## Finishing touches made for festival

After many years of successful mint farming, 49 years without a mint queen and many area residents looking for a three day party, the first ever St. Johns Mint Festival is almost here.

"It's been a tremendous amount of work," says a beaming Joann Martis who, with the help of most of the community, has been putting the pieces of the Mint Festival puzzle together. "No one knows the hours spent. A lot of sleepless hours."

The first ever Mint Festival in St. Johns will feature a parade with more than 90 entries, carnivals, food, a pig roast, dancing, several contests

and most of all, lots of emphasis on mint.

The busy work is nearly completed, according to Martis, but a lot of final details still need to be finalized. Bathroom facilities, litter control, parade lineups and other festival necessities need to be taken care of for the possible 100,000 people who may converge on the city August 9-11.

While details for this year's festival are still being made, organizers are probably looking forward to Mint Festival '86 when planning and organization should be much easier. Staging a festival of this magnitude for the very first time has been a learning experience for all those involved and things are bound to get better over the years.

"The first year has been difficult," Martis says, "because all our applications and contest forms have to be put together. The rules and guidelines for each event had to be put down on paper."

"We know we're going to be making a lot of mistakes," Martis adds. "Nothing ventured, nothing gained."

If optimism and support are any indication of the Mint Festival's success, than Mint Festival '85 should be a great time for all.

"People are still coming forth with ideas and suggestions that are too late for our massive advertising that we've done," Martis says complimenting all who have been involved.

More importantly, most area businesses and community leaders have all jumped on the mint bandwagon and are looking to put the St. Johns festival on the map with events equal to the Holland Tulip Festival or the Cherry Festival in Traverse City.

The city has printed more than 25,000 pamphlets advertising the festival and local restaurants will use more than 50,000 placemats that will advertise the Mint Festival to locals and out-of-towners as well.

While this will be the first ever Mint Festival, Eloise Harris holds the distinctive title of the first and only St. John's Mint Queen, a title she won back in 1936.

When all is said and done and August 12 rolls around, the first ever St. Johns Mint Festival should be a spectacular weekend for everyone involved and all its participants.

## Gowing bound over for trial

Robert Gowing, the 51-year-old brother of two men previously convicted of sexually abusing a young boy, will be bound over for trial in Circuit Court after he attempted to have sex with a 14-year-old Watertown Township girl.

In an opinion issued by 65th District Judge Jeffrey Martlew, Gowing, whose address was listed as 9393 W. Cutler Rd. in Eagle, will be arraigned on second degree Criminal Sexual Conduct Charges August 5 in front of Judge Timothy M. Green.

Martlew took the case under advisement after the county prosecutor motioned to have Gowing arraigned on third or fourth degree CSC charges. Gowing's attorney moved to have the case dismissed.

"This court finds that 2nd Degree Criminal Sexual Conduct... is the offense committed and probable cause to believe Defendant (Gowing) committed it," Martlew said in his opinion.

Gowing is accused of requesting sex from his daughter's friend in a June, 1982 incident. The girl was 14 at the time.

According to the complaint, Gowing fondled the girl's breast "approximately 20 times" in a three month period prior to the incident. The complaint also says the alleged victim was staying overnight with Gowing's daughter one night when he asked her to sleep with him.

Martlew refused to bound Gowing over on the fourth degree CSC charge because there was not enough proof that Gowing attempted to have sex with her.

He did not allow the third degree CSC charge because the alleged victim was not in a position of a "reasonable fear of dangerous consequences" which must exist.

The second degree CSC charge was allowed, according to Martlew's opinion, because "Defendant was certainly in a position of authority over Complainant. She was in his home. While she may have been invited by Defendant's daughter, she remained there at his pleasure."

Gowing's brothers, Donald and Delmar, were leaders of a Wacousta boy scout troop and earlier this year they were both given life sentences after they were convicted of sexually abusing a young boy in their troop.

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# Suburban rolls into the lake

The brown and yellow Suburban — which had its engine shut off at the time — is owned by William Staples, 6181 E. Price Rd. He, along with his wife, Stephne, and their grandson watched the vehicle roll down the ramp and sink completely under the water. Hettler's Wrecker Service pulled the vehicle out of the lake.

A 24-year-old Haslett man faces trial Aug. 22 for writing two bad checks to Beck and Hyde's, N. U.S. 27, totalling \$2594.85, Clinton County Police say.

He is a 1979 graduate of St. Johns High School.

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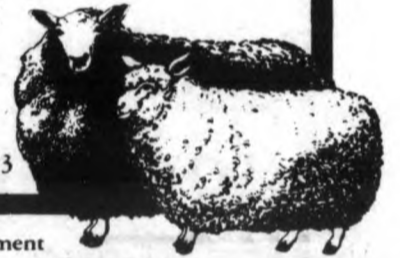

He is a 1982 graduate of Ferris State College, Big Rapids.

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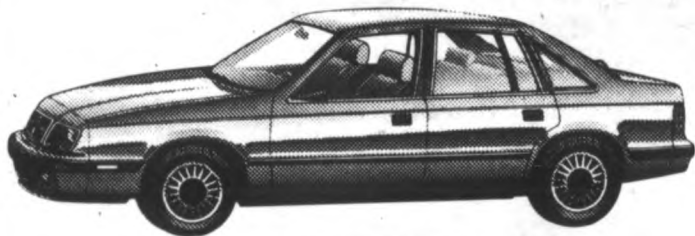

## 6 acres burned in wheat field

## Legislature passes bill for school aid

The Legislature has approved a 1985-86 school aid budget totalling \$554.9 million in general funds. The bill offers financial rewards to school districts that improve pupil-teacher ratios in the primary grades.

The funding formula awards a \$303 basic grant per pupil with another \$68.50 allocated for each operating mill.

Included in the budget was a new payment plan which offers each school district providing high school basic education requirements an incentive to maintain minimum daily class hours, minimum numbers of years of English, social studies, math and science. Qualifying districts will receive \$28 per student.

Another highlight is a \$8.35 grant per student in kindergarten and the first grades for every school district that reduces its fall class size in those grades at least five percent below what they were in the last school year.

The average Michigan public school class had 22 pupils in 1983, the third highest class size in the country.

Teacher-student relationships are critical in the formative years. Teachers have a better chance to help students with academic problems in smaller classes.

The program will be extended to second and third grades during the 1986-87 and 1987-88 school years.

I strongly support the education budget. For the second year in a row we have placed funding of education as a high priority item. Nevertheless, this budget requires less property taxation and shows our commitment to excellence for Michigan schools.

The Clinton Memorial Hospital nursing staff has issued a challenge to other hospital staff members and community residents in the July 31 Red Cross blood drive.

Dubbed the "1985 CMH Challenge," this year's drive comes on the heels of last year's, the most successful community drive in years.

Over 140 people took part in last year's drive, which saw 37, first-time donors. The nursing staff took the honors in the 1984 challenge.

The hospital blood drive is being coordinated by Betty Geller, Director of Nursing, and Irene Armbrustmacher, Assistant Director of Nursing.

## What the festival's all about

What's the mint festival all about anyway?

According to festival organizers, the first ever St. Johns Mint Festival serves many purposes. It will give local residents, as well as out-of-towners, a summertime, weekendlong party that will keep people at home rather than embarking on a long journey to Detroit for the Michigan State Fair or other cities which host summertime festivals.

Mint Festival '85 will also let other Michigan communities discover that St. Johns produces the fourth largest mint crop in the state.

The festival is also an opportunity for local businesses to grab a little extra business over the weekend.

Most importantly, though, Mint Festival '85 will give the city of St. Johns its own identity, according to Joann Martis, the director of the local chamber of

commerce.

"We want them (travelers) to know there is something here than just the two spotlights," Martis says referring to the motorists traveling on U.S. 27. "We have a lovely community and a fine shopping area, so the idea is to bring them in."

But why a mint festival?

Martis, who has taken special pride arranging the first ever mint festival because her family was heavily involved in the St. Johns mint industry many years ago, explains.

Until 1936, the mint crop was very large in this area, she says. In fact, in November of that year, the St. Johns community held a mint celebration to honor the importance of the crop to the farmers and the entire community.

Shortly thereafter, Martis continues, a severe blight struck the area mint crop and the crop soon died for many years.

"Now with chemicals,

it's one of the largest crops (in the state)," she says referring to the recent mint resurgence.

And along with the mint resurgence comes Mint Festival '85, another celebration — 49 years later — of the importance of mint to the St. Johns community.

With only two other mint festivals in the country — one in Indiana and the other in Oregon — the idea for a St. Johns mint festival was brought up about two years ago.

When the idea was first proposed to the chamber of commerce's board of directors two years ago, they decided to wait and see how much support there would be for this type of event.

"We knew there would be an interest," Martis says looking back, "but not the scope we're reaching our first year."

When most of the community jumped on the bandwagon, Martis

knew the festival would turn out to be a great success.

"I know other groups have tried to have a festival of some sort," she says. "But, unless you have the involvement of all the clubs, you can't do this alone."

And Martis, who says she has enjoyed the many hours it has taken to organize the festival, is confident that Mint Festival '85 will be the success everyone has envisioned.

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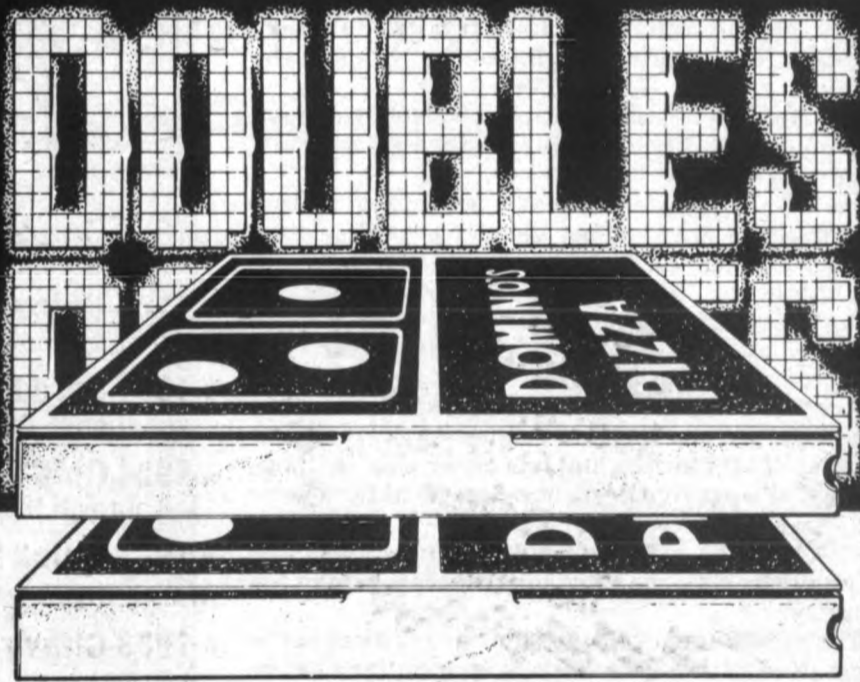
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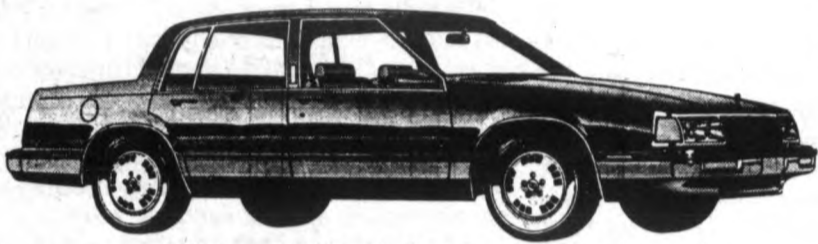
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# Cropsey fighting insurance problem

With the cost of malpractice insurance for Michigan's doctors rising at alarming rates, one Clinton County lawmaker is taking action to prevent more physicians from leaving Michigan and at the same time maintain quality health care in the state.

State Senator Alan Cropsey, R-DeWitt, held the second of two public hearings last Wednesday in order to curb the problem which is forcing many of the state's physicians to move to other states, while jeopardizing the quality of health care that most of us are used to.

According to the state insurance bureau, major

insurance underwriters have increased their malpractice premiums by as much as 60 percent in the past 12 months. The Michigan Physician's Mutual Liability Company says overall rates have jumped by nearly 75 percent in the past two years.

Figures show the cost of malpractice insurance has risen for obstetricians from \$15,000 to \$35,000 in the past year.

Cropsey says neurosurgeons and obstetricians have suffered the most over the years and that means the quality of health care for delivering babies in areas like Clinton County would suffer.

"What's happened is a lot of these general practitioners who also deliver babies will face higher (insurance) costs because they're delivering babies," he explains. "They're referring people

to obstetricians. It'll be tough in rural areas because some hospitals are many miles away."

When the legislature convenes in September, Cropsey says he will introduce legislation to combat this problem. He says the legislation is designed to strengthen four weak areas in the state's current insurance laws:

- Allow interest earned on a claim only after the suit has been filed. Currently, state laws say a claimant can collect interest from the time the incident occurred rather than at the time the suit is filed. "It basically doubles the cost of the judgement," Cropsey says. "Michigan is the only state to do this."

- Lower the statute of limitations on filing a suit somewhere between two and six years. Current laws, Cropsey says, have loopholes allowing suits to be filed at almost any time after an incident.

- Allow a \$500,000 cap on most awards. "A million dollar award doesn't make sense," Cropsey says.

- Set up a screening panel of physicians to determine if a doctor has provided proper health care when a malpractice suit is filed. Members of this panel would also have to testify in court.

Without some way to cut down on malpractice insurance costs, Cropsey says "there will be a shortage of specialists in certain areas."

Cropsey says administrators at large hospitals — most notably Detroit's Henry Ford Hospital — have told him they might have to eliminate many services, including emergency room facilities if insurance costs are not reduced soon.

"If a hospital closes down its emergency room," Cropsey says, "other hospitals will not be able to treat all those extra patients."

Cropsey says he is confident legislation can be adopted by the end of the year and the cost to practice medicine in Michigan will be contained.

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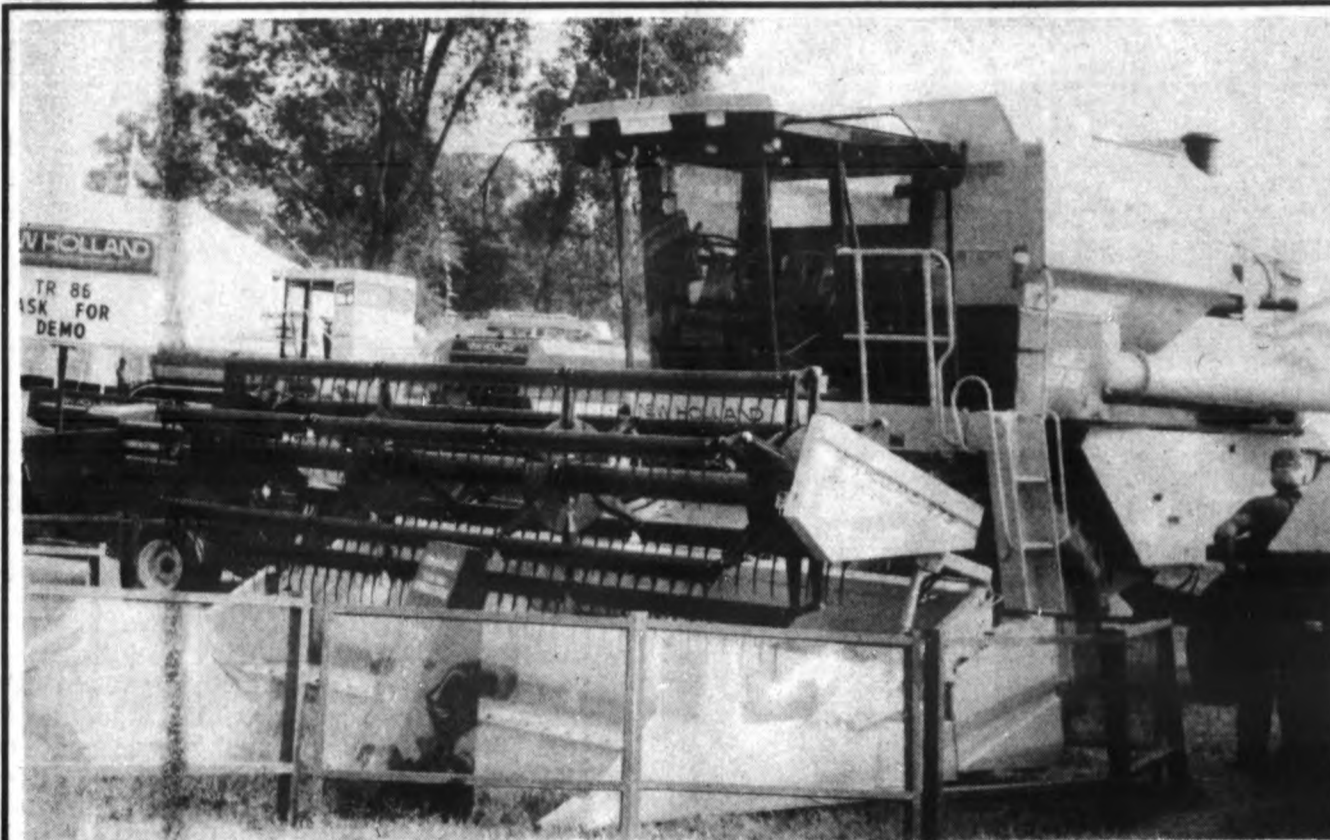

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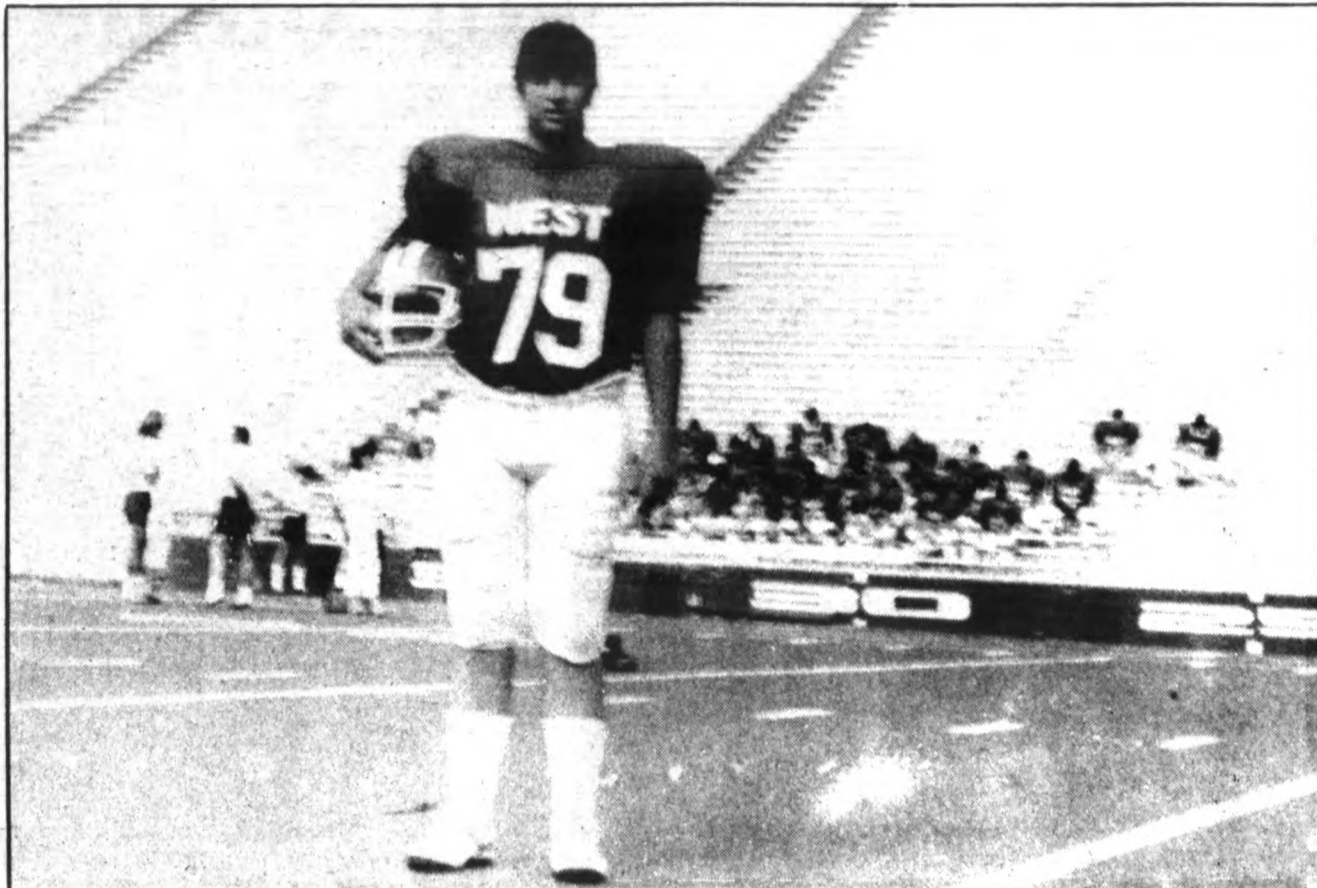

## Keenoy makes All Star team

John Keenoy is going to finish his prep football career at the site of his college career.

Michigan State University's Spartan Stadium will host the 1985 Michigan High School All Star football game on August 3.

Keenoy, the former St. Johns Redwing standout and first team Class A All-stater, will play offensive tackle for the West squad.

Keenoy will then shed his red All Star jersey for the green and white of Michigan State.

He lists being chosen to play in the All Star game as one of the highlights of his young football career.

"Playing three years on varsity was an honor," Keenoy said, recounting memorable moments. "Playing in the all star game, winning the conference as a sophomore, and being an all stater."

Among the larger universities that wooed Keenoy were Arizona State, Boston College, Central Michigan, University of Michigan, and MSU. He had narrowed his choices to the three Michigan schools because he "wanted to stay in the state."

"We wanted him to stay close to home," Keenoy's father, John, said. "We're glad he chose State. We're not going to miss a game."

The elder Keenoy also credits former Redwing coach Joe Gonzales with aiding his son.

"He sent out about 200 letters last year. I don't know how many phone calls he made," Keenoy said.

It's unlikely that Keenoy will be on Michigan State's active roster this fall, but he says he'll be ready anyway.

"If I could come in and help I'd like to," he said.

Jim Aldrich says he enjoys his pastime, late model car racing.

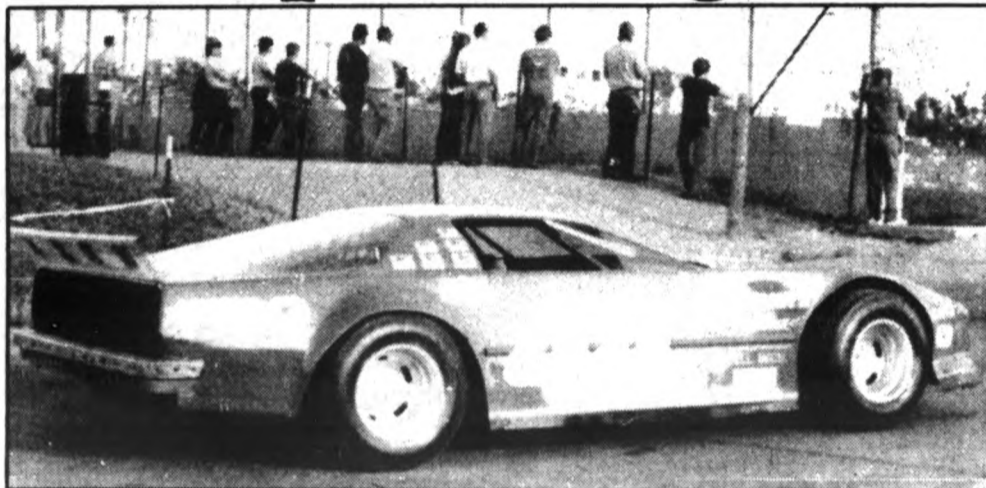
You have to believe him — he's been doing it 19 years.

Now, hopefully, undefeated teams can put away their crying towels. The Michigan High School Football Coaches Association has wisely changed the rules.

It has added a "pre-regional game" that will increase the number of playoff schools from 32 to 64. There will be four teams from all four regions of the four classes that will qualify for the playoffs.

The pre-regional rule is being tested over the next two seasons.

The power ratings will remain the same (there are 10 ways teams can garner points, so we won't

break it down here), just the opportunities are greater.

The coaches I spoke to Friday at the Michigan High School All Star football game Press Day were very pleased with the change.

John Rapacz, coach of Class B Kalamazoo Hackett, could only see good coming from the pre-regional game, especially in light of what happened to him last season.

"I think we lost our last game last season because the kids knew it didn't mean anything anyway," Rapacz said. "We were 8-0 but we had no way of getting into the playoffs even if we went undefeated."

"I know they say those kind of things don't matter to the good teams, but kids are kids."

Dick Mettlach, coach of Class D Forest Park Crystal Falls, agreed with Rapacz' realism.

"Yeah, that's what the kids are shooting for," the Upper Peninsula coach said. "Some people say they are shooting for the league title and they'll think about anything else afterwards. They're not. They are looking beyond that (to the state playoffs)."

Joe Eufinger, of Class A Flint Central, thinks it will take off a degree of pressure from the players.

"It created controversy, certainly," Eufinger said. "I think it made players think about more than the game they had to play."

"You could come up to the end of a very successful season, and what should have been a very happy time could be very discouraging."

It's true that we could go on documenting all the complaints and injustices in the playoff's system's past. But, it is important to note that the MHSFCA was big enough to face an inadequacy in its system and change it.

That's progress.

Whether you're one who just likes to watch deer, or a bow hunter who is beginning to plan for the season, the time to see deer is now. The bucks are well into "the velvet" and the fawns are mostly old enough to be frolicking about very visibly.

Where do you look for deer and how to you spot them in this season of lush vegetation? Let me help with the answers to these questions and you will be able to watch more deer than you probably knew existed in areas close to where you live today.

When the wheat

becomes golden and the threshers begin their cutting, the time for spotting and observing deer is at its peak. The deer are nearly the same color as the wheat, for one thing, making a casual perusal of anything but a wheat field sufficient to spot their presence. For another thing, the threshing of the wheat coincides with the time period when deer are ending perhaps the

most secretive season of their year. The fawns have matured enough to be able to run and move and graze with the does and the bucks have begun regaining their lost confidence with the growth of their new antlers. Fortunately, most deer sightings at this season of the year seem to be a little further from the road. You may need a pair of binoculars to see them

well but you usually don't risk an accident.

They eat the tops of beans and the tender centers of young corn stalks, and against the bright green of these plants the deer stand out clearly.

I always watch for deer, summer and winter. But when the wheat is golden and the last long days of the July sun reach back to the far edges of the corn and beans, I really get serious. I start to make notes concerning the whereabouts of whitetails because the magic of the deer season has become close enough to plan for.

## Dave Weber is softball saturated

Truthfully, he admits that record doesn't have a lot to do with coaching ability. He says it has more to do with the way the City Rec people created the divisions.

"Last year, we were a couple of games above .500 — we were just about in the middle," he said. "Then they put the better teams in division A and the lower teams in division B.

"Our guys' team doesn't even practice. We get together in the winter and play volleyball, and we

# Experimental planter aids preparation

A new, experimental planter improves seedbed preparation for row crops in crusting soils without prior tillage.

The design for the new planter was presented at the national meeting of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers held at Michigan State University.

Developed by E.O. Beasley and G.C. Naderman, from North Carolina State University, and Gyles W. Randall, from the University of Minnesota, the planter has a chisel point mounted on a 45 degree forward-sloping shank that provides aggressive penetration in the hardest soils without added weight.

Dry, crusted soil often breaks along natural fracture lines into large clods when lifted by a chisel or subsoiler point. These clods tend to roll or get pushed partly out of the row zone, leaving an obstacle-strewn furrow with little or no loose soil available for seed coverage.

The new planter prevents the formation of large clods. A pair of closely spaced wheels with solid rubber tires placed directly above the chisel point presses down on the soil as the chisel point lifts it, creating a crushing, shearing action between the wheels and point. This divides the soil into smaller aggregates than would form if the soil were allowed to break up naturally.

A pair of beveled steel wheels behind the chisel shank squeezes the loosened soil back toward the center of the row, filling voids and firming the soil for more uniform soil penetration by the planter opener.

Adjustment of the downward pressure of the wheels over the chisel point is critical for proper operation. Too much pressure in wet clay soils presses the soil into sticky clumps and strips. Wet

clay is forced up between the pressure wheels, clogging this area and causing the leading coulter, which extends back between the pressure wheels, to jam and slide.

Raising the pressure wheels so they touch the soil surface just enough to rool allows the gauge wheels or tractor lift to support the implement, eliminating the problem and providing a good-textured seedbed.

This planter design virtually eliminates the formation of clods under dry conditions, leaving a loose, granular soil in the row zone with a high proportion of fine aggregates suitable for a seedbed. The planter also performs well in the prepared seedbed strip, placing corn seed accurately to the prescribed depth and providing consistent coverage and good soil-seed contact.

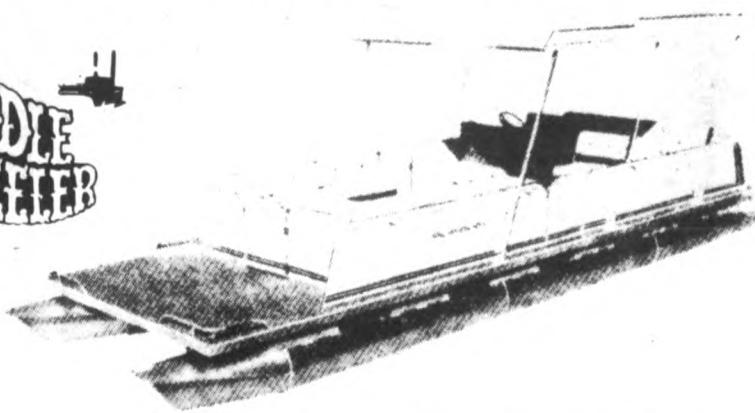

# Veterinarian has ideas on calf management

Care of replacement calves is an important part of running a dairy operation. Dr. Mary Schmidt, veterinarian and manager of the dairy research center at MSU, has a few ideas for improving calf management.

"One of the keys to a profitable dairy operation is getting calves into production quickly, and that can be expedited by following some basic steps," Schmidt says.

The first few hours of a calf's life are the most critical. To maintain a peak calf survival rate, Schmidt emphasizes keeping the calving area clean. It is also very important to hand feed colostrum to the newborn calves in the first few hours of life. Feed them as much as they will eat, because it contains many antibodies that increases a calf's resistance to disease. Keep frozen colostrum on hand in case a cow is unable to provide it for her calf.

## How to prevent pest infestation

Finding weevils in your oatmeal or worms in your flour is not an uncommon occurrence. Each year, people discard thousands of dollars worth of food because of insect infestation.

Several kinds of pantry pests feed on dried food in storage. All pantry pests are small and go unnoticed until they become numerous or begin crawling or flying.

Pests often enter foods as tiny eggs that go undetected when the food is packaged. During storage, these eggs hatch and the young insects develop. That is why food kept for long periods may become infested even when there are no breaks in the packaging.

Other pests simply fly in during warm weather. Pests may also be brought into the house on decorative dried plant materials, such as grains, nuts flowers and seeds.

Often you can prevent pantry pest infestations by buying food in small quantities and using it within a short time. Never buy broken or damaged packages of food -- they may already be infested.

Use older foods before opening newer food

After birth, the calf's navel needs to be dipped with a seven percent iodine solution to prevent infection. This is not the same as iodine-based teat dip, and Schmidt does not recommend substituting teat dip for the iodine solution.

Calves should be separated from their dams soon after birth. Research has shown this practice produces better adjusted adults and weans the calves more quickly. Providing the calf with fresh feed and water from the first day will also ex-

packages. Never add new food to an old storage container until it has been cleaned.

Infested foods should be discarded. Clean the storage area thoroughly. In most cases, cleaning and proper storage conditions will control unwanted pests.

pedite weaning. Schmidt emphasizes making sure feed and water are kept fresh, because this will encourage the calf to consume more solid food earlier. When calves are eating three to four pounds of grain per day, they can be completely taken off of a milk diet, she says. Calves can be weaned between four and eight weeks of age following these practices.

Schmidt thinks it is best to raise calves in individual hutches to avoid spread of disease. If raised individually, calves can be fed mastitis milk. But do not feed mastitis milk if calves are kept together. They can contract mastitis by nuzzling each other. High quality milk replacers cost as much as milk, so simply feed milk, she suggests.

To keep replacement costs at a minimum, Schmidt recommends raising only heifers. Sell any bulls born soon after birth, because they will never make economic contribution to the operation. This also allows producers to spend more time on the care of the replacement calves, so that they can soon be healthy, high milk-producing cows.

### ORDINANCE NO. 360

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE V, ZONING AND PLANNING, CHAPTER 51, KNOWN AS THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS TO CHANGE CERTAIN ZONING CLASSIFICATIONS AND TO CHANGE AND AMEND USES PERMITTED BY RIGHT IN THE "O", "OFFICE DISTRICT".

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

That the Zoning Ordinance of the City of St. Johns, and the Zoning Map of the City of St. Johns forming a part thereof, shall be amended in the following respects:

**Section 1.** That the premises hereinafter described shall be rezoned from its present R-3, High Density Residential, or MC, Municipal Center designation as the case might be, to O, Office designation. That the legal description of the parcels to be rezoned are as follows:

Original Plat, City of St. Johns, Block 16, except Lots 5, 6, 7, and 8 thereof, City of St. Johns, Clinton County, Michigan.

**Section 2.** The City Commission has predicated this rezoning action upon recommendation of the St. Johns Planning Commission as a result of the Planning Commission Meetings held thereon in respect to the requested rezoning.

**Section 5.** This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

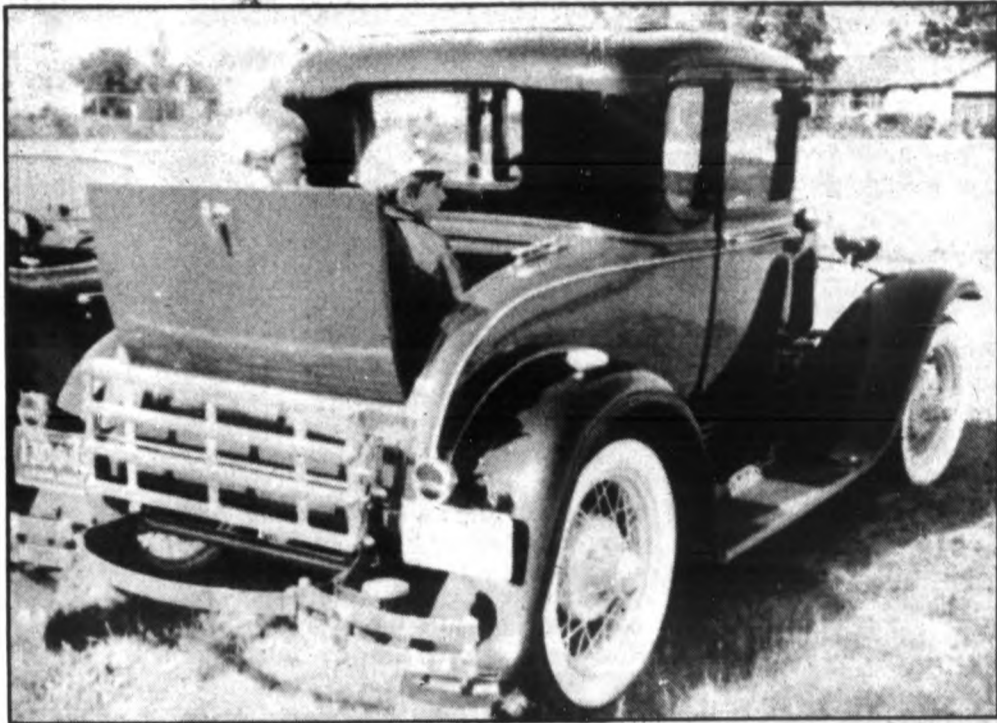

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
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
