'Friends of Don Page' ask help for DJ

He lies in a Sparrow Hospital bed now, a far cry from the cheerful, dynamic person he was a mere month ago. For years he clung onto a dream he had always carried, now he clings onto life.

His name is Don Mycek. Most people in this area would know him as Don Page, the morning voice on WVGO in St. Johns.

Two years ago, at the age of 52, Don fulfilled his dream of becoming a disc jockey. He left a catering service he had owned and operated for 21 years in the Detroit area, and began chasing a dream he had longed for since dabbling in radio many years ago.

After attending the Specs Howard School of Broadcasting in Detroit, Don got a job working at the original WVGO in Lansing who's Music Of Your Life format was well-suited to not only his tastes, but style as well.

When that station dropped the format, WQTK in St. Johns picked it up and brought Don Page and his talents north to Clinton County. WQTK changed its call letters to WVGO, Don had his disc jockey job again, he moved into a duplex apartment in town, and everything couldn't have been going better.

Suddenly on Dec. 6, everything crashed down around Don. As he was going on the air that morning, he suffered a crippling stroke. On the way to the hospital in a comatose condition, he also suffered an epileptic seizure.

The situation looked bleak for the next few days and he required brain surgery on Dec. 9 to relieve a build up of fluid on the brain. He was unconscious for 23 hours and in grave condition while his family stood by in the hospital waiting room area. Last Rites were given twice.

On Saturday, Dec. 10, after a long night and day of waiting, Don finally gained consciousness after a grim warning that further bleeding, which had developed, would be fatal. This did not occur and the family's long wait and prayers were heard and rewarded.

Don's sister, Adele Copperstone, said, "At first he spoke clear and garbled, fast and slow, understandable and irrational, singing and sassy. But we were glad to hear anything and went home a happy family hoping for the best."

Doctors still do not know how much brain damage Don has suffered. They do not believe he was paralyzed during the stroke, and hope that therapy can help

correct his sadly garbled and slurred speech.

Copperstone said the doctors were just stunned. "They couldn't believe that he made it through, they didn't expect him to pull out of it."

She said Don is in relatively good spirits, but is worried he will not respond to speech therapy — an emotion anyone would feel if it could end their livelihood.

Meanwhile, bills for his expensive health care are piling up for his financially-strapped family, which includes a daughter from a former marriage.

Unfortunately for Don and his family, he had not had enough time on his new job to acquire medical insurance, and Copperstone is pleading, on Don's behalf, for help.

"It has cost \$10,000 already just for the room," she said. "That's not coun-

ting any of the doctor's bills. It could run between \$20,000 and \$30,000!"

A group calling themselves "Friends of Don Page" have been mailing flyers to faithful WVGO listeners asking for help. In part, the flyer reads:

"Don is a devoted enthusiast of the big band sound. His lifelong dream is to be a DJ playing the real music he loves and respects. Don's enthusiasm, wit, and vitality come out to us over the air. It is always a thrill to listen as he talks about our favorite songs and artists. Don both stimulates our memories and helps us realize our music is as enjoyable and entertaining today as it ever was.

"We all feel an empty sadness that our wonderful friend Don Page has such a tragic problem. I don't think any of us will listen to

the Music Of Your Life and not think of Don Page. Please make it possible for Don to return to us. We are urgently asking for your

financial assistance."

A trust account has been set up with Michigan National Bank in Don's name. Contributions can be sent

For building, renovation

Voters face two issues

Voters in the St. Johns School District will go to the polls, probably on March 26, to vote on a bond issue to fund the building of a new elementary school in the city and make needed renovations to the district's rural schools.

The St. Johns Board of Education voted last week to adopt the recommendation of a special Citizens Committee on School Organization (CCSO) to close Central and Perrin-Palmer elementary schools, build a new school near the high school, and make needed repairs and renovations to the other elementary schools in the district.

The voters will be voting on either 2.35 mills over 20 years, or 2.20 mills over 25 years.

The board passed three motions. One was to accept the recommendation of the CCSO and authorize the superintendent to take whatever action is necessary for their implementation; second was the support of the board of these recommendations and pledge to work toward the implementation; and third to tentatively establish March 26 as the date to put the bond issue before the voters, pending approval of the county's elections commission.

Several reasons were given why the date March 26 was chosen. They were: it comes within a week of spring recess; it won't be bothered by the Easter Holidays; it lends greater exposure from the media due to a similar bond issue in the Lansing Waverly School District; it gives ample planning time for the millage

Hospice seeks volunteer aid

Hospice for Clinton County, developed by staff members of Clinton Memorial Hospital just over a year ago, is hoping that area residents will take a good look at their New Year's resolutions this year.

"We need more volunteers, especially in the outlying areas, willing to give a few hours occasionally to help ease the burdens facing families of terminally ill persons," explained Jan Gramlich, Hospice Head Nurse. "Not everyone involved with Hospice needs to work directly with the patient — that's their individual preference. But there are so many 'little' things that can be done by volunteers that make the real difference in our patients' lives."

Offered through Clinton Memorial Hospital Home Health Services, Hospice for Clinton County is a carefully-coordinated network of physicians, nurses, clergy and volunteers who, together, provide support to the terminally ill person and his family. Hospice has already served over 30 patients in Clinton County in only its first year and has been well-received by those involved.

"Your Hospice program has certainly helped me," Mrs. Marie Herrmann, whose husband is terminally ill, told Gramlich. "I don't know what we would have done without your help. Especially being so far out here in the country. There's all those questions

that you helped me with; things I didn't know if I should bother the doctor about, but they still worried me. Having a volunteer certainly is nice. I know I can call her if I need anything. She offers to run errands, she visits with us, and does so many things that are appreciated."

Gramlich is optimistic that the volunteer ranks, often referred to as the "backbone" of Hospice, will continue to grow and provide the kind of support that is so special to patients and families like the Herrmanns.

Another volunteer training session is scheduled to begin in January. The training program consists of 10 sessions, each lasting two hours. Anyone interested in more information is urged to call 224-6881, Ext. 274.

"Retired persons and those not working during the day may want to consider becoming a part of our 'Hospice Rainbow,'" Gramlich explained. "The quality of a terminally ill person's remaining life is dependent upon the support we're able to give. Without volunteers, the task is not complete."

Gramlich emphasized that anyone may volunteer and pointed out that outlying areas of Clinton County are especially in need of those special people who help make "every moment matter."

St. Johns 'Good Samaritan' group

"Let us stop just saying we love people; let us really love them, and show it by our actions." (I John 3:18)

Using this rationale, the St. Johns Ministerial Association and other local organizers are in the process of forming what will be called "Good Samaritan Services of Clinton County."

Good Samaritan Services is set up to involve members of each church in Clinton County in responding to individual and family needs that arise, or currently exist, in the area where their church is located.

"There can be no more important rationale for this worthy endeavor than that it gives believers the opportunity to put their Christian faith and love to work in the service of those in need," the organizers said. "Unemployment, decreased state and federal funding for helping service programs, public resistance to tax increases, and ever-increasing human needs underline the urgent need for churches to become focal points of compassion within their communities. The church, Christ's Body on earth, has all the resources and gifts it needs to change lives and communities."

Good Samaritan Services will act as a clearinghouse which acts as a liaison between the participating churches, individuals in need and area agencies. Staffed by volunteer coordinators, the clearinghouse develops a need analysis procedure to determine the nature, extent and legitimacy of needs.

Good Samaritan also develops a cooperative relationship between public and private helping services agencies, thereby reducing the unnecessary duplication of services, identifying and teaching self-help skills to chronic dependents and responding more effectively to needs. These agencies develop an inventory of community resources for the provision of basic services, including food, clothing, furniture, housing and transportation to people in need.

Good Samaritan divides the area to be served into church zones, with participating churches — Good Samaritan churches — assuming responsibility for the needs which originate in their zone areas.

Each Good Samaritan church designates at least two contact people who are trained to identify and draw on the volunteer and material resources of their church to meet the referred need.

The needs come to the attention of Good Samaritan Services in four ways: church, referrals, agency referrals and direct client contact. Working cooperatively with the area helping agencies, the clearinghouse will thoroughly examine the

nature, extent and legitimacy of the individual's need and determine if other agencies have already assisted the individual.

The referrals will fall in one of four categories: Individuals requiring highly specialized legal, medical or psychiatric assistance will be referred to the appropriate agencies.

Individuals requiring short-term services or centralized program services available at community agencies or churches will be referred to these organizations.

Chronic dependents are required to meet certain self-help conditions appropriate to their situation before they will receive any assistance.

All other needs are referred to a zone church contact person who identifies the appropriate volunteer or material church resource to meet the need.

Many activities and services do not require the centralized administrative structure of local agencies. These programs can be offered by a church member, a church group or several churches.

Good Samaritan Services of Clinton County

hopes to have all 70 congregations in the county to be involved in the program.

The St. Johns Ministerial Association began investigating the possibility of such an organization about a year ago after seeing the success of similar programs throughout Michigan.

The Rev. Hugh Banniga, who serves on the Good Samaritan Board of Directors, explained why the Ministerial Association desired such a program.

"They have had daily contact with a lot of human needs and transient people that come through town and feel a lot of local needs are becoming identified," Banniga said. "They felt that one top priority was to identify the chronic

got close - our defense took over the game," Smith commented. Potterville scored only three field goals in the second half of play.

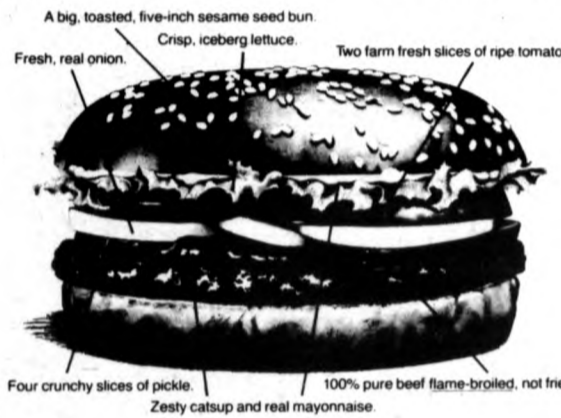

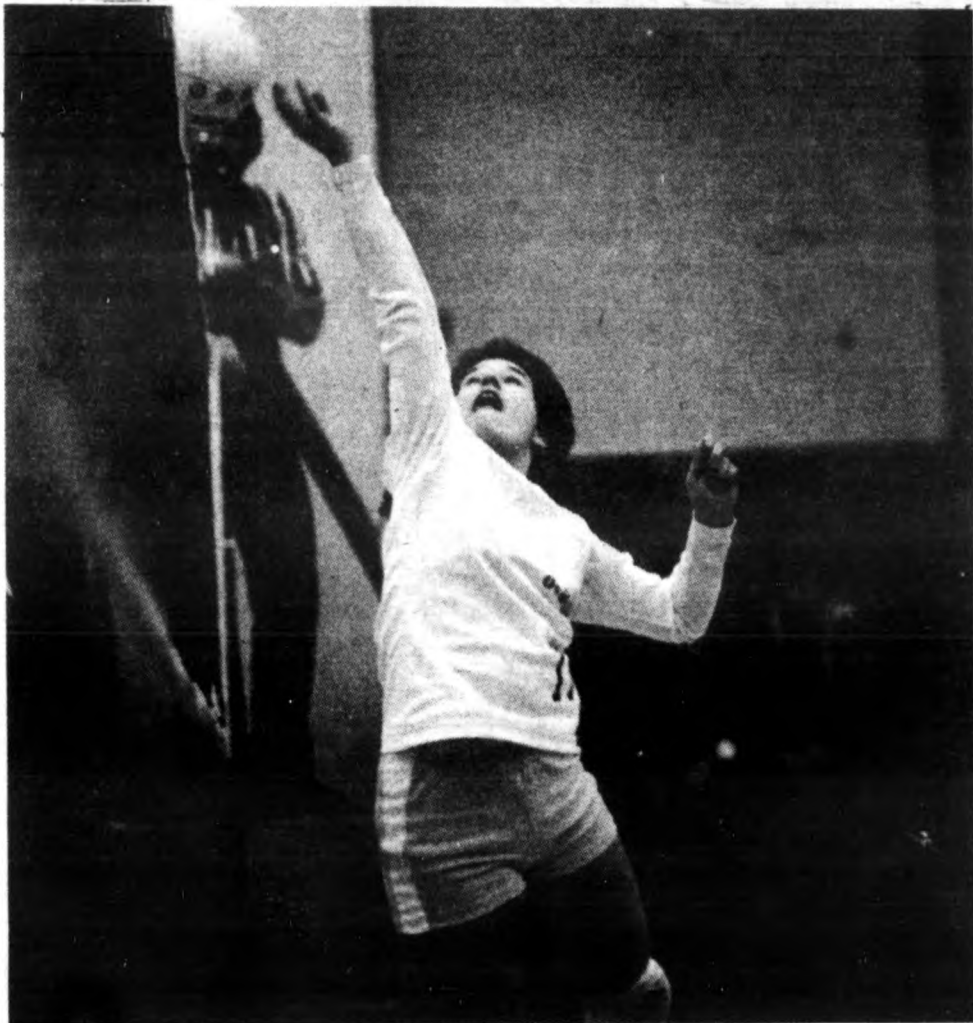

Bath sports picture is better now

Funds for athletics in Bath have been hard to find since the district was hit by a budget crunch in 1977. The Bath Athletic Boosters have had to step in and fund some programs in order to preserve the entire athletic structure.

But a recent economic upswing has brightened the sports picture in Bath, according to high school athletic director Gary Boyce.

"It's getting much more solid," Boyce said. "There's talk among the board members that they'd like to take over funding the entire program, but that's

just preliminary discussion. We've got lots of projects on hold, it's just a matter of getting the money."

Boyce pointed to the reinstatement of middle school sports as one sign of the solidifying financial structure.

"Getting the feeder system back is a big step," he said. "We're getting more parental support and support from the board, too. We're on the upswing.

"We're in a better financial situation that we were two years ago. At one point in time, things were looking pretty bleak. But fortunately, things are back on the road to recovery, like everything else in Michigan."

For the past three years, the boosters

have funded five varsity sports — boys and girls cross country, wrestling, baseball and softball. The school board funded football, boys and girls basketball, volleyball and boys and girls track.

This year, the boosters took on the responsibility of funding middle school sports, which include girls and boys basketball and girls and boys track.

To pay for those sports and plan for the future, the boosters are selling lottery

tickets to give away \$600 every month for one year.

Buying a yearly ticket for \$60 gives one a spot in a \$500 drawing and \$100 drawing each month.

Paying on a 12-month, \$5 per month payment plan entitles one to a \$500 drawing every month.

Since sales began in December, 200 tickets have been sold, according to Betsy Clark, secretary of the boosters. "We've really done quite well," Clark said. "We have had a lot of community spirit."

The first lottery drawing will be held on Jan. 23 at the high school.

Local business provides exercise area

Thwack! The golfer swings his driver back smoothly and follows through on the ball as it screams off the tee.

The exercise room used to be rented to a dance studio in the afternoons. Brewbaker got the idea to rent it about four years ago, and it has gradually turned into a company exercise room.

The golf net was and is Brewbaker's favorite piece of equipment.

"It was a matter of trying to keep in shape for golf for the winter months," he explained. "It's fun to swing the golf clubs in the winter time. You can hit as many as 50-60 balls. I've hit as many as 100. It's the next best thing to golf."

Brewbaker said the men generally use the exercise room at night, while the women use it on their lunch breaks.

"It's a good break for them," he said. "Most of them don't live in town,

and they have nothing else to do. It's a good relief. In the insurance business, you have a lot of pressure. It's a good relief valve."

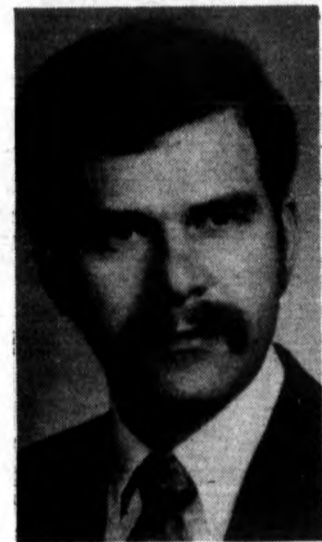
Assistant prosecutor seeks bench

Koenigsknecht

was awarded meritorious unit awards and nominated for Marine of the Month status.

Koenigsknecht returned to the University of Michigan after military service and received his Juris Doctorate in May of 1973.

In 1973, Koenigsknecht joined an East Lansing law firm, gaining experience in criminal law, wills and estates, divorce proceedings, child custody matters and many other areas of civil practice. He practiced at all levels of the state courts, as well as in the Federal District Courts in Michigan.

Koenigsknecht joined the Clinton County Prosecuting Attorney's Office in 1975 where he rose to the rank of Chief Assistant Prosecutor. He has represented the county in several hundred jury trials involving criminal matters, ranging from speeding tickets to felony prosecutions. In addition to trial work, Koenigsknecht also represents the county in hearings in Probate, District and Circuit Court as well as handling motions, arguments and research and writing in the Court of Appeals and the Michigan Supreme Court.

Koenigsknecht believes his background makes him qualified to serve as District Court Judge.

"I have worked in all phases of the practice of law and am well aware of the responsibilities and the

needs of the office of District Judge, and I believe I can meet these responsibilities and needs," he said. "I believe in a judiciary that is not only responsive to the rights and needs of the accused but to the needs and desires of the society as a whole.

"I believe that I come from a very unique background, having been

born and raised in rural Clinton County and having spent the first 18 years of my life on a functioning farm. I believe that background and upbringing has and will continue to guide me and allow me to view matters in a practical and common sense manner."

Koenigsknecht is a member of the Clinton County Bar Association;

the Michigan Bar Association; the American Bar Association; the Prosecuting Attorney's Association of Michigan; the Knights of Columbus; the St. Johns Rotary Club; and the Lawyers Club of the University of Michigan.

Koenigsknecht and his family are members of the St. Joseph Catholic Church in St. Johns.

Agencies share big windfall

A dozen area human service agencies will share a windfall of nearly \$112,000 earmarked to provide food and shelter for those in need. Robert Berning, director of the Capitol Area United Way said, "Usually we process between 600 and 750 requests for assistance per month - lately we've received between 1,500 and 2,000 such requests each month."

Berning said the money has been allocated through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Funds must be used to provide either food or shelter. "Our whole emergency service area is flooded with requests for help, despite recent improvement in the economy," Berning added.

FEMA was designated by Congress to chair a national board of human service agencies comprised of agencies such as Catholic Social Services, the Jewish Relief Fund, and United Way, according to United Way spokesperson Janet Narezo.

Narezo said FEMA last spring allocated \$50 million in emergency food and shelter funds. Regulations required the money be spent by September, 1983. "The new allocation is a pleasant surprise and badly needed," Narezo said.

To qualify for the emergency funds, a service area must have an 8 percent unemployment rate with 18,000 persons out of work, or a 13 percent unemployment rate with a thousand unemployed, Narezo said.

FEMA named Capitol Area United Way

to administer the program in this area. Ingham and Eaton counties qualified for assistance, as did the metropolitan Lansing area. But funds allocated will go to agencies also serving Clinton County, according to Narezo.

Agencies receiving funds are the Greater Lansing Food alliance, Rural Emergency Outreach, Cristo Rey, Economic Crisis Center, Loaves and Fishes, the Red Cross, Salvation Army, St. Vincent DePaul Society, Volunteers of America, The Housing Foundation, the YMCA, and Helping Hands of Eaton County.

Metropolitan Lansing will receive the bulk of the FEMA funds netting \$83,787, while rural Ingham County will receive \$19,291. Eaton County will obtain \$8,805. Funding will be made directly to the service organizations and be in their hands available for use by early February, according to Berning.

Berning estimates the \$112 thousand allocation will provide more than 82,000 meals and 16,466 nights of shelter for needy families in the tri-county area. FEMA funds in this grant must be used by the various agencies by May 15, 1984.

Berning commented, "Even though the recession is receding, demand for assistance in the area is still high. Demand never rises immediately when economic times get tough - they rise as people and families expend personal resources. Then, as things get better, there's usually a residual need for assistance until things even out."

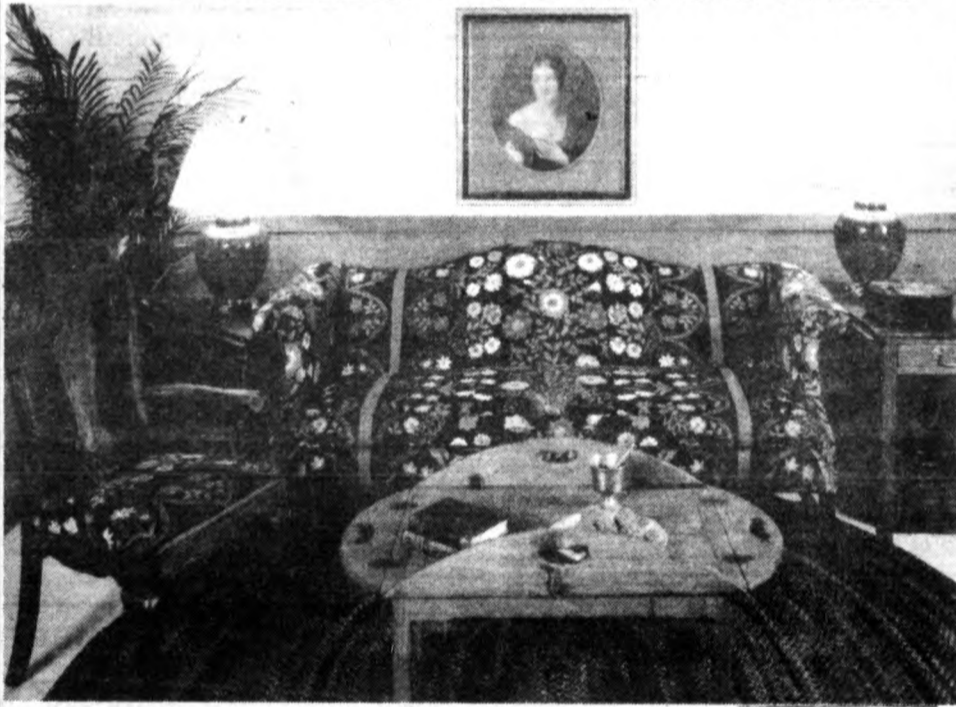

Free cheese for those qualified

Capital Area Community Services, Inc. and its' Clinton County Community Services Outreach Office announces that between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Monday, Jan. 23 and Tuesday, Jan. 24, the Clinton County Community Services Office will distribute free U.S.D.A. Commodity Cheese to income eligible residents.

Everyone who received cheese and has a registration card needs to bring their card to the church during the distribution. No other information is needed and recertification is not necessary at this time.

The distribution will be at the Nazarene Church, 515 N. Lansing St., St. Johns.

For those individuals who did not apply for a card, you must do so before the January distribution.

To qualify for the program an applicant must be at or below the following guidelines for family income: family of 1, \$6,075; for 2, 8,175; 3, 10,275; 4, 12,375; for each additional member, add \$2,100.

Presentation of proof of income is necessary to receive a registration card. The following is proof of income: copy of Social Security, SSI, or VA check; Benefit Report from the Social Security Administration; copy of Homestead Property Tax Credit Claim; State or Federal Income Tax Returns; rental or lease

agreement from Subsidized Housing or a Benefit Report or Form letter from the Department of Social Services Office dated within the past three months. Food Stamp and Medicaid cards are not proof of income.

Registration cards are available at the Clinton County Community Services office, 100 S. Ottawa St., St. Johns between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday until Jan. 20. After that date no registration cards will be issued until Jan. 25. Cards will not be available at the church nor at Community Services during the distribution. Everyone must apply before Jan. 20.

abusers of social services and wanted to coordinate the whole effort into one organization."

Banniga also said that because of the limited time and budgets of the local agencies, they could not fill all of the needs of those who come to them for help.

"But," he said, "there is more than enough human resources in each congregation, however, to meet the needs that arise to supplement the limits of the help agencies."

Pat Erhardt, one of the three Good Samaritan coordinators, said there is

an unlimited body of talent out in each congregation with nowhere to channel their talents and energies and hopes Good Samaritan will be the avenue.

She said that Good Samaritan Services will be able to provide some services that the help agencies can't. Good Samaritan will provide for people who fall between the cracks, she said.

The project will start in the St. Johns area and then proceed to branch out into the other parts of Clinton County. Erhardt said they want to get things rolling in the St. Johns area first and once it got rolling, it would make more sense to the

other churches in the county and easier to teach it.

Banniga believes the challenge will be to see how many congregations in the county they can get involved in the program. He optimistically would like to see all the churches in the county enrolled in Good Samaritan by Easter, but says it may take close to a year to get them all involved.

But with the groundwork set, Good Samaritan Services of Clinton County is on its way. Its next step is to get the local churches in the St. Johns area to find their contact people so the program can continue on schedule.

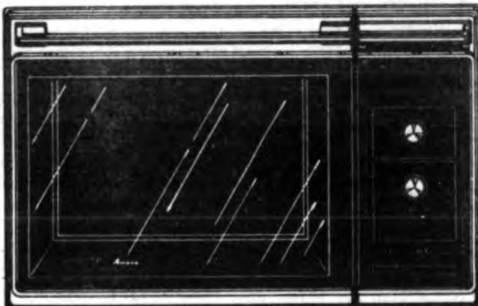
