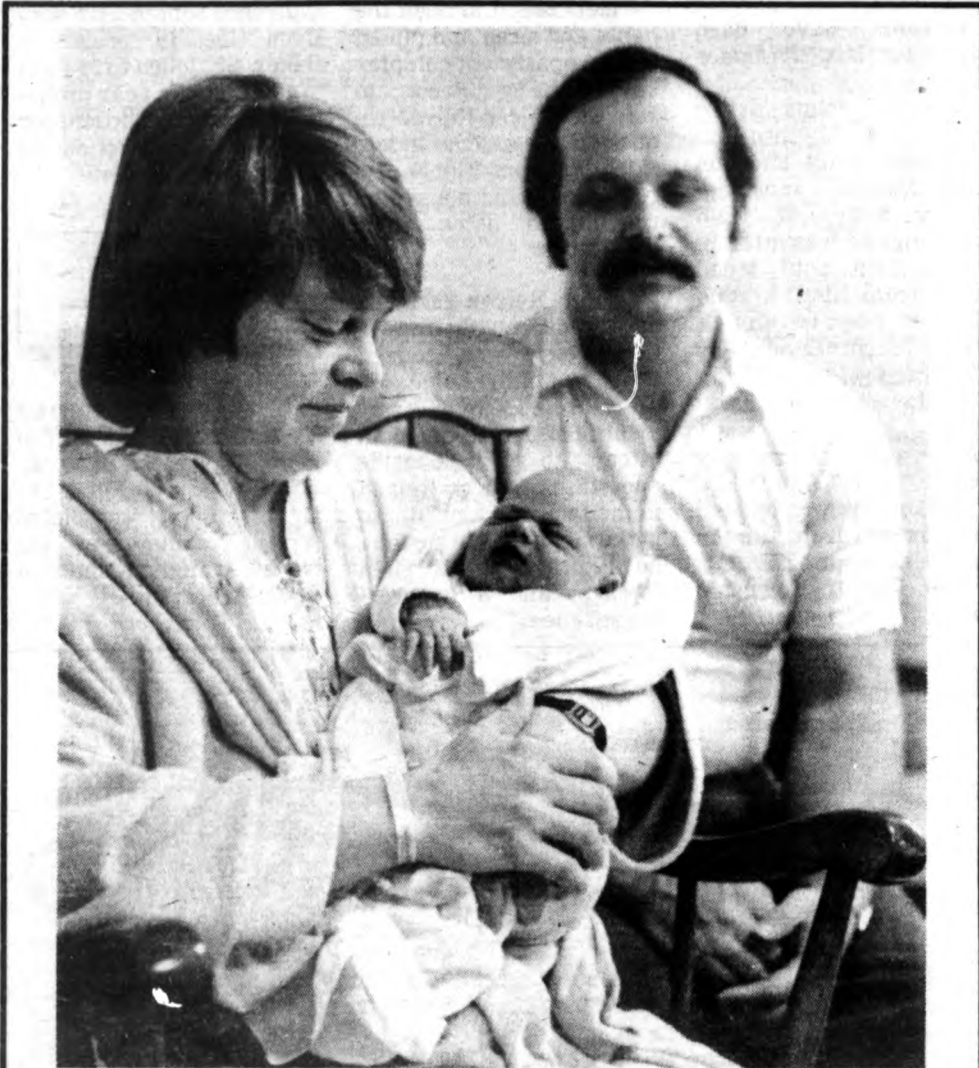

## Redistricting plan has new emphasis

The recent redistricting in the Michigan Legislature may have an interesting impact on the politics in Clinton County.

Although most Republican lawmakers said they aren't thrilled with the compromise plan, only two, Sens. Alan Cropsey (R-DeWitt) and William Sederburg (R-East Lansing) would end up battling for the same Senate seat.

The new 24th District, which includes most of Clinton County, most of Ingham County and two townships in northern Ionia County will more than likely change the point of political emphasis in what Clinton County has known, according to Sederburg.

"The current 30th District includes Clinton, Shiawasee, and Livingston Counties. Although it does have some large towns, it is basically a rural district," Sederburg said. "The new 24th District would change that."

"With picking up Lansing and East Lansing, the new district would have more of an urban focus than a rural one. But a good majority of Clinton County works in Lansing, so most of that part of the population would benefit from the urban emphasis. But for the rural parts, I'm sure the constituents feel they'd be better off in the old 30th District."

Sederburg was one of the architects of this compromise redistricting plan and when asked why he would agree to one which combined his district with another senator's he explained, "We started out with a compromise idea where we'd have 18 Democrats, 18 Republicans, and two districts that could go either way. To accomplish that, we needed to put two Republicans in the same district."

"Since, as you said, I was one of the architects, and Alan and I live close by (10 miles), I felt I should be willing to make the sacrifice," Sederburg said. "And neither Alan or myself were committed to what we're going to do by the next election."

There has been wide speculation that Sederburg would not run in 1986, but neither he nor Cropsey would cement that information.

"Senator Sederburg and I had a long discussion at the time," Cropsey said, "and we both agreed that a lot of things can happen politically between now and 1986."

"There is a very real chance one of us

won't run, a slight possibility neither will run, and still a slighter possibility both of us would run. But I doubt Cropsey and I would face each other in a primary. He didn't say he would run, but he didn't want to close the door on it," Cropsey remarked.

But Cropsey may have hinted that he may run for that district seat when he said he was not worried about having to face an election in the traditionally-Democratic Lansing area.

"We'd have most of the city of Lansing and East Lansing and those tend to be liberal and Democratic. But we also have the Williamston area and eastern Ingham County and that's a good conservative Republican area," he said.

"It'd be a little tougher to be maintained by a Republican than the current district, but not impossible. I'm not worried."

Cropsey said according to their estimation, the current 30th District is 57 per cent Republican while the new 24th District would be around 55 per cent Republican.

Yet while Cropsey said he would still like to see this recent redistricting plan challenged in court, he felt it would be fruitless.

"This compromise plan was a choice of two bad situations, frankly I don't like this plan either," he commented. "The Supreme Court would throw this out if it (the Supreme Court) was fair, but it's not. The governor has stacked the Supreme Court with a bunch of his cronies. We have a Supreme Court that doesn't care what is wrong or right."

"It's a terrible public policy to reapportion every year, we're setting a bad precedent. It's not fair to the people who vote someone in that they want in. It's a constitutional crisis that really has to be resolved," Cropsey said. "I'm going to be requesting the Supreme Court to make a decision on this redistricting to see where they stand on it."

Only three townships in Clinton County, Greenbush, Duplain, and Ovid, will not be in the new 24th District. They will be in the 35th District which is now served by Senate Republican Leader John Engler of Mt. Pleasant.

The 89th House District, held by Gary Randall (R-Elwell) would not change much with the new redistricting. However, Bath Township will be added to Rep. H. Lynn Jondahl's (D-East Lansing) 59th District.

## Kuenzli steps down

An era will be coming to an end sometime after the first of the year with Governor Blanchard appointing two new members of the Michigan Bean Commission, replacing Gerald Elenbaum, Huron County grower representative, and F. Dale Kuenzli, a shipper representative on the Commission from St. Johns.

Kuenzli is President of Valley Marketing Cooperative of St. Johns, and has long been recognized as a leader in the Michigan Dry edible bean industry. He has been involved with the bean business for almost 20 years; with Valley Marketing for five and a half years; and before that, 14 years with Michigan Elevator Exchange.

Kuenzli and Elenbaum are each completing a service of six years on the

Bean Commission, two consecutive three year terms each.

In addition to the dry bean industry, Kuenzli is active in his Local Lions Club, has served on the board of the Michigan Crop Improvement Association, and was recognized in 1978 as the Outstanding Agriculture Alumni of Michigan State University.

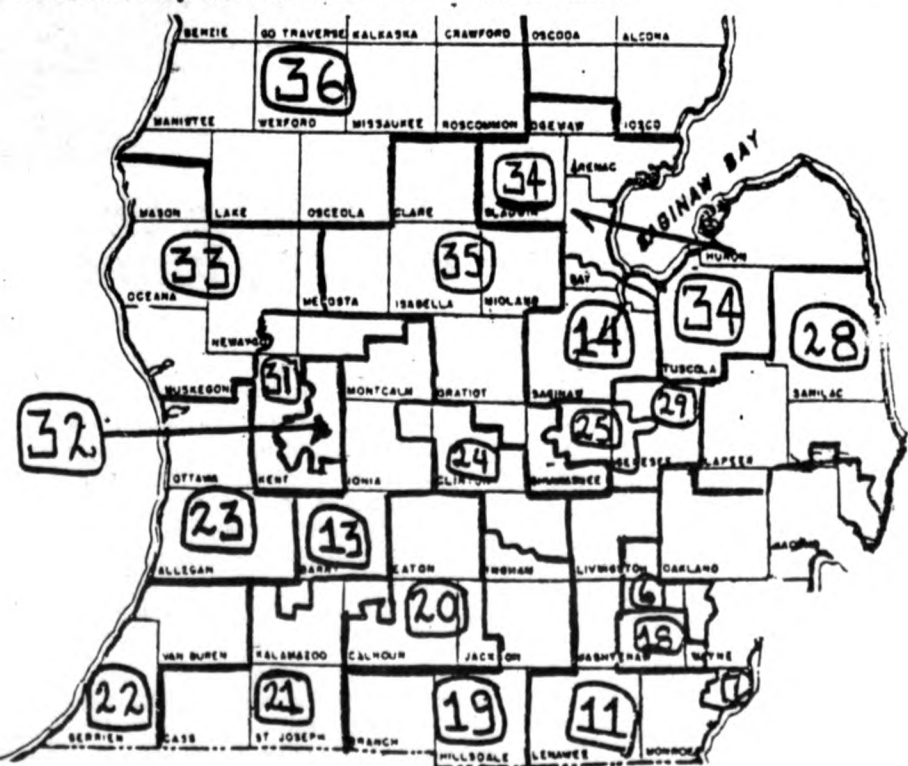
He has also served as President of the Michigan Bean Shippers Association. Kuenzli was also instrumental in negotiating the Mexican dry bean contracts of 1979 and 1980.

Kuenzli and Elenbaum, during their tenure on the Bean Commission, worked very hard to redirect promotional programs and foster greater cooperation between all segments of the dry bean industry.

During their terms on the Commission, promotional programs were directed away from a New York based public relations agency to reach the point where all programs are handled by the Commission staff.

Kuenzli, in farewell remarks at the most recent Commission meeting, cited that accomplishment as one of the highlights of his tenure on the Commission, along with cooperation between the Michigan Bean Commission and Michigan Bean Shippers Association.

In summing up the period that Kuenzli and Elenbaum served on the Commission, an officer of the Bean Commission, LeRoy Schluckebier, said, "Their actions and dedication helped the entire dry bean industry, not just the Commission. They are both a credit to this industry."

# Seat belt credited for saving woman

Clinton County Sheriff's authorities believe the use of her seat belt saved Teresa Hatta from serious injury last week.

Hatta, of 2675 N. Hollister Rd., Ovid, was northbound on Hollister Road just north of Front Street when she lost control of her vehicle and went into the ditch on the west side of the road last Thursday afternoon.

Her car came to rest on the railroad tracks when a Grand Trunk Western train struck the vehicle and spun it around back onto Hollister Road. She was taken to Owosso Memorial Hospital by the Ovid Area Ambulance, but since she was wearing her seat belt, received only minor injuries.

• The St. Johns Police Department apprehended three young men stealing gasoline from the tanks of several school buses at the bus garage on West State Road.

# Memory Lane...

## First Telephones Here 71 Years Ago

As some of you know, I worked for the Telephone Company for 27 years, so I am always interested in things concerning the telephone business.

Telephone service came to St. Johns 71 years ago. It was in 1889, Gene Crawley built a telephone exchange at Maple Rapids and extended lines into the St. Johns and Middleton areas.

John T. Millman and John H. Fildew, St. Johns druggists, a short time later, invested capital and organized the National Telephone Company here.

The first exchange operations were in the back of the Millman and Fildew Drug Store, located where the present D&C Store is, at 125 N. Clinton Avenue.

National Telephone Company was acquired by Union Telephone Company on March 21, 1901. The Union Company originated at Alma in 1899 and soon extended service to Ithaca and St. Louis.

At the time of the acquisition of the National Telephone Company, Union also purchased the Montcalm County Telephone Association and the Owosso and Fenton Telephone Companies.

As new properties were added to the Union Telephone Company, they were connected with a net-

work of long distant lines. Before 1910, the Bell Company and the Union Company were providing telephone service in Michigan's 13 central counties.

The next major advance in telephone service for St. Johns came in 1919 when a common battery system, the kind presently in use, was installed.

The Union Company continued to expand and improve telephone service in Michigan during the next 28 years, and was acquired by General Telephone Company of Michigan, officially, on Feb. 28, 1957.

General Telephone of Michigan is one of 20 subsidiary telephone companies of General Telephone and Electronics Corporation, serving in 31 states.

Manufacturing subsidiaries of GT&E include Sylvania Electric Products Inc, Automatic Electric Company, Leich Electronic Company, and Electronic Secretary Industries Inc.

## Forced Landing of Plane Makes For A Good Show

A Grumman Albatross, the U.S. Air Force amphibious rescue ship that was forced down at St. Johns last Thursday night, was probably the largest plane ever to land at the local flying field and will probably hold that honor for years to come.

An Albatross is not the type of ship that you will take off and land several times a day on a strip such as is available at the St. Johns flying field.

Local residents who saw the giant plane circling the city very low breathed a sigh of relief when Capt. Wilbur M. Hackett finally brought his ship down in a perfect landing at the airport on the Floyd Wing farm southwest of the city. Others who breathed easier were the five men aboard the huge plane.

Gerry Smith, local pilot, went up in his Piper Super Cruiser to show Hackett and his crew the way in.

The Albatross was on its way back to Selfridge Field near Mt. Clemens from Traverse City when the ceiling closed in and violent thunderstorms forced the ship off its course. Capt. Hackett was not lost, but was forced to alter his course and when he was unable to maintain radio contact and with darkness closing in with practically no ceiling he decided to set his ship down in St. Johns.

Scores of curious people visited the field Thursday night and Friday and many stayed at the field as long as five hours to watch the ship's jet-assisted take off.

Tanks of Jato gas were brought up from Selfridge Field early Friday morning and fastened to both sides of the plane, slightly to the rear of amidships. The Albatross left the ground shortly before 2 p.m. Friday, after waiting for the weather to clear.

# Clinton SSI rolls are 2nd lowest in Mich.

Information provided by George Eberhardt, director of Social Services in St. Johns, shows that there are 5,600 people in Clinton County.

The number of people receiving SSI in September was 227. Of these there were 80 people who were 65 years of age or older, 144 who were disabled and three who were receiving SSI because of blindness.

There were 282 cases of recipients of Medicaid only. One hundred and seventeen were 65 years old or older, 30 were disabled, 52 were families with children who were not receiving A.D.C. and 82 persons were under 21 years old.

Food Stamps were given to 38 SSI families and 26 households were given Medicaid and Food Stamps. Three hundred and ten just received Food Stamps.

We are the second lowest county in Michigan for the ratio of people receiving assistance of any kind. Ottawa County was the first lowest.

The Social Service office on East State Street in St. Johns has not had to cut back on personnel. Three people have transferred to different areas by their own choice.

SSI is a public assistance program and Social Security is a pension program. If you are receiving no

Social Security, you can apply for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) if you are over 65 years old or if under this age and are totally disabled. There is a property limitation so you must have what they call a "means test."

Both SSI and Social Security are administered by Social Security Administration. Social Service handles Medicaid program, Hospital nursing home care, prescriptions or office calls.

If you are eligible for SSI programs, you are automatically eligible for Medicaid.

Greenville scored the first six points of the second half and was never threatened as P-W continued to have problems executing a press offense.

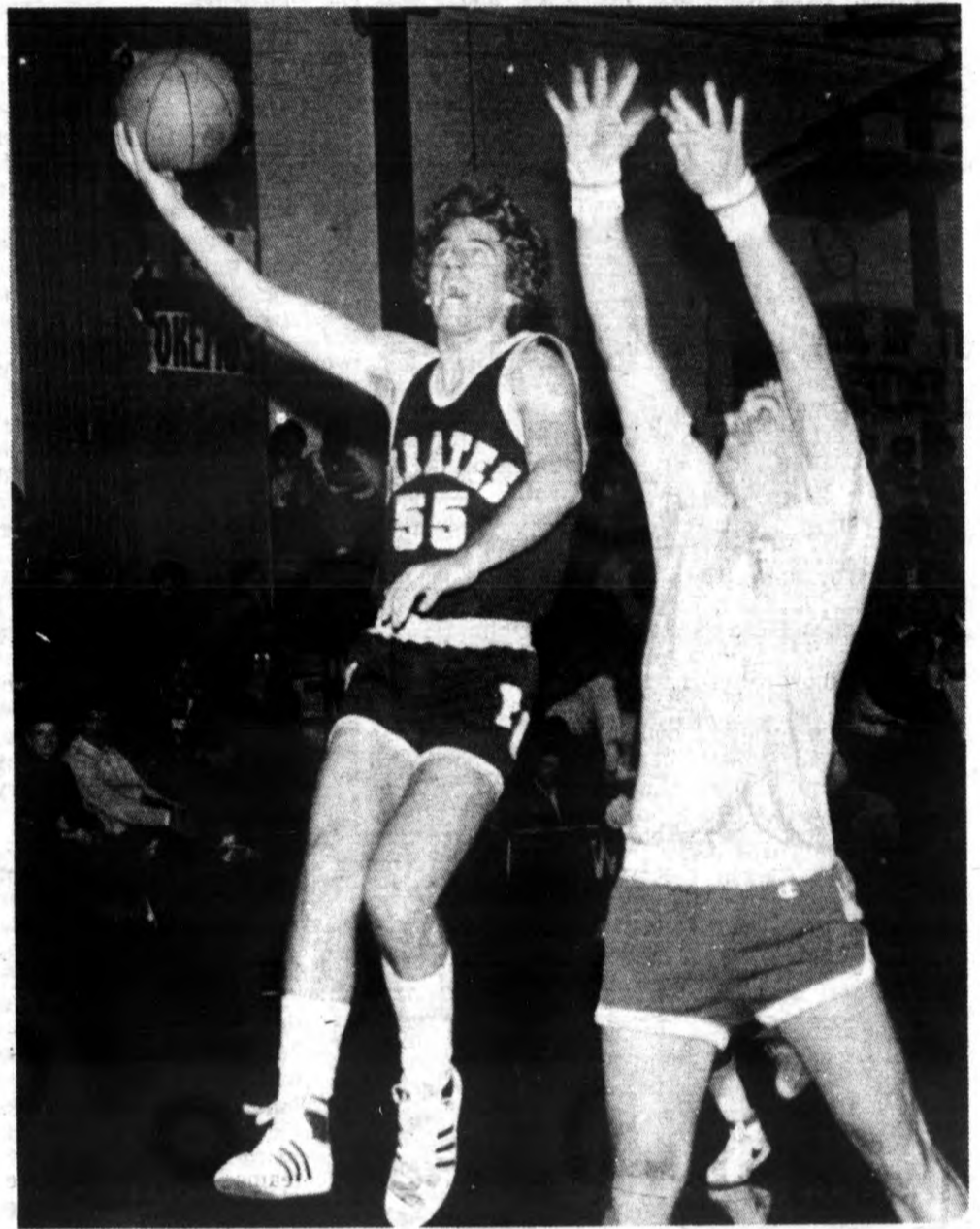
"We shouldn't have trouble with a press, but we kind of panicked," Kramer said. "We weren't breaking to the spots where we were open."

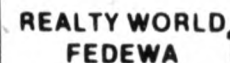

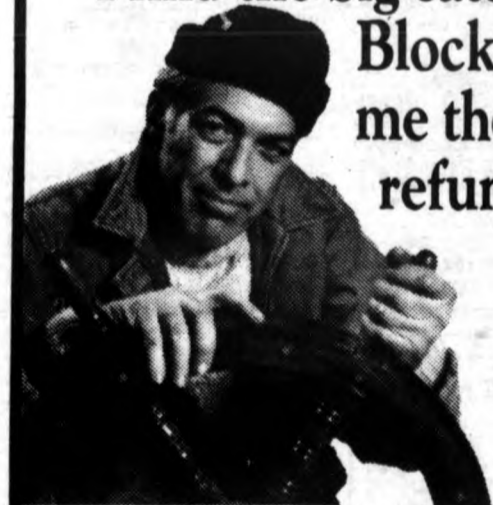
