City Commission reviews next fiscal year's budget

The St. Johns City Commission heard the first presentation of the 1984-85 fiscal year budget at Monday night's City Commission meeting and agreed to vote upon the adoption at the May 29th public hearing.

According to City Manager Randy Humphrey, the budget is up less than five percent from last year, setting a new record at \$4,292,933.

Humphrey also proposed a renewal for the general operating millage, maintaining the 9.72 mills used last year. With the operating mills, the City is proposing a \$60,000 project for street resurfacing and \$15,000 for sidewalk improvements.

The budget also includes refurbishing the water tower, replacing sanitary sewer lines on Garfield and West Gibbs streets, surfacing the Sickles Street Tennis Courts, paying for materials for the fire hall, purchasing a small truck for fighting small grass fires and publishing a brochure to promote the city and industrial park.

At the same time, the debt levy will go from 3.6 to 4.19 mills, proposing the extra .59 mill will be used to pay a scheduled in-

crease in principal payments in three of four bond issues. He said the increase was set by actuaries when the bonds were sold for improvement projects years ago.

The total levy, which will begin July first, will be 13.91, up from 13.32.

The proposed budget includes a \$62.50 annual rubbish fee, up from last year's \$57.20. According to Humphrey, that figure can be broken down to mean \$1.20 weekly for weekly rubbish pick-up, spring clean-ups in May and Christmas tree pick-ups in January.

He added that even with the increase in the rate, the service is still favorable to the surrounding rural residents who pay \$1.85 for private weekly pick-up.

In other action, the Commission heard a presentation by Bill Richards of the Community Resource Volunteers, regarding the implementation of a Senior Citizen and handicapper bus service for the St. Johns area. He requested that the Commission considers the project for a portion of financial support.

The Commission also voted to refer a parking problem on North Oakland Street to Police Chief Lyle French. French will investigate a report of cars parking along the street rather than the designated parking area.

Korienek II, Jim Maddix and Bob Peterson. Senator Alan L. Cropsey personally presented Korienek with a special tribute.

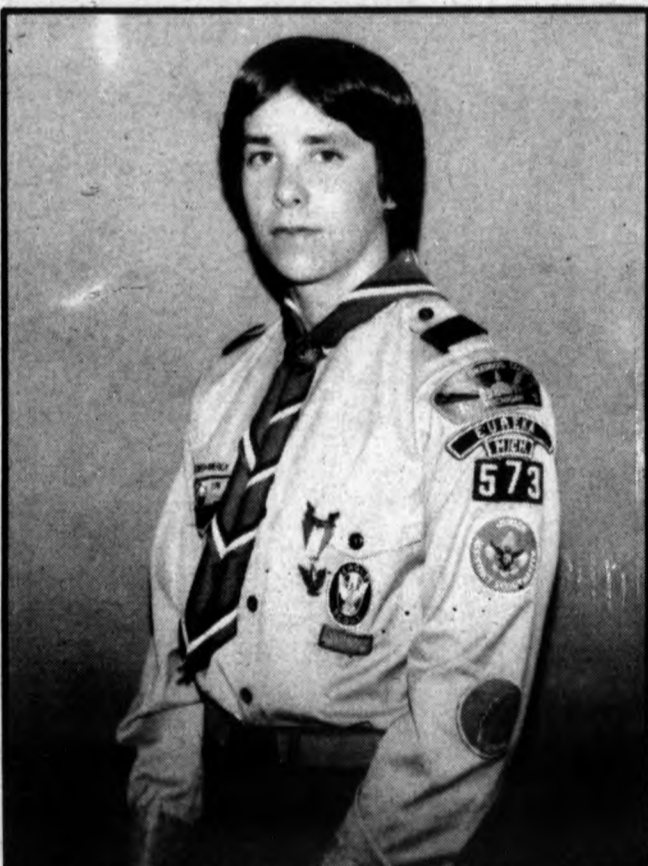

Korienek is a junior at St. Johns High School and attends St. Cyrils Church in Bannister. After graduation, he plans to attend college majoring in electronics.

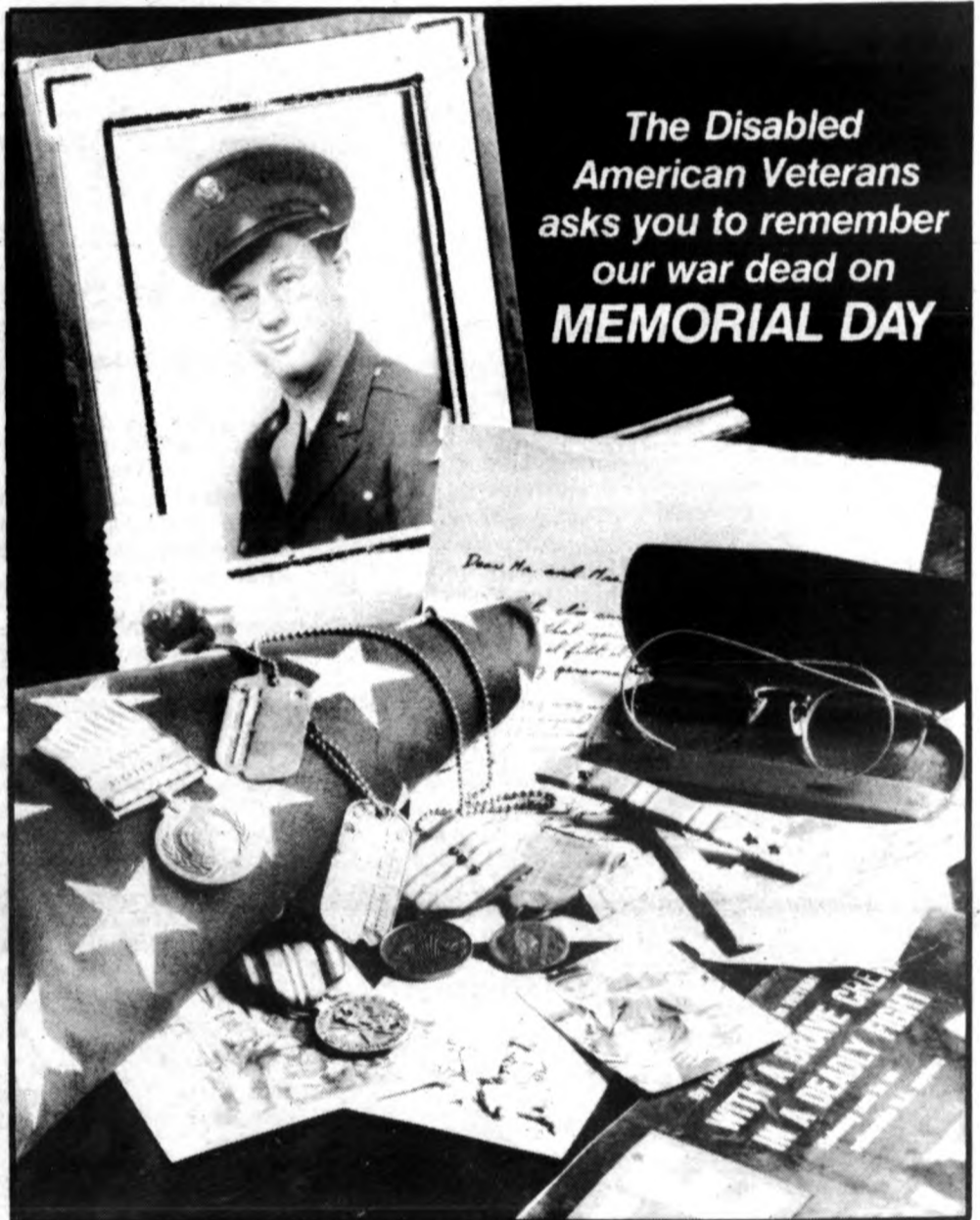
Korienek is the son of Jim and Diane Korienek of St. Johns.

Pornography restraints enforced by state law alone

Despite a current public concern regarding the availability of obscene materials to children in area stores, St. Johns City Attorney Paul Maples announced Monday night that the City Commission is unable to legally enforce a resolution to restrict the selling of the materials.

According to Maples, the authority to make such decisions lies in the state government and cannot legally be assumed by a local government.

However, he did say that the prosecuting attorney could enforce a state statute if he felt the state standards were not being met regarding the display or sale of obscene material.

To begin with, under the law, as adopted by the Michigan Supreme Court in 1979, three standards are used in determining what can be deemed constitutionally obscene materials are: whether 'the average person, applying contemporary community standards would find that the work, taken as a whole, appeals to the prurient interest; whether the work depicts or describes, in a patently offensive way, sexual conduct specifically defined by applicable state law; and whether the work, taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value.'

Maple said his findings does not mean, however, that the Commission is unable

Exchange hosts Schuette

Members of St. Johns Exchange Club met last Thursday night at the House of Beef east of St. Johns for their traditional "Ladies Night" featuring the presence of their wives.

After enjoying a delicious meal of prime rib the attending group were treated to a program of barbershop singing and the appearance of congressional candidate Bill Schuette.

Members of the barbershop group were John Anderson, Eugene Livingston, Don Valentine and Charlie Huntington.

Following several popular selections by the "Silo Singers", all local personages from St. Johns, Past President Pete Peterson introduced Congressman hopeful Bill Schuette to the attentive audience.

to request that the merchant or distributor of this material to cooperate in setting the material out of reach of children.

Karen Asher, spokesperson for the St. Johns Citizens of Concern, was at the Monday night meeting and reaffirmed her statement that the concern isn't that the stores are selling the magazine, but simply that retailers move the material behind the counter so children aren't able to look through them as they casually

walk through the store.

Mayor John Arehart conceded that the problem isn't a major one in St. Johns and that most of the stores already keep their material behind the counter.

On Monday, the board voted to investigate what action they may take in the upcoming weeks regarding the material, including the possibility of sending a letter to the area merchants notifying them that there are citizens who are concerned. The plan will be presented at the next May 29th meeting.

Crop Dusters tune up for farming efficiency

It's not often that a crop-dusting pilot used to covering hundreds of acres in the space of a couple of hours is concerned with something so seemingly trivial as spraying a three-inch plastic dish.

But that's precisely what Al and Mike Schiffer of Al's Aerial Spraying, Ovid, spent last week doing. They coaxed their 3800 pound AgCat and Airtractor into spraying a mist of water and copper powder into three-inch diameter plastic petri dishes.

The intent of this preci-

sion exercise involved use of state-of-the-art technology to make their Ag airplanes the best possible instrument for aerial application—also known as "crop dusting"—for farmers.

Al's Aerial Spraying serves farmers in Clinton County and the rest of Mid, Southern, and Eastern Michigan by providing aerial application of seeds, fertilizers, and pesticides.

Contrary to some popular impressions, aerial application is a precision science, not a

devil-may-care adventure in which flying cowboys drop bursts of chemicals through a bomb bay.

Aerial application requires uncompromising pilotage under exacting conditions—a careful blend of skilled airmanship and well-honed machinery.

To insure that their Ag airplanes are able to perform with the best of them, the Schiffers put them through their paces Tuesday through Thursday. Modern technology and close attention were focused on making the airship

capable of satisfying farmers most demanding needs.

That bring us back to those three-inch dishes. Schiffer and 15 other crop dusters throughout Michigan converged on a strip near Ovid to fine-tune their aerial application aircraft.

With the assistance of other experienced crop dusters, Michigan State University specialists, Department of Agriculture Regulatory officials, and industry personnel, Schiffer brought old and new technology to bear in improving an already versatile agricultural tool.

Aerial application involves spraying of chemicals through a row of nozzles through a tube extending the width of the airplane. But wind turbulence generated by propeller backwash, wingtip whirlpools and other disturbances can cause uneven distribution of the

solution being sprayed. Schiffer and other pilots attending Operation Self-Regulated Application and Flight Efficiency (S.A.F.E.) at Schiffer Acres near Ovid subjected their aircraft to careful examination to locate such interruptions in spray distribution and then to eliminate them.

The process involved spraying a solution of copper powder and water over a row of three-inch wide plastic dishes during a routine fly-over. The copper content in each dish was then gauged with a photometer, allowing a pattern of the plane's spray to be developed.

Participants were then able to adjust the nozzles on their planes to smooth out overly heavy or inadequate concentrations of spray.

Repeated test flights allowed significant disturbances to be located, analyzed and eliminated. The result is a fleet of aircraft able to help make area cropland as fruitful as possible.

Schiffer also participated in seminars presented by specialists

from the Federal Aviation Administration, the Michigan Aeronautical Commission and several farm chemical companies to increase his knowledge of his craft.

Hosting Operation S.A.F.E.—an annual program of the Michigan Agricultural Aviation Association—was Al's Aerial Spraying, owner of Schiffer's Acres.

"Aerial application is an invaluable tool for the busy farmer," commented Mike Schiffer, a partner in Al's Aerial Spraying. "It allows the farmer to turn a dollar faster and more easily."

"Aerial application eliminates the problem of soil compaction and permits spraying in a small fraction of the time needed by conventional ground spraying machinery.

"Aerial application works when fields are too muddy to accommodate heavy ground vehicles in the spring, and airplanes crush no crops under their tires.

"Aerial spraying can save the average farmer time, effort and money while permitting him to focus more attention on other important tasks."

Fuerstenau honored as Citizen of the Year

And the honors continue for Clarence H. Fuerstenau, the 1984 recipient of the DeWitt Citizen of the Year award.

Fuerstenau, 83, was chosen for the honorary title based on his qualifications and contributions to the betterment of the city. According to organizer Denise Smith, a board selected his name after viewing his achievements made while living in DeWitt for the past 61 years.

Fuerstenau said he never expected to be chosen for the third annual award. "I thought I was through with honors 18 years ago," he said, jokingly. "I was surprised when the mayor came over the other night and told me I had been chosen."

In 1966, the same year Fuerstenau retired from the DeWitt school system as superintendent, a new middle school bore his name in recognition of all that he had done for the school system.

Since moving here in 1923, he has served in nearly every position within the system, beginning with the teaching of ninth and tenth grade students. At the same time, he was also recognized as the general overseer of the school in its entirety, although not formally classified as a superintendent.

Several years later, he moved into the official superintendent spot and continued in that position until his retirement. During that time, he said he took an active part in making sure the system

ran efficiently. He often visited classrooms while in session and made himself readily available to both students and teachers. He said he tried to make the schools as personable as possible.

Fuerstenau said he feels that the reputation he began has continued even today. "I'm rather proud of the way things are going," he said. "I figure they've got one of the best class 'C' schools in Michigan."

At the same time, Fuerstenau and his wife, Beatrice, were also active in other community events, including being lifetime members of the Masonic Lodge, serving on the Boy Scout committee and twice serving as Trustee on the Village Council. Today, he is still serving on the DeWitt Cemetery Board.

Fuerstenau recalled that some of his most enjoyable moments came during Christmas as a member of the DeWitt Lions Club. At that time, the Lions would put together food baskets and deliver them to the needy in DeWitt.

"Those are the kinds of things I like to do," he said. "I enjoy helping people."

Today, he continues with that same motivation. When he isn't enjoying himself at the High Noon Luncheons in Lansing, or traveling to and from Florida, one would most likely be able to find him working in his garden or doing yardwork at his home on 117 Wilson Road.

Magistrate Court added in county

The southern end of Clinton County will soon be getting their own informal magistrate court, according to county magistrate Joseph Yurek.

The DeWitt Township Board recently adopted the civil infraction court in an effort to reduce overtime budgets and provide savings in police officer time in traveling to the present district court in St. Johns.

"It will be very convenient and helpful to those communities involved," Yurek said. "The people wanted it and the judge

was very happy to comply."

The communities in which the court will serve are Bath Township, DeWitt Township, and DeWitt City. The court itself, will be located in the DeWitt Township offices.

According to Yurek, he will be traveling to the court as often as he is needed to cover the case loads in the area. He said most of the cases are basically traffic violators, in which the defendant, judge and officer making the arrest are present. Each case takes anywhere from 10-20 minutes to complete.

Scheduling for the court should begin by mid-June.

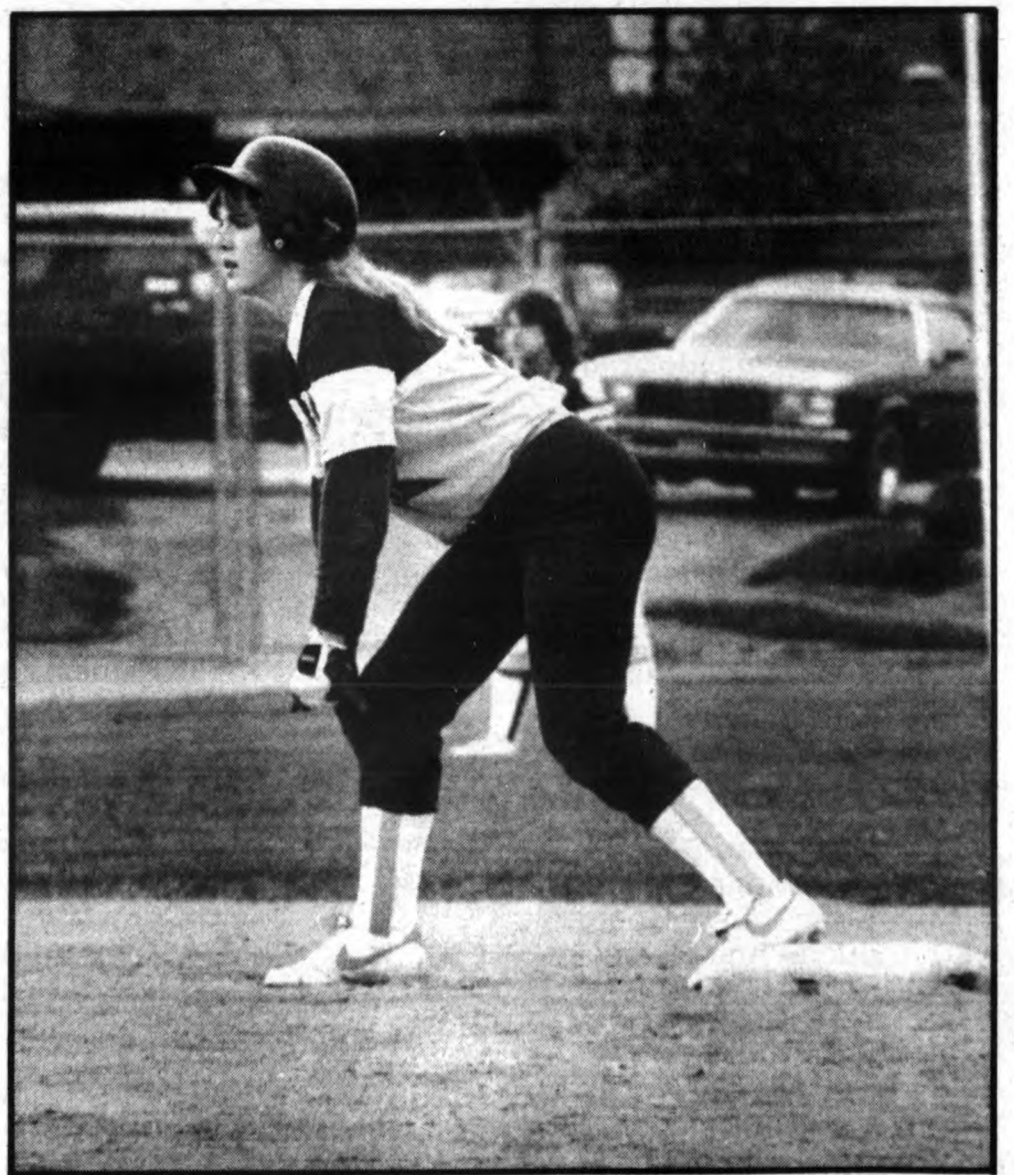

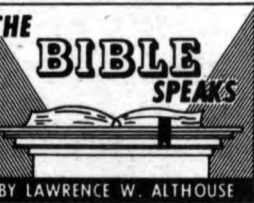
What the father wanted, as we all do when we approach the golden years of life, can

THE PEOPLE'S CHOICE June 3, 1984

Background Scripture: 1 Samuel 8:12.
Devotional Reading: 1 Samuel 8:4-9.

The situation that confronted Samuel seems entirely alien and incomparable to our own times.

The age of the Judges of Israel was drawing to a close. Samuel was the last of these Judges—who were not "judges" in the judicial sense, but temporary leaders—and now his own ministry was drawing to a close.

During this period of Hebrew history, the tribes of Israel flourished without a single centralized leadership. They were bound together in a loose tribal confederation that waxed in times of mutual peril and waned in periods of prosperity and security.

When challenges came to any or all of the twelve tribes, we are told that "God raised up a leader"—Jephthah, Samson, Gideon—to meet the threat. But when the crisis had passed, for the most part, the Judge faded from the scene.

GIVE US A KING!

Now, with Samuel obviously in his last days and the Amorites threatening to overrun the land, the people come to Samuel asking for God to send them a king. It seems a reasonable enough request: why shouldn't they have a

designated leader?

Samuel's response is a surprising one: he's utterly against the choice of a king. Furthermore he indicates that their desire to have one is a sin against God, a rejection of his leadership.

What possible relevance can this archaic situation have for us today? Are we implying that God is against us having duly constituted political authority? If God opposed the crowning of a king for Israel, does that mean he is equally antagonistic to our election of mayors, governors, a Congress, or a President?

Yet, perhaps Samuel and his times are closer to us than is immediately apparent.

If we read 1 Samuel 12 carefully, we find that it is not the king per se that is the issue Samuel is raising. His concern is that the people will transfer to a human king the faith and dependence they had previously posited in the Lord. And that is where we

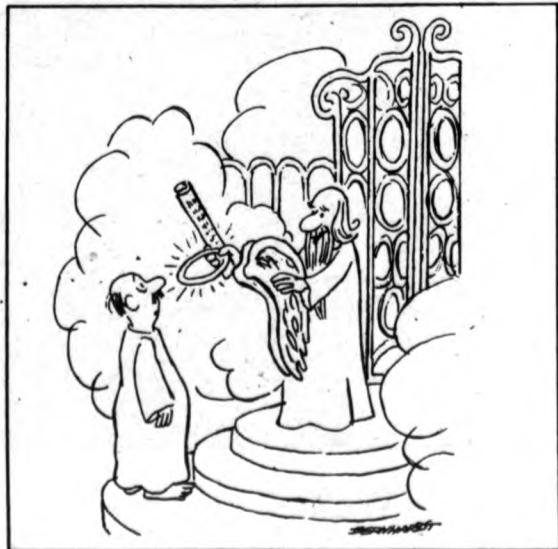
find their story becoming our story: it is a continuing human tendency to look to human leaders to do and mean what only God can do and mean.

SERVE THE LORD

We are presently in the midst of an intensive—and sometimes wearying—campaign to elect a President for these United States. It is not only right but necessary for us to do so. But we need to realize that no human President can do for us what has to be done. He or she cannot be God and we must resist the temptation to look to the Presidency to give us what only God can give.

Thus, Samuel's counsel—archaic as it is—is timely and appropriate: "...if both you and the king who reigns over you will follow the Lord your God, it will be well" (12:14b). Let that be the People's choice.

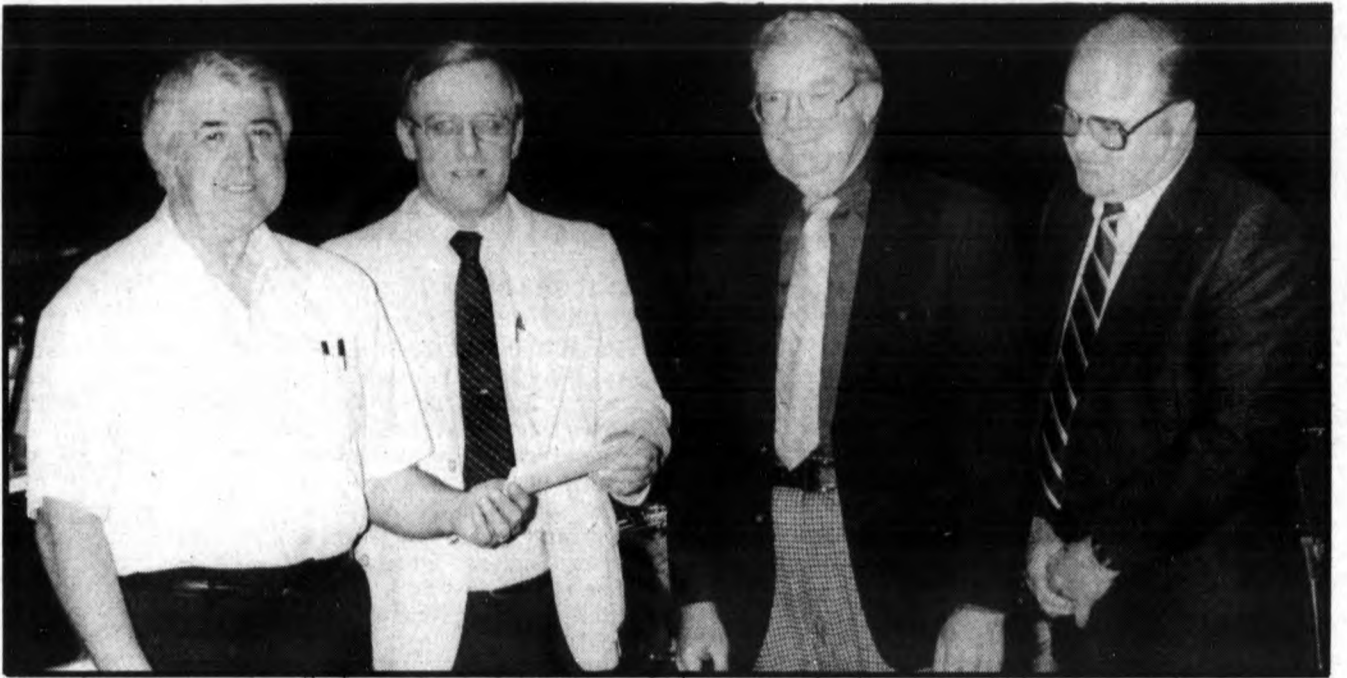

A total of \$5,000 has been donated to this program from individuals and community groups in Clinton very supportive of the program. The Clinton County

County. Also, 19 seats were donated.

Currently, there are 30 people on the waiting list for toddler seats and 33 people on the waiting list for infant seats in Clinton County. To date 90 car seats have been distributed on a loan basis.

The State of Michigan granted the program \$1,500 for Clinton County to purchase seats. Forty-six seats were purchased with this money.

Some of the donations are invested in an endowment fund to ensure a continual source of funding to purchase seats with in the future. Currently, there is \$2,875 in the Clinton County Endowment fund. The principal is not spent. The interest earned from the principal is used to purchase seats and replace straps, pads, etc.

Two local law enforcement agencies and community groups have been

Child Seat Safety Committee and the Mid-Michigan District Health Department are co-sponsoring the Child Seat Safety Program. The goal is to eradicate the number one cause of death and injury to children.

Child restraint seats can reduce the risk of death by 90 percent and injury by 80 percent when used properly. Studies have shown that over half of the seats are being used incorrectly. The Child Safety Program requires that parents attend an educational session to learn how to use the seats correctly.

Child restraint seats are distributed free of charge on a loan basis to families in Clinton County. After

their child reaches the age of four the seats are to be returned so that others may benefit from its use.

The goal of the car seat program is to ensure that every child in Clinton County under the age of four rides safely in a child restraint seat.

The seats are being distributed in four ways: through the Health Department, the clergy, some local law enforcement agencies, and pre-natal classes.

There are 700 babies

born per year in Clinton County. Twenty-one hundred seats are needed to maintain an inventory for the next three years. The seats are purchased at a discount price with donations from businesses, industries, community groups, and individuals.

Donations are tax deductible. Presentations are available to community groups and individuals interested in aiding this community wide effort. For more information please call 224-8393.

Potato stocks lower in state

Michigan potato growers, shippers and processors held a total of 700,000 hundredweight (cwt) of potatoes on May 1. This compares to 1,200,000 cwt. a year ago, according to the Federal State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

Seed growers are in the process of making final shipments for the season. Disappearance for the 1983 crop from the start of harvest to May 1st, totaled 6.7 million cwt., two percent below disappearance for the same period a year ago. So far this season, 91 percent of the crop has been removed from

storage as compared to 85 percent last year.

Nationally, potato stocks in the 15 major producing states totaled 46.2 million cwt. on May 1st. This is down 19 percent from the

previous year and nine percent below two year ago. May 1st stocks accounted for 17 percent of fall production this year, compared to 19 percent last year.

Business Report

McDonald's national advertising campaign that will run May 18 through June 17 is the brainchild of a Michigan businessman. Charles McCann of DeWitt, conceived the "Olympic Sand Pail Happy Meal"—a children's meal combination contained in colorful sand pails. Each sand pail, complete with shovel and lid, is decorated with scenes of "McDonaldland" characters performing Olympic activities.

Owner of four McDonald's restaurants located in St. Johns, Portland, Alma and Owosso, McCann said he was in his backyard one summer when the idea just "floated" in.

"I found a small children's sand pail that had washed up on the bank of Lake Geneva. The idea came to me then and I knew that it had great potential."

McCann approached McDonald's national headquarters regarding the sand pail in the summer of 1980 but the idea was rejected. He said McDonald's main concern was that the recreational value of the item would not be uniform throughout the country.

McCann did not give up. He shared the idea with fellow McDonald's restaurant owner-operators and one operator took the idea to McDonald's advertising agency in Boston, where it was successfully test-marketed in 1983. A three week supply sold out in just two weeks. Meanwhile, McCann tested it at his own restaurant with similar results.

Now, four years later, McDonald's is implementing the Olympic Sand Pail Happy Meal nationally and McCann is looking forward to seeing his idea become reality.

McDonald's Children's Marketing Group presented McCann with a gold pail in November of 1983 for the "Big Idea Award."

McCann has been with McDonald's for 23 years, working himself up from crew member to manager, then part-owner. In December, 1979 he purchased his first McDonald's, located at 920 S. U.S.-27 in St. Johns.

McCann enjoys boating in his free time. He resides in DeWitt with his wife, Barbara, and two daughters, Nichole, 8, and Gretchen, 5.

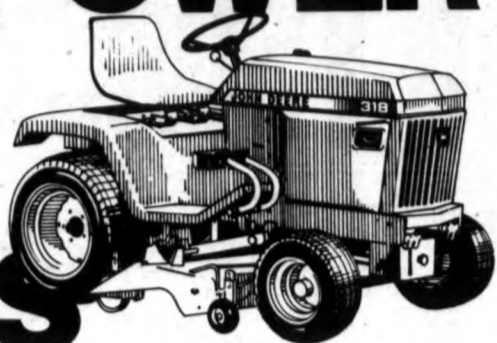
