Merchants to make a city grant possible?

Despite a recent disheartened meeting with the Department of Commerce, the St. Johns City Commission has decided to continue pursuing the possibility of receiving a grant to improve the downtown area.

According to City Administrative Assistant Diane Edwards, the Community/Business Assistance Division of the Department of Commerce "did not sound encouraging" regarding the proposed application for a Small Cities Grant.

The city recently decided to apply for the grant in hopes of providing the funds for the new fire hall, making downtown street repairs and constructing the Industrial Park.

Edwards said however that Division Spokesperson Sarah Eubanks did provide information on how to increase the chances of receiving the grant. She explained that the best way to be considered for a possible grant was to request a funding ratio of at least two to one for private businesses and the city. The ratio represents \$2 being paid locally by the businesses and city, to every \$1 of grant money requested for the project.

Furthermore, the city must obtain letters from downtown merchants stating that because of the improvements made, they will remodel, put on new store fronts or increase their employment.

"What the local community is willing to invest means a great deal," said Randy Humphrey, St. Johns City Manager. Working with the city could mean better

streets and better sidewalks, and an overall better downtown area.

According to Edwards, the funding applications will soon be available so action must be taken quickly. Monday night, the board authorized the staff to make the necessary preparations for the grant approval.

In other board action, the board accepted the recent Parking Lot Committee's recommendation that four more spaces in the "American Legion Lot," on Walker Street, be designated for 10 parking with a permit. The recommendation also suggested to remove parking meters from five spaces immediately in front of the library and three spaces on Spring Street, next to the Clinton Bank drive-thru. These spaces will be designated as one hour parking.

In accepting these recommendations, the board will authorize Chief Lyle French, of the St. Johns Police Department, to appropriate Temporary Traffic Control Orders. Permanent Traffic Orders will be presented within 90 days for final adoption by the city.

The City Commission also approved the continuation of the annual spring cleanup program. According to Edwards, since the program began in 1980, the number of participants have improved a great deal. Last year, 1,443 yards of trash were picked up by the city.

With authorization, Edwards is now contacting companies that may be interested in hauling the trash for this year's program. Results will be presented at the next meeting.

Litter signs to be posted at Daggott Road 'dump site'

Hopefully, the Daggott Road "dump site" will become a thing of the past, thanks to a DeWitt Charter Township vote Monday night to post two signs on the mile long stretch.

According to Tom Woodruff, Assessor and Township Services Coordinator, Daggott Road has been a favorite spot for dumpers for several years. In the past, the township has tried to eliminate the problem by increasing police patrol on the road.

Linda Wise, of 15151 Daggott Road, said it didn't help. According to Wise, people continue to dump washers, couches and bags full of garbage along side their road while no one is around to watch them. She said that the neighbors in the 12 houses along the road have created an alliance to catch the potential dumpers, but even that hasn't proven totally successful.

"We caught one guy for dumping and wound up even taking him to court," she said. "All the judge did was fine him \$50 and made him clean it up."

Wise said she and her husband, Ken, went to Monday's township meeting hoping to suggest some other alternative to stop the litter problem. She said one of two things could possibly be done. One is to blacktop the northern half of the road where the residents live to possibly create a separation between the south end of the road where the dumping occurs.

The other suggestion was to shut the northern end of the road off to traffic and making Daggott Road a dead end.

"None of the neighbors use that end of the road," Wise said. However, she added that the traffic is heavier than others realize. People frequently go down the road and stop to eat their lunch or to simply dump their trash. Others are just passing through.

According to Woodruff, board members are considering the alternatives to the problem and plan to further investigate the possible solutions. In the mean time, two signs will be erected warning potential dumpers of a possible \$500 fine for littering on Daggott Road, while police continue to patrol the area.

In other Township business, the board accepted agreements to improve DeWitt, Stoll, Clark, Howe and Cutler Roads in DeWitt Township. The costs for improving the roads will be shared between the Township and the Road Commission. Improvements will include resurfacing of the roads and removing the trees, making ditches and replacing existing drive tubes.

The board also examined the annual Public Safety Report. As part of the report, the board approved the appointment of Acting Lieutenant of the Fire Department, Doug Bowers for Robert White. They also approved the purchase of a new suction unit for the department, with more than half of the costs being covered by the Fire Department.

Amendment rejected by the school board

After more than 10 years of trying to adjust the graduation requirements for St. Johns High School seniors, the school board continued to look at the alternatives at Wednesday night's school board meeting.

School board member Gary Whitford brought up the possible amendment of allowing students to decrease their physical education requirements from one and a half credits to one credit, provided the student is enrolled in Marching Band or active in a major school athletic program. At the same time, the social science requirements would increase by one half credit.

According to Whitford, the amendment was developed to "custom-fit" the students needs, yet high school principal Bill Swears rejected the possible change.

"I'm opposed 100 percent," he said at Wednesday's meeting. "Health is really

becoming one of the main emphasis at the state level and we're trying to incorporate that at the physical education level. A student wouldn't receive the same benefits as he would in band. To say one letters in a sport, is no substitution for the class. I think it needs more study."

The amendment was defeated before the school board, but referred to the long-range planning council for further study.

However, the original proposal, made at the March 14 school board meeting, was retained. Under that amendment, graduating seniors must have at least one and a half credits in physical education, a half of credit decrease from previous requirements. Also, there is a half of credit increase in the geography requirements.

In other action, the board adopted a committee for purposes of negotiating for the superintendent's contract, to start no later than May 1.

June 11 was also established as the date for the annual school board election.

St. Johns' School Board urged to make affirmative plans for Central School

To the Editor:

A few years back some concerned parents of Central Elementary School students received a commitment from the Board of Education at the time to renovate and improve the facility—to make it safer and to offer the students a building at least minimally comparable to other schools in the district. The extent of that commitment can be seen in the six-year plan for the building which included the addition of a multi-purpose room as the last phase. Perhaps the citizens and Board were a little short sighted in light of the information revealed by the recent citizens' committee regarding long term costs and life expectancy of the existing structure. At any rate, we are now faced with the question whether to make the recommended costly repairs and construct an addition which will outlive the main part of Central by 40 to 60 years.

It is clear that it is time for this Board to form an affirmative plan for Central Elementary. To sit back, make do and watch to see how much more of the building falls into disrepair with each passing year is irresponsible, dangerous and extremely biased against the 350 students attending that school. If costly repairs seem inefficient and a waste of taxpayers' money—so be it. Then your plan must be to cease using the facility—either entirely, at the end of this school year; or by portions over the next one or two years.

Many options have been mentioned, at the last special board meeting held on March 28 and in the citizens' committee report. These merit careful consideration:

1. Bus all fringe students to fill up the empty classrooms in the country schools. (This would also eliminate combination classes—a priority indicated by the Board at the last meeting.)

2. Do an exact study to determine how many extra classrooms are needed if the above busing occurs and Central is closed entirely.

A. Use proceeds from the sale of Central, or operating funds to purchase

(4-5?) portable classrooms to temporarily house students until a more suitable facility is available.

B. Ask citizens to support a bond issue or short term millage to build an addition to Swegles or Perrin-Palmer as suggested in the citizens' committee report. (This may fare better a year from now.)

3. Bus students as in No. 1 above and locate all of the empty classrooms at Central.

A. Do not house any students on the second floor of Central.

B. Do not allow student use of the basement.

C. Meet the fire inspection recommendations to insure the safety of the students using the facility. (replacement of ceiling tiles, etc.)

D. Consider children who are faster and less likely to panic in the event of a fire for the Central facility—in other words, upper elementary students only; with K-3 (or K-2) going to Swegles. (This would also allow for some of the team teaching mentioned as part of the new school proposal.)

E. Begin to plan for ways to close the facility entirely in one or two years time.

Five years ago the school board realized something had to be done about Central School. Indeed, upwards of 70 items were listed for improvement or repair. During these past years precious little has been done, as you well know. Instead the building

continues to fall further into disrepair each year. A responsible Board of Education can no longer sit back and do NOTHING, to the detriment—indeed danger—of 350 students. A responsible Board cannot be crippled into inaction by a vote of the public denying a new facility. A responsible Board must choose to act NOW, not over the next 5 years, to remedy the dangerous and unequal conditions at Central School if they plan to continue using that facility.

The Historical Commission applies for official Michigan marker to be set in Ovid

Application for an official State of Michigan marker has been initiated by the Clinton County Historical Commission for a site in Ovid.

The structure, now a residence, on the southeast corner of North Main and East Pearl Streets, was built for the First Congregational Church organization in 1872 and moved to its present location in 1899. The building's scrollwork and tower have attracted architectural

historians for many years. It was the subject of study by the Historic American Buildings Survey of the National Park Service in 1965. The Michigan Historical Commission added it to the Register of local sites in 1971.

The Clinton County Historical Commission has established a fund for acquisition of the double post informational marker. Contributions from citizens and organizations may be directed to the Commis-

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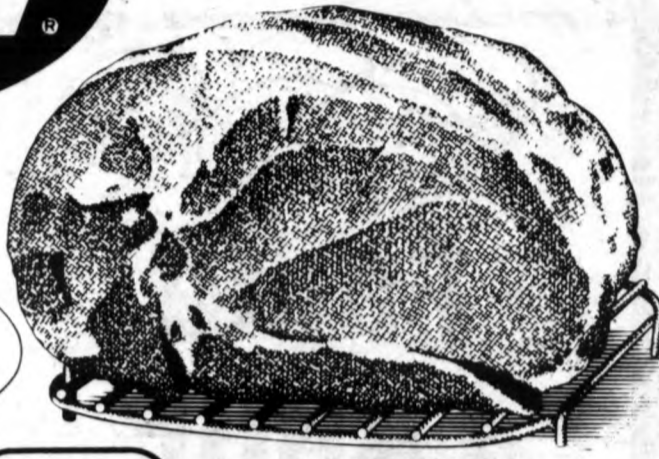

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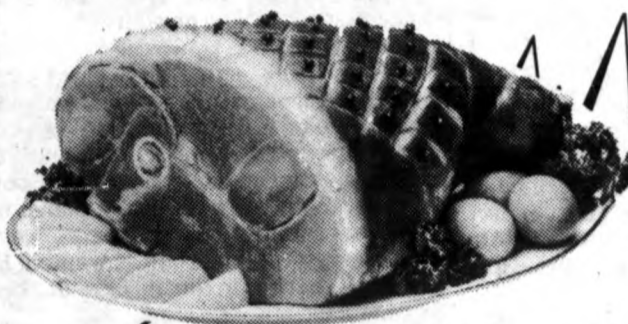
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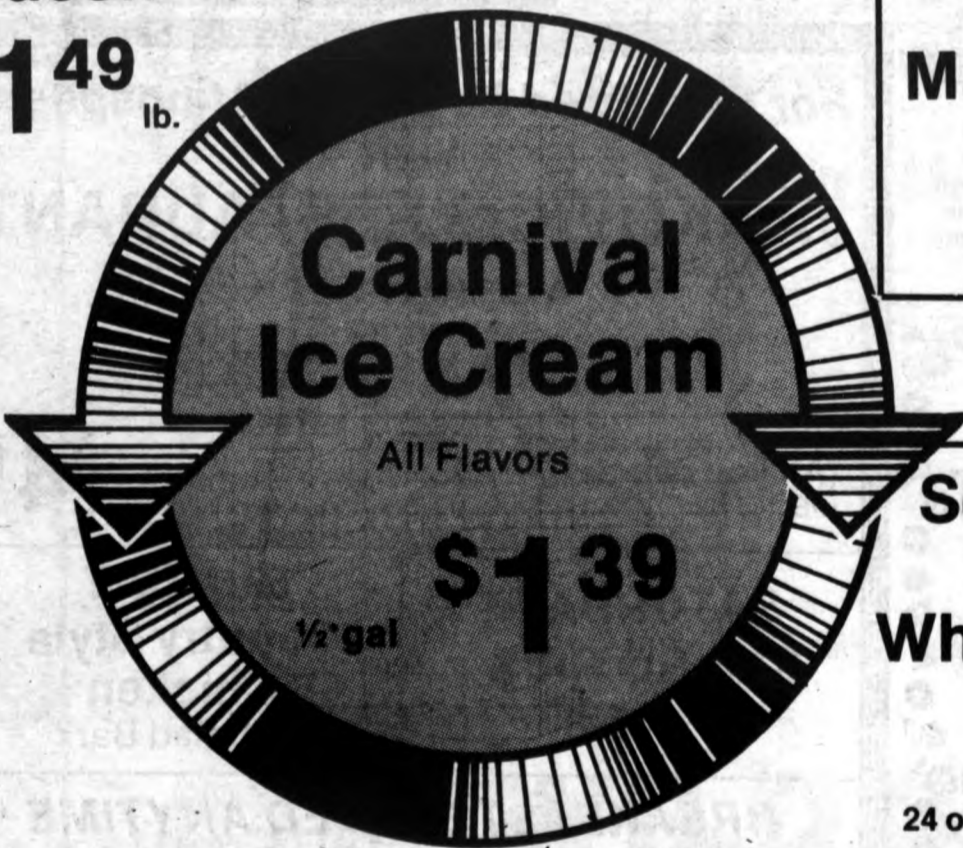

Three five-man teams of runners from the Deputy Sheriff's Association of Michigan will participate in a record breaking 1,000 mile non-stop relay run through 31 Michigan counties, May 14-22.

This is the third consecutive year the the deputies have made the run which covered 860 miles in 1983 and 790 miles in 1982. Known as the "Journey For Sight", the event is staged in cooperation with the Lions Clubs of Michigan and the Leader Dogs for the Blind in Rochester, Mi.

A support crew of Lions members and deputies accompany the runners day and night in six vans and three motor homes. Elias Bros. Restaurants is sponsoring the run by underwriting most of the cost, as

well as providing meals for the runners and their crew along the route.

Individual runners as well as organized teams who wish to join the deputies as they pass through their communities may do so by meeting them at their local Big Boy Restaurant where time schedules will be posted, or by contacting local Lions Club members or writing to DSAM, in care of 2684 Industrial Row, Troy, Mi. 48064.

The "Journey For Sight" relay run is intended to call attention to the work being done by the Leader Dogs for the Blind.

This recipe will make about four dozen rolls that will keep for a week to ten days.

REFRIGERATOR ROLLS

1 quart of sweet milk
1 cup of sugar
1 cup of shortening
1 cake of quick-acting yeast
1/4 cup of lukewarm water
8 cups of all purpose flour or self-rising
If you use plain flour add: 1 Tbs. of salt; 1 tsp. of soda; and 2 tsp. of baking powder.

Scald milk with sugar and shortening. Cool to lukewarm, then add yeast dissolved thoroughly in 1/4 cup of lukewarm water. Add the 8 cups of flour. Beat thoroughly by hand. Let rise until double in the bulk, then add salt, soda, and baking powder. Add enough flour (about 1 cup) to make dough soft. Place in bowl, grease surface of the dough, cover, and place in refrigerator. Make rolls as wanted. Bake on any type of baking sheet or in muffin cups at 325 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes.

MY MOM'S "BANANA NUT BREAD"

1/2 cup of shortening
1 cup of sugar
2 eggs
2 or 3 (extra) ripe bananas
2 cups of all purpose flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. of soda
Chopped nuts if desired.

Cream together shortening, sugar, and eggs. Mash bananas and add to creamed mixture. In separate bowl, blend flour, soda, and salt. Combine mixtures and mix well. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes.

Austin said that all other candidates circulating petitions for office in 1984 are not affected by Public Act 256.

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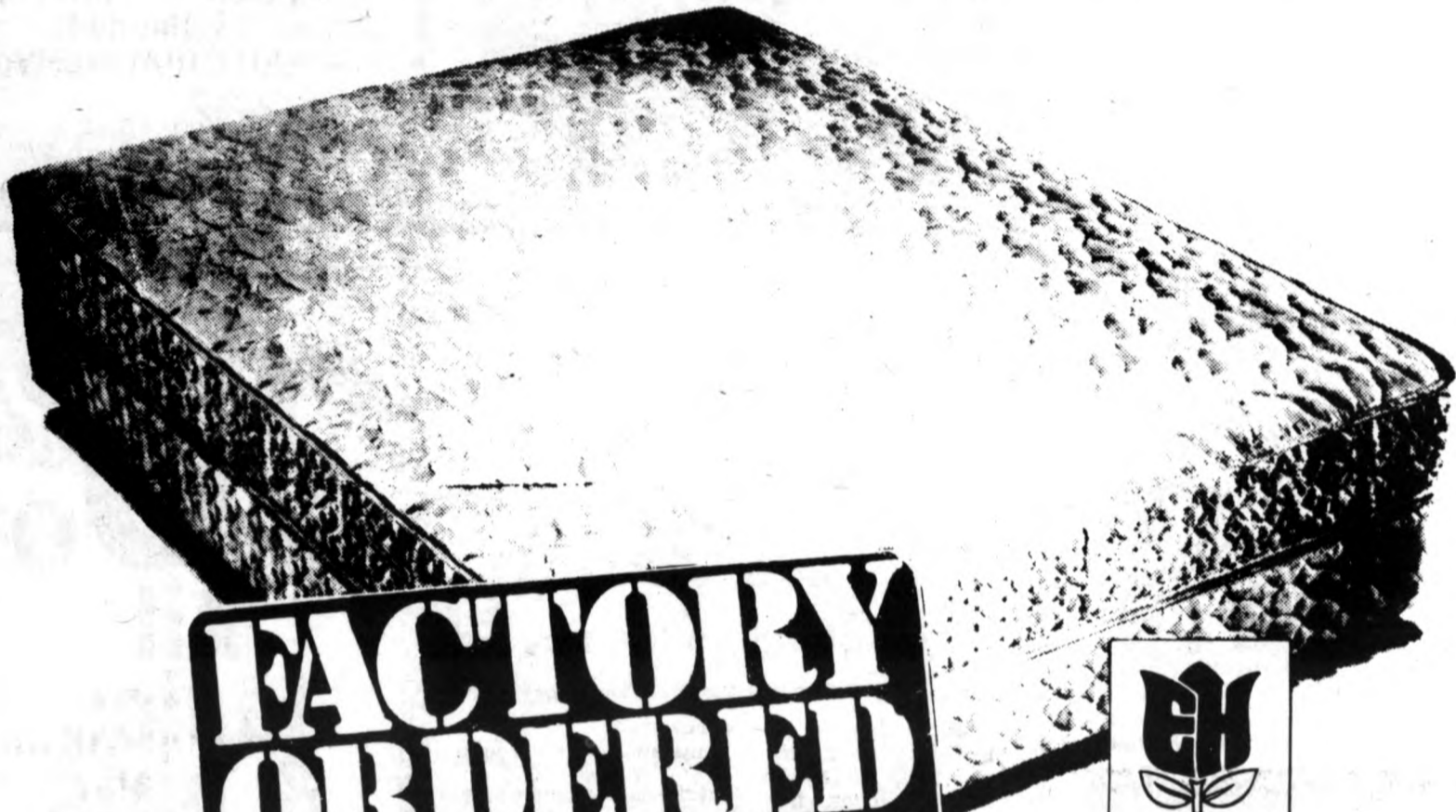
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Dorothy Comstock Riley: Beating all the odds

Dorothy Comstock Riley; a woman small in stature and large in honors. Her credentials speak for themselves: The first woman to be appointed to the Michigan Supreme Court, 1982; the first woman to be appointed as judge of the Michigan Court of Appeals, 1976; interim Circuit Court Judge for the 3rd Judicial District (Wayne County), 1972; Attorney for the Wayne County Friend of the Court, 1956-68; and partner in the Detroit law firm, Riley and Roumell, 1968-72.

of the Michigan Court of Appeals by Gov. William G. Milliken. She then became known as the first woman to serve on the Michigan intermediate appellate court. In November of 1978, she was reelected to a full six-year term.

"As a lawyer, I did not have judicial ambitions," she said. "But with the appointment to the appellate court, it whetted my interest. I enjoyed it, so when the vacancy occurred on the Michigan Supreme Court, I decided to run."

Riley lost the 1969 election by a very small margin. She said that it

was the small margin defeat that gave her hope of someday being elected to the Court.

Instead, she was appointed to a vacant seat on the Court on Dec. 9, 1982, by the Milliken administration. She served in that role until the evening of Feb. 15, 1983, when she was served

with an Order of Ouster.

"I was terribly surprised," she said. "Actually, I was surprised because of the procedure they used."

According to Riley, the Supreme Court voted upon her dismissal after the ordinary session hours, in a closed meeting.

Despite her removal from the Court, she said she felt that the biggest defeat came in the disruption of the court's integrity.

"I think the court's reputation has suffered,"

she said. "I hope to be an instrument to change that. I think the court is very important to the daily public and I think its very important to have a court that can be trusted."

With determination to be the next Justice on the Supreme Court, Riley announced her candidacy for the position on March 7th, 1984.

"I care about the Court," she said. "I care enough about the Court not to embarrass it or tarnish its reputation. I'm very optimistic about the upcoming election."

Riley was in St. Johns Thursday as the guest speaker for the Clinton County Republican's annual Lincoln Appreciation Dinner.

And she has made many of her dreams come true.

"I've wanted to be a lawyer since I was nine years old," she said Thursday, in the office of the Clinton County News. "When I was young, I thought lawyers would save the world. It wasn't until I graduated from law school that I realized just how unrealistic (being a lawyer) seemed. There just wasn't that many women involved in law."

Despite friends and family trying to dissuade Riley from entering the legal field, she was admitted to the Michigan Bar in 1950. She practiced law until 1956, when she became an attorney for Wayne County Friend of the Court. She continued in that capacity until 1968, when she returned to private practice as a partner in the Detroit law firm of Riley and Roumell.

In 1972, Riley took a leave of absence from her law firm to fill an interim appointment and serve as a Circuit Court Judge for the 3rd Judicial District. In January of 1973, she resumed the private practice of law with Riley and Roumell until her April 5, 1976, appointment as Judge

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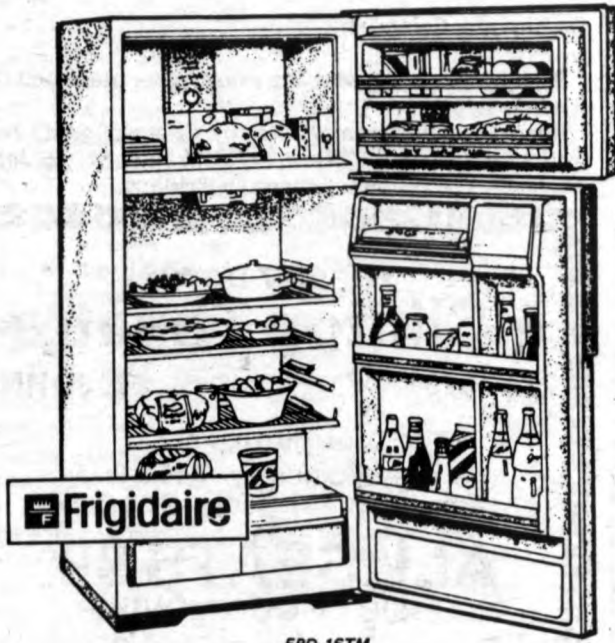
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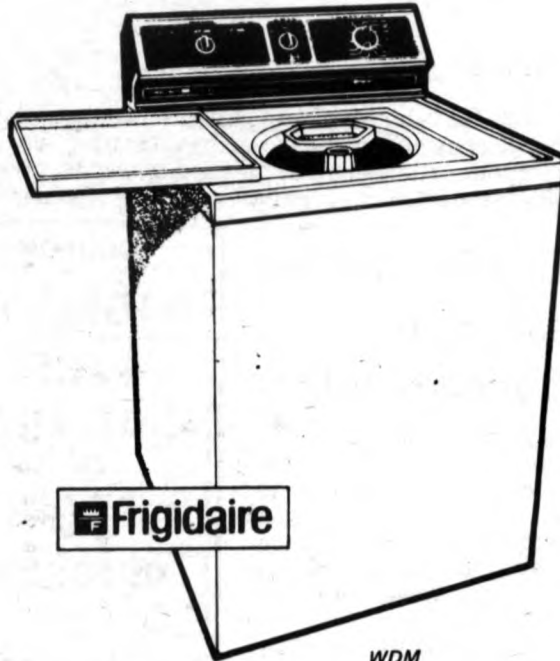
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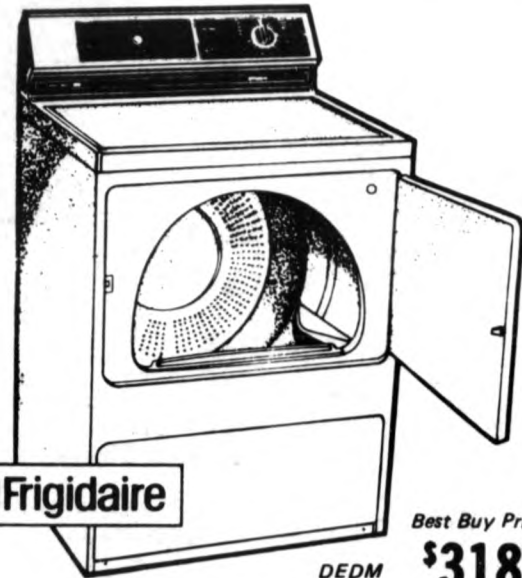
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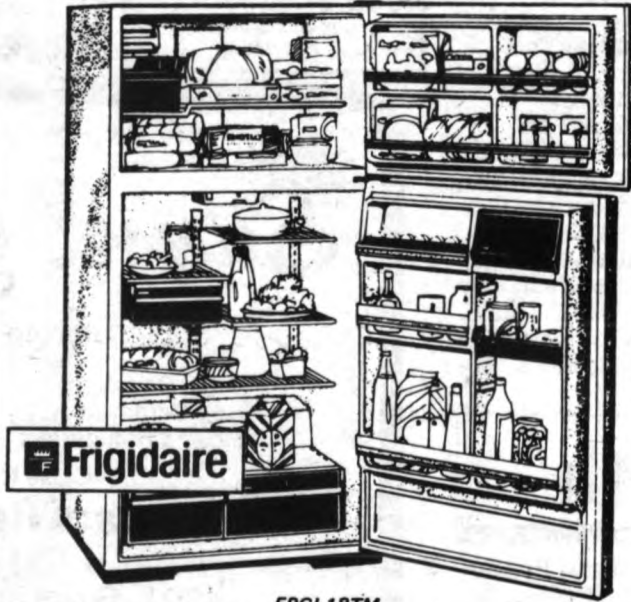
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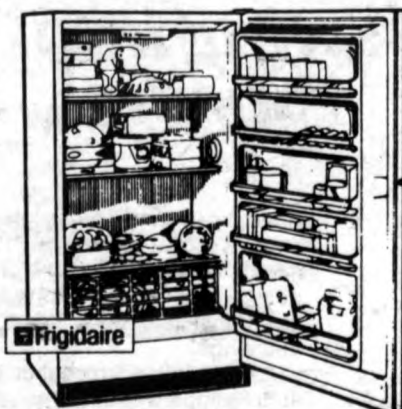
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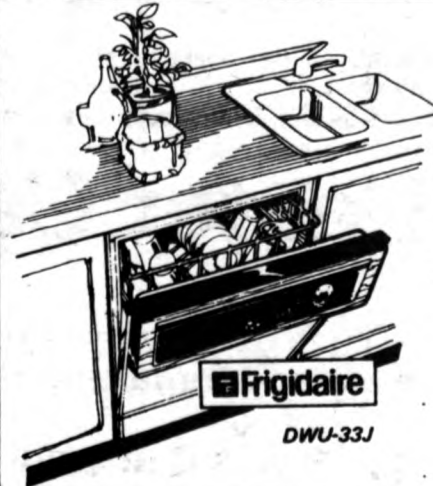
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Tarrant-Groulx Early March wedding

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Riley addresses Clinton County Republicans

The importance of an independent and trustworthy judiciary was the theme at the Clinton County Republican's annual Lincoln Appreciation Dinner, held Thursday evening at the St. Johns High School.

Dorothy Comstock Riley, a candidate for Justice on the Michigan Supreme Court, delivered the address to more than 200 county republicans, including legislators, commissioners and township supervisors.

Riley, who was appointed to the Michigan Supreme Court in December 1982, was ousted from her position February 15, 1983, when the Blanchard administration decided it was their responsibility to fill the vacant seat on the court, rather than the former Milliken administration.

Since her ouster, she has returned to her Detroit law practice, Riley and Roumell, until announcing her candidacy for the Michigan Supreme Court on March 7.

According to Enid White, the county chairperson for the Republicans, Riley was chosen as the guest speaker because of her integrity as a former Justice on the Michigan Supreme Court and her role as Judge of the Michigan Court of Appeals.

In her address, Riley pointed out several high standards the public needs to recognize in order to properly evaluate the candidates for judicial office, namely independence and integrity.

"Our judicial system must remain free from intimidation if the public is to continue to place its confidence in our courts," she said. "A strong, independent judiciary remains of vital importance to a system of justice based upon the rule of law, rather than of persons.

"Our justice system requires a body of judges to interpret and apply our laws," she continued. "I believe we want them to decide the matters that come before them without concern for the effect of their decision on their personal careers. In particular, we require that they be free of interference from members of the executive and legislative branches of government."

Riley addressed the crowd regarding the importance of having judicial candidates who have integrity and are trustworthy.

Riley also pointed out the responsibility each registered voter has to examine the candidates who are running for a judicial seat.

"There is also a parallel duty that each citizen has with respect to candidates for judicial office," she said. "It falls to each new generation. It falls to each of us, because of our vested interest in American justice, to evaluate each man or woman who seeks a seat on our courts against the high standards I have outlined.

"For unless we all participate in insuring the quality of our judges in whatever way we can, the future of an independent judiciary cannot be assured."

Riley concluded her address by exhorting her audience to do their part in diligently choosing the proper justice for the Supreme Court, "The preservation of our liberty depends on it.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many, many people who provided constant support for me and my family recently. Facing major surgery was a difficult decision but one which was made easier thanks to the team of physicians and nurses at Ingham Medical Center and our local physicians, the support and prayers of religious and civic organizations, caring employees and staff at Clinton Memorial Hospital, and the kindnesses expressed by the entire community. 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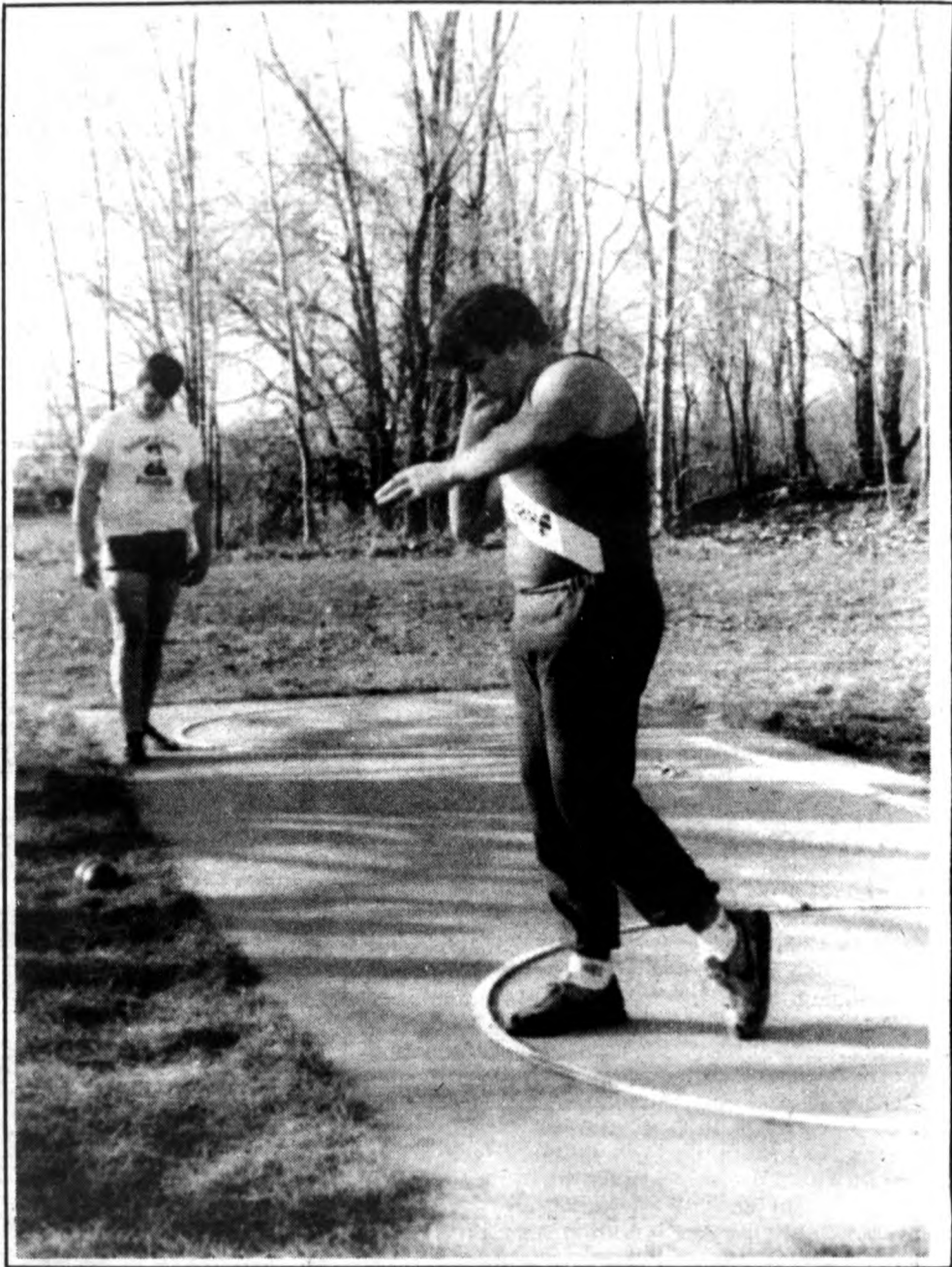

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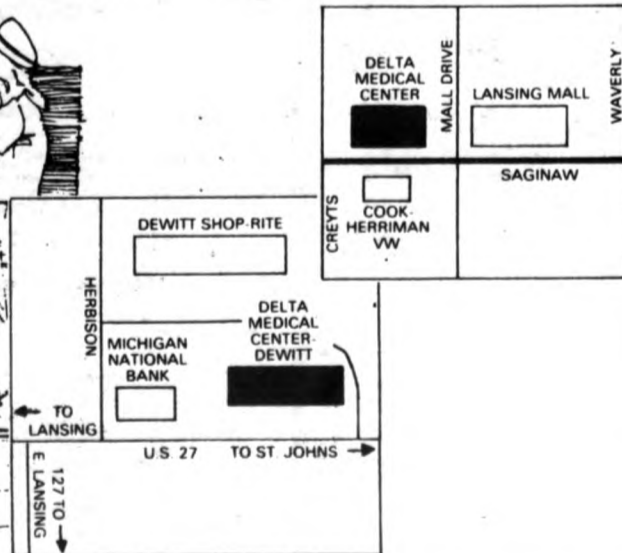
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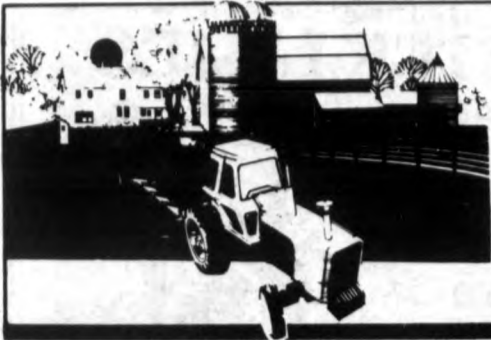

Soybean oil used as diluent

Soybean oil continues to be a good and legal choice for use as a pesticide adjuvant, according to Dr. Larry Beauregard, associate director of Soy Oil Programs for the American Soybean Association.

"A recent ruling by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) which restricts the use of non-labeled materials as pesticide diluents has caused some confusion," says Beauregard. "But this ruling doesn't apply to vegetable oils used as crop adjuvants."

He explains that adjuvants and diluents are not used the same way in pesticides.

"An adjuvant, often referred to as a crop oil concentrate, is a material added to a pesticide mixture to improve the pesticide's performance. It modifies characteristics such as spreadability or droplet size.

"A diluent, often referred to as a carrier, is a material used to dilute a concentrated pesticide to field use strength."

The EPA policy ruled that diluents must be labeled for a specific pesticide to be used legally. If a pesticide does not specify a diluent, water must be used. The policy clearly states that the ruling does not apply to additives, adjuvants or surfactants.

Beauregard says that if farmers understand the policy's restrictions, there should be only limited effect on soybean oil's use as a crop spray, since most farmers use soybean oil as a crop oil or adjuvant.

Beauregard predicts that in response to the EPA ruling, manufacturers of pesticides for ULV applications will apply for labeling to legally clear soybean oil's use as a diluent.

The museum needs the area donations and contributions to help keep it self-supporting. All donations are tax deductible upon request.

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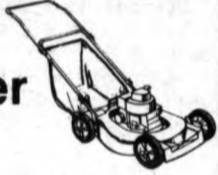

NOTICE OF AMENDMENT

TO THE TEXT OF OR-1-78, THE CLINTON COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE

To Whom It May Concern: Pursuant to the provisions of Public Acts 183 of 1943 and 156 of 1951, as amended, notice is hereby given that the Clinton County Board of Commissioners has adopted Ordinance numbers OR-1-84 and OR-2-84 which amends the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance in the following manner: ZC-1-3-84/OR-1-84: (A) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.2.3(1) in the following manner:

Delete entire sentence and replace with the following: 1. The application for an appeal, variance or interpretation.

(B) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.5(A) in the following manner: Delete 4.4.5(A) (2) and replace with the following new language:

2. Shall not permit the establishment within a district of any use which is not permitted by right within that district, or any use variance for which a special use permit is required pursuant to Article 7 of this ordinance.

Delete 4.4.5(A)(6) and replace with the following new language: The condition which is the basis for the application has not been created by the applicant.

Amend Sec. 4.4.5(A) in the following manner: Add a new standard No. 7 as follows:

7. The possible precedents or affects which might result from the approval or denial of the appeal.

(C) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.5(B) be deleting (B) and replacing with the following new section: When all of the foregoing basic conditions can be satisfied, a variance may be granted when one of the following special conditions can be clearly demonstrated.

1. Where there are practical difficulties which prevent carrying out the strict letter of this ordinance. These difficulties shall not only be deemed economic, but shall be evaluated in terms of the use of a particular parcel of land.

(D) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.5(C) by deleting said section and replacing with a new section as follows: In addition to the foregoing conditions, the following rules shall be applied to the granting of variances.

(E) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.6 Special Exceptions by deleting the entire section.

(F) Amending Art. 4, Sec. 4.4.7 Findings of Fact by deleting the entire section.

(G) Amend Art. 4, Sec. 4.4 by adding a new Sec. 15 entitled ADMINISTRATIVE VARIANCE ON LOTS OF RECORD.

The amendment will reduce the case load of the Zoning Board of Appeals by incorporating a mechanism into the ordinance to permit the zoning administrator to issue administrative variances based upon a showing of practical difficulty.

(H) Amend Art. 4, Section 4.4 by adding a new Section 16 entitled CONDITIONAL PERMITS.

The amendment will authorize the board to permit more than two (2) roomers in any one family dwelling, authorize modifications in parking requirements and permit the joint use of off-street parking.

Case ZC-2-3-84/OR-2-84

The following three (3) amendments pertain to procedural requirements in addressing special exceptions in light of changes to enabling legislation in 1980. The Clinton County Zoning Ordinance is structured such that authority to address "special exception", ie temporary housing occupancy permits due to medical conditions, temporary permits for construction of asphalt plants, and conditional permits, are conveyed to the zoning board of appeals. It has been purported that said function is administrative in nature rather than quasi-judicial and would be more appropriately addressed pursuant to procedural requirements delineated in the enabling legislation for administrative function. The above referenced permits are currently issued by the Zoning Board of Appeals.

A. Amend Art. 5, Sec. 5.11 REGULATIONS CONCERNING CONDITIONAL USES by adding a new Sec. 13 TEMPORARY CEMENT AND/OR ASPHALT PLANT.

The director of the Department of Development Control or his agent will be authorized to issue temporary land use permits for cement and asphalt plants when such are necessary for road construction under contract with the municipality and/or the Department of State Highway and Transportation upon compliance with a set of objective standards.

B. Amend Art. 5, Sec. 5.11 REGULATIONS CONCERNING CONDITIONAL USES by adding a new Sec. 14 TEMPORARY HOUSING PERMITS IN EMERGENCY SITUATIONS.

The director of Development Control is authorized to authorize the occupancy of a single family dwelling has explosion, acts of God, or applicant's compliance with

REGULATIONS CONCERNING TEMPORARY HOUSING PERMITS IN EMERGENCY SITUATIONS. The following shall be applied to temporary housing occupancy permits in emergency circumstances.

The director of the Department of Development Control shall authorize temporary housing occupancy permits for the installation of a temporary structure upon compliance with a set of objective standards.

OR-2-84 become effective upon the passage of the Department of Commerce.

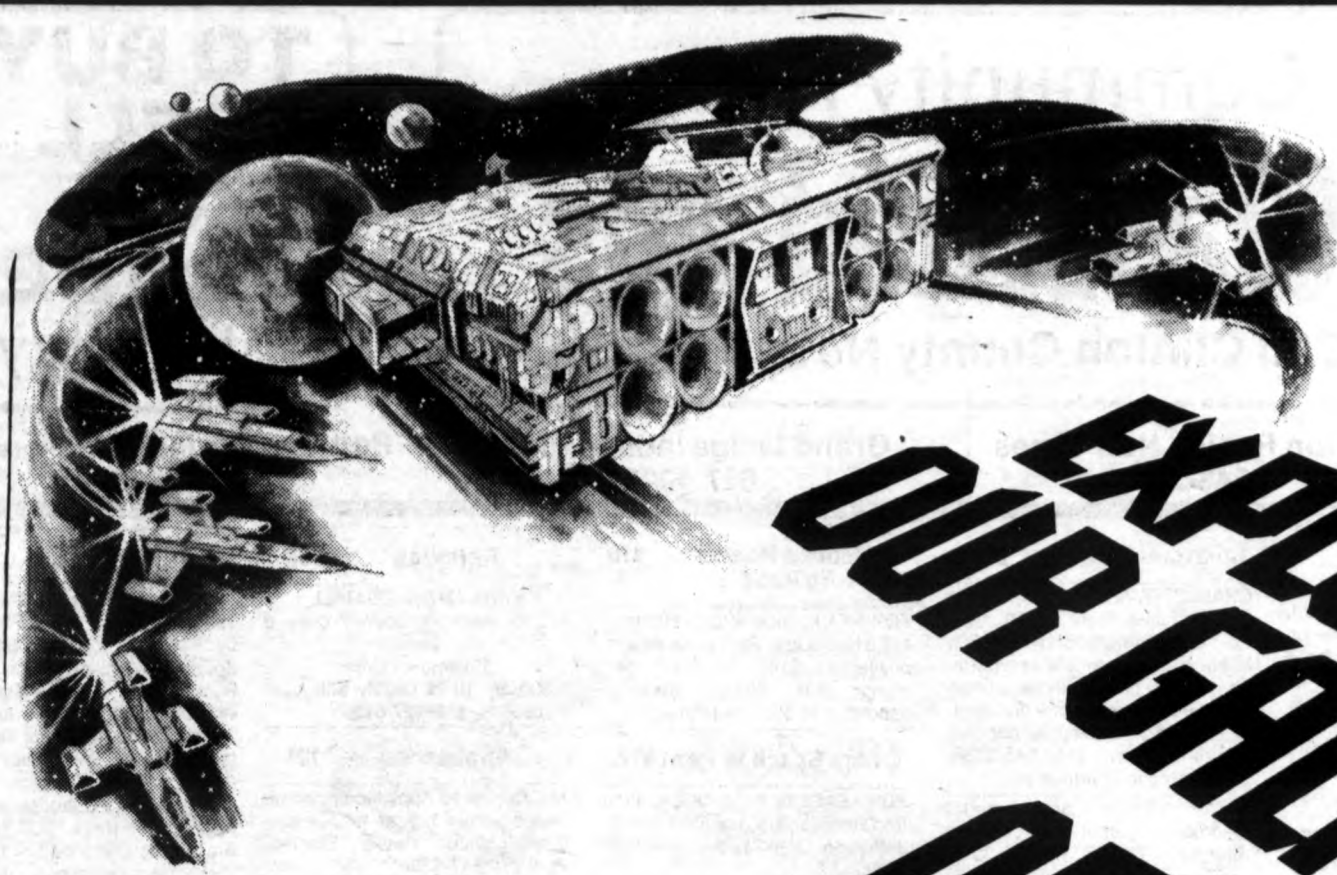

When Mercy Ambulance got here our people didn't leave they stayed and helped the ambulance people. Our EMT's left only after I was in route to the hospital. After several hours in the emergency room of Sparrow Hospital I was released after they were sure my blood sugar was up, my color was better, my temperature back almost to normal and I could talk alright. It was an unexpected event but the people were great!

I would like to thank our EMT's, the Bath Fire Department, the Mercy Ambulance drivers, and Donna Beth and Ray Eschtruth from the Bath United Methodist Church that started a prayer chain and stayed with our boys while my husband and I were at the hospital. My family and myself appreciate the fast service and the concern shown by all. Thanks again!

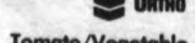

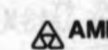

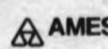
