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Judge Lewis to run for reelection

Judge Frederick (Fred) M. Lewis of St. Johns this week announced that he is a candidate for re-election to the office of 65th District Court Judge.

In making his declaration, Lewis said, "I have a commitment to the people of this county; the greater part of my life has been in service to them, in the community of my forebearers. My qualifications include thirty some years of varied legal activities, including twelve years as Prosecuting Attorney and ten years as District Judge in this county, and three years as legal trouble shooter for Clark Equipment Company."

Continuing on, the judge said, "My future plans include locating and staffing a traffic bureau in the Bath/DeWitt area, and expanding alternative sentencings for youth, such as work details in their home communities."

Judge Lewis graduated from St. Johns High School, holds a B.A. degree from M.S.U. and a law degree from the University of Michigan. He also holds special degrees from the College of William and Mary and Cal Tech. At St. Johns High School

Drama Club is best in Michigan

Friday and Saturday, Feb. 17 and 18 marked two very important days for the Drama Club of St. Johns High School. Those were the dates the drama club traveled with its entire 81 member cast and crew to Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo to defend its state title as Michigan Theatre Champion.

After a very intense two days of fine theatre performances given by the final 12 high schools to qualify in the 1984 competition, St. Johns once again succeeded in placing first among the high school dramatists in the state.

St. Johns won the state title with Irwin Shaw's "Bury The Dead". The show, under the direction of Robert L. Koger, assistant director, Barbara Markman, and student director Craig Paksi not only won the state title, but they also succeeded in winning 25 superior awards for individual performances and 47 excellent awards for individual performances. Superior awards went to senior Cam Wood for his design work on poster, program and T-shirt, the 18 members of the make-up crew, and 6 members of the lighting and special effects crew.

Excellent awards went to the 35 members of the stage running crew, the 8 members of the costume crew, Eric Hudson for his role of the Captain, Cam Wood for his role of the General, Dell

Baker for his role of Private Schelling, and Colleen McCarthy for her role of Martha Webster.

Of a total possible of 200 points, the St. Johns production achieved 176 points.

The second place winner was from Ferndale High School with its production of "The Miracle Worker", attaining 172 points.

Some of the judges' comments regarding the St. Johns show were "very good", "captured mood very well", "so much to see, feel and touch", "very powerful" and "good vocal quality and variety".

This is the fourteenth consecutive year that St. Johns High School has qualified for the state drama finals. It is also the sixth time that they have won the state championship. Only one other high school in the state has won this title more than once. Southfield Lathrup High School has taken the title three times in the past.

St. Johns also holds the distinction of being the only high school to achieve the title twice in a row, and this is the second time they have achieved that feat.

To make their record even more astounding, St. Johns is the only high school in the state to have qualified for the state finals for fourteen consecutive years. Previous state theatre championship went to St. Johns in 1975 with their pro-

duction of "Bottom's Dream"; 1978 with "The Crucible"; 1979 with "Pygmalion"; 1981 with "Story Theatre" and 1983 with "You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown".

This year's accomplishment will mean that the St. Johns High School production of "Bury The Dead" will once again be presented in a special honors performance at Central Michigan University on May 19 at the State Youth Arts Festival.

The entire St. Johns community can join in pride with the Drama Department at St. Johns High School upon their achievement. The dramatists are to be highly commended for their success and dedication to the world of theatrical entertainment which evolved in another state title for their efforts.

Explains committee action

Huard speaks at Chamber luncheon

Ron Huard, well known local banker and former newspaper publisher, addressed a sizeable crowd at the regular noon luncheon of the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce held in the community room of the St. Johns Municipal Building, last Thursday.

Huard, himself a past president of the chamber, was selected to head a 32 member committee last spring by the St. Johns Board of Education to research

Many questions erupted from the floor, some supportive, some sceptical, regarding the committee's findings and Huard merely indicated that the final analysis of the problems would be borne out by the committee's in-depth research.

Huard said he did not know where a new building would be built at the present time, should the bond issue be successful, but that it was recommended by some to have the new structure constructed near the present St. Johns High School property. That decision would have to come later, he said.

The bonding proposition facing district voters reads as follows:

Shall St. Johns Public Schools, Clinton and Gratiot Counties, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Three Million Nine Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$3,950,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds therefor, for the purpose of erecting, furnishing and equipping a new elementary school building; partially re-equipping five existing elementary school buildings, in part for energy conservation purposes; constructing and equipping playgrounds; acquiring additional land for site purposes; and developing and improving sites?

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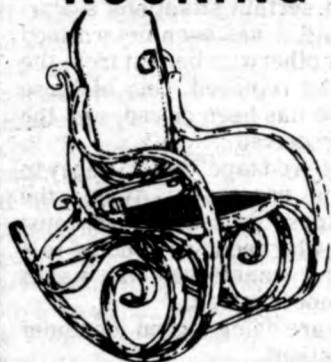
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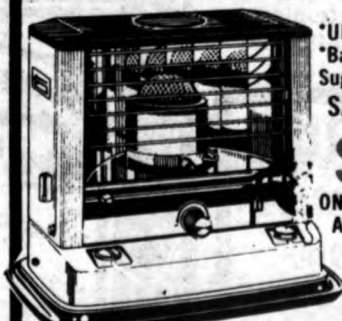

shut-offs, evictions, and death. We try to be caring and helpful, but must always determine eligibility according to state and federal guidelines. Sometimes we must deny help to those who appear to be in need and, unfortunately, we cannot make these explanations public. Hopefully, those who know us realize that we are simply human beings trying to do a difficult job under trying circumstances.

a unit of attorneys (Law Judges) who hear both sides of the issue and render a decision. If a person really believes heshe has not received what heshe is entitled to, they should request an administrative hearing.

If however, a person simply wants to complain, then the logical thing would be to write a letter to you knowing full well that all of our records are confidential and the caseworker is prevented from responding for that reason.

People should know that the caseworkers do not establish the policies, but only administer them. Even though the "red tape" is cumbersome, and no one likes it, it is usually developed because experience has indicated the need.

For example if an ADC or GA client comes to our office and claims that their check was not received, the caseworker will do a computer check to see if the check was issued, and if it was issued, was it returned as undeliverable. If it was issued (mailed) and not returned, the client is asked to contact the postman. If the postman cannot verify delivery, the client must wait four days to be certain the warrant is not simply late in the mail. After four days if the warrant is not delivered, the client must sign and notarize a form stating the known facts and requesting a replacement warrant and a stop payment on the original. If the original warrant has been cashed and cleared Treasury by the time the form from the Local Office reaches treasury another form "Affidavit Claiming Forged State Treasurer's Warrant" must be completed.

If the original warrant was mailed, but not returned, in most cases the Central Office will begin replacement procedures immediately. In certain situations a warrant will not be replaced until it has been determined that the client did not cash or otherwise benefit from the cashing of the warrant to be replaced. One of those situations is if a client's case has been closed, and the last check is reported as not received.

This does sound like a lot of "red tape" but it is easy to see why this procedure is necessary. Again, the caseworkers do not make these procedures but must comply with them. A client who becomes abusive to a caseworker because he doesn't want to wait only makes life uncomfortable for everyone involved.

I believe our caseworkers are doing a good job under very trying and difficult situations.

When I receive complaints of rude treatment, I usually find that our workers are the recipients of rude treatment rather than the perpetrators of it.

DeWitt School Board holds busy session

Courses of action taken during the meeting of the DeWitt Public Schools held Feb. 13 meeting are as follows: The Healthstyle program for health promotion and disease prevention to be offered in the DeWitt Schools. The school district will cover one-half of the \$20 cost for the service. It is anticipated that the program will start in April. Each employee will receive a letter and brochure further explaining the service.

A request to name the football stadium in honor of Gary Challiss was presented to the Board. The request was referred to the Board Facilities Committee with the recommendation that consideration be given to naming the facility the DeWitt Memorial Stadium and a plaque be established which would allow for other names to also be included. The superintendent was directed to obtain teaching staff and support staff feedback on a tentative Board proposal to host breakfast meetings with representatives from each group. The superintendent will be discussing this with staff members during the month report back to the Board in March.

To curriculum

Computer Science may be added

Experts estimate that computer use in the classroom could triple in the next three years and educators should prepare for this technological advance, said an area lawmaker who recently attended a statewide conference on education.

State Rep. Gary Randall (R-Elwell) served as a moderator for a workshop on the future of high technology in Michigan schools, at a House conference on education at the Lansing Hilton Inn, Feb. 15-16. Legislators met with nearly 600 educational leaders at the two-day event which featured speeches by national education experts and workshops on important issues facing school systems.

"The workshop panelists said that the importance of microcomputers in the school system will continue to grow," Randall said. "America's educational system is undergoing a quiet revolution. Five years ago, there were virtually no microcomputers in use. Today, there are more than 150,000. Three

years from now there will be more than 450,000."

Randall, a member of the House Education Committee, said that within 10 years, two out of every five jobs will require some type of technology. "The education community faces problems such as teacher training, computer literacy and adequate funding," he said.

"The coming generation will have to know how to use high technology if they hope to find rewarding careers," Randall said. "The Michigan educational community must be prepared to adequately train our young people so they will have the proper skills."

The Targeting Fuel Assistance Program (TFA) is designed to assist low income families in paying their heating costs. To be eligible the family income must be within the following guidelines: with a family size of one an income level of \$6,075; a family of two with an income of \$8,175; a family of three with an income of \$10,275.

In addition to the income guidelines, the individual household must also spend in excess of 12 percent of their yearly income on heating costs.

The application process is not difficult, but households are required to have proof of all income and current fuel bill receipts. As with many government programs, documentation is a must!

It's wise to call ahead for an appointment and for information. If you are 60 years or older you can call the Senior Citizens Office at 224-7998. Those under 60 can call Community Services at 224-6702. The TFA program ends March 31. All applications must be in by that date.

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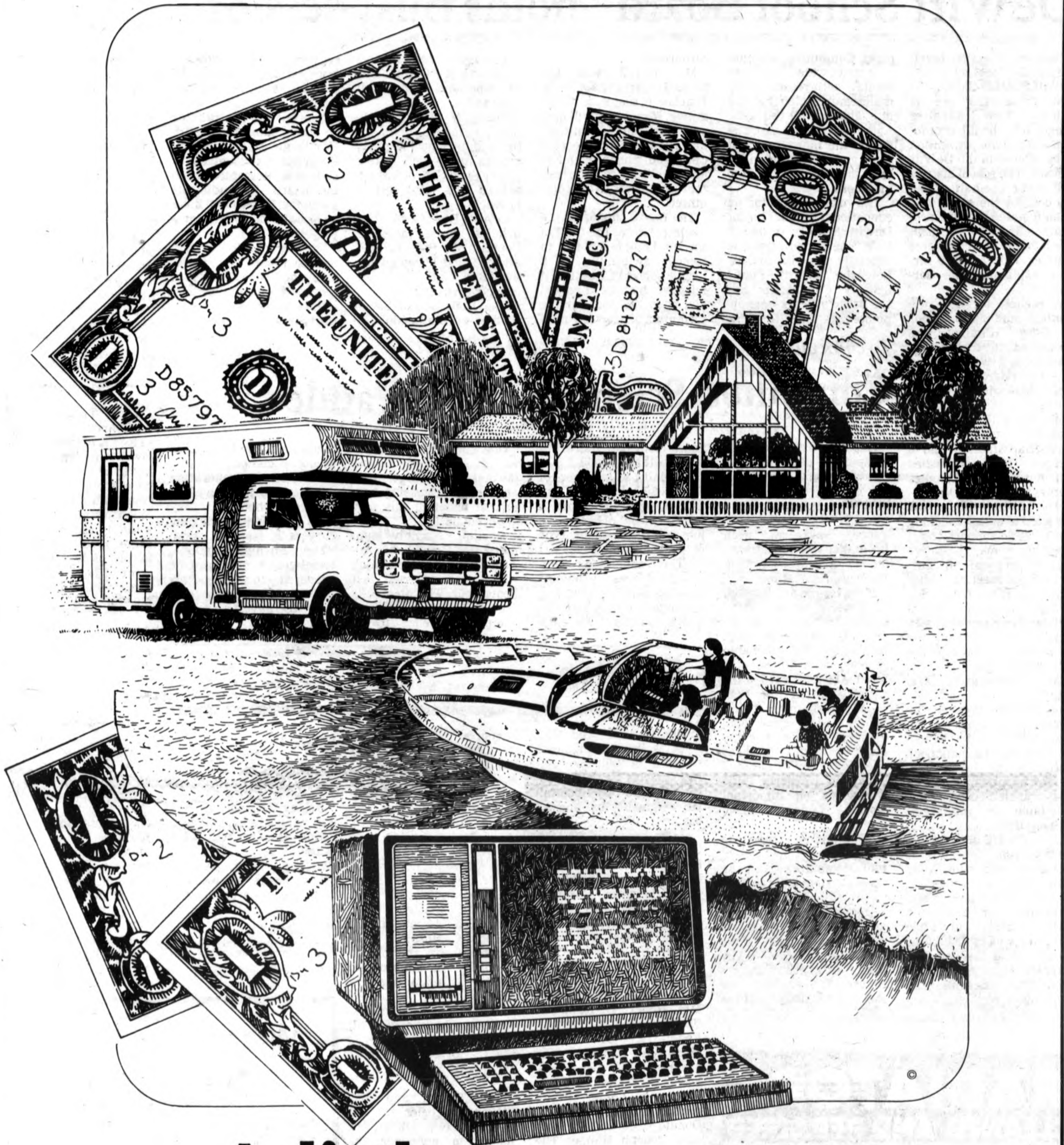

Liven up your garden

If you're just a little bit bored with the same old round, red tomatoes, beets and radishes and green snap beans, squash and lettuce, liven up your garden with vegetables of a different color this year.

Most seed catalogs offer at least a few vegetable varieties in unconventional colors and shapes, observes Lee Taylor, Extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University. Though you probably don't want to give up an old favorite standard variety, you might want to try some of the novel varieties for a change of pace.

Browsing through a selection of seed catalogs can turn up such vegetable oddities as: burpless cucumbers, odorless onions and virtually leafless peas; spindle-shaped red and yellow onions; golden beets; yellow, pink and white tomatoes; pear-shaped tomatoes in red and yellow; white cucumbers; purple kohlrabi, cauliflower, broccoli and snap beans; white radishes, both round and icicle types; red leaf lettuce and rhubarb chard, which has bright red stalks; blue potatoes; yard-long beans and cucumbers; banana muskmelon (roughly banana-shaped and flavored melons that may weigh up to 6 pounds); golden-fleshed watermelon and yellow acorn squash; vegetable spaghetti (a hard-shelled squash with stringy flesh that can be used like pasta); black radishes; Jerusalem artichokes, a sunflower relative grown for its edible tubers; black turtle beans (a dry bean that is a big favorite south of the border); golden buttercup squash (looks like the traditional dark green buttercup except that it's bright orange).

Giant vegetables can also be entertaining to grow, though the eating quality is often not exceptional, Taylor notes.

Another way to spice up the garden is with less commonly grown crops, such as peanuts, okra, popcorn (yellow, white and strawberry types are available), Indian corn, ornamental gourds, broom corn, garlic, leeks, shallots and horseradish.

Long-season crops such as peanuts, okra and sweet potatoes may do better in Michigan some years than others, depending on the weather. Late spring or early fall frosts may shorten the growing season so that these crops don't have time to mature.

Oriental vegetables are another possibility. As stir-frying has become popular, more catalogs are offering a selection of Oriental vegetables well suited to this use.

"When trying new or odd varieties, think small," Taylor suggests. "Try one or two or maybe three new things per year, if you have the space. Plant them in addition to your standard favorite varieties so you don't risk your entire harvest if yield or quality is poor. If you find something you really like, you can enlarge your planting next year."

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Trend toward larger farms in Michigan is continuing

During the past two decades, the average size of farms in Michigan has increased and soybean and corn acreage nearly doubled, in spite of diversion of some cropland to nonfarm use.

A new publication, "Comparing Michigan's Agriculture with that of Nearby States, 1960-1982," written by Karl Wright, Michigan State University agricultural economics professor emeritus, contains data on changes in farm size and other trends since the 1960s in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

"One of the most significant changes in Michigan is the increase in corn and soybean production in the past 10 years," Wright says. "Corn acreage rose from 1.7 million to 3.1 million acres - 42 percent of state cropland - making corn Michigan's major crop. Soybean acreage increased from 500,000 to 1 million acres."

Even though it has lost farm acreage to nonfarm uses, Michigan continues to produce a consistent percentage of the six-state market.

From 1960 to 1964, the average-sized farm in Michigan consisted of 135 acres. By 1982, average farm size had increased to 177 acres. Because of rising costs of farming - equipment, land, fertilizers - and inflation, farmers had either to enlarge their farms, Wright explains, or to supplement their incomes with off-farm jobs.

Farmers with medium-size farms - 100 to 400 acres - found themselves too busy to hold extra jobs, Wright says. The percentage of large farms went up then, because farmers had to increase the size of their farms to maintain their income.

The percentage of smaller farms - those with less than 100 acres - remained about the same, but off-farm income increased each year.

Overall, farmers make twice as much income off the farm as they do from farming. Off-farm income per farmer in Michigan in 1979 averaged \$15,270, compared with \$6,318 net farm income, for a total family income of \$21,588.

Eventually there will be small farms with a great percentage of their income derived somewhere other than the farm, and large farms. The medium-size farm will become obsolete, Wright says.

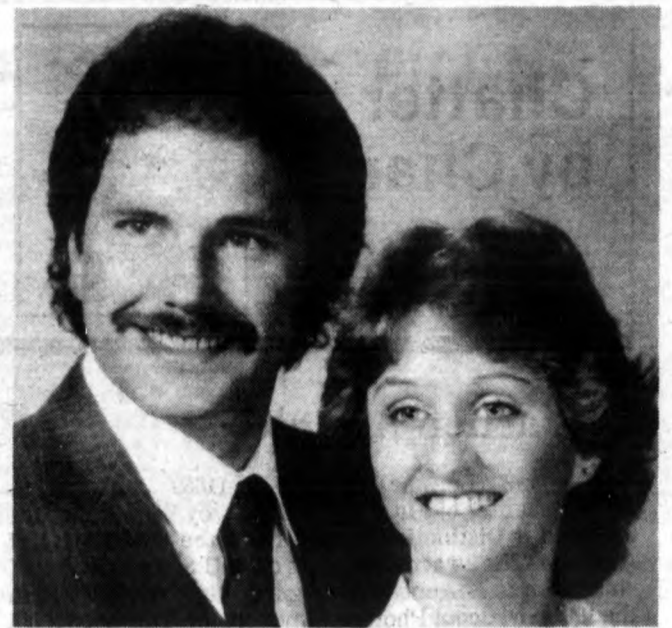

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Egg prices soar to double proportions

The hottest news in the February food report is that retail egg prices are double what they were a year ago. Prices are expected to remain strong through late spring.

Analysts cite four major factors which have pushed egg prices to record highs. First, the nation's laying flock is about 4 percent smaller than a year earlier. Second, the extremely cold weather has reduced the rate of lay (eggs laid per bird). Third, a sizeable number of birds contracted avian flu. Fourth, a greater proportion of eggs are now going to breakers who supply bakeries and other processors.

Consumers are very aware of egg prices so supermarkets may choose to feature them as loss leaders (products sold at cost or below). Thrifty shoppers should check food ads for such special offers.

Broiler prices are also at relatively high levels. This market behavior is somewhat inconsistent given the low beef and pork prices. The 3 percent smaller supply of broilers is one market-strengthening factor. Another big determinant is the demand created for white meat when a national fast-food chain put chicken on their menu several years ago. Dark-meat chicken quarters are a low-cost alternative in some supermarkets.

Beef and pork prices continue at relatively low levels. Expect the forecasted price increases to escalate more quickly as the economy improves.

Salad lovers can put lettuce salads back on the menu. Shoppers will see features as low as 3 heads for a dollar this month. Bell peppers, cucumbers and tomatoes will also be quite reasonable for this season of the year.

Supplies of green beans, cabbage, carrots, celery, corn and onions are down and prices are up. Dry onions will likely continue to increase in price. The fall potato crop in Michigan and across the United

States was small and potato prices have been high. Shoppers can expect prices to trend even higher in the coming weeks. Michigan apples remain one of the best values in the produce department.

Farm Index Prices increase in latest report

The Index of Prices Received by Michigan Farmers for all farm products averaged 141 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending Jan. 15. This represents a 25 point (21 percent) increase from January 1983, according to the Federal/State-Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

Stronger livestock prices continued and pushed the monthly index up 3 points (2 percent). The Index of Prices Paid by Farmers, nationwide, for commodities and services, interest, taxes, and farm wage rates for January 1984 was 164 percent of its 1977 base. The index was up 1 point (1 percent) from December and 6 points (4 percent) above January, 1983.

In Michigan, prices for livestock and livestock products posted a 5 percent gain from the previous month. Meat animals and eggs contributed most to the overall increase. All commodities in the livestock section displayed increases for the month with the exception of calves which revealed a lower price level. Prices in the crops sector were stable for corn, wheat, and hay. Potatoes and oats showed some upward strength while soybeans and dry beans were off from the December level.

Nationally, the January all farm products Index of Prices Received by Farmers increased 3 points (2 percent) from December to 143 percent of its 1977 average. Higher prices for cattle, eggs, tomatoes, hogs, and broilers were partially offset by lower prices for oranges, lettuce, soybeans, cotton, and milk. The index was 15 points (12 percent) above a year ago.

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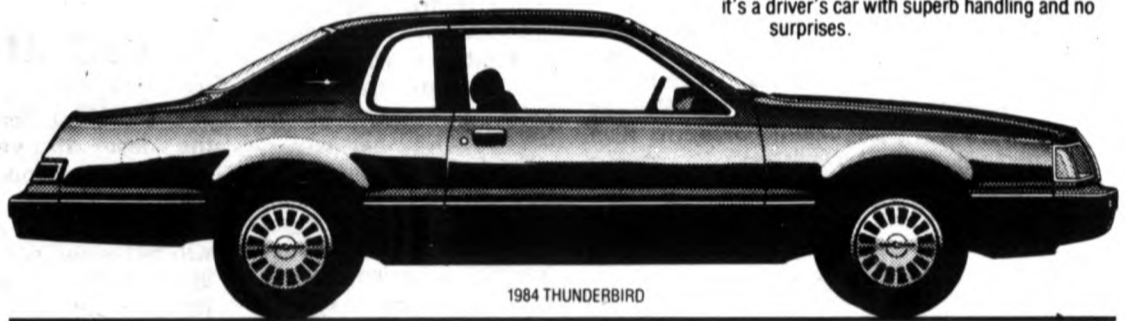

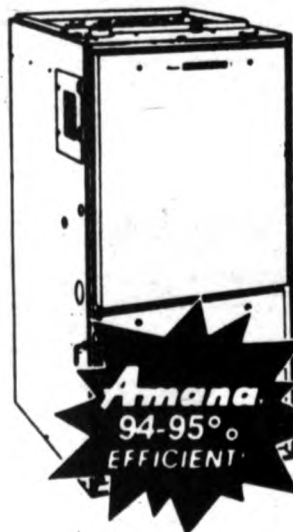

3. That extended separately in said schedule against each description of said lands therein contained are (a) the total amount of delinquent taxes upon said description for the non-payment of which the same may lawfully be sold at the next annual tax sale, (b) interest computed thereon as provided by law to the first day of May, next ensuing, (c) a County Property Tax Administration Fee of four per cent which shall be a minimum of \$2.00 as provided by Section 211.59, C.L. 1979, as amended, and (d) \$10.00 for expenses, all in accordance with the provisions of the act first above mentioned.

4. ORDINANCE NO. 350

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE IV, CHAPTER 41 - STREETS, BY THE DELETION OF THAT SECTION ENTITLED "SAFETY REQUIREMENTS" AND THE ADDITION OF THE PROPOSED SECTION ENTITLED "SAFETY REQUIREMENTS", TO FURTHER GOVERN AND REGULATE THE SAFETY OF STREET EXCAVATION IN THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Chapter 41, Title IV, Subsections 4.31 and 4.32 shall be deleted.

Section 2. That the following section entitled "Safety Requirements" shall be inserted in its place and stead, and shall read as follows:

SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

Purpose. The purpose of this Ordinance is to better control the hazards created on streets, sidewalks, or public properties owned by the City of St. Johns, or under the control of the City of St. Johns, the County of Clinton, or the Michigan State Highway Department as located within the City of St. Johns. It is anticipated the following provisions shall cover the type of work and excavation as follows:

- (1) Street construction and/or maintenance.
- (2) Curb and sidewalk construction and/or maintenance.
- (3) Tree trimming, tree removal, or stump removal.
- (4) Utility construction and/or removal and maintenance, i.e., electric, gas, etc.
- (5) Water mains, water services, sewer mains, or sewer service construction and maintenance.

4.31 Permits Required. No contractor, subcontractor, or anyone acting in consort therewith shall commence any excavation, opening, tree trimming, or maintenance of streets, sidewalks, curbs or other public ways without first obtaining a written permit from the Department of Public Works at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the commencement of such work, and without first notifying the St. Johns Police Department to enable the re-routing, if necessary, of all emergency vehicles, unless such work is deemed to be required in an emergency situation, i.e., gasoline break, in which case such work shall not be commenced without the contractor first contacting the Superintendent of the Department of Public Works, the Superintendent of the Water Department, and the St. Johns Police Department.

4.32 Safeguards and Barricading. All such openings, excavations, maintenance and/or obstructions shall be properly and substantially barricaded, signed and marked at the contractor's expense pursuant to the Manual of Traffic Controls for Street and Highway Construction and/or Maintenance Operations by the Michigan Department of State Highways, Traffic Control Devices, specifically pursuant to Section 6-A-1, 6-A-2, 6-A-3, 6-A-4, and 6-A-5, which sections of the Michigan Department of State Highways' manual is incorporated herein by reference and made a part here of.

4.33 Shoring of Excavations. All openings and excavations shall, where necessary, be properly and substantially sheeted and braced as a safeguard to the workmen and to prevent cave-ins or washouts which would tend to injure and further damage the thoroughfare or subsurface structure of the streets or public ways under construction.

Section 3. Except as herein provided, Chapter 41 of the St. Johns City Code, Title IV, shall stand as first enacted or subsequently amended.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 351

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE VII - BUSINESS AND TRADES, CHAPTER 75, TAXICABS, OF THE ST. JOHNS CITY CODE BY ADDING PROVISIONS TO SET FORTH THE TERMS, CAUSES, AND CONDITIONS UPON WHICH TAXICAB LICENSES AND/OR DRIVER PERMITS SHALL BE SUSPENDED OR REVOKED.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Title VII - Business and Trades, Chapter 75, Taxicabs, shall be amended by the addition of the following section numbers, to set forth the procedures and causes for which the taxicab licenses and/or driver's permit may be suspended, revoked, and providing the holders thereof, provisions for hearings in conjunction therewith.

The following additions shall be added to Chapter 75, Taxicabs, as herein denoted and set forth:

7.100 Suspension or Revocation

Any taxicab license and/or driver's license or permit issued by the City may be suspended or revoked by the City Clerk for cause shown, as herein defined. A hearing shall be scheduled to be held by the City Manager, or the City Manager's designee, or the issuing authority as herein provided.

Depending upon the necessity for prompt action, the hearing shall be held in accordance with one of the following provisions:

(a) If there is no immediate threat to the public health, safety, or welfare, the hearing shall be held to determine whether the license or permit should be suspended or revoked. The holder of the license or permit shall be notified of the time, date, and place of the hearing and shall be notified of the reason or reasons for the proposed suspension or revocation. The licensee or permit holder shall be entitled to be represented by counsel at the hearing, to submit evidence, to cross-examine testifying witnesses, and to make other arguments concerning the factual and legal issues raised. The hearing officer or body shall render its written decision, stating the reasons for such decision.

(b) If there is an immediate threat to the public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of St. Johns, the license or permit may be suspended prior to such hearing. If any such license or permit is suspended prior to the hearing, the hearing shall be commenced as soon as is practical, but in no case, more than ten (10) days after such suspension. The hearing shall then be held and shall determine whether the license shall be terminated and revoked, or whether the suspension should be extended, or if the license should be restored to the holder. The holder of the license shall be notified of the time, date, and place of the hearing, and shall be notified of the reason or reasons for the already imposed suspension, and for any contemplated future action. The licensee or permit holder shall be entitled to be represented by counsel, to submit evidence, to cross-examine testifying witnesses, and to make arguments on factual and legal issues. The hearing officer or body shall render its written decision, stating the reasons for such decision.

(c) In any hearing held pursuant to the provisions of this Chapter, the rules of evidence shall be followed as far as is practicable, but the hearing officer may admit and give probative effect to evidence of a type commonly relied upon by reasonably prudent people in the conduct of their daily affairs: Irrelevant, immaterial, or unduly repetitious evidence may be excluded by the hearing officer. Notice may be taken of facts within the general knowledge of the community and residents of the community.

(d) Any person dissatisfied with the decision of the City Manager or his designee may appeal that decision to the City Commission, provided a written request for such appeal must be filed within seven (7) days of the date the decision was rendered.

The City Commission shall schedule a hearing, upon receipt of the written request, within ten (10) days of the receipt of the written request. The hearing shall then be scheduled and held before the entire City Commission, or a quorum thereof. The factual record made in the hearing below shall constitute the basic record for the appeal. The city may, but need not, allow the presentation of additional evidence, the decision to be by a majority vote of the City Commission. The City commission may affirm, reverse, or modify any action taken by the City Manager or his designee, relative to the license.

7.101 Cause Defined

The term "cause" as used in this title shall include the commission or omission of any act, the permitting of any condition to exist in the trade, business, profession, or occupation, activity or privilege for which the license was issued, under the provisions of this code, or upon the premises or facilities used in conjunction and connection therewith, which act, omission, or commission is:

- (1) A violation of this Code;
- (2) A violation of any other applicable federal, state, or local law, ordinance, rule, or regulation.
- (3) Unlawful or fraudulent act by nature.
- (4) Actions beyond the scope of the license granted.
- (5) Abandonment of the license, trade, business, profession, occupation.
- (6) A deceptive practice as defined in the Michigan Consumer Protection Act.

Section 2. Except as herein provided, Chapter 75, Taxicabs, of the St. Johns City code shall stand as first enacted or subsequently amended.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

ORDNANCE NO. 348

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND REWRITE CHAPTER 73, PEDDLERS AND CANVASSERS OF THE ST. JOHNS CITY CODE TO PROVIDE AS HEREIN SET FORTH AND TO BE ENTITLED "PEDDLERS, CANVASSERS, AND TRANSIENT MERCHANTS". THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS

Section 1. That Chapter 73 of the St. Johns City Code shall be amended to read and entitled "Peddlers, Canvassers, And Transient Merchants" and shall herein delete Chapter 73, Section 7.41 through 7.51, as aforesaid, and shall implant in their place and stead, the following:

CHAPTER 73 PEDDLERS, CANVASSERS, AND TRANSIENT MERCHANTS

7.41 Permit and License Required

It shall be unlawful for any solicitor, peddler, canvasser, or transient merchant, as defined in Section 7.42 herein, to engage in such business within the City Limits of the City of St. Johns, without first having obtained a permit and license therefor, in compliance with the provisions of this Chapter.

7.42 Definitions.

(1) Canvasser or Solicitor. A canvasser or solicitor is defined as an individual, whether a resident of the City of St. Johns or not, traveling either by foot, wagon, automobile, motor truck, or any other type of conveyance, from place to place, from house to house, or from street to street, taking or attempting to take orders for sale of goods, wares, and merchandise, personal property of any nature whatsoever for future delivery, or for services to be furnished or performed in the future, whether or not such individual has, carries or exposes for sale, a sample of the subject of such sale or whether he is collecting advance payments on such sales or not, provided that such definition shall include any person who, for himself, or for another person, firm, or corporation, hires, leases, uses, or occupies any building, structure, tent, railroad boxcar, boat, hotel room, lodging house, apartment, shop, or any other place within the City for the sole purpose of exhibiting samples and taking orders for future delivery.

(2) Peddler. The word "peddler" as used herein shall include any person, whether a resident of the City of St. Johns, or not, traveling by foot, wagon, automotive vehicle, or any other type of conveyance, from place to place, from house to house, or from street to street, carrying, conveying, or transporting goods, wares, merchandise, meats, fish, vegetables, fruits, garden truck, farm products or provisions, offering and exposing the same for sale, or making sales and delivering articles to purchasers, or who without traveling from place to place, shall sell or offer the same for sale from a wagon, automotive vehicle, railroad car, or other vehicle or conveyance, and further provided that one who solicits orders and as a separate transaction makes deliveries to purchasers as a part of a scheme or design to evade the provisions of this Chapter. The word "peddler" shall include the words "hawker" and "huckster".

(3) Transient Merchant. A transient merchant is any person, firm, corporation, whether as owner, agent, consignee, or employee, or whether a resident within the City Limits of the City of St. Johns, or a resident outside the City Limits of the City of St. Johns, that engages in a temporary business of selling and/or delivering goods, wares, services, or who conducts meetings open to the general public where franchises, distributorships, contracts or business opportunities are offered to participants, or one who sells, offers, or exhibits for sale, any goods, wares, or services, franchises, distributorships, contracts, or business opportunities out of trucks, vehicles, vans, or located on street corners, parking lots, lawns, or other devices and locations; the foregoing notwithstanding, however, a transient merchant, for the purposes of this section, shall not include the following:

(a) person, firm, or corporation who shall occupy any of the aforesaid places for the purpose of conducting a permanent business therein or thereon, provided no person, firm, or corporation shall be relieved from the provisions of the ordinance by reason of a temporary association with any local dealer, owner, trader, merchant, or auctioneer, or by conducting such temporary transient business in connection with or as a part of, or in the name of any local dealer, owner, trader, merchant, or auctioneer, and shall not include any garage sales, by owners of the property thereon, or any auction sales on property owned by the resident and involving sale of property of said owner.

7.43 Application

Applicants for permit and license under this Chapter must file with the City Clerk, a sworn application in writing, (in duplicate), on a form to be furnished by the City Clerk, which shall give the following information:

- (1) Name and description of the applicant.
- (2) Permanent home address and full local address of the applicant.
- (3) A brief description of the nature of the business and the goods to be sold.

(4) If employed, the name and address of the employer, together with credentials establishing the exact relationship.

(5) The length of time for which the right to do business is desired.

(6) The place where the goods or property proposed to be sold, or orders taken for the sale thereof, are manufactured or produced, where such goods or products are located at the time said application is filed, and the proposed method of delivery.

(7) The applicant shall furnish to the City Clerk, his sales tax license number and proof of the issuance thereof.

(8) The applicant shall furnish to the City Clerk, a lease, rental agreement, or other indication of the written permission of the owner of the property upon which the establishment of the business is to occur.

7.44 Investigation and Issuance.

(1) Upon receipt of such application, the original shall be referred to the Chief of Police, who shall cause such investigation of the applicant's business and moral character to be made as he deems necessary for the protection of the public good.

(2) If, as a result of such investigation, the applicant's character or business responsibility is found to be unsatisfactory, the Chief of Police shall endorse on such application his disapproval and the reasons for the same, and shall return the application to the City Clerk.

(3) If, as a result of such investigation, the character and business responsibility of the applicant are found to be satisfactory, the Chief of Police shall endorse on the application his approval, and shall return the application with his endorsement of approval thereon to the City Clerk.

(4) The City Clerk, after obtaining the recommendation of the Chief of Police, shall then satisfy himself that all provisions set forth in Section 7.43 herein are met, and shall then complete the license and issue the same to the applicant for the purposes set forth and for the time limit set forth therein. The Clerk shall keep a permanent record of all licenses applied for, issued and denied.

7.45 Fees

(1) The license fee shall be set by the St. Johns City Commission, by resolution, and shall be posted in the offices of the City Clerk or in the Municipal Building, and shall be continued as set by the St. Johns City Commission, or until subsequently amended by the St. Johns City Commission by resolution.

(2) No fee shall be required of one selling products of the farm produced by the seller or by his immediate employer.

(3) The St. Johns City Commission may, by resolution, waive the requirement for payment of fees, wither for the investigation, or for the license, or for both, if it deems the applicant represents and acts on behalf of a charitable, benevolent, or non-profit organization.

7.46 Exhibition of License.

Peddlers, solicitors, and transient merchants are required to exhibit their licenses and display the same at the request of any official acting for and on behalf of the City, or at the request of any citizen.

7.47 Hours.

No person licensed under this Chapter shall engage in peddling, soliciting, canvassing, or transient selling of merchandise, goods, or wares, within the City of St. Johns between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m.

7.48 Duty of Police to Enforce

It shall be the duty of any police officer of the City of St. Johns to require any person seen soliciting, peddling, or selling wares, who is not known by such officer to be duly licensed, to produce his solicitor's and /or peddler's license and to enforce the provisions of this Code against such person found to be in violation of the same.

7.49 Penalty.

Any person, firm, or corporation violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars, nor more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, for each such offense.

Section 2. Except as herein provided, Chapter 73 of the St. Johns City Code shall stand as first enacted or subsequently amended.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

Area schools continue quiz competition

Students from 49 Michigan high schools, three of them locally, will be playing the "varsity sport of the mind" at Alma College through March 21. The students, almost 250 of them, are participants in a high school version of the quiz game "College Bowl."

In Alma's Quiz Bowl, there are two divisions of competition, determined by school size and corresponding to the class level of sports competition set by the Michigan High School Athletic Association.

Area schools competing in Quiz Bowl are St. Johns, Bath and DeWitt.

Quiz Bowl is a single elimination tournament. Seventeen schools will be eliminated in the first round Feb. 4. Eight schools in A-B and seven in C-D drew byes (automatic wins) in the first round.

Played between two four-member teams, Quiz Bowl is a fast-moving question and answer game lasting 16 minutes and played in two eight-minute halves. It is a game of quick recall and fast response, with points awarded to the team giving the correct answer first. Contestants have three seconds to answer toss-up questions (worth 10 points each) and five seconds to answer bonus questions (worth a pre-stated number of points from 20 to 35, depending upon complexity and degree of difficulty).

Either team is eligible to answer toss-up questions, but the individual team members must signal to answer by pressing a buzzer which then blocks out signals from the other players. There can be no consultation among players to answer toss-up questions. Correctly answering a toss-up question gives a team the exclusive right to answer bonus questions.

Both toss-up and bonus questions cover a broad range of topics including science,

politics, literature, history, religion, art, chemistry, geography, movies, television shows, Olympic competitions, sports, music, and Nobel, Pulitzer and Academy Award winners.

The questions Alma uses are purchased from Quiz Bowl, Inc. and validated by Reader's Digest. Participating schools are sent sample sheets of questions similar to those used in competition.

Alma's High School Quiz Bowl gives academically-talented students the opportunity to be identified and win recognition the way outstanding athletes are recognized: through competition. It also gives high schools from all over the state opportunities to compete with other schools. Each school chooses its own team members, an alternate and a coach.

Coincidentally, Alma's High School Quiz Bowl championship matches for the past three years have coincided with "March Madness" high school basketball State Finals. One Michigan daily in 1981 tagged Alma's Quiz Bowl competition "The Other State Finals," involving "head-to-head competition, lightning reflexes and dumb luck."

The 1983 champions were Flint Luke M. Powers (which had a team in the state basketball finals the same night the Quiz Bowl team won) in A-B and Saugatuck in C-D. Andover took second in A-B and Orchard Lake St. Mary's Preparatory second in C-D.

Okemos won the A-B championship in both 1981 and 1982, with Ferndale the runner-up in 1981 and Andover in 1982. The C-D champion in 1981 was DeWitt, with Detroit Country Day second. In 1982, it was Carson City-Crystal over Vandercook Lake in the C-D championship match.

Homeowners given blooming tips on shrubs

Homeowners can enjoy the effects of spring a little earlier than normal if they'll bring clippings from ornamental trees and shrubs indoors and force them into bloom.

"Branches of most flowering trees that are brought indoors after Jan. 1 will blossom well ahead of their normal time to flower," says Lee Taylor, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service horticulture specialist. "These include pussywillows, forsythia, quince, maples and most fruit trees."

The closer it is to the normal blooming time, the sooner the buds will begin to flower. Though normal indoor temperatures will cause branch cuttings to bloom more quickly, the blossoms will fall sooner than if the cuttings were forced at temperatures below 60 degrees. Taylor suggests that the cuttings be kept in the basement or similarly cool location.

To force blossoms, choose branches 1½ to 3 feet long that have budded. Flower buds are larger than leaf buds, Taylor notes. Branches taken from the side of the tree or bush exposed to the most sunlight will have the larger buds.

Branches cut on a diagonal will take up water better. Place the cuttings in a bucket of lukewarm water and put them in a cool location. Occasional misting will help the buds to open. When the color of the flowers begins to show, select cuttings from the branches to accent household plants or use the cuttings as a bouquet.

Flowers will last longer if they're displayed in a cool location, such as on a window sill.

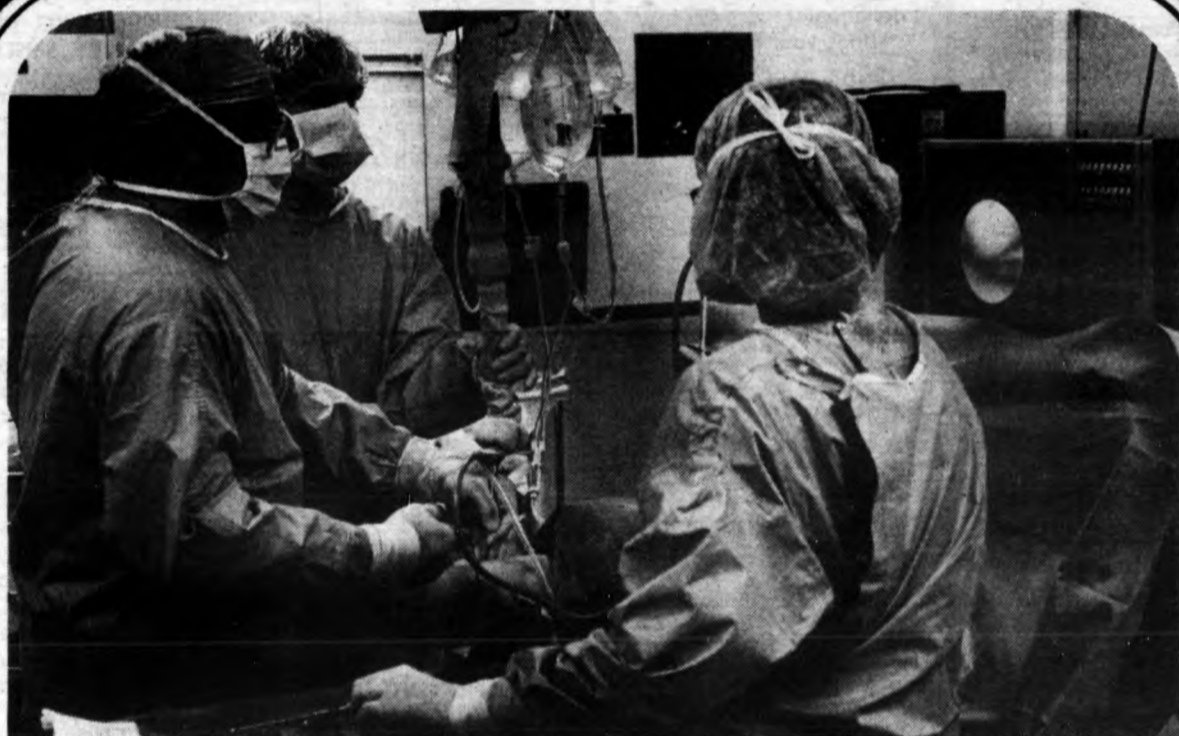

Sophisticated surgery means less trauma, faster recovery.

Gone are the days when knee surgery put patients on the sideline for the season. Now, when someone (like a Big 10 basketball player, for instance) comes to Lansing General Hospital for knee surgery, he can often be back on the court in ten days, thanks to new arthroscopic surgical methods.
