## Double run bus plan clarified at meeting

Despite the recent misunderstanding regarding a plan to incorporate a double bus run for St. Johns students next year, Superintendent Earl Gabriel assured school board members and the public Wednesday night that the project is only a proposal on the school's budget for next year.

According to Gabriel, the project came about after recognizing a projected \$341,000 deficit in the budget for the 1984-85 school year. He added that since it is part of the proposed budget, it has not yet been adopted by the board itself. Such action may take place at a June 27 Public Hearing in which a budget will be reviewed and later be adopted by the board.

The plan, which includes busing fringe city students to country schools, is projected to save the district approximately \$27,000 by reducing the fleet of buses from 38 to approximately 25 in operation.

According to Gordon Vandemark, pick-up and drop-off times for students will be staggered, beginning with high school pick-up at 8 a.m. and middle school and

town elementary at 8:10. Other elementary schools, including the private schools, will be picked up at 9:10.

Drop-off times is planned to occur at 2:35 p.m. for high school, and 2:45 for the middle school and town elementary. The other schools will be at 3:45 p.m.

Vandemark said that he feels such a plan, if adopted by the board in the upcoming meeting, will be beneficial to the community, despite the problems that may initially occur. After reviewing several communities that use the double run program, he said he is confident that such a program can work efficiently.

A break down of the proposed school board budget is available to public beginning June 19 at the Superintendent's office. Gabriel encourages the community to voice their opinion at the June 27 public hearing.

The board also heard a presentation from Carolyn Moore regarding the redesigning of the district's sex education courses. According to Moore, because of a recent law that has been adopted in Congress, a more comprehensive course must be offered to students.

The board plans to take further action on the issue at the July board meeting.

## Voters reject additional mill for new school year

Approximately 2,099 St. Johns residents turned out for Monday's school district election in which a five-year renewal of 18.25 mills was passed.

According to Superintendent Earl Gabriel, 1,381 residents voted to approve the 17.75 mills for operating, and the .50 mills of upkeep, repairs and maintenance, while 718 voted against the passage.

A second proposal, seeking one additional mill for one year, was defeated by 1,366 voting against the passage, and 714 voting for the approval.

The additional mill was to be proposed to alleviate a projected \$341,000 deficit for the 1984-85 school year. As a result of the defeat, \$215,000 will have to be eliminated from the current budget, eliminating

several programs in the district and reducing others, Gabriel said.

Cuts will include the elimination of the middle school librarian, elimination of the sixth grade exploratory program, the elimination of the capital outlay, the trimming the Special Education program, not purchasing new text and library books and a decrease in the school maintenance.

Incumbent Board Member Neil Barnhart was also defeated in the June 11 election, while William McCarthy and Eugene Livingston were elected to fill two, four year positions on the St. Johns School Board.

Barnhart, a school board member since 1977, gathered 1,135 votes. McCarthy, the only candidate from the city that ran, received 1,351 and Livingston, a local

## Summer swim lessons offered community children

The St. Johns Summer Swim Program is offering residents a choice of four different swim lesson periods for children ages six years old and older.

Session II begins June 25th and runs until July 6th; Session III begins July 9th to July 20th; Session IV begins July 23rd to August 3rd; and Session V begins August 6th to August 17th.

Special classes include, lifesaving, Tiny Tots for babies, Tadpoles for preschoolers, Open Lap Swim-

ming, Semi-Private Lessons and Private Lessons.

Qualifications for the lessons include non-swimmers must stand 36 inches tall at the shoulders, and preferably six years old or older. A towel and swimming suit must be brought to the pool and long hair must be tied back.

The Veteran's Memorial Pool is owned by the City of St. Johns and operated by the YMCA of Lansing. All

instruction and tests are conducted in accordance with the National YMCA Progressive Aquatic Program. Only certified instructors are used and a ratio of one instructor for every 10 children or less strived for. All swimming ability levels will be taught at the same time. Children will be tested at the first lesson and placed in classes according to their ability.

## Dog owners asked to protect mailmen

With the arrival of summer, St. Johns Postmaster David L. Yallup has asked dogowners to help protect their pets -- and their letter carriers -- from dog bites.

Yallup said that more than 7,000 of the nation's letter carriers suffered dog bite injuries last year.

"Dog bites can be disastrous," said Postmaster Yallup, "and that's why we're asking for cooperation from dog owners. We're hoping they will help to protect both their pet and their letter carrier."

Yallup suggested that dog owners keep their pets away from the mailbox and the areas used by the mail carrier for access to the property.

"If the pet is not kept behind a secure fence, then we suggest the owner restrain the dog with a leash or keep it inside during the usual hours of the carrier's delivery," he

said.

The Postal Service has the right to protect its carriers by refusing to deliver mail to a household with an unrestrained dog. In cases where a dog is allowed to run loose in the neighborhood, and it interferes with a carrier, delivery service to the entire area could be affected. The Postal Service also provides counseling to bitten carriers wishing to seek action against the dog owners.

"We constantly alert our carriers to the danger of unrestrained dogs," Yallup said, "but the real solution is for dog owners to cooperate. Owners need to realize that dog ownership carries with it several responsibilities. Preventing their dogs from biting or attacking people who must enter the property is one of them. We don't think that's too much to ask."

### Kramer named Postmaster

Alan E. Kramer, who joined the U.S. Postal Service as a sub carrier at Fowler, in 1963, was sworn in as postmaster at Fowler on June 15, 1984. He had been part-time flexible clerk at Fowler and his postal experience includes service as officer-in-charge at Muir, earlier in 1984.

The appointment was announced recently by Roy J. Murray, sectional center manager postmaster at Lansing.

Kramer succeeded Raymond J. Halfmann, who retired on May 25, 1984. In the interim, Martha R. Fox headed the Fowler office as officer-in-charge. She returned to her regular position as part-time flexible clerk at St. Johns. Postal Service regulations prevent an officer-in-charge at a major post office from serving as postmaster at that office.

Kramer takes over an office serving a population of 3,500. The office has seven employees and delivers mail over two rural delivery routes.

Before coming to the Postal Service, Kramer worked as a Parts Clerk at the Ford garage in Lansing. He is a native of Fowler and served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He spent two years overseas and was part of the D-Day invasion force in Europe. His family includes his wife, Therese, three sons and three daughters, and 11 grandchildren. He is a member of Holy Trinity Church in Fowler and has been an usher there since high school. He also serves on the Church Council. Kramer is also a member of the Fowler Conservation Club.

# A weekend of events in Clinton County



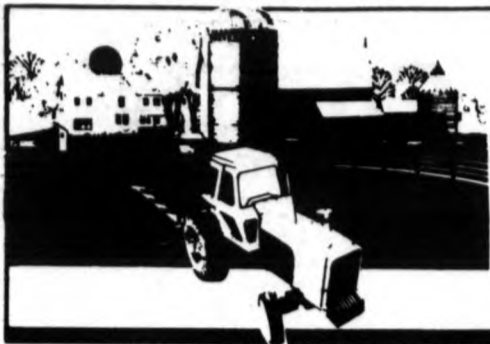

# Farm News

## Ag Expo to be held at State

More than 50,000 farmers are expected to attend Ag. Expo, July 24-26 at Michigan State University.

The annual event, primarily intended for people interested in Michigan's agricultural industry, is free and runs from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day.

Nearly 400 manufacturers and distributors of farm equipment and supplies will be exhibiting the latest in products ranging from major tillage implements to new hybrid seed.

"Ag. Expo is the only place in Michigan where farmers can inspect such a wide range of equipment and supplies," says Bill Bickert, chairperson of Ag. Expo. "Ag. Expo is large enough to offer just about anything that may be needed for the farm business, yet small enough to afford time to evaluate and make comparisons between similar kinds of products."

Market research conducted during last year's Ag. Expo shows that most of the people who attend the event are farmers and that they attend Ag. Expo primarily to evaluate and compare the products shown.

Research results show that: Eighty percent of the participants have attended Ag. Expo since it began in 1980. Their main reason is to keep up with new technology (76.7 percent). Nearly as many ranked educating themselves on the latest farming techniques as important (72.3 percent), while evaluating equipment is their third highest ranked reason (68.8 percent).

Half of the farmers surveyed operate from 250 acres to more than 1,000 acres; 6.9 percent of those farmers manage well over 1,000 acres, mostly for cash grain crops.

Well over half (56.3 percent) of the people attending Ag. Expo are full-time commercial farmers. A Third (33.3 percent) are part-time farmers. Ten percent of the Ag. Expo participants classified themselves as hobby

farmers.

Ag. Expo farmers fall into four main groups: 70.3 percent produce cash grain crops, 37.3 percent are livestock producers, 26.2 percent are dairy farmers and 19.4 percent produce horticultural crops.

## Powdery mildew on plants is controllable

Powdery mildew, a fungus disease that affects a variety of indoor and outdoor plants, is generally easy to control if you catch it early.

Sandy Perry, a plant disease diagnostician at Michigan State University, says powdery mildew disease can be caused by several common fungi that can infect landscape ornamentals, vegetables, garden flowers, house plants, fruit trees, grasses and berry bushes. Almost any plant growing where sunlight and air movement are restricted is a candidate for infection.

The telltale signs of the disease are a white to grayish, powdery or webby coating on the surfaces of leaves, stems, buds or fruits; and beneath this growth, brown to black lesions on the plant surface. If growth conditions for the fungus are unfavorable, only the lesions may be evident.

Injury to the plant can include stunting and distortion of leaves, buds, growing tips and fruits; death of invaded tissue; yellowing of leaves; premature leaf fall; and a general decline in plant growth and vigor as the fungus drains away the plants' nutrients and reduces their ability to carry on photosynthesis.

Outdoors, special struc-

tures called cleistothecia generally form during late summer to protect the fungus over the winter. In the spring, these structures rupture and the wind carries the spores to potential hosts. The spores germinate and mycelial threads penetrate the tissue. Soon chains of conidia - summer spores - form all over the mycelium. Enormous numbers of these conidia give the powdery appearance to the fungus.

Each of the millions of conidia is capable of starting a new infection, and numerous cycles of conidia may form during a summer.

Indoors - on house plants or in a greenhouse - the conidial cycle may be the only stage formed, because there is no need for the protective overwintering structures.

In the vegetable garden, the cucurbits - melons, squashes and cucumbers - are the crops most often afflicted with powdery mildew. Check seed catalogs for vegetable varieties that are resistant to powdery mildew. In the

flower garden, chrysanthemums, zinnias, roses, phlox, monarda and verbena are often affected. Landscape ornamentals frequently infected with powdery mildew include lilacs, azaleas, viburnums and English oak. Indoors, powdery mildew may occur on jade plants, African violets, begonias and grape ivy.

Outdoors, powdery mildew is most likely to develop when days are warm and nights are cool. Cool air holds less moisture than warm air, so as the air cools after sunset, moisture from the air condenses on foliage. This raises humidity to levels that favor spore germination.

The best control measure is to plant varieties resistant to powdery mildew. When resistant varieties are not available or susceptible varieties are already in place, control powdery mildew by applying fungicidal sprays as soon as the disease is apparent, Perry recommends. Applying one or two sprays is usually sufficient. She ad-

vises using a spreader-sticker with wettable powder formulations to be sure you get thorough coverage and good control of the fungus.

Be sure to read fungicide labels carefully, Perry advises. Some fungicides used for powdery mildew control may cause chemical burn to some plants. Check the package label for specific instructions and precautions.

Sanitation is an important part of mildew control, Perry adds. Removing and destroying infected plant parts in the fall eliminates the overwintering spores.

Pruning fruit trees and landscape plants to improve air circulation and sunlight penetration can also help prevent infections from becoming established.

## Plants ranked as cause of poisoning among children

According to nationwide statistics, plants rank after medicine and various household products as a cause of poisoning, especially among preschool children. But only a few plants are so dangerous that illness or death results if only a leaf or one berry is swallowed.

Most poisonous plants produce symptoms only after a relatively large amount of leaves or some other part of the plant has been eaten. However, what is a small amount for an adult may be a large amount for a young child. If a child or an adult does eat a plant you think might be poisonous, take him or her immediately to the nearest emergency room or call your local poison control center. And be sure to take along a portion of the plant, including the leaves as well as the berries or flowers.

As a general rule, you should not eat, and you should encourage your children not to eat, any plant or plant part that you are not sure is completely safe.

Features that make certain plants popular for indoor gardening make them attractive to curious youngsters. The leaves of both Philodendron and Elephant's Ear (Colocasia) are shiny, and often large and eye-catching. The foliage of Caladium and Dumbcane (Dieffenbachia) have enticing yellow or red markings, and the showy yellow Foinciana and Yellow Allamanda (Allamanda Cathartica), sometimes imported to other parts of

the country from the South, share with the other hazardous houseplants the ability to severely irritate the mouth and stomach.

Ingesting leaves from the above houseplants can be very painful because they contain oxalic acid which, when it comes in contact with saliva, forms little needle-sharp crystals and irritates the mouth and stomach.

The leaves of garden plants such as the Purple Foxglove, the Oleander, the Lile-of-the-Valley, Mountain Laurel and its relatives, pink Lambkill and Rhododendron, can affect the action of the heart.

Most plant poisons produce vomiting and diarrhea, and the most dangerous ones do so after you have eaten only relatively small amounts of them. Rapidly acting stomach poisons are found in the Delphinium, Wisteria seeds, Frivet leaves, the green parts of the Horse Chestnut, and the soft red berries of the Yew (Taxus). Slower acting poisons occur in Black Locust's seedpods, Lantana, and the Autumn Crocus.

The Castor Bean, sometimes grown in gardens because of its interesting large leaves and also used for jewelry in other countries, can make a person very ill. Even Narcissus and Jonquil bulbs and Iris rhizomes are irritating to the stomach.

Climbing Nightshade (Solanum dulcamara) with its five-pointed star-shaped drooping purple flowers

that bloom in the summer and develop oval, shiny red berries in the fall, can cause redness in the face, a fast pulse rate, dilated eyes and a dry mouth. Children often eat the berries of this common weed and become ill. The very uncommon Deadly Nightshade (Atropa belladonna), which has small tubular white flowers and dark blue berries, causes similar but more severe symptoms. "Remember, a child's environment is in the home, yard and in other areas of play," said Beth Farson, R.N., of the Children's Hospital Foison Control Center, Detroit. "Adults should know what kinds of plants are in these areas before an emergency occurs."

Ms. Farsons also noted that children, especially under one year of age, can choke on any plant leaf. All plants should be kept out of their reach. Further information can be obtained by sending a

self-addressed stamped envelope to: Children's Hospital Foison Control Center, 3901 Beaubien, Detroit, MI 48201. Persons outside the 313 area code should dial 1-800-572-1655 in case of

emergency. The Grand Rapids Foison Control Center can be contacted by dialing 1-800-632-2727.



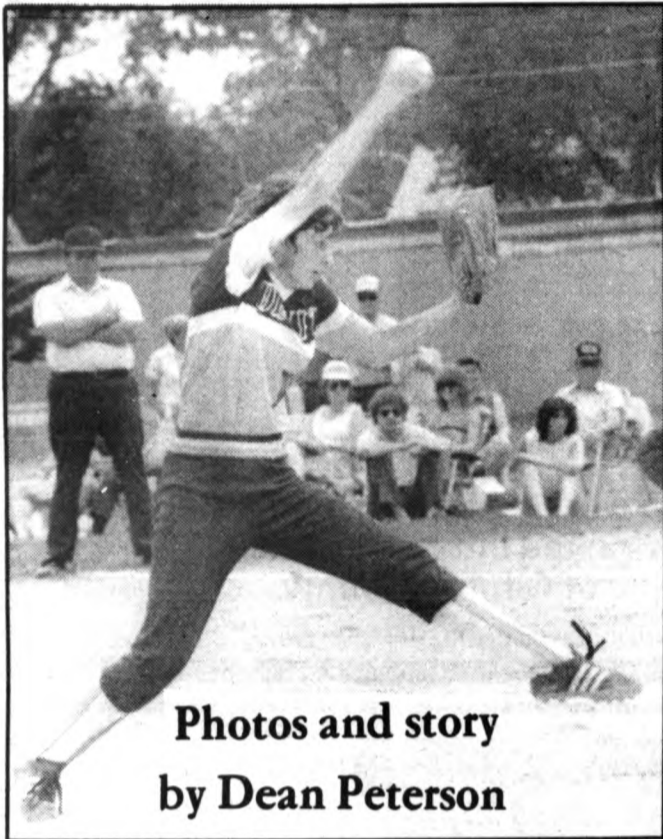

DeWitt's Shelly Renz and Michelle Hamilton each hit an RBI fielder's choice.

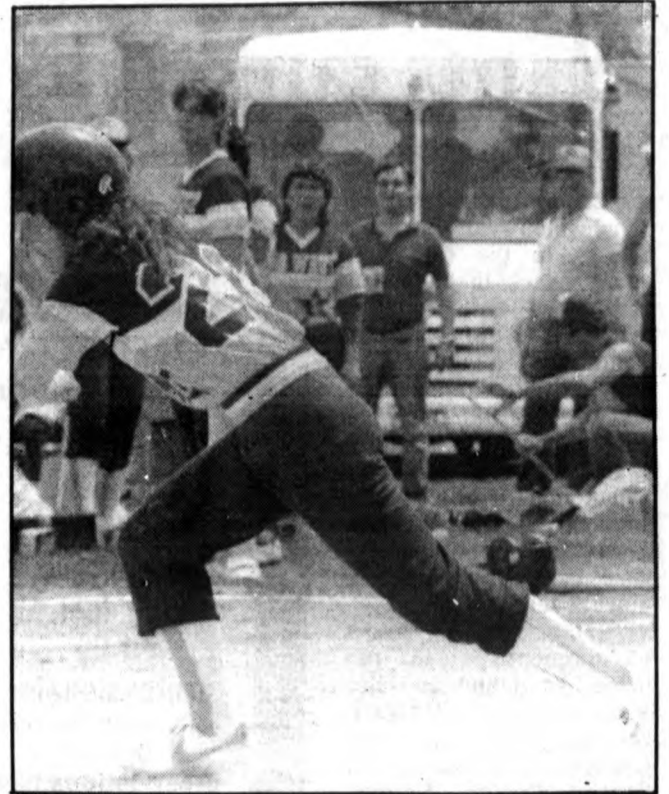

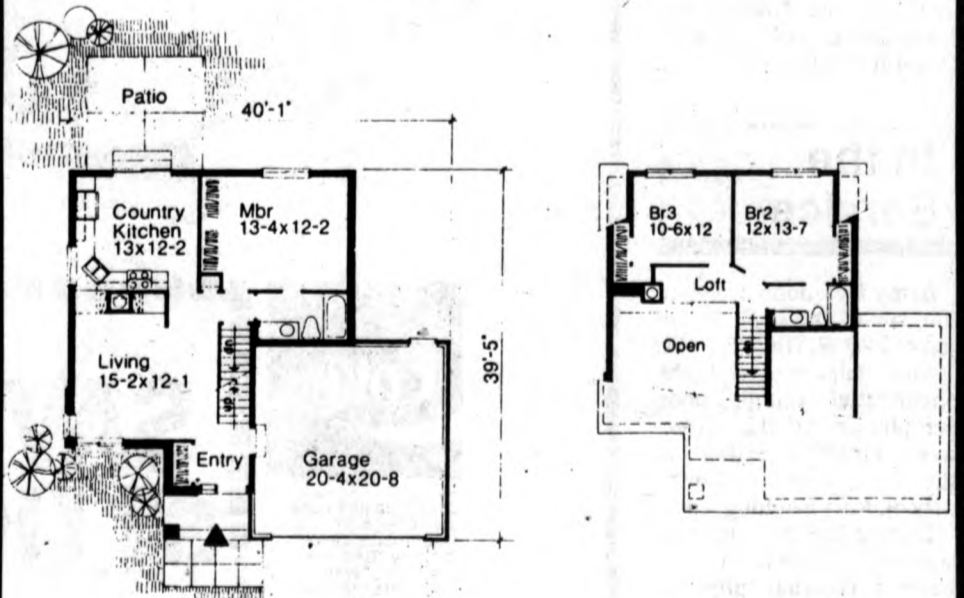

# Happy homes reported

These findings reinforce other national data reported earlier this year by the media.

Eighty trained 4-H volunteers queried nearly 400 Michigan families that were selected at random from public and private school lists last spring. Parents and children responded separately to a wide range of questions on self-esteem, self-management by the young adolescents, family relationships, skill areas and career preferences.

Nearly 80 percent of families report that the previous year was either a very good year (20 percent) or that it was good and bad, but mostly good (60 percent).

This is good news/bad news, says Joanne Keith, Extension specialist in human development, who, along with Leah Hoopfer, 4-H program leader, was a co-investigator in the research project.

"While it's gratifying to know that eight out of 10 families feel things are going well, we still need to be concerned that two out of 10 families are having problems," she said.

A majority of the parents reported being very concerned about their child's ability to assume responsibility and indicated this is an area in which they would like help. Seventy-five percent of the parent said their child needed reminders to carry out family responsibilities; 50 percent said they needed reminders to do homework.

The investigators were somewhat surprised that the career aspirations, out-of-school activities and household chores reported by the youths followed traditional gender lines.

Boys reported that they

would most of all like to be computer programmers, space engineers, lawyers and wildlife managers, while girls expressed preferences for child care, secretarial work, nursing and teaching. However, when asked what they'd like to learn, both boys and girls indicated an interest in computers.

Parents also felt that computer skills were important for their children to have, but 95 percent of the parents felt that interpersonal and leadership skills were also important.

"Schools are being pushed to teach technology," Keith says, "but people skills are traditionally learned in the home. Now families are saying they want support in this area."

Another important area is self-esteem. Slightly more than 50 percent of the youths indicated they generally felt good about themselves. In contrast, 73 percent of the youths said they felt good about their social relationships and 72 percent had positive feelings toward their parents.

"This could mean that early adolescents may need some help from their peers and their parents in feeling better about themselves," says Keith.


"The implications for youth organizations, such as 4-H are clear," he says.

"They can be a major assistance to youths by providing programming that helps them develop leadership skills, better self-esteem and interpersonal communication abilities."


The study was jointly funded by the Cooperative Extension Service and the MSU Agricultural Experiment Station.

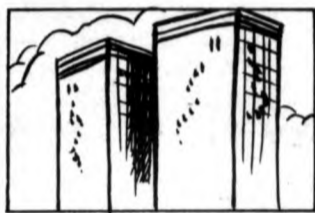

# State jobseekers push May unemployment rate up

The number of jobseekers entering Michigan's work force during May helped push the state's unemployment rate up slightly to 11.3 percent, according to S. Martin Taylor, director of the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC).

Unemployment in the state climbed by 18,000 in May to 497,000. In April, the jobless rate had been 11.0 percent with 479,000 out of work. A year earlier, May 1983, the statewide jobless rate was 14.7 percent with 643,000 unemployed.

Taylor explained that normally unemployment drops in May. This year, however, the state's labor

force increase out paced the growth in new jobs resulting in a small rise in unemployment.

"In May, we had two groups entering the labor force. We began to see some summer jobseeker start their job searches and a continuation of a five-month trend where unemployed workers have been re-entering the labor force seeking permanent jobs," Taylor explained. "In fact, since January Michigan's labor force has grown by nearly a quarter of a million workers."

Michigan's labor force grew to 4,395,000 in May, an increase of 64,000.

Total employment also rose during the month by 47,000 increasing to

3,899,000. Slight job gains in manufacturing and moderate gains in construction, retail trade and services accounted for the employment increase.

Michigan's seasonally adjusted labor force estimates also showed an increase in unemployment as the rate rose to 11.7 percent in May from 10.6 percent in April. The number of jobless last month grew by 45,000 to 511,000.

Nationally, the civilian labor force reported a drop in its seasonally adjusted unemployment rate from 7.8 percent in April to 7.5 percent in May. The nationwide jobless total fell by 329,000 to 8,514,000 last month.



## Report all changes for Social Security

People living in the St. Johns area who receive Social Security checks have an important responsibility to report any event that could effect their right to the amount of their check, Bob Stevens, Social Security Assistant District Manager in Lansing said recently.

A report can be made by telephone, mail or in person and should include the following information: name of person, what is being reported, date it happened, signature, address and the claim number under which benefits are being paid (a nine digit number followed by a letter).

Stevens said the following should be reported: change in mailing address; earning of more than the annual limit, \$6,690 for people 65 years old and older, \$5,160 for people under 65. (People getting benefits because of disability should report any work); a person goes outside the United States; and im-

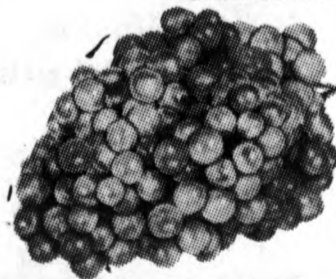

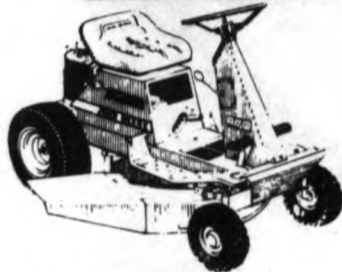
