## Recycling project sees bright future

In a report to the St. Johns City Council Monday night, a spokesman for the St. Johns Lions Club believes its monthly paper and glass drive could do much better than in previous years if the people of St. Johns realized what they were throwing away.

"If people would realize it, and save those pickle or mayonaise jars for us instead of throwing them in the trash bags, we certainly believe our volume could grow by 10 times," Dale Kuenzli told the city council.

Kuenzli felt the Lions Club Recycling drive could double or triple its newsprint volume if somehow they could retrieve the volume that still gets shipped to the landfill.

The Lions began operating the center in the fall of 1980 with the active encouragement of the city. The city purchased the operating equipment and assisted in get-

ting the drop-off center publicized and started.

The city lends continuing support by paying the center's rent, \$2,100 per year; hauling the glass to Lansing; and on occasion, have the unusable products removed and disposed of for the Lions Club.

In return, all revenue generated by the selling of these recyclables is put back into the community through special projects.

Kuenzli reported that in 1983 alone, over \$3,200 was raised and pumped back into community projects such as: providing eye exams and glasses for the needy; giving Christmas baskets to the elderly; and making contributions to the Clinton County Care Center, Special Olympics, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, and Jaws of Life.

The Lions Club is divided into three groups of approximately 15 people each to handle the collection, bundling, crushing, and clean-up procedure on the second Saturday of each month. A fourth group of approximately six people supervises the drop-off center, does any extra crushing, and picks up the donated glass from Clinton Memorial Hospital.

The drop-off center, located at Swegles and Steel Streets, is open 24 hours a day for the convenient dropping off of the newsprint, glass, and aluminum.

To date, the recycling project has handled over 58 tons of clear glass, three tons of brown glass, and three tons of green glass. It has also handled 210 tons of newsprint and a very minimal amount of aluminum.

Few problems have risen, Kuenzli reported. The majority of the problems seen has been the dropping off of unusable items such as mattresses, magazines, old shoes, dirty glasses, etc. "Some people think of the drop-off center as a junk yard," Kuenzli noted.

In other action, the city council authorized City Attorney Paul Maples to proceed with action against Mrs. Geraldine Costanzo for continued violation of the city's zoning ordinance.

Mrs. Costanzo's residence at 604 Lambert Dr. has been being used as a multi-family dwelling. The area is zoned single family.

City Assessor Diane Edwards told the city council that upon her inspection of the premises on Dec. 15, she found the residence occupied by a couple who is renting the house with an option to buy it. However, Edwards said, the basement of the dwelling is still being rented by a brother and sister.

Edwards said eventhough the number of occupants in the house has decreased, the use of the basement as a separate living quarters would still constitute a two-family dwelling.

The council also approved the purchase of an \$800 post hole digger for the Department of Public Works, while delaying a purchase of an air operated 20-ton hydraulic jack.

An automated primary sludge pumping control system was purchased for the wastewater treatment plant to provide assured operation on a 24-hour basis.

And John Kennedy was appointed to fill the vacated term of Bob Barber as the Chamber of Commerce Representative on the Parking Lot Committee. Barber stepped down when he was appointed to the City Planning Commission.

## No 'snow job' from Ancel

Last week Bath Township Board Trustee Robert Leiby attacked the Clinton County Road Commission for its lack of effort to clear the secondary roads in that township.

County News Editor Marty Ackley sat down with Bob Ancel, Superintendent/Manager of the Clinton County Road Commission, and asked him several questions dealing with the snow plowing procedures.

**Q:** The road commission has received some negative remarks, especially from Bath Township, about the lack of snow removal on the rural side roads. Is that a fair complaint?

**A:** No I don't believe it is. We have put a lot of effort in. We've tried this winter to provide a better service and we feel that we have done that. Our budget is still to the point where we cannot overspend or we cannot do everything we would like to do in snow removal, so we still have to stay within the limits of our budget.

We have had some complaints from Bath Township, but we've also had many compliments as to our improved road service into our secondary system. We have had compliments for our men working during the holidays to give the people the privilege of getting together with their families, so I don't want this all to be just negative.

**Q:** Can anything be done to solve this problem in Clinton County?

**A:** The solution, I would say, if they want their so-called back roads snow and ice cleared all the time, they have to have an increase in revenues.

**Q:** Whenever school closings are heard over the radio, Clinton County schools are always on the list. Why are the roads here unable to be plowed when other counties seem to be?

**A:** I don't believe that's a true statement. I don't believe our roads in Clinton County and our schools are closed any more than our surrounding counties.

**Q:** Could it be the fact that Clinton County is more rural than say, Ingham County?

**A:** Could be, but I certainly don't want to be compared with Ingham County.

They get three times the budget, their revenues down there are three times (that of Clinton County), and they have fewer roads.

**Q:** Who sets the priorities for the roads to get plowed, and how is that done?

**A:** The manager sets the priorities. The manager and the formans set the priority to plow the primary roads first. We normally try to keep our primary roads open during the storm and the first day after the storm, after that, we go into the secondary roads.

**Q:** Is anything going to be done about the complaints, are there going to be any changes?

**A:** We're just going to continue doing the best job we can with the revenue that we have, and no, I don't think there are going to be any changes. We feel we are doing the best we can.

**Q:** What would you tell the people on the secondary roads who don't get their

roads plowed immediately?

**A:** There is no way possible we could plow their roads immediately. Again, the priority is to do the primary roads first, and then we will get on the secondary roads as soon as possible after the storm.

**Q:** Do you think the work by the road commission is often times overlooked or taken for granted?

**A:** Oh, very much so. I don't think the people out there realize the hours and time that's put in by our men. I would like to give you an example. During the Christmas holidays, when most everybody else was with their families, our men were out day and night. They could not spend time with their families during Christmas. We spent 750 hours of overtime during the three-day Christmas holiday. From that point to New Year's, we spent another 250 hours overtime, so we had our regular work hours plus 250 hours extra during that time.

**Q:** This is a heavier winter so far than last year's, is that going to have any strain on the budget of the road commission as far as road clearing and salting?

**A:** Well, we are going to continue doing the best we can on snow removal and if it continues like it has been, something will have to give in the summer. We only have so much money and if we spend an extremely high amount on snow removal, our maintenance or our construction projects in the summer will have to give, we can't do them.

**Editor's Note:** To put things a bit more into perspective, here are some figures that may help in understanding what the Clinton County Road Commission faces.

There are 327.4 miles of primary roads in Clinton County, 810 miles of local roads, totaling 1,137 miles of county roads. That does not include the 72 miles of state highways (U.S. 27 and M-21) that the county is responsible for. The county road commission has only 20 pieces of equipment to maintain those roads and they receive their revenues from the state gas taxes and license fees only.

Since 1965, the road commission staff has been depleted by 15 employees, with a total of 51 now. Its budget has also decreased gradually since 1979.

# DeWitt school damage investigated

DeWitt School property took a heavy beating over the past week. Several windows of a school bus were shot out and over \$700 was taken from the high school safe in separate incidents.

The school bus incident took place last Tuesday afternoon as the bus driver dropped off her final passenger. The bus was travelling north on Shavey Road when someone took two shots at it.

DeWitt police believe the weapon to have been a pump pellet or BB gun. The shooting knocked out four side windows on the bus. It was believed to have come from an abandoned barn in an adjacent field.

A witness, following the bus in a car, told authorities she saw three boys run from the barn through the field. No positive identification could be made. No one was injured in the shooting and the matter is still under investigation.

The break-in at DeWitt High School occurred sometime early Monday morning. The suspects used glass cutters to break a hole in an outside window to gain access to the building, then proceeded to do the same to an office window.

Once they were in the office, the suspects moved the safe away from the

wall to attempt opening it. They must have realized they didn't have the tools to do the job so they went down to the school's wood and metal shops.

From there they took pry bars, drills, and chisels which they used to open the safe enough to grab the cash box. The cash box contained \$760 belonging to 10 different school organizations.

There has been no estimation of the other damages — an office desk, three doors, tool cabinets, and damage to the tools. This break-in and larceny remains under investigation.

Subsequently, Monday night, the DeWitt Board of Education authorized the expenditure of \$3,500 to step up security measures at both the high school and middle school.

DeWitt police are also investigating the larceny of several tools taken from a construction site on Lehigh Drive. Taken were: a power saw, power sander, power drill, extension cords, hammers, hand saw, planer, nails, and a 24-foot aluminum ladder. These tools have been valued at \$250.

DeWitt Township Police investigated an accidental shooting early last week. Ricky Cornell, 29, of 2817

Coleman and Gene Butler, 16, of 16757 West Rd., DeWitt were hunting for rabbit and got separated in the brush.

Their dog flushed out a rabbit and when Butler aimed and shot at the animal, Cornell stepped out from behind a tree and caught some of the stray buckshot. He received minor injuries and was treated and released from St. Lawrence Hospital in Lansing.

Township police also investigated a three-car accident on U.S. 127 near Lake Lansing Road around 3 a.m. Sunday.

Bryan Ward, 22, of Flint was southbound on U.S. 127 when he struck a pair of cars parked in the roadway. A passenger in the Ward vehicle, Steven Thomas, 19, also of Flint, was taken with Ward to Sparrow Hospital where they were treated for their injuries.

The cars they had hit were parked sideways in the highway. One had come and just pulled the other out of the ditch when

they were sitting in the road. They were cited for impeding traffic. Ward was cited for driving under the influence of liquor.

Three Lansing men, originally charged with first degree criminal sexual assault, have been bonded out of the Clinton County Jail and are awaiting further charges from the county prosecutor.

The three men had been charged with sexually assaulting a 27-year-old

Lansing woman in a DeWitt Township motel. She had met the men in a Lansing bar and left the bar with them in their van. She was assaulted in the van by two of the men, and again by all three in the motel room.

She escaped when two of the men left for cigarettes and liquor and the other left the room. The men were arrested by DeWitt City Police after notification from the victim.

Authorities are still investigating the allegations and waiting further action by the county prosecutor.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department handled two personal in-

jury accidents last Thursday due to icy roads.

The first involved Laurie Ann Clark, 19, of Portland who was westbound on Howe Road when she lost control of her car on the ice. She left the road and went into a marshy area. She was transported for medical care by a citizen. Her injuries were not believed to be serious.

Later that afternoon, Robert Alan Pung, 21, of Fowler was westbound on Colony Road, east of Wright Road, when he lost control of his car on the ice. The car ran into a ditch and rolled upside down. He was slightly injured and sought his own treatment.

# DeWitt purchases bank lot

DeWitt city council members approved acceptance of a downtown parking lot on Monday after ironing out the details of the contract with the lot's owner, First of America Bank.

Council members purchased the North Bridge Street lot for \$1 and agreed to buy a back hoe from the bank for \$600, city clerk Marge Lotre said.

For its part, the bank agreed to pay 1983 taxes on the lot and any appraisal and attorney fees, Lotre said. The bank also reserved six spaces in the lot for its employees.

The city will maintain the lot as it has been maintained, Lotre said, charging no fees for parking.

In other action, council members authorized a change in the downtown traffic light at Bridge and Main streets. The light will now flash one color, instead of rotating three colors, between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Lotre said the east-west street will have a flashing yellow light and the north-south street will have a flashing red light.

An overhead door for a salt shed, costing \$450, was also approved.

## Extra Cent Sales Tax

In the Republican News of Dec. 29, 1960, we learn when the four cent sales tax started.

Save pennies by shopping early.

Do your New Year's shopping early. Michigan business places will start collecting a four per cent sales and use tax, Jan. 1.

The one cent increase was voted earlier this month by the "lame duck" legislature and is in line with a directive from the voters at the Nov. 8 general election.

Generally speaking, the sales tax is a losing proposition for most merchants. They seldom collect from customers all that they must remit to the state monthly.

The new levy tax will put about \$50 million into the state's sagging treasury in the last five months of this fiscal year, and about \$120 million in a full 12 months.

The tax revenue windfall, according to Sen. Elmer R. Porter, Blissfield Republican, will not solve the state's financial troubles. He estimates the state deficit will be \$40 million when this fiscal year ends next June 30. Porter says decreasing tax col-

lections and increasing school costs, plus as accumulated deficit, will fail to close the gap between income and outgo.

Democratic leaders fix the upcoming deficit still higher, around \$55 million, explaining that rising costs will make the difference.

# County youth can perfect their skills

Clinton County young people yearning for an opportunity to develop their skills in dance, drama, or vocal or instrumental music are eligible to participate in the 1984 4-H Performing Arts Program, says Theresa Silm, 4-H Youth Agent.

Members of the 4-H Performing Arts Program then have the opportunity to join the 1984 Michigan 4-H Performing Arts Troupe.

"The arts program is an excellent opportunity for young people to acquire self-confidence while learning valuable artistic skills," Silm explained. "The Michigan 4-H Performing Arts Troupe gives members a chance to travel and meet new people across the state."

A series of in-depth arts workshops will be held on weekends in January through March for all interested young people. Workshop participants must be at least 13 years of age. Silm pointed out that participants aren't required to have an extensive background in the performing arts to attend the workshops.

Young people interested in troupe membership

must be at least 15 years old by Feb. 1, 1984, and no more than 18 years old or in their last year of high school.

Over the past four years, the Michigan 4-H Performing Arts Troupe has entertained more than 100,000 people throughout the Midwest. Major appearances include performances at the Pontiac Silverdome, the Upper Peninsula and Michigan State fairs, Boblo Island and the Grand Rapids Arts Festival.

The troupe has also performed with a variety of professional acts, including the New Christy Minstrels, The Sunshine Express and the internationally acclaimed Arete Mime Troupe.

According to Silm, musicians are especially needed for the coming troupe season, but any young person interested in honing his or her performing skills is invited to apply for membership. Interested youths don't have to be current 4-H members, but they must agree to enroll in a 4-H arts project in their county upon acceptance as troupe members.

Two weekend rehearsal

camps will be held for members of the Michigan 4-H Performing Arts Troupe, as well as residency and preview programs at MSU's Wharton Center for Performing Arts, the home of the Michigan 4-H Performing Arts Troupe.

There are no membership or application fees for the 4-H Performing Arts Program. Participants are responsible for their transportation to and from workshops, camps, rehearsals, and preview and residency programs. Troupe members are responsible for cost of approximately \$100, which covers meals and lodging for the troupe preview weekends, camps I and II, a T-shirt, a leotard, dance shoes, scripts and music.

The 4-H Performing Arts Program activities are made possible in part by a grant from the Michigan Council for the Arts.
