

School millage election is today

St. Johns School District voters decide today whether to approve a 3.5 mill increase for five years in the tax levy for school operation.

The district faces a \$550,000 budget deficit if the millage increase is not approved, school administrators have said in recent months.

The deficit is the result of declining enrollments in the school district that causes revenues to lag behind expenditures, said Asst. Supt. for Business Richard Terres. Terres said each

student lost this year will cost the district \$2,377 in state aid.

"If we lose two students out a classroom we still have to pay the teacher the same amount," he said. "It costs just as much to bus 60 kids as it does 70 kids. We still have to use one bus, still have to have one driver and possibly travel the same number of miles."

THE ENROLLMENT HAS declined two percent a year, or about 65 students, for the past five years, Terres said. However, this year the decline is estimated to be close to

four percent or about, 130 students, he said.

The Board of Education voted Aug. 26 not to make budget cuts if the millage increase is rejected by voters. Instead, the Board decided, the schools will continue operating with existing programs intact until funds run out, at which time the schools will be closed for the year. Administrators and some Board members have said the budget has been cut in recent years all that it can be without severely eroding the quality of education provided by the district.

If the millage increase is not approved the schools could close as early as March 1, said Asst. Supt. for Business Richard Terres.

Dale Kuenzli, the chairman of a citizens' group campaigning for approval of the millage request said Thursday he was "certainly feeling more positive" about the chances of voter approval than he did earlier.

"I FEEL MORE UPBEAT about it than I did ten days ago," he said. Kuenzli said he was optimistic of voter approval of the millage request even though he recognized that many

voters are suffering from economic problems.

Kuenzli said he would encourage voters to make certain of the difference between "street facts" and the actual facts of the school district's financial status before voting. He also encouraged voters not to allow gripes about the school district to influence their vote if the gripes will not be affected by the millage increase.

"It is the children who will be affected, not the terms of Board members," he said.

No organized opposition to the

millage increase had surfaced by late last week.

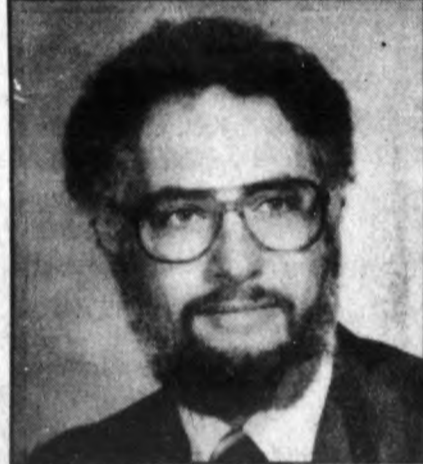
Marion Kurncz, 4029 Gilson Rd., and Thomas Irrer, 4507 Francis Rd., were named by Gov. James J. Blanchard in August to the Michigan Mint Committee. The committee consists of five state mint producers.

Funded by a two to four cent per pound tax on mint oil produced in the state the committee is authorized to contract with or make grants to organizations or individuals for the following purposes:

- Research into production, distribution or handling of mint oil

and surveys related to mint oil producers.

- Preparation of an annual report on the results of research and other activities pertaining to mint production.

• Development of educational programs and materials pertaining to mint production.

The first order of business for the committee will be to elect officers and set an agenda for the coming year. The date for the first meeting has not yet been set but it is expected to be sometime this fall or winter.

The committee will also decide how much to assess mint producers next year, the first year of the assessment.

Witness fee rift will go to court

Clinton County Prosecutor Jon Newman hopes an Aug. 19 memo will clear up any misunderstanding between his office and Bath and DeWitt township officials as to whether or not an attorney general's opinion will be sought concerning the legality of payment of witness fees to township police officers.

"I have not sought, nor do I have any plans of seeking, a review of the matter by the Attorney General," the letter states.

But township officials say Assistant Prosecutor Richard Koenigsnecht told them an attorney general's opinion would be sought, pending agreement by Newman.

Newman says Koenigsnecht made no such agreement.

The townships have decided to take the matter to court and to seek a declaratory judgment against Newman's interpretation of the statute which governs the payment of witness fees.

Telethon is a big success

The biggest thing going on in St. Johns over Labor Day weekend was a Muscular Dystrophy fundraising campaign that netted \$6627.32 — which is exactly \$2.82 over last year.

"Pledges were down this year but cash donations — that actually stay in the county — were up," says Sandy Wagner, who, with her husband Jim, coordinated the campaign.

Cash donations accounted for \$2,500 of the total. The cash will be spent in Clinton County while the majority of the funds pledged by telephone will go to the national organization.

A good share of the cash was raised by Alden Argersinger, says Wagner. As he has done for several years, Argersinger held a barn dance at which \$1,482 was raised to fight muscular dystrophy.

"We don't know how he does it but he has raised over \$1,000 for the past three or four years and every year it gets bigger," says Wagner.

Meanwhile, at the Muscular Dystrophy Telethon Center in the Southpoint Mall, volunteers took telephone pledges and munched on meals donated by local restaurants — a total of over 50 meals during the

Family life

Land a good catch

There is always something fishy going on in Michigan. That is understandable with over 11,000 inland lakes, 2,000 miles of Great Lakes shoreline, and 36,000 miles of streams.

Besides the many thousands who enjoy fishing for sport, the commercial fishing industry has long supplied restaurants and markets with Great Lakes fish. Whether you catch fish in lakes and streams or catch up with them at the market, fish available in Michigan provide a wealth of varied and delightful eating.

No finer food

There is no finer food than fish. The meat is tender, delicately flavored, and cooks quickly. Fish are 85 to 95 percent digestible, making the nutrients readily available to our bodies. Fish provide well balanced protein. One four-ounce serving supplies about one-third the amount of protein nutritionists recommend an adult eat daily. That is similar to the protein in a four-ounce serving of lean meat. But fish has fewer calories than other meats because fish has less fat. Fish oils are poly-unsaturated and rich in vitamin D. Fish also supplies vitamins and minerals to our diet. Fish is low in sodium, so if no salt is used in preparing fish, they are suitable for low sodium diets.

Your catch

To make sure you eat your catch at its flavorful

best, protect it. A stringer that keeps fish alive protects quality when fishing from a still boat. Always keep fish in a fly-proof container. Cold — especially refrigeration — best protects quality. An ice chest is essential. Pack fish in crushed ice immediately after removing them from water. It is best to gut the fish first and pack ice in the body cavity as well as around the drawn fish, but whole or round fish can be successfully iced. Properly iced, fish can be held two or three days.

When stream fishing, a rigid creel that provides air circulation and protection from bumping, bruising, and crowding is preferable to a soft bag. Line your creel with soft moist sphagnum moss, ferns, grass, or other greenery. Air circulation and evaporation keep the fish cool.

The fish most apt to be damaged by how it is stored is smelt. The very weight of a full tub, pail, or garbage can of fish is bound to crush those at the bottom of the container. Use shallow flat containers like those the commercial fishermen use and add ice to keep cold.

Extension bulletins

Two new CES bulletins, E-1180 Freshwater Fish Preservation and E-1179 Great Lake Fish Preparation, are available at the County Extension office for 50 cents each.

One describes the proper handling and cleaning of large Great Lakes fish. This bulletin includes canning, smoking, and drying recipes for fish preservation. The other bulletin describes the methods to clean and dress a fish as well as common fish cookery methods such as broiling, frying, and steaming. It also provides recipes for cooking with roe.

Are you in the know with roe? Roe is fish eggs. Roe is a very versatile food. It is smoked, made into caviar, and added to many dishes. It is even used as bait to catch more fish. The simplest way to cook roe is to clean it and batter it like the fish flesh and then cook it with the fish.

Why not try one of your favorite fish chowders on your family and friends. This recipe would make a great tailgate soup to serve at any football game.

New England Chowder (milk based)

- 1 lb. fish
- 4 strips bacon
- 2 cups diced, raw potatoes
- 1 tsp. salt
- 4 tbsp. flour
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 3 cups milk

Steam and debone fish. Cover diced potatoes with one cup salted water. Simmer 10 minutes. Add fish and cook 15 minutes. Fry bacon until crisp. Add onions and cook slowly 10 minutes. Add flour to onions and bacon and stir until smooth. Add three cups canned milk, milk, or diluted half and half to make a cream sauce. Cook until thickened. Add sauce to fish and potatoes. Simmer five minutes. Makes six servings.

Health Fallacies

These days almost everyone seems to be more actively working on a healthy lifestyle. But the flood of books and articles on health related topics makes it easy to confuse health facts and health fallacies.

One of the most common health fallacies is that short-term exercise will burn off lots of calories and therefore, help you lose weight quickly and permanently. How many calories you burn off actually depends on the intensity, duration and frequency of the exercise. A well planned exercise program consists of activity for 60 minutes, including warm-up and cool-down periods, at least three times weekly.

People often have the notion that exercising strenuously over a given period of time — two weeks, for example — will help them lose pounds quickly. Usually people who attempt this have an important

event coming up; they want to lose weight quickly and they think that this is the easiest way to do it. Though it is possible to lose weight through a system of "crash dieting and exercise" the weight lost is not usually body fat, but body water or fluid, which causes only a temporary loss of weight.

A similar fallacy is that weight can be reduced by sitting in a steam room of similar place and "sweating off" pounds. Wrestlers and other athletes who have to "make weight" before they compete commonly try to lose weight this way.

Once again, however, any weight loss this way is body fluid, not fat, and so it's only a temporary loss. Anyone, athlete or not, who attempts this kind of loss, can become dehydrated if it is overdone.

Another common fallacy is that a high protein diet is necessary to increase muscle mass.

This fallacy may have originated with athletic team coaches who believed that to build muscle, you needed to eat muscle. Normally, eating a well-balanced diet will give a person as much protein as he or she needs. Even today, however, many athletes believe this fallacy and eat large amounts of red meat and other high protein foods at athletic training tables.

Some people are reluctant to eat food such as potatoes or pastas that contain primary starches or carbohydrates because they are afraid these foods will make them gain weight.

Actually, the danger in gaining weight is not so much in eating these foods as in eating the condiments, toppings and other foods that go with them.

A person might eat an eight ounce steak that contains 500 or so calories, then turn around and ignore a 90 calorie baked potato is not high in calories until sour cream, butter, gravy or other seasonings are added to it. And any amount of calories must be evaluated in light of how many total calories you need per day.

Another example of a generally low-calorie food that becomes high in calories when certain ingredients are added is a tossed salad. Salads, which are traditionally thought of as diet foods, can become high in calories when heaped with rich dressings and other toppings.

Another fallacy is that vitamin supplements are essential to daily diets. This is not necessarily true — a well balanced diet with a variety of foods is usually sufficient. Likewise, leading a more active lifestyle does not necessarily mean you need to take vitamin supplements. Increasing your daily calorie intake when you are active by eating more nutrient-rich foods usually gives you any extra vitamins you might need.

Some vitamins, particularly those that are fat soluble — including vitamins A, D, E, and K — can be toxic if taken in large doses. People should take supplements of these vitamins only on the advice of their physicians.

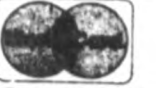

What a deal

Here's a new twist on the old saying: "Let the buyer beware."

Last week the telephone rang and the next thing you knew I was talking to one George Jenkins about toner and developer for our office copying machine. Jenkins started out by saying his company had just been informed by its supplier of a price increase, or something like that. How much toner and developer did we have on hand?

Now our copier has its quirks and of late they have become a little more pronounced than usual so I figured this was the serviceman for our machine. I dutifully checked our supply of toner and developer and told Jenkins that as best I could tell we did not have any on hand.

"Uh oh," said Jenkins. This was a big problem but he could take care of it. He asked for the model number of our machine and for the reading displayed by a digital counter on the side of the machine. I gave him this information.

He asked me if I had enjoyed my Labor Day weekend. I said I had indeed.

JENKINS THEN started talking about how he would have a dispatcher get the supplies right out to me and the price would only be \$145 not the new price of \$190. He mentioned that someone would call the next day for billing authorization but not to let that scare me as they just want to make sure they're not talking to the janitor.

"You don't wash the windows there do you?" he asked.

"Nah," I said.

"Okay," said Jenkins, "when they call tomorrow just listen for the price of \$145. If you hear any other figure, if they say \$190, you tell them George Jenkins

said you get last year's price."

"Right," said I. "Now what was the name of your company again?"

"Nationwide," he said.

"And do you have a phone number where I can reach you?"

"Uh, yes," he said. "That's 1-800-841-8601."

I thought about it for a moment or two and decided I was not about to accept delivery of \$145 worth of anything — maybe \$290, maybe more, as I was never sure just what was included in the low, low price of \$145 — without checking with management.

KAY TURNER, our business manager, explained that no one has a service contract on our copier. She was familiar with the sales tactic, though, having almost been caught by it a number of times. The scam is that you don't realize who you are talking to. You think you are talking to a routine supplier, someone your company deals with regularly. About the time you hang up the phone you begin to think maybe you should check up on the whole thing before you agree to anything.

"For some reason they always have to call back a second time," she said.

I agreed to tell them to get lost when they called back. But rather than wait, I called the telephone number Jenkins had given me. It came as no particular surprise to find that all I got was a disconnect recording. Checking with the 800 information directory I learned that there is no listing for Jenkin's company.

There are legitimate companies with "Nationwide" in their name, including Nationwide Resource Management Co. in Lansing, but I could locate none that sell copying supplies.

THE NEXT DAY the telephone rang again. When I

answered, a different voice announced that he had to make sure he was sending the supplies for our AB Dick Model 990 Copier — now how did they know our model? — to the attention of the right person.

"We don't want it," I said.

"You don't want any of it?"

"None of it," said I.

Click. Buzzzzz.

Too bad he hung up. I was going to ask him where the company was located. With that information I could have checked with the closest Postal Inspector to see if maybe there were complaints filed against the company. One Postal Inspector did say the Post Office is aware of what they call "toner bandits" who operate in a manner similar to the way this company did.

A quick phone call to Berger H C Co. in Lansing, an authorized HB Dick distributor, revealed that they were aware of toner bandits, too. They call them pirates. Pirates, said a Berger representative, are usually careful not to reveal the location or full name of their company.

That telephone call revealed another interesting fact. Toner for our machine is currently selling for \$39.70 a case.

Let the buyer beware. Especially if you never intended to buy anything.

I have been a real estate broker for over 30 years and I am really worried when I can not sell a farm to any young couples. They are afraid to enter into a business that their fathers and grandfathers have been in all their lives.

After all of the younger generation have gone off to become computer technicians, doctors, factory workers or anything else that pays an uncomplicated wage for eight hours work, who is going to raise the crops and livestock that feed our country? If something isn't done, and soon, to make farming an attractive and profitable way to make a living, there will be no farmers in America.

Dear H.A.:

As America prepares to enter the 21st Century, the question raised in your letter will be one of the biggest issues we face. The tightening economy and its consequences for agricultural communities is one of the most unfortunate trends in our country today. The farm economy spreads throughout our society, affecting implement and supply dealers, small banks and the whole fabric of small towns in America.

I have supported legislation that addresses the economic problems of our farms. H.R. 1814, the Farm Emergency Credit Act, and H.R. 11, which allows farmers and other self-employed persons a tax deduction for their health insurance premiums, are the sorts of bills that I have co-sponsored to ease the economic burdens of farmers. In supporting measures that will open up world markets to our farm products, I have worked to exempt agriculture exports from cargo preference rules which require that half of U.S. government grain exports be carried on U.S. vessels. The additional shipping expense of cargo preference rules has made our agricultural products less competitive on the world market.

Recently, the Agriculture Department announced that Egypt was accepting American bids on 300 million metric tons of wheat. This bidding process has been made possible because American producers can now offer a "baker's dozen" deal to any foreign buyer, a policy which I fought for. By using existing Commodity Credit Corporation stocks as a bonus for foreign buyers, we can open up new markets abroad,

put heavily subsidized European farmers on notice that we intend to compete and reduce our own surpluses that depress the market. On the Agriculture Committee we are working on a new Farm Bill which will set agriculture policy for the next several years. While most people agree that farmers should be producing for the market and not for federal programs, we must be careful not to pull the rug out from under producers. The most important consideration in shaping farm policy is the survival and prosperity of farmers, their families and the communities they support.

Legislature gives okay to \$10 million clean up

Michigan may be one step closer to reducing its dependence on landfills thanks to a \$10 million appropriation by the state legislature establishing the "Clean Michigan Fund".

The program emphasizes resources recovery technologies as solid waste disposal alternatives to deal with the state's annual accumulation of 9.5 million tons of solid waste.

Most of the funding will be available as grants to public, private and non-profit groups interested in implementing or expanding programs for recycling, composting and waste-to-energy projects.

Funds will also be available for closure of some landfills and dumps, construction of transfer stations and development of household hazardous waste collection days. In addition, a portion of the funding will be directed towards education efforts, market development and incentives for recycling industries.

"Michigan must move aggressively to avoid a solid waste disposal crisis in the future," says Ronald O. Skoog, director of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. "We know that improper disposal in landfills is responsible for known and

suspected groundwater contamination, as well as air pollution and some pollution of our lakes, rivers, and streams. As existing landfills reach capacity, it has become extremely difficult to find and license sites for new landfills. All people need to get rid of their garbage, but few will agree to permit landfills in their neighborhood or community. We need to find solutions to these problems."

Between Oct. 1 and Nov. 15 the DNR will accept applications for grant awards, feasibility study site selections and waste stream assessments.

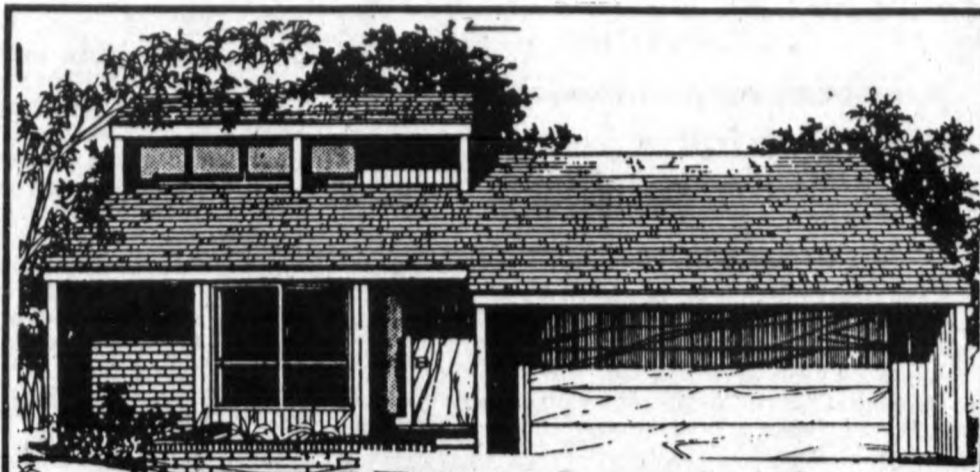
Whitlock has been clerk of DeWitt Township since 1980. He completed the three-year education program for township clerks held at Michigan State

University. The program included over 100 student-instructor contact hours of in-depth courses in public administration, social and interpersonal concerns, and other subjects.

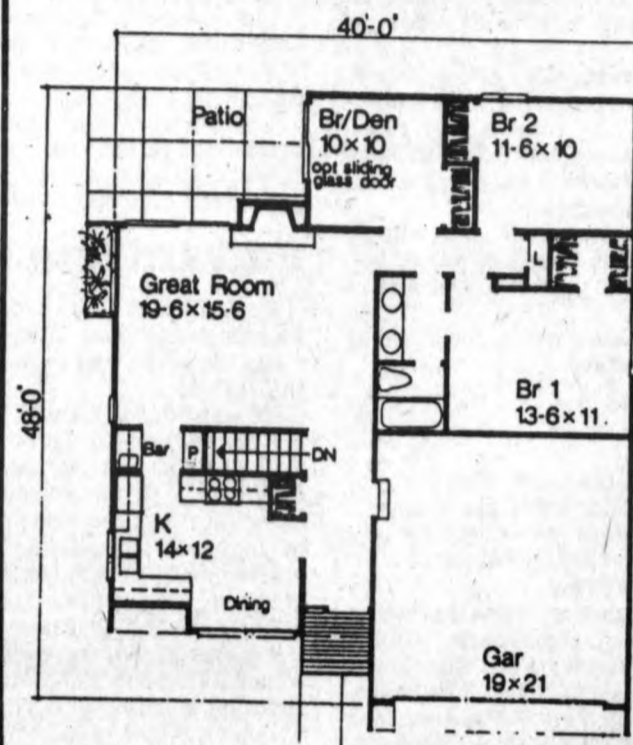

Soil testing

The time of the fall garden cleanup is an excellent time to collect a soil sample for testing. Extension horticulture specialists at Michigan State University point out that a soil test can take the guesswork out of fertilizing lawns and gardens. The tests tell you which plant nutrients are needed and how much of each to apply.

A soil test will also tell you the pH of your soil — whether it is acid, alkaline or neutral — and whether soil treatments are required to change it. Most garden plants do best in a neutral to slightly acid soil. As pH goes up or down from there, various nutrients become less available to plants and deficiencies may occur.

Following soil test recommendations should enable you to provide the nutrients your plants need for best growth and may enable you to save a little money by applying fertilizer only as needed. You may find, for instance, that a high-phosphorus starter solution and

boost of nitrogen in July are all that your vegetable garden needs next year. Applying a complete fertilizer before you turn the soil in the spring would be a waste of time, money and effort.

If you have soil tested before and plan to do it again, consider doing it in the fall instead of in the spring. Fall is generally a slow time for soil test labs. You are likely to get your results back quicker than if you wait and join the spring rush. Also, you will then have them in hand next spring when you want them.

For information on how to take a soil sample, a container in which to mail it to the MSU Soil Testing Laboratory and a bulletin to help you interpret the results, contact your Cooperative Extension Service office. It's listed in the telephone directory under "county government."

Soybean loan rate set at same rate as 1984

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today issued a preliminary loan and purchase rate for 1985 crop soybeans of \$5.02 per bushel, the minimum permitted by law and unchanged from 1984.

Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the loan rate is set by law at 75 percent of the simple average price received by farmers during the past five years, excluding the high and low years. USDA is required by law to issue a preliminary loan and purchase rate not earlier than 30 days before Sept. 1, the beginning of the soybean marketing year.

Rank said USDA will issue a final 1985 soybean loan and purchase rate no later than Oct. 1, by which time USDA will have figures on prices received by farmers for the 1984

crop. All producers of 1985 crop soybeans will be eligible for loans and purchases since USDA does not require participation in pro-

duction adjustment programs as a condition of eligibility. Soybeans are ineligible for any reserve program or farm storage payments.

Further details on the loan and purchase rate for 1985 crop soybeans is scheduled to be published in the Aug. 22 Federal Register.

New program for insurance

A new federal crop insurance program permits Michigan wheat growers to select yield guarantees that are based on their own production experience. Premium rates have also been sharply reduced for producers who have a record of above average yields, said Barbara A. Cranson, state supervisor for federal crop insurance.

The improved policies are available for the wheat crop that is scheduled to be planted this fall. Cranson explains that the program, called Actual Production History (APH) Insurance, differs from last year's insurance protection mainly in the method that yield guarantees are determined. Rather than being based on the historical production average for the entire county, they reflect the production record for each individual farm. As a result of the change, growers with high yields are offered additional protection at a lower rate.

A second attractive feature, Cranson says, is the opportunity to choose and pay for only the amount of protection desired. Policies are offered that guarantee 50 percent, 65 percent or 75 percent of an average yield. This lets the farmer

carry insurance that guarantees as close as possible to a normal yield and another to carry insurance protection only against a major catastrophe.

Cranson points out that wheat growers can request, at no charge, an analysis of the cost of carrying various levels of protection. She adds, however, that the county deadline to apply for coverage on the 1986 wheat crop is Sept. 30.

Making final plans for putting in corn silage? Be certain to include in those plans proper safety procedures. Always be aware of the dangers of nitrogen dioxide (silo gas), which may be present around any ensiled field crop.

Nitrogen dioxide is heavier than oxygen, so it may form yellowish layers above the silage or drop down the silo chute. The strong silage odor can mask

nitrogen dioxide's bleach-like odor. It may be present even if you can't see or smell it, so always take precautions in or near newly filled silos.

"The highest concentrations of nitrogen oxides usually occur 48 hours after filling, but no one should go into a silo for the first four to six weeks after filling," says Howard Doss, agricultural safety specialist at Michigan State University. "Silo gas can be deadly."

If you must enter the silo for some reason before the recommended period elapses, you must wear a self-contained breathing apparatus. The local fire department will probably be willing to assist.

Though wearing the apparatus may make climbing the chute difficult, it is the only way to protect against nitrogen dioxide damage to the lungs.

Silo gas damages the respiratory system when nitrogen dioxide combines with moisture in the lungs to form nitric acid. This acid eats away at the lung tissue and can cause permanent damage or even death.

People may not realize they have been exposed to the gas because the poisoning symptoms — shortness of breath, fainting and flu-like illness — can frequently be delayed for several days. It is important for a person who suspects he or she has been exposed to the gas to obtain medical attention immediately to minimize potential lung damage.

When entering the silo after the recommended six-week waiting period, be sure to ventilate the silo chute for 10 to 15 minutes before hand and open several hatches to move out any pockets of gas.

No one should ever work alone in a silo. Always work in pairs so someone can go for help in an emergency.

Topple Holt

Redwings win tourney

The Holt varsity girls basketball team took a shot in the dark Saturday night — and got hit with its own bullet.

The mistake helped the St. Johns Redwings to a 44-36 championship game victory in the Williamston girls basketball tournament held last Thursday and Saturday.

Holt, down 18-11 at halftime, knew it needed to do something to try to turn the tide of the game. The something it chose to do was the press.

Unfortunately for Holt, the Redwings were more than equal to the challenge.

"Our girls really burned their press," Redwing coach Beth Swears said. "The scoring we had off it

was really balanced. Brenda Eiseler had six points, Cheryl Rademacher had four, and the other girls had a bucket apiece."

The Redwings "burned" Holt to the tune of 16-6 in third quarter. They shot 44 percent (eight-of-18) from the floor in the quarter.

Key to breaking the press was the ballhandling of senior point guard Mary Murphy.

"They (Holt) had been down all night against DeWitt, but came back to beat them," Swears said of Holt's opening game in the tournament.

"This was a little revenge for us. They beat us last year by two points," Swears said.

Senior Brenda Eiseler led the championship game victory with 16 points and 13 rebounds. Swears expects that Eiseler will average around 13 re-

bounds a game this season. Rademacher added 10 points, four assists, and three steals. Kerry Porter had six points and three steals. Cindy Armbrustmacher, Karen Simon, and Mary Murphy scored four points each. Murphy added three assists.

In its opening game of the tournament, St. Johns knocked off host Williamston 40-27.

Swears noted that she was pleased with that effort because her team had not played against another team this year.

"We didn't even have a scrimmage," she said. "We played pretty good team defense. Considering the weather, the humidity, and that it was the first game, we did pretty good." The Redwings took charge right from the opening stanza, outscoring

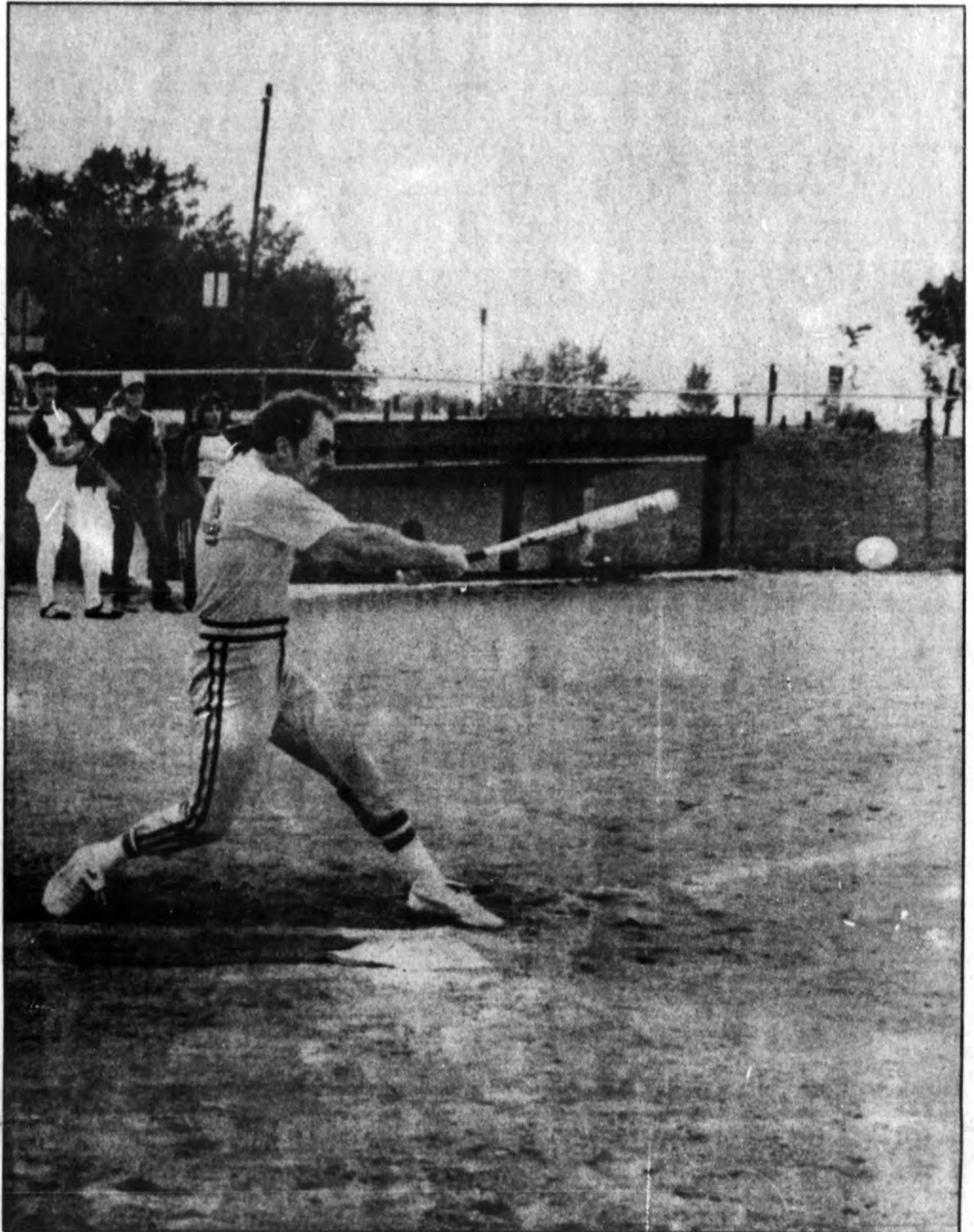
Williamston 13-7. They outscored the hosts in every quarter but the second, when Williamston recorded an 8-7 edge.

Eiseler again led the Redwings in points and rebounds. She had 11 points and 13 rebounds.

Murphy chipped in with 10 points, Rademacher had seven, Armbrustmacher put in five, Simon had four, Brenda Schafer scored two, and Kerry Porter scored on a free throw.

Two Redwings were named to the all-tournament team. Murphy and Eiseler received the recognition for their outstanding play.

The Redwing junior varsity players also won a championship. They took the JV end of the tourney by beating Williamston 34-22 in the opener, and downing DeWitt 34-23 in the championship game.

This is an opinion column, a place where I get to air my thoughts (hopefully responsible ones) on the sports scene in Clinton County.

Having only been around for a couple of months I haven't developed concrete opinions on many things, but there are a few things that I think I can assess accurately.

As a sports writer, I'm not only seeing what takes place on the field, but I also get opportunities to hear coaches and athletes talk about the "why" of what has just happened.

Sometimes those things are said with the veil of "don't quote me on that" over them, other times I simply know it would be unwise and in bad taste to quote someone who is not in the best of moods.

But those behind-the-scenes moments do help you develop opinions. And here are some of mine:

— the City of St. Johns Recreation Department offerings are pretty limited. In the summertime, you have softball, one bike rally for kids, and I've heard that there is some organized tennis — although finding it seems a little difficult.

Of course, this may be because of limited funds or sparse participation because of vacations. But it seems that there could be a little more imagination shown in what is offered.

— Coach Bart Kjolhede is a likeable guy and is probably going to be successful in the won-lost column with the St. Johns Redwings' football team.

But I am disappointed that Bart takes the standard position coaches' position of opposing the rule that is new to Texas high school sports — that every player must achieve at least a C in ALL his classes before he is eligible to play.

Kjolhede says that it is "a poor rule" and "sports are keeping kids in school."

No matter how you look at it, the simple fact is that young people are in high school to get a BASIC education, at least. Football will advance the career ambitions of only a precious few, the three R's will take most a lot farther.

Sports participation should not be allowed until students have proven themselves capable in the classroom. The time a "D" student may spend on the football field (15 hours a week Kjolhede estimates) should better be spent studying.

If that sounds idealistic in today's values, we have poor values.

— Profanity at area sporting events is all too often present. As a born-again Christian, I am deeply offended when people use the name of the Lord in vain (according to His Word, the Lord gets pretty offended, too).

— Automobile racing is a pretty unusual sport. Before taking this position, I had never been to an automobile race. My interest with automobiles usually ends when I unbuckle my seatbelt.

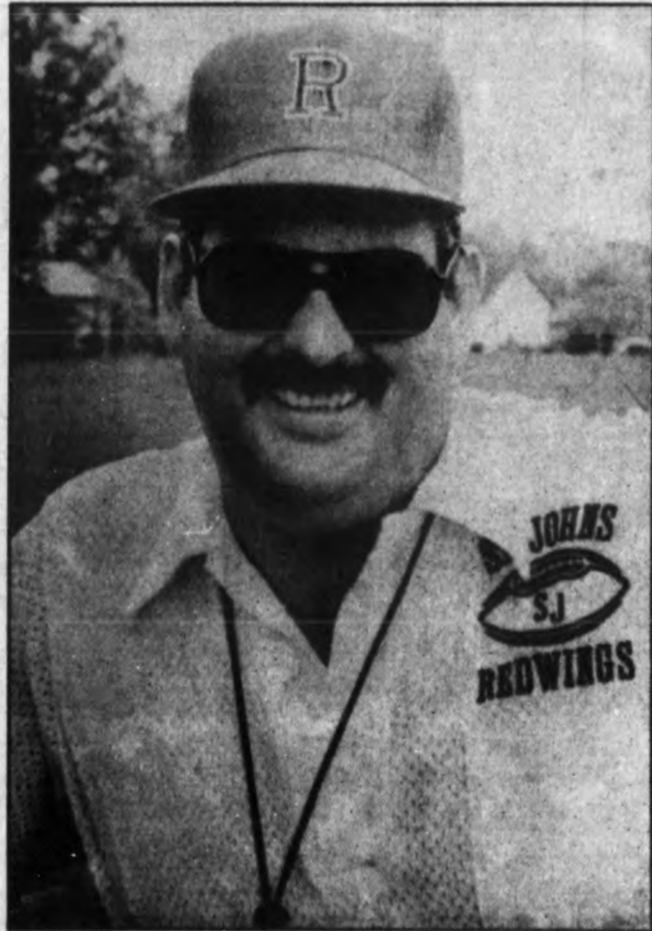
But I have to admit that when I covered some races earlier this year, it held my interest. Basically, it's the same as going to a high school track meet, but instead of slender young people gliding around the track, you've got a couple of tons of metal and a driver.

It's pretty noisy, too. The sociology of a racing crowd also interests me. There's a quilt-like collection of blue-collar humanity, just there enjoying the speed and bumping and fumes.

Lots of emotion gets vented at a racing track. I assume there is more vented there than many other types of sporting events I've been to, because the engine noise makes you let it all hang out if you want to be heard.

— Football is a little stupid. Bart Kjolhede told me the other day that there are about 60-70 football injuries resulting in paralysis annually in the United States.

Okay, so your kid's chances of being one of them are pretty slim (approximately one to a state). That still is a very distasteful statistic to me.

I remember seeing former New England Patriot Darryl Stingley being shown from his wheelchair on Monday Night Football a couple of years ago. The fun and money he received from playing football didn't seem to be worth too much at that moment.

And whether your teenager gets maimed or not, how can you really enjoy a sport where one of the epitomes of excellence is being able to "stick it to somebody."

Like me or not, I think football, like boxing, is distasteful.

— On the other hand, I have great admiration for cross country runners. To be able to discipline yourself in eating and exercise so that you can run fast is true sport.

So what if somebody can pump up their muscles and bang someone else's head around or "stick it to them"? What use will you have for that after high school, bouncing people from bars?

Cross country, like golf, is a lifetime sport that is being offered in high school. And, in my opinion, if you're going to offer sports in high school, why not something that is of benefit after the high schooler has moved on.

— To put in a good word for St. Johns city rec department, let me say that I think it has done well to promote slo-pitch softball.

Slo-pitch softball, unlike most other forms of softball, allows more people to enjoy participation. The ball is easy to hit (for most people), the fielders get lots of action, and more than nine batters can be in the line-up. It's good fun.

While the Eagles, Marauders, and Pirates all

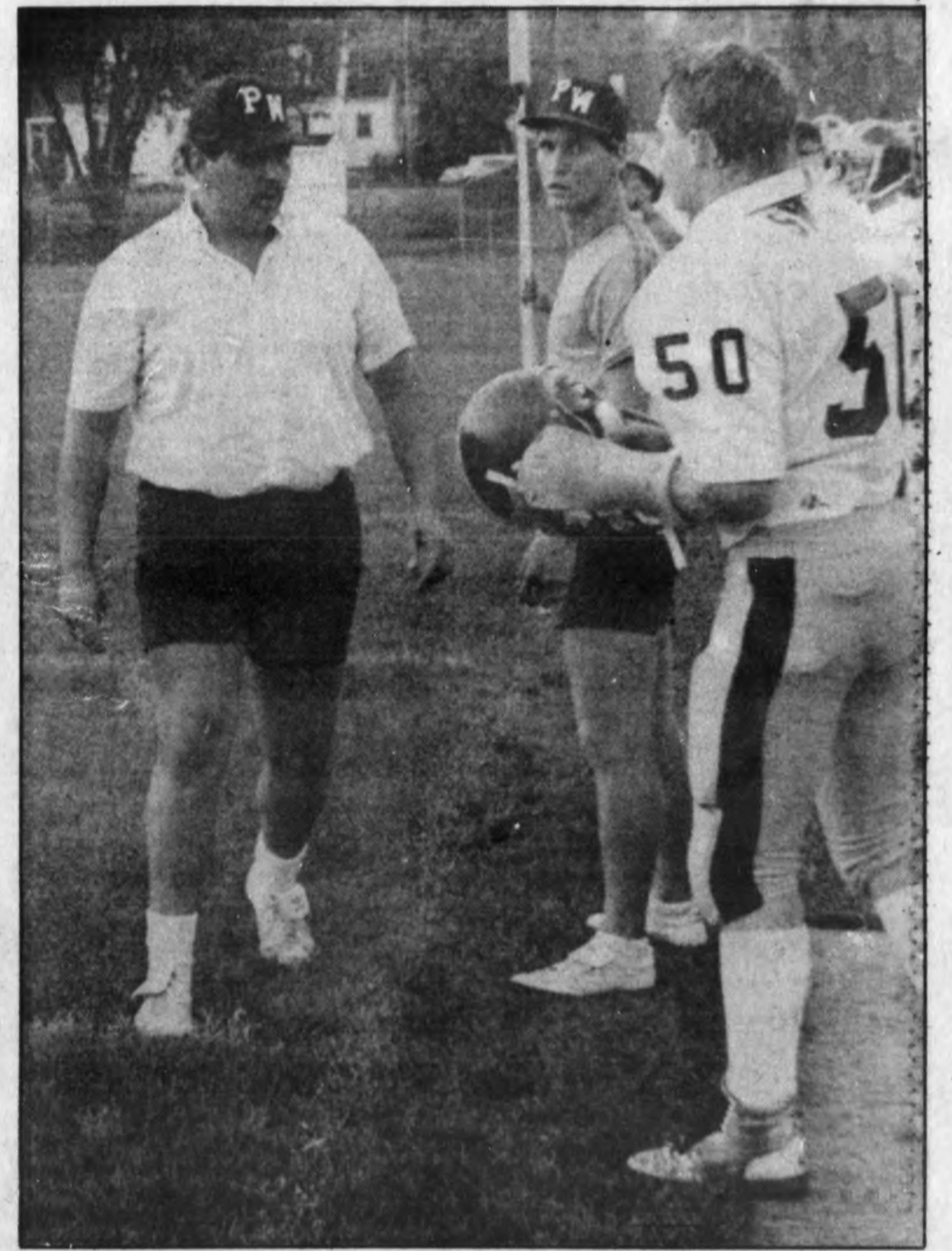
had fine defensive performances, the St. Johns Redwings did not.

Squirrel hunting

It was a big day in those growing-up years, when I'd get the chance to go with dad or one of the older neighbor boys to hunt squirrels. It wasn't that I was likely to put food on the table, you understand, but that shooting at those tiny little tree top targets represented for us a special kind of time.

In those days we hunted squirrels mostly in large moodlots along the headwaters of the St. Joe River in the southern part of the state. The squirrels were plentiful there and usually the pressure from other hunters was low. Considering my shooting ability, facts like that were important.

Most all of us used .22 calibre rifles in those times. Mine was a single shot Remington that was my most treasured possession. It had a peep sight and was quite heavy. I didn't care though because it could be used to fire every shell from "shorts" for target practice to "long rifle" for the hunting of squirrels. I loved that gun.

I can still remember the stories of "barking" squirrels that the older guys would tell. Actually, barking was a practice of early pioneers who used heavy caliber rifles. They would intentionally fire a ball or bullet close enough to their quarry to kill it by the concussion, and thereby avoid damaging the meat. The heavy missile would actually strike the bark of the tree only, when properly done; thus the term barking.

In the case of the boys I knew, the "barking" attempt was a handy excuse for a miss. It didn't occur to me that a little .22 bullet could never kill by concussion. Maybe the lead from a deer hunter's shotgun

slug could do it but our little bullets penetrated rather than expanded on impact.

Perhaps the thing that made squirrel hunting so special was that it was the first kind of hunting most of us were allowed to do. Perhaps it was because there was usually quite a bit of shooting and little work to do afterwards; we shot only the most foolhardy and daring of squirrels. Perhaps it was because there were less adult hassels, most parents feeling that sitting quietly in the woods and shooting upwards was a safer form of hunting than most.

But with consideration given to all of the above possibilities, I think it was something else about squirrel hunting that made it special. For instance, the season occurred early in the fall and the type of hunting offered my dad and me a chance for "man talk."

We learned a lot about each other, sitting under the still heavily leaved trees, waiting for our targets to reveal themselves. Back to back or side by side under the oak we became friends. It seems to me that as that special season approaches again when two people can whisper together as they hunt, that the time can still be special.

I wish I had a youngster now of an age and temperament that would beg to hunt squirrels with me. We'd go to the woods and tell each other things like how pioneers barked squirrels. We'd exchange dreams and wishes and hopes, and while fall gradually gave in to the cold breath of winter, we'd be warmed by a strengthened friendship.

NRA holds sighting clinics

Firearms safety is the focus of the National Rifle Association's upcoming Sighting-In Days.

If a spring arm does not fire accurately, a program volunteer will be available to make sight adjustments while gunsmiths will be on site to perform equipment and safety checks.

The NRA Hunter Services division has prepared packages of life-sized game targets, ideal for use in sighting in sporting arms.

Six different targets are available. They are: wild turkey, rabbit, white-tailed deer, mallard duck, squirrel and groundhog. The targets provide realistic shooting conditions to assist hunters' firing accuracy.

The packages are inexpensive, ranging from \$1 to \$4.50.

Sighting-In Days programs stress the necessity of hunter marksmanship preparation and safety in the field.

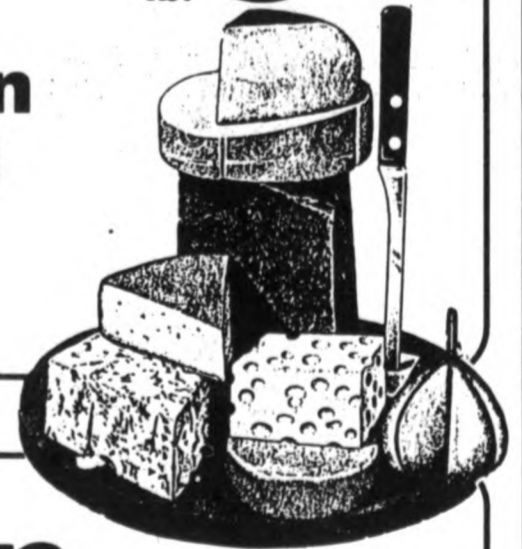

Matthew 5:13 — "You are the salt of the earth; but if the salt loses its flavor, how shall it be seasoned? It is then good for nothing but to be thrown out and trampled under foot by men."

We are to be zest for the world. This is what Jesus meant when He told His disciples that they were to be the salt of the earth. Salt is so common and inexpensive to us that we do not value the full intent of what Jesus was saying.

Salt was extremely expensive in Jesus' day; a man's life was valued about as much as a bag of salt. Salt was cherished and used carefully. To be called the salt of the earth indicated value and worth. But for what purpose? To bring tang back into the bland, tasteless experience which most people had made of living.

Christians are to be the source of vitality in the world. So often our style of life is just the opposite. In history, we can make the profound misunderstanding of Jesus on this point. Piety has often equalled caution, restriction, and negation. The Christian life has been defined by what a believer should not do. Not so with Jesus.

He called His disciples to outlive, outlove, and

outserve the whole world. He wanted the pagan world to stop with a start and say, "Why, that's living." The joy of the Christian is his saltiness. He is alive with a tremendous vitality because he has been loved, forgiven, cherished, and empowered.

A good way to deal with the challenge to be the zesty salt of the earth is to question, "Do I want the whole world to be like me? Have I found an exciting, adventuresome faith that I want everyone to have? Who would want to know Christ because of what he sees in me?"

The world around us is deciding whether to take Christ seriously because of what people see that He has done for us.

Thought for the day: A Christian is salt to a tasteless world.

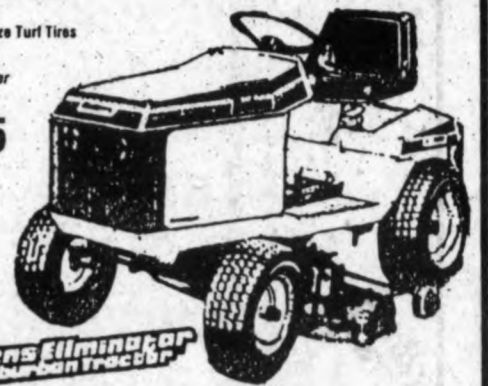

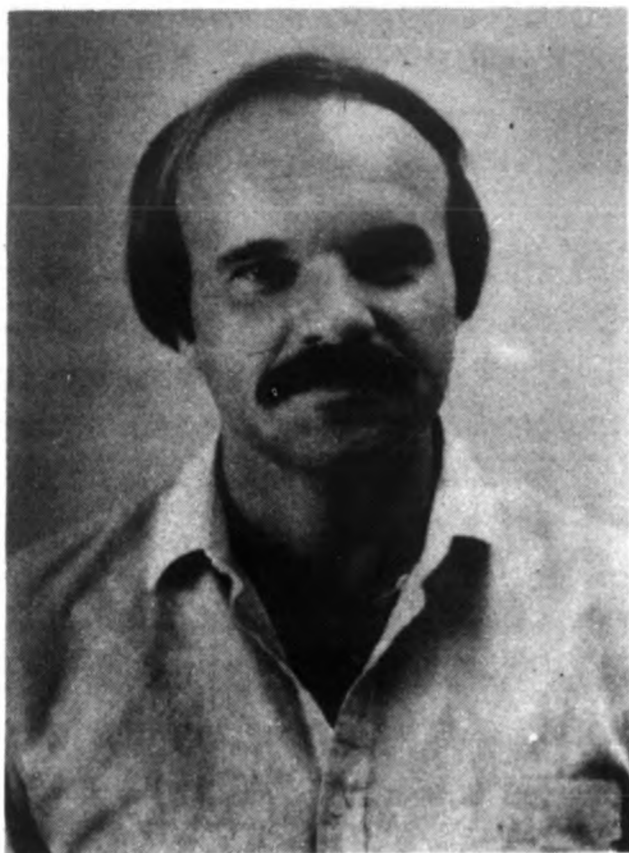

Bulb planting

If you're planning to plant spring-flowering bulbs this year, there is no time to waste — prepare the planting site as soon as possible.

Horticulturists at Michigan State University say the most important considerations in site selection are good drainage and plenty of light.

Bulbs in poorly drained soil are susceptible to root and bulb rots, and they flower poorly, if at all. Heavy, soggy or compacted soil can be improved by adding sand and peat or some other organic material to it. Spread the material to be added on the top of the soil and then spade or till the site to a depth of 10 to 12 inches.

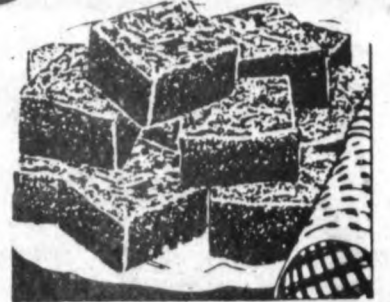

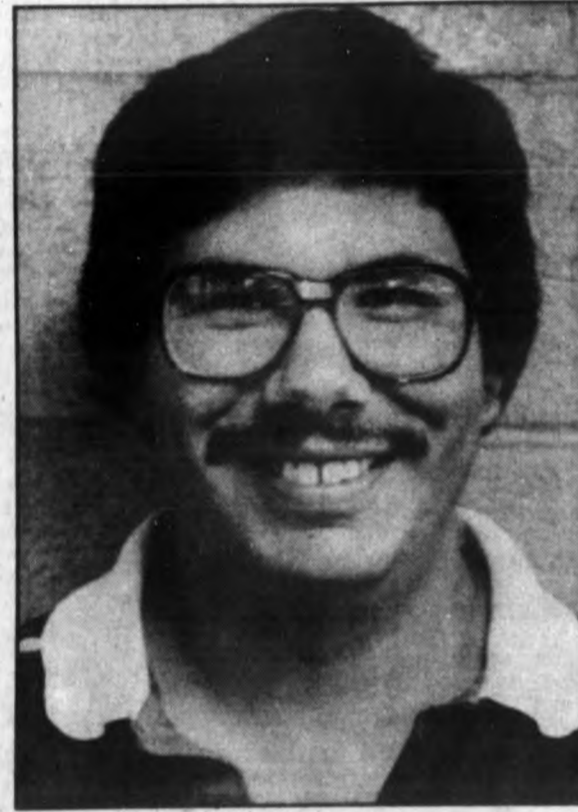

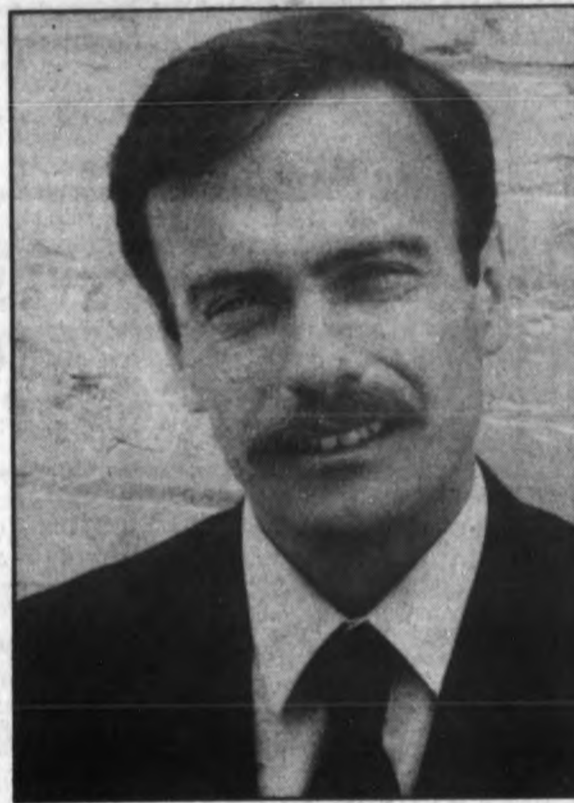
