagus suddenly pokes its stalks toward the late May sun. And just about when all these "wild" activities

Turtles Have Right Stuff

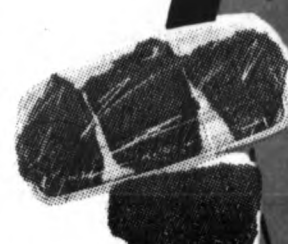
