DSS starts new jobs program

Clinton County is one of six areas in the state included in a pilot program aimed at preventing people who apply for general assistance from becoming dependent on welfare.
Clinton County residents who apply for general assistance in September will be channeled into Project Self-Reliance for personal counseling and job training.
"The ultimate goal of these programs is to assist participants in obtaining full-time, permanent, unsubsidized employment," says Janet Howard Washington, director of the project.
The program will be tested in six areas of the state. Clinton, Eaton and Ingham counties make up one of those six areas.
IN CLINTON COUNTY about 30 GA applicants each month — the average number of monthly applicants — who are deemed "eligible and employable" by the Department of Social Services will be required to participate in a 30-day "Job Club" agency.
The Job Club will include classroom instruction in finding and holding employment. Those in the program will be paid for their participation. The payment will be larger than the standard GA grant, says county DSS worker Jeff Stibitz.
After the 30-day program GA applicants will have a choice of continuing with Manpower employment programs or returning to the DSS for the standard grant.
Those who continue with the program will be referred to one of six employment programs offered by the project. Included are temporary government "work experience" jobs and private sector jobs in which half the salary of each participant is paid for with Project Self-Reliance funds, says John Hollingsworth, county Manpower director.
THE PROGRAM officially begins Oct. 1 and will continue for eight months.
Hollingsworth says the participation of private firms in the project is promising in that the jobs they provide will likely offer more opportunity for advancement than the government jobs into which the unemployed have been placed in past programs.
However, he says, the participation of private companies is not expected to come easily.
"The private sector is not so used to this," he said. "We're going to have to do a little bit of a selling job...convince them we're not the forerunner of the IRS."

Insurance cost rises for county

Clinton County was hit last month by the same skyrocketing insurance costs that have affected other county and municipal governments in Michigan this year. But the county covered the increased cost without tapping its contingency fund.
The cost to the county for police officer liability insurance rose from the annual rate of approximately \$7,400 to approximately \$22,000, said Clinton County Administrator William LeFevre Aug. 6.
The company that previously carried the insurance notified the county in July that it was pulling out of Michigan and would no longer carry the insurance, LeFevre said.
County administrators were able to locate only one company to carry the insurance, he said.
ALTHOUGH THE cost of the new policy was about three times the cost of the previous policy the county did have funds in the insurance portion of the budget to cover the increase, LeFevre said.
Clinton County joins other county, school and municipal governments in the state that have seen insurance costs escalate rapidly this year. Certain types of coverage have been in short supply, making it difficult for some governments to obtain coverage at all.
The shrinking supply of insurance coverage for governments has been blamed on big money awards in lawsuits against governments and on lower interest rates. As interest rates decrease insurance firms reap smaller returns on their investments, making it harder for them to absorb insurance losses.

Liquor permit request tabled

After listening to strongly stated arguments on both sides the St. Johns City Commission Aug. 12 tabled a request by the Little Ceasars restaurant in the Southpoint Mall for approval of a Class C liquor license.
The license would allow the business to serve beer, wine and spirits for consumption on the premises.
Restaurant owner Ron Margetin had asked the commission to approve his request to the Liquor Control Commission (LCC). The LCC will grant the license only with the approval of the City Commission.
A decision by the City Commission to either approve or disapprove the license requires three votes. The decision was tabled since only three of the five commissioners were present at the meeting. Two of the commissioners at the meeting indicated opposition to the license and one indicated support, which meant neither side would have had three votes if a vote had been taken.
MARGETIN MADE A brief presentation to the commissioners in which he described a 3,500 square foot expansion project in which his restaurant will be converted from

carry-out only into a full service restaurant. The staff of the restaurant will increase from 15 to 50 with the expansion, he said.
The restaurant will not have a bar for customers, he said, and alcohol will be served only to customers who purchase food.

Dick Zimmerman, owner of the Southpoint Mall, spoke in favor of the license. He said approval of the license would be beneficial to the mall in that it would attract more business. He said the community would benefit from more jobs and increased tax revenue.
"Margetin has operated a very clean operation, with quality people, a quality product, at fair prices," Zimmerman said.
SPEAKING IN OPPOSITION to the license was Patsy Coffman, 206 S. Swegles, St. Johns. Coffman, a teacher for 12 years, said approval of the license would contribute to drunk

driving.
"No matter how gorgeous it (the restaurant) is, even if the alcohol is served on golden platters in silver chalices, the kids who hurt themselves are going to be dirty and bloody..." she said.
She said the commission should not be swayed by economic arguments in favor of the license.
"Even if it employs 20,000 people — what difference does it make if one person is hurt," she said. "It's not worth it."
Charles R. Jones, senior vice-president of Little Ceasars, told the commission that the restaurant will be designed to attract families, not a heavy drinking clientele.
"There are no barstools," he said. "This is a family restaurant... This is not a shot and a beer place."
Coffman repeated her opposition to the license. "I just want to know how the alcohol would be different whether it is drunk from a barstool or not," she said.
JONES SAID: "I think it's the difference in the type of clientele we attract."
J. Humenik, 302 W. Gibbs, St. Johns, spoke in favor of the license. He said the Mint Festival recently demonstrated the ability of St. Johns to attract large numbers of people.

"Next year are we going to have enough restaurants to serve all those people at the Mint Festival?" he said.
Dale Coffman, the husband of Patsy Coffman, asked if the restaurant will be converted to full service even if the liquor license is not approved.
"Yes it will," answered Margetin.
Commissioner Raymond G. Parr directly stated opposition to the license. Vice Mayor Richard E. Starck did not state directly that he was opposed to the license but he did express agreement with remarks Parr made in opposition to the license.

Commissioner Thomas G. Wiseman indirectly indicated support for the license when he moved to table the matter on the grounds that a split vote was probable.
Mayor John W. Arehart and Commissioner Benson S. Munger were not present at the meeting.

City Clerk Richard Coletta said after the meeting that the last time anyone requested a Class C liquor license in St. Johns was "15 or 20 years" ago.

- 4 eggs
- 1 8-oz. pkg. chocolate chips
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 cup oil
- 4 oz. unsweetened chocolate, melted
- 2 tsp. vanilla powdered sugar

Sift dry ingredients on waxed paper. Mix oil, melted chocolate, and sugar in a bowl. Beat in one egg at a time until mixed. Add vanilla, stir in dry ingredients. Then add chocolate chips.

Chill several hours. Roll into balls and then roll into powdered sugar. Bake at 350° for 8 to 10 minutes.

water. A milk solution of water and baking soda — a mild alkali — can be used to clean appliances, metal sinks, fiberglass tubs and other surfaces. Because milk is nonabrasive, it will not damage these surfaces.

Ammonia, a stronger alkali, can be dissolved in water and used to clean painted surfaces, greasy film on windows or other glass, or grease on range

burners and ovens. Laundry detergents, which are also alkaline, can be used for similar cleaning tasks. These products are a relatively inexpensive and can be made into different strength cleaning solutions for specific tasks when needed.

Inexpensive milk acids such as vinegar can be used to remove soap film and mineral deposits left by hard water. In a water

solution they can be used to clean window glass. When heated they can dissolve lime from teakettles and pans.

Chlorine bleach makes an excellent disinfectant and mildew remover and if used carefully can also remove many stains.

Irrigation

Now is the time to decide if an irrigation system would be economically worthwhile so that, if the answer is yes, it can be installed by next season. "Irrigation is a type of crop insurance policy because it provides consistent crop quality and yields," says Gerald Schwab, extension agricultural economist at Michigan State University. Each farmer's situation is different, so each producer needs to figure out whether an irrigation system will pay for itself within a given time, which is usually between five and ten years, Schwab says. Producers first need to estimate how much they expect yields to increase if they irrigate. Most people can expect at least a 50 bushel per acre increase in corn yields, especially on sandy soils, Schwab says. This will increase profits, but farmers need to ask themselves if it will cover the cost of the system. Producers get tax credits when they install irriga-

tion systems, such as investment tax credit of ten percent of the system's cost, and depreciation credits, Schwab says. These tax breaks can make irrigation installation a good idea, but producers should remember to consider the cost of borrowing money to pay for the system.

Talk with neighbors who have irrigation systems to make comparisons with your farm, Schwab advises. Also look for MSU trial sites in your area to see how systems have performed on soils similar to those on your farm, he says.

"Spending more money is not always the best way to increase farm profitability, so producers should make sure profits outweigh costs before installing an irrigation system," Schwab concludes. George McQueen is the Director of the Clinton County Cooperative Extension Service.

Milk machines

Do you remove the milking machine properly? According to Dr. John Kirk of the MSU College of Veterinary Medicine this may be the most important step in milking the cow.

The proper way to remove the milker is to determine that milk flow has stopped, shut off the vacuum to all four quarters and remove the four teat cups at the same time. Not following this procedure may result in the spread of bacteria from one infected quarter to another within the same cow.

The reason bacteria can be spread so easily from one quarter to another at the end of milking is because the streak canal is wide open at this time. Removing a single teat cup without turning the

vacuum off will cause a rush of air into the bowl of the milk claw and up one of the remaining cups. This surge of air may carry milk droplets laden with bacteria which can be injected into the teat through the open canal. This same mechanism can occur when all four teat cups are removed before the vacuum is shut off.

Proper milker removal technique is very important in controlling cross-quarter infections. Check your technique. Take off all four year cups at the same time, after the vacuum has been shut off and see if there is an improvement in udder health.

Kellogg station opens state-of-art dairy barn for research and tours

On the farms of the past, a farmer and his family did all of the work with the possible aid of a hired hand or two. As farms got larger and more complex, more help was needed. As time goes on, however, it may be possible to manage all the chores of the farm without any more labor than was needed 50 years ago. With new technology, more and more farms are becoming efficient and computerized, making them cheaper to run and easier to operate.

Dairy farming is no exception. Michigan's third largest industry is farming and dairy farming is the largest part of Michigan's agriculture. This makes it a priority topic of research and education at the Michigan State University Kellogg Biological Station. The newest addition to

the station is the Kellogg Dairy. It will be unveiled for an open house and formal dedication on Aug. 28.

The dairy will be used as a working model for education and research. The 128 Holstein cows that make up its herd will be milked the same as those on a commercial dairy farm. But they will also be part of a laboratory for scientists and an example for farmers.

The entire system is energy and labor efficient, from the milk parlor to the field. Though most of the equipment is available to commercial farmers no single farm utilizes all of it, according to Dairy Manager Rob Ashley.

Anyone interested in seeing the future of dairy farming is welcome to come investigate the Kellogg Dairy on Aug. 28. Dairy

specialists from MSU will be on hand to explain exactly how the equipment works and to answer questions about the energy efficiency, labor conservation, resource considerations, and any other aspects of the dairy.

One way to help control weeds is to plant soybeans solid rather than row-seeding them. Many weeds are not shade tolerant and it can also increase soybean yields. The narrow rows that go with soybean solid seeding eliminate the option of cultivation, however. Knowing what your weed problems are can help you decide whether solid seeding is appropriate.

If you have questions about weed control strategies, talk with your county MSU Cooperative Extension Service director or agriculture agent.

Schmitt, a catcher, has designs on coaching at the major level she now plays at. McKean, meanwhile, fits the stereotype of the infielder. She is a short, lean shortstop.

McKean leads off in the Renegade line-up, while Schmitt bats third.

How they arrived at playing at the highest level of competitive softball for women is an easy story to trace.

The late Clare "Butch" Snyder contacted the pair in 1977 when he was forming a women's team in Fowler called, the Oilers.

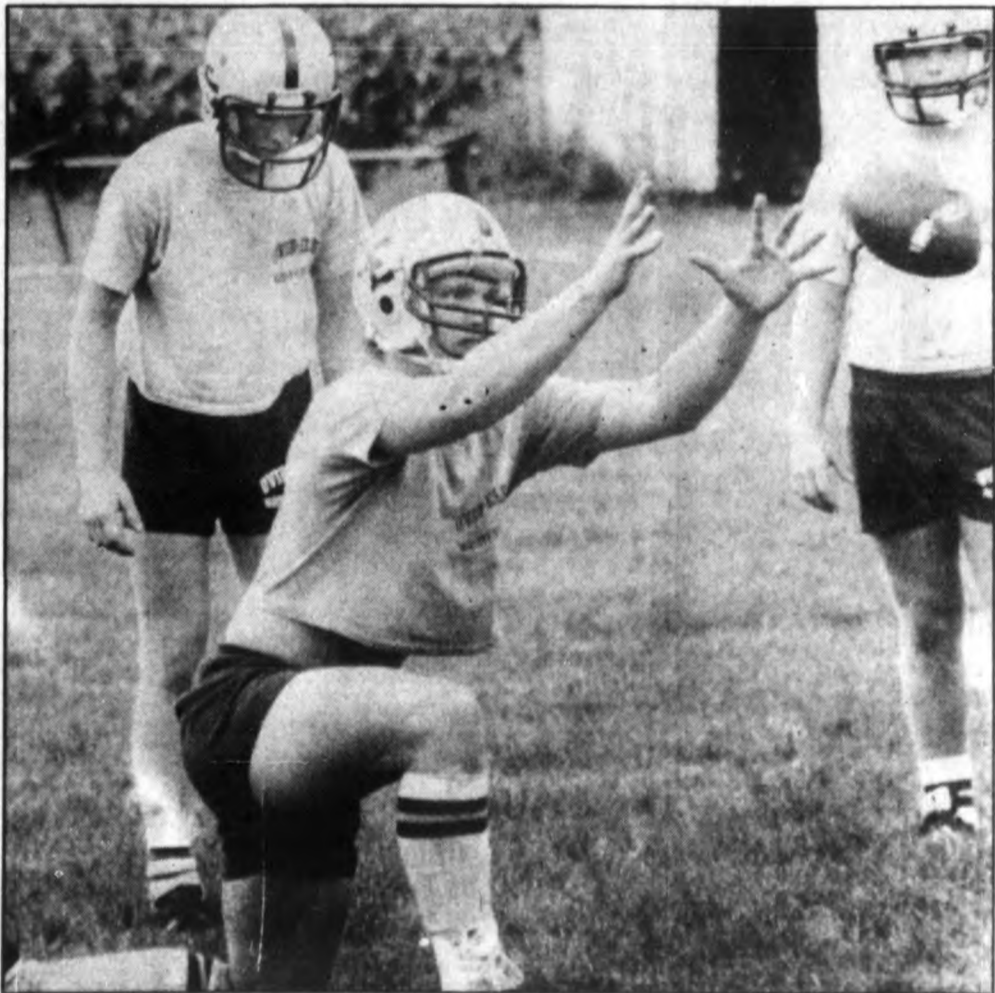

Outdoors
Nature at its best

Several years ago, when I began planning my hideaway cottage "The Write House," I vowed that it would be a rustic, vacation spot. Too many of my friends had built second homes as northern cottages and spend most all of every vacation doing there what they do at home the rest of the year. I didn't want that.

When my friend, Greg, and I actually began to erect the structure, the same thoughts prevailed through the planning. Keep things as they are as much as possible. Let things grow where they want to. Mostly, I wanted to heal the scars left by the digging of a foundation and get nature back as it had been as soon as the basic construction would allow.

I'll admit to planting a row of pines as a buffer between the cabin and the old road behind the property. I'll even admit to starting a bed of leeks in the woods and to throwing out a pound or two of rye grass seed to grow and green where other plants were reluctant to begin. We even planted myrtle to help prevent erosion by the driveway in.

But the wild strawberries are there because they chose to grow there, as are the blackberries in the hollow and the wild columbine that brightens the base of the building itself. Under the nearby oaks, maples, sassafras, wild cherry, and poplars, are fiddlehead ferns and wintergreen, and banks of the fragrant bayberry bushes. These grow where they have chosen to grow and their choice has been better than what I might have made.

Does this still sound like I'm crazy? I have known a number of people who would have cut all these plants back and put in a lush green lawn, appropriately broken by decorative shrubs and beds of domestic flowers. I love their yards in the city, but in the woods they make me uneasy.

Deer bed down on the little rises on both sides of my cottage, because they can be in the ferns under the dump of maples, concealed and cooled by the foliage of the bushes and the trees. Their imprints are visible in the crushed vegetation where they've rested, and their tracks across the corner of my land are clear.

The route was there when I built and I am happy I have not caused a detour by my building.

Rabbits den in the heavy brush beneath the wild cherries. Squirrels and grouse cross the land; their tracks are visible in the snow and sand. Bird sounds punctuate the whisper of breezes in the tall trees and at night fireflies compete with the stars to light the paths of those who love to wander the trails as I do.

So why do I say all this? Few that would build a summer cottage would quarrel with the joy of experiencing the sights and sounds I have described. I guess I say these things as a reminder to all of us that nature is at her best when observed. When we try to keep her at bay the real beauty is lost in simply another kind of work.

A summer vacation spot should be fun! I must remember to keep it that way at "The Write Place."

One dead in car accident

The Clinton County Sheriff's Dept. is investigating an automobile accident in Bingham Twp. in which a Lansing man was killed Aug. 11.

Mark Douglas Pick, of Lansing, was killed when his car was struck head on by a car driven by Joseph L. Vermeersch of St. Johns. Pick was driving north in the south bound lane of US-27, according to a Sheriff's Dept. report.

Vermeersch and a passenger were treated at Clinton Memorial Hospital and released, the report said.

"Alcohol was involved and seatbelts were not worn," the report said. The report did not specify which automobile the statement referred to.

Assisting at the scene of the accident were the St. Johns Police Dept., the Clinton Area Ambulance Service and the St. Johns Fire and Rescue Squad. The rescue squad used the device known as the "jaws of life" to extricate the victim from his vehicle, the report said.

A Westphalia woman was injured in an

automobile accident Aug. 10 on M-21.

Joan M. Theis was east bound on M-21 when she realized the car in front of her was stopping to turn, the Sheriff's Dept. report said. She veered into a ditch to avoid hitting the other car and was injured, the report said.

She was treated for injuries at Clinton Memorial Hospital. The report said she was wearing a seatbelt and that no citations were issued.

Three people were injured in an Aug. 10 accident at the intersection of US-27 and Cutler Road.

Linda M. Cooley, of Lansing, was towing a trailer on Cutler Road and failed to stop at the intersection, the Sheriff's Dept. report said. Her vehicle was struck by a northbound vehicle driven by Harold C. LaCombe, of Wyandotte, the report said. Both vehicles travel across the south bound lane of US-27

Fulton welcomes students

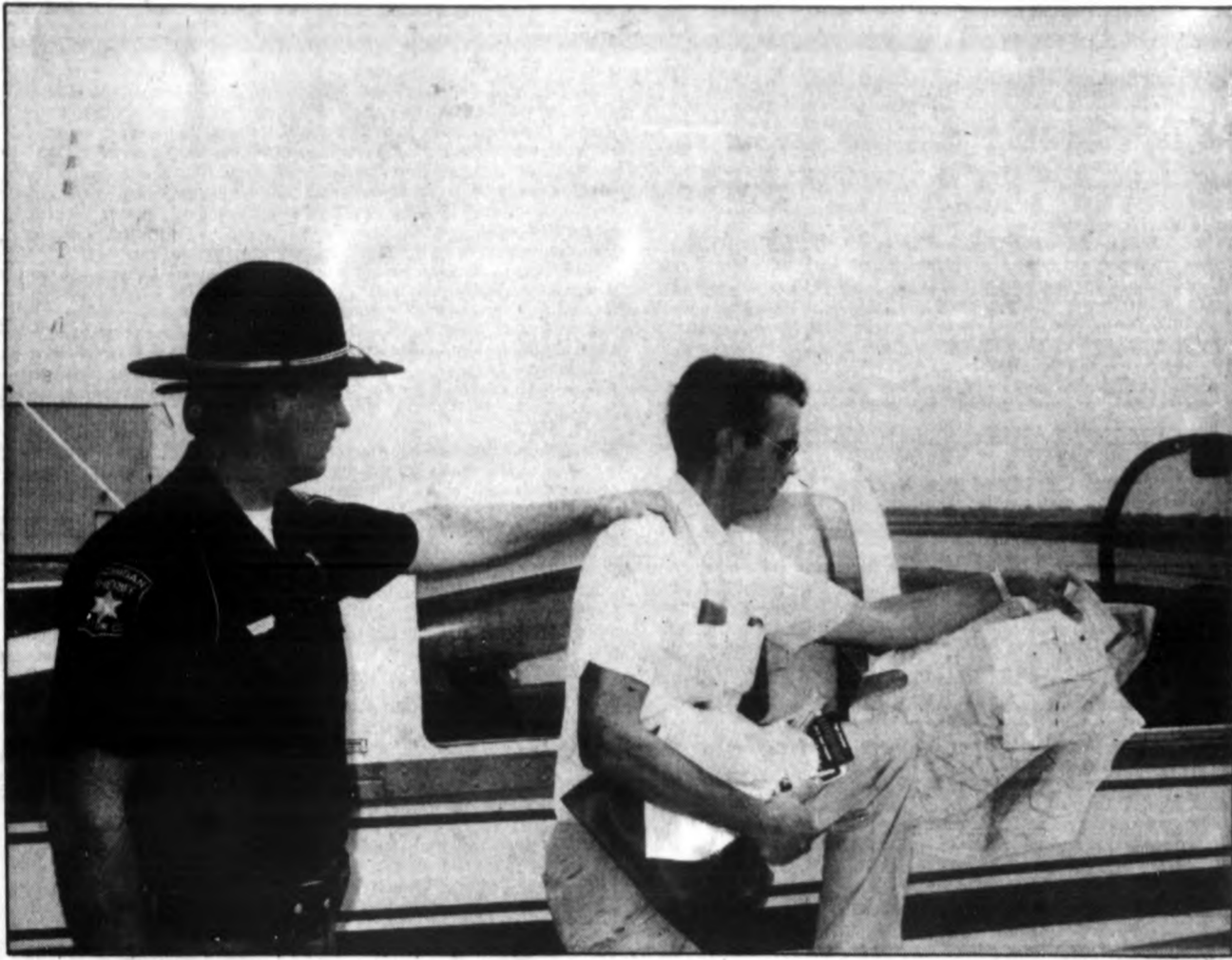

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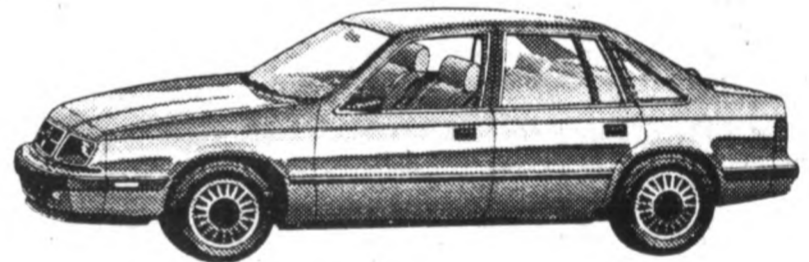
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1985-86 BUS ROUTE INFORMATION

The 1985-86 bus routes are listed below. For the most part they are the same as last year and being driven by the same driver. The school starting and dismissal times have also remained the same, so the majority of students can plan on being picked up at the same time as last year. To be on the safe side, the first week of school everyone should allow at least 15 minutes extra time in preparation for the arrival of the bus.

As you review the bus route, you may find that the bus doesn't travel your road, in which case you will have to see that the students arrive at the corner nearest their home where the bus will be picking them up and dropping them in the evening.

Kindergarten pick up and delivery is at the door of the student's home. If the kindergarten is not on the a.m. p.m. route, students in other grades in that vicinity will be asked to find their own way to or from the corner stop.

We will not be sending notices to those who have to get to corners, so read the routes carefully. The driver will also be asking students to group at various stop locations on a main route to reduce stops and make shorter run times.

All routes reflect the intent of the rules and regulations of the State of Michigan regarding the transportation of students.

Rider Safety
The drivers will be handing each rider a copy of the bus rules of the St. Johns schools. Take time to review them with your youngsters. A few things are extremely important:

1. Watch for cars and other vehicles at all times, don't rely only on the red flashing lights of a bus for total protection. It is a law that all vehicles must stop when the red lights are running and the bus is stopped.

2. Walk at least 15 feet in front of the bus when crossing the road so that the driver can see you at all times and at least 25 feet to the side of the bus before the bus pulls away.

3. Do not go to your mailbox until the bus has left the area and you can safely see all moving vehicles.
These three areas cause the bus drivers their major concerns for your students' safety.

Help for children home alone: Learning to deal with potentially dangerous situations

There are more than five million latchkey children in the United States—children ages five to 13 who spend time at home alone while their parents work.

Cause for concern

Latchkey children are a cause for growing concern among parents and others worried about their safety and development. While some point out benefits to children who care for themselves, such as a sense of independence, other people believe it is dangerous both physically and psychologically to leave children at home alone—particularly those under nine years old.

For some parents there are few alternatives. Babysitters can be expensive. There are not enough qualified day care or extended school day programs to meet the needs of every community. Employer-supported child care centers are few.

The National PTA believes that, ideally, children under the age of 13 should be supervised before and after school by a re-

sponsible adult. However, parents who must leave their children at home alone should discuss safety and crime prevention with them, says the PTA.

The 5.6 million member child-advocacy organization also suggests teaching children how to cope with being alone, how to handle routine activities such as homework, and how to deal with potentially dangerous situations.

Expert advice

Here is advice to parents from "Latchkey Children: Young Children at Home Alone," prepared by the National Crime Prevention Council in cooperation with the National PTA.

- Teach children to memorize their name, address, city and state, and their phone number. Make sure they know how to use both a push button and dial phone and how to reach the operator.

- Tell them to check in with you or a neighbor immediately after getting home. Teach them never to go in if the door is ajar or a window is broken.

- Make sure your children know how to get out of the house safely in case of fire.

- Teach them how to answer the doorbell and telephone when they're home alone.

- If you aren't going to be home at your regular time, tell your children.

- Tell them never to go anywhere with another adult, even one who says you have sent him or her. Adopt a family code word to use if you must ask a third party to pick up your children.

- Urge children not to go home if they feel they're being followed, but to run to the nearest public place or neighbor instead.

- Encourage them to tell you if anything happens while you are away that made them feel uncomfortable in any way.

SAMPLE PUBLIC RELEASE FOR FREE AND REDUCED PRICE MEALS

On August 16, 1985, Clinton County Intermediate School District on behalf of the six constituent schools today announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast or Commodity School Programs. The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility:

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, households should fill out the form and return it to the school. Additional copies of the application form are available at the principal's office in each school. Households should answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain all of the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income AND the amount and source of income received by each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR the household's food stamp case number if the household is on food stamps; (2) names of all household members; (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older, or the word "none" for any adult household member who does not have a social security number; and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and verifying data. Applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If children are approved for free or reduced price meal benefits, the household must report to the school increases in household income over \$50 per month (\$600 per year) and decreases in household size.

Households may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible but has a decrease in household income, an increase in household size or if a household member becomes unemployed, the household should fill out an application at that time.

In certain cases foster children are eligible for these benefits regardless of the household's income. If a household has foster children living with them and they wish to apply for free or reduced-price meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

Under the provisions of the policy Larry A. Schwartzkopf will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. The household also has the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Clinton County I.S.D., Box 207, St. Johns. Each school has a copy of the complete policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

In the operation of the child feeding programs no child will be discriminated against on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.
