## Gramlich earns state award

William R. Gramlich, Wastewater Treatment Plant superintendent for the City of St. Johns, has been presented the prestigious Donald M. Pierce Award by the Michigan Water Pollution Control Association (MWPCA) at their annual conference in June.

The Pierce Award is presented each year to a worthy recipient who has demonstrated the ability to do an outstanding job by producing a good effluent from a clean orderly municipal wastewater treatment plant, while interacting with his employees and other operators for the betterment of the profession.

Gramlich has been employed in the wastewater treatment field since 1971. He is a member of both the MWPCA and the American Water Works Association. He has held a Class B wastewater operators certification since 1975.

Gramlich began work with the City of St. Johns in 1978. As Wastewater Treatment Plant Superintendent, he plans and directs all aspects of the operation and maintenance of the treatment plant, pump and lift stations.

The Michigan Water Pollution Control Association is a non-profit organization working for the preservation and enhancement of Michigan's Water Resources.

It is a Member Association of the Water Pollution Control Federation, and International Organization that has a diversified membership composed of wastewater treatment plant operators, engineering consultants, equipment and chemical sales representatives, and others whose interest lies in water pollution control.

## Bridge falls on three people

Three people using blow torches to cut away metal strippings from an abandoned bridge were injured July 1 after they severed a support pole and the 70-foot span collapsed.

Ronald Brown and his son, Daniel, 13, of DeWitt, suffered arm and wrist fractures when they and Marvin Lovegrove of Maple Rapids fell 15 feet into Hayworth Creek northwest of St. Johns at about 3 p.m.

Brown and his son were treated at Clinton Memorial Hospital and released, a hospital spokesperson said. Lovegrove was not injured.

A Clinton County sheriff's deputy said the aged bridge in Essex Township had been abandoned for several years and fallen into disrepair.

The men reportedly had a permit signed by Brian Dolman-Jersey, Clinton County Road Engineer, to take parts of the bridge down.

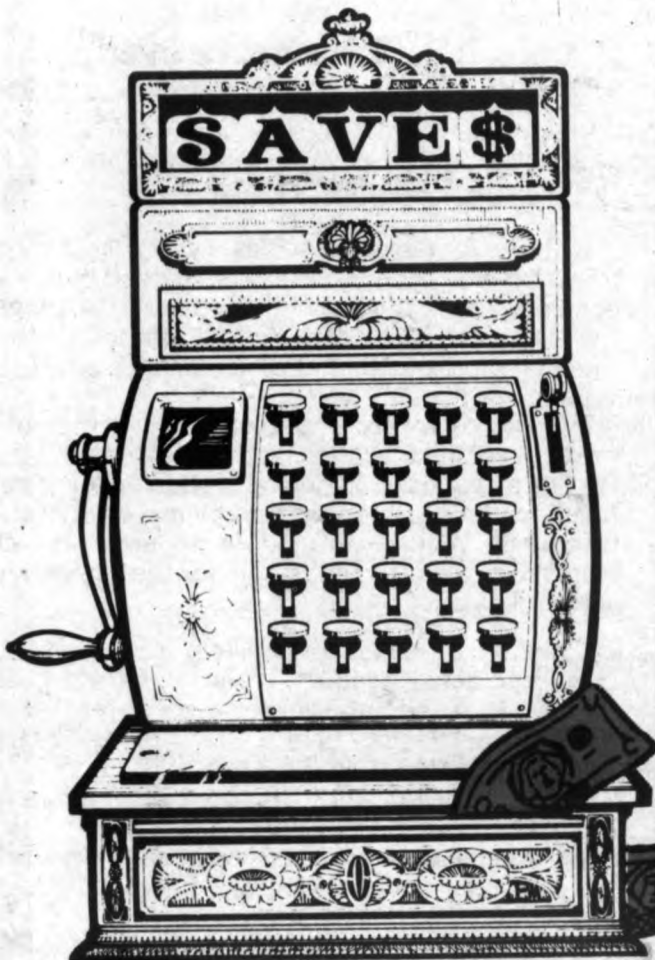

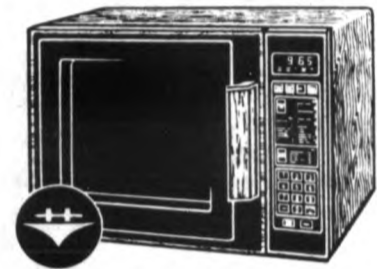

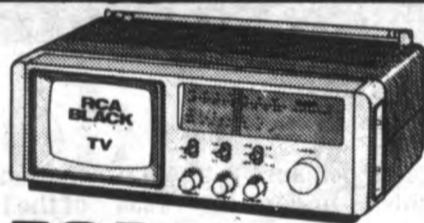

## John Deere announces new finance plan reducing charges

John Deere has announced a new program to waive finance charges for up to 10 months on all new farm tractors--utility, row-crop and 4-wheel drive--purchased through the John Deere finance plan.

Finance charges will be waived until April 1, 1986.

Waiver of finance charges reduces the interest paid during the term of a retail financing contract. Additionally, the program permits

a faster buildup of the buyer's equity in the tractors since all payments during the waiver of finance charges period apply entirely to principal.

The company has also announced a discount

schedule for buyers of new John Deere tractors who choose not to use the waiver of finance charges. Discounts range as high as \$1,025 on utility tractors, \$2,575 on row-crop tractors and \$4,450 on 4-wheel drive tractors.

## Looking back on mint farming in 1936

**Editors note:** This article is reprinted, with permission, exactly as it appeared in the Lansing State Journal in October 18, 1936. The article was written by Frank S. Pritchard and submitted to the Clinton County News by Ginger Crosby.

Less than a score of miles north of the city on US-27, is one of the most valuable carpets in the world--a carpet of velvety green--composed of millions of plants of peppermint and spearmint.

This "magic carpet" which furnishes oil to flavor chewing gum and candies, is the basis of menthol, used the world over when a cold in the head makes folks miserable. The oils also are used to conceal the disagreeable taste in scores of bitter medicines, and are sometimes used when young Johnny eats too much, develops "tummyache" and demands peppermint tea.

In Clinton County alone there are 7,300 acres of this fragrant herb, and the area, known as the St. Johns area, extends into Shiawassee, Livingston, Ingham and other nearby counties.

The carpet is a magic carpet, for the land where the mint now grows formerly produced crops of bullrushes, swamp grass, and rattlesnakes. Mint land is low land, black muck soil found where once rivers and lakes were found, and where the old river and lake beds formed rich deposits of soil.

This crop of mint in Clinton County alone, is worth this year about

\$240,000 based on the present price of \$1.80 a pound for oil, and the government estimate of a production for the state of 23 pounds of oil per acre.

The whole state this year will produce about 386,000 pounds, or nearly a million dollars worth. The industry is so important that there is even a town, Mentha, near Kalamazoo, named after the plant that produces the oil.

These figures, buried in a mass of government statistics, mean but little to the average resident of the state, but when he reads a little farther he finds that this is more than half of the oil that will be produced in the entire country. If he delves deeper for in-

formation he will find about 40 percent of the total production of mint is in the area of which St. Johns is approximately the geographical center.

There are two kinds of mint, peppermint and spearmint, grown in Michigan. Most of it is peppermint, since peppermint oil has far more uses than spearmint oil. Peppermint oil is used for making menthol, for flavoring and in medicine. Spearmint oil is used chiefly for flavoring chewing gum.

In many ways mint growing is an unusual business. Unlike most farm crops, the oil can be kept from year to year, so that in case of a poor crop, the manufacturers of candy and chewing gum may have enough oil on hand to last them a long time. Farmers growing mint usually have but this one crop at least in any quantity, and any one-crop agricultural enterprise is considered a risky business, for unfavorable weather and ravages of insect pests may make the yield practically worthless.

This year, for example, the estimated yield

of oil per acre is about a third under the 1935 figure. In 1934 the yield in Michigan, both from old ad new mint, averaged 36 pounds per acre. In 1935, the crop dropped to 35 pounds per acre, while this year, due largely to drought condition, it is expected to be about 23 pounds per acre. The price at present is about \$2 a pound. It has been as high as \$35 a pound, according to a Michigan State College bulletin published in 1926.

What sort of surroundings are necessary to make mint a profitable crop? It must have muck soil, properly drained. Secondly, it must have a growing season of from 100 to 120 days. In the third place, it must have proper cultivation. Then there must be a demand for the oil. Due to the purposes for which it is used, this demand is limited.

Mint is generally planted by hand. While other methods have been used by larger growers in the state, the common method is to have men drop roots in shallow furrows, covering them with dirt as

they move ahead. Some of the larger farms have mechanical devices for planting.

Mint must be carefully cultivated to keep weeds down, especially those weeds which also produce oil, as those oils which perfume or color the peppermint oil are objectionable and result in a lower price. In the new crop, hoeing and weeding is necessary in addition to cultivation by horse-drawn machinery.

Peppermint oil is found mostly on the under side of the leaf. When the leaf is ready for harvesting, if held to the sun, the oil can be seen glistening on the under side. This condition generally comes when the plants are in full bloom, usually during the month of August. The leaves are said to lose their oil when the blossoms begin to die.

While some growers use a horse-drawn machine for cutting the crop, many of them still cling to the scythe. After it is cut, it is forked into small piles until it wilts. Then it is hauled to a still.

Oil is taken from the mint hay by a simple

distillation process. The mint is packed into receptacles through which steam is forced. This steam picks up the oil and carries it to a condenser, where, as it cools, the water and oil separate. Some of the oil is refined by a Kalamazoo firm, which buys most of the peppermint oil in the state. Some of it, more carefully prepared than the rest, is not refined if it passes certain standards.

Leaves and vines left after the oil is extracted are sometimes returned to the soil as fertilizer and sometimes fed to livestock. This "hay" is said to be palatable and if weather conditions are right for curing, makes good feed for cattle.

A new crop of mint produces from 25 to 50 pounds of oil to the acre. The yield for old mint is from a half to three-fourths of that. Government figures, based on an estimate, indicate that the yield per acre this year will average, for new and old mint, 23 pounds of oil per acre.

The so-called St.

Johns area, which includes parts of Clinton, Shiawassee, Gratiot, Livingston, and Ingham counties, was not the first locality in the state to start the culture of peppermint. That honor goes to the St. Joseph, Cass, Berrien, Van Buren, Allegan, and Kalamazoo county areas.

J.E. Crosby, living south of St. Johns, is the pioneer of the mint industry in Clinton County. Mr. Crosby started 22 years ago. Since that time his sons, C.E. Crosby and Lawrence Crosby, have entered the business.

According to C.E. Crosby, the market for peppermint oil is so limited that the increase in the number of growers has taken all but a very nominal profit from the business.

"After we made a successful start, everybody thought he could get rich quickly by growing mint and the acreage soared," Mr. Crosby says.

"When the price of peppermint oil is reasonable, there is no effort to produce synthetic oil, but when the price gets beyond

reason then some synthetic oil is used. There is no longer any profit in growing wintergreen, because synthetic oils have been produced which are much cheaper and can be used instead of the pure oil taken from the herb."

"Mint growing is dangerous, however, in the way that any one-crop enterprise is dangerous, and most of those growing mint make this the only crop from which they expect a financial return of any size."

The cost of equipment is also high, and the cost of labor also plays an important part in the business.

"The United States exports some oil, but in the past some of it has been sent abroad, repackaged, and then shipped back to this country to supply the demand of those who believe that a foreign product is superior to a domestic product. Japanese oil has failed to find favor in this country."

According to the Michigan State College bulletin, English mint has practically supplanted American mint with growers in this country. English mint,

the bulletin states, was introduced into this country from Mitchem, England, and grows higher than the domestic variety, ordinarily attaining a height of 18 to 24 inches.

Greatest enemies of growing mint are cutworms, grasshoppers, wireworms, and the mint flea beetles. The bulletin advises control of cutworms by fall plowing and the use of poison bait, and wireworms by the use of crop rotation, alternating buckwheat and clover, crops distasteful to the bee wireworms, with the mint.

Nationwide production of mint this year will be less than half of the 1935 production, according to a United States department of agriculture bulletin, published September 17. The 1935 production was 1,363,000 pounds of oil. The 1936 crop is expected to produce about 630,000 pounds of oil. The acreage this year is given by the crop reporting service as 28,900 or 32 percent smaller than last year's acreage of 42,350.

The peppermint center of the country has shifted in the last few years from Indiana

to Michigan. In 1934 Michigan has 15,000 acres to 14,000 for Indiana, in 1935 this state had 23,000 acres to 17,000 for Indiana, but this year had only 16,800 acres. The 1936 In-

diana acreage dropped to 9,500, however.

In 1934 Oregon had the highest acreage in the country, outside of Indiana and Michigan, with 1,600 acres under cultivation. Oregon held

to the same acreage in 1935, but in 1936, according to the United States estimate, dropped to 1,500. Of the other states producing mint, Ohio has 600 acres, and Washington 500.

## Congressman Bill Schuette

The Schuette Amendment, offered by Congressman Bill Schuette to boost farmers' incomes, was unanimously approved by the Subcommittee on Wheat, Soybeans and Feed Grains this week.

"My amendment should help increase farmers' incomes by making commodity exports more profitable," said Congressman Schuette.

The measure adds corn and other feed grains to the wheat marketing certificate program, under which producers could, at the discretion of the secretary of agriculture, be given export certificates for the percentage of their crop estimated for export.

Under one option, the certificates would have a cash value and the USDA would redeem

them from exporters, thus providing farmers with a possible source of income and allowing exporters to sell abroad at more competitive prices.

The Schuette Amendment became part of the farm bill reported to the full Agriculture Committee which is designed to give wheat and feed grain farmers a program combining strengthened voluntary acreage controls, with income supports, and to continue a flexible soybean support program. In addition, farmers would be offered a chance to vote in periodic referenda on whether to use the new program or to shift to an alternative program using tight mandatory production controls and higher price supports.

The subcommittee adopted a non-recourse

loan for corn, soybeans, wheat and other feed grains established at 75 to 85 percent of a five-year moving average price (dropping the high and low) with a five percent limit in the annual drop of the loan.

The 1986 loan rates are: corn \$2.42; soybeans \$4.77; wheat \$3.14. Higher target price on 50 percent of a farmer's individual crop acreage base were approved. 1986 target prices are: corn \$3.50; wheat \$5. Soybeans will have no target price.

The agriculture secretary must require at least a 20 percent reduction program if the carry-over for wheat exceeds 800 million bushels and at least a 10 percent acreage reduction program for feed grains if the carry-over exceeds 1.1 billion

There are, however, people and situations that can ruin your child's summer fun. Sheriff Haneckow of Clinton County wants to help you protect your child from those potential dangers.

"You can help your children to have a safe and fun summer by teaching them how to protect themselves from potential dangers," Sheriff Haneckow said.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department offers these "play it safe" rules it hopes will contribute to a fun, safe summer for your children:

Never play in empty buildings or deserted areas that you don't know about or have never been to before.

Stick to the same safe route when walking to and from the playground, store or friends's house.

Do not play in such public areas as restrooms or elevators.

Keep doors and windows locked when you are home alone, and never open the door for

someone you don't know.

Never hitchhike. NEVER.

Never walk or play alone outside at night.

Don't accept rides, candy, gifts, money or medicine from a stranger.

If a stranger calls you to his/her car, asks for directions or simply bothers you, turn and

run in the opposite direction.

Do not tell anyone who calls your house that you are home alone; instead, tell them Mom or Dad cannot come to the phone and will call back.

Do not give family vacation plans or information about your home to a stranger. Don't tell them where a

spare key is hidden, or that your garage door is left unlocked when you come home from school, etc.

Avoid strangers who hang around restrooms or playgrounds and want to play with you and your friends.

If a stranger does follow you on foot or tries to grab you, run away, scream and make

a lot of noise; run to the nearest person you can find, a police officer, a person working in the yard, or a neighborhood house or store.

"While it is important for your child to know how to spot and avoid danger, it is also important that your child knows how to act quickly and wisely when confronted with troubles,"

## Ag Expo set for July 25-27

It's time again for Michigan's largest agricultural equipment show...Ag Expo 85, July 23-25 at Michigan State University. The show is open to the public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

A major portion of Ag Expo will focus on land improvement practices for more economical and efficient crop production.

Approximately 20 acres of drainage and sub irrigation tile will be installed, ponds for pollution control and wildlife habitats will be constructed, and water and soil erosion control terraces will be built.

See the latest development in field contour mapping. This demonstration includes a laser surveying system which is mounted on a vehicle that is driven across the site to be tiled and provides data needed to plan land improvement.

This system provides more information on the characteristics of the field and its drainage contour than conventional methods and can facilitate tiling a field in a matter of hours rather than days.

Other land improvement demonstrations will include: tile drain installation using eight types of tilling machines using trenching and plow concepts; and sub-

irrigation systems to facilitate field drainage and irrigation.

In addition to viewing the land improvement demonstrations, Ag Expo visitors can visit the over 400 commercial exhibits on the Expo site or take several tours.

These tours, available from 10 a.m. through 3:30 p.m. each day, will include the following:

--MSU Poultry Science Teaching and Research Center. This will be primarily a consumer education stop that will enable participants to see a modern egg production unit and learn more about poultry production.

--Integrated Pest Management Weed Garden. This will be an exhibition of 60 major crop weed species and 10 lawn weed species found in Michigan.

--Field Crop Research. A walking tour of research plots will demonstrate the validity of high-yield crop production. Several tillage practices and herbicide trials will be compared and discussed.

Ag Expo is sponsored by the MSU Department of Agricultural Engineering with the support and assistance of the MSU Agricultural Experiment Station and the MSU Cooperative Extension Service.

## Hypertension patients sought for MSU clinical trials now

Patients with high blood pressure (hypertension) are being sought to participate in clinical trials of new antihypertensive agents at Michigan State University's College of Human Medicine.

Patients who participate in the program will be provided, at no cost, a complete medical evaluation, including a history, physical examination, EKG, chest X-ray and various laboratory test.

Medication will also be provided at no cost. The studies, lasting from one to two years, will require brief visits every

one to two weeks initially.

The clinical trials are conducted by the nephrology division of the Department of Medicine. Investigators are studying new drugs and also some drugs currently on the market. Because of the investigational nature of these studies, women must be postmenopausal, or have had either a tubal ligation or hysterectomy.

"Long term reduction of high blood pressure is relatively easy to accomplish and clearly reduces incidence of

hypertension complications such as stroke, heart failure and kidney failure," says Gilbert H. Mayor, M.D., project investigator and chief of nephrology at MSU.

Dr. Major says at least 35 million Americans have hypertension, one of the few chronic diseases

medical science can treat effectively. Only 20 percent of these individuals are currently under proper medical management.

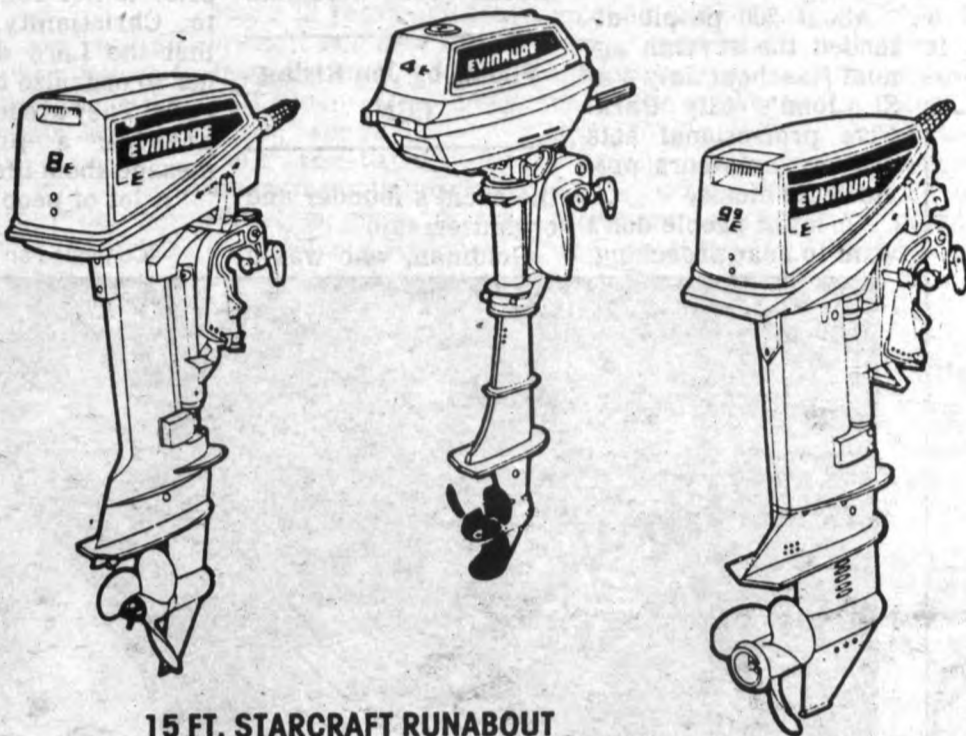

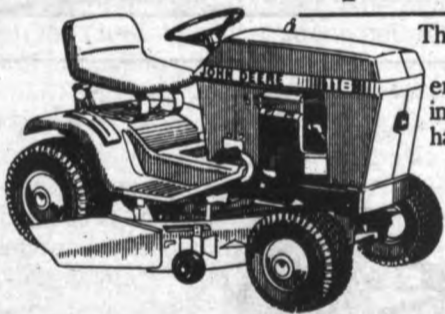

## Commerce department rules that hog and pork exports are subsidized

The U.S. Commerce Department has ruled that live hog and pork product exports from Canada are subsidized.

To offset those subsidies, the department is temporarily imposing duties on the imports of such products.

"Michigan pork producers are halfway to their goal of obtaining relief from subsidized exports," said Bob Craig, manager of the Commodity Activities and Research Department of Michigan Farm Bureau.

Craig said the Department ruling is important in relation to legislatively trying to resolve the subsidy problem.

"Farm Bureau opposes special legislation to deal with trade problems because that is generally protectionist and contrary to our international obligations," he said.

Craig added that Farm Bureau advocated resolving the

problem through negotiations and the Commerce Department.

"Farm Bureau supports using existing regulatory procedure to obtain relief from unfair trade practices," he said, "and this case demonstrates that this approach is sound."

U.S. importers must now post bonds of 5.5 Canadian cents (about 3.2 cents U.S.) per pound for live hogs.

The next step is for the International Trade Commission to determine if U.S. pork producers are being injured by the Canadian subsidies.

If the ITC rules in favor of U.S. producer, the countervailing duties will become permanent. The ITC has 45 days to make a ruling.

In the meantime, customs officials will hold in escrow the penalties paid by importers.

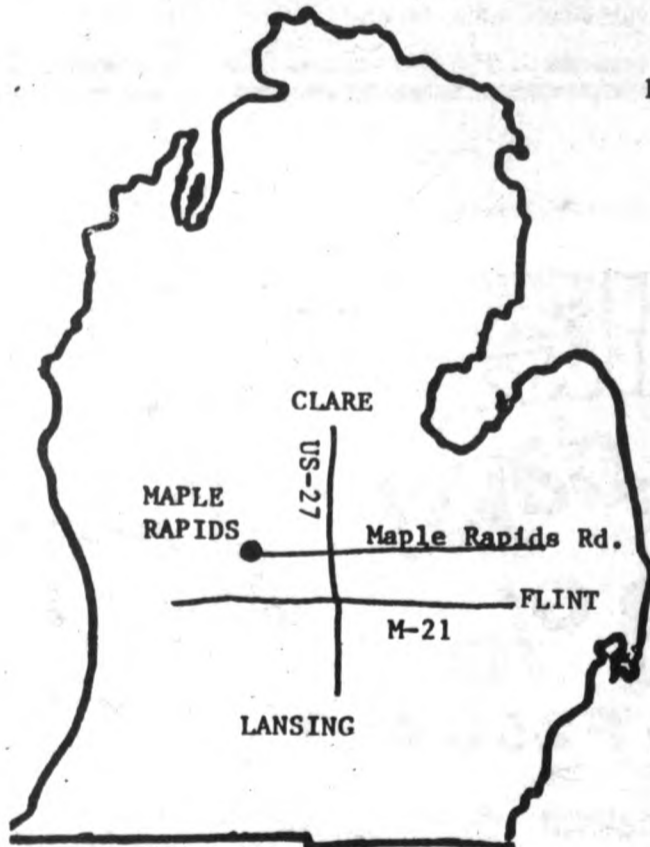

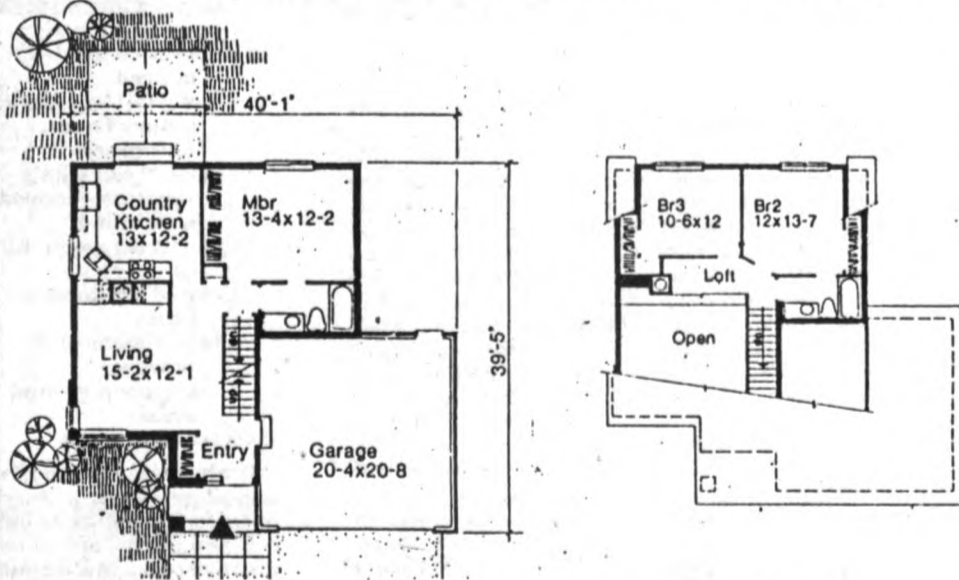

## Reduce Cholesterol Levels In Your Diet

Simple changes in eating habits can lower most American's cholesterol consumption by as much as 15 to 20 percent.

Here are some suggestions to reduce the amount of cholesterol in your diet:

- Use reduced fat forms of dairy products—skim milk, low-fat cottage cheese and yogurt, ice milk, sherbet, low-fat cheese.

- Reduce red meat consumption and trim-away any visible fat before cooking. Remember 4 ounces is equal to one serving.

- Enjoy poultry (skin removed), fish and veal.

- Serve a meatless main dish once a week.

- Increase consumption of complex carbohydrates like those found in grains, breads, potatoes and other vegetables, and legumes.

- Limit egg yolk consumption to no more than three per week, including those used in cooking.

- Avoid high fat salad dressings, sauces and gravies.

# Farm News

## Rural living

Imagine the whole world covered to a depth of 47 feet--with houseflies.

That's what you would have if one pair of houseflies--and all their offspring down through the generation--could freely breed for five months, with no deaths occurring except from old age.

Fortunately most, if not all, insects fail to reach their maximum reproductive potential. The reason, points out Gary Dunn, Extension entomologist at Michigan State University, is that insects' natural enemies--predators, parasites and pathogens (disease-causing organisms)--and other natural control agents--availability of food, shelter, water, space and suitable weather--keep their numbers in check.

"Gardeners can enlist some of these natural control agents in their lawns and gardens to control insect pests,"

said Dunn. "The big advantages are that using natural controls is ecologically safe for humans, livestock, pets, wildlife and beneficial insects; that natural controls are always around and they sustain themselves; and that they are economical."

"Disadvantages are that natural controls can never eradicate a pest, and that pest numbers may have to increase to damaging levels before natural controls click in to restore the balance. Fortunately, most crop plants can tolerate some pests with minimal damage."

Many species of birds, snakes, toads and insects feed on insect pests. Gardeners can attract such predators to their yards by making the environment more suitable for them, or they can buy or catch and release them. All these creatures need food, water and shelter--if your yard provides

these, it may attract the natural enemies of the pests you want to control.

Often you can control pests by managing the environment. For instance, crop rotation, crop residue destruction and sanitation, soil tillage, pruning and thinning, crop and variety selection, and proper plant care, all play a part in pest and disease control.

When planting woody ornamentals, for instance, you can select trees and shrubs that are known for having few pest problems and varieties that are hardy in Michigan and well adapted to the conditions your growing site provides. Plants that are healthy and growing vigorously usually have high resistance to invasion by insects or diseases.

When diseases and insects begin to take a toll on plantings of small fruits--especially strawberries and raspberries and other brambles--consider removing old plants and replanting in a new site. A new, young, vigorous planting in an area that has not had such crops

in it recently will yield much better and have fewer pest and disease problems than an old, declining planting.

In the vegetable and flower gardens, rotating crops so that closely related crops don't follow one another in the same spot minimizes the buildup and carry over of insects and plant disease organisms from one year to the next. Removing and destroying plant residues and tilling the soil in the fall removes or buries overwintering insects and disease organisms and eliminates plant debris where insects could overwinter.

Often using insect traps or mechanical barriers or physically removing insects from plants provides effective control.

Cutworm collars made of cardboard and placed around newly set transplants prevent cutworms from clipping peppers and other plants. Hand picking tomato hornworms and Colorado potato beetles and spraying aphids off of plants with a garden hose may eliminate the need for other control measures. Gardeners can build a variety of insect traps that use baits, certain colors or lights to attract and catch pests.

"A trap can be as simple and inexpensive as a saucer of stale beer in the garden to attract and drown slugs," Dunn notes. "Another simple trap is a board placed in the garden for squash bugs to hide under. All you have to do is pick up the board and crush the bugs."

If tent caterpillars have been a problem in landscape ornamentals and fruit trees, check plants in the winter and remove twigs holding tent caterpillar egg masses. Then, in the spring, prune out the first small webs that appear and destroy the tiny worms.

Gardeners can even use an insect disease to control pests. *Bacillus thuringiensis*, a bacterial disease of caterpillars, is available by a number of trade names, including Dipel and Thuricide. Caterpillars that ingest it stop feeding almost im-

mediately and die within a few days. It is not toxic to other insects or humans and, unlike chemical insecticides, it can be used right up to harvest.

Using natural controls against insect pests often requires some understanding of the biology of pests, plants and plant diseases, Dunn points out.

"Gardeners who take the time to find out how these controls can work can usually apply them, often in combination, to achieve adequate control of many yard and garden pests without use of toxic chemical pesticides," he says.

"They can reserve insecticides and other chemicals for use only as a last resort and so greatly reduce the quantities of chemicals they apply. This, in turn, preserves vast numbers of beneficial insects, which are often more susceptible to insecticides than the target pests."

## Corn referendum dates are set

A referendum to establish a proposed Michigan Corn Promotion Program will be conducted July 8 through July 23 by the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

"Ballots will be mailed to all producers of record and must be post-marked on or before July 23 to be counted," said Paul E. Kindinger, Michigan Department of Agriculture director.

To approve the referendum, an affirmative vote of at least 50 percent of the total votes cast, representing more than 50 percent of the corn production of those casting ballots, is required.

If passed, the Corn Promotion and Development program would provide funding for product development of corn and corn products, expansion of markets, increased consumer knowledge, research, market information,

and promotion by assessing corn growers up to one-half cent per bushel for each bushel of corn sold.

By law, MDA must handle the referendum. A public hearing was held May 30, after more than 200 growers submitted a petition requesting establishment of the promotion program.

Producers are eligible to vote if they have grown and sold a quantity of corn valued at first point of sale, at more than \$800, during any one growing and marketing season within the last three years. Each producer, partnership and corporation is entitled to one vote.

Any eligible grower not receiving a ballot may write to the Michigan Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Development Division, P.O. Box 30017, Lansing, MI 48909.

# Cattle-Forage Field Day planned for July 13

A Cattle-Forage Field Day is scheduled for July 13, at Michigan State University's Lake City Experiment Station.

The program will be of interest to dairymen, beef producers and forage producers.

The morning program will start at the station. Included will be exhibits of barley variety trials, methods of storing large hay bales, alfalfa variety trials, least-cost pasture improvement with frost seedings, low cost fencing systems for controlled grazing, no-till alfalfa and corn

demonstrations, and the results of a long-term selection and crossbreeding with beef cattle.

Following the tour, a noon lunch will be served on the station by the Missaukee County 4-H Council.

The afternoon program will feature demonstrations on preservation of silage in large plastic bags, new developments in making hay, checking bulls for total breeding soundness, and management systems for grazing weaning heifers.

There will also be exhibits on controlling respiratory disease problems, new pharmaceutical products, fencing systems using high-tensile wire, computer systems for farm use, performance testing of beef cattle, artificial insemination, and equipment and machinery exhibits.

Lake City is located 68 miles southwest of Gaylord, where the Michigan Cattleman's Association will hold their Annual Summer Round-Up at the Hidden Valley Resort on July 11

and 12, just prior to the Field Day.

Beef cattle producers are urged to attend both events.

The Summer Round-Up program will begin at 1:30 p.m., July 11, with a talk on "cattle feeding strategies for a mature beef industry" by Don Gill, well-known beef specialist from Oklahoma State University.

He will be followed by Steven Rust, MSU beef specialist, who will present an up-date on current beef cattle research.

The Round-Up program will reconvene at 9 a.m. on July 12, with a producer panel on "management programs that work for me". Next, Dr. Don Hitzemann, DVM, will speak on "cost-effective management practices for beef producers".

Gill will then talk on "management of stressed feeder cattle".

The Round-Up will conclude at 1:30 p.m., with a special program, "What's happening to beef prices and demand?"

It will be moderated

by Richard Lehnert, editor of the Michigan Farmer, and will feature J.N. Ferris, Agricultural Economist, MSU; Orin VanderBoon, Ada Beef Co., Ada, MI; and Tom McDermott, vice-president of communications, National Livestock and Meat Board, Chicago.

Using solar collector grain-drying systems reduces energy needs for the bin drying process, but fuel savings in Michigan are generally not enough to justify construction cost.

"Solar energy for crop drying is weather

dependent and may be least successful during the years when it is most needed," says Roger Brook, Extension specialist in agricultural engineering at MSU. "In fact, it appears that a natural air drying system may

work equally well in Michigan without the additional expense of a solar collector."

Five solar collector designs were studied over a 10-year period. Construction costs ranged from \$600 to \$4,835.

One type of collector was wrapped around a storage bin.

Two of the collectors tested were solar attics on livestock facilities.

Another was a portable, self-supporting collector, and the last was an inflatable plastic collector.

Of the five, the solar attic collector on a dairy calf house performed the most successfully, with an average energy efficiency of 56.2 percent. This collector was the most expensive per square foot to build, however.

Solar drying was found to be most successful when started later in the fall, when humidity is reduced.

Brook recommends that the moisture con-

tent for grain in a solar drying system not exceed 20 percent, using an airflow rate of 2.5 cubic feet per minute per bushel of grain dried.

Solar collectors are more efficient when sized according to the amount of grain dried, with a range of 0.1 to 0.3 square feet of collector per bushel of grain the most effective, Brook says.

Brook also found that the heat energy supplied by the solar collector systems often overdried the bottom layers of grain in the drying bin.

This can be alleviated by stirring the grain, but installing a stirring device increases the cost of the system.

Solar collector crop-drying systems are not likely to replace conventional equipment, because of the collector's cost and the small amount of energy collected during the crop-drying season, Brook says.

But, if fuel costs continue to rise in the coming years, using solar energy for crop drying in Michigan may become more practical, he concludes.

## Family Focus

Cherry picking time is finally here and, according to various orchards in the area, the trees are "loaded".

If you are picking your own cherries this year, there are a few tips you need to remember in order to keep your cherries plump and fresh for eating.

Cherries, like many fresh fruits, remain at their best for only a few days. Even in the refrigerator, cherries only maintain maximum quality for one to two days. Since cherries are so highly perishable, they should be refrigerated as soon as possible after picking. Do not wash them before putting them in the refrigerator. Just sort them carefully, looking for any signs of decay. Decay is indicated by soft leaking flesh, brown discoloration and mold growth.

Once sorted, the cherries can be placed loosely in shallow containers

so that air can circulate and the weight of the cherries on top does not crush those on the bottom. Do not remove the stems prior to packing.

If you get sick of cherry pies and cobblers and still have cherries left over, why not make a fruit sauce?

Cherry sauce makes colorful topping for ice cream pudding, sponge cake or anglefood cake.

To make cherry sauce, wash, sort, stem and pit the cherries. The pour 2/3 cup of water per pound of cherries into a saucepan. Bring water to a boil. Add cherries, cover and return to boiling. Reduce heat until water just simmers.

Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, until cherries are tender (approx. 5 minutes.)

Stir in 1/2 cup sugar per pound of cherries and simmer for 1 minute longer. (Sugar may be adjusted according to taste.)

# Michigan's 1985 tart cherry crop to be up by five million pounds

Michigan's 1985 tart cherry crop is forecast at 215 million pounds available for harvest.

This is five million pounds higher than last year's crop according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

Exceptionally warm April temperatures enabled the crop to get off to a fast start. Favorable weather during pollination and the absence of frost damage statewide, has helped this year's crop.

Except for very strong winds on May 31, the growing season thus far has been nearly ideal.

The crop is currently in good shape and is maturing nearly two weeks ahead of normal. Michigan has three

primary growing regions which are located along the Lake Michigan shoreline.

Production in the northwest area is forecast at 100 million pounds, down 13 percent from last year.

The west central area is forecast at 70 million pounds, up 56 percent from 1984.

The crop in the southwest is expected to be 44 million pounds, down eight percent from a year ago. Rounding out Michigan's tart cherry crop is an additional one million pounds forecast for minor growing area.

Picking is expected to start around June 21 in southwest Michigan, July 5 in the central area and around mid-July in the northwest.

Nationally, tart cherry production is forecast at 268 million pounds, down one percent from last year, but 73 percent more than 1983.

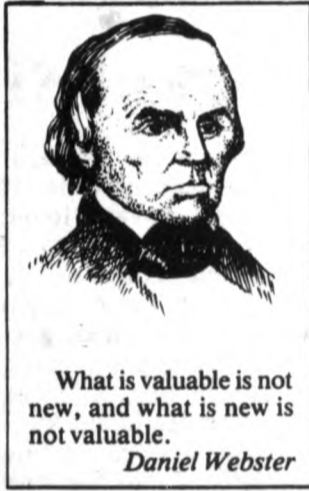
Michigan's production represents 80 percent of the U.S. total.

Sweet cherry produc-

tion in Michigan is forecast at 33,000 tons, the same as last year, but 83 percent more than 1983.

Nationally, sweet cherry production is pegged at 132,400 tons, 27 percent less than both last years and 1983's production.

## Sheep and lamb consumption at lowest level since 1867

When was the last time you had a meal of lamb or mutton? If it has been such a long time you can't even remember, then you can understand one of the problems facing the sheep industry.

Per capita consumption, which peaked at five pounds annually in 1961, has leveled off to about 1.5 pounds in the 1980s.

In fact, according to farm economist Bob Craig of Michigan Farm

Bureau, sheep and lamb numbers nationwide are at their lowest levels since such records were first kept in 1867.

"Part of the problem is imports of sheep products from other countries, which has forced our farmers to cut back their production," Craig says. "In addition, with lamb and mutton in such low demand, farmers are raising fewer sheep. And sheep producers have had to deal with the same farm credit problems faced

by others in agriculture in this country."

He says sheep farmers have also been affected by the competition created by lower retail prices for beef, pork and chicken.

But Craig notes that it hasn't been all "gloom and doom" for the sheep industry. "For those producers still in the business, they're enjoying the highest prices they've received in a long time. There's certainly some profitability in the sheep business these days."

Other positive news comes from recent figures on consumption of lamb and mutton. The U.S. produces less lamb than is consumed here,

and a significant portion of the most avid lamb eaters...about 27 percent...have been consumers for only five years or less.

The Michigan Farm Bureau recently appointed a sheep industry study committee to explore some ways to address the problems of the industry.

bushels.

The \$50,000 payment limitation was retained, and a \$250,000 non-recourse loan limit was established. And loans made to producers over that amount would be recourse.

The subcommittee adopted amendments:

---offering producers a non-recourse marketing loan at the discretion of the Secretary that would allow producers to redeem their C.C.C. price support loans at less than the original amount. The redemption amount would be limited by estimated annual carrying costs of the specific commodity to C.C.C. As an incentive for producers to exercise the marketing loan option, the Secretary could offer a PIK bonus payment, not to exceed 10 percent of the mid-month average price.

---allowing haying and grazing of idled acres, at the option of the state ASCS committee.

---requiring the Secretary to conduct a referendum of wheat, feed grain and soybean producers in crop year 1986 and every year thereafter if it fails, on a mandatory supply management program. If 60 percent of the producers voting approve the referendum, farmers would receive

high price supports, marketing quotas, and mandatory acreage cut-backs.

---granting discretionary authority for the Secretary to implement a wheat export certificate program if the non-recourse loans are above the competitive world market prices.

---requiring the Secretary to make early announcements for the wheat and feed grains program. (July 1 for wheat and September 1 for feed grains).

---authorizing cost reduction options: 1) to enter the market and purchase grain to prop up prices, 2) waiver of all or part of the interest due on non-recourse loans to prevent forfeiture of grain to the C.C.C., 3) re-opening production control or loan programs during the growing season to accept bids from producers to destroy planted acreage in return for up to a maximum PIK payment of \$20,000.

---permitting the Secretary to make prevented planting disaster payments-in-kind and requiring the making of prevented planting payments unless prevented planting crop insurance is available to producers.

---modifying the Farmers-owned-reserve to prevent ex-

It is the intent of this section to provide standards that will allow the placement of mobile homes on the same lot as the principal dwelling that would not otherwise be allowed by this ordinance; where the provisions contained herein are complied with and where there is a proven need for supervision of an individual(s).

A person(s) may make application to the Clinton County Department of Development Control for a land use permit to occupy a mobile home as an accessory use to a principal dwelling on unplatted parcels in the A-1, Agricultural zone district and in the R-1A, One Family Rural Residential zoning district if a medical condition exists such that the occupant of the principal dwelling or the proposed mobile home requires continued supervision.

The permit shall be conditioned upon compliance with the following standards.

**Case Number ZC-11-7-85 Text Amendment - Size Limitation of Accessory Building**

Amending Article 5, Section 5.3.1(A)(1) from:

Section 5.3 SUPPLEMENTARY USE REGULATIONS

5.3.1 Accessory Buildings

A. Authorized accessory buildings may be erected as a part of the principal building or may be connected to it by a roofed over porch, patio, breezeway, or similar structure, or may be completely detached. If attached to the principal building, an accessory building shall be made structurally a part of it, and shall comply in all respects with the requirements applicable to the principal building. An accessory building not attached and not made a part of the principal building shall not be nearer than ten (10) feet from any other structure on the same lot and shall also comply with the front, rear and side yard requirements of this ordinance.

1. Accessory Uses - Garages: The structural space which is permissible in residential districts for motor vehicle storage and for incidental space as accessory to an authorized use shall not exceed the following:

a. R-1A, Residential District not to exceed 900 square feet.

b. R-1B and R-1C residential districts not to exceed 800 square feet.

c. R-M1 and R-1D residential districts and group housing developments not to exceed 500 square feet per each family unit.

d. There shall be no residential storage of commercial vehicles except one (1) per residential dwelling not to exceed one (1) ton rated capacity, or in the case of an agricultural operation or of a home occupancy which are part of the principal residence use, then except one (1) per residential dwelling not to exceed 1 1/2 ton rated capacity.

e. Space in a garage accessory to an R-M1, R-1D or to a motel shall not be rented out except to occupants of the principal dwelling.

f. An accessory building shall not occupy more than 30% of the area of any rear yard.

Amending Article 5, Section 5.3.1(A)(1) to:

Section 5.3 SUPPLEMENTARY USE REGULATIONS

5.3.1 Accessory Buildings

A. Authorized accessory buildings may be erected as a part of the principal building or may be connected to it by a roofed over porch, patio, breezeway, or similar structure, or may be completely detached. If attached to the principal building, an accessory building shall be made structurally a part of it, and shall comply in all respects with the requirements applicable to the principal building. An accessory building not attached and not made a part of the principal building shall not be nearer than 10 feet from any other structure on the same lot and shall also comply with the front, rear and side yard requirements of this ordinance.

a. R-1A residential district, refer to 6.18.1 Schedule A

b. R-1B residential district, refer to 6.18.2 Schedule A

c. R-M1 and R-1D districts and Group Housing

Developments not to exceed 500 square feet per each family unit.

d. There shall be no residential storage of commercial vehicles except one (1) per residential dwelling not to exceed one (1) ton rated capacity, or in the case of an agricultural operation or of a home occupancy which are part of the principal residence use, then except one (1) per residential dwelling not to exceed 1 1/2 ton rated capacity.

e. Space in a garage accessory to an R-M1, R-1D or to a motel shall not be rented out except to occupant of the principal dwelling.

f. An accessory building shall not occupy more than thirty (30%) percent of the area of any rear yard.

**Case Number ZC-12-7-85 Text Amendment - Ceiling Height Requirements**

Amending Article 6.5.2(A)(2) in the following manner: delete the text language which is underlined.

6.5.2 Uses Permitted by Right

A. Single family dwellings, structures, either constructed on the site or manufactured off the site and which are designed and used for the complete living accommodations of a single family and complies with the following regulations:

1. The dwelling shall meet dimensional requirements for the district in which it is situated as delineated in Article 6, Section 6.18, Schedule A or Article 6, Section 6.5.5 of OR-1-78, the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance.

2. All habitable rooms within the dwelling shall have an average ceiling height of not less than 7 feet 6 inches in at least 50 percent of the required area with no portion less than 5 feet in height.

Exception: Beams and girders spaced not less than 4 feet on center may project not more than 6 inches below the required ceiling height.

All other rooms including hallways and corridors shall have a ceiling height of not less than 7 feet measured to the lowest projections from the ceiling.

**Case Number ZC-13-7-85 Text Amendment - Duplex Conversion**

Amending Article 6, Section 6.5.4(W) in the following manner: Delete the entire text.

W. Amending Article 6, Section 6.5.3 by adding the following text under 6.5.3(L)

L. Conversion of one-family dwellings: The conversion of one-family dwellings over 2000 square feet built prior to 1940 to two-family dwellings shall be permitted to achieve the better utilization of existing larger houses in rural areas in order to extend the economic life of the building, and to allow the owner to justify the expense of modernization when the following conditions are met:

1. An on-site sewage treatment permit is issued from the Mid-Michigan District Health Department specifying the maximum total number of inhabitants capable of being served by the said on-site system.

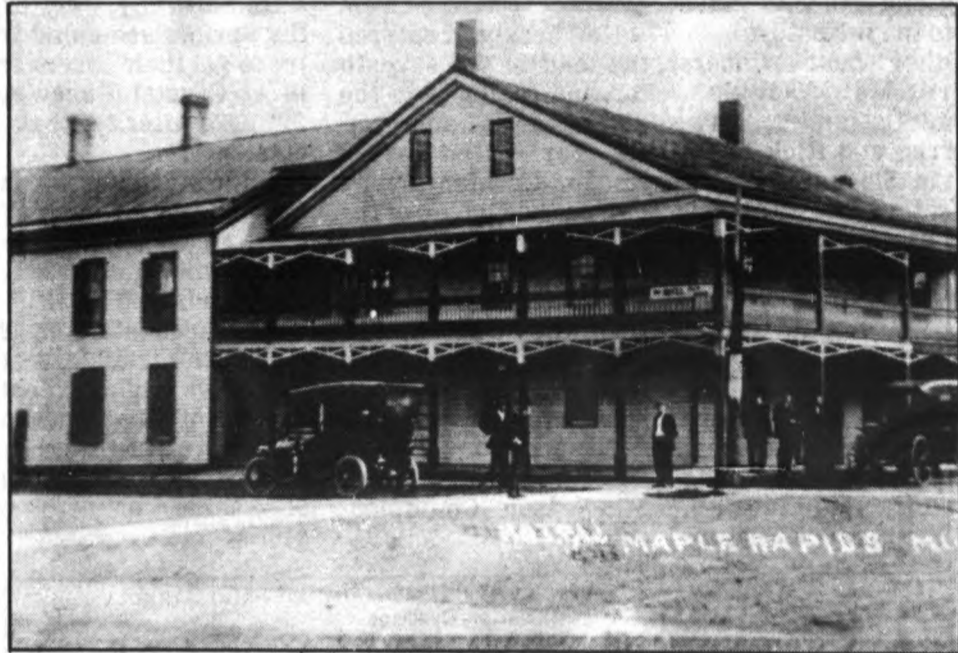

After the war, all records of the decoration were lost. Shortly after the bicentennial of Washington's birth, records of the decoration were rediscovered. The award was revived in 1932 by President Herbert Hoover and General Douglas MacArthur and renamed the Purple Heart.

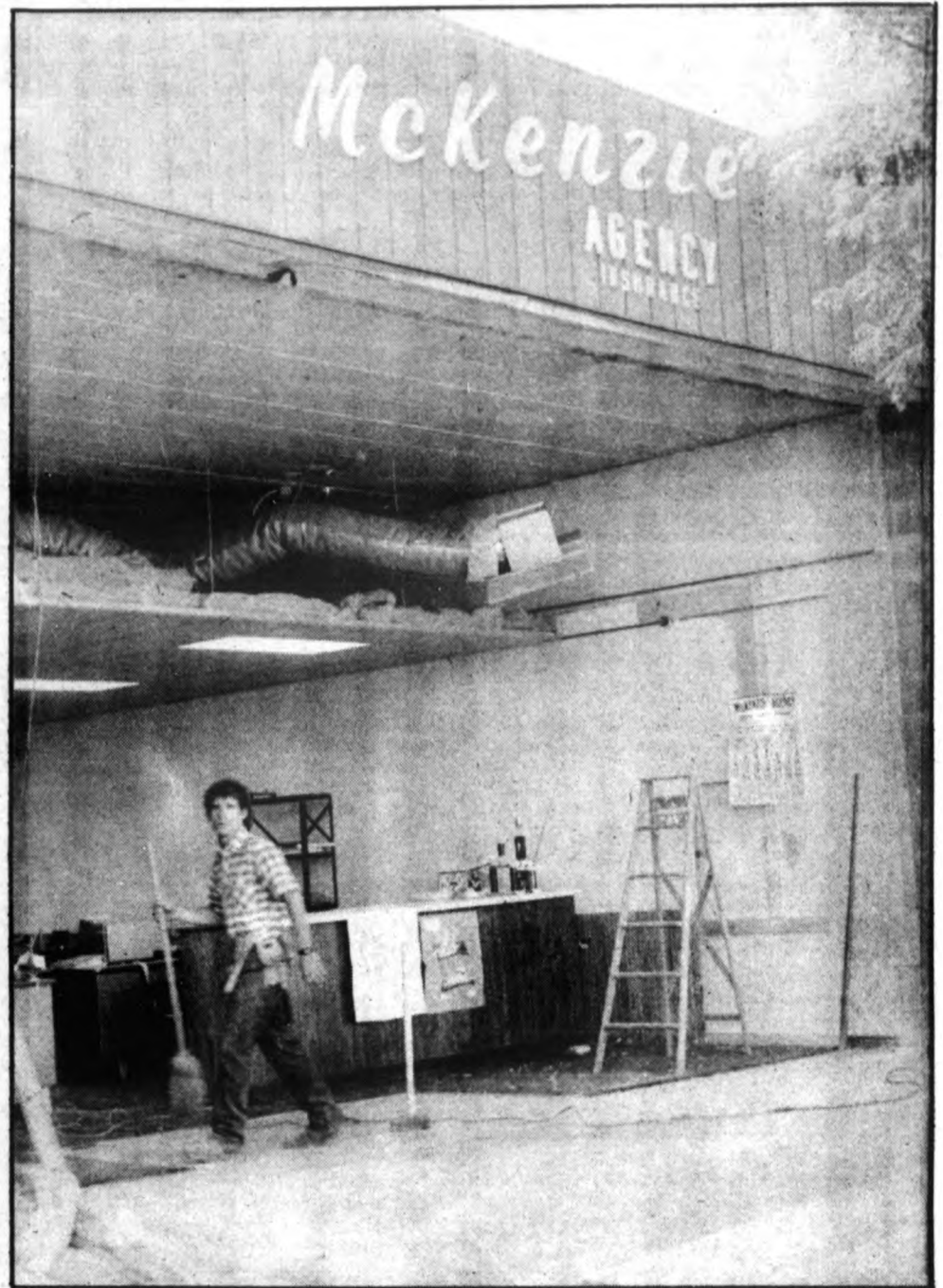

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on July 15, 1985 at 7:30 o'clock p.m. at Waldron School - Room 102 the Board of Education of Fowler Public Schools will hold a public hearing on the levying in 1985 of an additional proposed millage rate of 1.0882 mills for operating purposes pursuant to Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan, 1982.
