Fire Investigators to be added in Clinton County

In a recent meeting in St. Johns, Clinton County Fire Chiefs unanimously agreed to support a fire and arson investigation team that will directly probe the causes of individual fires throughout the county.

According to Dep. John Criswell, of the Clinton County Sheriffs Department and coordinator of the effort, the concept of the team isn't a new one. "The idea first evolved two years ago, but nothing was done about it. This time, the response was more favorable. All the fire chiefs seemed to support the idea."

Under the new program, the district fire departments will work directly with the Clinton County Sheriff's Department, the State Police Fire Marshall, the prosecutor's office and the Department of Natural Resources.

With one representative from each organization, a board of directors will be established, which, in turn, will set the policies of the team. According to Criswell, each member will hold one equal vote, except in a legal matter, in which the prosecutor's office will hold more weight.

"We want to promote better cooperation between the agencies," he said. "Together, we want to help cut down on arsons and increase the conviction rates for arsonists."

"Actually, we're a fire investigation unit," he added. "We're trying to find the cause for every fire, not just arsons."

Criswell explained the way in which the unit would operate is similar to the units already established in Shiawassee and Livingston Counties. When a call is received at the fire department, the senior person on the fire team, who will also be a police officer, will accompany the department to the scene.

He or she will act as the key person on the case, responsible for the evidence found, as well as the entire work process. Theoretically, in the case of arson, that person will also provide the prosecutor's office with any information regarding the fire.

A unit coordinator will also be at the scene of the fire. That person will be responsible for the daily administrative activities.

"Initially, the fire department will handle the case," Criswell said. "We don't anticipate having more than three people at the scene."

In order for the unit to begin operation, every fireman who is going to participate in the unit, must undergo 80 hours of training in fire and arson investigation.

The team must also purchase a unit vehicle in which all of the equipment could be stored and taken to the scene. According to Criswell, a March 29th meeting will determine exactly how much money is needed for both the vehicle and the program as a whole.

He added that he is hopeful that the unit can begin operation as soon as possible. "This is something the county has needed for a long time."



THE OLD ROUND SCHOOL HOUSE, once earmarked for renovation by Greenfield Village, was recently destroyed by a fire. According to Dallas Township's Assistant Fire Chief Jerry Fox, the fire was accidentally started after a neighbor lit his trash and sparks landed on the nearby property. The building had also been a favorite project for the local Clinton County Historical Society to eventually renovate as funds became available. The building was located on the corner of French and Grange Roads.

Board discusses sites

On March 7, the St. Johns School Board met in a closed session to further discuss the proposed sites of the new elementary school, which St. Johns residents will be voting upon March 26.

The upcoming election will determine whether or not the public feels a new elementary school is necessary. If, in fact, the results of the election favor the building of a new school, the actual site will not be decided upon until after the

vote has taken place, due to the financial expenditures involved.

According to School Supt. Earl Gabriel, if the Board would choose to have the three sites professionally viewed, the costs would have to come out of the schools general fund. He said the Board felt they had already taken too much from the general educational fund to consider having the sites professionally viewed.

Gabriel contends that all along, the school proposal has been a "citizen pro-

Secretaries bargaining

To the Editor:

Secretaries in the St. Johns School District are still at the bargaining table. They have worked since July, 1983 without a contract. Wages for the 1982-1983 school year still have not been settled. A reopener clause in the contract stated that if any other support group received a raise for 1982-1983 school year, the secretaries contract could be reopened for negotiation. Other support groups received increases ranging from 4.7 percent to 11.4 percent for 1982-1983.

The main issues in bargaining this contract are wages, binding arbitration, agency shop, transfers and vacancies, plus seniority.

Other support groups this current school year received as high as 18 percent wage increases. The Board insists secretaries receive a mere 1 percent increase for the 1982-1983 school year.

Arbitration is a most important factor for the secretaries. In the past, it has been common practice to ignore the seniority language in the secretaries contract. The Board chose to ignore the findings of a mediator (who had ruled in our favor) to award a job to the most senior, qualified applicant. Instead, this position was given to an outside person who had no seniority in the secretarial staff and had very little experience.

Most of the twenty-two M.E.S.P.A. secretaries have been employed with the St. Johns Public Schools for

many years. In the past, it was a pleasure going to work. We had the highest of morale and a great deal of pride in our work, but when you are treated as unfairly as we have been, it is very difficult to maintain a supportive attitude, especially when job security is continually threatened.

The pay scale of the secretaries ranges from \$4.32 per hour for Level 1 secretaries, to \$6.91 per hour for a Level 4, of which there is only one M.E.S.P.A. secretary who is at the \$6.91 range. The majority of the secretaries are in the lower and middle ranges of this pay scale. Bus drivers and custodial wages are much higher than those of the secretaries.

Who is left in charge when the administrators are not in the building...

Project Business begins program



"Project Business is moving from the planning stage to an action program", said Jim Robinson, local project chairman and Plant Manager of Sealed Power.

"Since the future of the free enterprise system rests with young minds and creative ideas," he said, "business executives in the county are joining forces with local educators to bring this program, part of the National Junior Achievement Program, into local schools."

As a result, five classes are being sponsored by the Clinton Bank, Federal Mogul Corporation, Sealed Power Corporation and the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce. Funds for the teaching materials are supplied by the businesses in an effort to help young people learn more about our economic system.

According to Robinson, a member of the Clinton Work-Education Council, instructors of the classes are persons from businesses who find it both personally and professionally challenging to instruct students for the ten-week Project Business Course.

Skip Hughes, of the Sealed Power Corporation, instructs his 8th grade class at Rodney B. Wilson Jr. High in Project Business. Also serving as Project Business Consultant/Instructors are Dave Dodd, also of Sealed Power, Bob Hall of Federal Mogul, Greg Penix owner of the Clinton Home Center and representing the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce, and Dennis Pilmore an insurance consultant from Fowler.

"They provide a practical and realistic education experience that often substantiates the classroom teachers emphasis on the need for Basic Skills," he said.

In addition to the school room training, the instructors have the opportunity to arrange field trips for their students to visit a business in action and talk with employees. According to Robinson, this provides an excellent opportunity for youth to gain insights into future business careers and even possibly owning their own business, which is one of the goals of the Work-Education Council.

The classes are being held at the Fowler Middle School and the Rodney B. Wilson Junior High School in St. Johns.

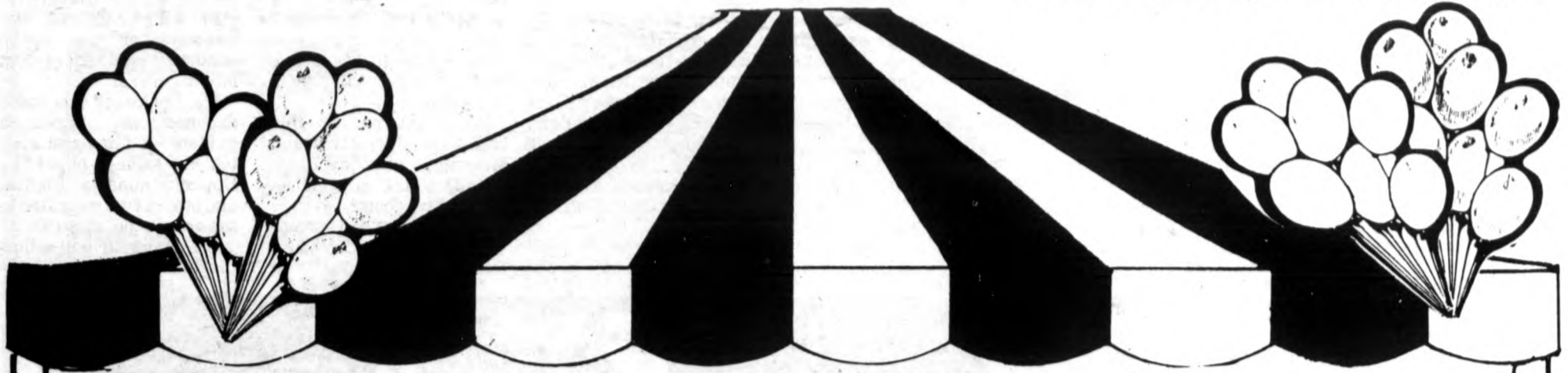

Presentation to society

The presentation of an unusual gift to the Clinton County Historical Society and a program on upper peninsula folkways is on tap for the March meeting to be held March 22 at 7:30 p.m. in the Capitol Savings and Loan Community Room.

Tom Teare, long time supporter of the Society, will present the Paine-Gillam-Scott Museum staff with a glass pen points holder which belonged to

Abraham Lincoln. Teare came in possession of the pen points holder as a gift from William O. Stoddard Jr., whose father had been Lincoln's personal secretary from 1861 to Lincoln's death in 1865.

The senior Stoddard, one of the first journalists to support Lincoln, had been given the pen points holder by Lincoln who had decided that he had had enough

of the "new fangled" pens and was going back to the "more reliable" quill pen. Stoddard gave the pen points holder to his son, William Stoddard Jr., who moved to the bustling city of Detroit and became well known in that city as a speaker relating tales of his personal knowledge of Lincoln.

Teare happened to meet him, and since he too was

interested in Lincoln, a friendship developed. Stoddard gave the glass pen points holder to Teare as a remembrance of their friendship.

Teare will present this case to the director of the Museum, Catherine Rumbaugh, at the meeting on the twenty second.

The Natural Resources Commission, at its October 7, 1983, meeting, under the authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that effective April 1, 1984, through March 31, 1985, all spearing be prohibited from December through March and a 30-inch size limit be placed on northern pike in OVID LAKE, Clinton County.

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on January 13, 1984, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April 1, 1984, and ending March 31, 1987, no person shall possess, take or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon except on Lake Huron and its tributary streams and on Lake Michigan and its tributary streams the season on lake trout is from May 1 through August 15.

Size limits shall be 8 inches in Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on all lakes except the daily possession limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 2 lake trout or splake from Lake Michigan and its tributary streams or 3 lake trout or splake from Lake Superior and Lake Huron and their tributary streams, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only.

Sec. 19.14 Public or Private Junkyards

1. The following minimum standards for site development and site use shall be established for junkyards located in the D-Development zoning district.

Junkyards, as allowed in the Development District, refers only to those uses of land or structures which involve, and are limited to, the storage of used, inoperative motor vehicles, salvage and resale of used motor vehicle parts and the cartage of motor vehicles in wrecked or inoperable condition.

1. All such uses shall not be established on land in the Township until a Special Use Permit has been issued by the Township and all license requirements of the Michigan Department of State, Bureau of Automobile Regulation (or successor) have been fully complied with. All such uses shall further be maintained in accordance with all applicable State of Michigan statutes and regulations.

2. The minimum site area of establishment of a junkyard in the Development district shall be five (5) acres. In the case of previously established uses of land in this category, the Planning Commission may recommend and the Township Board may authorize a Special Use Permit on a site of less than the minimum area, subject to final site approval and other conditions which may be required to ensure proper utilization of the site and minimal impact on adjacent properties.

3. All activities involving motor vehicle storage, salvage of used motor vehicle parts, assembly of parts, cutting or welding activities and repair of motor vehicle components shall be confined within a screened enclosure as required in the paragraph immediately following.

4. Outdoor motor vehicle storage and all permitted and related activities shall be screened by an opaque fence or wall, earthen berm covered with turf or other plantings, or by a dense evergreen planting. Such screening shall be designed so as to completely obstruct view of stored materials and salvage operations from public streets and occupied structures on adjoining lands. Such screening shall be shown on the site plan submitted for approval in connection with the Special Use Permit application.

5. Screening required in connection with this Section shall be setback a minimum of one hundred (100) feet from any public street.

6. All oil, gasoline, hydraulic or other fluids shall be drained from all vehicles stored on the site and placed in holding tanks for future disposal off the site. Every effort shall be made to prevent any material of this type from entering the soil.

7. No burning beyond the limited amount normally associated with residential land use shall be permitted.

8. Motor vehicles, motor vehicle components or other materials or equipment associated with this use shall be stacked or piled so as not to be visible from a public street or occupied structures on adjoining land.

9. Steps satisfactory to the Mid-Michigan District Health Department (or successor) and the Township shall be taken to control rats and other rodents on the site.

10. The intensity level of sounds generated by the operation of a junkyard located within five hundred (500) feet of a residential land use shall not exceed fifty five (55) decibels (dba) when measured at the property line of the residential use which is closest to the junkyard except between the hours of 8 A.M. and 5 P.M. Monday through Saturday.

11. The operator of any junkyard for which a Special Use Permit is issued shall, as a condition of such permit, agree and be subject to periodic on-site inspections by the Zoning Administrator to ensure continuing compliance with this Section and any special conditions of the Special Use Permit.

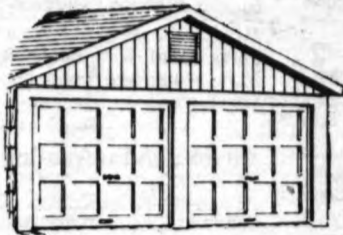

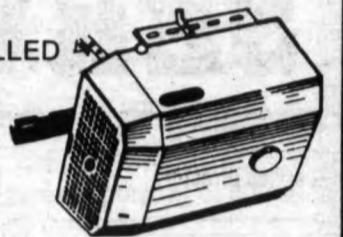


