Medical clinic at Elsie open

A new family medicine clinic opened last Monday in Elsie highlighted by a grand opening reception and free health screening. The new clinic is located at 117 E. Main St.

Harold K. Poff, D.O. and Roger D. Morris, D.O. will practice in the new facility serving the town of 1200 and surrounding communities. Both physicians are on the staff at Carson City Hospital, and presently practice at the Ashley Clinic in Ashley. Drs. Poff and Morris have been at the Ashley location since 1967 and 1972, respectively.

"We're very pleased to be opening these offices, and to provide more convenient medical care to the Elsie area," said Dr. Morris.

The clinic's grand opening took place at 10 a.m. Monday with refreshments of coffee and sweet rolls being served. Physicians and hospital representatives were on hand to greet guests.

Both State Senator Alan Cropsey and State Representative Gary Randall were present to inspect the new facility as well as visit with area residents in attendance.

According to Bruce Traverse, hospital administrator, Carson City Hospital medical staff members and volunteers scheduled free health screenings later in the day's activities. Testing included blood pressure, blood sugar levels, vision, height and weight, and lung capacities. Instruction was also made available for women concerning pap smears and self breast examination.

"Test results will be kept confidential, and will be provided to health screening participants or their own family physician, at the participant's request," said David Z. Nareski, R.N., assistant director of nursing at the hospital and coordinator of its health education and screening programs.

"We're very excited about the new clinic in Elsie," said Carson City Administrator Bruce Traverse, "and we're looking forward to making alot of new friends in the Elsie area during the course of operations at the clinic."

Dr. Poff has been a family practice physician in Ashley for 16 years. He is presently Chief of Staff at Carson City Hospital, and Associate Clinical Professor at the Michigan State University College of Osteopathic Medicine. Dr. Poff received his professional training from the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine in Kirksville, Missouri and completed an internship at Carson City Hospital in 1967. Dr. Poff and his wife, Lois, live in Ashley. They have three children, Doug, Mark, and Cindy. All are pursuing careers in medicine.

Dr. Poff enjoys woodworking, hunting, fishing, golf and skiing.

Dr. Morris is originally from Moundsville, West Virginia. He has been in family medicine at the Ashley Clinic since 1972. Prior to his arrival in Ashley, Dr. Morris also practiced in his home town, and in Carrabelle, Florida. He is also a graduate of Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine.

He holds the distinction of Associate Clinical Professor at Michigan State University College of Osteopathic Medicine, also.

Dr. Morris and his wife, Mary Ann, have four children, Tammi, Michael, Kimberly and Jaime. Mrs. Morris is president of Carson City Hospital Auxiliary.

Dr. Morris enjoys salmon fishing, golfing, bowling, boating, skiing, hunting and football.

Schmaltz assumes top post

A familiar face to most Clinton County Area residents re-entered the scene in St. Johns in the person of Harold E. Schmaltz, former general manager and advertising director of the Clinton County News during the period of years from 1971 to 1977.

Schmaltz, 49, formerly held the top post at the St. Johns paper under the earlier ownership of Greenville News, Inc. while a resident here in St. Johns with his family.

The new manager left Michigan for his native state of Kentucky in early 1977 where he was affiliated with an agricultural publication near Montgomery, Alabama which circulated into a major block of southeastern states. He returned to Michigan in early 1980 and became editor of the North Kent Leader, a position held there for nearly four years. Located in Sparta, the Leader was a Greenville owned enterprise until its eventual sale to a newspaper group in Ottawa County.

Schmaltz and his wife Joan are the parents of 10 children, three of whom are still at home. They are Amanda, 11, a sixth grade student at Rodney B. Wilson Junior High, Elizabeth, 8, a third grade student at Central Elementary and Susannah Leigh, 5, at home. Two of the older Schmaltz children, Debby Patterson, 27, resides in St. Johns with her husband Kris, while Robert, 25, resides in Muscatine, Iowa and is employed as a drafting technician and liason inspector for Stanley Architects. Both Debby and Robert are graduates of St. Johns High School. Other sons include Greg, 22, who is presently program director for radio station WPLB Greenville while David, 20, is currently attending a Bible seminary in Fayetteville, N.C. January 16. All attended St. Johns schools while residents here.

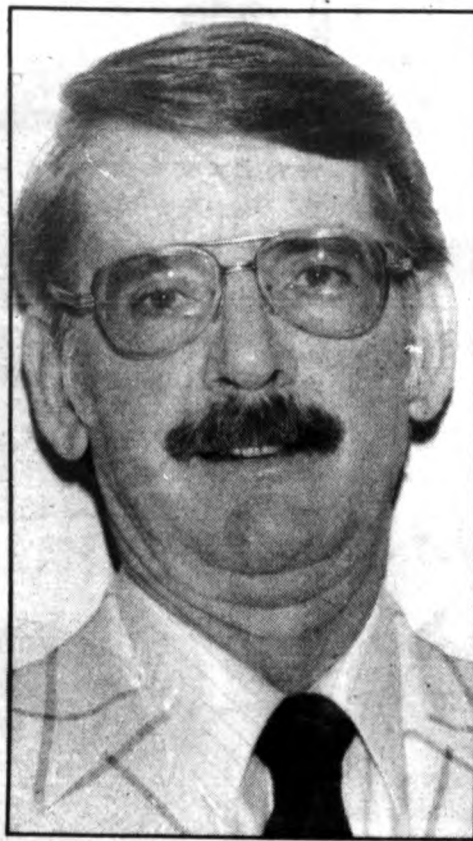
In earlier days, Schmaltz was active in local and civic affairs including being a director of the Chamber of Commerce, a Rotarian, a member of the Clinton County Historical Society as well as being active in local theatrics. He served as Clinton County Historical Michigan Week chairman in 1976.

More recently while in Kentucky, Schmaltz was honored by former Governor Julian Carroll with a lifetime commission of Kentucky Colonel. The commission, Kentucky's highest citizen award, came about through a joint recommendation by Kentucky congressman Carroll Hubbard and former Michigan congressman Elford Cederberg.

No stranger to journalistic publications, Schmaltz comes back to St. Johns with 15 solid years of newspaper experience, having gained expertise in all facets of the business.

Commenting on his new position in St. Johns, Schmaltz said, "Apparently many of St. Johns' earlier dreams of expansion have come to pass as there are many new businesses here that were not here in 1977. My first impression of the town indicates a proud community following through on well-laid plans of many years. I am proud to be back and re-establish myself and family as St. Johns residents once again."

Continuing on, Schmaltz commented, "I'd like to help the County News regain its foothold in the St. Johns community and become the style of newspaper it used to be. I have plans of acquiring additional personnel with quality credentials to aid me in the project and welcome the renovative efforts necessary to get the job done. I've had lots of fun visiting throughout the local businesses this past week and becoming re-acquainted with all my former friends."

County treasurer alerts taxpayers

Clinton County Treasurer Gerald E. Shepard this week alerted county taxpayers that they should be sure to include the administrative fees, if any, when paying their winter taxes to the appropriate city or township treasurer so that these fees will not be returned delinquent to the County Treasurer's office on March 1st by the local treasurer. Shepard said that a number of county taxpayers had become confused upon learning of a Michigan Court of Appeals decision in a Wayne County case which involved payment of collection fees under an earlier law.

"Apparently many taxpayers were under the impression that this lawsuit meant that it was no longer necessary to pay the administrative fees which may be imposed by the action of the city or township in which the taxpayer resides," Shepard remarked. He went on to say that litigation did not involve the administrative fee which local treasurers are currently collecting, but involved an old form of "collection fee" which the Legislature abolished in 1982.

Shepard further explained that this case had been thoroughly discussed at a

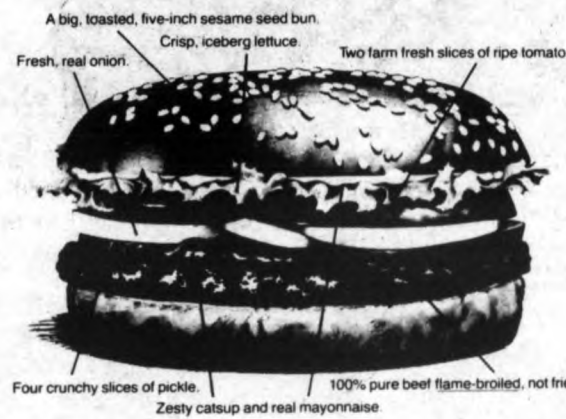
recent conference of the Michigan Association of County Treasurers by Emil Tahvonen of the Michigan Department of the Treasury and by John R. Axe, a partner in the firm of Axe ' Schwartz, general counsel of the Michigan Association of County Treasurers. Shepard said it was noted by both Tahvonen and Axe that the administrative fees, if not paid, would have to be included with the delinquent taxes and returned as delinquent to the County Treasurer on March 1st.

The County Treasurer went on to discuss the im-

pact of the Wayne County case on collection fees for former years noting that Axe and Tahvonen had explained that the Wayne County case was limited to just those few taxing jurisdictions in Wayne County where taxpayers had filed suit. Shepard indicated that at this time the Court of Appeals' decision may still be appealed to the Michigan Supreme Court and that if that occurs, the Court of Appeals' decision could be reversed. "Whether or not it is appealed," Shepard explained, "the Wayne County case does not affect tax collection procedures in our county."

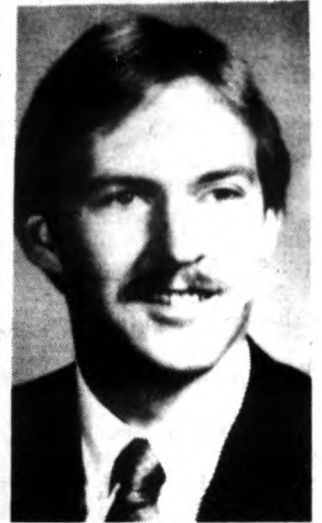

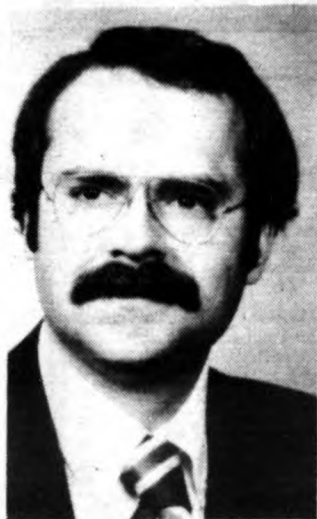

Stroke victim needs help

Although many who read about the plight of former Dearborn resident Donald Mycek in the Times-Herald Newspapers rushed to his assistance during the holidays, more help is needed to help the stroke victim's family pay off soaring medical costs.

Adele Copperstone, Mycek's sister, said the bill for his hospital care and surgeries is now up to \$25,000. She believes the total will be as much as \$50,000 after she receives a bill from the neurosurgeon.

Mycek is now in stable condition following a massive stroke that occurred while he was working as a disc jockey at a Lansing-area radio station Dec. 5. Since the Times-Herald published his tragic story in December, Mycek has had prostate surgery and soctors have found an aneurysm on his brain. They say Mycek will need round-the-clock nursing care "into the indefinite future".

Mycek is able to walk but becomes confused easily, Copperstone said. She said

he is only able to walk with the help of another person.

Copperstone said she is moving Mycek to a nursing care facility this week so he can get the rehabilitation he needs. He will be in the nursing home for about a month at the cost of \$56 a day.

When Mycek returns to his Dearborn home, he will need constant attention and health care, Copperstone said. But private nurses are also expensive, and would drain on the financially-strapped family's budget.

Mycek left his steady job as an industrial caterer in Dearborn several years ago to fulfill a fantasy and became a disc jockey at age of 54.

Mycek lived in Dearborn most of his life and was a member of Kiwanis Club. He graduated from St. Alphonsus School.

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Cattle inventory goes downward

The recent steady increase in Michigan cattle numbers came to an end during 1983.

Michigan's Jan. 1 cattle inventory, at 1,475,000 head, was down 2 percent from the previous year, according to the Federal/State-Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. This was the first decline in cattle inventory since 1979. Most of the decline was due to a 27 percent drop in beef cow numbers.

The year-end beef cow inventory was estimated at 158,000 head while milk cows totaled 402,000 head. Milk cow numbers were up only 1 percent from year earlier levels. Michigan's 1983 calf crop, at 525,000 head, was down 5 percent from the previous year.

The decline in beef cow numbers may continue into 1984 as the year-end inventory of beef replacement heifers, at 36,000 head, was down 31 percent from a year earlier. Milk replacement heifers, at 180,000 head were up 5 percent. Steers weighing over 500 pounds were up 22 percent. Non-replacement heifers weighing over 500 pounds were up 27 percent. The inventory of calves weighing less than 500 pounds was off 5 percent from last year. The bull inventory was estimated at 23,000 head as of Jan. 1. Michigan cattle feeders had 175,000 head of cattle and calves on full feed for slaughter market on Jan. 1, up 17 percent from the previous year. This was the largest January fed cattle inventory in the State since 1979.

Nationally, all cattle and calves as of Jan. 1, totaled 114 million head, down 1 percent from a year earlier. This continues the recent downward trend in cattle inventories begun a year ago. Total cow numbers at 48.8 million, were down 1 percent. Beef cow numbers declined 1 percent while milk cows were up 1 percent. The 1983 calf crop, at 44 million head, was down 1 percent. Cattle on feed for slaughter on Jan. 1, at 11.6 million head, were down 4 percent.

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Drama competition is underway

The District 5 High School Drama Competition for 1984 is now underway. Throughout the day five high schools vied for the top two positions in the district competition to qualify them to pass on to the state finals at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo Feb. 17-18.

The schools competing were St. Johns, Cheasening, Pontiac Waterford Mott, Stevensville Lakeshore and St. Joseph Lake Michigan Catholic. Last year's state title went to St. Johns with Stevensville Lakeshore coming in a close second by only two points. Thus, the district took on some special interest and excitement.

At the conclusion of the contest St. Johns edged out Stevensville once more with its production of Irwin Shaw's "BURY THE DEAD" with a score of 187

out of a possible 200 points. Stevensville placed second with a score of 179 of 200 points with their production of "THE DIVINERS" by Jim Leonard Jr. At the Feb. 17-18 state finals, again these two schools will meet, along with other top district finalists, with close competition at hand.

The St. Johns production of "BURY THE DEAD" has a cast of 21 and a technical and running crew

of 60. The students in the production and drama club range from the ninth grade level to the twelfth grade level. The coordinator is Bob Koger and his assistant is Barb Markman. The student director is junior Craig Paksi with senior Angie Magsig as stage manager. Veteran cast members of the production are Eric Hudson, Paul Crosby, Rodney Peck, Dell Baker, Barb Stork and Col-

leen McCarthy.

The success of the show is not only in the quality of the cast but also in the outstanding work of the technical crews. The directors, cast, and crews of "BURY THE DEAD", as well as the total population of the St. Johns High School can be very proud of the hard work and endless hours that have made their production a success.

Ovid Lodge officers will confer the Fellowcraft Degree immediately following the dinner and guest speaker.

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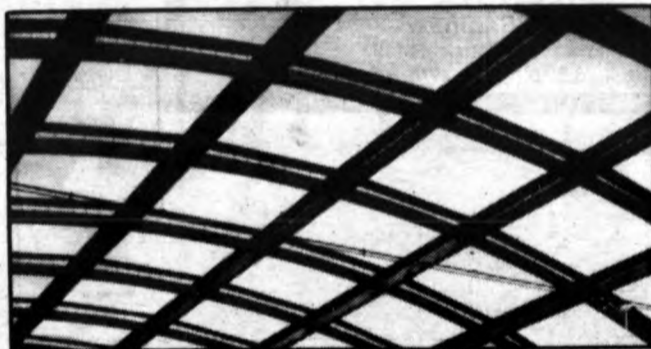
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St. Johns council receives annual fireman report

On Feb. 13 the St. Johns City Council met for their regular bi-monthly meeting.

As in the agenda, the Commission discussed Downtown Communications and a letter from the Downtown Merchants Association, signed by Alan Harr, chairman. The letter stated that the merchants of St. Johns "heartily support this endeavor" to try to make improvements in the downtown section of

Clinton Ave. In the letter Harr also stated that the merchants "would like to help...in any way possible". The Commission, in the search for funds, was informed that the City will not receive any funds from the Urban City and possibly the Small Cities Grants for the project, therefore, the search for funds continues.

Additionally at the meeting, Fire Chief Clare Maier of the St. Johns Fire Depart-

ment presented their annual report for 1983. In the report the runs made by each individual fireman was given. The top five in answering calls were John Kechensparger, answering 97%; Charles Hyler, answering 95%; Clare Maier and Dick Cornwell, each answering 94%, Eric Knight and Dean Mazzolini, each answering 93%, and Elon Hufnagel answering 92%.

In city fires there were 13 residential fires with a loss of \$14,500; 3 grass fires with no loss; 9 commercial fires with a loss of 34,200; 1 hospital fire with no loss; 15 cartruck incidents with a loss of \$2,050; and 4 false alarms.

In country fires there were 12 residential fires with a loss of \$54,700; one mobile

home fire with a loss of \$9,000; 10 accidents with carstrucks with a loss of \$2,200; 10 barn and outbuilding fires with a loss of \$749,300; 15 grass fires with no loss.

Compared to the 1982 report, this past year was high in losses. In 1982 there were a total of 39 city fires with a loss of \$19,625 and 49 country fires with a loss of \$85,000.

The loss figures do include both the building and its contents, as explained in the report, but the increase for 1983 was said to be due to the Gram and Watts fires which are still under investigation.

The City Council expressed their appreciation and thanks to the St. Johns firemen and their families for their time and efforts.

Dairy program signup good

Clinton County showed a healthy signup rate for the Milk Diversion Program, according to Roberta Weber, extension agriculture agent. Weber said the signup date has now past and some idea of the number of dairy producers participating in Clinton County is now known.

Approximately 17 percent of the herds are enrolled in the diversion program, Weber said. Statewide, about 1,282 herds or 14 percent of all

herds are enrolled, she said. The national outlook shows about 12 percent of the total U.S. herd population enrolled, with a total decrease in milk marketings of about 5.5 percent. At this rate, Weber said, it is anticipated that the milk surplus could be cut in half by the end of 1984.

There is expected to be no significant impact on the cattle, poultry or hog markets with the way dairy cattle are being culled, Weber indicated.

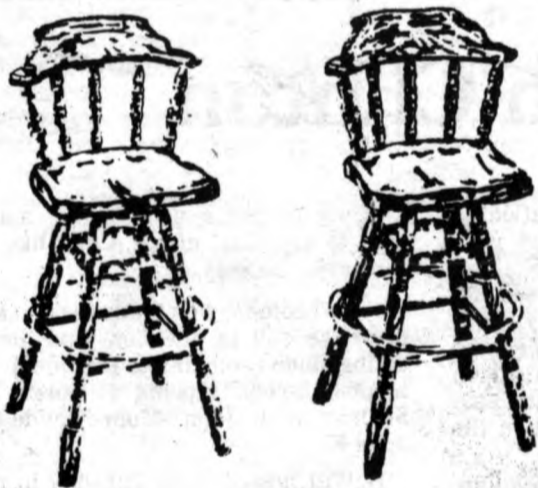
Area readers will be kept posted on breaking developments in the program, Weber said.

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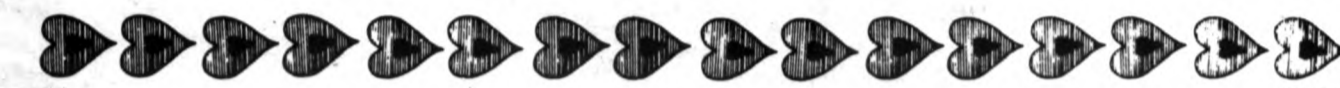

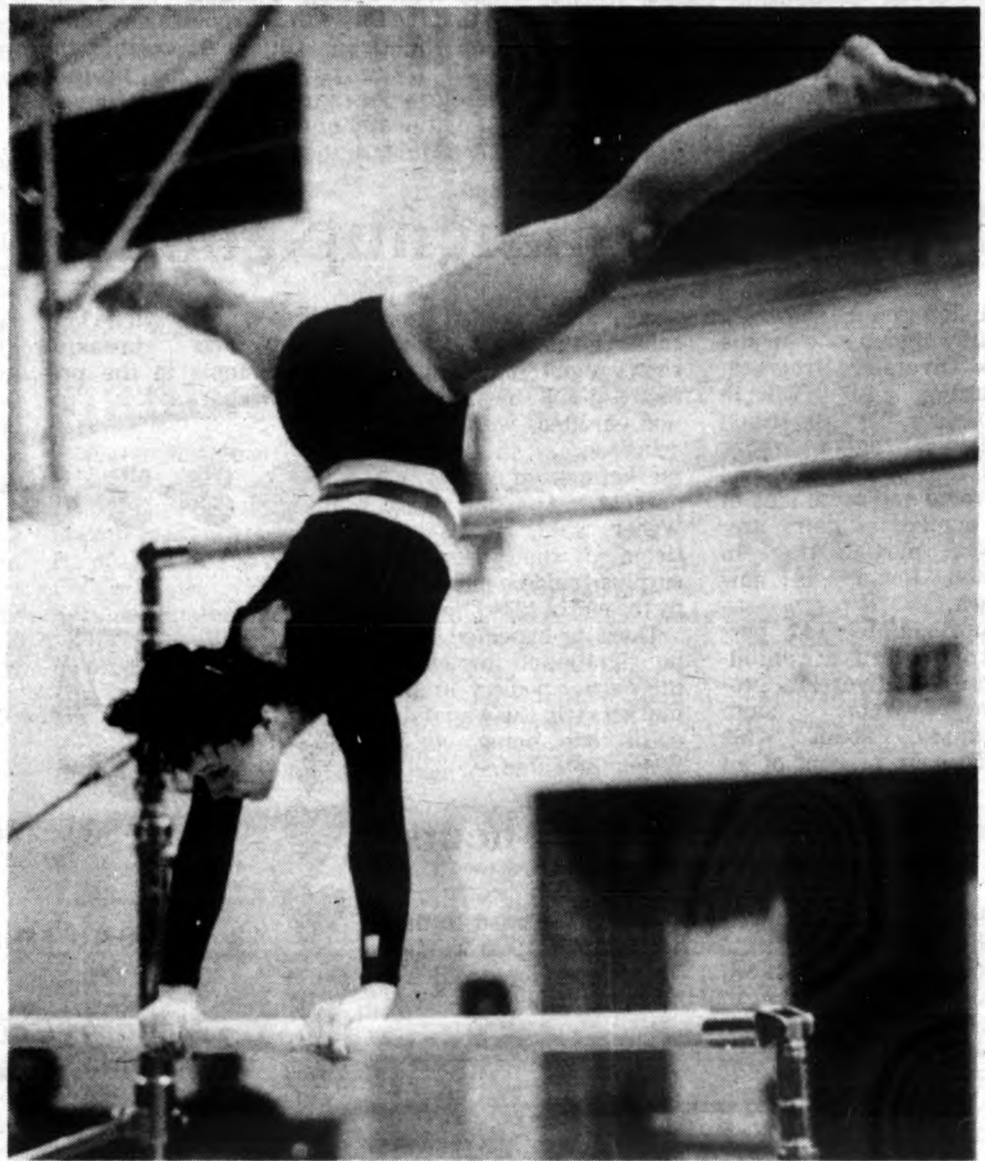

Bean soup contest guidelines explained in detail

A contest to select the state's best bean soup recipe is being sponsored jointly by the Michigan Bean Commission and AAA Michigan Living magazine.

The winner will be flown round-trip to Washington, D.C. on Northwest Airlines to prepare the soup for Michigan's Congressional delegation and members of the U.S. Senate, with two nights at the Vista International Hotel.

Soup made from Michigan navy beans is currently on the daily menus in the Senate and House dining rooms.

USDA views light dairy sign-up

Michigan Farm Bureau's dairy specialist, Mike Kovacic, says that the light sign-up of U.S. dairy producers in the USDA's paid diversion program will result in some reduction, but it won't be enough to offset the surplus situation the industry is in.

The USDA announced this week that only 12 percent of the nation's dairy producers have signed contracts to participate in the program. According to USDA estimates, this will reduce U.S. milk output by about 5.5 percent during the total 15 months of the program.

"It's somewhat of a disappointment," Kovacic said. "There was a lot of hope put in this program to solve the surplus problem and now it appears that it may not get the job done completely."

"We have to look at what the final output is going to be considering all those producers who are not signing up in the program. If they maintain or possibly increase their production, that's going to erode the 5.5 percent reduction that's going to be achieved by the program. I do believe there will be some reduction from the program, but I don't believe it will be enough to offset the surplus situation that we're in."

"If this program does not do the job, then we have to be very concerned about what our prospects are in the 1985 farm bill," he said.

Farmer groups tell of tax credits

Agra Land, Inc. and Farmers Petroleum Cooperative, Inc. have distributed sizeable investment tax credits to 2,172 local member cooperatives and farmer members throughout the state of Michigan. The distribution amounts to credits of \$445,000 from Agra Land, Inc. and \$139,000 from Farmers Petroleum Cooperative, Inc.

The Federal government provides incentives in the form of investment tax credits to businesses that invest in certain capital investments. Because Agra Land and Farmers Petroleum Cooperative did not have sufficient tax liabilities to fully utilize the investment tax credits earned in fiscal 1982, provisions were made to distribute these credits to their members. Each member of the two regional cooperatives received a Federal form 1099 stating the amount of their credit, which may be used to offset their Federal tax liabilities.

Agra Land, Inc. is the largest agricultural supplier and marketer of grain and beans in the state of Michigan. Farmers Petroleum Cooperative, Inc. is one of the largest distributors of petroleum products, tires, batteries and accessories in Michigan.

A French food critic recently described it as "friendly, but bland." Michigan is the world's largest producer of navy beans, annually growing more than 500 million pounds worth \$150 million.

Michigan is the only state that has a product printed on the Senate menu. The menu includes a history of the soup and a recipe that calls for "small Michigan navy beans."

The menu states, "Whatever uncertainties may exist in the Senate of the United States, one thing is sure: Bean soup is on the menu... everyday."

Here are the contest rules:

- The recipe must have Michigan navy beans and other readily available ingredients and serve four to eight persons.

- The entrant must be a Michigan resident. Automobile Club of Michigan and Bean Commission employees are not eligible.

- The ingredients and cooking instructions (no abbreviations please) must be typed or neatly printed and

mailed to: The Michigan Bean Commission, P.O. Box 22037 AAA, Lansing, MI 48909. The recipes must be received by May 1.

The Bean Commission will select the top five soup recipes based on flavor, texture, presentation, eye appeal and use of Michigan products. Simplicity and availability of ingredients also will be considered, but flavor is the main criterion.

The five finalists each will receive a Rival Crockpot Slo-cooker, a 20-pound bag of Pillsbury navy beans, a AAA flight bag and family season tickets to Boblo Island. They will be invited to go to the Detroit Press Club or send samples of their entries for the May 17 finals.

Judging will be done by Paula Blanchard, Michigan's First Lady; Hans Schuler, president and chairman of Win Schuler's Inc.; Jack McCarthy, WXYZ-TV; Molly Abraham, Detroit Free Press; Nancy Kennedy, Ford Times; Evelyn Cairns, Mellus Newspapers; Andrea Wojack and Sandy Silfven, Detroit News.

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Clinton Memorial Hospital receives project aid

Clinton Memorial Hospital was presented with \$1700.00 this past week from the 66-member hospital Auxiliary. This most recent contribution from the Auxiliary represents the final payment of the \$31,700 Capital Equipment Debt Retirement project undertaken by the group in 1983.

Several areas of the hospital, as well as patients and members of the community, will benefit from the funds raised for the project, according to a hospital spokesman.

Two resusci-annies, used in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training were purchased. One is capable of

providing immediate feedback to CPR-trainees and allows more practical application of techniques learned.

The Laboratory Department acquired a Co-Oximeter which serves as a diagnostic tool in evaluating cardiac and pulmonary dysfunction in critically ill patients.

In addition to these major items, a Birthing Table was purchased for the Obstetrical Department, as well as a Fiber Optic Bronchoscope used by surgeons. The latter allows the surgeon to remove foreign bodies, visualize gall bladders and provide direct visualization

of structures. The greatest advantage is that these procedures can be performed without using invasive procedures. Previously there were none available at Clinton Memorial.

The CMH Auxiliary has provided ongoing

support for the hospital programs since 1927 when the hospital was first founded.

This year, members voted to fund the redecorating project currently underway in patient care areas in the hospital.

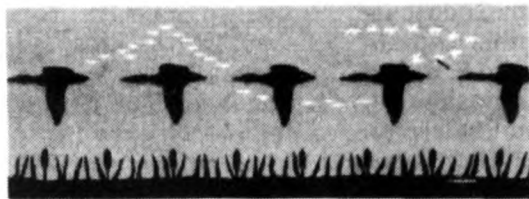

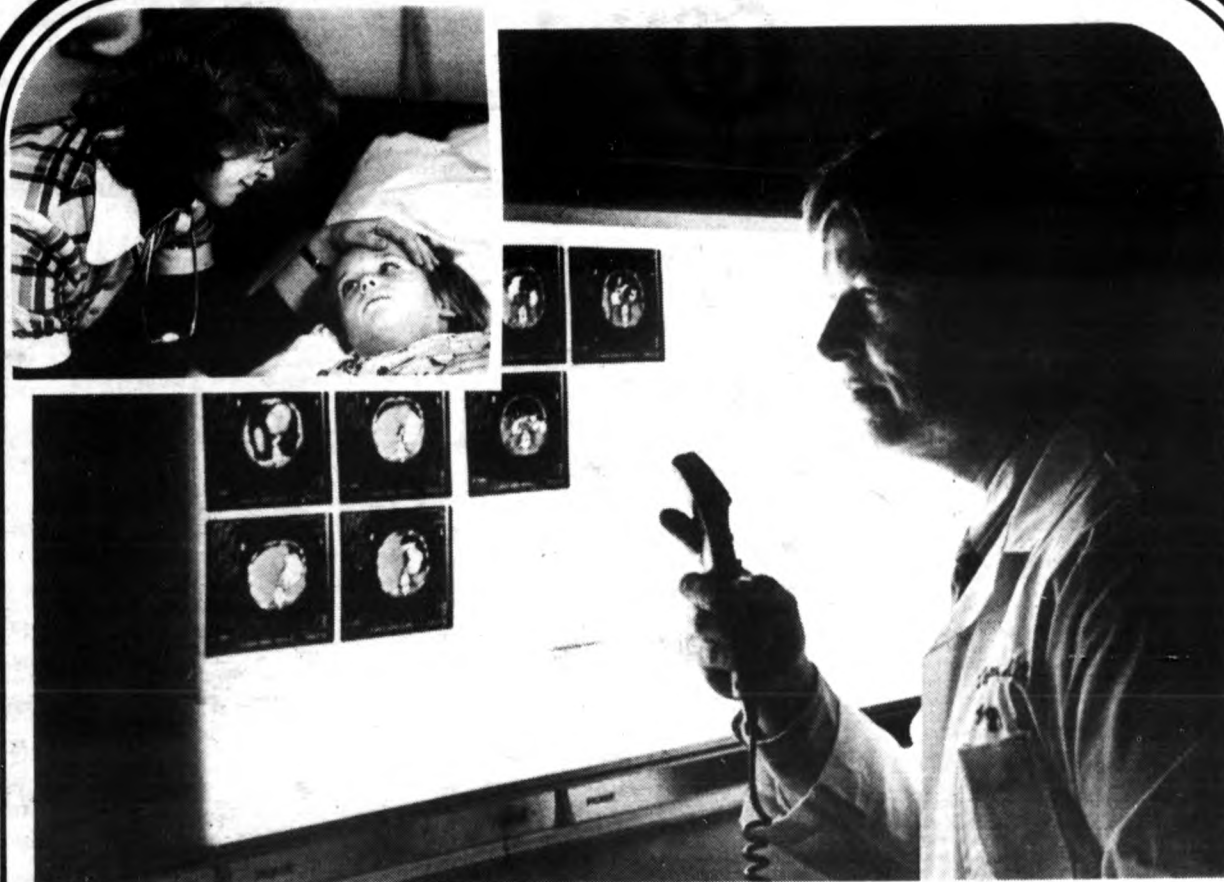

GREAT LAKES SPEARING REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on October 7, 1983, under the authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, renewed its order of July 14, 1978, for a period of five years beginning January 1, 1984, through March 31, 1989, that on the Great Lakes and connecting waters it is unlawful with spear or bow and arrow to take (a) walleye, sauger, Atlantic salmon, coho salmon, chinook salmon, pink salmon or splake; (b) perch except on Lake St. Clair during January and February; (c) northern pike except during January and February; (d) muskellunge except during January and February on lakes Superior, Michigan, Huron, and the St. Marys River; (e) sturgeon except during February.

The director of the Department of Development Control or his agent will be authorized to issue temporary land use permits for cement and asphalt plants when such are necessary for road construction under contract with the municipality and/or the Department of State Highway and Transportation upon compliance with a set of objective standards.

B. Amend Art. 5, Sec. 5.11 REGULATIONS CONCERNING CONDITIONAL USES by adding a new Sec. 14 TEMPORARY HOUSING PERMITS EMERGENCY SITUATIONS.

County faces critical situation unless mild weather continues

Clinton County's coal situation is fast approaching the critical stage. Yards in St. Johns and other county communities are getting in just enough to keep homes supplied and many have less than a week's backlog.

A siege of cold weather, ending the present mild spell, would soon wipe out the entire county supply of coal, dealers say.

The coal strike may not be regarded as an emergency in Washington, one dealer declared, but it is a real one in St. Johns. A week of cold weather, the dealer said, would bring real suffering to many homes.

Houghton Lumber and Fuel in St. Johns reported that their bins were completely exhausted from Thursday of last week until yesterday. The arrival of two cars of coal yesterday gives them about a weeks supply if present mild weather continues.

B. Danley and son, another St. Johns dealer, said they also had about a week's supply of coal on hand. Stoker coal is in fair supply, they said, but coal for domestic furnace use has been slow in coming in.

Clinton Ice & Fuel of St. Johns, reported about a four days' supply of coal on hand. At the St. Johns Co-operative Co., manager George Brooks said that their supply was better just now than it has been. They received two cars of coal Wednesday and have several more on the road.

STURGEON SIZE LIMIT

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on October 7, 1983, under the authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that no sturgeon may be taken or possessed from the waters of this state of a length less than 50 inches for a period of five years beginning January 1, 1984, through March 31, 1989.
