Schools may close early if vote on millage increase is rejected

The St. Johns Board of Education, faced with the task of explaining to voters what will happen if they reject the requested 3.5 mill increase Sept. 10, has opted not to cut programs if the request is rejected.

The Board opted instead, in that case, to operate with existing programs intact until the money runs out, at which time the schools would be closed for the year.

The closings could come as soon as March 1, said Asst. Supt. for Business Richard Terres in a telephone conversation Aug. 29.

Terres also said a memo distributed to Board members by Supt. Earl Gabriel listed four possible effects of early school closing. They were:

•An adverse effect on a select group of seniors. (This could include seniors who need credit from spring

sports in order to graduate. With early school closing it is possible there would be no spring sports.)

•Potential litigation by employee groups.

•Unknown effects upon underclassmen in regards to graduation credits.

•State-ordered opening of the schools which would require an even higher millage increase than was proposed for this year.

The decision was made in a close vote at a special meeting Aug. 26. Board members William McCarthy, Marilyn Newman, Tom Irrer and Peter Apostol voted in favor of the plan. Voting against the plan were Board members Gary Whitford, Eugene Livingston and Bob Craig.

Those who voted against the early-closing alternative favored cutting the budget in the event voters reject the millage request. Cutting the budget would allow the schools to stay open for the full year.

THE TWO ALTERNATIVES have become increasingly defined at recent Board meetings even as all the members agreed the millage increase is necessary. Those who favored the early-closing alternative argued that programs have already been cut to the bone and that further cuts would severely damage the quality of education throughout the year. Cuts in the curriculum would be ineffective, the argument went, since cuts in that area would mean less state aid for the district.

It was also argued that proposing budget cuts suggests to voters that there is remaining fat to be trimmed from the budget — that some current programs are not necessary or important — which is a notion rejected by those who favored the early-closing alternative.

Those favoring the budget-cut alternative argued that their plan was more fiscally responsible and that the specter of budget cuts would

be more likely to influence voters to support the millage increase.

Board Secretary Robert Craig, one of the three to vote against the early-closing alternative, said in a telephone interview Aug. 29 that he thought budget cuts would have been more fiscally responsible than closing the schools early.

"I WOULD NOT operate my business that way," he said.

Craig said keeping the school open for the full year would assure seniors of graduating. He also said he suspects the state will force the schools to borrow money to continue operating, which would in turn require an even higher millage request next year.

"I will say that even though we were a minority (of the vote) we are members of the Board and will support the majority," Craig added. "That's the duty of a board member."

Little Caesars license approved

The St. Johns City Commission, before an audience that completely filled the Commission chambers, voted Aug. 26 to approve a Class C Liquor License for the Little Caesars restaurant in the Southpoint Mall.

Before taking the vote the Commission listened to at least a dozen people in the audience speak in support of the license. St. Johns residents and merchants and an employee of Little Caesars said restaurant owners Ron and Pam Margetin have a track record of responsibility in managing their business and have demonstrated concern for the community.

"If there is a right way to open a new restaurant that sells alcohol in St. Johns then it is the way Little Caesars has done it," said one resident.

The lone voice of dissent was that of Dale Coffman, 206 S. Swegles, St. Johns. Coffman, along with his wife Patsy, spoke in opposition to the license at another Commission meeting Aug. 12.

At the Aug. 26 meeting Coffman said he had in his work as a paramedic seen too many traffic deaths caused by drunk drivers and that he did not believe

The Board named Lois Bracey and William Brook to the EDC board for the duration of the project. They will serve as representatives of neighborhood residents and business likely to be affected by the project. There are fewer than 18 such residents, property owners or businesses, or by law a citizens council would have had to have been formed.

City to eye zoning

The St. Johns Planning Commission will consider a request from an Ottawa St. property owner to change a city block from residential to commercial zoning.

The request was referred to the Planning Commission by the City Commission Aug. 26.

The block is between N. Ottawa and N. Lansing streets, bounded on the south by W. Higham St. and on the north by W. Railroad St.

Al Marrah, 309 W. Ottawa St., the property owner making the request, asked that the zoning of the block be changed from high density residential to general commercial so he can start a retail floor-covering business. Marrah is the majority property owner on the block.

All but one of the property owners of the block signed the request for the zoning change. James Ward, 300 N. Lansing St., who did not sign, said in a telephone interview that his first concern about the proposed change was the effect it may have on traffic on Lansing St.

Ward said his family is planning to move from their home on the block but that they did not intend to sell the property. They will rent to a family that, like his own, includes children, he said.

He said he also does not know how the zoning change would affect property values on the block. He said the change would prevent rebuilding residential homes on the block in the event they were destroyed by fire and that anything short of heavy industry could establish itself on the block if the Marrah property for any reason changed ownership.

City Administrator Diane Edwards, asked about Ward's concerns, said the zoning change would prevent residential homes on the block from being rebuilt if they were more than 60 percent destroyed. She also said commercial zoning would permit commercial establishments, such as offices or retail stores, but not industrial operations on the block.

Marrah, the majority property owner on the block, said in the zoning change application that the change is not expected to generate additional traffic near the block.

In making the referral the City Commission asked the Planning Commission to also review the overall zoning structure of the downtown area and come up with what City Clerk Richard Coletta later called a "plan, policy and criteria for growth, planning and rezoning."

The remarks Starck agreed with were those of Commissioner Thomas Wiseman and were not indicative of Starck's position regarding approval of the license.

Starck voted to approve the license at the Aug. 26 commission meeting.

It was incorrectly reported in the Aug. 27 article titled "Schools

battle deficit" that the replacement of three resigning teachers with new hires will save the St. Johns School District about \$100,000 next year. The projected savings, later adjusted to \$90,000, will actually come from the replacement of seven teachers and a less costly fringe benefit package included in the new teaching contract.

The Aug. 20 article titled "Video mint" quoted a \$30 rental charge for video tapes of the Mint Festival available through the Chamber of Commerce. The \$30 is the purchase price. The tapes are not available for rental.

In the mood

Unfortunately most people do not need a mood ring to tell them what mood they are in, but our lives do seem to be governed by our behavioral moods.

Procrastinate

Conquer procrastination

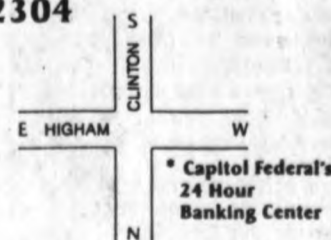

Family focus

Frozen veggies Dawn Harris

Late summer offers a plentiful supply of fresh vegetables ready for freezing. Sweet corn green beans, broccoli and cauliflower are among those Michigan vegetables ready to be frozen to contribute to more nutritious and enjoyable winter meals.

When selecting vegetables for freezing, keep in mind that young, tender vegetables are the most desirable. The best time for freezing is immediately after picking because the quality of the food begins to deteriorate as soon as the vegetables are harvested. The fresher the vegetables when frozen, the more satisfactory the final product.

Prepare vegetables for freezing much the same way you would for cooking. Wash them under cool running water, so that garden dirt doesn't resettle on the food. While washing, remove bruised or spoiled portions.

With the exception of green peppers and onions, vegetables maintain better quality during freezing storage if they are heated before freezing. Heating is an important step in the preparation of vegetables for freezing because it stops the action of enzymes that can cause loss of flavor, color, and texture. Heating also softens the vegetables and makes them easier to pack.

The most common method of heating is blanching. Most vegetables are blanched in boiling water. For one pound of vegetables (approximately four cups),

use one gallon of boiling water. Put the vegetables in a blancher, wire basket, colander or other suitable holder and lower into actively boiling water. Put the lid on the blancher and immediately start counting the blanching time. Do not wait for the water to return to a boil. Consult a reliable freezing book for proper blanching time.

As soon as blanching is complete, cool the vegetables immediately in ice water or cold running water to stop the cooking process. Cooling the vegetables should take about the same amount of time as blanching. When vegetables are cool, remove them from the water and drain thoroughly. Don't let vegetables stand in water longer than necessary — loss of flavor and nutrients can occur.

After the vegetables have been blanched, cooled and drained, pack them in meal-size, airtight, moisture vapor-proof containers leaving a half an inch of headspace. After packaging remove as much air as possible from the container, seal, label and freeze.

Frozen vegetables should be eaten within one year of freezing to assure optimal nutritional content.

All of us are in favor of a reasonable defense. But to ignore cuts in the defense budget or to make these so small as to be meaningless is to insure that we will have to raise taxes substantially. The president does not want that and neither do I. It is time for the Pentagon to be reasonable.

Dear H.C.,

I have to agree that in our current budgetary situation it is necessary for the Pentagon to take its fair share of cuts. I supported a budget package which would freeze defense spending next year and allow three percent growth in 1987 and 1988. This defense spending plan was later adopted by the Congress in its budget resolution.

President Eisenhower long ago warned us of the dangers of a large military budget and of the military-

industrial complex which advocates it. We must remain strong if we are to remain free but I think our strength will not be diminished if the Pentagon makes some sacrifices.

Another indication that the Pentagon does not need a large increase is the waste of taxpayers' dollars on weapons that don't work. A national security issue commonly overlooked is the confidence citizens have in their government. We cannot continue to erode that confidence with weapons that can't hit their targets and are made of shoddily manufactured and overpriced parts.

The Defense Department has informed me that the Pentagon has engaged in a new round of austerity and fraud reduction measures. Through the process of competitive bidding, with renewed and vigorous oversight, the Pentagon claims that problem areas are being cleared up. I am confident that the Department of Defense is acting with the best interests of our nation at heart but I will not relax for a moment my pursuit of prudent defense spending.

Extra class for DeWitt

DeWitt fourth graders won't be in overcrowded classrooms this year, after the board of education okayed an additional section at a special meeting Aug. 26.

The move brings the number of fourth grade classrooms to five, with approximately 25/ students per section. As of Aug. 30, 126 DeWitt students are enrolled in the fourth grade.

The teachers' contract sets the limit for fourth grade classrooms at 30. Without the additional section, the administration would have had to come to an agreement with the teachers to allow 31 students in the classroom.

At the board's regular August meeting three weeks ago, the issue of fourth grade class size came up when the board discussed an additional developmental kindergarten section.

Although it approved the kindergarten section, board members had decided to wait until enrollment figures were more firm before taking action concerning the fourth grade.

IN OTHER ACTION, the board devised its goals and objectives for 1985-86. They are:

- Continue efforts to reduce teacher/pupil ratio in the elementary, grades DK-5.
- Select and install new system-wide data processing. Superintendent Stephen Garrett says records such as attendance, class lists, grade cards, and scheduling could be kept in a system the district purchases for approximately the same amount the district now spends to have that information processed elsewhere.
- Commence and/or successfully complete all employee contracts.

I voted to maintain our present level of programs for as long as possible and then close schools to be able to provide our children the best possible tools to enter their adulthood, as long as we are financially able.

Board member explains position

To the Editor:

The St. Johns School Board at its Aug. 26 meeting voted to take the option of maintaining present programs and keeping schools open until present finances run out.

I supported this position and would like to take this opportunity to explain why.

In the past, when financial reasons dictated, the school board has slowly cut programs and personnel to keep within budget restrictions. These cuts have not been visible and in most cases the public has not been aware of the changes. Although these cuts have been "invisible" they have quietly eroded the foundation of our first class educational system.

Now we are in a position that if any further cuts in programs are made, we would be pulling away the last bricks of this foundation and our quality education would fall into second class status.

I do not want our system to become second class and I'm sure that the people of our district would not be satisfied with our children being educated any less than first class.

Error draws response from school

Your article in the Aug. 27 issue concerning the St. Johns Public Schools deficit needs clarification. The District will save approximately \$50,000 (one-half of one percent of our budget) as a result of the resignations and retirements of seven veteran teachers over the summer. These teachers were replaced with seven excellent teachers that have taught far fewer years than those that left.

The action, coupled with a less costly fringe benefit package negotiated with the teachers this year, has

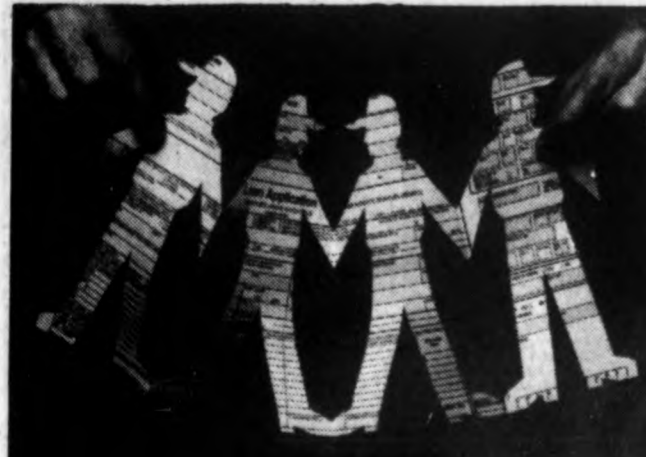

Gravel pit approved

About twenty-five residents who addressed the DeWitt Township Board for almost an hour couldn't stop it from approving a gravel pit owner's request to excavate 30 feet below the water table.

The board voted 4-3 in favor of an amendment to David Schlegel's 1983 special use permit that allows him to excavate for sand and gravel below the water table.

Approval of the amendment was recommended to the board by the planning commission.

The pit in question is on Turner Road, one block north of Sheridan.

Residents in the surrounding area are concerned about the effects to their water and what they see as a continuing safety hazard to their children: insufficient fencing around the pit.

The question of safety to residents' water is what most concerns Supervisor Frank Mann, who voted against the amendment.

"What concerns me is what they're going to fill the pit with after it's dug...it's going to go right to their faucets in a matter of days," he said.

"I am opposed to going below the water table simply because there's no control over what goes in there," said a resident who is part-owner of property 300 feet from the pit.

Owner David Schlegel said he plans to refill the pit with clean clay and broken concrete. The special use permit amendment stipulates that he must refill the pit in accordance with Department

of Natural Resources standards.

But digging below the water table has other ramifications besides the effects on resident's drinking water. Chief among them are concerns that the

open water will attract curious children seeking an adventurous play area.

Resident Lois Downing said the barbed wire fence that now surrounds the pit is inadequate, and her suggestion that an 8-foot chain

link fence with a barbed wire top be installed was met with applause from the audience.

Schlegel says his employees inspect the fence once a month throughout its perimeter.





County tax may go up

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners may have to set taxes next year at the full 5.8 mills authorized by voters, commissioners said Aug. 27. This would be the first time in several years that the full millage has been levied.

For the past several years the Board has set the levy below the level authorized by voters. The levy this year was 5.6 mills.

"The reason we've been able to levy less millage than we've been entitled to is because we've had a fixed millage," said Board Chairman Roger Overway.

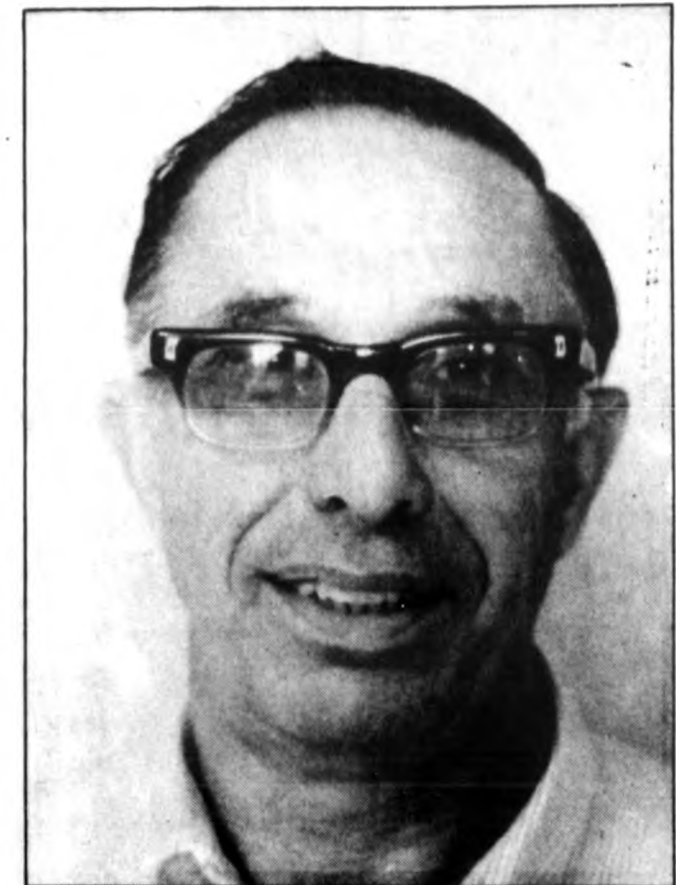
Commissioners said, however, that federal revenue sharing is expected to decrease 25 percent and that the entire millage may have to be levied.

"That decision will be made after we get through the budget process," said Finance Committee Chairman Richard Hawkes.

In an action aimed at saving money for the county the Board of Commissioners authorized Sheriff Terry Haneckow to try to collect compensation from prisoners for whom the county has paid medical expenses.

The collections could be aimed at either the prisoners' insurance or assets.

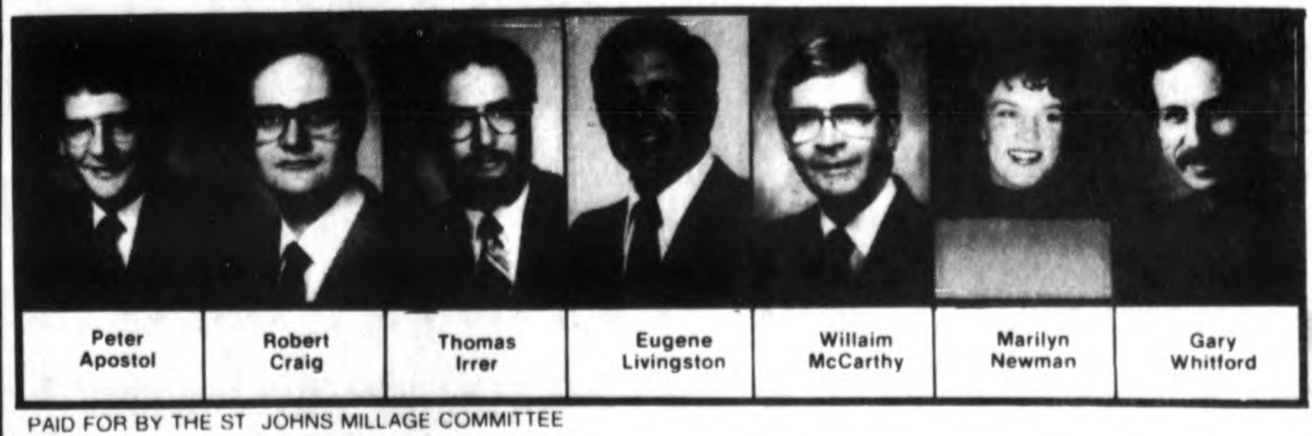

Sheriff hats draw comments by board

The new "smokey" style hats recently adopted by the Sheriff's Department drew some wry comments from County Commissioners Aug. 27 who considered the purchase somewhat of an extravagance.

The Commissioners readily transferred money from several line items of the Sheriff's Department budget to another in order to pay a bill that included about \$800 worth of new hats. But then the grumbling started.

"What are we going to do next month when he comes up with an overdraft in these line items?" asked Commissioner Glen Webster.

"That's not what bothers me," said Board Chairman Roger Overway. "What will bother me is if he runs out of money half way through the year. I think the Sheriff has this feeling if he runs out of money we'll give him more. I am personally not in favor of that."

Asked for his comments later in the week Clinton County Sheriff Terry Hanekow said the last thing he wanted to do was create a public controversy but that nothing was more common than transferring funds between line items and that the department was not going to run out of money.

Undersheriff William Page said sheriff's deputies needed new hats anyway and the new smokey hats cost only \$300 more than replacing the old ones would have cost.

Also, Page said, the old hats would not have fit with the new black leather boots and belts the department is eventually going to adopt in order to be in conformity with the recommendation of the Michigan Sheriff's Association.

Riders whose applications are received by September 7 will receive a free official Leelaunau Harvest Tour t-shirt.

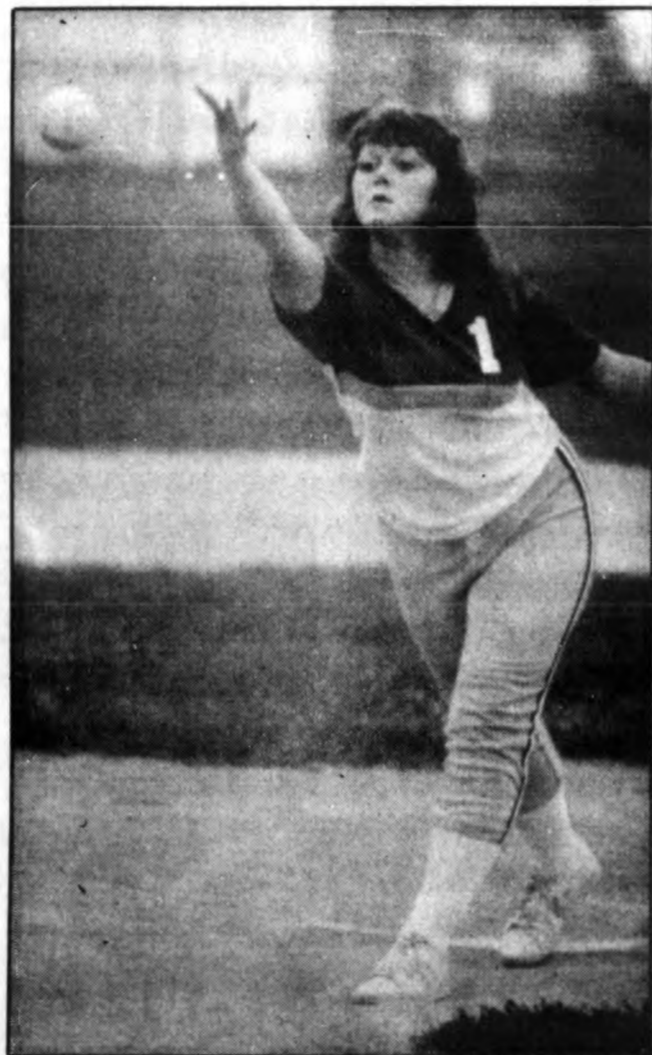

NYSCA educates coaches

The lessons young people learn from sports are often remembered the rest of their lives.

That is why volunteer coaches and youth administrators have a responsibility to the kids with whom they work, according to Curt Gowdy, National Spokesman of the National Youth Sports Coaches Association (NYSCA) and the chairman of the "Making Youth Sports Fun For Kids" program.

"The irony of sports today," Gowdy said, "is that while many psychologists, reporters, and educators denounce organized youth sports, millions of parents still encourage their offspring to participate."

According to Fred Engh, founder and president of NYSCA, "Even though the elementary school-age population is decreasing, overall organized youth league programs have increased to nearly 20 million participants throughout America."

"That indicates that youth league sports are here to stay, but those who criticize youth sports make some good points, too. Although problems exist in a number of areas, the statement that 'no program is better than its leader,' can best summarize the problem in youth league sports," Engh said.

In nine out of ten cases, the leader is a parent of one of the team players.

"In most cases," Engh said, "the parent has probably never been told that his or her responsibility extends beyond ensuring that the team wins the championship."

"Perhaps more importantly, that responsibility includes the development of the value systems of the young people being coached, and it is just as important for parents and coaches to remember that youth sports should be a fun experience."

"No parent would let a 10-year-old kid take swimming lessons from a person who is not qualified to teach," Engh said. "Well, what about the young people who suffer emotionally, psychologically, and sometimes physical abuse because the youth coach was never told he had responsibilities in these areas?"

Engh believes the coaches volunteer status does not exempt them from these responsibilities. To fill this training gap the NYSCA, a non-profit organization formed in 1981, offers a basic certification program that can be completed by attending three-hour sessions on two consecutive nights.

"The feedback we've received from leagues that have implemented the NYSCA certification indicated that by clearly stating the minimum standards for volunteer coaches, the vast majority willingly comply," Engh said.

More importantly, the youngsters benefit almost immediately from the more positive youth sports was intended to achieve in the first place."

The NYSCA doesn't stop at educating and certifying volunteer coaches. They have also created special programs to offer comprehensive guidelines for parents, youth league administrators, and game officials who are involved in community youth sport programs.

Certification of a NYSCA volunteer does not denote qualification to coach, per se, but more so indicates a basic awareness of the very important role that each volunteer has on the psychological well being, safety, and the need for basic sports instruction of each child in his (or her) care.

ZC-10-7-85/OR-5-85 Text Amendment: Amends Section 5.11.15 Temporary Housing Permit to permit the issuance of temporary mobile homes in unplatted areas in the R-1A, One-Family Rural Zone District as well as in the A-1, Agricultural Production zone district.

ZC-12-7-85/OR-6-85 Text Amendment: Amends Article 6, Section 6.5.2(A)(2) by deleting the ceiling height requirements for single family dwellings. Ceiling height requirements will be regulated by the applicable construction code.

Crickets are unwelcome guests

The cheery "chirp-chirp" of the cricket makes a pleasant background noise on a warm summer night. But it's not so pleasant when you detect it inside your home.

Field crickets frequently invade homes in the fall, says Gary Dunn, Extension entomologist at Michigan State University. Nocturnal insects, they often migrate to lights and make their way into homes through cracks in the foundation or around loose-fitting doors. They may also hitchhike indoors in the pots of house plants placed outside for the summer. Once inside they may feed on stored products,

especially soiled cotton, rayon, linen, wool, silk and furs.

Field crickets are the plump, dark brown or black crickets that you find under the mulch in the garden or in other moist areas outdoors. They do not adapt well to indoor conditions and will generally die off by mid-winter but they may do some damage before they die.

House crickets, however — smaller, light brown to yellowish crickets introduced from Europe — complete their entire life cycle indoors and are often active year round. They like warmth and are often associated with fireplaces

and furnaces.

The occasional cricket in the house can be dispatch-

ed of with a flyswatter or shoe. If large numbers of crickets call for chemical

controls, use only products labeled for cricket control in the house.

Weed control

Perennial and annual weeds can effectively be controlled in the fall. Control of perennial weeds in the fall can start with a pre-harvest application of herbicide.

Banvel has recently been registered for fall use in corn for controlling hemp dogbane and has proven to be fairly effective, says Jim Kells, Michigan State University Extension weed specialist.

Kells suggests applying a half pint of Banvel combined with one quart of 2,4 D ester per acre when the hemp dogbane rhizomes develop swollen, pink buds. Hemp dogbane generally reaches this stage of development about the second week in September in Michigan. Farmers should check fields every two to three days starting Sept. 1 in order to spray weeds at the optimum time.

This herbicide combination can be applied with ground equipment or by air, but aerial application poses an extreme drift hazard. Soybeans grown in the vicinity should be fully podded with the leaves turning yellow before an application is made to avoid injuring the plants near the treated area, Kells cautions.

Though this treatment may need to be repeated every fall for two or more years to achieve adequate control, preharvest herbicide treatment is the best approach when a perennial weed infestation is too widespread for spot treated, Kells concludes.

To control annual weeds next spring in alfalfa seedings, apply herbicides

after the final alfalfa cutting this fall.

"For controlling most winter annuals — including hoary alyssum, yellow rocket, shepherd's purse and chickweed — a fall application of Princep at one pound of active ingredient per acre is both effective and inexpensive to use," says Jim Kells.

The alfalfa needs to be established — planted prior to June 15 — before Princep is applied, or the stand will be injured by the herbicide.

Other herbicides can be applied in the fall, such as

LexoneSencor or Velpar, but these tend to be more effective if applied in the spring.

These herbicides can control some perennial weeds — such as dandelions — which Princep is relatively ineffective against, but they cost more and should be used only if needed.

Kerb is a late fall herbicide that should be applied after the soil temperature drops to 60 degrees. At an application rate of one and a half pounds of active ingredient per acre, this chemical will control

perennials as well as quackgrass. Kerb is used primarily for quackgrass control, however, and is more expensive and less effective for perennial weed control than Princep.

When applied in the fall, Princep is one of the best weed management tools available because it is inexpensive and does a good job keeping winter annuals from establishing.

Landfill gets clean report

Recent tests at the Granger landfill off Grand River Highway have yielded no new evidence of monitor well contamination, according to Robert Basch, Lansing District supervisor of the Hazardous Waste Division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

But members of a non-profit Wacousta-based citizens group are far from convinced that trace chemicals found in a monitoring well earlier this year are isolated to just that well, and are concerned the contamination may spread to residential wells.

"Even though the concentration (of chemicals found) may not be very high, it's an indication that something's not secure at the landfill," asserts Gloria Miller, Watertown Township trustee and vice president of the People's Action League.

Township officials were notified earlier this month that the presence of 10 to 15 parts per billion of 1,1 Dichloroethane and 1,2 Dichloroethene had been confirmed in monitor well no. 19 in a DNR test conducted in July.

The compounds are said to be non-carcinogenic and can be found in household products such as paint and paint strippers, and in industrial solvents.

New DNR tests taken two weeks ago confirmed again the presence of low amounts of the compounds in the same monitoring well, but yielded no evidence of contaminants in four other monitoring wells near well no. 19, Basch says.

Miller says that PAL, which has ousted heads more than once with the Granger Land Development Company over the safety of the landfill, has no quarrel with the DNR's methods of testing of the wells.

But PAL members are dissatisfied, she says, "with the attitude that there's nothing to worry about, just because the concentration of chemicals is not very high."

"We have an aquifer to be cleaned up and a slurry wall to be evaluated," says PAL member Mary Fuller. "I think that's the DNR's responsibility."

According to DNR Hazardous Waste Division Chief Delbert Rector, the source of the contamination has not been determined.

"We expect to continue to work and expect (Granger Land Development) to do work that will find the source and develop an action plan to remedy the situation," Rector says. "What that plan will be depends on what the source is."

Rector says one possible explanation is that the slurry wall, installed a year ago as a protective measure to contain leachate, is malfunctioning.

Other possibilities are that the contamination came from the installation or maintenance of the monitoring well itself, or that it is coming from somewhere outside of the landfill.

Miller believes the contamination "probably came from the landfill," and poses a potential hazard for people whose residential wells draw from the same aquifer as that of well no. 19.

"To our minds," she says, "it's an indication that something's getting through (the slurry wall) — and if it's getting through, what might get through later?"

The DNR was composing a letter last week to Granger Land Development outlining measures

the DNR believes Granger should take to help identify the source of the contamination.

A public informational meeting over the issue has been scheduled for Sept. 9 at the Watertown

Township Hall, and will tentatively be attended by DNR representatives, according to Miller.

Bath students fight drug abuse

Prevention is a key word in the vocabulary of a group of Bath High School students who have organized to form Breaking Away With Teen Help (B.A.T.H.).

They want to prevent a fatal accident involving a drunk driver. They want to prevent severe alcohol or drug abuse problems among their schoolmates. And they want to prevent the same problems among younger children.

"There's not much of a problem here, but we might as well try to stop it before something bad does happen," says Amy Belyea, a Bath freshman who joined B.A.T.H. at its August meeting.

The group is also aiming to attract more people like Amy during the coming school year. B.A.T.H. was organized last spring, and is gearing up for an intense public relations campaign during its first full school year.

"During the first semester, we're going to concentrate on publicity," says President Debbie Nichols.

To be more visible in the school, the group is making recruitment posters, purchasing t-shirts to wear on meeting days, and making arrangements to hold their once-a-month meetings during school hours so more students will participate.

In August, the group gained three new members simply by word of mouth.

If increasing participation is the group's goal for the first semester, the aim

for the second semester is to use those people to help implement some ambitious ideas.

"Our long-range goal is to bring the alcohol and drug abuse program into the middle school and the elementary," Nichols says.

"We'll start with alcohol awareness...tell the kids the facts. And we have some movies. I'd like to at least see the plans for this set up before the end of the school year.

"I'm graduating then and I would like to know that things are settled for next year," she says.

B.A.T.H. had no summer vacation. The group put together a float for the Community Days parade to make people aware of the organization, and won third place for its entry.

Members sold novelty ice cream bars that weekend, and so have some money for projects

and materials.

They participated in a beautification project in downtown Bath — providing flowers for the park and mowing the lawns of vacant houses.

This fall, they're planning a car wash and bake sale in the Shop-Rite parking lot to raise more money.

They feel they can serve not only students, but the community at large as well. Teachers, the police department, and the sheriff's department have all expressed an interest in helping.

"We're trying to show people what can happen," says the group's sponsor, Connie Ramseyer.
