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St. Johns barber dies in car mishap

Lynne S. Beaufore, 43, of 701 E. Baldwin, owner of Lynne's Barber Shop in St. Johns, died early Friday morning when his car collided almost head-on with a cattle truck at the corner of M-21 and Francis Road.

Beaufore turned eastbound on M-21 from northbound Francis when he crossed the centerline and his car collided with the cattle truck, driven by Denver Lee Hughston, 29, of McBain, Michigan. Hughston was not injured.

According to Clinton County Sherriff's Deputy Page, the accident occurred at about 1:10 a.m. on Dec. 7. St. Johns Police, Clinton Area Ambulance, and St. Johns Fire and Rescue assisted the Sheriff's Department in the rescue. The jaws of life had to be used to remove Beaufore from his vehicle.

Tom Lewis, owner of Hair World, who knew Beaufore through business relations, expressed total shock at Beaufore's death. "We've talked about it here all day, it's hard for me to believe it," he said. "He is definitely going to be missed-

by me and everyone in the community who knew him," Lewis said.

"We'd been in business as barbers in St. Johns as long as I can remember," Lewis said of their business relations.

Bob Paksi, a toolmaker at Federal Mogul, knew Beaufore through their mutual love of sports.

"Lynne was a great guy. If you needed help he'd do anything for you to help you out," said Paksi. "He did a lot with softball and girls softball and he did a lot of deerhunting and sports things. He managed some little girls teams and some bigger girls teams. Lynne was involved with slo-pitch in St. Johns since it started." Beaufore's teams won several championships. Paksi especially remembers Beaufore holding parties for the softball teams he managed in his swimming pool after the games. "He always wanted you to bring your wife on over, let the kids swim, he was a family man," said Paksi.

Don Munger was a hunting buddy of Beaufore's. "He was an avid hunter, a sportsman, sharp witted, a family person, enthusiastic, played softball for years. He coached young sportsmen, communicated well with people through his barber-

City and county governmental units should also be advised of the schedule changes in regard to legal publications and notices as well," Schmaltz added.

"Nothing will be changed in circulation or in the day the papers will be delivered. The readership will continue to receive their papers

in the same manner and days of delivery as before," Schmaltz concluded.

Wendy's new in St. Johns

Business has been booming for St. Johns' new Wendy's. The restaurant opened up Wednesday, Nov. 28, south of town on U.S. 27.

"We're doing really well," said Randy Israel, area director for Wendy's restaurants. "Our reception has been real good. We've done a little better than we thought we were going to do in the location. Even in the week we've been open we've seen a lot of repeat business," he said.

David Stanton Associates, which owns the St. Johns Wendy's franchise and is headquartered in Jackson, has been trying open a Wendy's in St. Johns for two and a half years. "We've just had a hard time getting the property and location we needed," said Israel.

Once the property was purchased, the grade level of the lot had to be brought up five feet. "People will remember that this lot was a swamp," said Israel. "We had to bring in tons of earth."

Contractors for the project were mainly St. Johns firms. "As much as we could, we tried to use St. Johns contractors," said Israel. "We tried to keep as much of the money here in town as we could." The masonry firm, construction firm, excavating firm, and electrical firm that built the new Wendy's are all local businesses.

Of the 50 Wendy's employees, all but 2, who are managers experienced in helping new restaurants get going, are St. Johns area residents. "One of our goals is to have all of our management people be from the St. Johns area," said Israel. "The employees who work here are just good workers and you can tell that they come from good families and a good community," Israel said of his new employees.

Besides bringing new business to St. Johns, the new Wendy's is also involved with the non-business community. The restaurant is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and also the honorary high school basketball coaches club. As is tradition with all opening Wendy's, the St. Johns restaurant has contributed \$256 to the local American Cancer Society. That's one dollar for each different way Wendy's can make a hamburger. "We try to do as much as we can for the community," said Israel.

And while Wendy's tries to do as much as it can for the community, Israel says the community is also doing a lot for Wendy's. "The friendliness of this town and the cooperation and the open arm reception we've gotten no matter who we've talked to has been great," said Israel. "In all the restaurants I've opened up I've never met a city as amiable as this town."

The St. Johns Wendy's isn't only new to St. Johns, but it is in a new style for the restaurant

High school programs viewed by board

St. Johns High School's Spanish program, its math department, model United Nations Assembly club, special needs program, advanced biology class, computer program, and guidance department, as well as a report from a student, highlighted last Monday's committee on the whole School board meeting. Principal William Swears moderated the positive report on the present construction of the school's curriculum.

Spanish teacher Edna Gonzales, math department head Doug Parker, Model United Nations club advisor Peggy Andretz, special needs director Lynn Baisely, biology teacher Mike Gehoski, science teacher Gary Kingsley, and student services head Loren Perry were chosen to speak by Principal Swears "because we wanted to highlight the variety and quality of the program. To present you with things you might not be familiar with."

Speaking to the school board first was Spanish teacher Edna Gonzales. Gonzales emphasized the importance of foreign language knowledge in the business world and in better foreign relations. With more and more companies becoming international in their holdings, the need for foreign language speakers is steadily increasing, said Gonzales. She also cited foreign language requirements for degrees at major universities. Foreign language knowledge is not only part of an improved curriculum, but encourages self discipline as well, said Gonzales.

The high school's Spanish teacher then played a videocassette of a puppet show produced by her third-year Spanish students. Gonzales uses videotaping for class evaluation, criticism and correction of students' speech, and to improve Spanish listening and conversation skills in her classes.

Doug Parker, head of the high school's math department spoke to the board next on what is being done to create additional interest in mathematics at the high school.

Two hundred students, one sixth of the school, are currently competing in tests given by the Michigan Math League, said Parker. The math league is made up of students from 75 different Michigan high schools. Members of the league take one thirty minute test a month. Records and standings of both team and individual scores are recorded.

So far this school year, St. Johns High School is tied for second in statewide math league competition. St. Johns is tied for first among Michigan's public schools, as the first place school is a Catholic School near Detroit. Last year St. Johns was 17th overall and second in the region.

So far the high school hasn't received any Math League individual awards, although two students tied for the top scores in other contests. The Math League is open to anyone.

Another program helping to increase interest in math at St. Johns is the Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition. Students statewide compete for grants and scholarships when taking this test, which has a higher participation level than the Michigan Math League. The test is given in two

parts, with only those scoring highest going on to take the second part. Two St. Johns students have qualified to take the second test this year.

Teacher Peggy Andretz next talked to the board about the extra-curricular MUNA, or Model United Nations Assembly, club. St. Johns has had its MUNA club, with Andretz at its head, since 1969. Since 1970, the club has been attending a simulated United Nations conference held at Grand Valley State College. St. Johns has played a wide variety of countries at the meetings these past 14 years, including the three super powers, the U.S., the U.S.S.R., and the People's Republic of China.

This fall, the St. Johns MUNA club played Libya at a Michigan State University conference on African problems. Last Saturday, Dec. 8, the MUNA club went to Midland to participate at a conference at Midland-Dow High School. Club members played the U.S.S.R. in a symposium on the Middle East and the Iraq-Iran War, and Zimbabwe and China in a symposium on Central America.

In these conferences, students have to follow debate and parliamentary rules and actually think like a country, said Andretz. "We seem to have some kind of problem getting people to look at world situations," said Andretz about the general reception her club has received, but she points out that the 8-10 students who are club members are all dedicated. "This activity is total-

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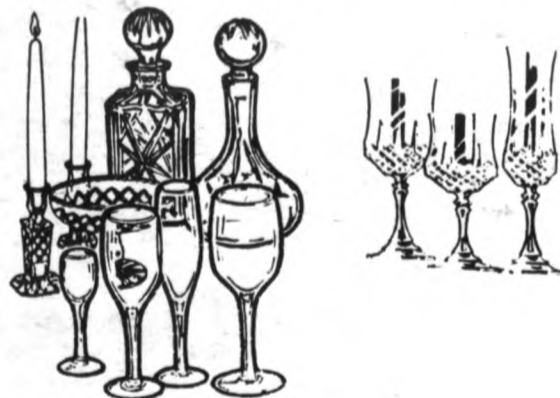

ly extracurricular, they don't get a grade, they are all self motivated into learning something," she said.

St. Johns' MUNA club is self supporting, through two dances held each school year and the sale of stationery. In addition to attending the Model United Nations conferences, students in the MUNA club all study foreign countries. Each year, Andretz mails over 150 information seeking letters to the consulates of different countries.

MUNA club members will be going to a conference at Pope College in March, the Great Lakes Invitational Model United Nations Assembly at Kalamazoo, and Grand Valley State's symposium in May.

After Andretz' presentation, Principal Swears pointed out that she had recently bought a new van, mainly so she could transport the MUNA club on her own. Andretz receives no extra pay for this extracurricular activity.

Lynn Baisely, head of the high school's special needs department presented the next example of the school's broad and wide curriculum to the board.

"We work with students who have a problem that requires a little extra help with their high school careers," said Baisely. The special needs program services approximately 60 students, and is able to help those who are emotionally and mentally impaired, visually impaired, hearing impaired, and learning disabled.

Students in the programs are divided into two groups. The first group is able to meet the set requirements for graduation with support of the special education staff. They usually spend one period of the six period day in a special needs class. The second group has different requirements for graduation, which are tailored to their special needs. Their classes tend to be oriented more towards vocational training, but these students are integrated into regular classrooms whenever possible.

Baisely outlined two needs of the program for the board. The first need is cooperation from the staff, and she feels that she is receiving that wholeheartedly. The second need is an expanded curriculum for special needs students. Baisely feels that much more in the area of vocational training needs to be offered for the special student.

Mike Gehoski, who teaches science classes at the high school followed the special needs presentation with his discussion on St. Johns advanced placement program.

The high school's advanced placement program currently consists of one two-hour college level biology class, but Gehoski feels that advanced placement classes could also be offered in math, English literature, and chemistry.

Students taking the advanced biology course are able to take a test at the end of the year for level placement in college. If passing the test, St. Johns students would be able to bypass introductory college biology and go on to more advanced classes. Of the 12 students in the class, Gehoski feels that all of them are capable of passing the college test.

Science teacher Gary Kingsley followed with his computerized classroom demonstration for the board.

Board members were each given personalized computer-generated tests similar to those Kingsley gives his students. Kingsley then talked about how the grades of all the students in his classes are recorded in a classroom computer, so that at any time a student can know how well he or she is doing in that class.

After talking about the computer as a classroom tool, Kingsley made an impressive demonstration of its ability to simulate physics and chemistry experiments. The experiment demonstrated simulated the heating of camphor to find its saturation point. Computer graphics showed the element being heated and temperature readings

on a thermometer, all controlled by the computer operator.

Kingsley pointed out "incredible" cost and time savings made by computer-simulated experiments, as well as making them easier for students to conduct. Disks with these programs are available through a national science education organization and cost about four dollars apiece.

Kingsley has 54 students using the school's single Apple computer.

Warren Perry, high school director of student services, was the final staff member to make a presentation to the board. His speech dwelt on the lesser known activities of student services, as it is now called instead of "guidance department" because they do "so much more than guidance."

Other than guidance, student services operates the health room, provides career education, helps in post secondary educational planning, and planning and enrolling for the following year.

St. Johns' student services have a ninth grade program to introduce students to the department, and set them up for career education. Seniors are taught how to write resumes, fill out job applications, and even do mock interviews with Community Resource Volunteers, who point out their interviewing strengths and weaknesses.

"We have received some very positive feedback from the business community," said Perry. "When they see a job application filled out by one of our students, they see that the students know what they are doing." Senior citizens also

Cheryl Perez, an Alma college freshman from St. Johns, is one of 27 students serving on the Student Health Advisory Committee for 1984-85. According to Director of Health Services Jim Brasseur, the committee functions for "advising the director of health services and providing health-related information to the Alma campus."

The committee members meet every other week, to talk about health center concerns and discuss upcoming projects that the group sponsors.

Together, the Health Service and the Student Health Advisory Committee operate a blood pressure clinic, hold an annual health fair, assist in blood drives held on the campus each academic term, and sponsor a road run during Homecoming week. In addition, the committee is responsible for maintaining health-oriented displays on campus.

The Student Health Advisory Committee has been active on campus since 1976. Alma is the only small college in Michigan with such a student advisory group. Although the committee is open to any student, most members are biology majors or premedical students.

volunteer to come in to answer questions and give career counseling at the high school.

"I believe that we are a model in the state of Michigan for our educational development plan," said Perry. He points out that annually, between \$150,000 and \$250,000 goes to St. Johns students in awards, scholarships, and assistance for college. "We are supporting academic excellence," said Perry.

On an underclassmen level, St. Johns has the PASS program, for all ninth graders who fail a course within the first nine weeks of the school year. Both parents and students attend a night meeting of the PASS program and fill out questionnaires as to why the student failed, and then discuss their answers.

The high school offers a study skills program, held in meetings after school, for all grades.

Brian O'Connor, president of the high school student body, was the last speaker of the night. He spoke about three major student sponsored events that he has been involved in as student council president; homecoming, the blood drive, which earned St. Johns outstanding high school in the mid Michigan honors, and the Michigan Student Forum, in which students discuss their problems and ideas with other high school students around the state.

"Students should be heard," was O'Connor's message for the night. When put on the spot as to what could be improved at the high school by Superintendent Earl Gabriel, O'Connor was unable to name any needed improvements.

Principal Swears closed the presentation with a plea for more support from the schoolboard, primarily monetary. He pointed out that St. Johns was one of the most cost efficient schools in the area, while still maintaining a high level of education.

"There are positive marvelous things going on here every day," Swears concluded.

chain as well. While most Wendy's have only chair and table seating, the St. Johns Wendy's has a center area with the chairs and tables, but around the perimeter of the dining area the restaurant features booths. Israel says that there is a trend towards booths in Wendy's across the country these days. The St. Johns Wendy's also has hanging plants, and festive white holiday poinsettias line the windows. In the near future, photographs of historic St. Johns, courtesy of the Clinton County Historical Society, will be displayed on the restaurant's walls. "We're trying to make a more comfortable atmosphere," said Israel. He also pointed out that the wide aisles and booths make the St. Johns Wendy's a lot roomier than other restaurants in the chain.

"This restaurant has everything Wendy's has to offer," said Israel of the new store's menu. That

includes fish, which is a test-market product here, baked potatoes, and a complete breakfast line. By June 1985, all Wendy's will have breakfasts, said Israel. One of the most popular newer items on the menu are the stuffed baked potatoes. "This is a real meat and potato town," said Israel.

One thing that Wendy's doesn't have at the St. Johns outlet is sulfite, a food preservative that can trigger allergy and asthma attacks. "Wendy's has never used it, and we never will use it," said Israel of the potentially dangerous chemical.

The new St. Johns Wendy's is open from 7 a.m. to 10:30 Sunday through Thursday, with the drive through window open until midnight. On Friday and Saturday the restaurant is open from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m., with the drive through window open until 1 a.m. Breakfast is available from 7-10:30 a.m. Monday through Saturday and 7-11 a.m. Sunday.

What to do after the holiday rush

Before you get so busy with holiday get-togethers that you find yourself coming and going, sit back, put up your feet and take about five minutes to plan your post-holiday business!

There are a wide variety of agricultural programs offered through the Clinton County Extension Office for your professional growth. Although I don't expect that anyone will want, or have the need to attend every program, I do feel it is important for you to know your options.

Dairy farmers have two options this year. A Milk Secretion Short Course will be held at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Fowler January 10, 17, 24, and 31. This four day short course will address such topics as the gross anatomy of the mammary gland, mammary development, including initiation and maintenance of lactation as well as milk secretion. The course will go on to determine how management and disease may affect lactation and milk components.

The second option open to dairy farmers is the Basic Dairy Cattle Nutrition and Feeding Short Course to be held in the Ovid Village Hall, January 9, 16, 23, 30 and February 6. The nutrition short course is packed full of valuable information that can increase the efficiency of milk production. You will receive the basic nutrition information, including cow requirements and how they are affected by age and stage of lactation, as well as information on forages, concentrates, and by-product feeds. You will learn the ins and outs of ration evaluation and will also get some "hands on" computer experience.

A \$36 registration fee, to cover meals and materials, will be charged to participants in each dairy short course. Pre-registration is required. For more detailed information on either program, please feel free to contact the Extension Office at

224-3288.

County swine producers are encouraged to attend Central Michigan Swine Day, January 19, in Grand Ledge. This educational program has speakers from Michigan State University as well as swine specialists from throughout the state. There is something for everyone in this program. We are offering sessions on "Evaluation The Benefits Received Per Dollar Spent," "Trouble Shooting The Farrowing House," "Effective Weaning Management Techniques," "How To Keep The Farrowing House Full," "Personal Management," and more. The cost of this program is only \$2.50, so plan on attending! No pre-registration is required.

Beef cow calf operators can sharpen their management skills through a correspondence course offered through the university. This is a 9 week project and can be obtained for only \$8. For information on registration in this course, call the County Extension Office at 224-3288.

Batteries undercharged and credit cards overcharged

Credit cards can be a great convenience during the busy holiday shopping season. They can save you time, energy and even money. But you need to be cautious and responsible in their use.

Credit card purchases are frequently speedier than cash or personal check payments. And you don't have to worry about carrying around large amounts of cash which can be lost or stolen. However, it's important to avoid the temptation to "overcharge," because it's so easy to do.

"Overcharging," charging amounts greater than one's ability to pay, is often a result of a willingness to buy more, and pay more, when using credit cards. Research at Purdue University found that subjects were willing to pay an average of 22 percent more for individual items when credit cards were involved.

Sooner or later the bills will come. Even if it's later, they need to be paid on or before the due date to avoid finance charges at an annual rate of eighteen percent or more. If you add finance charges to the price of your purchases, you may find the purchases are quite costly.

"Armchair shopping," purchasing from catalogs and newspaper advertisements, can save much time and energy by helping you avoid the crowds. Credit cards make ordering by mail or by phone easier.

But their use requires careful record keeping. When the bills come in, make sure the items charged are only those you ordered and that the prices are correct. It's important to avoid being "overcharged" by error too.

Credit cards can save you money by allowing you to take advantage of sales for which you lack the cash. You may also be able to keep your

money in an interest paying account longer. And, paying one bill instead of writing checks for ten small items could reduce your checking account charges.

Your ability to resist overcharging and the time and energy available for shopping are factors you'll want to consider when deciding whether to use credit. Wise use of credit can go a long way towards preventing your personal batteries from becoming undercharged during the holiday season.

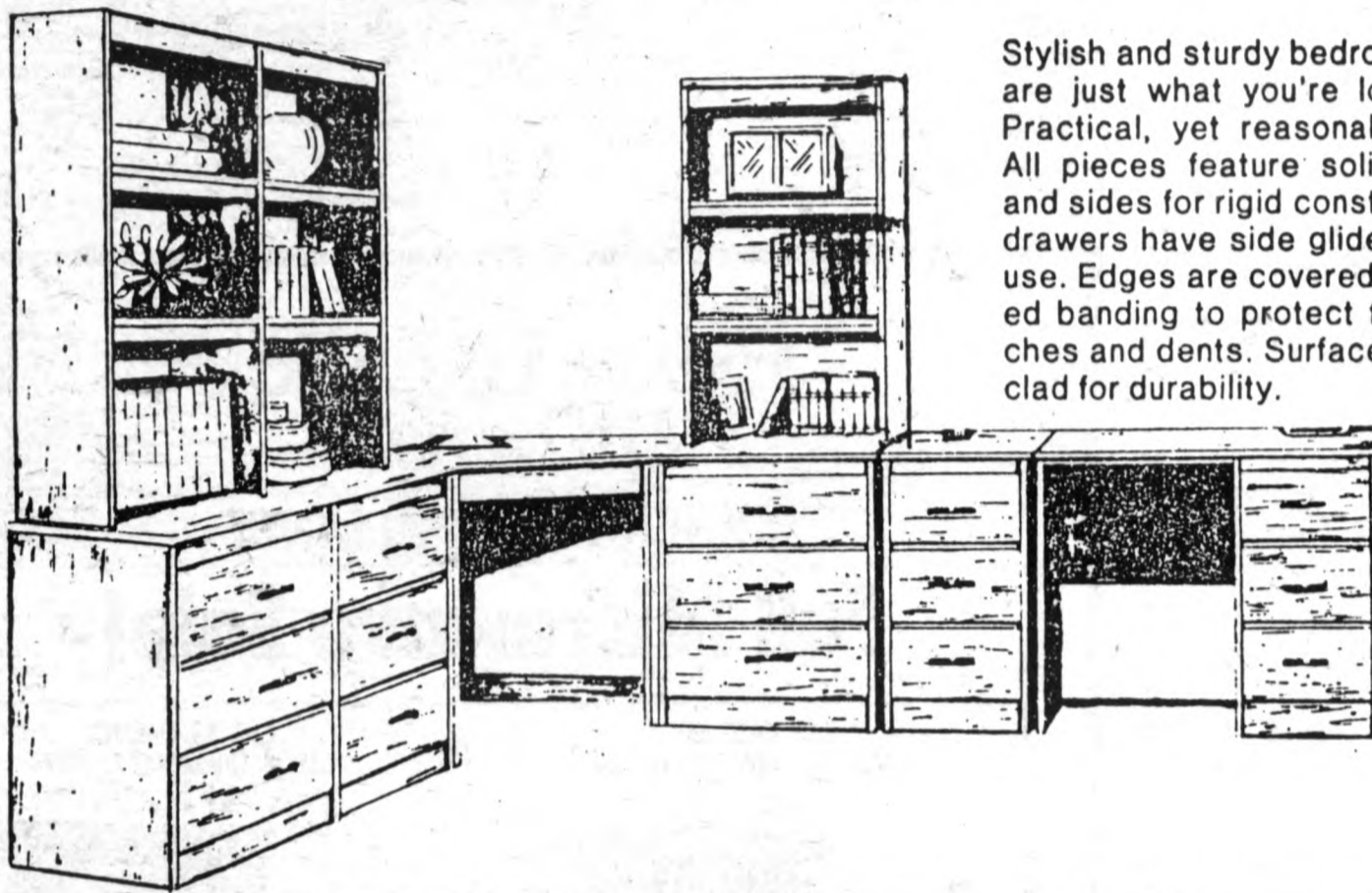

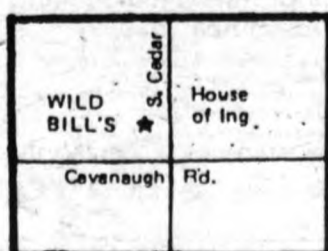

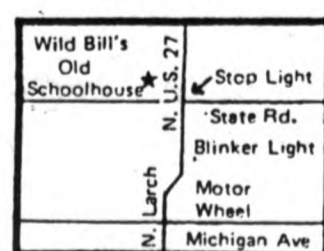

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Farm price index up

The Index of Prices received by Michigan farmers for all farm products averaged 124 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending November 15. This represents a 1 percent increase from the October level, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Prices during November were 9 percent below the comparable month a year earlier. The Index of Prices paid by farmers, nationwide, for commodities and services, interest, taxes and farm wage rates for November was 164 percent of its 1977 base. The index was unchanged

from October. Declines in the feeder livestock and fuels and energy indexes were offset by increases in the family living items, autos and truck components. Compared with a year earlier the index was up 1 percent.

In Michigan, overall farm prices were generally stronger in the livestock and livestock products sector, while they remained weaker for crop items. Individual commodities with stronger prices were eggs, hogs, milk, steers, heifers, potatoes, oats and winter wheat. Lower prices for calves, slaughter cows, dry beans, soybeans, and

corn were partially offsetting. Both corn and soybeans have showed a noticeable price decline since about mid-year. Hay prices showed no change from the previous month.

Nationally, the November all farm products index of prices received by farmers decreased 1 percent from October to 137 percent of its 1977 average. In the index, lower prices for oranges, lettuce, corn, grapefruit, and tomatoes were partially offset by higher prices for hogs, eggs, cattle, potatoes and turkeys. The index was 2 percent above a year ago.

For Good Measure

If you want your measuring to take on a new dimension, here are some rules from experts. They can help make sure you measure up to the job.

• There's an old saying that "every good carpenter measures every cut to be made three times." That's a sound rule, no matter what you're measuring.

• To figure how much paint is needed to one-coat a room, total the width measurements of all sides and multiply by the ceiling height to get square feet. Paint can labels state square foot coverage per gallon.

• When cutting a board for new storage shelving, measure and mark a cut line with a pencil. For accuracy, saw just outside the line.

• A good quality automatic tape measure will have a rubber cushion to prevent damage to the end hook when the blade returns to the case.

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St. Johns Co-op turns over to creditors

B and W running elevators for St. Paul Bank

The lease agreement reached last week by B and W Co-op and its creditors, St. Paul Bank of Cooperatives and the Central National Bank, last week allows the co-op to stay in St. Johns in order to run the grain and feed elevators for the St. Paul bank, which has accepted the facilities from the St. Johns Co-op as payment of their debt to the bank. Previously, B and W was leasing the facility directly from the St. Johns Co-op.

This arrangement is based entirely on a verbal agreement between B and W, St. Johns Co-op, and The Bank of Cooperatives. The signatures of the members of the St. Johns Co-op's Board of Directors and approval by that company's stockholders is needed before everything is final, however.

"We are trying to come together on an agreement," said Jerry Motz, president of the St. Johns Co-op. "Probably within the next two weeks we'll have things drawn down so we know where we're at." If the stockholders fail to approve this latest move, the bank will foreclose on the St. Johns Co-op.

While currently B and W are acting as managers for the St. Paul bank, they would still like to own the feed and grain elevators. "We are still potential buyers, once the bank starts taking bids, which will probably be in a couple of months," said Roger Poscal, B and W feed and grain elevator manager in St. Johns.

The Breckenridge-based Co-op was originally going to leave St. Johns last week when their lease for the facilities with the St. Johns Co-op ran out and they were unable to get the financial backing to purchase the elevators.

At the time, grain stored in the elevators was being trucked to the co-op's Breckenridge elevators for storage there. The grain will remain in Breckenridge, but farmers participating in the grain bank program will still be able to get at it.

B and W's feed mill lost 80% of its feed business during the moving-out confusion, when many farmers were taking their feed to other feed mills. According to Poscal, the co-op has hauled in several semi-loads of feed to get the feed mill going again.

B and W, says Poscal, will be staying in St. Johns at least for the coming month, but as the situation is uncertain, he cannot make any guarantees after that.

Safety program marks one year

Thanks to 59 Clinton County individuals and organizations and the Clinton County Child Safety Committee, five Clinton County children who were in severe automobile crashes during the past year are still around to celebrate another Christmas.

All five; one year old Regina Wilson, three month old Victoria Newton, two year old Elisha Newton, one year old Elizabeth Newton, and one year old John Kieffer, were saved from eminent injury or death by child safety seats.

Since November 1983, the Clinton County Child Safety Committee has distributed 60 infant seats and 115 toddler seats for use in the county. One hundred seventy five adults have par-

ticipated in the health department safety seat education session as a pre-requisite to obtaining child safety seats.

The committee lists 59 donors in its first annual report. Donations amount to \$9,151. Sixty seven percent of the contributions were used to purchase 87 infant safety seats, and 132 toddler safety seats. The remaining 33%, or \$2,977.25 of the contributions was deposited in the committee's investment fund. The investment fund produced \$299.46 in interest, which has been used to purchase 6 toddler seats.

Four Clinton County law enforcement agencies, The Clinton County Sheriff's Department, St. Johns Police Department, DeWitt Township

Police Department, and DeWitt City Police Department have received orientation to the child safety seat project and elected to become active distributors of child safety seats to traffic violators who needed seats for their children.

Seats are available for a small refundable deposit through the above-mentioned law enforcement agencies, the Mid-Michigan Health Department, and the Clinton Memorial Hospital. There are currently 72 families on the waiting list for seats.

Actual points scored in the 30-28 Redskin victory was 58.

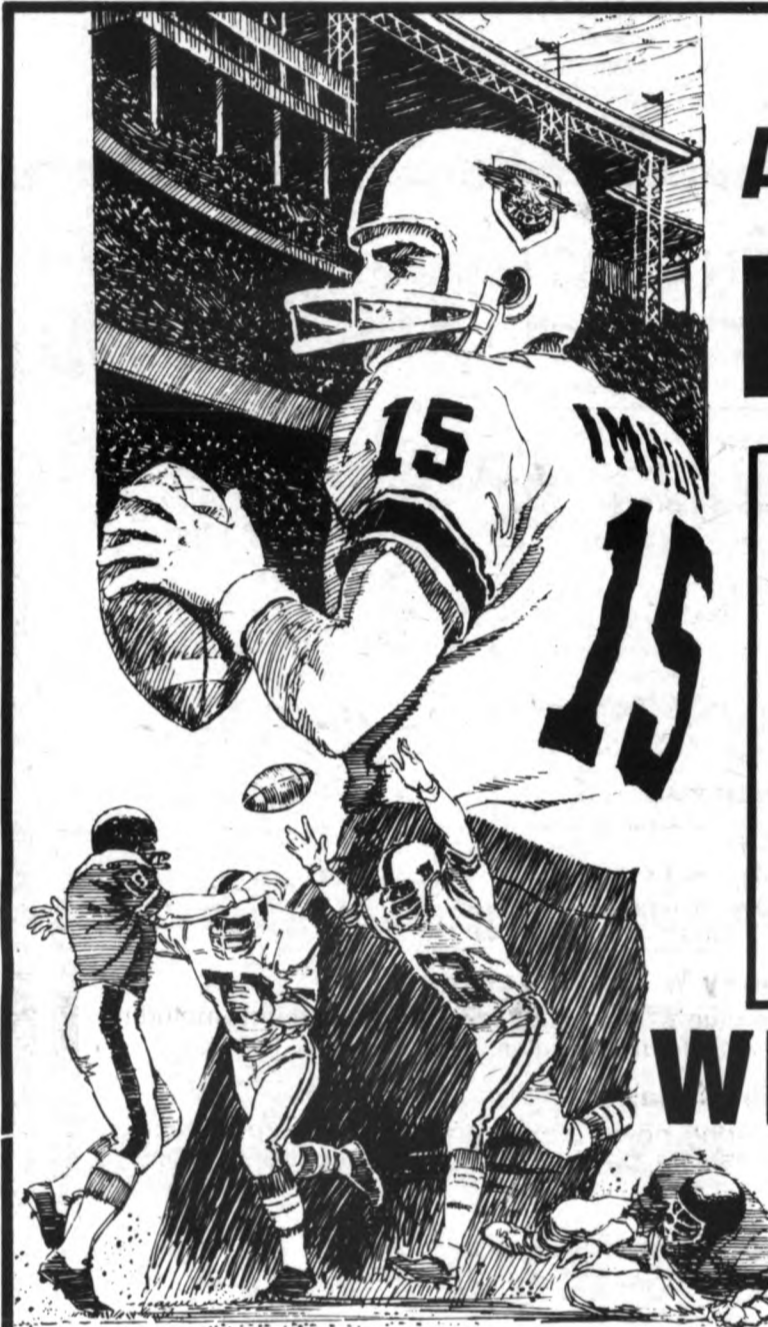

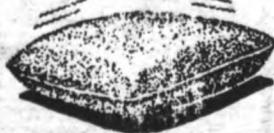

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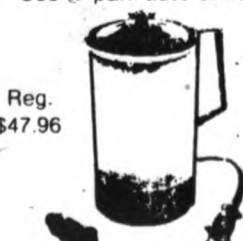


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Teacher arrested as window peeper

Marvin Allen Pettit, 29, of 850 E. Chadwick in DeWitt, pled guilty to disorderly conduct charges of window peeping in 65th District Court in St. Johns Dec. 5. He has been referred to the probation department for a pre-sentence interview at a yet to be scheduled date.

Pettit was arrested Wednesday after an investigation by DeWitt City Police, who answered a peeping tom complaint Friday Nov. 30 and apprehended him at the scene.

According to a DeWitt police spokesperson, Pettit said that he has been window peeping in the DeWitt area, at adult women, for the past two or three years. City police have been receiving approximately two complaints of prowlers and peeping toms a week for about the same period of time.

"When we went to investigate these calls they always came back as 'unable to locate,'" said the spokesperson.

"We're hoping this arrest will squelch the problem in the future," said the police spokesperson. "There is the possibility that he could be the one who has been causing all the problems," the spokesperson said of Pettit.

Pettit is employed as a substitute teacher in the tri-county area. According to the St. Johns Schools Superintendent's Office, Pettit signed up as a substitute with their system just this year.

named her brother as the assailant.

The killing apparently stemmed from a family argument, according to Detective Richard May, of the Clinton County Detective Bureau. According to the witness, she, the suspect and Pease returned from the Hilltop Bar in Bath, and he dropped them off at their house. About five minutes later he returned with either a rifle or a shotgun and shot Pease through the head as he was bending over to say good night to her daughter. The suspect then left the scene in a rust and white Chevelle, which was found at the 7-11 at Lake Lansing and Harrison by the East Lansing Police Sunday night.

"We don't know where he is at at this time," said May. Assisting in the investigation have been the Clinton County Detective Bureau, Bath and DeWitt Township police forces, The Clinton County Sheriff Department, and the State Police Crime Lab. The search for Trofater is now state-wide.

Trofater is described as a white male, 5 feet 6 inches tall, about 140 pounds, with brown hair, brown eyes, and a mustache and goatee.

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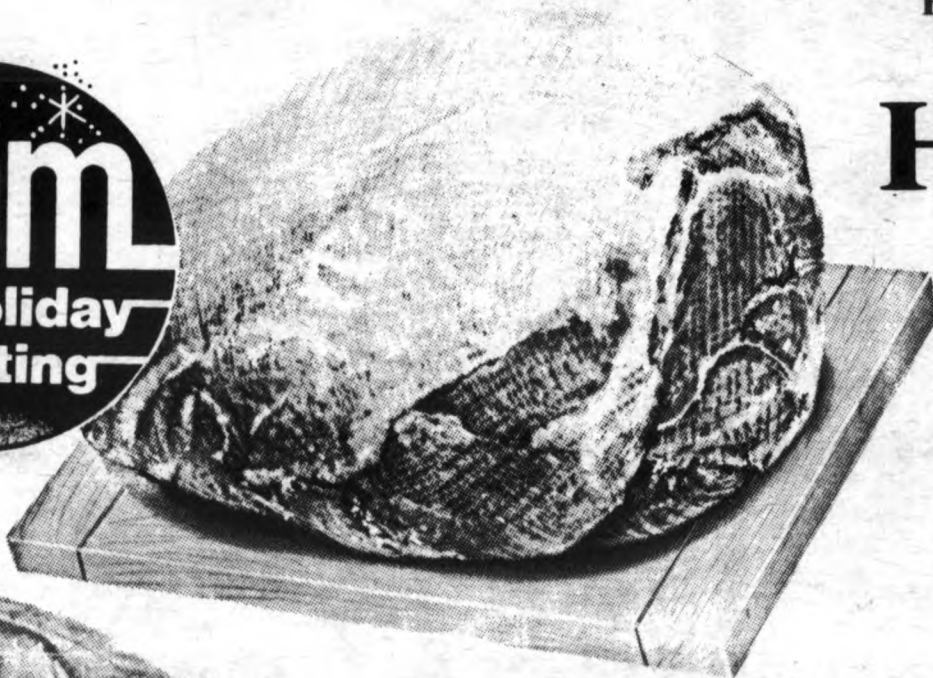

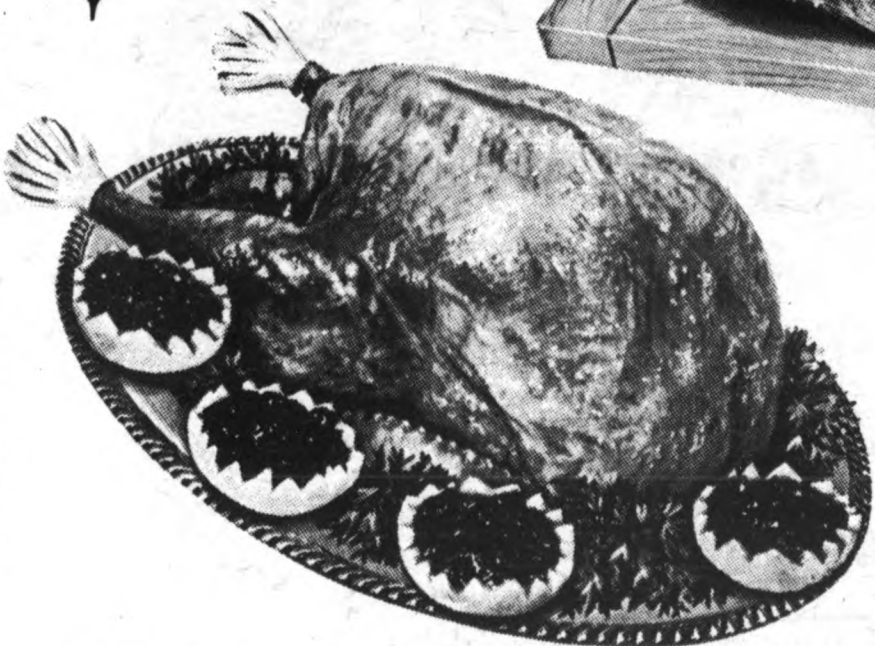
