Plan III adopted by board for coming year

On May 2nd, the St. Johns Board of Education voted to adopt "Plan III" for the upcoming 1984-85 school year.

Under this plan, combination classes will be reduced from 14 to three in the upcoming school year.

According to Supt. Earl Gabriel, the use of the seven school buildings in the district have been reorganized to include those students who live on the fringe of the city, to begin attending classes in the country schools.

In effect, this will mean that two rooms in each of the buildings will not be used, helping to defray the costs of maintenance of the buildings.

Swegles Elementary will be the exception, with only one room being closed.

At the same time, three elementary school teachers will be removed

from the system all together. The plan, saving the district an approximate \$49,500, was chosen over several other plans including the closing of Perrin-Palmer and Central and selling one of the buildings.

Board votes to add one mill for year

On Wednesday evening, the St. Johns Board of Education voted to renew the current millage in the upcoming June 11th election. In a separate proposal, they voted to increase the millage by one order to avoid cutbacks in the quality of education.

In the renewal, the board decided to continue asking for the 18.25 mills for the next five years. Broken down, that means 17.75 mills will be used for operational expenses,

while .50 mills will be used for maintenance.

However, under the current budget set for the 1984-85 school year, without an additional mill added to the proposal, many programs will have to be reduced or eliminated to meet the current \$341,000 deficit.

"One mill is not a big amount of money," said board member Lee Ormston. "We need that additional mill to deal with the deficit. I think we're chewing to far into the programs for the good of the district."

Jobless rate falls in April

With the help of strong seasonal hiring, Michigan's jobless rate fell by one and a half percentage points in April to 11 percent, according to estimates released today by S. Martin Taylor, director of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

Taylor reported that 60,000 fewer Michigan workers were unemployed in April, as the jobless total fell to 479,000 from 539,000 in March. The unemployment rate in March was 12.5 percent. A year ago, April 1983, the state's jobless rate was 15.5 percent with 668,000 out of work.

Although the drop in Michigan's unemployment rate in April was large, it was not inconsistent with past March to April jobless rate declines. For instance, in both 1982 and 1983, the state's jobless rate fell from 17 in March to 15.5 percent in April.

As unemployment declined, employment increased by 95,000 in the state to reach 3,852,000, its highest level since August 1981. Taylor said, that the construction, retail trade and service industries all reported seasonal job gains. Overall manufacturing employment showed little change during the month.

Michigan's 11 percent April jobless rate is the lowest for the state since August 1981 when it was also 11 percent. April marks the third straight month of unemployment declines and employment increases in the state.

Michigan's seasonally adjusted April labor force estimates also showed an unemployment decline, as the rate fell to 10.6 percent from 11.3 percent in March. The number of jobless was down by 28,000 last month to 466,000.

Nationally, the seasonal-

ly adjusted unemployment rate for the civilian labor force remained unchanged at 7.8 percent from March to April. The number of jobless rose slightly to 8,843,000, an increase of 71,000.

Under the current budget, eight areas of education would have their monies depleted if the mill is not added, while five programs would have to be eliminated all together.

Programs reduced to meet the deficit include: elimination of the middle school librarian; trimming in the Special Education program; maintenance decreases in the high school, elementary and middle school; decreases in the capital outlay and equipment, and an elimination of high school programs.

Programs that would not be re-instated would be updated elementary teaching supplies, high school teaching supplies, and middle school teaching supplies, elimination of the sixth grade exploratory program, elimination of the capital outlay, and the purchase of new library and text books.

All together, \$215,000 would have to be eliminated from the current budget if the proposal was not passed. At the same time, an additional mill would enable the district to maintain all of the educational programs.

"It's going to require more money to continue existing programs and keeping the buildings open," said Robert Craig, president of the school board. We've got to be honest with ourselves and with the public.

Dear Karen,

The DeWitt-Bath Review is now on the wrong end of a total re-organizing effort to rebuild the six community newspapers.

Your letter is, for the most part, right on target. If we had no plans for the Review, we would discontinue the paper. However, we do have plans and it is our hope to rebuild the credibility of the paper.

Unfortunately, the Lansing area papers were all sold from their local communities a few years ago. That's when they seemed to lose their local color. Since I bought the papers last November, I have been working on one paper at a time, trying to restore the local color that they once had.

In St. Johns, where last October the Clinton County News was 12 to 16 pages a week, the newspaper has grown from 44 to 56 pages. Our plan there seems to be working and Clinton County is now enjoying a better newspaper than last year.

The same thing has happened in Portland.

I presently have two projects I am working on. The Charlotte Republican Tribune needs more work than the rest of the papers combined.

At the same time, we are presently printing our six newspapers in four separate locations; in the Lansing area, in Howell, Ithaca and two Ann Arbor papers in Ypsilanti. The combining cost of printing these papers can be cut in half if we had our own printing plant.

That is our second project. We expect to be printing our own papers by the end of June.

Once that happens, we are going to begin working on two additional projects;

The establishment of the DeWitt-Bath Review and moving production of the Clinton County News and DeWitt-Bath Review to St. Johns where it belongs.

This summer, you will begin seeing changes in the DeWitt-Bath Review and by the start of the school year, we will have a good newspaper for St. Johns, DeWitt and Bath.

I hope this answers your letter.

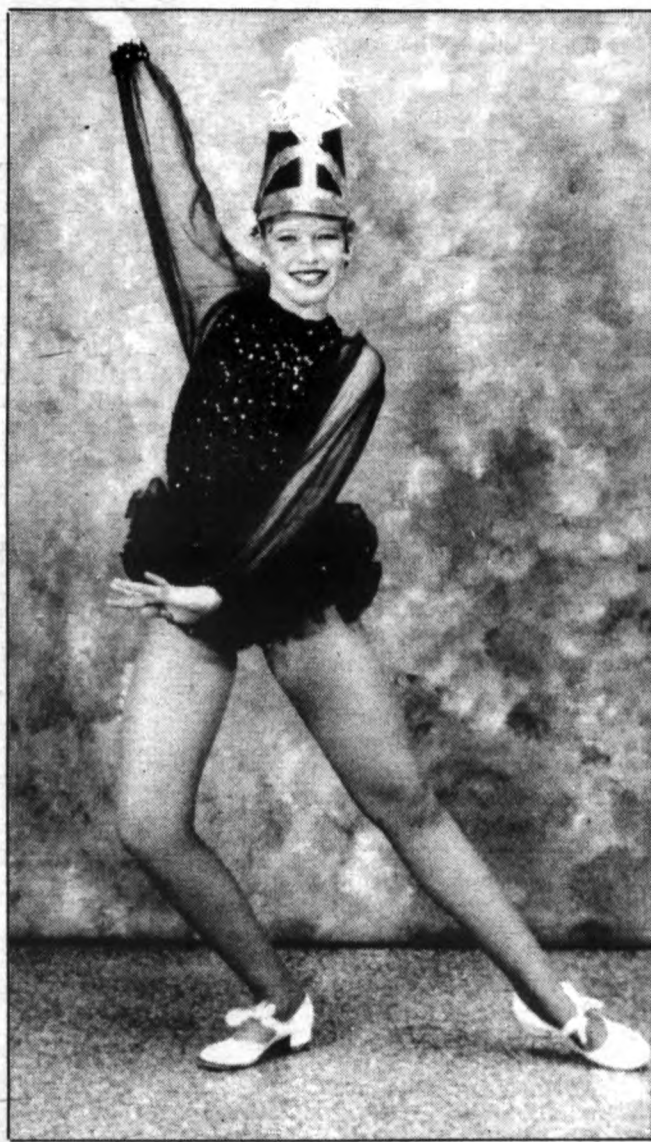
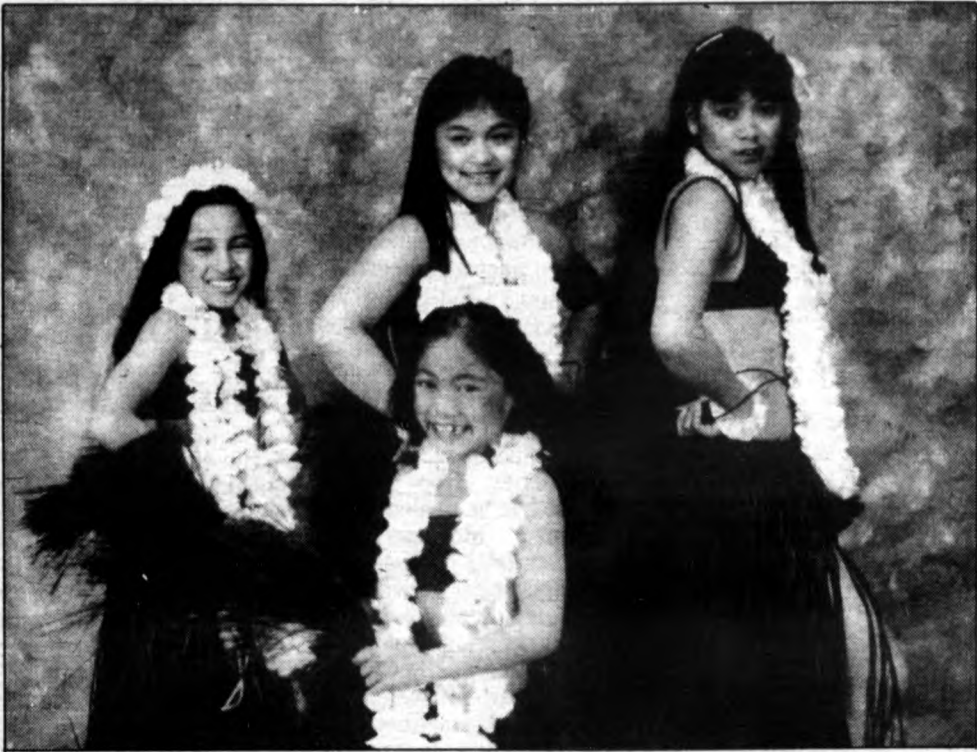

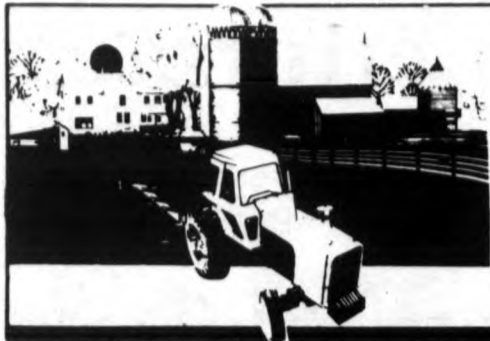

Farm News

Labels assure safety in pesticides

The best reason for keeping pesticides and other lawn and garden chemicals in their original containers is not the containers themselves, but the labels they carry.

Labels tell not only what the material is and how to use it effectively, but also its relative degree of hazard to humans and the environment and how to use it safely.

Fred H. Tschirley, Extension pesticide coordinator at Michigan State University, explains that certain signal words on labels indicate relative acute toxicity—that is, how dangerous the chemical is to people.

The words "danger-poison" and a skull and crossbones are used on labels of pesticides that are so toxic that a taste to a teaspoon is enough to kill an adult. Information on using protective clothing and equipment to reduce the likelihood of poisoning and information on first aid and treatment by physicians is also provided.

Pesticides labeled with the signal word "danger" only are not highly toxic to humans but may be extremely deadly to fish, birds or bees, or be capable of doing some other environmental damage. The label will instruct the user how to avoid this damage—by keeping the material out of lakes and streams, for instance.

The word "warning" is used on pesticides that are somewhat less toxic—a teaspoon to an ounce may be fatal. Users of pesticides in this category are advised to wear protective clothing. Labels also provide first aid measures, advice for physicians and notice of potential environmental hazards.

Still less toxic pesticides are labeled with the signal word "caution." Though toxicity is relatively low—an ounce to a pint would be needed for a fatal dose—labels still advise careful handling.

"Whether poisoning occurs depends on the length

of the exposure as well as the relative toxicity of the chemical," Tschirley points out. "Even a pesticide with a fairly low order of toxicity can be fatal if exposure goes on long enough."

Pesticides and other poisons can enter the body through the mouth, through the skin and through the lungs. Anyone using pesticides should protect themselves against all routes of exposure. This may mean using special protective clothing and

respirators. It always means washing hands and other exposed areas and changing clothes after using pesticides, and not smoking or eating while handling pesticides. Clothes should be washed after each use, Tschirley adds, not worn day after day so that pesticides can build up and increase exposure to possible dangerous levels. To avoid contaminating other clothing, wash pesticide-contaminated clothing separate from other laun-

dry. "Remember that any pesticide can be dangerous if you don't handle it properly," Tschirley sums up. "Labels provide adequate information to protect you and the environment. Take time to read them before you use the material. If you think you have suffered overexposure to some pesticide, consult a physician and take the label with you. The information on the label will help the doctors treat you."

Farm Index Prices increase from last year's total

The Index of Prices received by Michigan farmers for all farm products averaged 142 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending April 15. This represents a 2 percent increase from March, according to the Federal/State-Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. The monthly index indicates a 16 percent increase in farm prices from last year.

The Index of Prices paid by farmers, nationwide, for commodities and services, interest, taxes and farm wage rates for April was 166 percent of its 1977 base. Contributing most to the 1 percent rise were increases in feed and seed prices. Lower prices for feeder cattle and calves were partially offsetting. Compared to a year ago the index was up 4 percent.

In Michigan, feed grains and hay, commercial

vegetables, cash field crops, meat animals, poultry and eggs were the commodity groups showing overall price gains. Lower prices were noted in dairy products while, fruit prices displayed no change. Producers received higher prices for corn, winter wheat, oats, potatoes, hay, hogs and eggs. Prices for all other commodities were equal or slightly below the previous month. Crop items surveyed displayed higher price levels than for the comparable period last year with the exception of winter wheat. Prices for slaughter cows, hogs and eggs were up from last April.

Nationally, the April All Farm Products Index of Prices received by farmers increased 1 percent from March to 146 percent of its 1977 average.

Higher prices for eggs, corn, hogs, wheat and onions were partially offset by lower prices for cattle, broilers, tomatoes, sweet corn and lettuce. The index was 7 percent above a year ago.

Winter Wheat may be largest

Based on conditions as of May 1 winter wheat production in Michigan during 1984 is expected to total slightly over 44 million bushels. If production prospects are realized, this will be the largest wheat crop on record, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

This year's wheat crop is expected to be fractionally larger than the previous record production in 1953. The large crop is attributed to a projected 23 percent increase in harvested acreage. Acreage for harvest is estimated at 900,000 acres, the largest since 1975. Yields are currently expected to average 49 bushels per acre, equal to last year and one bushel below the record established during 1981. Condition of most wheat fields is rated good. Plant growth has been limited by below normal temperatures this spr-

ing. Nationally, winter wheat production is forecast at 1.98 billion bushels, one percent less than last year.

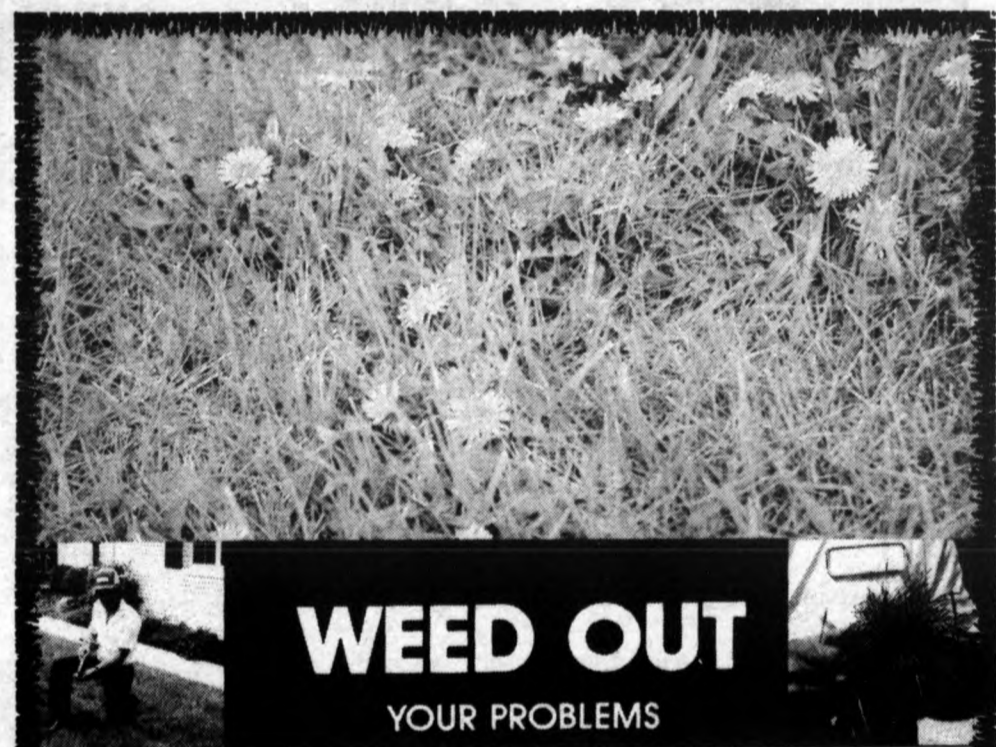
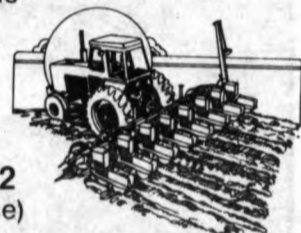

Sheriff to distribute car seats

The Clinton County Sheriffs Department will be distributing child car safety seats instead of tickets to families who are stopped with unrestrained children in their car.

The Sheriffs Department is working with the Clinton County Child Safety Committee to eradicate the number one health threat to children - the automobile accident. Car accidents cause needless death and injury to thousands of babies each year in Michigan.

The Clinton County Child Safety Committee and the Mid-Michigan District Health Department are working to see that every child under four years of age in Clinton County will ride safely in a child restraint seat.

Child car safety seats can reduce the risk of death by 90 percent and the risk of injury by 80 percent when used properly. Studies have shown that half of the seats are being used incorrectly. The Child Safety Seat program requires that parents attend an educational session to learn how to use the seats properly.

The child restraint seats are distributed in four ways: through the health department, the clergy, some local law enforcement agencies and pre-natal classes.

The car seats are purchased at a discount price with donations from community groups, industries, businesses and individuals. Donations are also tax deductible.

Child restraint seats are distributed on a loan basis, free of charge, to families in Clinton County. It is asked that families return the

seats after their child reaches the age of four, so that others may benefit from its use.

Currently, the program has been very successful but is in need of additional funds to purchase more seats. Approximately 2100 seats are needed in this

county to accommodate the number of children born in the next three years.

Graduates to meet for 81st Class Reunion

On May 18, graduates of the old Wacousta School will gather for their 81st class reunion. Turnout is expected to be in excess of 100, which is pretty remarkable for a school which hasn't had a graduating class since 1938.

Although never a large school, there were over 350 10th grade graduates between 1895 and 1939. And over the years these graduates and their spouses have continued to assemble for this annual get-together for a banquet program at the Methodist Church in Wacousta.

THE WACOUSTA SCHOOL, serving students in kindergarten through 10th grade, was built in 1870. It was torn down in 1917 and rebuilt. The new two-story brick structure burned down seven years later and classes met in private homes until the building was replaced in 1926. The school graduated 10th graders until 1939, when the 9th and 10th graders started attending Grand Ledge High School.

In 1957 the Wacousta School District was annexed to Grand Ledge. The last Wacousta School is now used as an office for Watertown Township and the Grand Ledge Public Schools have built a new elementary school near the original sight which is still called Wacousta School.

The drawing card for this year's reunion will be the entertainment which should prove particularly interesting for the Wacousta alumni. A recently formed

hand bell choir from the church will perform with handbells bought by the Wacousta Alumni members. The program is aptly named "Hear Them Bells."

According to this year's alumni association president, Stuart Openlander, a letter was sent to all members a year ago asking them if they would be willing to donate money to purchase the bells for the church. "Within a couple of months, we had in excess of \$4,000," says Openlander.

"NO ONE CAN seem to put their finger on why they keep coming back year after year, but they have since 1903, when the first reunion was held," says Shirley Wright (class of 1933). She is the daughter of Carl Miller (class of 1909) and Floy Miller (class of 1908). They all live within a stone's throw of the old Wacousta School and have missed only three reunions between them. Wright's daughter, Delores Waldo, is also an alumni, making them the only three generation family involved in the event.

As a young girl, Delores Waldo remembers the banquet being an elaborate affair and she says she was honored to help out in the kitchen just to be there.

Two years ago, to add to their shrinking ranks and to keep the spirit alive, the alumni association voted to open membership to everyone who attended the school prior to the annexation.

Thus Delores Waldo gave up kitchen duty for the first time and came as a paying guest.

Protection program to begin for Clinton County children

In an effort to provide the utmost protection for the children in the area, several organizations, including local police departments, have recently come together to discuss the possibilities of providing the proper identification on every child in Clinton County.

According to Ray Bond, organizer of the Protect Our Children program, the need for such identification is increasing every day, as the number of children abducted from their homes, nationwide, continues to soar.

At the same time, an

identification card containing fingerprints and vital statistics about a child, also would enhance the law enforcement procedures if such information would be needed.

"It's going to be more of an enforcement tool, rather than just an identification card," Bond explained at the first planning meeting held May 3rd.

Under the project, the identification card would only be given to the parents or guardian of the children for their own personal files. A copy of the card would NOT be placed in police files. Bond said that in the past, many parents seemed to object to the police having identification

about their children and that this is a way of alleviating the mistrust.

According to Bond, the project will be well under way by the end of June, at which time a booth will be set up at the Ingham County Fair. Bond said that the organization will also continue to hold safety days at area schools and set up crime prevention booths in area malls.

Bond said that his desire is for the program to eventually go beyond the state and to be picked up on a nationwide level.

"It would be really nice if every child had to be fingerprinted," he said. "There is definitely a need there."

The Cardinals were led in scoring by Cheryl

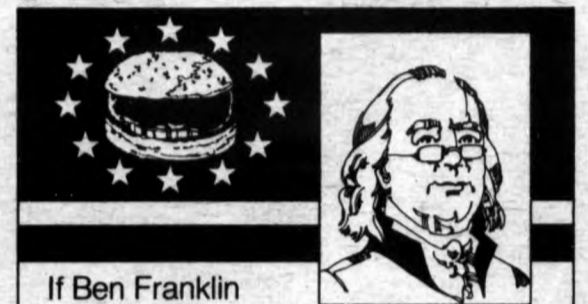

RENEWal begins

The Catholic parishes throughout Clinton County are embarking upon a three-year diocesan RENEW program. The parishes involved include churches in St. Johns, DeWitt, Fowler, Westphalia, and Ovid.

Fr. William Hankerd, pastor of St. Joseph Parish in St. Johns explained the RENEW program briefly. "The overall purpose of the program," he began, "is to promote the spiritual growth of the people in the community."

"We hope to enlist their spiritual support for this vital program," Erhardt explained. The RENEW teams are currently aiming toward October for the beginning of the first session.

Nationwide 'Revival Fires' comes to church

A nationwide "America for Jesus" crusade was recently launched by Cecil Todd and the Revival Fires Ministry from Joplin, Mo., and is soon coming to St. Johns.

The crusade service will be conducted on Thursday, May 17, at the First Assembly of God, 7:30 p.m. The meeting is designed to unite God's people under the Christian banner of love, faith and power. The crusade's purpose is to set a fire in the hearts of God's people, put prayer back into the public schools, stop the Godless killing of babies and bring more of the powerful influence of Jesus Christ to America.

Todd, who is the speaker for this effort, is founder and president of the

Revival Fires Ministry, a world-wide outreach ministry based in Joplin, Mo. Todd and his teams have conducted evangelistic campaigns in 56 different nations, including India, Africa, Central America and behind the Iron Curtain. More than 350,000 people have made public decisions for Christ in Todd's services.

The "America for Jesus" crusades have already been conducted in 200 cities in the United States with more than 100,000 people in attendance and more than 25,000 making public decisions for Christ.

Everyone in attendance at the local rally will be given the opportunity to

vote their feelings on the issues of prayer in the schools and the Godless killing of unborn babies going on in this country.

"As many as four thousand babies are murdered every day in America," Todd said. He also claims that many cosmetic companies are now using the remains of these aborted babies in their products such as shampoo, hand and face creams. The details of this grisly activity will be given in his crusade rally in St. Johns.

A one hour television special was recently made of this service in Denver, Co. It will soon be released nationwide. Appearing on the program with Todd will be President Reagan, Pat Boone, Jimmy Swaggart and Jim Bakker.

Todd recently delivered two one thousand foot long prayer petitions to Senate Majority Leader, Howard Baker, and House Speaker,

Tip O'Neill, calling on the House and Senate to return the freedom to pray to our public schools. These two petitions were taken to Washington, D.C., by Todd and had 100,000 names on them collected by him. They were proclaimed as the longest petitions of any kind ever brought to the nation's capitol in its 200 year history.

As a result of that delivery, Senator Baker recently initiated the vote on the "Reagan Prayer Amendment" before the full Senate. Though the "Prayer Amendment" lacked the two-thirds majority, Todd said, "We've only begun to fight."

Todd also took a record one million prayer petitions to President Reagan just three weeks before he announced his support for an amendment to the Constitution that would return the freedom to prayer in the school classrooms. The

presidential aides said it was these one million petitions that inspired Reagan to call for this amendment to the Constitution when he did.

Todd believes the "silent prayer" push is a watered down compromise. "They can pray silently in the Soviet Union," he said. "It's when they pray out loud they are hauled off to prison or shot or both. We are not a satellite of the Soviet Union and its time we stopped acting and talking like it."

A beautiful blue "love" Bible will be given to all school age young people in attendance. Todd is in a crusade to give 100,000 Bibles to the school children with a promise from them that they will carry the Bibles to school each day. Almost 50,000 have already been given to school children.

He also has special T-shirts available for the

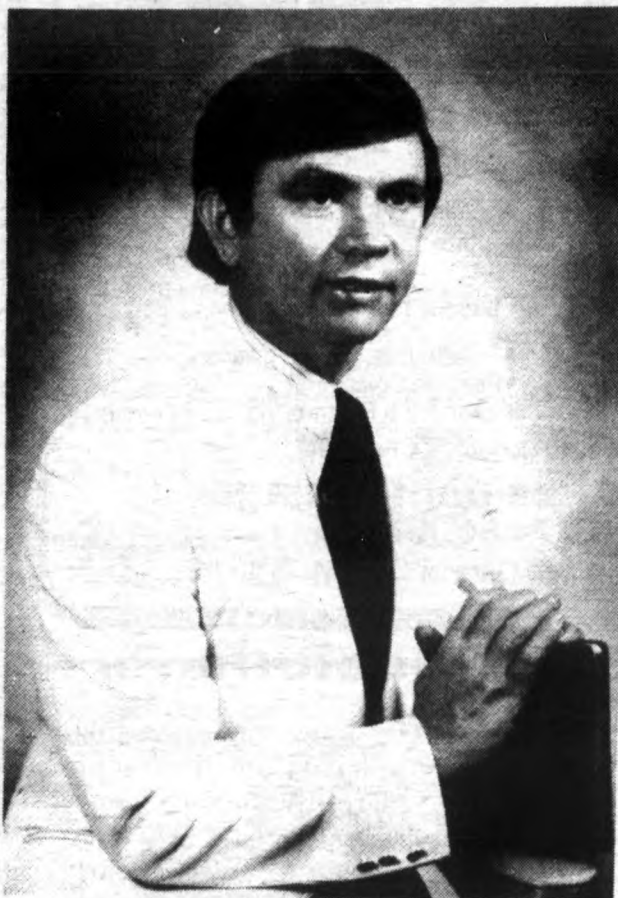
children, that carry the message, Don't Care What-cha Say, I'm Gonna Pray Anyway." Thousands of school children and even adults are now wearing them.

Todd has been the only speaker on the Revival Fires television program since it started in 1965. The program is recognized as the third longest running religious program on national television.

Todd is a ten-year member of the National Religious Broadcasters, chairman of the first National Clean-Up TV Crusade, author of several books and has a Doctor's Degree in Divinity.

Joining Todd for the special crusade service will be his wife, Linda, and The Chosen, one of America's top singing talents, singing gospel.

The service will begin at 7:30 p.m. and there is no admission charge.

Final hearing for fact finding expected in July

The final hearing in the factfinding involving the Fulton Board of Education and the Fulton Education Association was held in Lansing on May 8. Judge Victor Baum, the factfinder, adjourned the hearings at 6:00 p.m. that night. Earlier sessions were held on March 19, March 29, and April 9.

The Board of Education

has been attempting to obtain a one year teacher salary freeze for 1983-1984. The teachers have not accepted this proposal and petitioned for factfinding in November. The contract expired last August 31.

The Judge asked that written briefs be submitted to him by both sides by June 8. Second briefs, in response to the opposing party's initial briefs, will be due June 26. A report from the Factfinder is expected in late July. His report is advisory. Neither side is bound by his recom-

mendation.

Judge Baum is an attorney and retired Circuit Court Judge from Detroit. He was appointed as a State Factfinder by the Blanchard Administration in 1982.

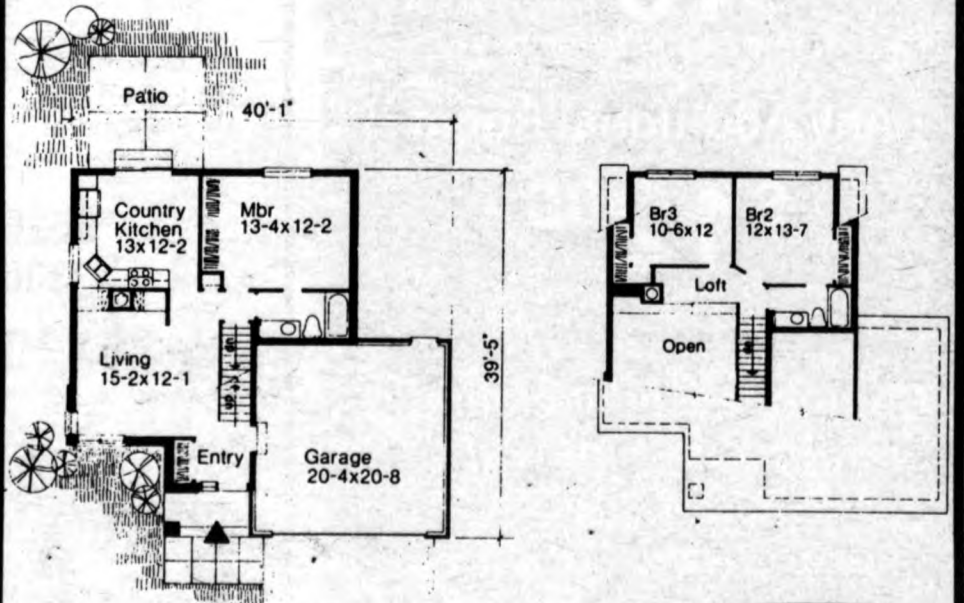

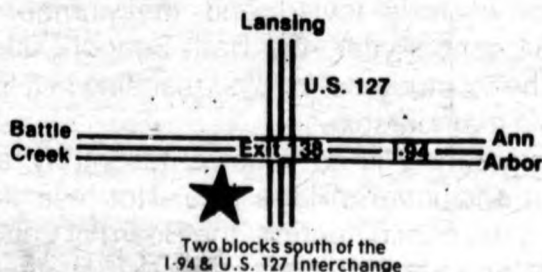

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on May 21, 1984, at 7:30 p.m. in the Bath Elementary Multi-Purpose Room, the Board of Education of Bath Community Schools will hold a joint public hearing to consider the district's proposed 1984-1985 budget and to consider the levying in 1984 of an additional proposed millage rate of .28 mills for operating purposes pursuant to Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan, 1984.

The Board of Education may not adopt its proposed 1984-1985 budget until after the public hearing. A copy of the proposed 1984-1985 budget is available for public inspection during normal business hours at the Office of the Superintendent.

The Board of Education has the complete authority to establish that 33.40 mills be levied in 1984 from within its present authorized millage rate. The additional proposed millage rate would increase revenues for operating purposes from ad valorem property tax levies in 1984 otherwise permitted by Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan, 1982, by one percent (1%).

The figure for increase in revenue for operating purposes is based on the latest estimate of state equalized valuation of property located within the school district. State equalized valuation will not be finalized until after the fourth Monday in May. In the event the state equalized valuation as finalized is for any reason higher than the estimate used for this hearing, the Board of Education must hold another public hearing before levying millage on any higher valuation.

The Bath Community Schools District levied 33.68 mills in 1983 for operation of the School District. This represented 23.68 mills which was approved by the voters for three years in 1981; 1 mill for maintenance approved by the voters in 1983 and 1 additional mill for operation approved by the voters in 1983, and 8 mills set through the Clinton County Allocation Board.

The State Aid Membership Act is written in such a way that when the local state equalized value increases and the taxpayer pays more in taxes the state reduces the amount of revenue that they pay to the local school district. This results in the local community member paying a greater proportion of the financial support of the schools and the state reducing their contribution to the local school support.

Declining enrollment has also compounded the financial problems facing the school district. The membership aid formula is based on the number of mills levied and the number of students. In 1983-1984 school year, the Bath School District enrollment decreased by 52 students, or 5%, resulting in a loss of \$120,386. of state aid membership.

The purpose of the hearing is to receive testimony and discuss the levy of an additional millage rate. Not less than seven (7) days following the public hearing, the Board of Education may approve all or any portion of the proposed additional millage rate.

ORDINANCE NO. 76

LIQUOR CONTROL CITY OF DEWITT CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND CONTROL THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS BY THE GLASS IN THE CITY OF DEWITT; TO PROVIDE STANDARDS FOR MUNICIPAL APPROVAL OF VENDORS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES BY THE GLASS FOR CONSUMPTION ON THE PREMISES, THE OPERATION THEREOF, AND CONDUCT THEREIN; TO REGULATE AND CONTROL CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR ON PUBLIC PROPERTY; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

THE CITY OF DEWITT ORDAINS:

Ordinance No. 76, Section 13, entitled CONSUMPTION IN PUBLIC, is hereby amended and is re-enacted in its entirety as follows:

Section 13. CONSUMPTION IN PUBLIC

No person shall consume alcoholic liquor in any store or other establishment doing business with the public which is not licensed to sell alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises, nor shall any person who owns, operates or controls any such public establishment or store permit the consumption of alcoholic liquor therein. The City of DeWitt may permit the consumption of beer and wine in its designated public parks or in other municipally owned or controlled areas, for a limited time, by the issuance of written licenses, upon written application to the City and approval by the Chief of Police and the City Clerk or the designee of either of them.

All other provisions of Ordinance No. 76 shall remain in full force and effect.

This Amendment to Ordinance No. 76 is hereby adopted at the regular meeting of the City Council of the City of DeWitt held May 7, 1984. This Amendment shall become effective upon publication.

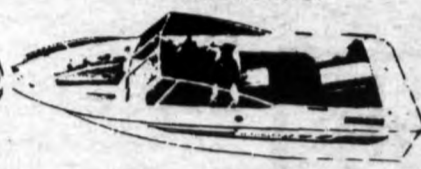
