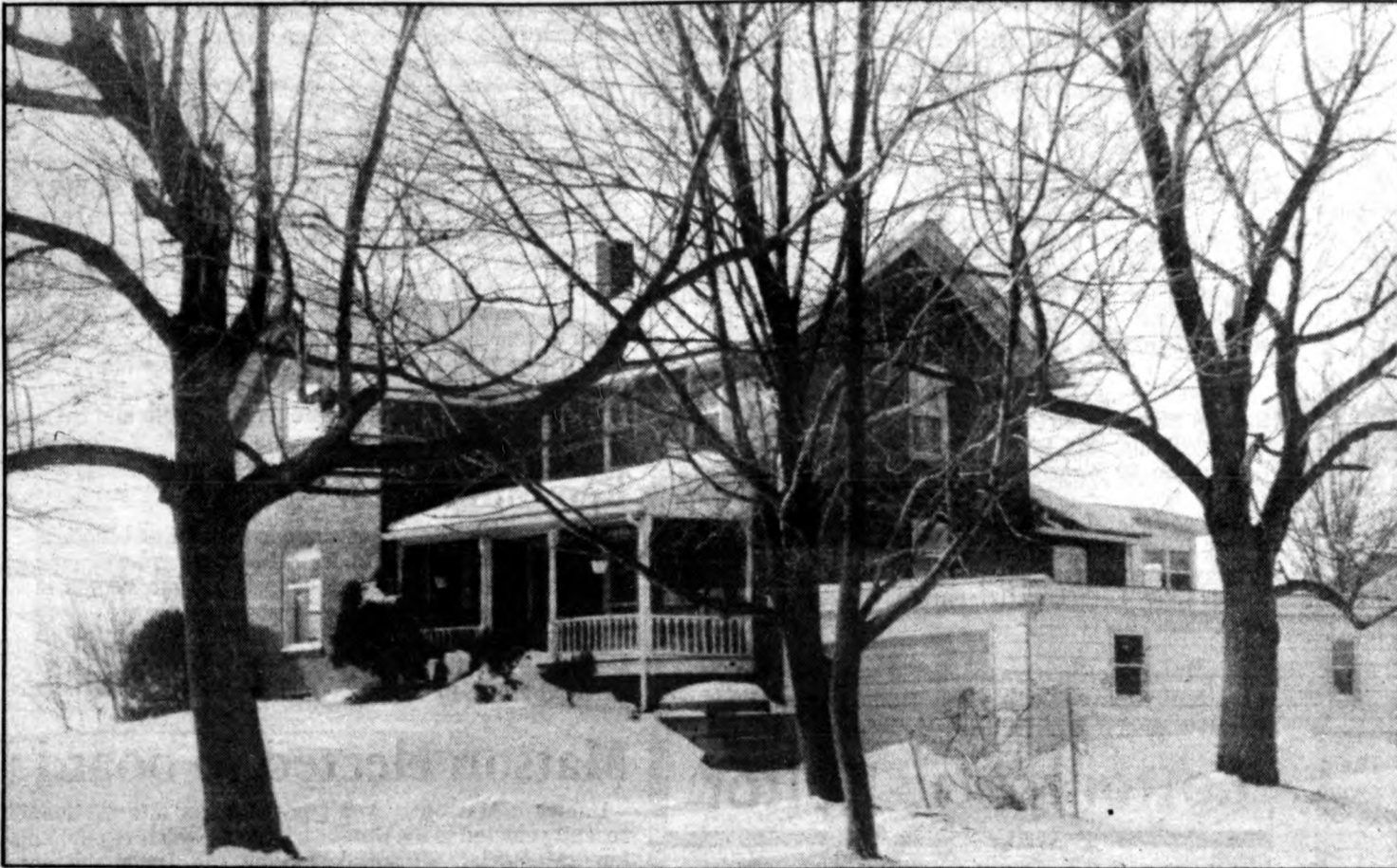

Local farm makes it to 100

A local farm is one of 26 farms in 23 counties recently certified as a Centennial Farm, according to Secretary of State Richard Austin.

Dale and June McAllister's farm at 16500 S. Grange Road was recently declared Centennial. It was bought on May 22, 1876 by their great-grandparents, Peter and Lucena Blake, from Charles

and Caroline A.S. Hitchcock.

A Centennial Farm is one which has been in continuous possession of the same family for 100 years or more. It must contain a minimum of 10 acres with an estimated sales value of \$50, or if less than 10 acres, gross sales of \$250. Only land, and not buildings, is considered in qualifications.

More than 4,000 Michigan farms have been certified as Centennial Farms since the program was inaugurated in 1948, Austin said.

Certificates to owners are provided by the Michigan History Division of the Department of State. Markers are provided by the Detroit Edison and Consumers Power companies.

Haneckow to seek sheriff post for Clinton County

Terry Haneckow, 44, of 2265 W. Parks Road, St. Johns, has announced his intention to run for the position of Clinton County Sheriff in the upcoming election.

Haneckow has spent his adult life in the law enforcement field, and is currently ending 11 years with the Clinton County Sheriff Department as a deputy.

Prior to the Clinton County position, Haneckow served Montcalm County Sheriff's Department, and the cities of Carson City and St. Louis, spending five and one-half years as Police Chief in Carson City.

A graduate of Rogers City High School, he also received a degree in law enforcement, associate's degree in business, pre-police administration from the Lansing Community College.

After an honorable discharge from the Army where he served with the Military Police, he began his education in the law enforcement officers association, basic training; and has completed an 80-hour

course in criminal investigation and a 40-hour course in traffic law enforcement at Michigan State University; as well as seminars at Michigan Technological University in emergency operations simulations, fire training seminars from the University of Michigan and the Region 8 Narcotic School, where he completed the 80-hour course in narcotics investigations.

A member of the First Baptist Church in St. Johns, Haneckow has also been active in the Junior Chamber of Commerce and has devoted 10 years to Scouting; where he served as a committee man, and assistant post advisor with the Explorers and as assistant scoutmaster and scoutmaster. He received Vigil Honors, in the Order of the Arrow, from the Boy Scouts of America, in connection with his interest in the boys in the area.

Haneckow has been with his earning of the Certificate of Achievement by Post No. 380 of Carson City; and a citation for

professional knowledge and courage awarded by Clinton County.

A member of the Clinton County Car-Seat Safety Committee and the St. Johns Right to Life movement, Haneckow spends much of his time and energy in his hobbies of camping, hiking, swimming, biking, and canoeing. He recently completed the bike trip to the Mackinaw Bridge. He has managed Little League, and states that he collects stamps and enjoys a good game of chess.

Schuette declares candidacy

Bill Schuette (pronounced Shoo-tee) has announced his intention to seek the Republican nomination in Michigan's 10th Congressional District — the seat currently held by incumbent Democrat Don Albosta.

Schuette, an attorney from Midland, toured the district with press stops in Lansing, Midland, Traverse City, Cadillac and Mt. Pleasant.

"I enter this race with no illusions about the tremendous task before me. I am absolutely confident in my ability to wage an effective campaign and to deal with the many difficult issues facing our nation," Schuette said.

Schuette outlined the need for real leadership in the 10th District as his overall campaign theme. "The theme of my campaign will focus on the pressing need for new leadership in the district — leadership not only for today, but, more importantly, leadership for tomorrow. We simply cannot afford two more years of 'politics as usual,'" he stated.

Schuette continued to explain his ideas regarding leadership for the 10th Congressional District. "First, new leadership for tomorrow means a consistent farm policy which allows this industry to implement long-range planning. Agriculture, a major economic base in this district, has for too long suffered from stop-gap crisis management."

"My No. 1 commitment will be to serve on the Agriculture Committee, and I have already spoken to the Republican House leadership regarding my appointment."

Schuette then outlined the balance of his "leadership theme."

"New Leadership for Tomorrow means to stop wasteful government spending and to begin instead to invest in people for a better future."

"New Leadership for Tomorrow also means jobs. While the rest of the country undergoes an economic resurgence, the 10th District lags behind."

"New Leadership for tomorrow also means working to improve the quality of life — in education, health care, and the environment."

"And lastly, New Leadership for Tomorrow means returning government back to its proper role — we need better government — not more government," he concluded.

Schuette closed his announcement by praising the economic programs of Ronald Reagan.

"Domestically, Ronald Reagan and his Republican allies in Congress have changed the shape, the size and the scope of the federal government. The results of these new Republican philosophies have been dramatic. The Reagan Economic Program is working. The 10th District needs a congressman who supports Ronald Reagan. His name is Bill Schuette."

GOP convention delegate talks with many

Jack M. Fraser, Water-town Township Trustee, was one of 3,700 delegates and alternates who traveled to Grand Rapids for the State Republican Convention Jan. 27-28.

Present when Jack Lousma officially announced that he is a candidate for the U.S. Senate, Fraser

also had the opportunity to speak with Jim Dunn, who also is running for that seat in the August Primary.

While at the convention, Fraser also took the opportunity to talk personally with many of the delegates and office holders. These included Bill Schuette who is running for the U.S. Con-

gress seat held by Don Albosta in the 10th district.

"Bill Schuette is just a tremendous person," says Fraser. "Young, full of energy and knowledgeable. I have met Don Albosta, too. I'm for Bill Schuette all the way — he understands the importance of not having em-

bargos on our farm produce," says the chairman of the Looking Glass Valley Farm Bureau.

Farm issues discussed included the need for a long-term, sound farm program; free export and access to world markets; and balanced trade with Japan. Also speaking with State

Rep. Gary Randall of the 89th District, Fraser characterizes Randall as a very personal person and easy to talk with. "He comes from a small community such as ours," says Fraser.

Mike Busch, minority leader of the house, and

National Committeewoman Rona Romney also talked with Fraser. In addition, he also heard speeches by New York Congressman Jack Kemp, Dorothy Comstock Riley, Senate Majority Leader John Engle and National Committeeman Peter Secchia.

Then I was told it would be a week or two for the money to get here. I called St. Johns on Jan. 31 and they said it would take longer. So, I called Lansing and they said it could take a year.

Now, I would like to know how people who are relying on Social Services can live if they are given the run around. I am behind in my bills and do need the money.

I am also going to write a letter to the State Journal Onlooker. This is very important, as it could very well affect more people than myself.

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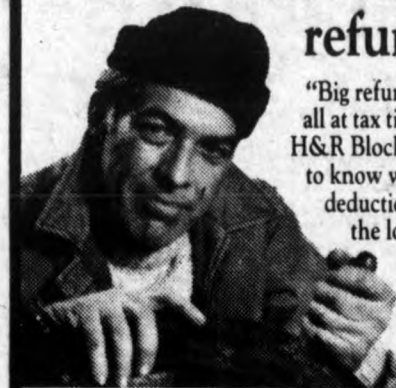

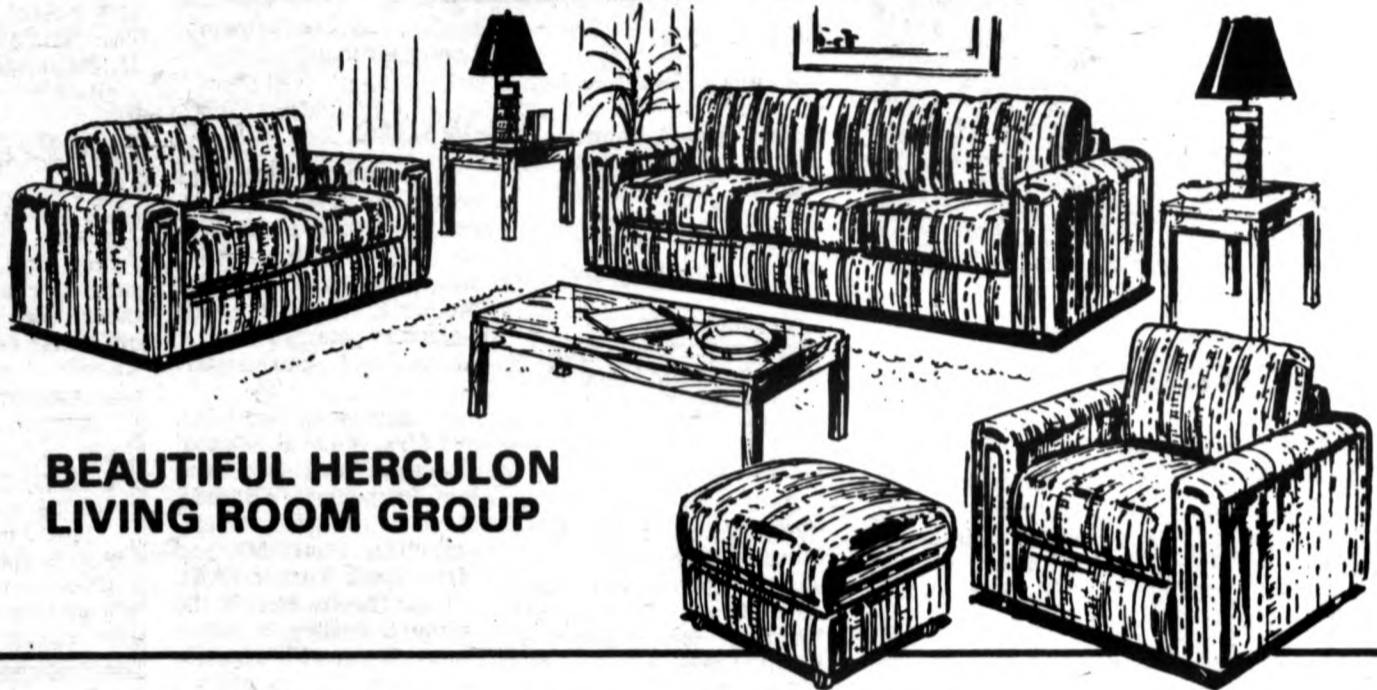

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Advice sought for new prevention program

dations, input and opinions from those individuals involved in and knowledgeable of prevention services and interested citizens as to the types of substance abuse prevention services which should receive priority attention and funding in the four county regions.

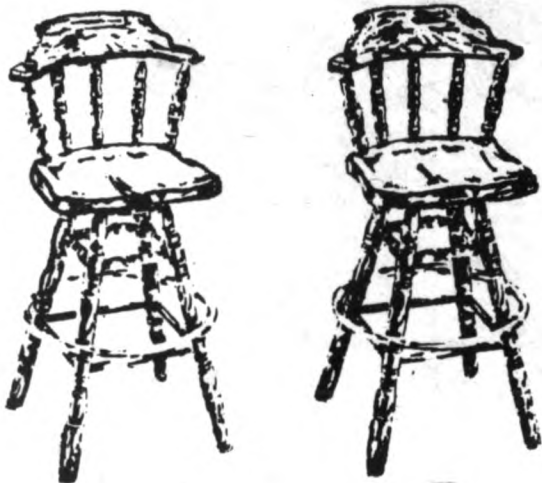

DEWITT — It might not be a case of "Slip Sliding Away," but the DeWitt basketball team could use a little salt to stop the skids.

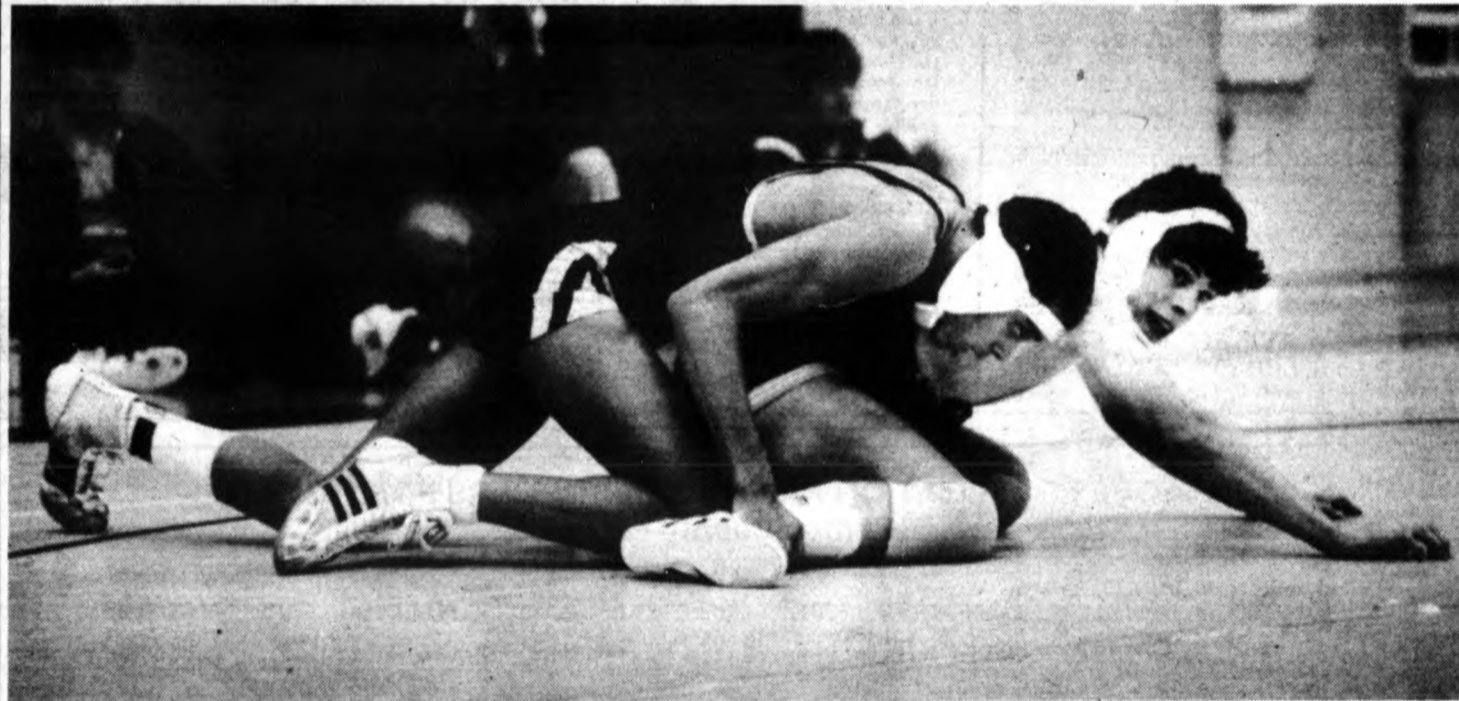
The Panthers dropped both of their outings last week, losing on the road to

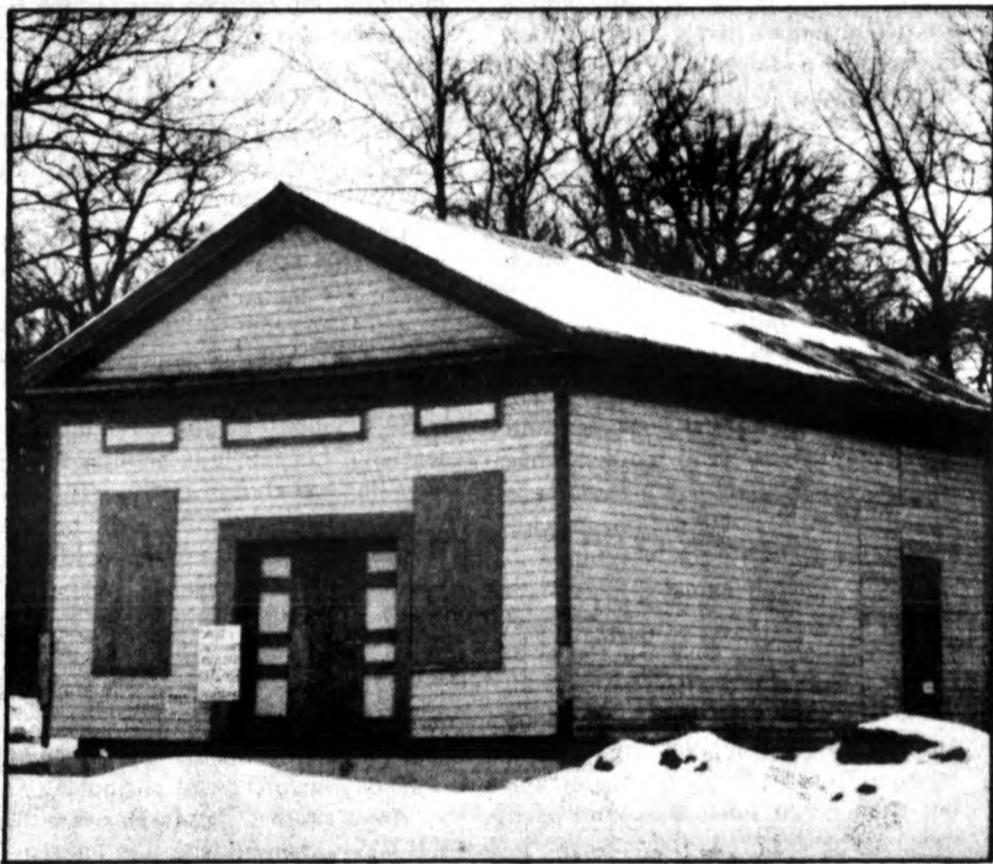

Order in the court(house)

The 1845 Eaton County Courthouse and the 1884 Eaton County Courthouse were built for the same purpose, but are as different as night and day.

The 1845 Courthouse was a one-story wooden structure, with two wings, built at a cost of about \$1,000.

It was used from 1845 until it was condemned in 1867, when it sat empty for one year. It was not used again until 1872 when it was moved to the corner of Cochran and Harris Streets in Charlotte (where the library is today). There it was used as an Episcopal church for a few years until it was again moved.

It only moved a few yards this time, where it sat between Cochran and Washington Streets just off Harris Street.

The courthouse was then used as a stable, a warehouse, a carriage house and eventually a garage.

It was purchased from the Billings family in October 1983, for \$3,000 by Historic Charlotte, Inc. and moved to its present site at Bennett Park.

The two side wings are missing.

When the structure was originally built, one wing served as a judges chamber for the visiting Circuit Riding Judge, and as a jury room and general office. The other wing served as a jail.

The main part of the courthouse had the judges platform flanked by the jury box and the defendant's box. The spectators sat in seats facing the judge. A central aisle ran through the spectators seats with a pot-bellied stove at the rear being the only source of heat.

Some of the original stencilling is still

visible, as is the ripped lath and the vaulted ceiling.

Historic Charlotte, Inc. plans to restore the structure to its original state.

For about 10 years, the property off Lawrence Avenue between Cochran and Bostwick streets sat without a courthouse.

The 1884 Courthouse was built to replace the wooden structure.

It is a 3½-story building built of fieldstone, red brick and white stone. A three-stage cupola rises from the center of the roof, containing a columned belfry and octagonal clock dome. Atop the dome is a pressed-zinc statue of Justice.

The cost to build was between \$70,000 and \$75,000.

There is extensive use of walnut and butternut wood throughout. The stained glass and stencilling accentuates the beauty of the building.

Due to the efforts of the Eaton County Historical Commission and a number of volunteers, they have completed most of the restoration. Another year of work is anticipated.

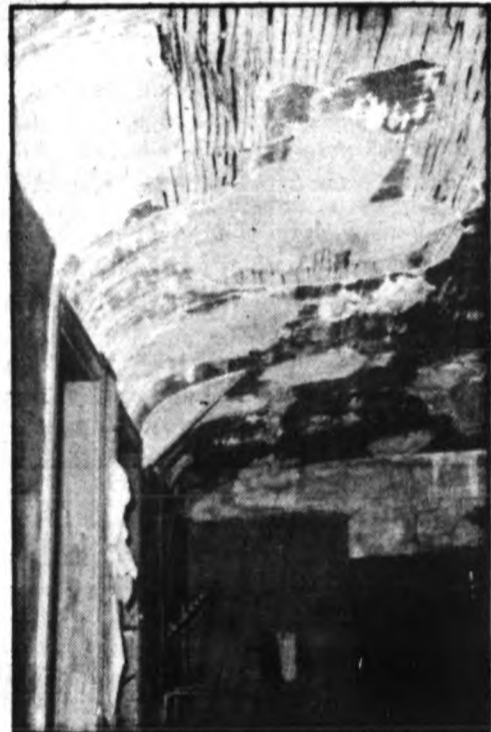
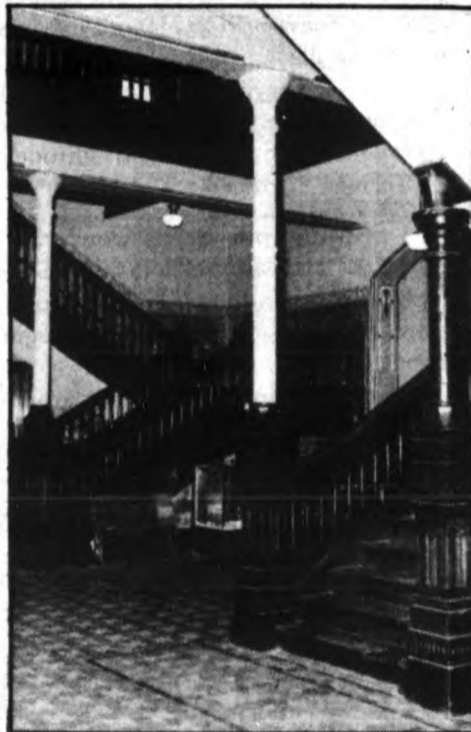
Presently stencilling is being done throughout the building. It is the same pattern and colors as those originally used.

The third level was the jurors' room. It is in the process of being refinished.

The second level is the most impressive. The courtroom with all its majesty is having the finishing touches of the stencilling applied. Lights are still needed for the ceiling.

All the furniture had been stored in the attic. It has been refinished and is back in its original setting.

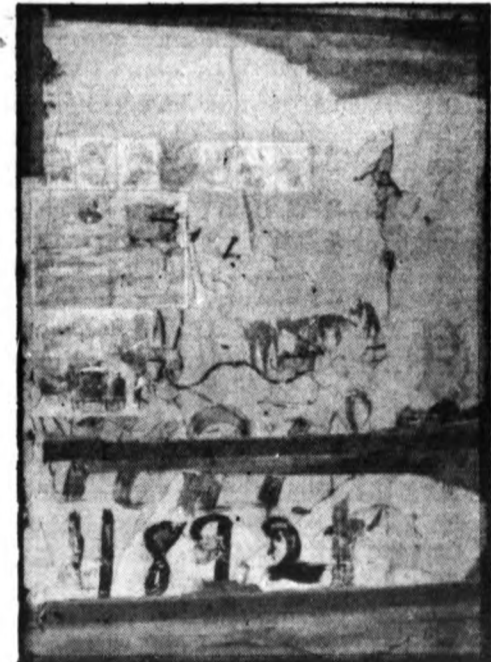
The first floor now houses museums and the office of the Eaton County Historical Commission.

Pat and Wiley Bean: partners in law

The sign reads "Bean, Bean & Robinson." But the Beans aren't father and son, they're husband and wife.

The mother of five children and a teacher at Grand Ledge High School, Pat became a lawyer in 1977, 10 years after husband Wiley earned his law degree.

"It was an interest of mine when I was in college before I got by bachelor's degree," she explains. "My major was political science. It's something in which I've always been interested."

Pat and Wiley, both attending Michigan State University, met in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. while on spring break. Married before Wiley received his bachelor's degree, each worked while he attended law school — Pat as a teacher, Wiley running the officers club at Camp Grayling during the summer.

Graduating from Grand Ledge High School in 1953, Wiley served as cadet commander of the Civil Air Patrol in Grand Ledge. Starting MSU in 1953, Wiley joined the cadet program in 1954 and the Air Force in 1955. In 1955, he returned to MSU to study engineering, but changed to political science after meeting Pat.

"I discovered what my real interests were after meeting Pat," says Wiley. "I might not have ended up in law without her. A mutual friend of ours was a lawyer and also encouraged me to apply."

After Wiley graduated from George Washington University, the Beans say they settled in Grand Ledge to be near Wiley's parents, and because they desired more direct contact with clients.

Joining John Fitzgerald and Lou Wirbel in 1964, Wiley passed the bar examination in 1965 and opened his own office two years later.

Prior to moving back to Wiley's hometown of Grand Ledge, the Beans were residing near the nation's capital. Pat says a major consideration in their move was to be near a law school so she could resume her earlier interest.

"You can do anything you put your mind to," she states, "but sometimes

you put up invisible barriers against yourself. When Cooley Law School opened, I was in the second night class. When you've been in one profession for a number of years, you feel a need to move on. My decision was to look for something else and to learn something new."

Now a full-time high school teacher with a law practice, Pat says she is considering going back to school to study international relations.

"Learning new things keeps you vital," she says. "That's why I like teaching — the students are always different. The clue to teaching is to become interested in your students and how they learn."

In addition to her fondness for teaching, her family is another reason why Pat has chosen not to assume a full-time law practice. "It would be hard on the family to have two people being trial lawyers," she explains.

Wiley supplied emotional support when she was in law school, Pat says.

"He took over the running of the house. As they say, 'The law is a jealous mistress.' You have to get your work done or you don't pass," she notes.

"It was stressful, but I was aware that this was something she was interested in," Wiley says.

"I'm really the cheerleader of her fan club," he says. "I've seen her ability to work with other people. Pat has done some terrific legal work. One reason why she doesn't do legal work full-time is because she enjoys teaching school."

Wiley has gained much publicity through his representation of Ray and Judy Stiver in the "Baby Doe" surrogate parent case.

"I think the publicity is wonderful," says Pat. "He's an excellent lawyer. He looks at law as a human service profession, and he's finally getting recognition."

Wiley, Pat and Bob Robinson, the third lawyer who occupies the upstairs office on South Bridge Street, Grand Ledge, often confer with each other on various cases. Wiley also handles Pat's court appearances.

"It's stressful being lawyers together,"

says Wiley. "Because we're married, I don't deal with her like I would deal with other attorneys. I might be more short-tempered with Pat."

One of the biggest rewards of being a lawyer, says Pat, is being able to help

people, which many times isn't easy.

Wiley agrees. "When I really feel I can help people, I enjoy my work," he says. "It's immensely satisfying when you feel your client is innocent and the jury agrees with you."

Here's a small sample of the "celebrities" who call Lansing home:

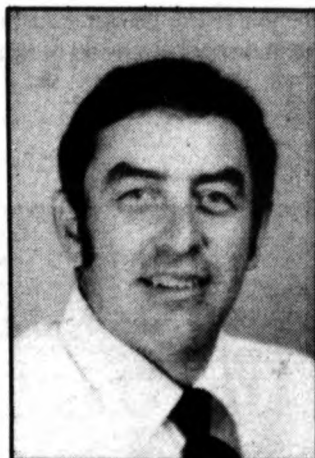

In reality, Young, an Oldsmobile engineer, shares few characteristics with the celebrated actor of the same name.

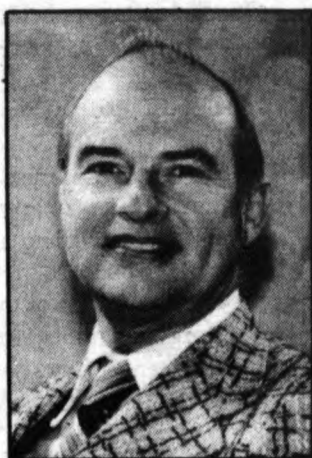
"I never had a desire to go into ac-

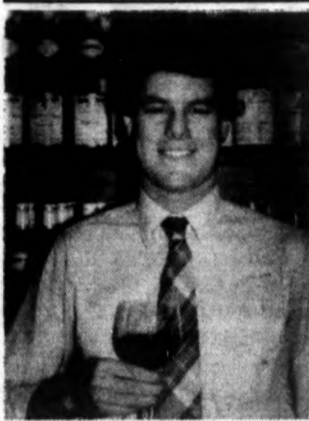
A rosé is a rosé is a rosé? Think again

Valentine's Day, the traditional day for lovers, lends itself to the pale pink beauty of rose wines. Rose is a versatile wine which is appropriate on any occasion. It can be served as an aperitif or as accompaniment to any meal.

Rosé is the French word for "pink." A true vin rosé is by no means a blend of red and white wines; indeed it is prohibited in France and many other countries.

Actually, this wine is made from red grapes alone. The grapes, when pressed, produce a white juice, but turn red as the natural grape sugar ferments into alcohol. A skillful producer can make a rose wine simply by filtering out the grape skins partway through the fermentation process.

Roses of some sort are produced in almost all wine-growing countries. Excellent roses are made in California, but some of the best come from France.

There are as many tastes as there are grapes and blends of roses. A rose that displays great charm and lightness is preferable. The finest of them are dry, fruity

and fresh-tasting.

Rosé wines are at their most flavorful with two years of vintage — so don't try to age them. All roses are best served well-chilled.

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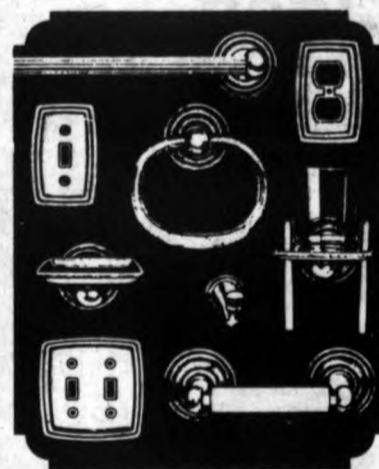

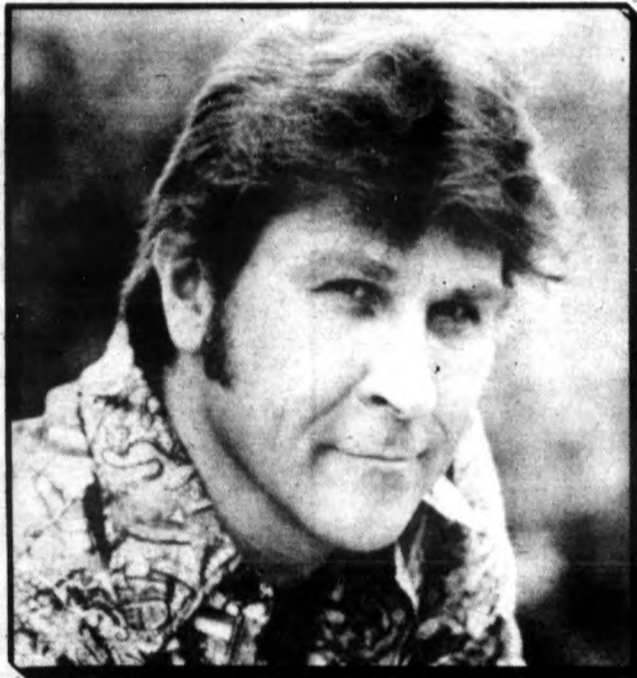

That extended separately in said schedule against each description of said lands therein contained are (a) the total amount of delinquent taxes upon said description for the non-payment of which the same may lawfully be sold at the next annual tax sale, (b) interest computed thereon as provided by law to the first day of May, next ensuing, (c) a County Property Tax Administration Fee of four per cent which shall be a minimum of \$2.00 as provided by Section 211.59, C.L. 1979, as amended, and (d) \$10.00 for expenses, all in accordance with the provisions of the act first above mentioned.

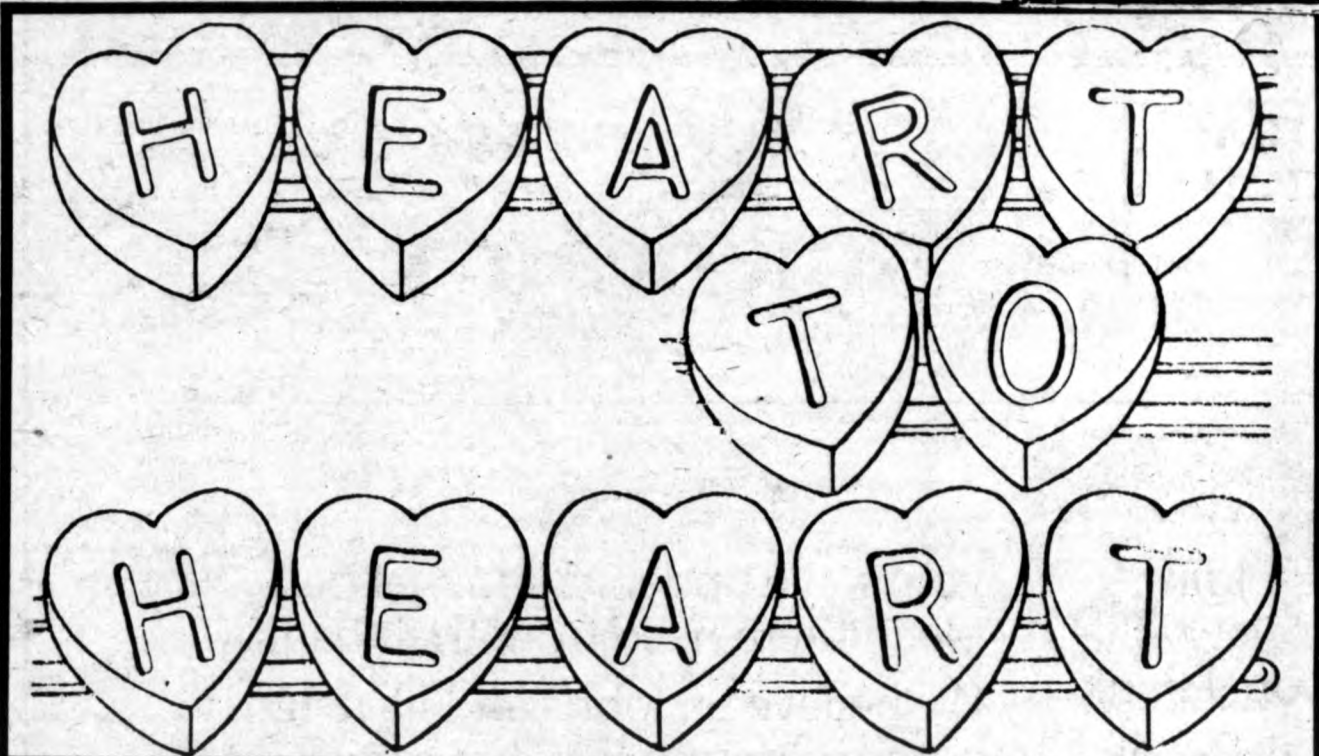

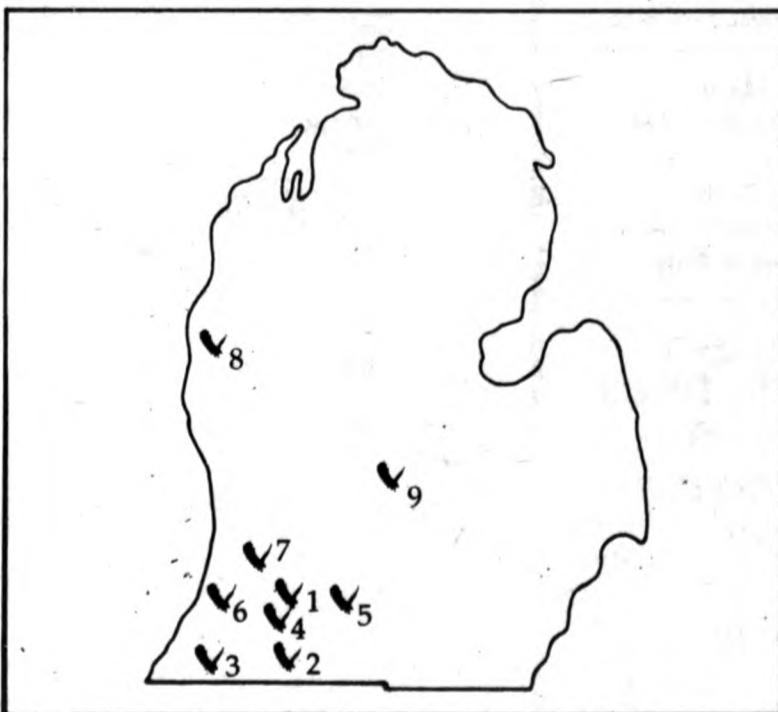
