## Green, Commission still at odds over salaries

"The relationship between the court and the board is like lurching from one situation to another," said presiding Circuit court judge Randy Tahvonen. Speaking to the News about the current salary dispute between county commissioners and circuit court judge Timothy Green, Judge Tahvonen said, "There never really has been a thoughtful procedure for commissioners and the court to address issues of mutual concern."

Judge Tahvonen said failure of the state legislature to clarify the situation has, "Left us out in the cold." At issue now is a Dec. 28, 1983 circuit court administrative order, handed down by Judge Green, ordering The Clinton County Clerk and the county treasurer to pay 10 circuit court employees wages in amounts differing from those set by the county government.

Catch 22 in this difference of opinion is the taxpayers of the county have to foot legal bills for both sides in the dispute. Last time it happened, about \$5,000 in county funds was spent on legal bills for both parties. "It

was almost evenly divided between lawyers for commissioners and for the court," county administrator Bill LeFevre said Friday.

Squabbles between Judge Green and county commissioners are not new, according to LeFevre. "The salary issue rose last year, but in other, subtle ways it's been going on for some time," LeFevre said.

LeFevre noted Judge Tahvonen took over as presiding judge Jan. 1, and said, "We're preparing a letter for him now, asking him to meet with commissioners to resolve the impasse." LeFevre said a Jan. 17 meeting with Grand Rapids attorney Jack Clarey didn't help much. "He told us we'd either have to resolve the issue in discussion, or file suit." Legal fees in such an action, "Could cost us much more than the nine thousand in salary increases Judge Green ordered," he added.

At the heart of the issue, LeFevre said, is, "Who's going to run the county; the legislative or judicial branch?" He said commissioners recently ordered a job description and wage study and, "Salaries ordered by the county

board were in line with the study's recommendations; those ordered by Judge Green are out of line and too high."

LeFevre said conflicts between, "Co equal branches of government are usually difficult to resolve." He said the county would have no trouble meeting salaries set within guidelines recommended by the county's wage study, "But we know from past experience the money won't be there to meet

these new salaries."

LeFevre and treasurer Gerald Shepard are hopeful the matter will be resolved quickly. "It's the kind of thing that could adversely affect morale in the court house, though I don't think it has done so at this time," LeFevre said.

Judge Tahvonen agreed. "I'm sure county employees are talking about the situation and it's probably eroding morale, but I'm sure we'll be able to work it out," he said. He

said the question is serious and hard to deal with, adding, "It has a tendency to divide the staff and the community."

Judge Tahvonen said as presiding judge he could, "Void the order handed down by Judge Green, but I don't believe it would be wise. Perhaps it may be a question for a visiting judge to examine and reach a decision."

Complicating the matter are legal phrases such as, "Reasonable and

necessary" and "Effective functioning of the courts." Both are terms used often by Judge Green in various documents relating to the salary dispute. "You'll hear both terms used often as the matter progresses," Judge Tahvonen told the News Friday.

Similar disputes between county commissions and circuit courts are awaiting litigation in, "At least six counties, perhaps as many as ten," Judge Tahvonen concluded.

## Treasurer retiring in December

Walking into the county treasurer's office to meet Gerald Shepard it's difficult to believe the man is ready to retire. He carries 70 years on a face and frame that could pass for fifty with ease. A soft-spoken man, he smiles when he rises to shake your hand.

Gerald Shepard has been serving Clinton County citizens in one way or another since first winning a post on the Bath School Board in 1942. Since then he's served as a trustee on the Bath Township Board and as a township and county commissioner, prior to being elected county treasurer.

Mr. Shepard was born in Gratiot County, and his family moved to Bath when he was ten years of age. "I went to school in Bath and was a seventh grader when the school was blown up by a disgruntled taxpayer on May 18, of '27," he recalled with a momentary downcast glance.

"No person could forget the experience when I hear about bombs and explosions on the news, I know what they're talking about," he said. Nearly

three dozen children and teachers were killed in the incident. "My younger sister was in school that day. She was downstairs and just got knocked around a bit," he commented.

"We all had a tough time getting over the experience, but it taught us to stick together," Shepard said, adding, "The stick-togetherness is still a visible thing in Bath."

"I've enjoyed my years in government, but it's time

to turn the job over to someone else. I'm ready for a break," he smiled.

Shepard said he'll support 10 year deputy treasurer Patricia Purtill who will seek the post in the next election (see story elsewhere in this issue). "She's been indispensable a real go-getter," Shepard said.

Shepard, and his wife Ila, raised four children of their dairy farm near Bath. Three children still live in the Clinton County

area. "We'll probably do some travelling, and we both like to garden. I've also got a small orchard I enjoy tending," Shepard said. Mr. Shepard will retire Dec. 31, this year.

Shepard has been a member of the Michigan Township Association where he rose to be first Vice-president; and he was 1982-83 President of the state Association of County Treasurers.

## Michigan Highway Deaths: A Five-Year Downhill Ride



Michigan's 1983 traffic death toll of 1,300 is the state's lowest since 1945 when 1,150 persons were killed. It marked the fifth straight year of declining traffic deaths in the state, and last year's unofficial total is 37 percent below 1978's figure of 2,076. In addition, Michigan's preliminary 1983 death rate of 2.05 per 100 million vehicle miles traveled is the state's lowest ever. The Automobile Club of Michigan cites increased safety belt use, more drunk driving arrests and stricter enforcement of speed limits, conservative driving during the recessionary period and highway design improvements as major factors in the five-year decline.

## Nutrition service

More than 150,000 older persons were served 8.8 million meals during the fiscal year ending Sep. 30, 1983, according to a report released by the State Office of Services to the Aging. Director Olivia P. Maynard said that's a 12.7 percent increase in congregate and home delivered meals served under the Community Nutrition Services Program over the previous year. Clinton, Eaton and Ingham counties had a 9.4 percent increase in congregate meals served to individuals, and a 24 percent delivery increase.

"Throughout the year, we encouraged agencies to identify and serve isolated and poor older people, those feeling the stress of escalating health, housing and utility costs. The end result," says Maynard, "was the number of participants in the program increased by 7.9 percent."

Maynard said the majority of meals served are provided in 668 meal sites throughout the state. The sites are open up to five days a week. A limited number of meals are delivered to homebound seniors.

The report, which covers the period of Oct. 1, 1982 through Sep. 30, 1983, also

stated the program reached more minority persons and economically disadvantaged older people than ever before.

## New program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, in an effort to target conservation programs to problem areas, has announced the acreage Conservation Reserve. The program provides funds for farms to apply either Permanent Vegetative Cover (alfalfa seedings) or Forest Tree Plantations on their 1984 diverted acres.

To be eligible for consideration, farms must be enrolled in a 1984 commodity program requiring an acreage reduction. The government will cost share

up to 90 percent of the installation cost of these practices, which includes seed, seedbed preparation, lime, phosphate and potash.

These acres may be used for 1984 as well as 1985 diverted acres, and must be protected during the six principle growing months of 1984. Sign-up for this program will be at the same time as the commodity program sign-up, Jan. 16 to Feb. 24. Contact your A.S.C.S. County office.

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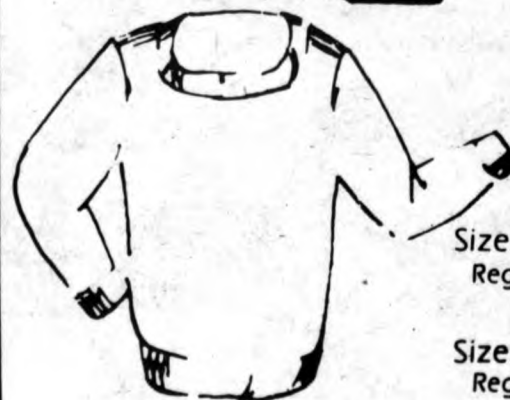
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**Editorial Page**

Perhaps the hottest debate in international trading circles right now is one of extreme interest to citizens of our state, and more particularly, our area. The issue revolves around import of Japanese autos, auto parts and accessories. Successful resolution of the conflict between governments of the two nations is critical to our nation's well-being.

Pressure is mounting in Lansing, other state capitols, and Washington to severely restrict the number of automobiles Japan exports to this country. Earlier limitations have moved the Japanese (and some European automakers) to purchase or construct manufacturing facilities in this country.

Americans often feel we can make the Japanese bend to our will in this matter-after all, they're having their own round of economic difficulties. The Japanese petrochemical industry is extremely depressed, along with some other major industries, and the Japanese even have to buy food from us in the form of grain.

Right?  
Wrong!

Quietly, unobtrusively, inscrutably, a movement is afoot in Japanese government circles, and throughout a cross-section of Japanese opinion makers, to answer our restriction of Japanese auto imports with restrictions on exports of U.S. food and grain to the island nation.

Big deal!

Yes, BIG deal.

Over the years no single country has proven a bigger buyer of American farm products than Japan. Here and there China or the Soviet Union will import more U.S. agricultural produce in a year than will Japan. But through the long haul, Japan has proven to be the most dependable big consumer of U.S. farm products.

Many experts fear a trade war with Japan over autos because American farm products are the only weapon the Japanese have available with which to fight back. Should they decide to use it, many food product and grain exporting countries will be more than happy to help balance their export/import ledger.

The U.S. position as a food exporter has slipped in recent years. It all began in the Nixon administration when the President declared a soybean export embargo. In the mid-'70's, American grain exports to most of eastern Europe were curtailed due to poor harvests here.

The 1980 grain sale embargo against the Soviet Union hurt U. S. farmers, but western Europe's grain exporters doubled sales in a year. They've never lost those markets.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently predicted American farm exports will decline this year for the fourth straight year. They're likely to fall faster and farther if we anger the Japanese over auto exports.

**Cropsey seeking special committee**

A special legislative committee to look into the health care insurance problems of the unemployed would be created under a concurrent resolution introduced by Senator Alan Cropsey (R-DeWitt).

The resolution points to "the lack of funds for the procurement of health care benefits" as the primary problem which constitutes a substantial hardship and seriously jeopardizes the financial future of the

unemployed and their families.

"The time is long overdue for us to give a serious look at the health care problems faced by many of Michigan's jobless

workers," Cropsey said. "In this period of increasing medical costs, adequate basic health care coverage is quickly becoming unaffordable for too many of our state's citizens."

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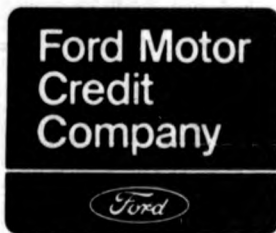

## New Jersey Pine Barrens offers diverse eco-systems

Dusia Tscherbotarew pushed through the woods looking for mushrooms, just as she did 60 years ago in the woods near her childhood home in the Ukraine. The cold wind whipped around her, but a bright pink scarf, a babushka, kept it off her face.

Suddenly she bent over and cleared away some oak leaves and pine needles. There were three mushrooms, which she examined closely.

"Is good," she said to the group of folklorists trailing her through the woods. "You eat."

Dusia Tscherbotarew came to the United States in 1951 and lives in Jackson, N.J. on the edge of the Pine Barrens. There are two Jackson churches, St. Mary's and St. Vladimir's, both with the gold onion-shaped domes marking them as Russian Orthodox. In a restaurant, photographs of Gogol and Pushkin hang on the walls, a waitress serves tea in a glass, and customers converse in Russian. A sign advertising "Meet the Candidates Night" is printed in English and Russian.

This is not the picture

most people have of the New Jersey Pinelands, whose more common image is of self-sufficient woodsmen, cranberry bogs, and scrub pines. But that is why folklorists are here.

In 1978, Congress created the Pinelands National Reserve, a million acres including about a quarter of New Jersey. The next year, the state placed the area under a commission to decide the future of the rural area in the heart of the northeastern megalopolis.

The Pinelands have come under heavy developmental pressure in recent decades, pressure which has, in turn, been resisted by environmentalists, preservationists, and scientists worried about potential destruction of many plants unique to the area.

One voice not clearly heard is that of local residents. They've been living in the woods or on the water for generations, but now either development or total preservation could destroy their way of life.

So folklorists from the Library of Congress'

American Folklife Center, working under the auspices of the Pinelands Commission, the National Park Service, and several state agencies, came to survey traditional culture of the Pinelands, to see how people live and how they view their world.

One thing quickly became apparent. There are many points of view and many diverse communities, like the Russians of Jackson, within the million acres of South Jersey encompassed by the Pinelands National Reserve borders.

"Our task is to look at the culture existing within the reserve," says Mary Hufford, the project's director. "That means looking at folklife, the folks who live in the Pinelands, and what that life consists of."

"Studies of the region abound in geology and hydrology and flora and fauna, but not much has

been done in the realm of contemporary culture. We're looking at the ways people create meaning for themselves out of the materials at hand," she said.

A dozen folklorists have worked on the project, studying the ways residents earn livings, how they prepare food, how they build boats like the clamming "garvey," and how they decorate yards.

Clifford Frazee of Forked River, near Barnegat Bay, works in cedar. In his back yard there's a big piece of cedar he's cut," Hufford says. "It wouldn't be in someone else's yard." Obviously, Frazee loves the wood, and the woods.

Frazee, in his early 60s, has a face and hands indicating the work of his life. He embodies a vast array of Pinelands occupations: He has trapped muskrats for fur, picked

cranberries, gone clamming, hunted, cut wood. He's a storehouse of information about the area, and folklorist Mal O'Connor is opening the door.

On a recent visit, O'Connor gave him maps of the area and asked him to mark anything important. Soon Frazee was noting the names of many of the sandy roads crisscrossing the woods, the names by which he knew them, and every road had its story:

"This is Jim Burke's Road. He came here from Terre Haute, over in Indiana, and he was sort of an outlaw. This gun club was Tillie and Zeb Collins' place 'fore the Civil War. The Frazees? They were foreigners. They didn't come here until 1880."

The love of place exhibited by Frazee typifies what folklorists and cultural geographers have come to realize: One of the most important elements

in a person's life is his "sense of place." How does he name it, how does he "organize" it in his mind, how does he care for it, what makes it important to him?

To understand different ways residents view the Pinelands, Nora Rubinstein, a member of the team, asked them to draw "cognitive" maps, maps of the area as it exists in each person's mind. Needless to say, the maps differ widely.

Folklorists are interested in what they see around them and in what residents tell them. Research has led them to study how cranberries are harvested and how hunters used a "sneakbox" boat hiding from ducks. Subjects range from motorcycle "enduros" in the woods to church services; from a

The bi-monthly meeting of the St. Johns City Council was held Jan. 23. At the meeting the council agreed to support and approve the Historical Society's request for a yearly donation of \$100. The donation will be used to offset billings for water and sewer.

The Commission also approved a request from the Parking Lot Committee that seven metered parking spaces on the west side, and two fifteen minute parking spaces on the east side of Spring St., be changed to one hour parking. This will make customer parking more convenient in the St. Johns Credit Union area.

The Clinton Avenue Street Improvement Update was given no final decision, therefore, the search for sufficient funds will continue. Though there are no definite talks, the Commission hopes they may obtain funds through grants, the Urban Street Program, and the Small City Block Program.

The Blastic-Prince Estates No. 4 received approval for an extension of the final preliminary plat. Mr. Blastic said he

needs more time to complete and submit final copies of the plat. If the plat is approved, it will allow twelve single family residential lots located east of S. Swegles St. and extending Hampshire and Lincolnshire Drives.

Mayor Arehart added one proposal to the agenda; the concern of the new City Charter that was to be brought up to date. The Commission received a letter from Mr. Louie Andrews and a bill of \$4,700 for the code books that were revised and brought up to date.

The Commission had received an estimate of \$3,450 with the chance to review the ordinances before it was printed. This review never took place and the Commission sent the bill back to Mr. Andrews with a letter explaining the situation, emphasizing the ordinances are already fourteen months out of date.

Mayor Arehart agreed that the issue should be "wrapped up as quickly as possible." The issue will be brought up again at the next meeting on Feb. 6 and in the next two weeks the council is in hopes they may reach a conclusion.

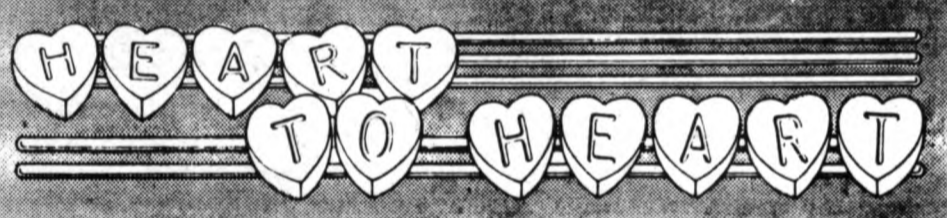

Puerto Rican beauty contest to a fox hunt, the early morning amusement of local workers who use CB radios to communicate and whose dogs ride in the rear of pickup trucks.

All this will lead to a number of books, studies,

photographic essays and development of an archive on Pinelands culture, interpretive materials for the Park Service to use explaining the Pinelands to visitors.

But the most important product will be greater appreciation of the values of people like Stephen Lee Jr., whose Irish ancestors

dug some of the area's first cranberry bogs, and who looks out the window of the house he built himself, at the homes of his two sons.
