As a recent graduate of the Michigan State University School of Journalism, Susan Owens has joined the staff of the Clinton County News with several goals in mind.

"I want to provide Clinton County with the news the residents want to read. As a community newspaper, I feel that we are the voice for the county as a whole.

"We hold a precarious position. We can either be a loyal friend to the community, helping to pull the county closer together, or a faithless foe. Naturally, the upcoming months will be the determinant of the outcome, but personally, I think we've got a winning team now. We're dedicated to getting the job done and getting it done with excellence."

While at Michigan State, Owens worked as a summer intern at the Grand Blanc News, a weekly community newspaper in the Flint area. It was that experience that lead her to pursue her career in weekly community newspapers rather than a daily.

"I like a more personal approach. With a community newspaper, I am able to get out and meet with the people I'm writing for. So often people see the press as an impersonal force wanting to violate the rights of individuals simply for the sake of a good story. At the same time, people see the press as individuals who just don't

care. I want to change that. Together, with Harold and Connie, we're GOING to change that."

Harold Schmaltz has recently resumed the position as general manager for the Clinton County News after a seven year absence from the newspaper.

In viewing Sue's new role at the Clinton County News, Schmaltz had this outlook: "I'm particularly excited about the changes we've got going here at the News. In returning to my post here three weeks ago, I pledged to the community that I would staff this organization with credentialled people. Sue certainly qualifies in that capacity. I know the county readership is going to enjoy her exuberant personality and her obvious love for life. It's going to be a pleasure having her on the staff."

Connie Squires, a recent graduate of St. Johns High School, is also an illustration student at Michigan State University and Lansing Community College. She is currently working on a part time basis at the News and is looking forward to helping build a solid reputation for the Clinton County News.

Owens is originally from the Flint area. She was born in Flint and later moved with her family to the suburb of Grand Blanc. Her father, Thomas, works for General Motors in Grand Blanc, while her mother, Janet, works part-time for the Days-Ease Corporation. Her brother Paul, 15, is a sophomore at Grand Blanc High School, while brother Tom, 26, is attending school in California.

Upon graduation from Grand Blanc High School in 1979, Owens entered the Social Work program at the University of Michigan-Flint.

During that time, Owens worked as a volunteer leader for the Young Life Campaign, an international organization designed to introduce high school students to the Christian way of life.

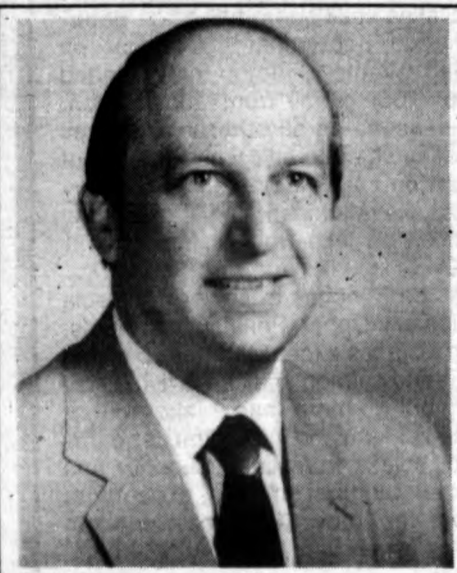
The following year, she transferred to Michigan State University and after becoming disenchanted with the negativism of the press, decided to change her major to journalism. She graduated in December, 1983.

Barry Dean named to Bank Board

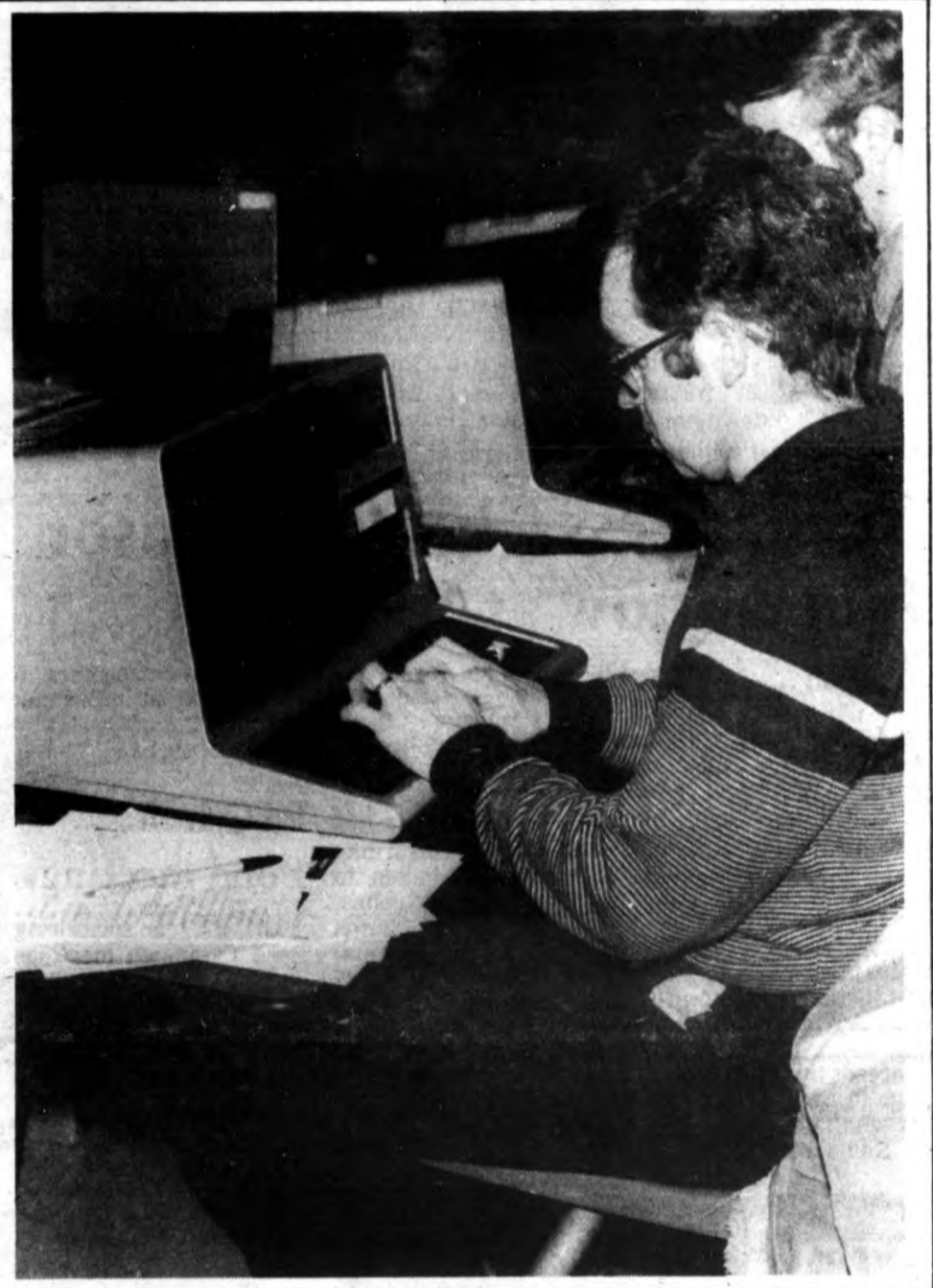
Clinton Bank and Trust Company President Brandon C. White, this week, announced the appointment of local businessman, Barry F. Dean, to the bank's board of directors.

Clinton teachers become college students again

The teachers and administrators in the Clinton Intermediate School District have recently become students again. This time around, they are learning about the uses of computers in the classroom and how they might incorporate the systems into their curriculum.

According to Jenny McCampbell, consultant for educational programs, the class enrollments went far beyond their expectations.

"We've had a wonderful response by the teachers. Because of the increase in demand, we've had to add a fourth class

for the spring." She added, "The teachers want to be informed about the latest developments in education."

The classes instructed the teachers on how to properly evaluate software programs and how to adopt a program that can best be used by students as a learning tool.

Lansing Community College offered the computer courses for five weeks during winter term. Two more classes will offered spring term for teachers who might be interested.

COMMISSION ORDER

(Under authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929 and Act 230 P.A. 1925, as amended) STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on January 13, 1984, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April 1, 1984, and ending March 31, 1987, no person shall possess, take or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon except on Lake Huron and its tributary streams and on Lake Michigan and its tributary streams the season on lake trout is from May 1 through August 15.

Size limits shall be 8 inches in Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on all lakes except the daily possession limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 2 lake trout or splake from Lake Michigan and its tributary streams or 3 lake trout or splake from Lake Superior and Lake Huron and their tributary streams, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only.

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Area police investigate County break-ins

This week, the Clinton County Sheriff's Department answered three personal injury accidents, seven property damage accidents and three car-deer accidents. Other complaints included four malicious destructions, five larcenies, two alarms, four breaking and enterings, three domestics, three assaults and one stolen vehicle.

On Feb. 24, officers investigated a report of a stolen vehicle in Bengal Township. The vehicle, owned by Michael Robert Fox of 4389 Farragher Road, St. Johns, was reported to have been stolen from the residence at 4264 S. Grove Road, Bengal Township.

The car, a 1979 Chevrolet Z-28, was later located approximately two miles

from where it was reported stolen. Merchandise including a graphic equalizer, tapes, radio, flashlight, sunglasses and money totalling over \$360 were reported missing from the vehicle. The Sheriff's Department has a suspect in custody following the investigation.

On Feb. 25, officers investigated a report of a breaking and entering at Fowler High School in Dallas Township. Upon arrival at the scene, officers found a storage shed holding athletic equipment broken into, but it is unknown at this time whether anything was taken. The Sheriff's Department reports the breaking and entering to have occurred Feb. 24, after 5 p.m.

On Feb. 25, officers also investigated a report of damage done to a vehicle owned by Jeff Rozen of 131 W. Elm St., Elsie. The vehicle, a 1978 shortbox pick-up, was reported to have been scratched extensively by someone with a sharp object.

The St. Johns Police Department investigated three reports of breaking and entering. On Feb. 21, officers investigated a reported breaking and entering at Eve's Inn, 1397 N. U.S. 27. Upon arrival, officers discovered a broken window used to gain entry into the

restaurant. Merchandise and cash amounting to less than \$50 was reported missing.

On Feb. 26, officers were again called to Eve's Inn to investigate a second report of breaking and entering. At this time, nothing was reported to have been missing. There are no suspects in both cases and both are pending further investigation.

On Feb. 22, St. Johns Police Department received a report of a breaking and entering at the Assembly of God Church on S. U.S. 27. Several small items, including a

calculator, were reported missing. The case is still under investigation.

In DeWitt Township, police were called Feb. 25 to investigate the breaking and entering of the residence of Donald Harnish of 11303 Wood Road. After noticing a broken basement window, neighbors called the police requesting an investigation.

Police report that \$600 worth of goods were taken from the home, including a microwave oven. There are no suspects in the case but detectives are continuing their investigation.

In DeWitt City, five people were arrested for possession of alcohol in a vehicle.

Police also investigated a report of up to \$600 worth of damage done to Perry Creek Golf Course, 704 Webb Road, DeWitt. According to police, green numbers 13, 14, 15 and 16 were reportedly torn up by an individual(s) with their hands. Presently, owner Roger Overway is considering a reward for information regarding the destruction.

Officers also picked up four minors for curfew violations.

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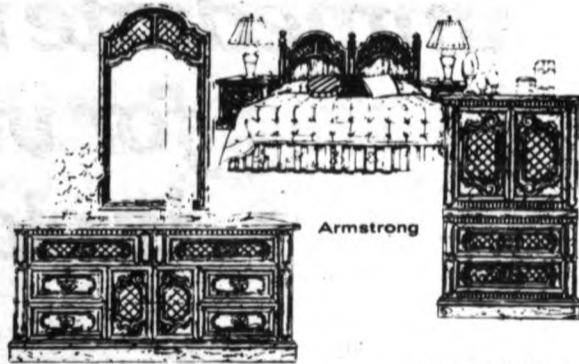
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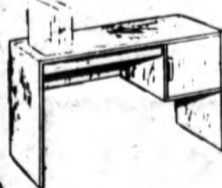
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After three years

Wedding reunites old friends in Bath

Three years ago, Lisa Tarrant said good-bye to a friend she thought she would never see again. But last week, Erja Keinanen returned from Finland to stand in Tarrant's wedding as honorary Maid-of-Honor.

"We never dreamed she would be here for the wedding," said Tarrant. "I wrote her in May, hinting around to the fact that I was going to ask her. And then when I called her to ask and she said yes, I was thrilled. I couldn't believe it."

Tarrant and Keinanen became friends when Keinanen was placed in the Bath school district as part of the internationally known student exchange program. They were in the same history class, but it wasn't until they spent spring break together that the real friendship began.

"Our trip to Florida really cemented us together," said Tarrant. "It cemented our whole family together."

During that trip, Keinanen was quickly "adopted" into the Tarrant family. By the time her 11 month stay in the United States was over, it was like saying good-bye to a member of the family. What's more, none of them knew when they would see each other again.

Keinanen said it wasn't long after returning home that she began missing the Tarrant's and her other American friends. In one sense, it was like she had left a whole new life. But even then, she never imagined herself returning to that life so quickly, especially to stand in Tarrant's wedding party.

Upon her "homecoming" two weeks ago, Keinanen said a lot of things have changed. She said it was a shock to go by her old house and find it torn down in order to make room for the expressway. In addition, most of her friends were either away at college or had moved away with new families of their own.

"That's American culture; everybody is always getting married, having babies or moving away at an early age," she said with a smile. "In Finland, people don't get married until after they have an occupation and that's after five years of school."

Both Tarrant and Keinanen admit that their time spent together these past few weeks was far too short. Together, they are making plans for the future for a time when they will see each other again.

"My fiance and I are already planning a trip to Finland someday," Tarrant said. "We'll see each other again, there's no doubt about it, but it's going to be horrible when she leaves."

Wildlife workshop offered by MSU

People interested in the protection program for Michigan's nongame wildlife will want to attend Farmers' Week and Natural Resources Days, March 19-24, at Michigan State University.

"Michigan was one of the first states to initiate a management program for preservation of un hunted game, but there were insufficient funds to develop an effective program," say Glenn Dudderar, MSU Extension fisheries and wildlife specialist. "Recently, funds have been made available through a tax-free donation program. Now we must determine what the potential is for a program in Michigan, and for that, we need suggestions from interested people."

The workshops will enable people to explore possible nongame management options with wildlife management experts so that a satisfactory way can be found to use the funds, Dudderar says.

The program begins at 9:15 a.m. March 19 in B102 Wells Hall. The feature speakers will be from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

Discussion will focus on nongame birds, mammals, reptiles and amphibians, fish and invertebrates by respective habitat: forestlands, wetlands, coastal areas, agricultural, prairie and urban areas.

This session is one of 19 programs offered during the week that relate to Michigan's lake, water and wildlife resources. These programs are free and open to the public.

Supt. Runkle approves qualification of bonds

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Phillip E. Runkel has approved the preliminary qualification of bonds in the amount of \$3,950,000 for several construction projects in the St. Johns Public Schools so the district may hold an election on March 26.

The application dated Jan. 25 received from St. Johns Public Schools for Preliminary Qualification of Bonds in the amount of \$3,950,000 is for the purpose of erecting, furnishing and equipping a new elementary school building; partially remodeling and partially re-equipping five existing elementary school buildings, in-part for energy conservation purposes; constructing and equipping playgrounds and developing and improving sites.

The proposed new elementary school will replace two elementary schools—Central and Perrin-Palmer Schools, which will be abandoned. The proposal results from the enclosed Citizens Committee Report containing a recommendation that Central, which was built in 1886, is sprawling, lacks adequate site, is outdated, and recommends that a new elementary school be built on land the district owns adjacent to the high school. An on site visit supports the committee's viewpoint.

Updating of the other schools would include roof and single glazed window replacements, lowering ceilings, upgrading heating and ventilation systems, plus developing playgrounds and site improvements.

When the current enrollment of 3,520 is compared with the estimated membership five years hence of approximately 3,331, it shows an overall decline of 189 children or 5.4%. This estimated decline however, impacts grades 6 through 12 rather than K-5 for which this bond issue is targeted. In response to how the district would utilize excess space at the middle and high school levels, school officials responded that the district is in need of storage and conference space at the secondary level. Also, three portable units now in use would be abandoned. Moreover, the district is proposing to expand its high school instructional program from five to six hours, and is discussing with neighboring districts the feasibility of it being the focal point of a multi-district sharing program for advanced chemistry, math, and computer science.

This will be the first attempt at passage of this bond issue, and the ratio of debt to valuation will be 3.4% if the bond issue is successful.

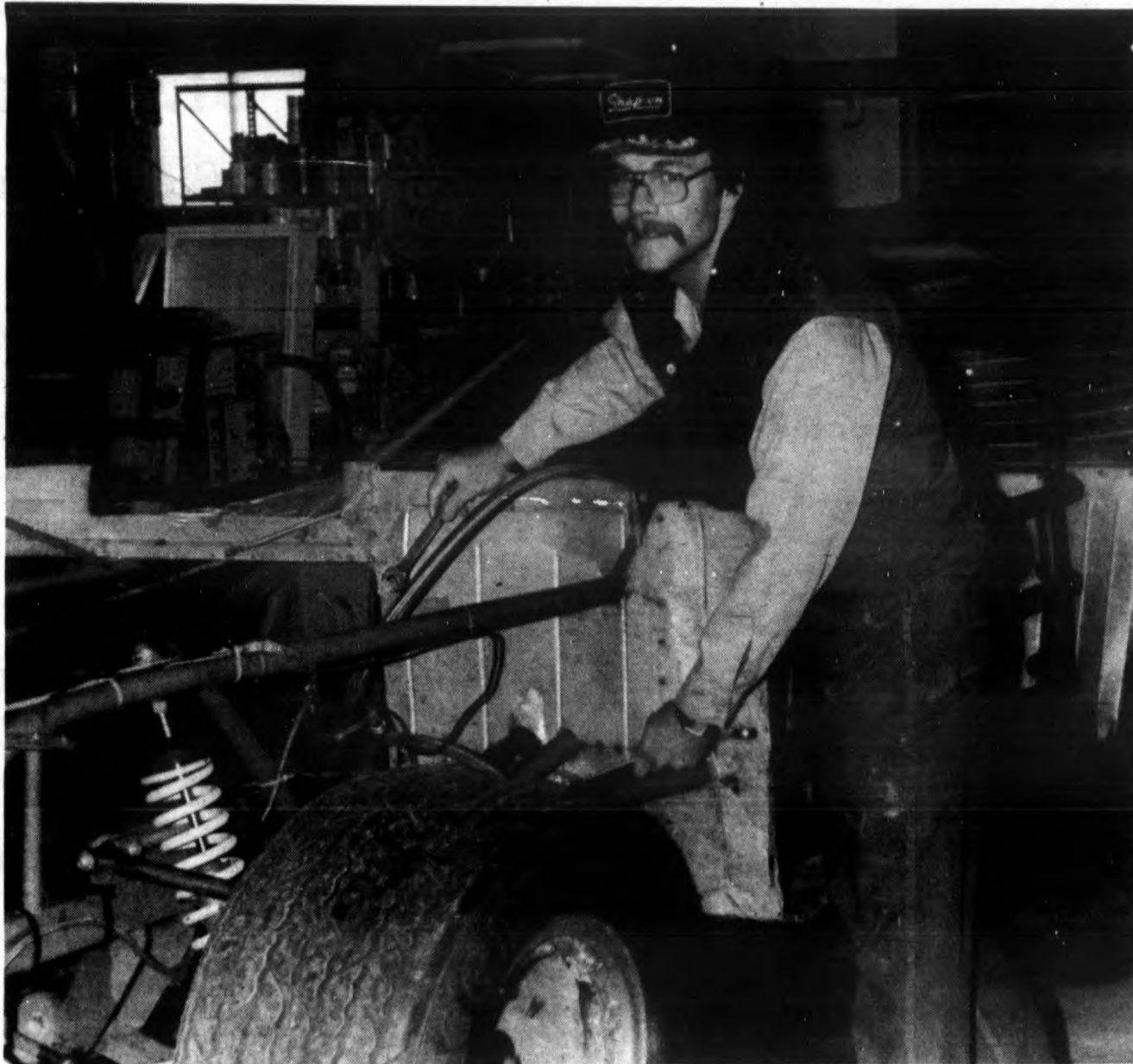
"It isn't easy living on the road, going to different

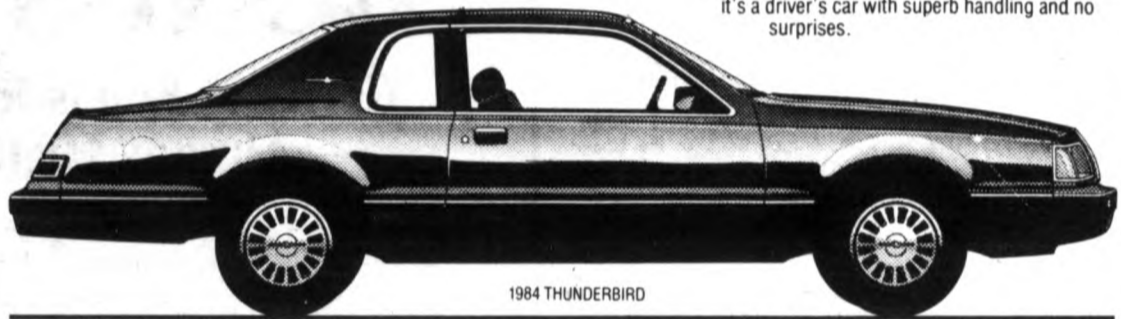

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF BATH CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 31.4

THE BATH CHARTER TOWNSHIP BOARD OF TRUSTEES AT THEIR REGULAR MID-MONTHLY MEETING OF FEBRUARY 22, 1984 ADOPTED THE FIRST READING OF THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE: AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 31 OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF BATH ENTITLED: "AN ORDINANCE ENACTED UNDER ACT 184, PUBLIC ACTS OF 1943, AS AMENDED GOVERNING THE UNINCORPORATED PORTIONS OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF BATH, TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF ZONING DISTRICTS WITHIN WHICH THE PROPER USE OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES MAY BE ENCOURAGED AND REGULATED; TO PROVIDE FOR THE LOCATION, THE SIZE AND THE TYPES OF USES THAT MAY BE MADE OF THE MINIMUM OPEN SPACES; TO PROVIDE FOR SANITARY, SAFETY, LIGHT AND OTHER PROTECTIVE MEASURES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF FAMILIES THAT MAY BE HOUSED IN DWELLINGS, BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES, INCLUDING MOBILE HOMES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND AMENDMENT OF SAID ORDINANCE; TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS AND FOR THE ORGANIZATION AND PROCEDURES TO BE FOLLOWED BY THE BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATIONS OF SAID ORDINANCE."

BATH CHARTER TOWNSHIP ORDAINS:
Sec. 19.14 Public or Private Junkyards

i. The following minimum standards for site development and site use shall be established for junkyards located in the D-Development zoning district.

Junkyards, as allowed in the Development District, refers only to those uses of land or structures which involve, and are limited to, the storage of used, inoperative motor vehicles, salvage and resale of used motor vehicle parts and the cartage of motor vehicles in wrecked or inoperable condition.

1. All such uses shall not be established on land in the Township until a Special Use Permit has been issued by the Township and all license requirements of the Michigan Department of State, Bureau of Automobile Regulation (or successor) have been fully complied with. All such uses shall further be maintained in accordance with all applicable State of Michigan statutes and regulations.

2. The minimum site area of establishment of a junkyard in the Development district shall be five (5) acres. In the case of previously established uses of land in this category, the Planning Commission may recommend and the Township Board may authorize a Special Use Permit on a site of less than the minimum area, subject to final site approval and other conditions which may be required to ensure proper utilization of the site and minimal impact on adjacent properties.

3. All activities involving motor vehicle storage, salvage of used motor vehicle parts, assembly of parts, cutting or welding activities and repair of motor vehicle components shall be confined within a screened enclosure as required in the paragraph immediately following.

4. Outdoor motor vehicle storage and all permitted and related activities shall be screened by an opaque fence or wall, earthen berm covered with turf or other plantings, or by a dense evergreen planting. Such screening shall be designed so as to completely obstruct view of stored materials and salvage operations from public streets and occupied structures on adjoining lands. Such screening shall be shown on the site plan submitted for approval in connection with the Special Use Permit application.

5. Screening required in connection with this Section shall be setback a minimum of one hundred (100) feet from any public street.

6. All oil, gasoline, hydraulic or other fluids shall be drained from all vehicles stored on the site and placed in holding tanks for future disposal off the site. Every effort shall be made to prevent any material of this type from entering the soil.

7. No burning beyond the limited amount normally associated with residential land use shall be permitted.

8. Motor vehicles, motor vehicle components or other materials or equipment associated with this use shall be stacked or piled so as not to be visible from a public street or occupied structures on adjoining land.

9. Steps satisfactory to the Mid-Michigan District Health Department (or successor) and the Township shall be taken to control rats and other rodents on the site.

10. The intensity level of sounds generated by the operation of a junkyard located within five hundred (500) feet of a residential land use shall not exceed fifty five (55) decibels (dba) when measured at the property line of the residential use which is closest to the junkyard except between the hours of 8 A.M. and 5 P.M. Monday through Saturday.

11. The operator of any junkyard for which a Special Use Permit is issued shall, as a condition of such permit, agree and be subject to periodic on-site inspections by the Zoning Administrator to ensure continuing compliance with this Section and any special conditions of the Special Use Permit.

This Ordinance shall become effective according to law.
