St. Johns Board of Education

Schoolboard is making plans for new millage increase election

The St. Johns Board of Education made a tentative decision June 24 to hold a millage renewal election in September, reversing a June 17 decision to hold the election in August.

Before the June 24 meeting, board members and Superintendent Earl Gabriel, contacted several people and organizations, including the Michigan State Department of Education, seeking advice on how to proceed in attempting to get a millage renewal. These ideas were presented during the meeting.

The Board members will spend the time between now and their regular meeting, July 15, discussing options and preparing a ballot proposal for Board approval.

The approved ballot proposal will then be put into legal terms and published.

At the June 24 meeting, the Board adopted a 1985-86 operating budget. State law requires an operating budget be approved by July 1. "This adopted budget is very preliminary," said Earl Gabriel, superintendent. "It's just to get an idea of where we're going."

The budget is up 8.7 to 9.2 percent over last years budget. This takes into account increases in fixed costs including contracts that call for salary increases, fringe benefit increases and increases in heating costs, among other things.

Many possible recommendations were presented and discussed at the June 24 meeting. Gabriel said the Board should consider all the options and their possible combinations before mak-

Maple Rapids plans are set on 150th celebration

On July 11, at 6:30 p.m. a lamplighter will light an original lamp in the Maple Rapids Park, while in the background a chorus sings "The Lamplighter Song", to officially begin "Heritage Days", Maple Rapids Sesquicentennial, July 11-14.

There will be something for everyone during the celebration.

One of the longest parades ever held in Maple Rapids will begin

at 11 a.m. on July 13.

Balloons will be released each evening at 7 p.m. at the ball diamond. Square Dancing July 12 at 8 p.m. at the Park on the stage. Arts and Crafts, flea markets, old-time craft demonstrations and an antique tractor pull.

At 6 p.m. at the Park on stage will be a style show of "Yesteryear". Featuring all original costumes, some dating as far back as the mid-1800's.

On July 13 at 1 p.m. the Veterans Memorial program will begin with a cannon firing. The Air National Guard will also be flying over.

There are many other events going on each day, food booths, beach contest, musical entertainment and more.

But, at 6 p.m. on July 14, the lamplighter will return to the lamp in the park and turn it off, to mark the closing of the celebration of Maple Rapids 150th birthday.

Underwood and Leon F. Whitney, D.V.M., wrote two books, "The Coon Hunter's Handbook" and "The Raccoon". Both are available at the Maple Rapids Library. Underwood appeared with Mort Neff during the 1950s. Neff made many visits to Maple Rapids to see Underwood and his experimental raccoon ranch. Underwood's favorite, and well-known, pet was his coon "Goldy".

Underwood's wife, Madge, still resides in Maple Rapids.

State Police offers fireworks safety advice

The Michigan State Police offers some guidelines and precautions to help Fourth of July celebrants have a safe and legal holiday.

The only fireworks which may be sold legally at the retail level and used by the general public are restricted to: toy paper caps, snakes, toy smoke devices, toy trick noise makers, wire sparklers (size 1/4 or less), flitter sparklers, and both cone and cylinder fountains.

Any other fireworks are illegal for sale and use, unless proper permits are obtained from the local governing body.

Fireworks which send a projectile into the air, spin, swirl, or emit an

audible signal (excluding toy paper caps and trick noise makers) are illegal.

Local jurisdictions may have more restrictive ordinances. Contact them for more information.

Many children, and adults as well, are seriously burned or injured each year while playing with fireworks. Fire marshal officers stress that caution should be used and offer several safety precautions:

Make sure fireworks are legal for use by local ordinance and state law.

Check for manufacturer's label and instructions for use on all fireworks---illegally manufactured

fireworks rarely have either.

Carefully follow instructions for use.

Provide adult supervision and don't allow very young children to handle fireworks.

Light only one device at a time.

Ignite fireworks outdoors and away from buildings and combustible materials;

Don't attempt to alter or use fireworks in a manner not intended.

Persons having any questions concerning the safety and legality of any fireworks are advised to contact any State Police post or their local police or fire department for assistance.

Sheriff's Department Report

The Clinton County Sheriffs Deputies investigated the fatal car accident of a Bloomfield Hills man on June 21.

Robert W. Geoghegan, 21, of 4940 Inkster, was northbound on US-27 near Taft Road. It appears that he was travelling at a high rate of speed and lost control of his vehicle.

The vehicle went into the median and flipped over. Geoghegan was thrown from the vehicle and both him and the car ended up on the north bound side of the highway.

Geoghegan was pronounced dead at the scene.

He was not wearing a seat belt.

Sheriffs received a report of an attempted child pick-up incident on June 19, in Dallas Township.

A full-sized pick-up truck with three white

males was reportedly driving up and down Parks Road near Hinman and the passengers of the vehicle may have tried to pick-up a couple of children.

The vehicle was described as a dark blue, full-sized pickup with a white stripe along the bottom of the truck. The passengers were yelling and hollering and are believed to have been drunk.

The incident remains under investigation.

Mary Rainsford, Ovid, reported June 21, that someone had gotten into their garage and stole some items.

Missing is one Stihl chain saw, mostly black with orange carrying case, a Craftsman hand push seeder with a burgandy colored canister, a Craftsman circular skill saw, Craftsman socket set, one shovel and two rakes.

Total loss is estimated at \$300. The case remains under investigation.

The Elsie Post Office reported June 15, that someone had broken the front door of the post office.

Investigation showed that someone had shot the door with a BB gun.

The damaged door is solid glass. No other damage was done, repair is estimated at over \$100.

Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies handled a total of 108 complaints this week.

Some of which included: nine suspicious vehicles or activity, nine property damage accidents, 12 reports of malicious destruction, two reckless drivers, six domestics, nine larcenies, nine assists to other departments, four prowlers, five alarms, two personal injury accidents, one breaking and entering and one runaway.

There were 35 people arrested this week, 10 for drunk driving. The current jail count is at 43.

Mills increase ballot in works

ing a ballot proposal and developing a campaign strategy.

At the June 10 millage election 2,809 voters turned out. The renewal of 3½ mills passed 61-39 percent. The one mill increase proposal failed 39-61 percent and the 4½ mills increase proposal failed 26-74 percent.

The current millage rate that the St. Johns Schools are operating on is 29.75, lowest in the three counties of Ingham, Eaton and Clinton.

The main idea for the ballot proposal seems to be a request for 3½ mills for five years to combat inflation and salary increases. Gabriel pointed out that schools are a "people business" and that the issue should be providing the kids with the best possible resources, and that means high-quality teachers.

The reasoning behind holding a September 10 election is that it allows more time for voter registration and a complete voting campaign. It will also meet the September 15 deadline in terms of setting tax rates.

The possible campaign strategy discussed during the meeting was to survey the voters who participated in the last election and find out how and why they voted as they did; canvass presently registered voters for support; have the consequences of a millage increase failure identified, adopted and put in place, if the request failed.

Some of the POSSIBLE consequences discussed included:

- stopping all co-curricular activities as of October 1, 1985.
- reduce bus set-aside to zero and limit bus runs to main roads.
- close two schools as of January 18, 1986.
- place a hold on all new curriculum considerations.
- return the part-time high school principal to full-time teacher-reduce half teacher.
- increase class size wherever permissible.
- maintain fund equity at no less than \$100,000.
- operate classes until the funds run out.

Gabriel stressed that these are only a few of the possible consequences and that the board should study the implications of each, and any others they might think of, carefully and to decide which ones, in any combination, would be necessary to implement, if the millage increase request failed.

It was noted that the academic class sign-ups were increasing because less kids are electing to attend physical and vocational education classes and this was actually costing the school more money for a variety of reasons including the fact that more teachers will be needed to teach additional class sections.

The next Board is tentatively set for July 15 at Rodney B. Wilson library at 8 p.m., the public is welcome to attend.

The move to hire two new St. Johns High School teachers was approved of at the Board of Education meeting June 24.

Gregg Mowan will be the new director of bands at the high school, taking over for Walt Cole who is retiring this year.

A new math teacher and head football coach, Bart Kjolhede, was hired because of the increasing number of students signing up for math sections and to replace a teacher and coach who resigned.

Mowan, 26, has a long list of professional accomplishments and organizational honors.

He graduated with honors from Owosso High School in 1977 and in the top five percent of music students from Michigan State University with a Bachelor of Music Degree in 1982.

Mowan is leaving the position of director of bands at Ainsworth Senior High School, Flint, to come to St. Johns. His responsibilities there at the high school level were wind ensemble, concert band, jazz ensemble, girls chorus, marching band, pep band and beginning band at Carman Park Elementary.

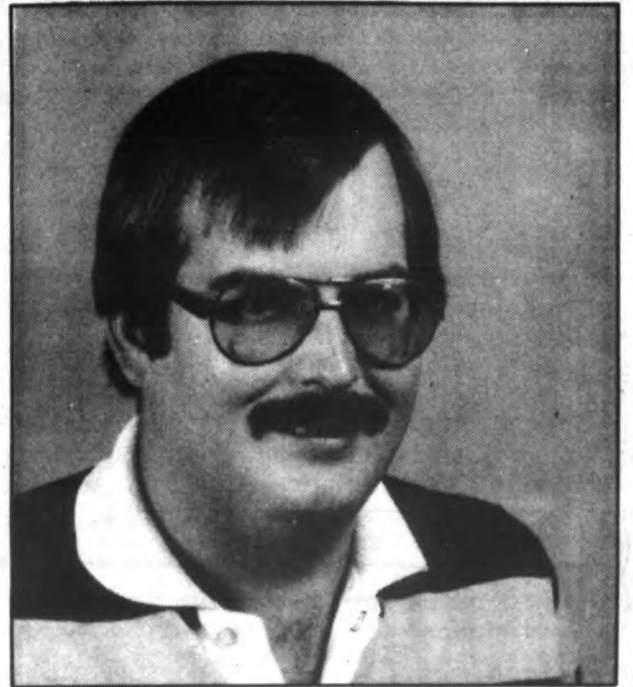
The Ainsworth marching band, wind ensemble and jazz ensemble took many top ratings and honors while under his direction.

Some of Mowan's personal accomplishments include: being selected for the 20-piece jazz All-American College Band from over 15,000 applicants from around the United States in 1979, they performed at the California Disneyland; member of Pi Kappa Lambda, National College Music Society, 1981; Kappa Kappa Psi, Honorary Music Fraternity, 1978; member of American Youth Symphony National Board of Advisors and solo tubist for Henry Mancini, 1980.

These are only a few of Mowan's accomplishments.

Mowan is moving to St. Johns with his wife, Carol, who is also a music teacher. He is looking forward to working in St. Johns and is gearing-up for band camp which will be July 28.

Kjolhede, 33, graduated from Mt. Pleasant High

For the four years he was at Wellsville his football win-loss record stands at 27-9, making state play-offs each year.

Kjolhede was a member of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association from 1975-1981; and a member of the Kansas State High School Football Coaches Association since 1981.

His personal interests include the Lions Club International and Special Olympics, among others.

He has a wife, Patricia, who is also a teacher, and a two-year old son, Nicolas. They are currently looking for a place to rent here in St. Johns.

Kjolhede is looking forward to working with the St. Johns Redwings and has called a meeting for July 8, 7 p.m. at the High School.

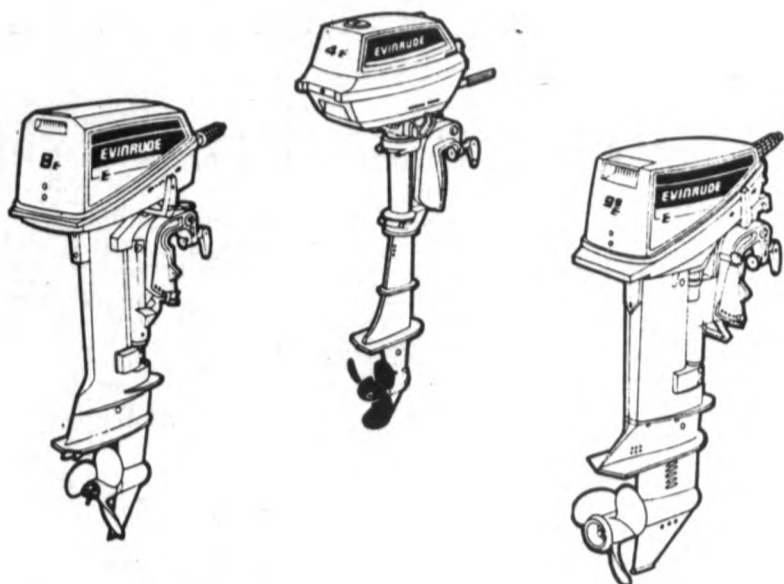

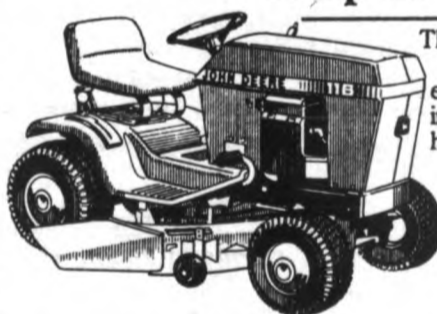

No grace period for seatbelt law

Enforcement of the new Safety Belt Law will begin July 1, and there will be no grace period according to Gerald L. Hough, department director, Michigan State Police.

Hough stressed that the law requires all drivers and front seat passengers to wear a properly adjusted safety belts unless they or the vehicle are exempt.

Exemptions include: vehicles manufactured before 1965; buses; mopeds; motorcycles; physical/medical exemptions; commercial vehicles/U.S. Postal Service; rural postal carriers; school bus passengers; and vehicles not required to have safety belts under federal law.

Those who are physically exempt must have in their possession written verification

from a physician that they are unable to wear a safety belt for physical or medical reasons.

Non-residents are not exempt—they must comply with Michigan law when in Michigan. If safety belts have been removed from a vehicle required to have them, they must be reinstalled.

Motorists will not be stopped for seat belt violations, but will be cited if they are stopped for other reasons and are not wearing seat belts.

Until January 1, 1986, the violation carries a penalty of civil fine up to \$10 plus court costs and judgement fees. After that period, the fine will increase to \$25. No points will appear on the person's driving record.

Drivers are responsible for themselves and front seat passengers under the age of 16. Those over 16 will receive a citation if they do not comply with the law.

Agricultural News

Dust from grain has long been controlled in grain elevators to reduce health risks to workers, but dust from a multitude of sources in animal facilities is often overlooked.

"Studies indicate that people suffer a significant risk of respiratory disorders from inhaling dust, and the amount of dust in the air in an animal feeding facility is often high enough to produce problems," says Howard Person, Michigan State Univer-

sity Extension agricultural engineer.

When a facility is thoroughly cleaned of dust and animals are brought into the area, dust builds to relatively high levels within three weeks.

Periodically cleaning the animal facility lowers dust levels 5 to 10 times, making it a more comfortable environment in which to work, Person says.

To help reduce dust levels, it may be a good idea to clean and

vacuum the facility occasionally.

Adding fat to animal diets is an alternative way to lower grain dust levels in growing-finishing facilities. Person says adding a 2½ percent fat supplement to feed reduces grain dust 25 percent. A five percent fat feed supplement lowers dust levels 50 percent.

Along with trying to identify improved management steps to reduce dust, researchers at MSU are now working on an electrostatic precipitator that will remove dust particles from the air through the ventilation system, Person says. This mechanism will be less labor intensive than cleaning the facility or mixing fat into feed, and therefore less expensive in the long run.

'Young astronauts' into programs second year

"Science is fun! Space is exciting!" so said two recent participants in a two day Space program conducted by Community Resource Volunteers (CRV) for 4-H Career Exploration Days.

Monday July 8 starts a two week Day Camp program by CRV for area youth who have an interest in stars, space, rockets, shuttle travel and thoughts about UFOs.

Activities will be based at the Abrams Planetarium at MSU with technical astronomical support from eight one hour sessions with the Abrams staff and plenty of hands on activities, experiences and field trips including the Michigan Space Center by the CRV Staff.

The program is designed for children ages 8 to 14 and will provide a beginner and advanced activity track depending on the age and interest of the youth.

Activity tracks will include building rockets, UFOs and for those who really want a challenge designing pictures on computers that will be converted into slides for their own space show that they will present at Abrams on the July 18.

It will operate from 9:45 to 3:45. In Clinton County transportation will be included starting from St. Johns with the possibility of coordinating rides on the way.

"Sure, the program is fun," said Richards, "But, participants use math, reading, creative

writing skills. They will find out how important those skills are if they have dreams about space and we have found that them do."

Young Astronauts perhaps, future engineer maybe, this summer day camp program is designed for children who may become some of the key people in the high tech society and will be those who are challenged when they are young.

The co-directors of this years program are Les Schwartz from RBW Middle School and Bill Richards from CRV.

Congressman Bill Schuette

Congressman Bill Schuette Monday told the House's taxwriting panel that tax shelters depressing farm income should be closed, gasohol production should be encouraged, and favorable tax treatment for dairy farmers should be maintained.

"I ask you to produce good tax policy that is also good farm policy," he told the House Ways and Means Committee.

One of only five legislators to testify before the Ways and Means Committee, Congressman Schuette said, "Farmers should be free to make decisions based on what is best for their farm operations, not what is best under the tax law."

Arguing for the

preservation of the existing gasohol program, Congressman Schuette pointed out that the six-cent a gallon excise tax on gasohol produces \$750 million in increased farm income, costs the taxpayers nothing, saves the government hundreds of millions of dollars every year, and reduces our dependence on foreign oil.

"Can we in good conscience end a program that puts money in farmers' pockets, saves taxpayers' dollars, and helps to make America energy independent? I say, emphatically, no."

Congressman Schuette also expressed concern about the effect of the new tax reform plan on the dairy industry. The new pro-

positional capitalizes the costs of raising livestock and eliminates capital gains treatment for livestock profits.

"This will create a great deal of uncertainty for farmers as to how large their tax bills will be, since their incomes fluctuate from year to year," Congressman Schuette said. "Dairy cattle are long-term holdings. It seems to me that taxing their sale as capital gains is the proper approach."

Speaking directly to the House Ways and Means Committee, Congressman Schuette said, "I ask you to remember farmers who are in such bad shape now got there largely because of government policies.

More than 400 commercial farm exhibits and 16 acres of field demonstrations highlight Ag. Expo '85, the largest farm equipment show of its type in Michigan.

The event, July 23-25 at Michigan State University, is expected to attract more than 50,000 people. A variety of tours and educational exhibits will round out the program.

Visitors will be able to see just about every type of equipment needed for efficient farm production.

"I'd be very surprised if a farmer went away from Expo without at least one new idea that would benefit the farm," says Bill Bickert, MSU Extension agricultural engineer and Ag. Expo chairper-

son. "I don't know of another place in the state where farmers can see as varied and as broad a collection of the latest in farm equipment and technology as they can at Ag. Expo."

The 35 acres of machinery displays will represent almost every mechanized area in a typical farm operation. Examples include irrigation systems; field machinery; dairy equipment and supplies; livestock handling equipment; grain harvesting, handling and storage systems; crop sprayers; farm buildings; and seed and fertilizer supplies and services.

A wide variety of university educational exhibits are being planned for Ag. Expo. Most of these will answer

questions on crop insect, weed and disease control, soil testing and erosion prevention, computerized farm record keeping, livestock health management and other farm-related topics.

Daily field demonstrations, from 12:30 to 4 p.m., will focus on land improvement techniques, including computerized land surveying systems, tile and subirrigation installation, and pond building.

Other activities include selected tours of MSU teaching and research units related to farming. Free buses will carry visitors from the Ag. Expo site to the field demonstrations and tours.

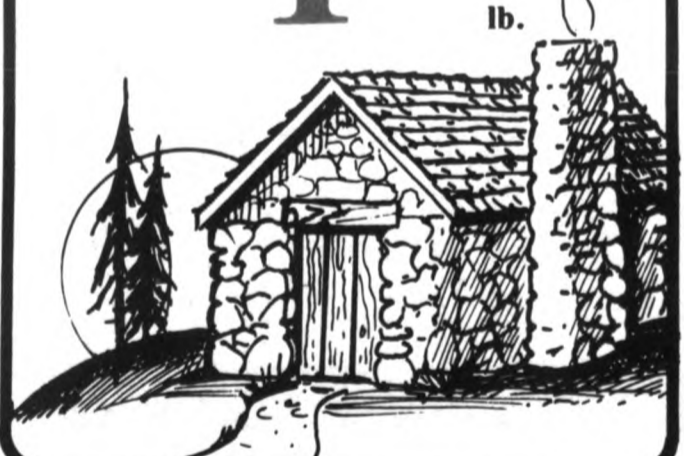

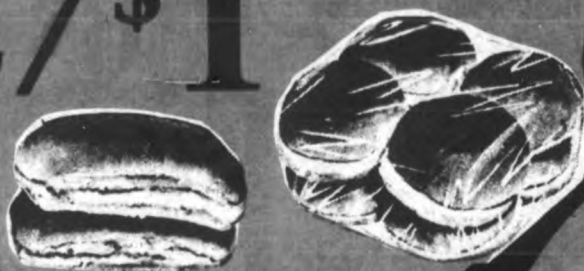

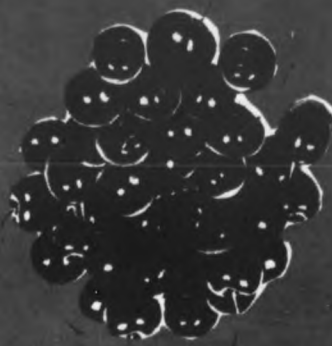

"No More Secrets For Me" by Oralee Wachter. Illustrated by Jane Aaron. Published by Little, Brown & Co., Boston, 1983. \$4.95.

□ This book helps children understand that taking care of themselves is very important. Sometimes it happens, someone touches a child and the child doesn't like it. It isn't fun and it doesn't feel good. It does not make the child feel close or comfortable the way it does when someone they love puts an arm around them.

Through the four stories inside *No More Secrets For Me*, children will learn how to express their feelings and be able to defend themselves against sexual abuse.

In the first story, we learn that Darryl likes his babysitter Terrie, but doesn't like her to walk in on him while he is dressing or in the bathtub. He confides this to his mother and she explains a few solutions. One of them is to talk to Terrie and to explain his need for privacy and to respect it. In Darryl's situation this solution works very well and the two can still be good friends.

The important message in all four stories is for children to confide to their parents, someone they can trust, their fears and mixed-up feelings when someone is bothering them. The book received very good reviews and many say it is what is needed for parent-child treatment of a difficult subject.

The community is filled with garage sales during the summer months and why not? They are a great way to clean out and reorganize your home as well as earn some money.

But, for many people garage sales can be more of a hindrance than a help. However, by following a few guidelines and little pre-planning, your garage sale can be successful,

and you might even find it enjoyable.

Don't try to go it alone. If you know other neighbors planning a garage sale try to combine your efforts, this will give you a greater assortment of items to sell, the more the better.

People take more time to look when there's a wide variety.

Organize your items. Get a notebook and take a tour through the house. Make up your

mind as to what exactly you want to sell. This is especially helpful in setting prices later.

Assemble all the sale items together in the garage, basement, or some other convenient location, and look them over carefully. Set a price on each item. Keep in mind that what you have a sell is used and, therefore, should be prices on the low side.

Place a price tag or label on every article, making sure it's firmly attached. Put signs on clothing and keep shoes together in pairs.

You may want to combine "go togethers" into a neat package for a single price. List all the prices next to the items in your notebook.

If your garage sale is a combined effort, be sure each item is properly identified. Using different color labels help avoid confusion especially when it comes to dividing the profits.

Advertise! It pays to

advertise. Unless you tell people about it, you're not likely to have many people show up at your sale. Put an ad in the neighborhood paper. Phone friends who might be interested. Announce it at club meetings. Local supermarkets will often let you put up a sign in their window or on their bulletin board.

Be ready before your first customer arrives. Have plenty of change on hand. Try to have one person at the cash box at all times and someone else out in the selling area to help customers. After each sale, check off the item in your notebook. Toward the end of the day, if it appears items will be left over, you can always reduce prices.

A small cash profit is better than winding up with a lot of things you'll end up giving away. If you change prices, be sure to make the change in your notebook.

Above all, have fun and enjoy the profits!

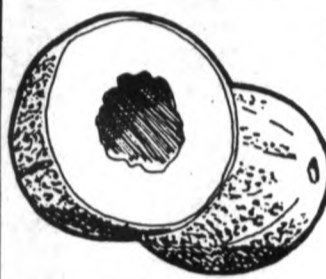

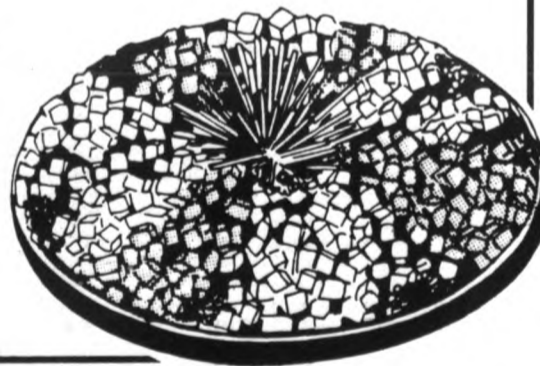

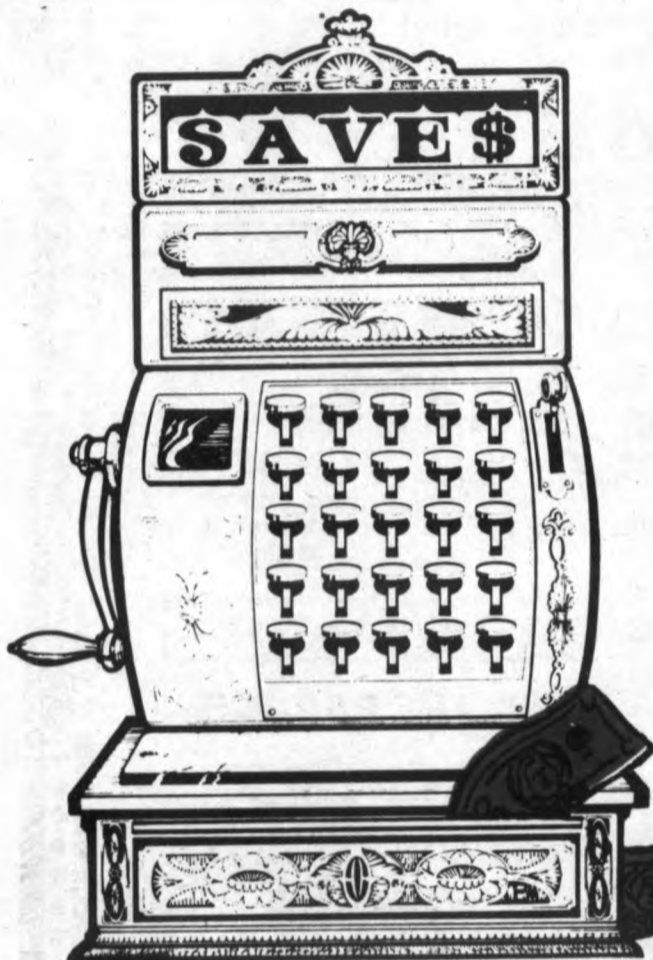
