## Massive phone bill staggers resident

"They usually come in little envelopes, but now they are thinking about delivering them to me in semi's," joked Robert Speidel, in discussing this month's phone bill of \$54,337.73.

Speidel, 41, received his first 62-page phone bill of \$10,105.78 last month, while watching his parents farm in St. Johns. This month, the pages more than doubled at 278, totaling more than \$54,000.

According to Speidel, he doesn't know how the amount of the phone bill got so high. Most of the calls, many being charged to places like Jamaica and New York,

were made using his parent's personal telephone credit card number. Yet, their bill only actually amounted to \$26.72 during both billing periods.

"I talked to my parents in Florida and they said that they didn't leave their credit card anywhere," he explained. "The phone company doesn't even know exactly how it got started. They say that there's definitely fraud involved and that they are investigating it."

In the mean time, Speidel has decided to investigate other means of communication. "I think I'm going to look into carrier pigeons. They might be less expensive."

## This year, she's going to 'Bee Chu'

"We're horse people," said Dolores Patterson, of Bath. "Once it get's in your blood, it will never get out."

The "transfusion" began five years ago when her husband, Don, spotted an old gray arabian horse hanging his head over the fence at a local 4-H fair. As a long-time admirer and painter of horses, something clicked inside. He immediately told the owner that he was interested in buying "Zyn" for his eight-year-old daughter, Deanna. Within a week, the owner contacted him and offered to sell.

According to Dolores, that was the family's first step into horse training, something none of them really knew anything about.

"Don had always lived in the city," she said. "He had always been interested in horses, he painted them, but this was the first one he had bought. We didn't even have a barn or a fence for Zyn."

After reading numerous books, Don began training Zyn for the Central Michigan Horseman Association's annual show. With his daughter by his side, they not only taught Zyn how to walk and trot, but they also taught her how to ride the eight-year-old horse professionally.

When Deanna turned ten, she joined the 4-H horse circuit. Her mother claims that is where she really got started showing horses.

"She began to do real well," she said. "She was getting good instructions from a 4-H trainer. Without Toni Tenlen, of Triple T Quarterhorses, she wouldn't have done so well."

Her first year in competition awarded her with a first place ribbon in Horsemanship. She also placed first in the Trail competition and in Fitting and Showing.

Deanna held the Trail honors for three years in a row. Then, in 1982, something happened to change her career forever. Her father had become increasingly interested in Paint horses over the years. In February, he rounded up his family and they went to an owner's farm to check out

their first Paint horse.

"The owners didn't know if it was a Pinto or a Paint horse," Don said. "When they brought him out, he looked awful. He was emaciated. His bones were sticking out and everything. But I said that I wanted to ride him."

One week later, "Bee Chu" was standing in the Patterson barn, and Deanna had two and a half months until the first Paint Horse competition in Big Rapids.

"At first, everyone laughed at me," said Deanna. "But I didn't care. In the end, I beat them all."

She began spending every afternoon with Bee Chu, retraining him to ride English rather than the Western as he had in the past. Since he was a professional jumping horse, it took more time and patience to train him, her father explained. But, in the end, it all paid off.

Through the American Paint Horse Association, Deanna earned high honors. She had enough points accumulated in Michigan Showmanship, Bridal Path Hack and Western, to qualify her for the National Congress Show in Wichita, Kansas.

During the week long event, Deanna placed five times among the top Paint horses in the nation, an honor no one really expected.

"They said that if you hear your name mentioned once during the week, you're lucky," Don explained. "We heard Deanna's five times."

He added, "Her being able to go to the Congress was an experience in itself."

As one of the top showmen in Michigan, Deanna has already begun preparing Bee Chu for the upcoming summer circuit. She said that this year she is looking forward to becoming the Association's high point youth in all of Michigan this summer, as well as the nation.

In the mean time, her mother and father are busy tending to their new business, Painted Acres, a Painted horse breeding farm at their home in Bath.

Perhaps Dolores is right, for some people, horses never get out of their system.

## Military ceremony honors Massey

He is survived by mother Josephine Massey, Newton, Ill.; Bonnie Kingman, St. Johns; one son, Dominic Massey, St. Johns; four foster sons, Joey, Christopher, Thomas and Federick; one foster daughter, Deanna; four brothers, Robert, of Gala, Ill.; Keith, of French Lick, In.; Max, of Newton, Ill.; and Jerome, also of Newton, Ill. He also had three sisters, Mrs. Rita Koontz, Charleston, Ill.; Mrs. Marietta Kernner, Belleville; Mrs. Caroline Woods, Newton, Ill.

A rosary service was held last Wednesday at 7 p.m. at the Osgood Funeral Home in St. Johns. Funeral services were held on Thursday, March 1, at 10 a.m., at St. Joseph Catholic Church, with the Rev. Fr. William Hankerd officiating. Burial was in Mt. Rest Cemetery, St. Johns. Arrangements were by Osgood Funeral Home.

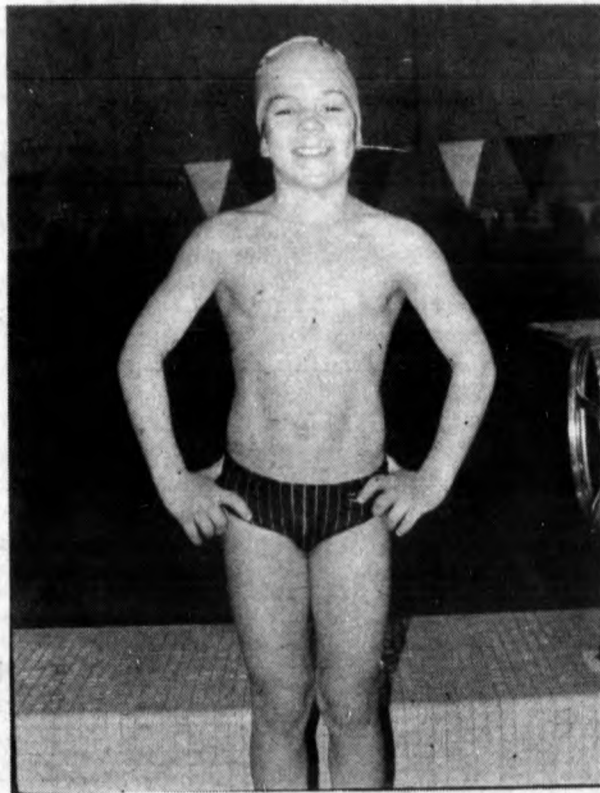

Swimmers competing in the USSM sanctioned meets must attain published speeds to move from the "C" level to the "B," followed by "A" and finally "AA." Only the "AA" swimmers may then participate in the Championship Meet.

Diaz qualified for the meet in three separate events. His 1:23.55 time for the 100-yard butterfly beat the cut off time by 6.64 seconds. He also qualified

for the 50-yard fly and the 100-yard freestyle. Diaz has one more opportunity before the March meet, to qualify for the 50-yard backstroke.

Diaz joined the DeWitt Swim Club in 1981. He admits that practicing with his team three or four times a week, takes a lot of time and effort, but says that the results make it all worthwhile.

His parents, Louis and Donna, agree. Mrs. Diaz says he has learned more than just swimming since joining the club.

"Matt has also learned about goal setting, time management, self-discipline and personal success through participation with the swim club." She adds, "Those are skills that will be useful throughout his life."

# They're on the road to recovery

"My next step is to give one of my lungs away," said Leroy Geer, six weeks after donating his right kidney to his youngest brother. "And then one of my legs and one of my arms," he continued with a smile.

His brother, Richard, was smiling too. After six and a half years of treatment on a kidney dialysis machine, he was able to bid farewell to the weekly event, something he had dreamed about for a long time.

"The doctors and nurses kept encouraging me to have the operation," he said. "I thought about it, but I was chicken. I guess I was just afraid of the

knife."

That fear subsided less than a year ago, after attending an Alma Hospital seminar introducing a new drug for kidney patients. Nineteen-year-old Richard said that after seeing how the medicine would improve the results of the transplant, he went home to ask for his family's support.

According to Richard, he wasn't surprised by his family's eagerness to help him. And neither was his mother, Donna. "No one told them they had to go and get the tests done," she said. "They just did it. They felt they had to do it for Richard."

The following week, all eight members of the family were tested in thorough examinations at Alma Hospital in Alma, Michigan. Leroy, 30, was

the one found with the near perfect 95-percent match of blood and organ type. He said that when the doctors told him about the match up, he didn't hesitate to donate his organ.

"I asked my brothers and sisters if they thought it was the right thing for me to do for him, and they agreed that there was no way I couldn't have," Leroy said. "If I wouldn't have donated my kidney, he wouldn't have had a chance."

Within a week, doctors scheduled the surgery for Feb. 8th, at 7:15 a.m. Five days previous to the surgery, the Geers entered the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor, a time Leroy describes as the most challenging.

"For four and a half days, I was on an IV," he said. "I couldn't have

anything to eat. And the doctors and nurses were always coming up to talk to me and trying to scare me about the operation. I kept telling them to just do it and get it over with."

According to Mrs. Geer, doctors in Ann Arbor said that the operation was the quickest and most successful surgery performed this year. Three and a half hours after surgery, Leroy was back in his room,

while Richard was walking on his own by 7:30 the following morning. Within nine days, Leroy was strong enough to be released from the hospital; Richard followed closely behind, a week and a half later.

Mrs. Geer added that she was surprised how quickly her sons recuperated, but attributed the recovery to the prayers and support of all the neighbors and

friends that stood by them during the surgery. She said she is thankful that during times like those, people and families pull together.

More than that, she's thankful that her son now has a chance to live a perfectly normal life.

"I would tell anyone who is considering the operation, to do it," Richard said. "There isn't anything to lose."

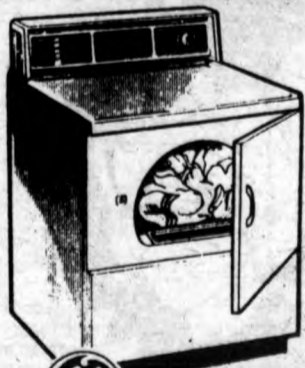

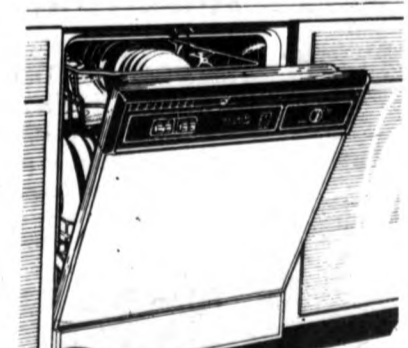

## DeWitt man receives award

Dennis Nash, of DeWitt, recently received the Federal Aviation Administration's Outstanding Performance Award for saving the life of a severely injured person December 24, 1983.

Nash, an air traffic controller at Capital City Airport, was directing a lifeguard helicopter from Muskegon to the Ann Arbor Medical Center Christmas Eve, when the pilot informed him that their injured patient needed immediate

treatment. Because of his familiarity with the area, Nash was able to guide them to Ingham Medical Center, a facility not shown on the radar scope. As a result, the emergency helicopter was able to land at the designated landing area, thus saving the life of the CPR patient.

The Outstanding Performance Award is one of the highest recognition awards a person can receive from the Federal Aviation Administration.

# Agencies needed to sponsor meal service

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is looking for qualified agencies to sponsor the Summer Food Service Program in Michigan. Under this program, qualified sponsors get federal payments for meals to children in needy areas.

Meals and snacks are served to children in places such as schools, playgrounds and parks. Sponsors get training and technical assistance to start and operate the program.

Monroe Woods, midwest regional administrator for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service, said that in order to qualify as a sponsor an organization must be a public or non-profit private school food authority, public or non-profit private residential summer camp, or a unit of local, municipal or county government.

According to Woods, some of the eligibility requirements are that the organization serve meals on a regular schedule to children or provide meals as part of an organized program for enrolled

children; operate the program in areas where at least 50 percent of the children would qualify for free or reduced-price meals under the national school lunch or school breakfast programs, or qualify as a camp; and accept financial and administrative responsibility at all sites where meals are served, demonstrate financial and administrative ability to operate the program, and have enough personnel to supervise, operate, manage and monitor each site.

The Summer Food Service Program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture is available to children

regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, age or handicap.

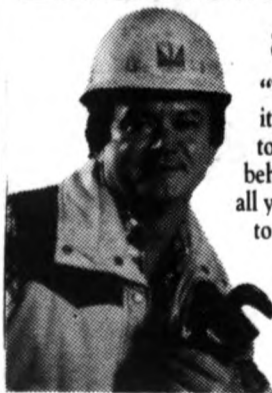

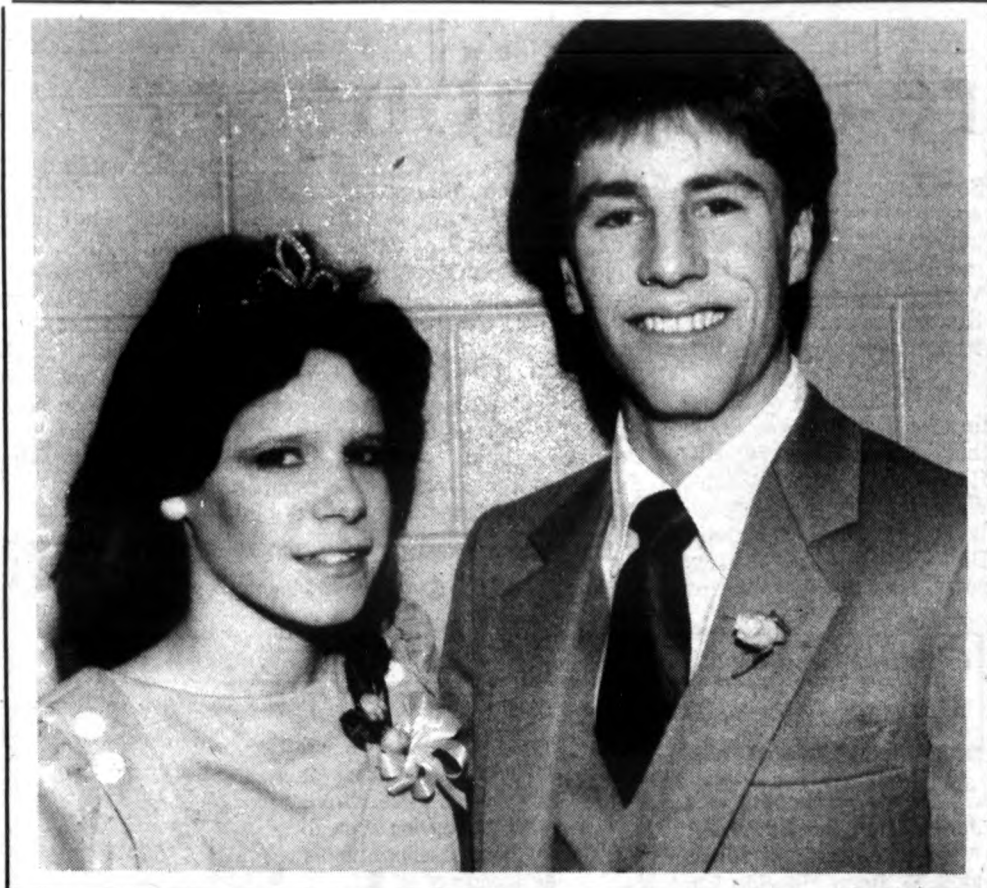

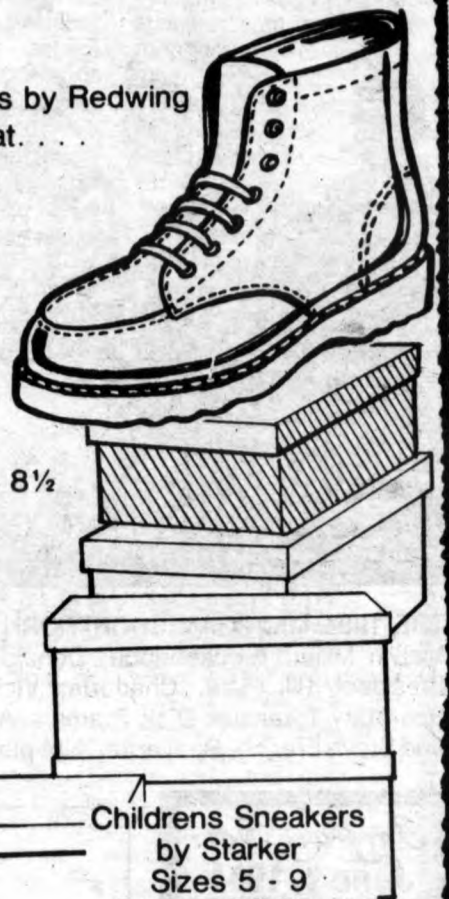

### COMMISSION ORDER

(No. CFI-112.82)

(Under authority of Act 230,  
P.A. 1925, as amended)

#### OPEN SEASONS AND CATCH LIMITS ON PIKE, WALLEYE, SAUGER AND MUSKELLUNGE

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on October 8, 1982, under the authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered the following order become effective on January 1, 1983, and remain valid until March 31, 1988.

It shall be unlawful to take the following named species except within the open seasons and daily limits prescribed (statewide regulations apply unless otherwise restricted):

Statewide open seasons on all waters not otherwise closed to fishing shall be from May 15 through February on walleye, sauger, northern pike, and muskellunge (including tiger muskellunge). The daily catch limit shall be five singly or in combination for largemouth and smallmouth bass, walleye, sauger, and northern pike; one for muskellunge (including tiger muskellunge).

The above regulations apply statewide except that walleye and sauger may be taken at any time from the Detroit and St. Clair rivers, Lake St. Clair, and Lake Erie; and that muskellunge in Lake St. Clair, St. Clair and Detroit rivers may be taken only from the first Saturday in June through December 15 of each year. Also, the daily catch on Lake St. Clair and Lake Erie and the Detroit and St. Clair rivers shall be six singly or in combination for largemouth and smallmouth bass, walleye, sauger, and northern pike when the catch includes at least one walleye or sauger.

# Memory Lane...

From the Republican News dated January 19, 1950: St. Johns Rural Couple Honored at Open House, a relatively few married couples in this country will live to celebrate their 70th anniversary, but this happy occasion was experienced by Mr. and Mrs. John P. Oyer, R-3, St. Johns, Sunday at their farm home north of St. Johns.

In spite of the inclement weather, more than 100 relatives and friends called to extend congratulations and best wishes to the aged couple. Mr. Oyer will be 92 next month and Mrs. Oyer is 88. Both are enjoying good health this winter.

The couple lived on a farm in the Gridley vicinity for six years before moving to Woodford County. For 16 years Mr. Oyer worked as a carpenter contractor before returning once more to farming.

Of the eight children who grew to maturity in this home, a son, Noah died in 1931. At the time of his death Mr. Oyer was Dean of Goshen College, Goshen, Ind. The seven living children were all present for this rare occasion. They are Edward H., Daniel S., Lydia, Emma, Elmer J., and Edna Oyer and Esther Oyer Smith.

This review of "Deans Hardware" should bring back memories for many of you. It was dated Feb. 2, 1950. It read: Alan R. Dean has proven himself a good businessman and a civic leader in his 19 years in St. Johns. Al came to this community in 1931 as instructor and athletic coach at Rodney B. Wilson High School.

Since his advent into the business world he has proven he can handle himself in that capacity as well as on the athletic field or in the classroom. He left his physical education duties at the high school in 1936 to take a position as assistant manager of the E.C. Smith and Son Elevator. When Dean left the Smith Co. in 1944, he was manager of the local establishment.

Al graduated from his home town high school at McBride and later received his degree from Alma College.

In 1938, Ann Becker, of Greenville, came to St. Johns to teach in the city schools and in 1940 Miss Becker and Dean were married. They have two children, Barry 7, and Barbara 4.

Friends have wondered how Al has had time to run a successful business along with all his civic activities. He has served as president of the Chamber of Commerce and the Clinton County Country Club and currently is head of the St. Johns Rotary Club. He has served on boards of all three organizations.

Dean purchased the Spaulding and Co. Hardware in September, 1945, and a year later bought out the Slife Heating and Plumbing firm and added their lines to his business.

A project which the boys at Dean's have just completed and are justly proud of is the portable antenna the store now has available. This antenna is mounted on a trailer and enables them to install a television set and show the prospective customer T.V. selling points right in his own home.

Croley and Philco radio and appliances are sold at Dean's along with Timpkin Furnaces and Conversion Burners and American Standard heating and plumbing fixtures.

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on January 13, 1984, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April 1, 1984, and ending March 31, 1987, no person shall possess, take or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon except on Lake Huron and its tributary streams and on Lake Michigan and its tributary streams the season on lake trout is from May 1 through August 15.

Size limits shall be 8 inches in Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on all lakes except the daily possession limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 2 lake trout or splake from Lake Michigan and its tributary streams or 3 lake trout or splake from Lake Superior and Lake Huron and their tributary streams, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only.

### SIZE LIMIT ON BASS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on July 11, 1980, under authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, set the size limit on smallmouth and largemouth bass at 12 inches for a period of five years beginning January 1, 1981, on all Michigan waters including the Great Lakes and connecting waters.

### ORDINANCE NO. 41

#### UNDERAGE PERSONS/ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR CITY OF DEWITT CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT UNDERAGE PERSONS FROM PURCHASING OR KNOWINGLY POSSESSING OR TRANSPORTING ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

THE CITY OF DEWITT ORDAINS:

Ordinance No. 41 is hereby amended and re-enacted in its entirety as follows:

**Section 1. POSSESSION AND TRANSPORTING OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR.**

A person under the age of twenty-one (21) years shall not purchase or knowingly possess or transport any alcoholic liquor, or knowingly possess, transport, or have under his or her control in any motor vehicle any alcoholic liquor unless the person is employed by a licensee under the Michigan Liquor Control Act and is possessing, transporting or having such alcoholic liquor in a motor vehicle under his or her control during regular working hours and in the course of his or her employment with such licensee.

**Section 2. EXCEPTION.**

This Ordinance shall not apply to alcoholic liquor possessed by a person less than twenty-one (21) years of age under authority of and pursuant to a prescription of a licensed physician.

**Section 3. PENALTIES.**

Any person violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than ninety (90) days or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

**Section 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.**

This Amendment to Ordinance No. 41 is adopted at a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of DeWitt on February 27, 1984 and shall become effective upon publication.

(C) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.5(B) by deleting (B) and replacing with the following new section: When all of the foregoing basic conditions can be satisfied, a variance may be granted when one of the following special conditions can be clearly demonstrated.

1. Where there are practical difficulties which prevent carrying out the strict letter of this ordinance. These difficulties shall not only be deemed economic, but shall be evaluated in terms of the use of a particular parcel of land.

(D) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.5(C) by deleting said section and replacing with a new section as follows: In addition to the foregoing conditions, the following rules shall be applied to the granting of variances.

(E) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.6 Special Exceptions by deleting the entire section.

(F) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.7 Findings of Fact by deleting the entire section.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND CONTROL THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS BY THE GLASS IN THE CITY OF DEWITT, TO PROVIDE STANDARDS FOR MUNICIPAL APPROVAL OF VENDORS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES BY THE GLASS FOR CONSUMPTION ON THE PREMISES, OPERATION THEREOF, AND CONDUCT THEREIN; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

THE CITY OF DEWITT ORDAINS:  
Ordinance No. 76, Section 10, entitled BIRTH CERTIFICATES, REQUIRED; Section 16, entitled PURCHASES BY MINORS, Section 17, entitled FALSE REPRESENTATIONS, AND Section 18, entitled DEMAND PROOF OF AGE, are hereby amended and are re-enacted in their entirety as follows:

**Section 10. BIRTH CERTIFICATES; REQUIRED.**  
All licensees must have in their possession birth certificates or other documents, showing the place and date of birth of each employee. No person under the age of twenty-one (21) years shall be permitted to sell or service any alcoholic liquor or to work either on a paid or voluntary basis in that portion of the premises wherein alcoholic liquor is being served.

**Section 16. PURCHASES BY UNDERAGE PERSONS.**  
Any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years who shall offer to buy, obtain or drink or who shall buy, obtain, or drink any alcoholic liquors anywhere in the City of DeWitt other than at his or her parents' home, and any person who shall sell, give, or offer any alcoholic liquor to any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years anywhere in the City of DeWitt, except a parent at his or her own home and to his or her own child, shall be guilty of a violation of this Ordinance and upon conviction thereof shall be punished as provided by this Ordinance.

**Section 17. FALSE REPRESENTATIONS.**  
Any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years, who falsely represents himself or herself to be twenty-one (21) years of age or over and thereby procures or attempts to procure the sale or furnishing to himself or herself of any alcoholic liquor, or any person who makes false representations as to the age of another and thereby procures or attempts to procure the sale or furnishing to any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years of any alcoholic liquor, shall be guilty of a violation of this Ordinance.

**Section 18. DEMAND PROOF OF AGE.**  
The person in charge of any bar, tavern, store or place where alcoholic liquor is sold or furnished for consumption, either on or away from the premises, shall have the right at any time to demand of any person offering to buy, or who is buying, obtaining or drinking any alcoholic liquor in such establishment who may appear to him or her to be under the age of twenty-one (21) years, proof of age and identity, and on failure of such person to produce the same, shall refuse to serve, sell and furnish such person with any alcoholic liquor and may exclude such person from such place of business. If any such person shall refuse to leave such place of business he or she shall be guilty of a violation of this Ordinance and upon conviction thereof shall be punished as prescribed in this Ordinance.

All other provisions of Ordinance No. 76 shall remain in full force and effect.

This Amendment to Ordinance No. 76 is hereby adopted at the regular meeting of the City Council of the City of DeWitt held February 27, 1984. This Amendment shall become effective upon publication.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND CONTROL THE OPERATING OF CABARETS AND CONDUCT THEREIN IN THE CITY OF DEWITT; TO PROVIDE STANDARDS FOR MUNICIPAL APPROVAL OF LICENSING THEREFOR; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

THE CITY OF DEWITT ORDAINS:  
Ordinance No. 86, Section 11, entitled UNLAWFUL ACTS, is hereby amended and is re-enacted in its entirety as follows:

**Section 11. UNLAWFUL ACTS.**  
In respect of any cabaret, club cabaret or limited cabaret in the City of DeWitt, it shall be unlawful for any person by himself or another:

A. To operate an unlicensed establishment of either type;

B. To allow entertainment or dancing on any Sunday after 2:00 a.m., or between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. of any other day, or between the hours of 9:00 p.m. on December 24 and 7:00 a.m. on December 26, and when December 26 falls on Sunday, to 7:00 a.m. on December 27;

C. To engage in or permit any disorderly conduct in or on the premises or permit such place to become a place of thieves, prostitutes, procurers, vagrants or other disorderly person to congregate, loiter or resort;

D. To permit any gambling on the premises or permit the placing or use of any gambling apparatus or paraphernalia thereat;

E. To sell beer, wine or spirits and/or to permit any persons under the age of twenty-one years in or about the room designated for dancing;

F. To permit any intoxicated person or persons under the influence of intoxicating liquors to dance or loiter in the establishment;

G. To permit any dancing in space except in such space especially set aside for dancing and approved for such use by the Chief of Police.

H. To permit overcrowding of the dance floor;

I. To obstruct dance floors in any manner during the time that dancing is permitted;

J. To obstruct a view into the establishment from the front and outside of any premises where alcoholic liquor is sold for consumption on the premises;

K. To permit booths or private rooms which are completely enclosed, or capable of being permanently or temporarily completely enclosed or locked on the premises;

L. To provide less than adequate lighting of the premises;

M. To permit any person to smoke or hold a lighted cigar, cigarette or pipe, or to drink any alcoholic beverage or hold any alcoholic beverage, on the dance floor while dancing is permitted or in progress;

N. To fail to provide separate and adequate dressing rooms for male and female entertainers, if entertainment is provided;

O. To permit re-entry into the premises on the same admission charge or ticket, if a patron leaves the premises;

P. To permit the sound of music to be audible beyond 100 feet outside of the building in which the cabaret is located, at any time, and for such purpose to close the exterior doors of the premises.

All other provisions of Ordinance No. 86 shall remain in full force and effect.

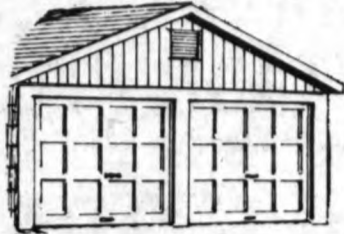

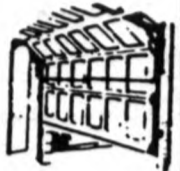

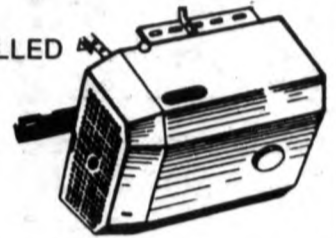
