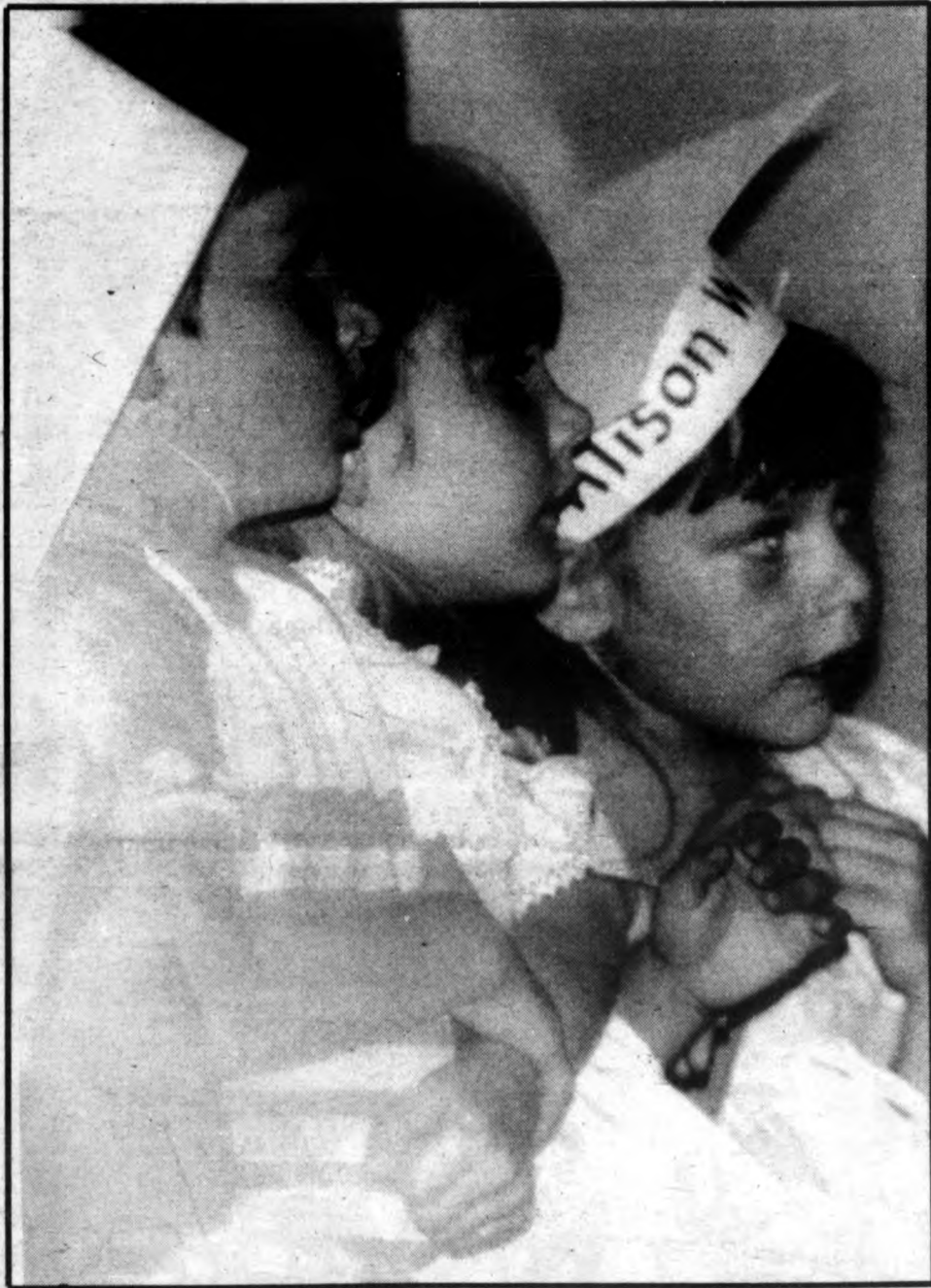

## Child Abuse Council adopts new goals

On Wednesday, approximately 30 citizens gathered together in St. Johns to lend their support to the Clinton County Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect.

The group, which actually began as a Family Growth Center in the First Congregational Church in 1978, is currently adopting a plan to actively eliminate the occurrence of child abuse in Clinton County.

"The public is now aware that child abuse is a problem," said Hugh Banning, the council facilitator for the education and public awareness of child abuse. "But now we need to tell them what to do about it. We need to make concrete recommendations for a solution, not just go around pointing to the problem."

After breaking into small groups, three

specific goals were determined as the direction for the council. As part of the coordination and advocacy of the entire child abuse program, the council recognized a need for a local coordinator to begin giving direction and coordination to the stated goals of the group.

Up until this point, the group has acted as a task force of the Lansing Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect. According to acting coordinator Gail Nutt, that connection will be maintained, but a local individual is needed in order for the council to run more efficiently in the county.

The council also adopted a plan to begin making more educational presentations to the citizens of Clinton County. As part of the education and public awareness of child abuse, the council feels that it is a priority to educate the people on the oc-

## Commission adopts fiscal year budget

The St. Johns City Commission recently adopted the 1984-85 fiscal year budget of \$4,294,933, setting a budgetary record for the city.

The general operating millage of 9.72 was renewed at the May 29th public hearing, with an additional \$2000 added for curve maintenance. The City also plans to spend \$60,000 for street resurfacing and \$15,000 for sidewalk improvements.

The debt levy went up from 3.6 mills to 4.19, with the additional .59 mills being used to pay a scheduled increase in principal payments in three of four bond issues. According to City Manager Randy Humphrey, the increase was set for actuaries when the bonds were sold for improvement projects years ago.

Other expenditures include, \$191,501 for the Garbage Landfill Fund; \$70,633 for the Library Fund; and \$5000 for the Public Safety Building.

In other action, the Commission adopted a form letter to be sent to area businesses known to sell pornographic magazines in their stores. The letter expresses a concern several individuals brought to the Commission regarding the increased visibility and accessibility of the magazines to children who may be entering the store.

Although, legally, the Commission can't enforce restricting the visibility of the magazines, they have agreed to ask the businesses to cooperate to eliminate

the concern by confining the visibility and accessibility of the material.

The Commission also accepted the recommendation of the purchase and operation of an in-house computer system.

The proposed computer will log the budgetary and accounting records, as well as the payroll and personnel, and utility records.

The total price for the IBM System 36 computer is estimated to cost \$63,813.80 over a five-year time period and would include two terminals and a printer. The cost of the first year would be \$17,075.00 for the software, installation and training, and \$9,347.76 for the hardware payments.

According to City Clerk Richard Colletta, there is \$31,400 budgeted for a computer in the City budget, leaving almost \$5,200 for contingencies such as wiring, parallel runs, office furniture and supplies. He said there should also be \$4,000 remaining in the computer budget if some of the expenditures were made before June 30.

The Commission also adopted a proposal to renovate both the interior and exterior of the water tank, costing the City an estimated \$4,000 for the entire engineering project.

Dixon Engineering, Inc., from Cadillac, was accepted as the company to service the project, offering approximately seven percent of the estimated \$55,000 for the renovation. The monies have already been scheduled in the 1984-85 budget.

## Simon to run for Clinton County treasurer

Eugene Simon has announced his candidacy for the position of County Treasurer for Clinton County in the August 1984 primary election.

Simon is currently City Treasurer for the City of St. Johns, a position held since May 1967, after initially being hired as the City Accountant in March of 1967.

Prior to the City of St. Johns position, Simon worked for Lansing Company, a division of A J Industries, as the Assistant Controller for four years, and Rehabilitation Industries for two years teaching bookkeeping to physically handicapped employees.

After graduating from Fowler High School in 1958, Simon attended Lansing Business University for the higher accounting curriculum offered at the time.

Simon is a member of the Knights of Columbus, St. Johns Exchange Club, and Accountant-Treasurer of related associations.

Simon and his wife, Lynda, reside at 1301 S. Oakland St., St. Johns, with their children, Jamie, Kari, Heidi, Chad, and Chip. They are members of St. Joseph Catholic Church.

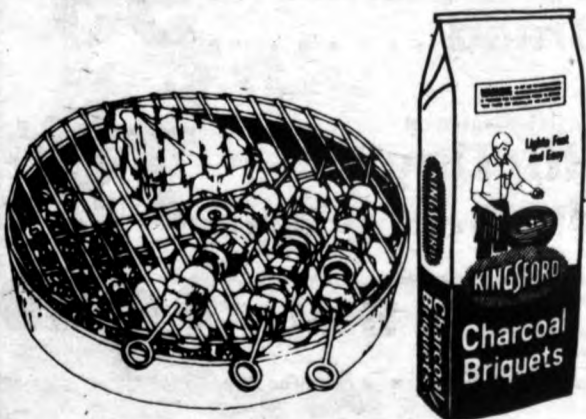

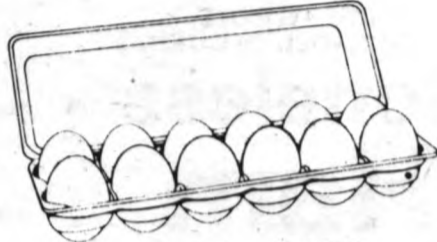

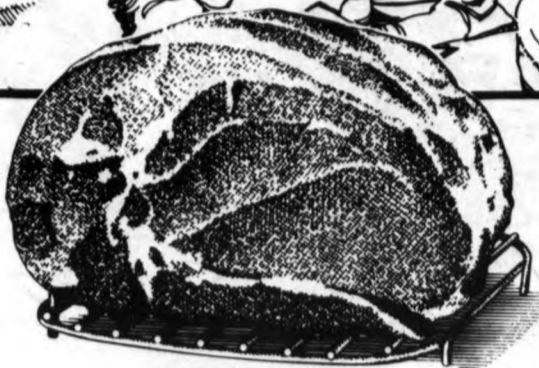

## Honor our country in upcoming election

Dear Editor,

Flag Day, June 14, marks the beginning of a 21-day Honor America celebration. Before reaching its climax on the Fourth of July, this special observance provides us with ample opportunity to honor our flag and nation as a free and independent people.

Because we are free and independent, it's important that we also take this time to reawaken the awareness that another important day looms before us this fall—Election Day, November 6. But, unfortunately, on Election Day, millions of Americans won't stand up to be counted. While it seems by news accounts and media coverage that the entire nation is caught up in the political hoopla of the nominating conventions and the elections themselves, the fact of the matter is that masses of citizens turn their backs on the election process and stay away from the polls. This display of indifference presents a challenge which must be dealt with.

According to the National Election Commission, only 54 percent of eligible voters cast their ballots in the 1980 presidential election. About 70 million eligible Americans did not vote. They chose, instead, to let someone else make their decisions for them—a choice that carries an impact on their lives for at least the following four years.

Even Michigan, with its proud tradition of citizen participation in the political-electoral process, had only 47.8 percent of its eligible voting age population turn out in the 1982 general election. This means that over three million eligible Michiganders did not invoke their privilege of voting.

The American Historic and Cultural Society has been pinpointing the span between Flag Day and Independence Day as a special 21-day period to honor America. What better way to honor our nation, than to prepare ourselves to exercise our privilege of helping to elect our local,

state and national leaders?

Eligible citizens can register to vote at the office of their city or township clerk, or at the time that a driver's license is renewed. Then, on November 6, we should exercise a most prized

possession—the opportunity to vote for the candidates of our choice.

## Corps applications accepted

Michigan Youth Corps applications are being accepted at the Clinton County Intermediate School District office, between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Applications for the Michigan Employment Security Commission program will be accepted until June 15th.

To qualify for the Corps, young people must be 18 to 21 years old, unemployed and Michigan residents. Preference in hiring will be given to those from families where the principal wage earner is unemployed. In addition, older applicants will take preference over younger candidates.

The jobs are expected to last from six to 12 weeks with members earning \$3.35 an hour for a 30 or 40-hour week. Anticipated work sites for the program will include public parks and recreations areas, highway areas, county fairs, hospitals and schools.

## Former Republican answers candidates

Several representatives will be available to discuss and demonstrate their products.

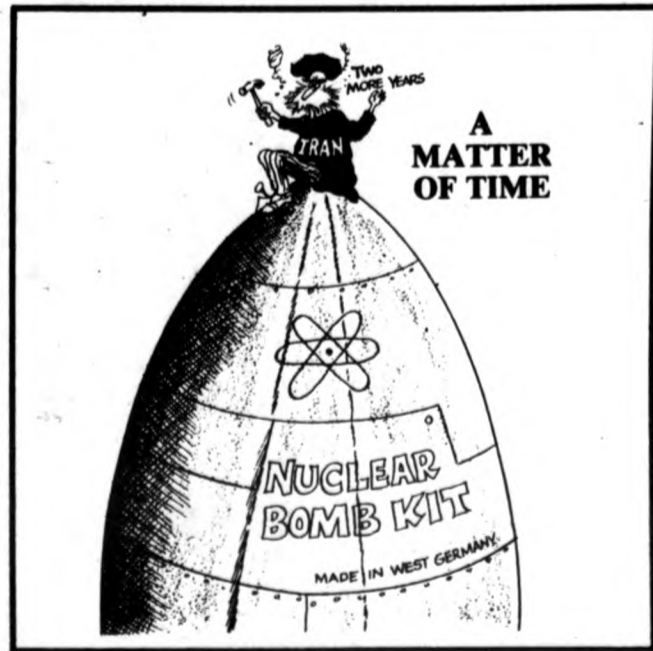

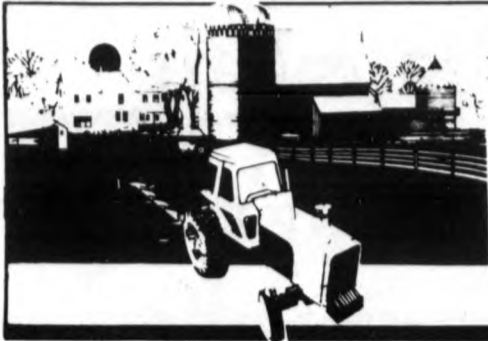

# Farm News

## Birds and animals controlled with proper garden products

Many garden and seed catalogs contain literally pages of products for controlling birds and mammals in the garden. How do you decide whether they might work well enough to justify your spending good money for them?

Glenn Dudderar, Extension wildlife specialist at Michigan State University, suggests knowing the animal you want to control and thinking logically about how the product is supposed to achieve control. This should give you some indication of its chances of success.

Animal damage control products available to homeowners fall into three general categories: repellents, traps and poisons. Dudderar offers some general rules of thumb for evaluating them.

Repellents include visual repellents (scare devices), odor repellents and taste repellents.

Visual repellents—including owls, snakes, twirling reflectors and reflectorized strips—are supposed to frighten animals so they'll stay out of the garden. They generally work for a while. After a few days or at most two or three weeks, the animals become accustomed to them and learn to ignore them.

"Be logical in thinking through such gadgets," Dudderar suggests. "A very realistically mounted black bear might keep you out of your yard briefly, but after you'd watched it for a while and seen that it didn't move, you'd quickly

figure out that it was no threat. It might take the robin a little longer to decide that the fake owl can't hurt it, but if the owl stays in the same spot day after day, the robin will learn to ignore it."

If you move the visual repellent from day to day or, better yet, switch from one gadget to another, animals won't have time to get used to any one product. Moving a rubber snake or owl or alternating one or both of them with twirlers or reflectorized strips will make all these products more effective. Keep in mind, however, that the more hungry and thirsty an animal is, the less likely it is to be repelled.

Odor repellents include such products as Hinder, which can be used on any garden plants, edibles as well as ornamentals, to repel deer and rabbits; and Deer-Away, for use on fruit trees and ornamentals. Both Deer-Away and Hinder have been consistently effective, but like all chemical repellents, they must be properly applied and reapplied as they wear off. Any use of these substances not specified on the labels is, of course, illegal.

"You'll often see naphthalene and paradichlorobenzene recommended for controlling rabbits and other mammals in the garden," Dudderar adds. "These chemicals work best in an enclosed area, and then only if you use them in large quantities. Out in the open, they have limited effec-

tiveness."

Odor repellents in burrows serve only to make an animal move and dig another burrow, Dudderar notes. So, if the burrowing is the problem, making the animal move only makes it worse. And once the chemical dissipates, some other animal may move into the abandoned burrow, potentially increasing your pest problems.

Taste repellents work by making food taste bad to animals. There are no taste repellents registered for use in vegetable gardens, and the only one that has been consistently effective for trees and ornamentals is Thiram. It is not labeled for use on vegetables.

Capsicum, the fiery substance that puts the "hot" in hot peppers, has been tested as a taste repellent, with mixed results. Sometimes it works well, sometimes partially and sometimes not at all.

"Even the best repellent will be effective only if animals have alternate food sources," Dudderar points out. "You cannot repel an animal into starvation."

Traps can be effective, and Dudderar says simple is usually better.

"Generally speaking, the larger and more elaborate the trap, the less likely it is to be effective," he says. One reason is that large, fancy traps are expensive. This means you may buy only one. In most cases, however, the more traps you have, the more opportunities the animals have to get caught. So, in general, several less expensive, simpler traps will catch more animals faster and more reliably than one large, elaborate trap.

The exception to the rule is the trap that uses the first trapped animal as a decoy to attract other animals to it. Then a large trap will be more effective because it can trap a lot of animals before you have to empty it.

A problem with many traps, Dudderar says, is that there are many ways to use them incorrectly but usually only one way to use them correctly. A good trap used inappropriately won't work, but a poorly made trap can be made to work if you can figure out how it's supposed to function and what you can do to make it do that.

Mole traps are a good example. Choke or scissors type mole traps are harder to misuse than the harpoon type, but with a little bit of practice, you can make the harpoon action traps do a deadly job. Neither trap will catch moles if you put it on an inactive tunnel, so you need to know something about the habits of moles and pick your trap site carefully.

Because over the counter chemicals available to homeowners today are not very toxic, Dudderar suggests being suspicious of any poison that the ads claim will kill moles, woodchucks or ground squirrels with one easily placed application. It might work if you applied it daily for several days to all the entrances of a burrow system, but then the cost might be excessive.

Mole poisons are not always effective, he adds, because moles only occasionally eat the treated bait or eat enough of it to get a lethal dose of the poison. Poison baits will control ground squirrels, but they must be applied to the entire burrow system daily for several days.

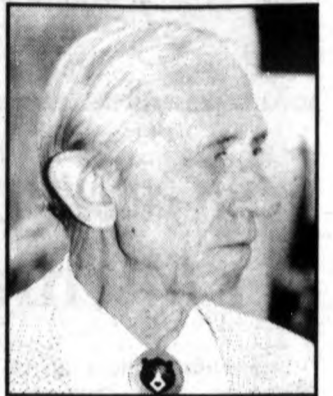

# Pig racing planned for Michigan State Fair

Twenty-five pigs came into the world the last of May already basking in what humans spend a lifetime trying to achieve—fame!

The porkers, born on a farm near Galva, Ill., will wear the silks of the world-famous Heinold Pig Racing team during 24 days of pig racing this summer at three state fairs and two major farm shows across the Midwest.

The pigs will be watched by an estimated 850,000 people during the season, primp before the television cameras and pose for newspaper photographers. A Japanese television crew has already asked permission to film the pigs during their appearance at the Iowa State Fair in Des Moines August 17-25.

The Heinold Pig Racing team will also appear at the Illinois State Fair, August 9-13; Michigan State Fair, August 29-September 3; Preble County Pork Festival at Eaton, Ohio, September 15-16; and the Farm Progress Show near Fisher, Ill., September 25-27.

The porcine speedsters will compete in 22 races a day over an 85-foot oval track in hopes of gobbling up the cookie awaiting the winner at the finish line, and tasting the heady brew of immortality by breaking a four-year-old record.

The fastest time ever recorded in pig racing in its seven-year history was 3.51 seconds in 1980 by Belly Bust on a 75-foot U-shaped track. To shatter this mark on the 85-foot track used today, a time of 3.97 seconds would be required. Fastest time ever recorded on the 85-foot oval was 4.58 seconds set by Oinkle Sam in 1982.

Pig racing was originated by Heinold Hog

Market, Inc. and Heinold Commodities, Inc., in 1977 to promote the pork industry. Since that time the pigs have drawn over 4,000,000 people.

But a racing pig's road to fame isn't that easy. Thirty

pigs will enter training the end of June—but only 25 will make the travelling team. During training and racing they eat a special ration to control weight but provide high energy level, drink medicated water, and are watched over by a

veterinarian for any suspicious sniffles. The pigs learn to come out of a starting gate and travel the 85 feet in less than 5.5 seconds—or they don't make the team!

The 25 pigs will travel

the highways in their own rolling pig palace—a 40-foot aluminum trailer complete with fans, and running water for their comfort.

At each of the shows, fans are permitted to bet on the five pigs in each

race without charge. Those who select the winning pig collect a prize at the cashier's window.

Heinold Downs—the world's only pig racing track—features photo-finish, electronic timing and an electric scoreboard.

the 4-H program with private resources.

Smoke for fumigation can be made to work in some cases. The key is using a sufficient quantity. The normally recommended rate of one cartridge per burrow is insufficient, Dudderar says. For a groundhog burrow, three to four per entrance is the minimum. For a small mole burrow system, 10 to 20 cartridges are required. A large tunnel network is nearly impossible to treat successfully. To fumigate even a small system, you must apply all the cartridges at the same time, so they can fumigate the whole system at once and the moles will have no time to seal themselves off from the chemical. It may take several people working together to do an effective job. With a per cartridge cost of 25 cents to \$1.00, this approach to mole control

can get expensive in a hurry.

"Though fumigants provide one of the best examples, all controls—chemical, mechanical and cultural—are most likely to be effective if you apply them at the proper time and rate using the correct method of application," Dudderar sums up. "Even then, external factors that you can't control may affect how successful you can be. If your problem is robins in your strawberries and the weather has been dry so there are few worms in the lawn and a poor crop of wild fruits and your strawberries are the only robin food around, you're going to have a hard time keeping the robins out of them. If your neighbor isn't protecting a backyard cherry tree, however, you may find it easy to repel your robins into the next yard—at least as long as the cherries last."

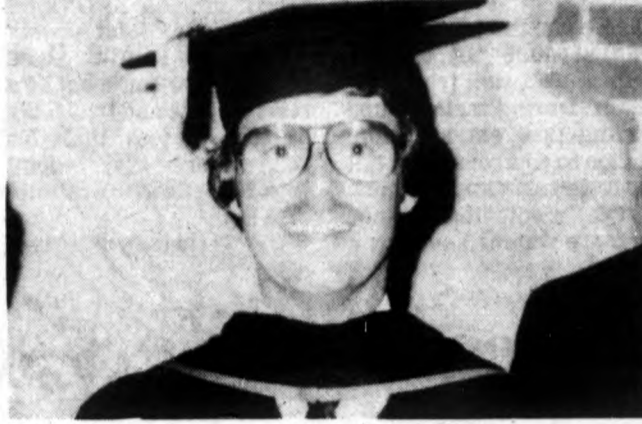

### JELLO-FRETZEL DESSERT

- Crust:
- 1 1/2 cups of crushed pretzels
  - 3 Tbs. of granulated sugar
  - 3/4 cups of oleo, melted

Combine all ingredients and pat in 9X13 inch pan. Bake 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Let cool.

### Middle Layer:

- 1 eight oz. pkg. of cream cheese
  - 1 cup of granulated sugar
  - 1 eight oz. pkg. of cool whip
- Beat together and spread over pretzel crust sealing edges.

### Top Layer:

- 2 three oz. pkg. of raspberry or strawberry jello
  - 2 cups of boiling water to dissolve jello
  - 2 small boxes of frozen raspberries or strawberries
- Mix all ingredients and pour on top of middle layer. Refrigerate for several hours. Very Good!!

## Bar owners to protect drivers

Clinton County area bar owners will learn how to prevent drunken driving when the Techniques of Alcohol Management (TAM) seminar comes to the Raodhouse Restaurant, 902 East State Street in St. Johns, on June 13th.

The eight-hour seminar, sponsored by the Michigan Licensed Beverage Association (MLBA), is the first of its kind in the nation to teach bar and restaurant employees how to monitor customer's drinking behavior. It also includes information on the clinical effects of alcohol, recognizing the signs of intoxication and preventing service to minors.

"The TAM program will become standard education for licensed establishments across the country," said Rod Brown, MLBA executive director. "To protect their customers and themselves, bar and restaurant owners need to teach their employees more than how to mix and serve drinks."

TAM seminars have been held locally around the state since January. The MLBA's goal is to train 15,000 employees this year.

TAM is funded by the MLBA and a \$50,000 federal grant made available by the Office of Highway Safety Planning.

Other groups involved in the development of the program are the Association of Chiefs of Police, the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, the Michigan Sheriffs' Association, the Michigan State Police and the Office of Substance Abuse Services.

The MLBA represents 2,800 bar and party store owners, restaurateurs and hotel and motel operators throughout the state.

Michigan licensees and their employees may register for the TAM seminar by calling 1-800-643-6722. Cost is \$15 per person. The seminar begins at 10 a.m.

## Music Camp slated for June

High School Youth Music campers take part in band, orchestra, piano classes or jazz band, and can also sign up for classes in music

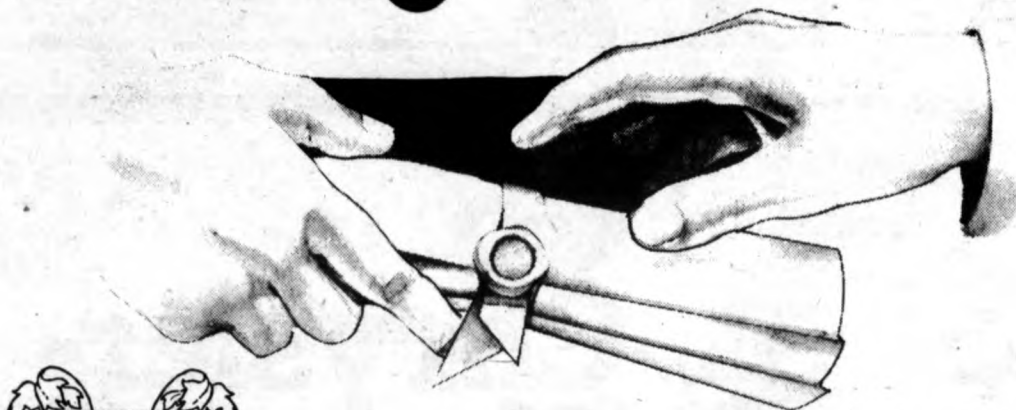

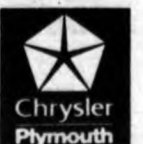

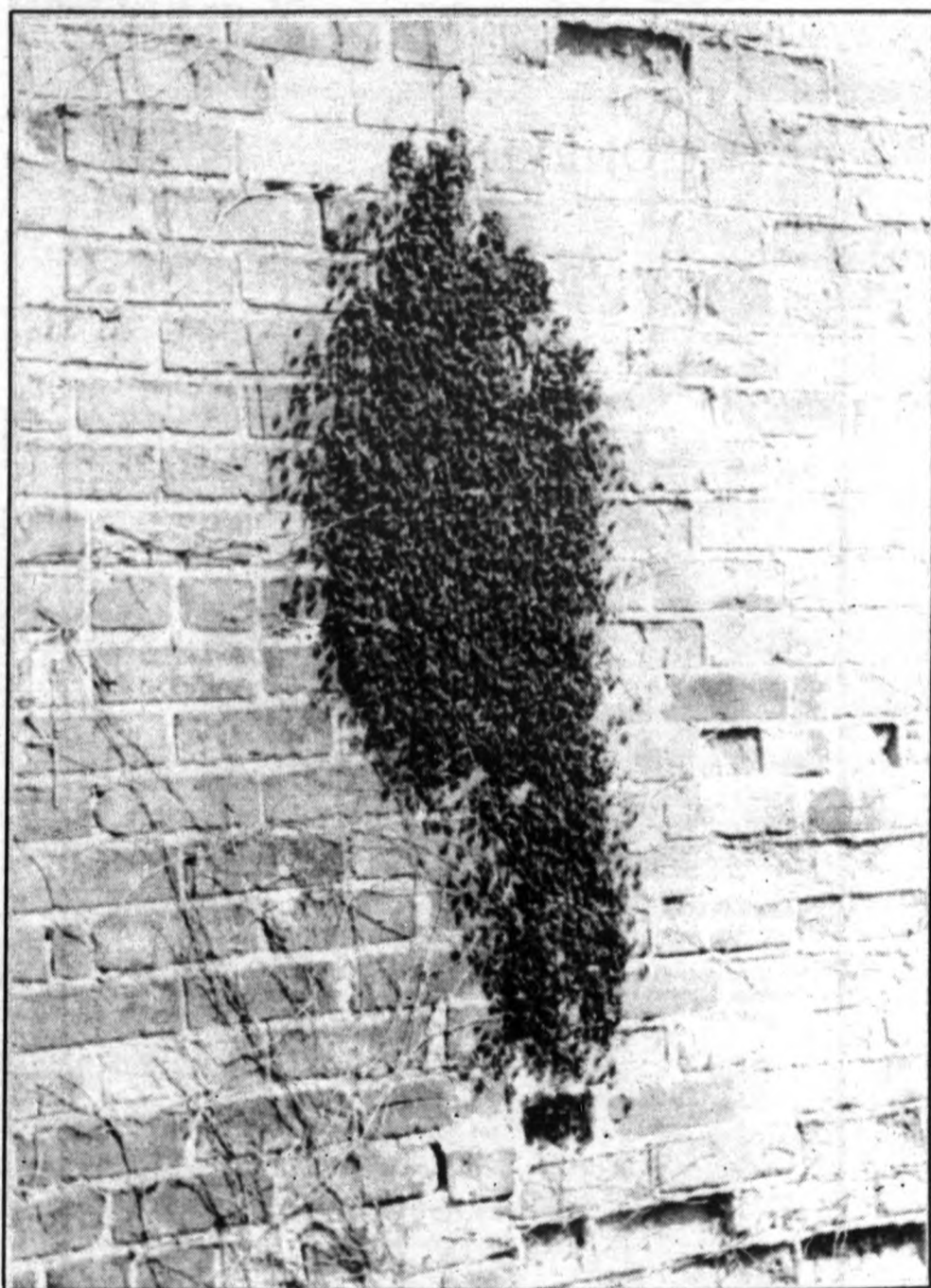
# Lambs graduate in ceremony

# Simulated disaster hits Clinton Memorial

Hospital personnel at Clinton Memorial and local emergency agencies took part in a simulated disaster drill this past week. The drills, which are conducted semi-annually, are designed to measure the effectiveness of internal procedures and coordination with area support services in the event of a real disaster would occur.

"Victims" of the mock disaster were health career students, who were "injured" in a fire-explosion in the laundry/classroom area of the hospital. Following the explosion, fire and disaster

codes were called, with physicians and hospital staff transporting and assessing the injured through "triage." Triage is a method of prioritizing patients according to injuries during a mass-casualty situation.

Following the mock disaster, a critique of the exercise was held for participants.

In addition to hospital physicians and staff at Clinton Memorial, other participants included Clinton County Health Career Students and the Clinton Area Ambulance Service. Other agencies notified of

the "disaster," and those that would be contacted in the event of a real disaster, included the St. Johns Fire Department, St. Johns City Police, Clinton County

Sheriff Department, Michigan Department of Public Health, Ingham Medical Center and the St. Johns Ministerial Association.

# Barter group adopts new system within County

Bartering, a system of exchange once used by our pioneering ancestors, has more recently taken on a new nationwide revival of interest, according to Fasqua Warstler, co-chairperson of the United Skills Effort Barter Group in St. Johns (USE).

"Barter itself is really going on in the country," she explained. "I think the shape of the economy has something to do with it."

After recognizing the potential success of a non-profit barter group in St. Johns, Warstler and Cindy Irish, both St. Johns residents, began researching the system at Michigan State University. Several months later, in December of 1982, the group began operation with a large list of skills and services to be traded without the exchange of money.

"When someone needed a service performed, all they had to do was look on file for a person who would do the service. We usually had three people signed up who could perform the task," Warstler said. "The exchange was totally up to the two parties."

The barter group uses a "credit hour" system to help insure fairness in the trades, she explained. Two credit hours are exchanged for every hour spent in doing a job. The parties work out their own barter, determine the credit value and report the results to the USE office. It is then up to the individuals to work out the details and follow-up of the trade.

The group is currently introducing a easier and more direct way of making the skills and services more available to participants. Using the same kind of idea as a telephone

book, Warstler and Irish are compiling a service and skills directory, where the service is listed along with the phone numbers of those individuals who can perform the task. As more people become involved in the group, the directory will be revised bi-monthly through the group's newsletter.

"The more people who become involved, the more skills you have," she said. "We want to contact the self-help groups in the area, too, in order to reach the community more effectively. There are some people in the community who might benefit from the services, rather than see them as luxuries."

Warstler continued that if there is a particular skill or service an individual could do or enjoys doing, the group is a good way to employ that service. At the same time, if an individual doesn't have time to do a particular service, or simply doesn't enjoy doing it, he can exchange doing it with someone who does.

"You don't have to use it a bunch of times to get a benefit from it. It's not something that takes a lot of time either; It could be

one week or one year."

Presently, there are nearly 400 skills and services available through the barter group, listed under 20 separate categories, including interior and exterior home maintenance, repairs and servicing, beauty and grooming, and handcrafts. Skills and services get as specific as riding lessons, general sewing, hair cutting and cleaning windows. Gardening and farming can also be bartered, as well as automobile mechanics.

"It's a good community

tool," Warstler said. "St. Johns is a perfect size community for something like this. It's a good way to stimulate a good feeling between citizens in the community. It promotes friendliness and neighborliness, a kind of favor for a favor."

According to Warstler, the apparent success of their group was recently proven when NBC's 20/20 television program directors contacted Warstler regarding the system. She said the directors are interested in featuring the

group in a report about the current growth in barter groups around the nation.

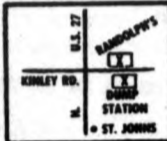
"We want to encourage new members," Warstler said. "The group will enable an individual to be a resource as well as a consumer. It's not getting

something for nothing; it's a method of getting what you need in exchange for what you have."

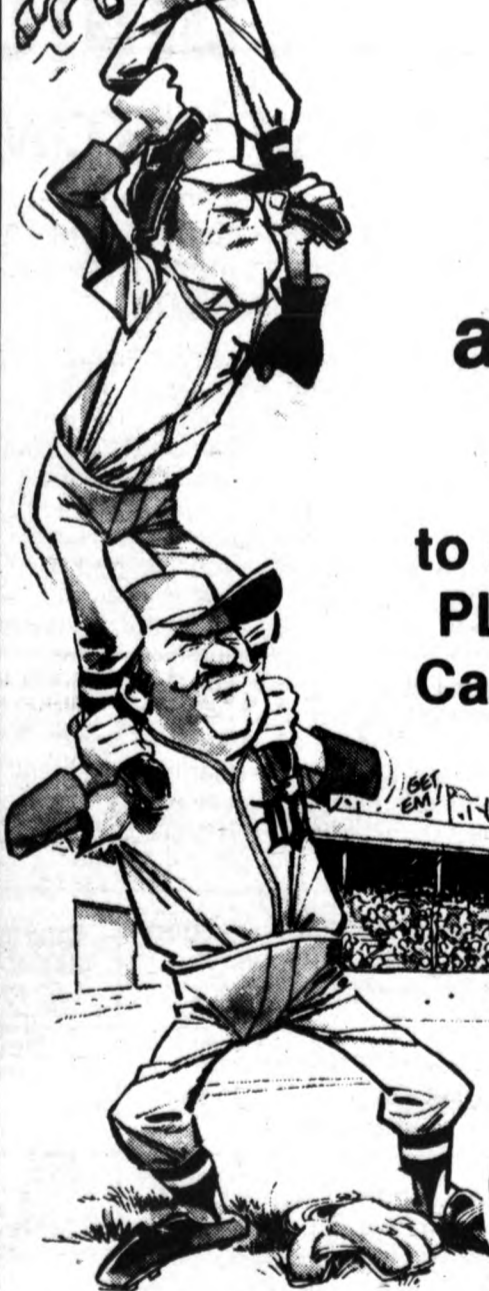

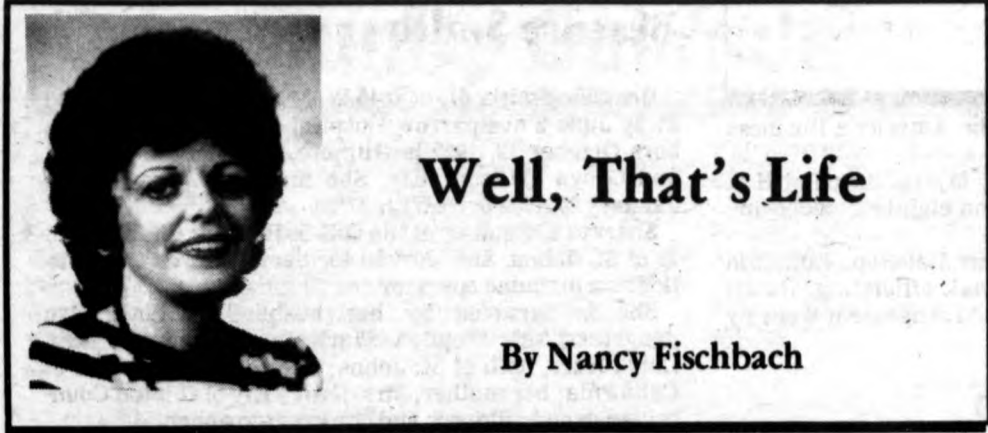

In order to maintain the level of City services as proposed in the 1984-85 fiscal year budget, the City proposes to levy an additional millage rate of .040 mills (.04 cents per 1,000 SEV) above the 11.9602 mill base tax rate or a total operating rate of 12.00 mills (\$12.00 per 1,000 SEV). This will provide an estimated 2.47% increase in revenues for operation purposes above the base tax rate of 11.9602 mills.

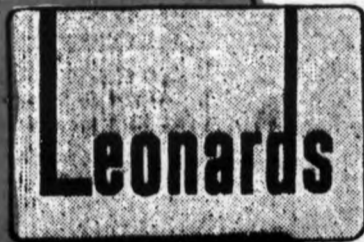

# Farm Index prices down

The index of prices received by Michigan farmers for all farm products was 140 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending May 15. This represents a 1 percent decline from the April level, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. However, farm commodity prices remained 13 percent above the 1983 level. The index of prices paid by farmers, nationwide, for commodities, and services, interest, taxes and farm wages for May was 166 percent of its 1977 base. Replacement livestock prices were lower while fuel, fertilizer, agricultural chemicals and family living items were higher. Compared with a year earlier, the index was up 3 percent.
