Alcohol losing interest for area youth?

In light of the traditional end-of-the-year celebrations that usually occur with each graduating class, Captain Robert Ferry of the Clinton County Sheriff's Department, said this year there seems to be less of an emphasis on alcohol consumption.

"It seems to be much slower this year," he said, adding, "There seems to be more of a tendency for parents to be concerned."

Ferry said he feels that the increased publicity of alcohol awareness, through such organizations as Mothers Against Drunk Driving, has helped to generate more of a concern about the illegal consumption of alcohol. He said in the past, alcohol was often used as a planned refreshment at an open house, whereas now, that seems to be changing.

He said the recent policy the department uses to inform parents about the legal implications in serving alcohol to minors is to inform them of the law and its consequences whenever a situation arises. Despite conflicting ideas in regard to serving alcohol to minors, Ferry stressed that it is illegal for anyone to serve alcohol to anyone underage. He added that once parents are aware of that, most of them cooperate and take action to restrict the consumption.

According to Ferry, there also seems to be a decrease in the number of teenage parties. He explained that during May and June, many students often advertise open parties in which everyone is invited to attend. In such cases, police usually arrive at the scene before the par-

Held locally

Steinman, Newman debate over issues

Bob Steinman's election platform of increasing the conviction rates for felonies was recently debated with incumbent prosecutor Jon Newman as part of a St. Johns High School Debate Class project.

After citing statistics gathered regarding the conviction rates during 1980 to 1983, Steinman explained that only half of the persons brought to trial in felony cases, were ever convicted, a number he feels is proportionately low for the nature of the crimes.

At the same time, he stated he felt proper restitution for the victims was something that had been overlooked during the past few years.

"The victims have lost their importance," he said. "We need to put the emphasis back on the victims rather than on the defendant."

Newman, who took the stand following Steinman, stated that Steinman's statistics were invalid and that giving them to the public is a dangerous thing.

"He suggests that crime is running rampant," Newman said. "When actually the conviction rate has increased

significantly since 1979."

Newman cited several reasons why he felt the conviction rate was actually increasing, noting the breaking in of new judges and the growing experience of his staff. At the same time, he cited statistics in which 31 people out of 50 cases were found guilty and convicted.

In reply, Steinman reported that Newman's statistics actually included directed verdicts, in which case the judge dismisses the case because the prosecutor wasn't able to give enough evidence to convict the defendant. He stated that his statistics were valid, as he gathered them through the clerk and county files. At the same time, he stated that the statistics are very important for the community to know.

The debate came after Mr. Koger's debate class had considered the job of prosecuting attorney and its qualifications. According to Koger, the class had then indicated an interest in not only hearing why both Steinman and Newman considers himself the person for the job, but also their positions on several other issues including how taxpayers can save money in civil cases, attitudes towards first offenders and the amount of work for one prosecuting attorney.

Card registration system to continue

For over a year, Capital Area Community Services, Inc., with the assistance of the Clinton County Senior Citizens Office and Clinton County Community Services, has been using a card registration system with the Commodity Food (cheese) Distribution Program. Because this system has worked so well, they have decided to continue with a new registration card for another year.

Beginning the week of May 21, they will start the process of recertifying and re-issuing new Commodity Registration Cards. As usual, recent proof of income is necessary in order to receive a new card. The following items can be used as proof: copy of Social Security, SSI or VA check; Direct Deposit Statement from the bank; benefit report from the Social Security Administration; copy of Homestead Property Tax Credit Claim; State or Federal Income Tax return; rental or lease agreement from subsidized housing; or a benefit report from the Clinton County Department of Social Services, dated within the last three months. Please remember that the Food Stamps and Medicaid Cards are not considered proof of income.

In order to qualify for the program the family income must be at or below the following guidelines:

Family Size of 1-\$6,225 Income
 Family Size of 2-\$8,400 Income
 Family Size of 3-\$10,575 Income

For each additional family member add \$2,175.

As of now, they are not sure when the next distribution will take place, but you must have your new registration card before that distribution.

The cards are available at the Senior Citizens Office and Community Services at 100 S. Ottawa St. in

St. Johns, between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday. If you do not have your new card before the next distribution, you will not be able to receive the commodities. If you have any questions, call the Senior Citizens Office at 224-7998 or Community Services at 224-6702.

ty even begins, therefore stopping any damage that might occur. This year, however, Ferry reports that the department hasn't received any information regarding the parties.

Nevertheless, Ferry said his department will continue to alert themselves to the possibilities of illegal consumption of alcohol at both parties and open houses. He said the department wants to maintain this year's lower number of fatalities connected with alcohol. Last year, by June, seven people were killed in alcohol related incidents. This year, the number of victims has dropped to three.

Waldron Middle School receives study test results

Waldron Middle School in Fowler participated in the Second International Science Study last spring (1983). Waldron was selected by the National Center for Educational Statistics of the United States Department of Education.

The Second International Science Study is one of the largest empirical research studies ever undertaken in education, and it involves over 25 countries throughout the world.

In April, 1983, 32 Waldron 5th graders (this year's 6th graders), answered a series of special science test questions. The results from Waldron and from schools throughout the United States have been

scored. The results are as follows:

- Percent correct (total test)-Waldron (60), National (58.7)
 - Percent correct (biology items)-Waldron (64), National (62.1)
 - Percent correct (physical science items)-Waldron (58), National (55.7)
 - Average total score on 48 items-Waldron (29), National (28.2)
 - Low and High Scores-Waldron (17/42), National (6/46)
- The results for the fifth grade and for the tests given to 9th and 12th grade students throughout the nation will be used to make decisions regarding science education policy at the local, state, and national levels in the years to come.

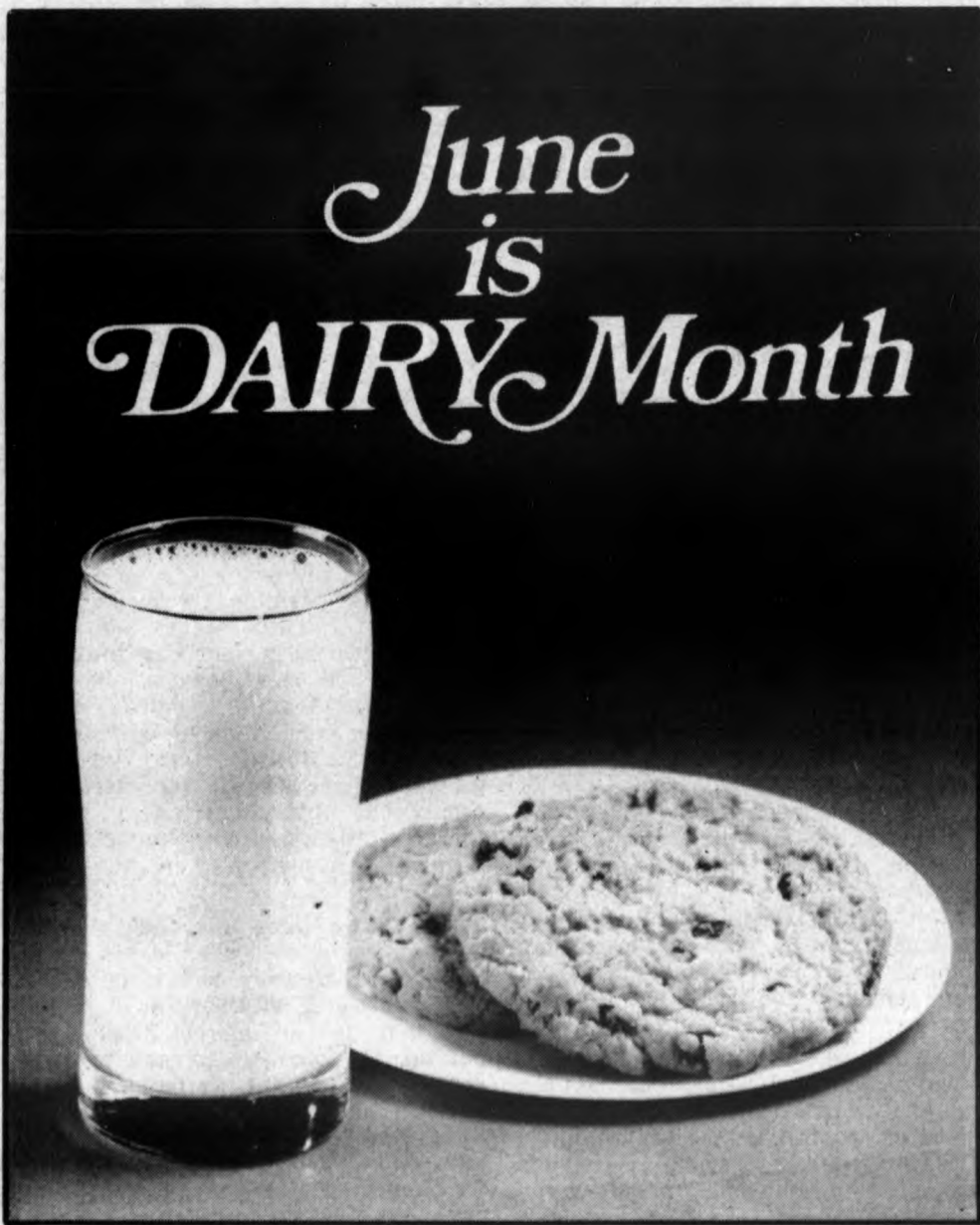

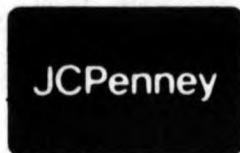

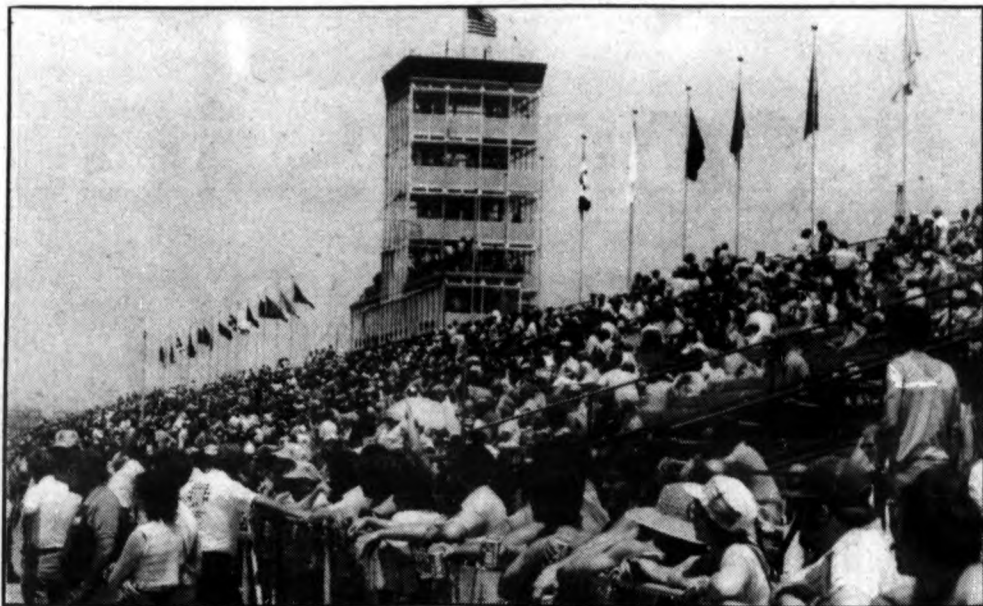

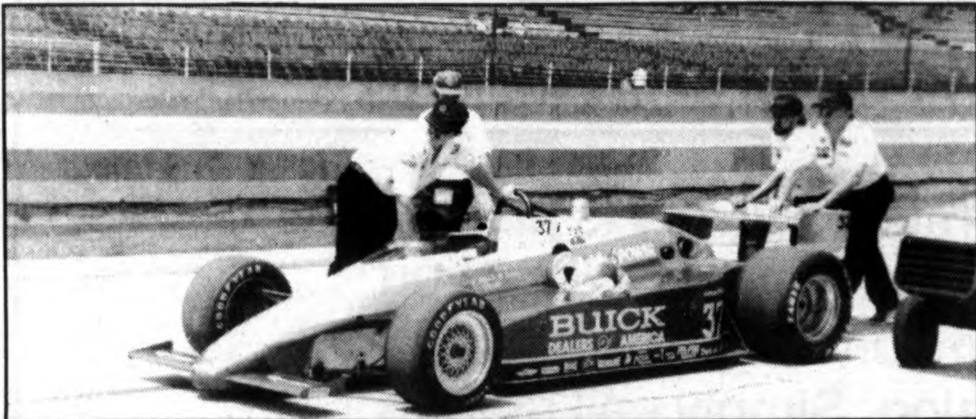

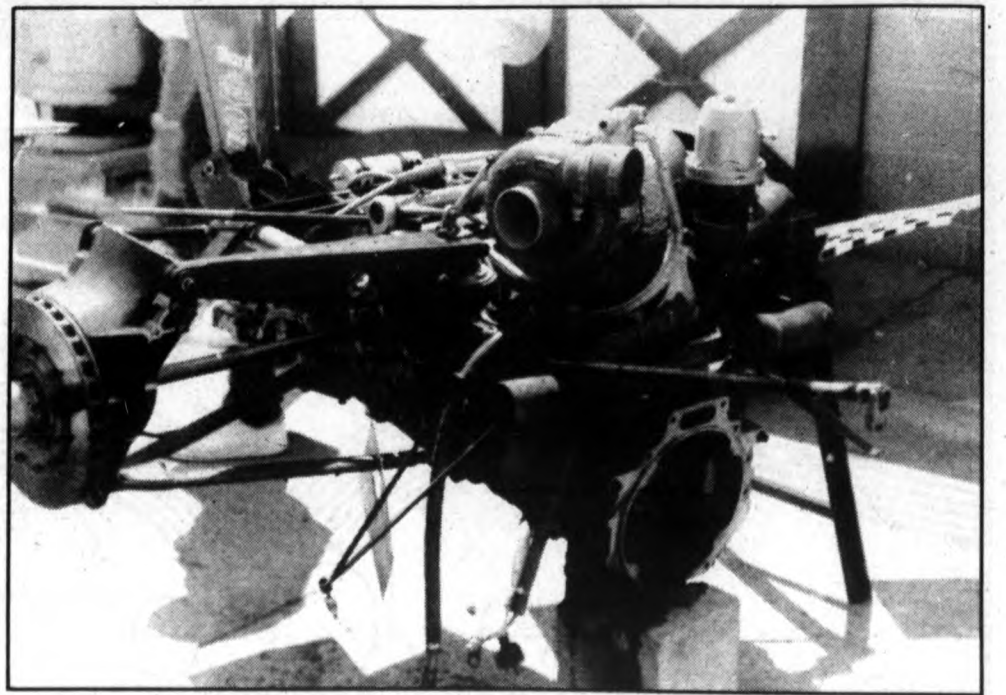

Farm News

Michigan milk production down

The steady increases in monthly milk production have ended in Michigan. Dairy herds produced 447 pounds of milk during April, down 2 percent from a year earlier according to the Federal/State-Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. This was the first year to year decrease in monthly milk production since July, 1979. The lower production was due mainly to reduced milk cow numbers. Cow numbers averaged 397,000 head during April, down 1

percent from last year. Milk output per cow has also declined from year earlier levels. The April average of 1,125 pounds per cow was down 5 pounds from the previous year. The value of milk sold in Michigan during April averaged \$13.40 per hundredweight (cwt.), down 30 cents from a year earlier. This price reflects the total value of milk at the dairy plant or receiving station before deductions are made for hauling and the dairy assessment.

Slaughter cow prices averaged \$42.50 per cwt., up 2 percent. Replacement milk cow prices averaged \$910 per head on April 1, down \$180 from a year earlier. Nationally, milk production during April totaled 11.7 billion pounds, 2 percent less than a year earlier. Production per cow averaged 1,075 pounds during April, 4 pounds less than April, 1983. Total milk cows averaged 10.9 million head, 2 percent less than a year ago. Accumulated

milk production during the first 4 months of 1984, at nearly 46 billion pounds, was down 1 percent from the comparable 1983 period. Michigan dairy manufacturing plants produced 5.2 million pounds of butter during March, down 16 percent from the previous year. American cheese production, at 1.9 million pounds, was down 38 percent from a year ago. Ice cream production, at 2.9 million gallons, was unchanged from last year.

Dairy month observed nationwide

In June, we celebrate the birthdays of Jefferson Davis, Beau Brummell, Judy Garland, Jean Paul Sartre, and Brigham Young. We observe Flag Day, Father's Day, and Midsummer Day. We can even take a day to remember Custer's Last Stand on June 25. But one celebration important to the health of people in the United States is the annual observance of June Dairy Month.

The event has two purposes. First is to encourage greater consumption and enjoyment of milk and other dairy foods. Second is to salute the dairy farm families whose daily work assures the continued availability of these nutritious foods.

While month-long celebrations have been established for many other foods (including soup, pickles, cherries, popcorn, hot dogs, potatoes and peanuts), June Dairy

Month is one of the oldest. This celebration began as a double-header. In the summer of 1937, grocer and drug chain store organizations sponsored National Milk Month and that fall an industry publisher set up National Milk Week. By 1939 the salute became a single month-long event promoting use of dairy foods and saluting dairy farmers. National Dairy Council (NDC) developed special materials and carried out the activities planned by a committee representing dairy farmers, processors, and a leading dairy publication. Pioneer leaders were Milton Hult, National Dairy Council; Charles Holman, National Cooperative Milk Producers' Federation; R. E. Little, International Association of Milk Dealers; Charles Speaks, Milk Industry Foundation; and Lester Olsen, The Milk

Dealer magazine. In 1940, when American Dairy Association (ADA) was organized, dairy farmers in many states selected the well-established June Dairy Month as the time for collecting ADA promotion funds.

Michigan farmers receive increase in 1983 marketings

Michigan farmers received nearly \$3 billion from 1983 marketings of crops, livestock, and livestock products, an increase of 3 percent from the previous year, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Crop cash receipts, at \$1.8 billion, increased 5 percent while livestock receipts, at \$1.2 billion rose nearly 2 percent. The higher crop cash receipts were due to a combination of larger marketings for some commodities and higher prices for many commodities. The combined effects of the Payment in Kind (PIK) program and the summer drought led to the higher prices. The higher livestock receipts were due mainly to larger volumes marketed. Michigan ranked 19th in the U.S. in total cash receipts during 1983. Michigan farms accounted for 2.1 percent of the U.S. total receipts. During 1982, Michigan held 22nd place in cash receipts.

Cash receipts from dairy products increased 3 percent during 1983, more than offsetting a 3 percent

drop in meat animal receipts. Dairy receipts accounted for 25 percent of Michigan's total cash farm receipts. Cash receipts from poultry and egg marketings rose 5 percent. Increases in cash receipts from marketings of vegetables, fruit, and wheat offset lower receipts from corn and soybean marketings. Wheat sales more than doubled from the low level of 1982. Vegetable receipts (including dry beans and potatoes) rose 7 percent while fruit crops increased 14 percent. Soybean receipts dropped 27 percent and feed grains (primarily corn) fell 1 percent. Corn remains Michigan's most important crop in terms of cash receipts, as 1983 marketings accounted for 20 percent of the total.

Nationally, 1983 cash receipts from farm marketings dropped 3 percent from 1982. This drop was due to lower crop receipts as livestock receipts actually showed a slight increase. Crop receipts declined 6 percent from the previous year.

Cash receipts provide on-

ly a partial measure of gross farm income and do not reflect the net income realized by farmers. To arrive at net farm income, one must also consider farm production expenses, government payments, current inventories held on farms, farm debt, and other income. Data on 1983 production expenses, government payments, and net farm income for Michigan and the U.S. will not be available until later this year.

Youths to enter heifers

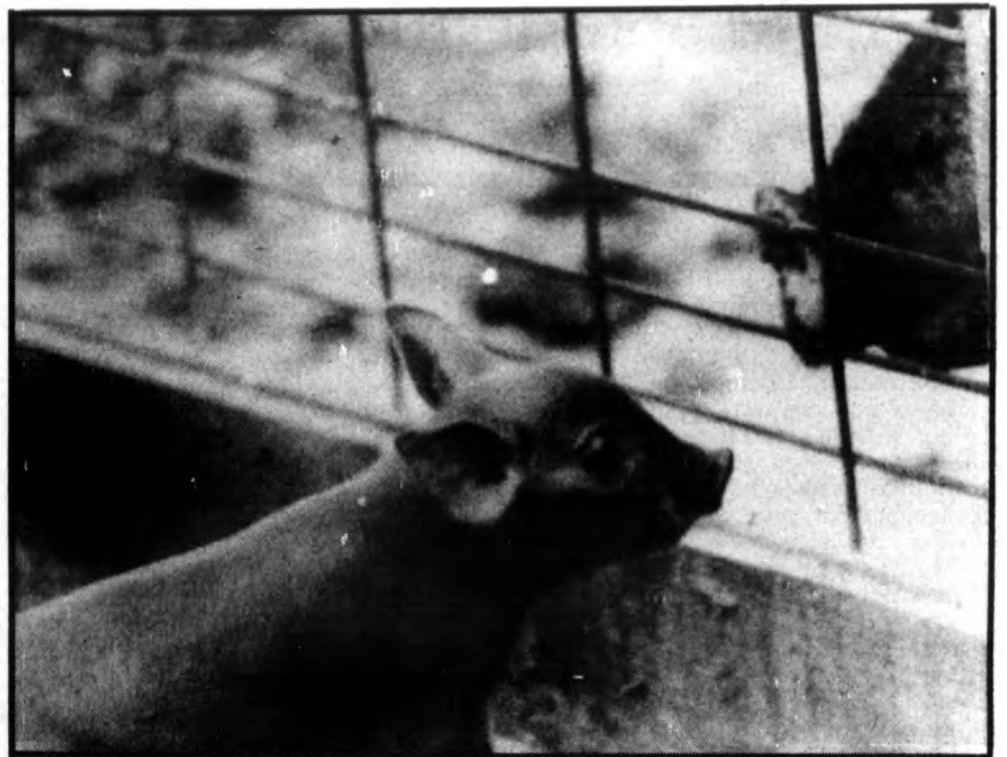

"The show will be an excellent opportunity for youths who own beef projects to practice exhibiting their animals before county fairs begin in July," says Theresa Silm, Clinton County 4-H youth agent.

The beef heifer show will feature classes for heifers of all breeds born between September 1, 1982, and March 31, 1984. Registered heifers must be exhibited in their breed classes; unregistered heifers can be entered in a commercial class.

A steer show will be held in conjunction with the heifer show. All steers will be shown by weight and must weigh at least 700 pounds.

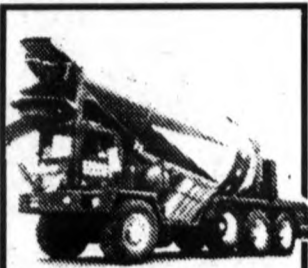

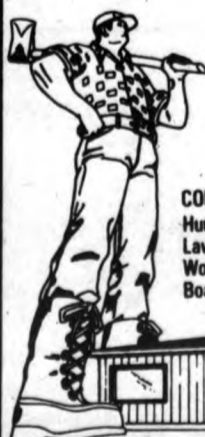

Immediately following the presentation, the Lansing "Box 23" volunteers, who supply coffee and sandwiches to firefighters fighting a blaze, served refreshments in the hospital's west parking lot.

While in the parking lot, firefighters from the Lansing, Lansing Township and

East Lansing departments displayed their firefighting equipment, discussed their demanding jobs and answered any questions.

The hospital also conducted tours of the emergency department and burn center to illustrate what happens when a burn patient is brought into the hospital. The staff explained how they care for burn victims and the special equipment used in treatment.

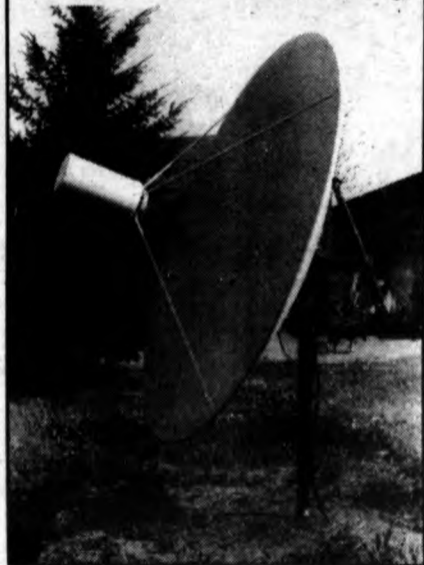

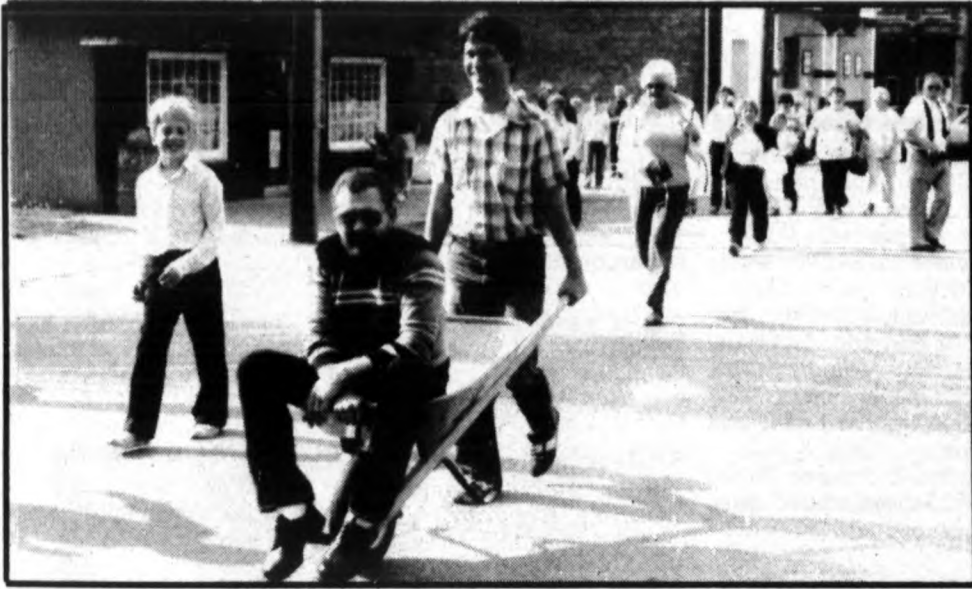

Partial Solar Eclipse to occur

A partial solar eclipse will cast a brief, dark shadow over the land May 30th.

Observers anywhere in the 48 continental United States will be able to follow parts of the moon's progress as it passes in front of the sun.

But only to Earth-bound observers located along a narrow path will the moon appear to almost totally cover the sun for few seconds, said University Astronomy Professor Richard G. Teske.

"To Michigan observers, the sun will be about 70 percent obscured at the height of the eclipse," Teske said. "Maximum dimming will occur around 12:37 p.m. (EDT), but the entire event will last for nearly three hours.

"The moon will appear to make its first tiny dent in the sun's southwest rim somewhere between 11:13 and 11:17 a.m., with the final moments of the eclipse occurring around 2:05 p.m."

The high point of the eclipse will occur just after noon, when the moon's shadow will speed along a path stretching diagonally across the southeastern United States from Louisiana to Maryland, he says.

While the exact time of maximum dimming of the sun will depend on the viewer's location, how much sunlight appears blocked out will depend on how close the viewer is to the center of the moon's shadow.

To avoid eye damage, Teske strongly advises that eclipse watchers never look directly at the sun. He recommends indirect observation, such as projecting an image of the partially eclipsed sun by allowing sunlight to pass through a small lens or through a pinhole in a sheet of cardboard onto a sheet of paper screen.

To observers in the path of the moon's shadow, the eclipse will not be a total, he points out, "because the moon will be slightly smaller than the sun. Consequently, at the moment the two bodies seem to be centered, an extremely narrow rim of sunlight will surround the lunar disk.

"Depending on where an onlooker is located along the shadow path, the moon will appear to cover the sun for between seven and 14 seconds. Only 0.4 percent of the sun will still be exposed around the darkened moon."

As a result, phenomena usually associated with a total eclipse may be visible, said Teske.

"Observers will have a very good chance of seeing the pearly light from inner portions of the corona; a million-degree hot gas surrounding the sun. They also may be able to see the rosy-red, flame-like prominences which often extend outward beyond the sun's edge."

According to the U-M astronomer, the partial eclipse usually has no reported effect on animal behavior. Along the central line of the shadow path, however, animals might

display the same distinctive behavior as they do in late evening. Momentarily, birds probably will fly into the trees, chickens might roost, and cows might look toward the barn.

The shadow first will touch the U.S. just west of New Orleans, after crossing Mexico and the Caribbean Sea. Passing just north of Montgomery, Ala., it then will go directly over metropolitan Atlanta, over Greenville, S.C., N.C., Petersburg, Va., and finally leave land just south of Ocean City, Md.

Near New Orleans, the track will be just six miles

wide- and will narrow to three miles wide at Petersburg, he adds.

Observers who travel to locations along the shadow course should select their site carefully and consider the weather forecast. Some initial meteorological reports indicate a 50 percent chance that clouds may interfere with eclipse observations in the southeastern United States.

Only a few astronomers may be attending the eclipse, Teske said. Such events used to provide their only opportunity to observe and study the

sun's corona, but since the early 1970's, orbiting satellites have been keeping watch on the sun. One example is the "Solar-Max" satellite which was rescued and repaired by the space shuttle crew in mid-April.

Teske added that the next partial solar eclipse will take place on May 10, 1994. Michigan residents will have a much better view because the moon's shadow will travel from California's Baja peninsula to Maine, passing directly over southeastern lower Michigan.

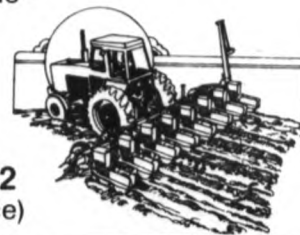

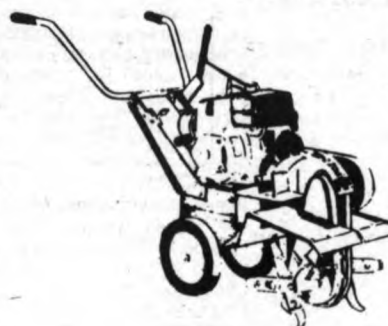

Sophisticated surgery means less trauma, faster recovery.

Gone are the days when knee surgery put patients on the sideline for the season. Now, when someone (like a Big 10 basketball player, for instance) comes to Lansing General Hospital for knee surgery, he can often be back on the court in ten days, thanks to new arthroscopic surgical methods.

By inserting a very small telescopic camera during surgery, the affected area is monitored on a screen. The surgeon then skillfully manipulates specialized instruments inserted through small punctures in the skin.

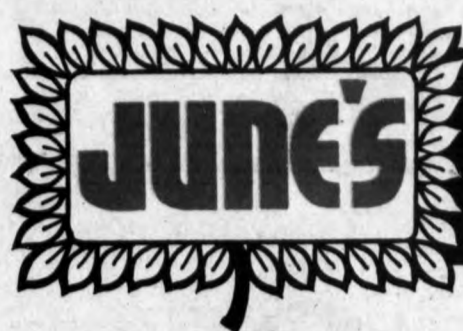
For the patients — some with ligament or cartilage injuries, some with arthritis, some with joint damage — it most often means a short stay, a fast recovery and minimal physical trauma. Small punctures replace the need for 6-inch incisions and surgical accuracy is enhanced by the large visual display.

The general trend for a shorter hospital stay is due, in large part, to more sophisticated surgical techniques such as these, and important advancements in high tech support systems.

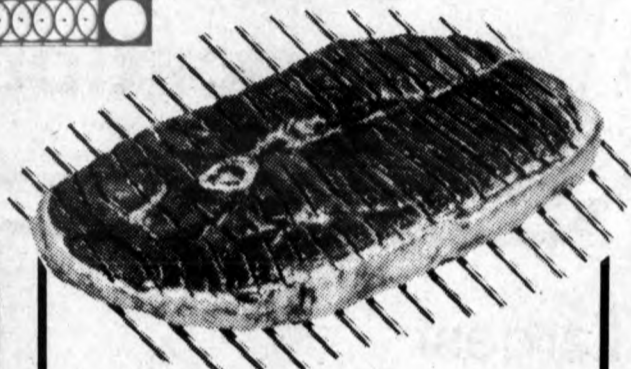

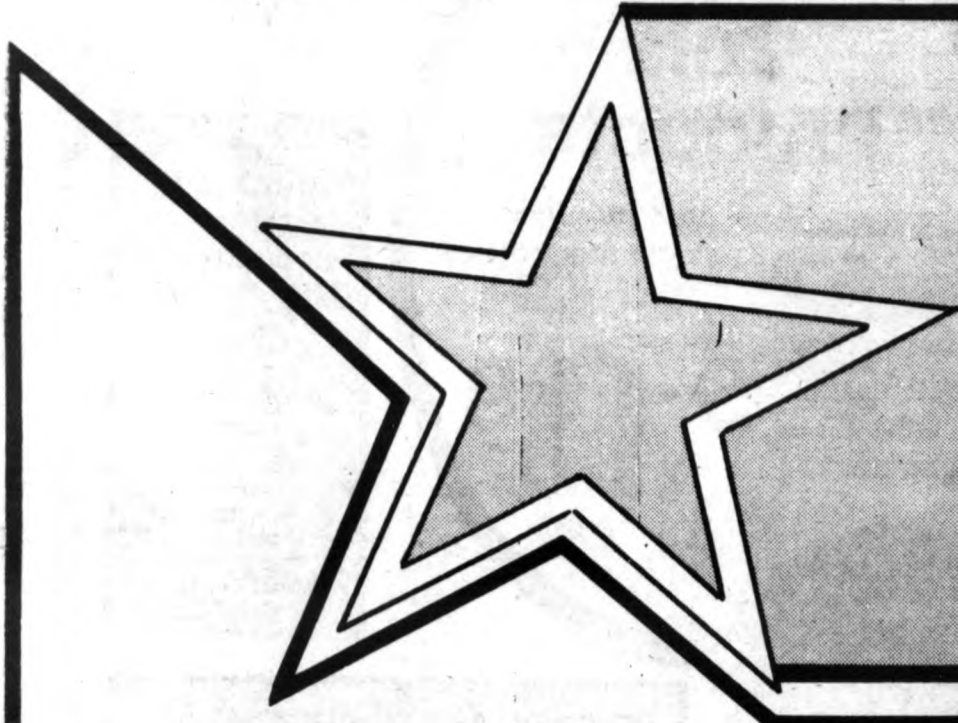

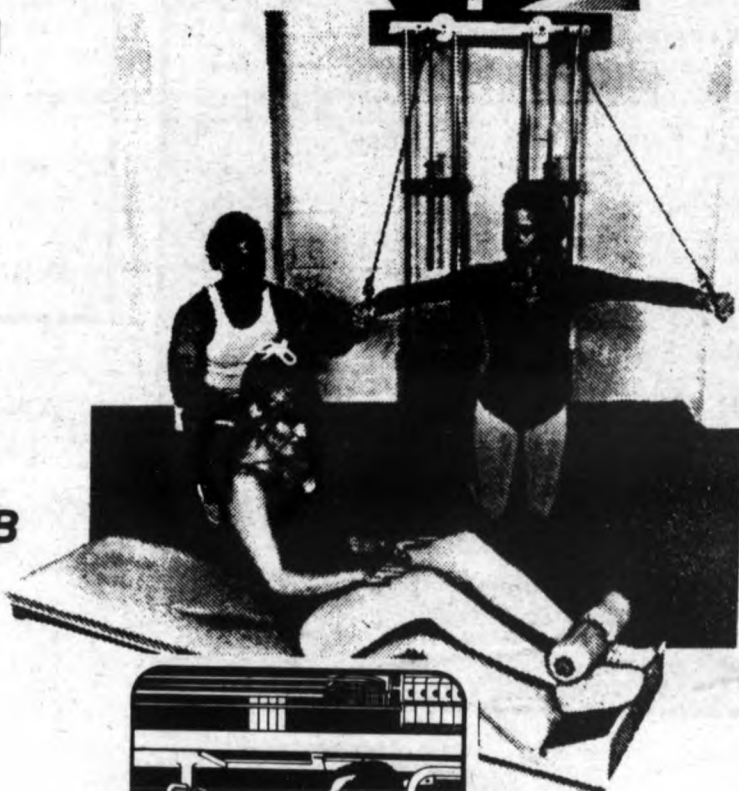
