## School board plans strategy

The St. Johns Board of Education last week continued planning strategy for convincing voters to approve a 3.5 mill increase in the school district's tax levy.

A large portion of a Monday evening meeting was devoted to discussion of possible options for the school district if the Sept. 10 millage increase request fails. The district faces a \$650,000 budget deficit next year if the millage request is not approved, administrators said.

The current school tax levy in St. Johns is 29.75 mills.

Board President Robert Craig said the board and administration should identify precisely where the budget will be cut if the millage request is not approved. Other board members rejected that idea.

"I DON'T THINK we want to threaten the voters with 'If you don't do this than this is going to happen'" said Trustee William McCarthy.

Board members also rejected a suggestion by Craig that the millage campaign include the closing of two outlying schools as a consequence of the millage request not being approved.

"I think the possibility of the schools closing is there and the millage doesn't have a bearing on it," said Board Secretary Peter Apostol.

In discussing where budget cuts could be made the majority of the board expressed the belief that the curriculum has already been cut to the limit. Supt. Earl Gabriel said further curriculum cutbacks will not be effective because they would result in less state aid to the district.

**FOR INSTANCE**, he said, cutting back from six-hour school days to five-hour school days would cost the district \$28 per student in state aid.

Gabriel cited the possibility of continuing existing programs next year and ending the school year when the district's funds run out. Possibly the state would step in with some help, he said.

He also cited the possibility of borrowing money to complete the school year. However, the district could only borrow against anticipated tax revenue and state aid and it is not clear if the state would permit that, he said.

"To say we would go out and do this would not be honest because we don't know if we would be allowed to do that," he said.

In a separate interview Friday morning the district's business manager said increases in state aid do not necessarily result in more money for the school district. Declining school enrollments more than offset increases in state aid, he said. For instance, he said, if the school district loses three students it will end up with less state aid even if the aid is increased 5 percent per student.

He also said the amount of additional property tax paid by homeowners if the millage is approved will vary because of property tax credits. The maximum property tax increase on a home with a market value of \$50,000 will be \$87.50, he said. However it is possible that tax on the same home will not increase at all if the millage request is approved because of property tax credits on state income tax, he said.

After living here for only a few months Carol got a call one day from the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation asking her to chair the "Breathe of Life" fundraising campaign in St. Johns this year. She has no idea who recommended her for the job but she was willing to it. Besides being sort of fun she figures it will be a way of getting to know the town better.

"I figure its predominantly a disease that affects the young, so I'll ask them," says Carol.

As chairperson of the campaign Carol is responsible for recruiting the volunteers who will go door-to-door during Cystic Fibrosis Week in an effort to raise funds to fight the incurable genetic disease. She plans to recruit mostly from youth organizations such as the Boy Scouts and church youth groups.

The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation estimates there will be 20 to 30 marchers needed for the St. Johns campaign. But a campaign by young people who do not drive cars will necessarily require more people than if the marchers were older and could drive, Carol says.

In addition to the door-to-door residential campaign Carol plans to solicit donations from businesses. She will also ask businesses to display campaign posters in their stores. Car, who says as far as she knows there was no Cystic Fibrosis campaign in St. Johns last year.

guesses the campaign will raise about \$500 based on the results of campaigns in neighboring towns in last year.

"If we could collect at least \$500 anything over that would be a real bonus," she says.

Carol is taking on the responsibilities of the Cystic Fibrosis campaign on top of her job in the nurse pool at St. Lawrence Hospital in Lansing. She also cares for her four children — once during this interview she had to rush outside to rescue her son from a the perious clutches of a bush he had fallen into — while her husband is at work as an industrial engineer at Sealed Power Corp. in St. Johns.

# CMH wins 'Cooking with Mint' contest

With little candies, shaped like mint leaves, available in green or white, the local community mental health center took first prize in the "Cooking With Mint" contest last Tuesday at the county fair.

In addition to a blue ribbon for their culinary skill the Community Mental Health Day Treatment Program, 104 N. Spring St., also got a fund raising boost. Funds from the sale of the candies will go toward the purchase of a video cassette recorder that will be used in the center's programs.

Martha Collopy, a mental health therapist, is credited by other staff members at the center with developing the recipe for the candy.

"Martha tested it and refined it," says Ann Beauschamp, senior mental health worker.

Collopy dismisses such talk. "Oh, we all did it," she says.

**BESIDES SHARING** the credit for the winning recipe among themselves the staff credits the St. Johns Lioness Club for allowing the day treatment program to sell the mints from the Lioness concession stand at the Mint Festival.

The Lioness Club has supported the program in a number of ways in the past, says Beauschamp.

"Now we're trying to raise some money on our own," she says.

Funds from the mint sales will be used to help pay for a video cassette recorder for use by the staff in its work with the 24 clients who come to the center each week. Clients prac-

ticing job interviewing skills, for instance, will be video taped so they can see how the come across in an interview.

The recorder will also allow the center to use educational video tapes supplied by the county extension service, she says.

For those who missed their chance at the festival to taste the winning recipe — the recipe and all the others entered in the contest will be compiled in a booklet and sold to the public.

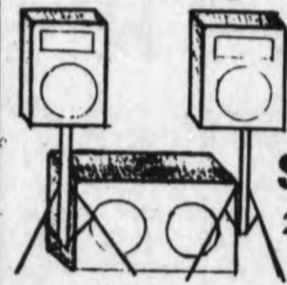

## Family focus

### Vegetables

Don't hide summer fresh fruits and vegetables under stale ideas. Let your imagination run wild with new serving ideas as you dish up fruits and vegetables.

Try adding dried herbs to vegetables when you start cooking them. Snap beans with basil or dill, broccoli with tarragon and cabbage with caraway seed are good combinations. Begin with a small amount of the herb and adjust to taste the next time you try the combination.

Sprinkle lemon juice or herb vinegar on boiled vegetables for seasoning instead of using salt and butter or margarine.

Use fresh fruit for desserts or party treats. A beautiful plate of fresh fruit prepared in bite-sized pieces can be the perfect end to a good meal. Or serve fruit as a center piece for a special event. It doesn't take long to make an elegant arrangement.

The variety of fresh fruit seems almost endless. Try making ready-to-eat snacks out of three to five different fruits.

Thin apple slices might be "sandwiched" with soft cheese. Banana chunks can be dipped in lemon juice

and rolled in chopped nuts. Apricot halves might be filled with chopped raisins, and melon cubes add color in red, green or orange.

Delicious, nutritious, easy-to-fix salads can be created with a wide range of greens and vegetables. Try adding bite-sized pieces of spinach or chard to lettuce.

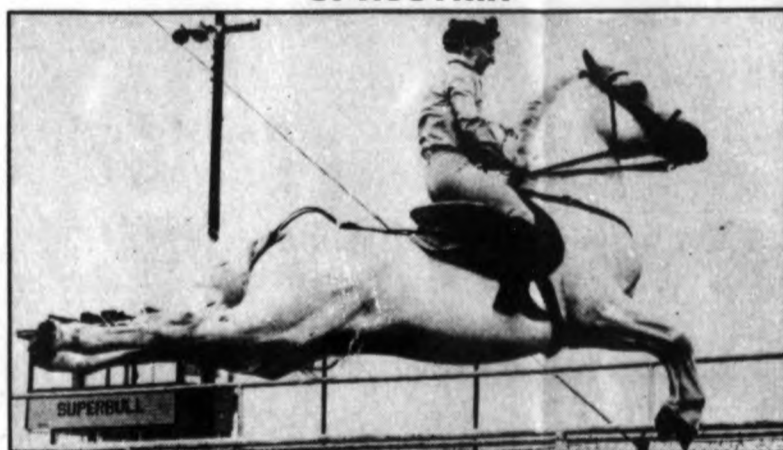
That dab of cooked vegetable left from dinner can be refrigerated and added to tomorrow's salad. For example, a few cooked beets add both color and interest to a salad.

Remember that vegetables can be fun for breakfast too. Add bean sprouts or waterchestnuts to scrambled eggs or cooked vegetables to an omelet or quiche.

### Cropsey says bill will reduce notary costs

A bill to reduce the notary public bond level will be introduced by Sen. Alan Cropsey (R-DeWitt) in September 1985 in an effort to reduce document notarization costs.

The proposed bill will roll back the recently instituted \$10,000 bond requirement to \$2,000. This bond must be secured for insurance purposes before notary services may be performed.

"This bill will reduce notarization fees which have risen drastically since the bond level was increased from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in 1984," Cropsey said.

Livingston County Clerk Joseph Ellis, who supports the proposed bill, said, "The high bond level approved in 1984 has forced many veteran notaries public to stop their services. There was no valid reason for the bond to be increased in 1984."

Ellis said that notarization services are now predominantly limited to insurance companies, banks, and township clerks.

"Senator Cropsey's bill will give citizens more convenience and confidence with notary public services," Ellis said.

...I was thinking, what's going on with nuclear war? Are we really going to have one in the future? That's what worries me. Thank you for reading this letter.

Dear C.L.:

I was happy to receive your letter. I remember meeting you at the parade. but as you know, we didn't have much time to talk.

The central question in your letter has to do with nuclear war, and I want you to know that I am in Congress to see that we never have one. So much of the "doomsday talk" which we hear today comes from very well-meaning people who are very deeply concerned about the possibility of nuclear war.

It seems to me that what people forget about the threat of nuclear war is that nuclear weapons are man-

made, the likelihood of nuclear war is almost entirely man-made and that courageous men and women have assumed the responsibility for seeing that nuclear war never occurs. I believe that in the realm of human action, the greatest safeguard against war is never giving up efforts to seek and maintain peace. In the same way, throwing up your hands because war is supposedly "inevitable" would be inviting war to occur.

In my time of Congress, I have worked to see that our defense is adequate, so that we are never perceived by an adversary as being weak. You and I may agree that we must fight to protect our freedoms, but we must make sure that any potential enemy knows that too.

For these reasons, I have voted for a limited deployment of MX missiles, a force which would strengthen our nuclear deterrent. We must make the results of a Soviet attack unacceptable to them, but also convince them that we have no intention of attacking them first.

I thank you for writing me. Young people like yourself must continue to pay attention to this very serious issue and I am proud of your interest. Aware and interested people like you will help to assure that a nuclear war never occurs.

### "It's in the Bag"

Which do you suppose you've eaten more of in your lifetime: muskmelon or cantaloupe? Well, don't answer too quickly, because that's kind of a trick question. And you'll find a surprise answer later in this piece, so read on.

Today's subject, by the way, is the muskmelon, of which the cantaloupe is but one delicious variety... as is the honeydew, for that matter. And the first thing you should know is that muskmelons originated in Asia, were hardly larger than oranges at first, and have always been considered something special.

In ancient Rome, for example, the Emperor Tiberius was so hooked on melons that he issued orders that they be served to him every day. That was a pretty sticky problem for the royal gardeners. But, necessity being the mother of invention, they solved it by thinking up the idea of the first greenhouse.

Muskmelons were also very big in ancient Persia, and one Persian king was so fond of them that he actually appointed a gentleman of the court to do nothing but sniff melons for freshness as they came from the royal garden!

One variety of muskmelon was cultivated in the garden of a sixteenth century castle near Cantalupo in Italy. And that, as I'm sure you've guessed, was the cantaloupe. However --- and here comes your surprise answer --- true cantaloupes are grown only in Europe, and what we call cantaloupes here in America are a different variety, no less delicious for being misnamed. So you have almost certainly eaten a lot more muskmelon than cantaloupe.

## Prosecutor vetoes paying witness fees

Clinton County Prosecutor Jon Newman says he is not willing to continue paying witness fees to Bath and DeWitt township police officers until the attorney general decides on the legality of the matter.

"It's an illegal expenditure of funds," he says.

In July, when Newman was on vacation, DeWitt officials say they were told by Assistant Prosecutor Richard Koenigsknecht that, if Newman okayed it, the county would continue to pay the fees until the attorney general rules on the matter.

But Newman vetoed the idea when he returned to work.

"I'm trying to follow the law as I understand it," Newman says, "and I would be violating my own office if I didn't."

Newman says he would be willing to keep track of the number of times DeWitt and Bath officers appear in court, and pay the fees retroactively if the attorney general rules in their favor.

Bath and DeWitt township authorities have not been notified officially by Newman that he did not agree with Koenigsknecht's agreement.

"We have not heard a word from him," DeWitt Township Supervisor Frank Mann says.

Bath Supervisor Richard Brook says the savings to the county would be between \$2,000 to \$3,000 if the fees were no longer paid to the township officers.

"If the attorney general rules that the townships are correct, we'll have to pay the fees to officers from St. Johns, the state police, the sheriff's department, and others that are not asking for the fees," Newman says.

The question at stake is whether or not officers are considered on duty when

they make a court appearance.

The townships say if an officer is not on the schedule when he is summoned to court, he is not on duty, even though he gets paid for the court time by the township according to the union contract.

Newman says if the officer is paid, he is considered on duty, and should not receive the county's witness fee in addition to his pay from the township.

### Robinson goes to trial

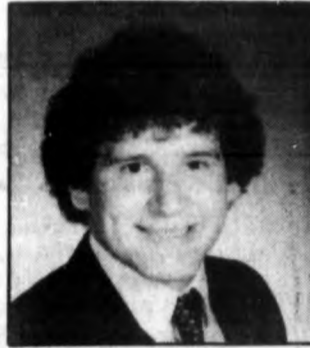

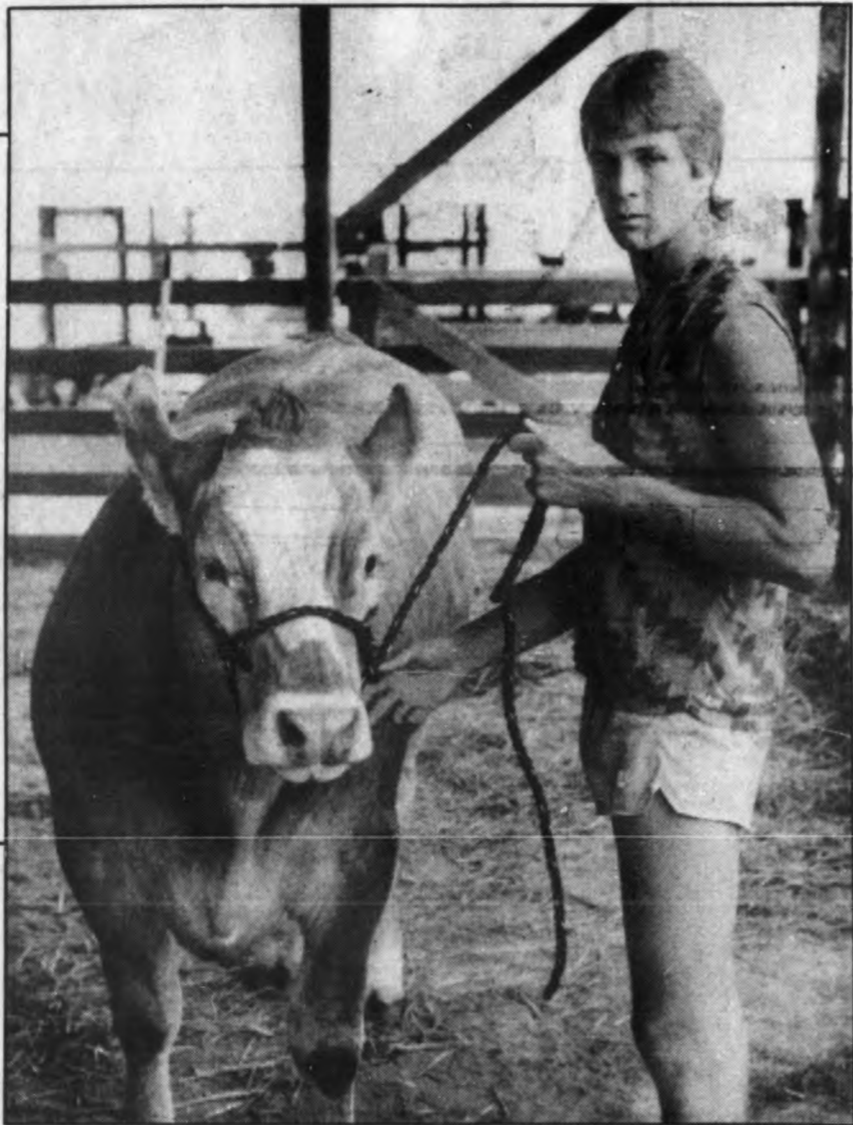

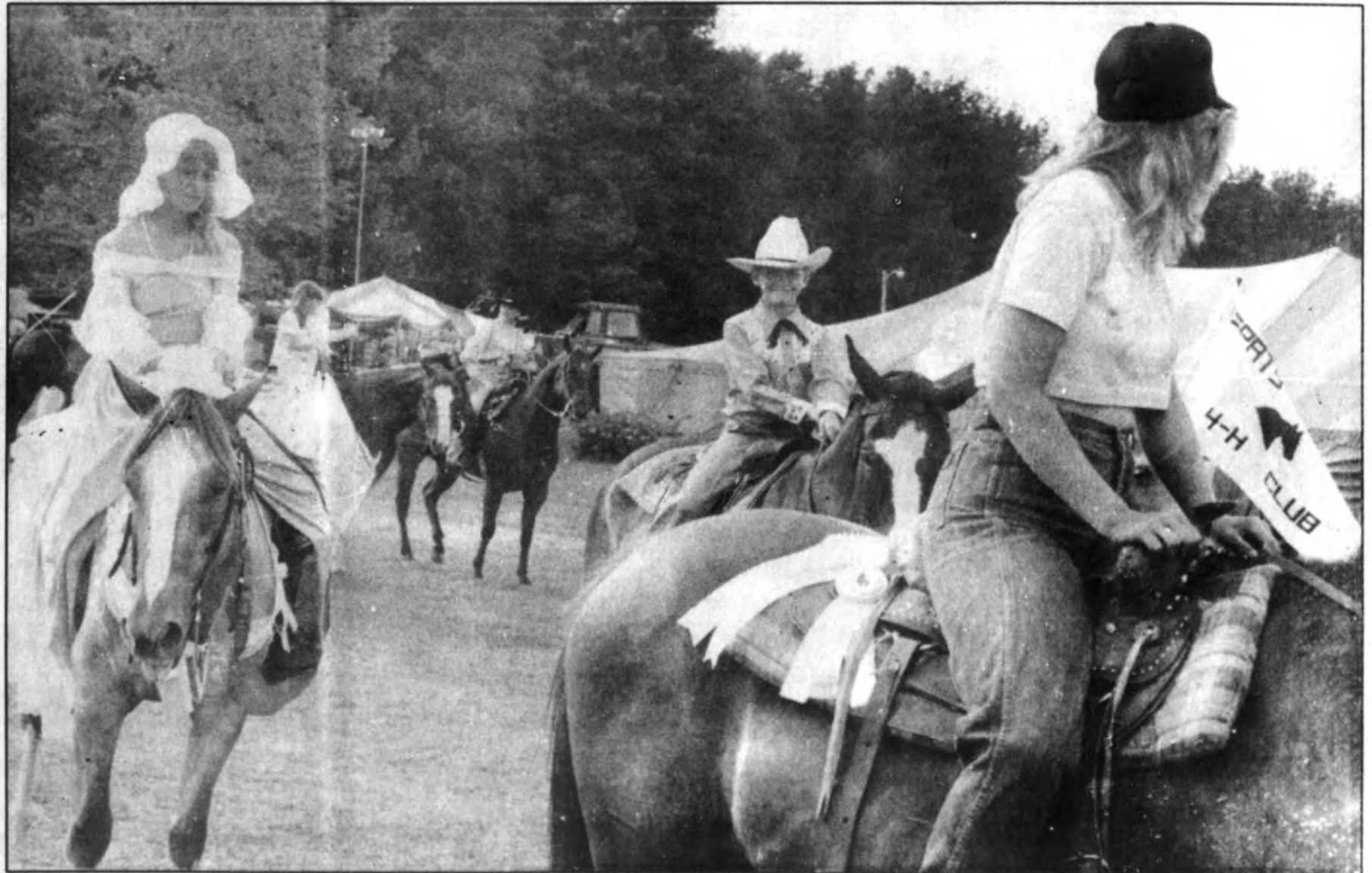

## DeWitt schools replace cut programs

Most of the programs scheduled for reduction or elimination in the DeWitt school system have been taken off the chopping block, after voters approved a 3-mill request by a narrow margin Aug. 5.

Supt. Stephen Garrett says the board of education will have to okay at their Aug. 12 meeting the reinstatement of programs that were already approved for reduction, but that it is their intent to reinstate all programs that were to

be cut for financial reasons.

With one-third of the registered voters in the school district casting ballots, the millage was approved with 588 yes votes (54 percent) and 508 no votes (46 percent).

There were 1,101 ballots cast, but five were considered spoiled and discarded. The DeWitt School system is made up of approximately 3,300 voters.

More people voted in this election than in the April 22 election, where the same 3-mill request failed but a

renewal request, on the same ballot, passed. In April, 945 voters cast their ballots.

Garrett says considering that properties within the city are being reassessed, and that residents already agreed to an additional mill for township fire vehicles this summer, even the narrow victory is a good sign.

"We really appreciate the community and their support of the schools. We want to thank Dr. Michael and everyone that called

and worked on the committee," he says.

"It's going to be much better working in a positive atmosphere," he says, "that's going to be beneficial."

Garrett says that the board could decide not to levy the full 3 mills next year or the year after if it believes it is not needed.

The 3-mill request was for three years, but the district is not required to collect the full amount it has the authority to levy.

Many of the program cuts already approved

have not been implemented, Garrett says, pending the outcome of the millage election.

However, moves have already been made to lay off personnel in conjunction with the program cuts because the teachers' contract requires 30-day notice of termination.

New enrollment figures and the allocation of teachers in the various grades and programs will be studied before any decisions are made to call back teachers, Garrett says.

## Bath Township road projects planned

The Bath Township Board approved two major road projects at its Aug. 5 meeting.

Angle Road, north of Clise to Howe Road, will be widened to prepare the road for future asphaltting. A new culvert will replace the bridge structure, and if homeowners and the road commission can reach an agreement, says Supervisor Richard Brook, the curve will be straightened out somewhat.

The improvements to Angle Road are expected to cost \$34,000.

Howe Road, from Angle Road west, will be widened somewhat. Trees and high banks that reduce visibility of the roadway will be removed, and the low spots

filled in.

The Howe Road project has a projected cost of \$11,000, but Brook says it will probably cost \$8,000 to \$9,000.

Funds for the projects will come from the monies designated for roads in the budget.

IN OTHER ACTION, the board heard from insurance consultant John Wenglarski, who was hired to find the best insurance package for the township.

Wenglarski told the board he will make his final recommendation at the Aug. 19 meeting, but he presented a packet of information comparing four companies.

He told the board that insurance prices have gone up, but it would be impossi-

ble to compare last year's prices with the prices he quoted at the meeting, because the policies are different.

George P. McPhail of

Laingsburg, who carries the township's present policy, submitted a bid of \$49,120. Mickle and Company of Kalamazoo said they would cover the

township for \$68,812. Burnham and Flowers of Kalamazoo submitted a bid of \$43,613, and Bunting and Company of Trenton submitted a bid of \$27,794.

## Fox is concerned

After 10 years of involvement with the City of St. Johns Recreation Department, Greg Fox may be calling it quits at the end of this summer.

The 22-year-old City Rec director feels he has contributed positively to the program, but if he leaves it will be with sadness and concern.

"Ten years ago, softball was a lot bigger around here," Fox said. "But, guys are getting mad about the deteriorating condition of fields. I kind of agree with them."

"I don't want to dig my own grave or chastise my employers — I like my co-workers — but it seems like the people downtown lack the motivation to make the fundamental changes that are necessary."

Fox isn't a disgruntled employee looking to cause grief for City Manager Randy Humphrey or City Assessor Diane Edwards. He is content with his job ("They give me very, very much flexibility"). And I assume the pay is not bugging him ("It's paying my tuition").

No, Greg is simply concerned that something that has become a family tradition to the Foxes is going downhill.

Greg's older brother, Tim, is a former City Rec director. Greg worked his way up the City Rec ladder first as a participant, then as a scorekeeper and umpire.

But, if Greg is right, there may be a day when there is no St. Johns City Rec ladder to climb.

"We used to have 40 to 45 men's teams. Now we're down to 24. At the rate they're going, it (city rec softball) may be non-existent five years from now. I don't want to see that," Fox said.

He said that poor field conditions are the main reason teams are leaving town and individual participation is down.

"The main (city park) diamond used to be one of the nicest around," Fox said. "Now, it is almost unacceptable."

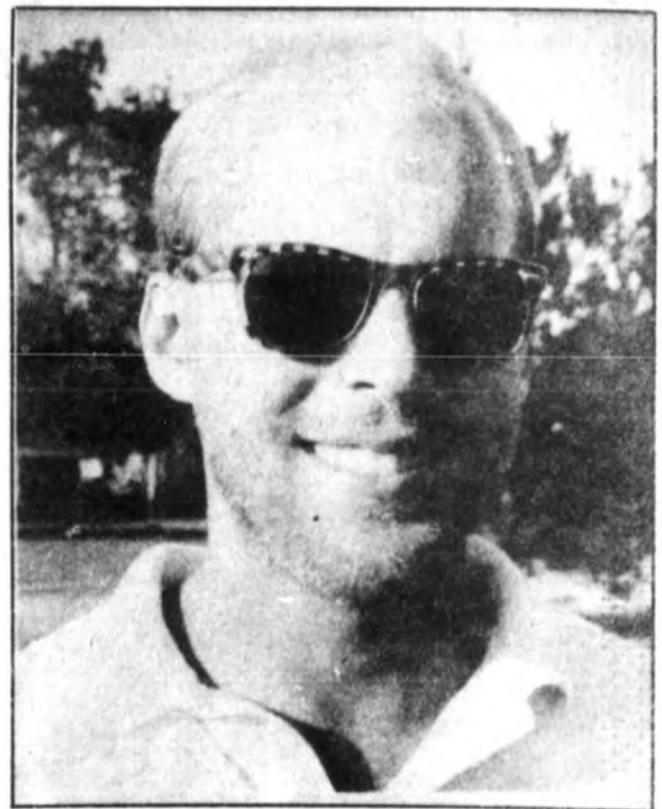
He said the main diamond could also use fence work, there is "serious work to be done" in the Sickles' outfield, and Sickles could also use lights.

Fox is not totally frustrated because he was able to engineer the overhauling of the Sickles infield.

"I wanted to get some of these projects done before I quit," Fox said. "I didn't just want to perpetuate the status quo."

When he is gone Glenn Voisin, currently the co-director, will probably take over the program. Fox says Voisin — or any other City Rec director for that matter — will need help from concerned towns people if the necessary changes are to be made.

"Suggestions are great, but it takes organizing and promoting," Fox said. "They need to organize, maybe

hold a meeting. Then they need to file their grievances — field safety and field quality."

The same is true for programs that people may want but don't see.

Currently, Fox's main thrusts are in field maintenance, scheduling, umpiring, morning youth leagues, and occasional "extras", like Wednesday's kids' bike rally.

There hasn't been much time for anything else.

"Maybe there aren't enough 'movers' in this town to make changes. That might be the problem," he said.

He says the problem can't be money. He estimates that each of the rec softball teams pays at least \$100 into the city's coffers.

"I'm not talking out of both sides of my mouth," Fox said. "I'm just trying to be candid. I don't know if it's a crisis yet or not...."

Nor, does he want it to become one. He just wonders if there are any "movers" out there.

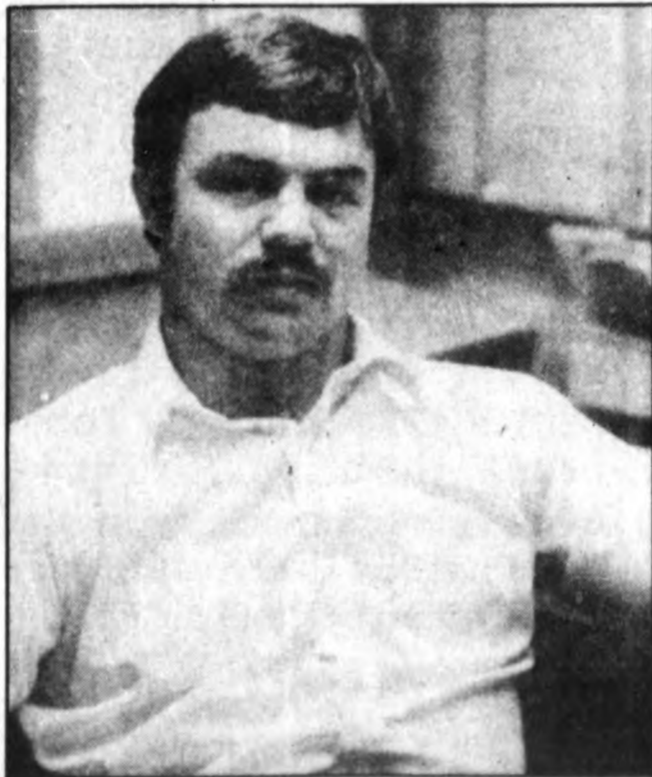
Currently, Boyce is busy getting to know his coaches, and also getting to know his budget.

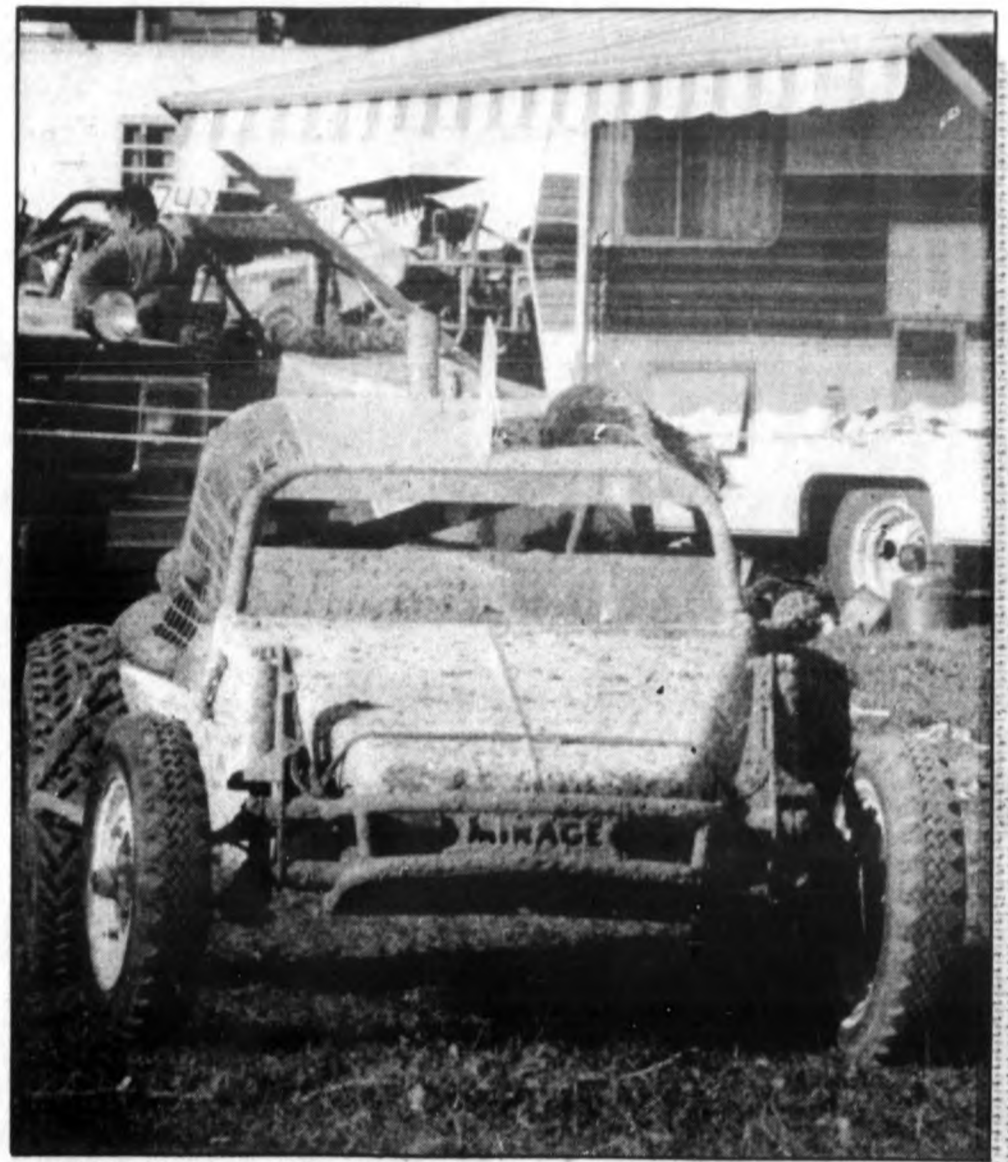

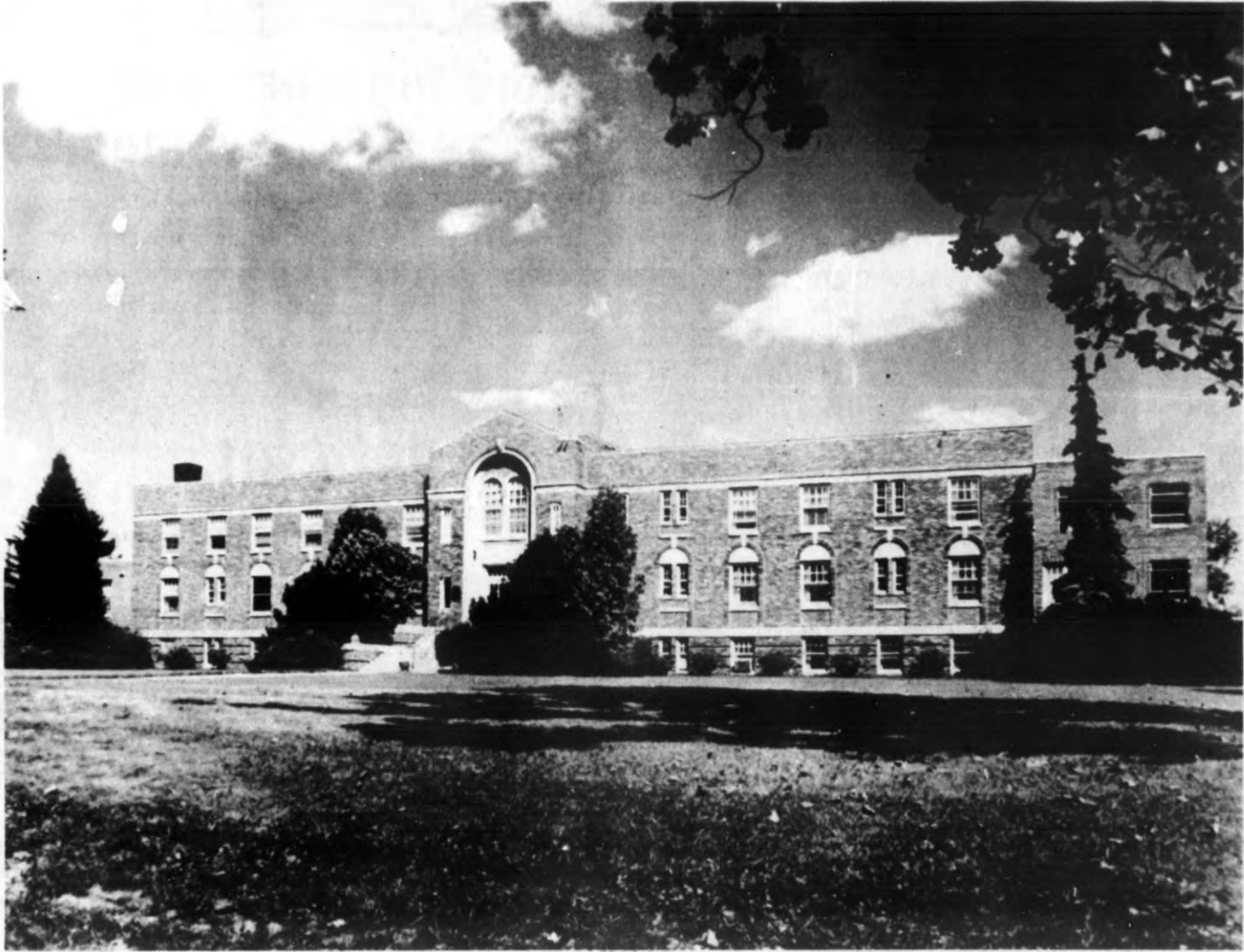

## Bath youth aims to race

At 16, Steve Woodruff is well on his way to achieving one of his lifelong goals: to train and drive his own horses to be successful on the harness race circuit.

Woodruff, a Bath High School junior, is spending the summer at Saginaw Valley Downs race track, training and looking after the two horses he and his father own.

It's something he's wanted to do since he was 10 years old and his father first took him to a harness race track.

His father, DeWitt Township Assessor Thomas Woodruff, says he, too, has always loved to be around horses since his grandfather brought him to the track when he was a youngster.

The father and son team bought their first horse, Warm Memories, in 1982. That horse was sold and now Steve trains a gelding (sterile male), Omaha Chip, and

a mare (female horse over five years old), Glimmer.

Training two trotters takes a lot of work. Woodruff, who is living in a trailer near the stables at the track, is up at 6:30 a.m. to feed the horses and clean the stalls.

"That's the worst part, cleaning the stalls...I like to drive," he says. Horses in harness racing are driven from a carriage called a jog cart, not ridden by a jockey.

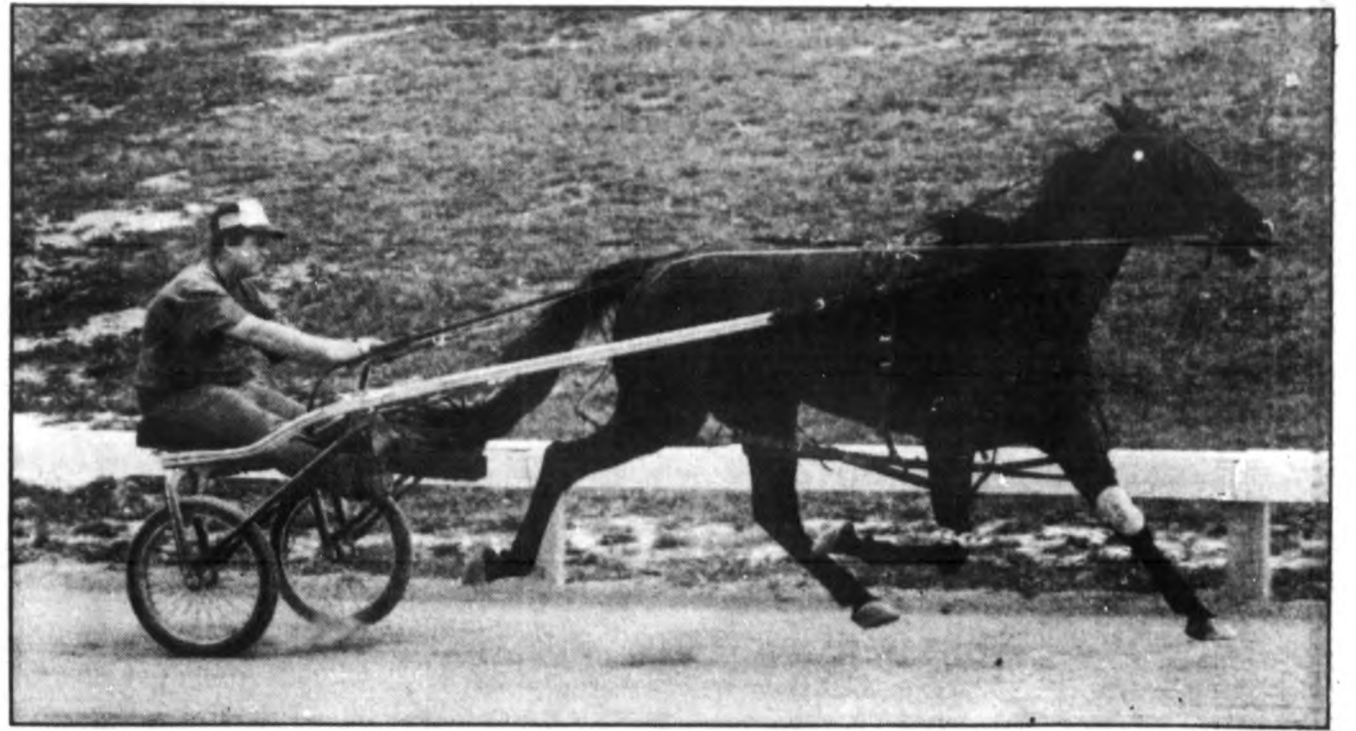
**AFTER HE** takes care of Glimmer and Omaha Chip, he feeds and cleans the stalls of another owner's horses.

Then he jogs the horses — driving them from his perch in the jog cart five miles around the half-mile long course. During a race, the horses run one mile.

After their workout, the horses sweat profusely and must be properly taken care of as they cool down.

Woodruff feeds his horses hay and grain four times a day, and must also buy straw to line the stalls. He says between the two horses he goes through a bale of straw per day.

Racing the horse is what makes cleaning the stalls and routinely jogging the horse worth it. Woodruff

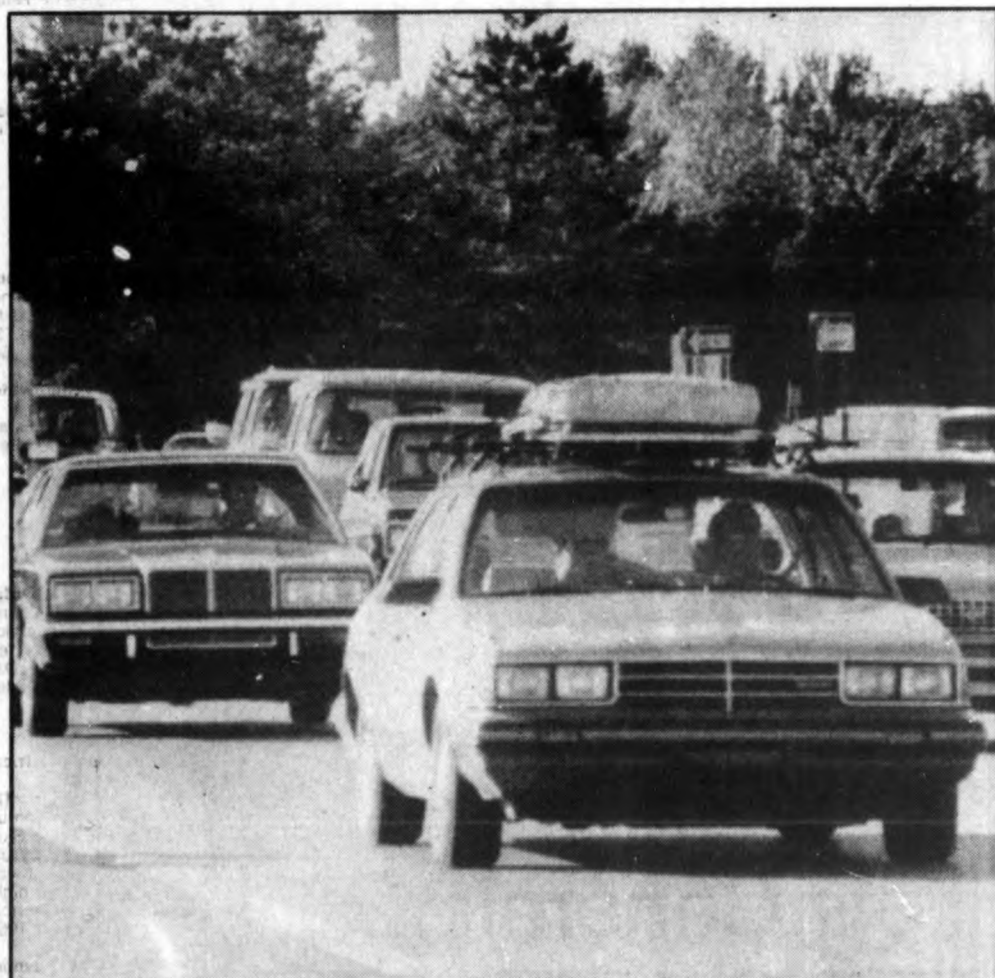

## Nuclear Data Book

A marathon six-year Los Alamos National Laboratory experiment—which produced a one-of-a-kind nuclear "data book" that could prove crucial to man's long-term energy needs—has attracted worldwide attention. The \$2 million project provides information vital to the understanding of fusion reactions, the same

power-producing nuclear process that makes the sun shine.

The project updates scientific experiments dating back some three decades predicting the energy output of fusion reactors that would feed on deuterium and tritium, types of hydrogen representing abundant fuel sources. For example, deuterium is easily taken from ordinary water.

### Slotted floors

With the summer comes a landslide of county fairs and farm expositions. If you have attended any of these this summer you have probably been bombarded with all the new and different flooring types available for swine facilities.

Flooring types for slotted floor facilities come in many varieties. Wood, concrete, metal, and plastic have all been used effectively for slotted floors.

Decisions on what types of slat material to use should be based upon cost, durability, freedom from maintenance, walking ease for the pig, self-cleaning and sanitation characteristics.

Wood slats are the least expensive. However they have only a two to four year life expectancy. Worn or warped slats can also result in poorer pig performance.

Concrete slats are the most durable. They function extremely well for growing-finishing and breeding-gestating facilities. For best results concrete slats should have a smoothness about equal to a machine trowel finish. Concrete floors that are too rough have been shown to result in more injury, lameness, and infection than smooth, clean floors.

For pigs under 40 pounds flattened expanded metal (3/4 inch, 9-11 gauge) has proved to work well.

However, this material has a shorter life span when used for heavier hogs, especially in high traffic areas. If you are looking at expanded metal flooring be certain the underside has been treated with epoxy paint or similar material to prevent corrosion.

Aluminum slotted flooring cleans very well. However, aluminum can be slippery for sows and heavier hogs and can be quite cold for small pigs.

Wire flooring is very popular in farrowing and nursery facilities. When installing wire flooring you should look for wire that has been galvanized before weaving. You should also use three or five gauge wire.

Most importantly you should be certain you have appropriate support under the wire. In most cases support spacings of 12 to 16 inches are adequate.

Limited research and numerous field observations show improved results when suckling and nursery pigs are produced on elevated floors, either coated or uncoated, when compared to floor level production. The reason for this improved performance is that the pigs stay dryer, they are separated for excreta sooner, they are warmer and they suffer fewer abrasions from this material than from concrete.

Baby pig performance has not been shown to be improved by coating the wire or mesh. However, sows may suffer less severe body lesions.

Plastic floors are warmer than concrete and metal and the clean up well. The slats can be slippery for sows and hogs over 100 pounds. If you are considering plastic slats look for good heavy slats or slats with fiberglass strands in them to guard against breaking or sagging. These slats are most popular in partially slotted farrowing floors and nurseries.

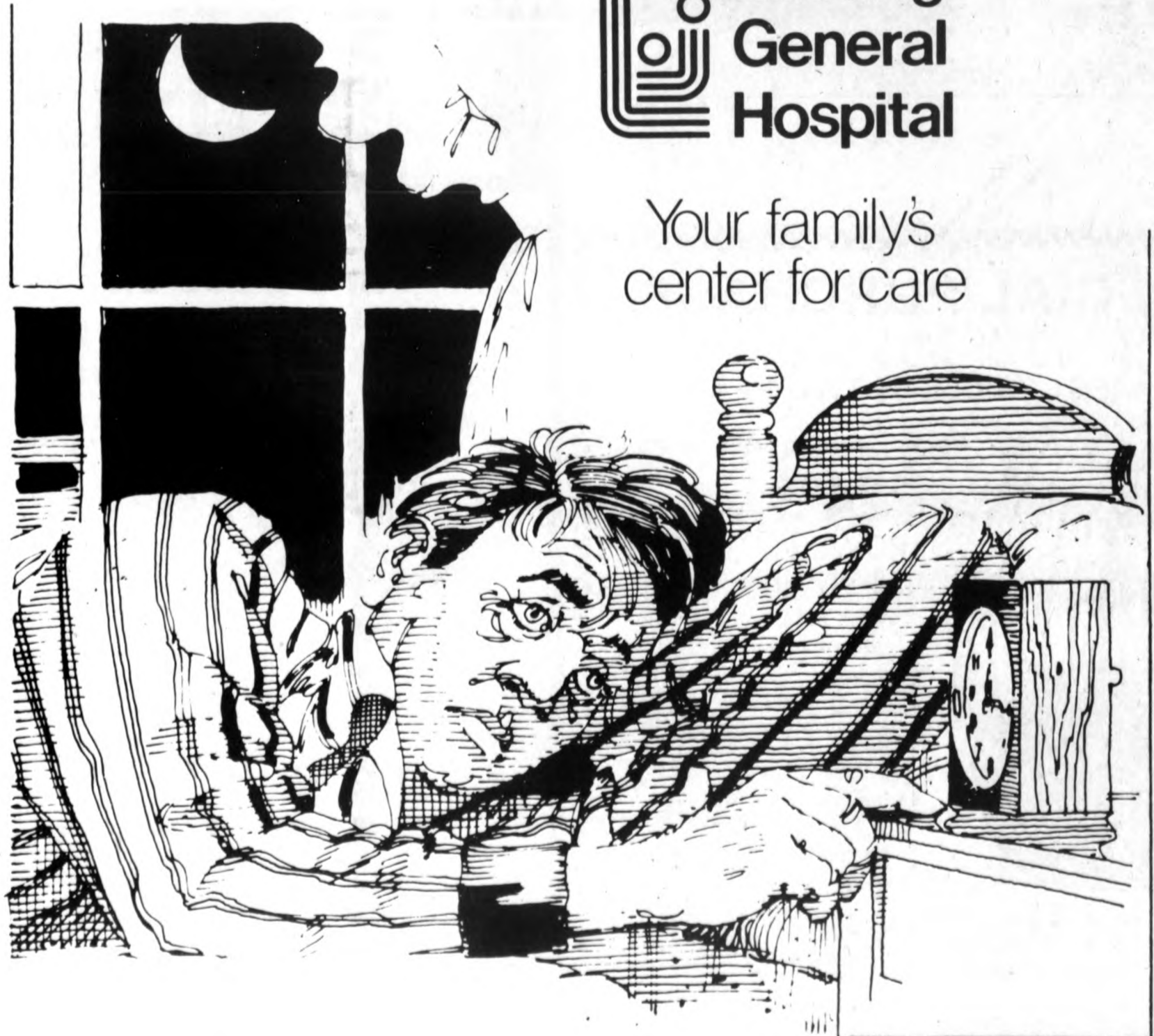

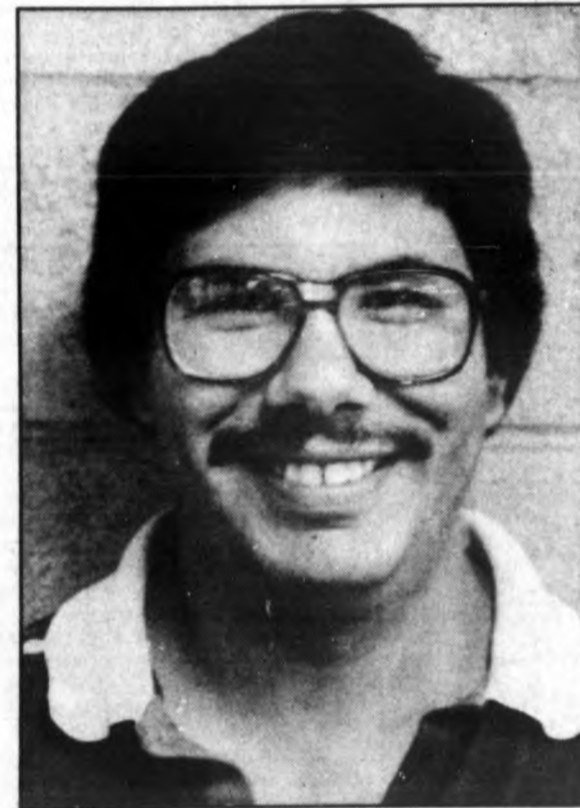

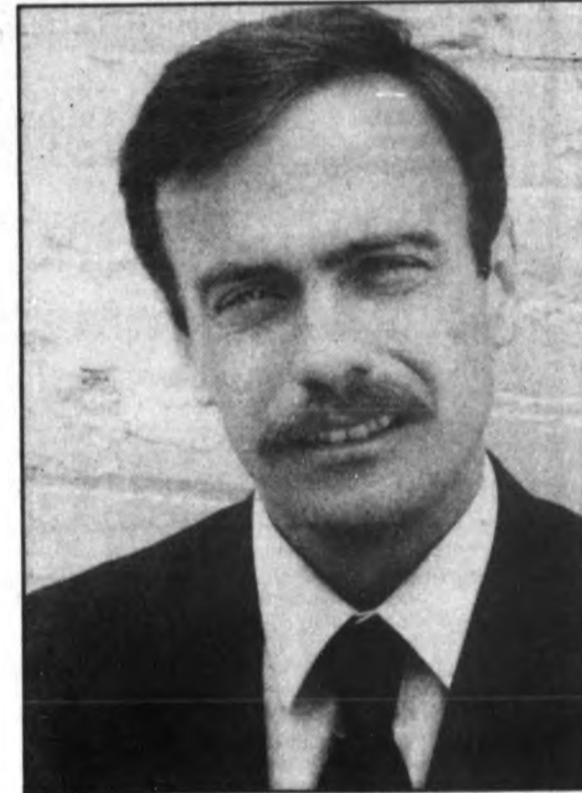
