Voters reject school millage

Voters in the St. Johns Public School District rejected a requested 3.5 mill increase for school operations Sept. 10 by a margin of 251 votes.

School Supt. Earl Gabriel called the 1,850 to 1,599 decision "devastating" and Board President Peter Apostal called it a "puzzlement."

The decision will mean a possible shortened school year for St. Johns students this year. The Board of Education, preparing in advance for a possible rejection of the millage increase, voted Aug. 26 to keep existing programs intact until until funds run out, at which time the schools will close for the year. Funds could run out as soon as March 1, administrators have said.

The alternative, administrators and some board members said, was to make budget cuts that would have severely eroded the quality of education in the district.

THE MILLAGE ELECTION drew 3,449 voters out of about 11,000 that are registered in the district. About 1,000 more voters cast ballots in this election than in a June election in which a 4.5 mill increase was rejected by voters.

"It is devastating to an educational system that has always prides itself on a well-rounded education..." said Supt. Gabriel of the election results.

In a prepared statement Board President Peter Apostal said the vote "represents a puzzlement to me and, I'm sure, to many others in the community. Nevertheless, the electorate has spoken and we, as promised, will continue to provide the best educational program at our disposal until we no longer have the money to continue...."

"Somewhere, somehow, there will come a time when complete understanding and trust will prevail and the community will recognize you only get what you pay for...."

THE LAST DATE the Board could set the tax rate for the year while meeting state requirements regarding public notice was Sept. 14, ruling out the possibility of another attempt to get voter approval of a millage increase for this year. However, it is possible that the state legislature will set the tax-setting date back, possibly as far as December, which would leave time for another election.

Asst. Supt. for Business Richard Terres said 45 days are required to meet the legal requirements of scheduling and holding an election.

"If there are other districts like ours then there will certainly be legislation introduced (to extend the tax-setting date)," said Supt. Gabriel. "It always has been in the past, although it has not always passed."

BOARD PRESIDENT Apostal said he could not comment on the possibility of another election this year. The decision to hold another election will have to be made if and when the legislature sets back the tax-setting date, he said.

Dale Kuenzli, the chairman of a citizen group that campaigned in support of the millage increase, said he saw no point in another election until such time as there was a clear indication of community support for a millage increase.

"It cost money to run an election," he said in a telephone conversation after the election. "I see no point in having election after election in the hope you win one out of six. There has got to be a groundswell of support...."

Apostal, in a comment that was not part of his prepared statement said: "I personally can't believe the people out there are against education. We have to click a switch somewhere but I don't know where it is."

State Rep. supports concept of wine cooler bottle deposit

Wine cooler bottles should be included in the Michigan "Bottle Bill," said Rep. Gary Randall. But, he said, he will not endorse such a bill until he sees how it is written.

"It seems to me only reasonable that the wine coolers would be included in the bottle bill," said the Republican representative for Gratiot and Clinton counties.

Those in favor of including the popular wine coolers in the bill — which currently requires a deposit on beer and soft drink containers — include environmental groups and Attorney General Frank Kelley.

Kelley and the Michigan United Conservation Clubs (MUCC) recently asked the Liquor Control Commission (LCC) to consider an administrative rule that would include the wine cooler containers in the law.

The LCC is currently conducting hearings on the issue.

RANDALL SAID the issue will probably be decided by the legislature. He said the LCC has the authority to include the wine cooler containers in the bottle bill but that it could draw court challenges if that authority were exercised.

"I think they (the LCC) would prefer the Legislature to handle it and I think that's the way it will go," he said.

In a Sept. 2 press release Randall said some opponents of the action by Kelley and the MUCC think the LCC

is the wrong forum in which to address the issue. They would prefer a public referendum or for the issue to be addressed in the Legislature where a three-fourths majority of both houses would be required, he said.

The press release also said many in the beer and wine wholesale industry think a wine cooler deposit would make Michigan less competitive and claim beer sales dropped when the original bottle bill took effect. Opponents say several beer distributors discontinued business because of the original bill and that the same effect could be expected with a wine cooler deposit, the press release said.

IN A SEPT. 10 telephone interview Randall said he was sympathetic to those who say the "wine coolers are a fledgling industry so why squelch it?"

However, Randall said: "My basic feeling is why should they be treated any different?...There's no compelling evidence that makes me think they should not be included...."

Michigan residents are expected to consume more than 30 million bottles and cans of the coolers in 1985, Randall's press release said.

Randall said that although he supports the concept of including the wine coolers in the bottle bill he will not endorse any particular bill until he sees how it is written.

Local woman teaches skill

Braille transcribers needed

Since 1979 Nancy Puetz, a St. Johns resident, has been one of 20 Lansing area residents who painstakingly transcribe written manuscripts into Braille for use by the blind. She is the only St. Johns area resident working as a Braille transcriber but she is certainly in-

terested in attracting others.

She is, in fact, a certified Braille transcriber who will, beginning Sept. 19, teach a class to those interested in learning the skill.

The skill requires a painstaking attention to detail and a dedication to accuracy. It does not pay a dime. But, Nancy says, it does have its rewards. It does not cost anything.

You can work at home. And you can spend as little or as much time at it as you want.

However, you may find you want to spend more time at it the better you get.

"ONCE YOU GET STARTED it's very rewarding and very interesting," says Nancy.

Getting started does require the investment of a certain amount of time and effort. First comes a two-hour class once each week from September to May. During that period an hour of practice at home each day is expected.

Then comes a certification test which involves transcribing a manuscript into Braille. In order to pass the test you must score at least 80 percent — a maximum of about three mistakes, Nancy says.

But once you are certified you are certified for life. Braille transcribers keep their skills from getting rusty by proof reading each other's work. Braille transcribers also keep in touch with each other to discuss various aspects of their work — which is one reason why Nancy would encourage other St. Johns residents to involve themselves in Braille transcribing. As the only Braille transcriber in St. Johns her work puts a strain on her long distance telephone bill.

THAT IS NOT, however, the most important consideration. Simply put,

there are not enough Braille transcribers to keep up with the work.

"We have a desperate need," Nancy says. "The electronic innovations and computers make it easier but we still can't keep up."

Family focus

Flooding

I hope the old saying is true that if we have a wet summer and fall we will have a dry winter because we have certainly qualified for the first part of the saying. These last few weeks have turned us all into "ducks" as we have spent most of our time walking through water with our umbrella and boots.

Unfortunately, many people have had to keep their boots on while indoors, too. The high water conditions have caused many basements in the area to flood. If you are having problems with flooding there are a few tricks you can do to help protect your home.

- Install check valves in sewer traps to prevent water from backing up in sewer drains.
- Seal cracks in walls and floors with hydraulic cement.
- Place heavy screens over lower windows to prevent breakage from floating objects.

- Be ready to protect appliances from minor flooding. Put a half block of cement under each corner of refrigerators, freezers, washing machines and dryers. Use bricks or boards if you don't have cement blocks. Be careful of any food dishes, toys etc. that may have been contaminated by floor water. It is very dangerous to internalize any flood water.
- Take immediate cleaning action once flood waters have gone down. Mildew can become a big problem. If you are currently having mildew problems at your home and need help controlling it, give the Extension Service a call for assistance. We would also be glad to answer any other questions you have about post flood home clean-up, sanitation and safety. The number is 224-3288 or 669-3663, ext. 229.

Clothing

Teenage consumers spend more than \$40 billion each year and clothes are their number one priority. According to a Seventeen magazine survey, teens report spending most of their money on clothes and cosmetics, followed by entertainment, eating out with friends, records, cassettes and video games.

"Clothing takes a big chunk of a teen's day-to-day expenses," says Joanne Schultink, MSU Extension Service clothing specialist. "The 1984 Rand Youth Poll found that girls between the ages of 13 and 15 spent 44 percent of their total spending on clothing and cosmetics. Older teens, ages 16 to 19, increased their clothing spending to more than 50 percent to about \$630 a year."

Buying clothes is more than an economic decision, it is also a personal one. Clothes express to the world who you are, what you think and how you feel.

"For young people, trying different clothing styles may be a way of trying out independence," Schultink says.

Most young children are dressed by their parents and are dependent on their parents' tastes, whims and budget. As they grow more independent, older children begin asserting control over their wardrobes.

"Psychologists have noted that teenagers try different styles of dress as they try out different identities," Schultink explains. "Youthful experimentation with clothing, hairstyles, makeup and accessories are all part of a young person's attempt to find a unique personality stamp that says, 'this is me'."

As a result of this search for identity, teenagers are especially influenced by fads and peers and Schultink says that is not necessarily bad.

"According to psychologists, this conformity is important and necessary," she explains. "It's healthy for young people to support each other in their efforts to establish independence. When adolescents wear similar styles, they are confirming their friendship and signaling their shared tastes and opinions."

Whether clothing is designed to get attention, to be useful and practical or attractive, Schultink has the

following suggestions for looking your best for less:

• Before shopping, examine your existing wardrobe and plan what you need to add. If possible, calculate a clothing budget and stay within its limits.

• Plan your wardrobe around one or two basic color groups to get the most mix-and-match potential.

• Shop around. Comparison shopping can help you save money.

• Visit discount, off-price and outlet stores frequently. There is a high turnover among the good bargain merchandise.

• Consider the cost per wearing. (Divide the number of times you expect to wear the item into the sum of the item's cost plus the estimated cleaning costs.) Be willing to spend more for classics that you can wear year after year.

• Look at care labels. If an item must be dry-cleaned, the cost of care might double or triple the actual cost of the item.

• Check carefully for comfortable fit. If clothes don't feel good on you, they'll probably gather dust in your closet.

• Consider the department store's "private label" clothing. Often these are made by the same manufacturer that make designer brands. A store doesn't want its name on poor quality merchandise.

• Make sure each item you buy goes with at least two other things you own.

What is your clothing image? Do you prefer the blazer and oxford cloth collegiate look or Michael Jackson T-shirts? Remember, clothing is a language you use all the time.

People's pulse

During August Congress takes what is called a "District Work Period." It's a time for representatives to get home and take the pulse of the people. I travelled 1,100 miles throughout our 10th Congressional District and attended 18 town meetings during August and I have returned to Washington with a renewed sense of purpose. Judging by the mood in Congress, a lot of our representatives have too.

Farmers, businessmen, veterans and senior citizens each have their worries. Farmers need a strong farm bill and a farm credit system, businessmen need to see interest rates come down and the economy remain strong, veterans need health care and educational benefits, and senior citizens need to know they have a sound Social Security System.

The one issue that everyone agrees on is the federal deficit. People in mid-Michigan recognize that Congress needs to make a greater effort at cutting the deficit and were interested that I had voted against a reduced budget.

MY ANSWER IS STRAIGHTFORWARD. The budget that passed the Congress on Aug. 1, 1985, is based on overly optimistic economic assumptions and claims phony and erroneous deficit savings. While members of both houses and of both parties could

claim that next year's deficit would be cut by \$56 billion, the actual savings are going to be in the \$39 billion range.

The other reason that I voted against the budget was because rural communities were being asked to make greater sacrifices than other areas of the country. The budget calls for \$7.9 billion in agriculture cuts and these cuts and others have an impact on dozens of small stores and restaurants and banks all across mid-Michigan.

Realistic deficit reduction — budget cutting that shows legislative discipline — is going to require a sacrifice from everyone one of us. The budget that passed the Congress does not make adequate or full reductions. I found that the people of mid-Michigan know this and support greater deficit reductions. And I am not discouraged, because it seems that the rest of Congress has gotten the same message too.

As Congress gets underway, the appropriations process will continue. Appropriations are where the government actually spends money and we must continue to support efforts to reduce the deficit. We're also going to have to see a farm bill and a farm credit bill soon. Congress will also be debating trade legislation, the South Africa issue and a tax reform bill.

ON THE FARM BILL, the House Agriculture Committee has appointed a task force to come up with proposed cuts that will bring the new farm bill in line with the budget. After the task force delivers its recommendations, the policy issues will be worked on. We members of the agriculture committee have to fix loan rates, set target prices and address the serious problem of farm credit and depressed prices.

The ag committee has been working too slowly on passing a farm bill. Farmers in mid-Michigan must know what the farm program is going to be so that they can make their long-term financial and planting plans. In August, I suggested that the Agriculture Committee lock itself in the hearing room until it had produced a bill.

Regarding tax reform, the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee will begin putting together a tax reform package in mid-September. The issues are many and controversial, such as the proposed elimination of state and local tax deductions, the taxation of fringe benefits and the tax treatment of interest payments.

FINALLY, Congress will decide on a policy toward South Africa, whether or not protection from unfair trade practices is necessary for American manufacturers and how more savings can be squeezed out of the federal deficit. The federal debt limit is going to be reached soon and there will likely be a bitter fight over this increase in our national debt.

Congress is returning to Washington with a new

agenda for the fall. My hope is that we will deal with these issues in a timely and expeditious fashion.

Can you imagine taking an oath with your right hand on an onion?

That's what the ancient Egyptians are said to have done. They considered the onion a symbol of eternity because of its formation of a sphere within a sphere.

For that matter, can you imagine an army general refusing to fight unless his men had onions? No less a man than Ulysses Simpson Grant did that very thing. It's a matter of record. In the summer of 1864, he sent the following wire to the War Department: "I will not move my army without onions." The very next day, three trainloads of onions headed for the front.

General Grant insisted that onions helped to prevent dysentery. But he may also have read that Alexander the Great...who was no slouch as a general...fed onions to his troops because he believed that it made them brave.

Well, onions may not make you brave, but they might very well make you healthier. This is no recent idea. Women back in the Middle Ages wore necklaces of onions to insure good health. But it has had some fairly recent support. Researchers in India claim that chewing raw onion helps kill mouth germs and stop tooth decay.

Onions, by the way, are a member of the lily family and produce beautiful flowers ranging in color from lilac to white. And they have several very close relatives, such as leeks, chives, garlic, shallots and scallions; all with roughly the same pungent flavor and all very popular in cooking.

Wanted: transcribers

Even with a computer — Nancy is thinking about replacing her manual braille with an IBM computer — a transcriber would still need to know braille. Of course, transcribed documents can be written to a computer disc and sent to the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. — where it will become part of a four month backlog for embossing on to braille paper.

For now Nancy uses a manual braille provided to her by the St. John's Lions Club. The Lions would supply other area transcribers with their own braille machine also, she says.

BRILLE, NANCY SAYS, "is kind of a combination of shorthand and a foreign language."

Invented in 1825 by a French musician and inventor named Louis Braille, the system consists of cells of six dots. Each cell has 63 possible combinations. In addition to alphabet

characters, the various combinations signify numbers, punctuation, contractions and other meanings. The spacing between dots is as important as the dots themselves, Nancy says.

"It takes a person who is dedicated to accuracy," she says. "You just have to train yourself not to make mistakes."

Braille transcribers read braille visually, not by touch. Blind children learn braille at a very young age, Nancy says, and it would be virtually impossible for an adult sighted person to learn to read by touch.

"Our finger tips are just too insensitive," she says.

As a members of both the Michigan Association of Transcribers for the Visually Impaired and the National Braille Association, Nancy and other Lansing area transcribers work predominantly on school textbooks. Transcribing requests are taken by

the Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped in Lansing and assigned to area volunteer brailleists.

Besides textbooks the Lansing area brailleists have at times transcribed everything from cookbooks and knitting patterns to Christmas cards and wedding invitations.

"**WE TRANSCRIBE** anything requested within our ability," Nancy says. "As a brailleist you kind of agree to do anything given to you."

For those interested in exploring the possibility of learning to transcribe braille, there will be an introductory class on Sept. 19 in the Board Room of the Library of Michigan, 735 E. Michigan Ave., Lansing.

Two in St. Johns are semifinalists in Nat'l Merit Scholarship competition

Two St. Johns High School students were named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists, Sept. 11. Brian Upton, son of Elmer and Jan Upton and Rachel Miller, daughter of Joseph and Nancy Miller, both seniors, were named for the honor after they each achieved academic excellence on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT).

The achievement qualifies them to compete for nearly \$21 million in scholarships to be awarded next June.

Upton and Miller are part of the 15,000 high school seniors who were selected for the honor out of more than one million students who entered the competition in all 50 states.

To advance in the Merit Scholarship competition, they must qualify as finalists by showing high academic performance. Both Rachel and Brian are especially strong in academics. Rachel carries a grade point average (GPA) of 3.8 out of a possible 4.0 and Brian carries a 3.6 GPA.

IN ORDER TO QUALIFY as finalists the two are required to document a recommendation by their high school principal, high scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), personal interests, goals and involvement in school and community activities.

It is expected that about 90 percent of the semifinalists will go on to become finalists. Over 40 percent of these finalists are expected to win Merit Scholarships.

The number of St. Johns students chosen for this honor varies each year, says St. Johns High School Counselor Mr. Tissot. Last year there were no recipients but in previous

years, Tissot said, "We've had as many as three chosen."

Both Upton and Miller are planning to continue their education in college. Miller is undecided on

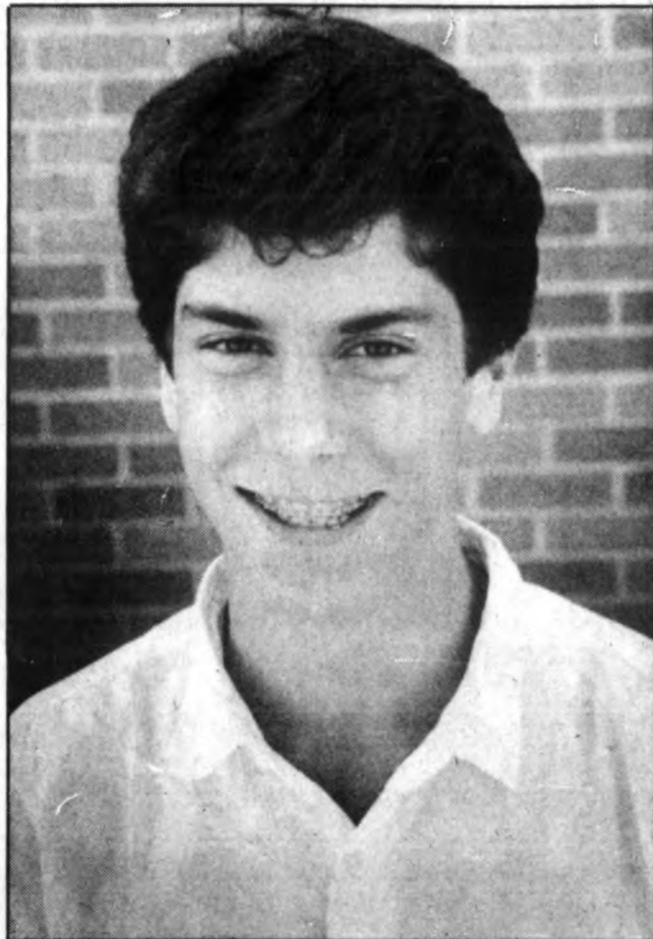
what college she will attend but she does know it will be in Michigan.

"I think I want to go into a science related field but away from the medical side," she says.

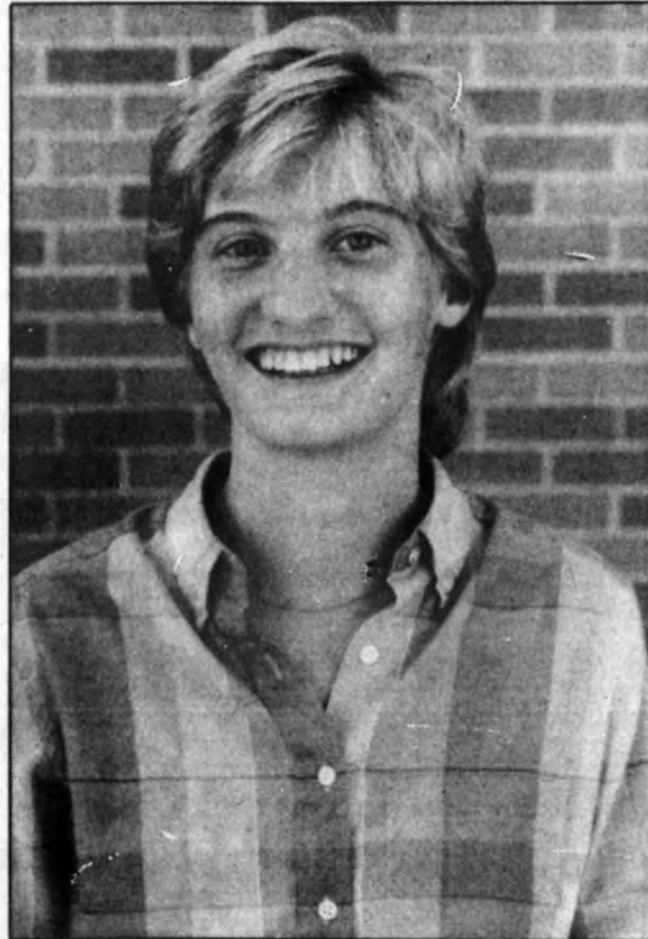
Upton is also uncertain of his college choice but is currently looking into The American University in Washington D.C. He is interested in international relations and says he will

Leaner beef

Today's beef industry has reduced the calories, fat and cholesterol in beef while maintaining the high nutritional value of beef in the average person's diet. Numerous studies have shown that changes in beef production and marketing and changes in the way people prepare beef have allowed the red meat industry to provide beef cuts that are 10 percent lower in calories than in the past, says Alden Booren, professor of food science at Michigan State University. Producers are now breeding cattle to produce leaner carcasses and are feeding animals for a shorter period of time. In addition, packers trim more fat from cuts before shipping them to retail markets. At the same time, consumers are preparing beef in ways that result in lower fat intakes. Beef has always been one of the best single sources of nutrients in the diet, Booren says. Nutritionists call beef a "nutrient dense" food. It supplies significant quantities of essential vitamins and minerals but relatively few calories. Three ounces of lean cooked beef, the serving size recommended by nutritionists, provide 25 grams, or 48 percent of the daily protein requirement. That same size portion of beef, however, provides only 192 calories, or eight percent of the adult male's daily caloric intake. Beef is also lower in cholesterol than people generally assume. Less than 48 percent of the fat in beef is saturated. The rest is mono- or polyunsaturated. This adds up to about 73 milligrams of cholesterol for a

three-ounce serving of beef, or 24 percent of the average daily recommendation by the American Heart Association. Fried chicken contains 74 milligrams and roast chicken contains 76 milligrams of cholesterol per three-ounce serving. In addition, beef contains substantially larger amounts of vital nutrients than other meats. Ounce for ounce, beef contains nine times as much Vitamin B-12, about 2½ times as much iron and four times as much zinc as chicken. This amounts to 79 percent of the adult male's recommended daily allowance for Vitamin B-12, 26 percent for iron and 38 percent for zinc. "Ounce for ounce, calorie for calorie, red meat is still a valuable resource to the human diet," Booren says. "Beef offers a great tasting package of nutrients for a relatively low caloric cost." Marilyn Loudenslager is the Clinton County Cooperative Extension Service Agricultural Agent.

Farm prices drop again

The Index of Prices Received by Michigan farmers for all farm products was 111 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending August 15. This represents a 16 percent decrease in farm prices from a year ago. Prices for all crops showed a 23 percent decline from the previous year while livestock and livestock products showed an eight percent decrease, according to the Federal State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

The Index of Farm prices was down three percent from last month. The Index of Prices Paid by Farmers nationwide, declines from a year ago. The calf price was the only increase observed, while egg prices remained unchanged from last year.

for commodities and services, interest, taxes and farm wage rates for August was 163 percent of its 1977 average. The index was unchanged from last month but down almost one percent from a year earlier. Corn, wheat, oats, dry bean, soybean and potato prices are all down substantially from a year ago. Only hay was unchanged.

Growers reject corn program

Michigan corn growers rejected a referendum to establish a Michigan Corn Promotion and Development Program conducted by the Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA) from July 8 through July 31. More than 200 corn growers submitted a petition requesting a referendum on the establishment of a corn promotion program. Ballots were mailed to 32,565 growers on a list compiled by the Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. An additional 4,450 ballots were mailed to

MDA regional offices, county extension offices and 500 grain elevators for distribution to growers who requested them. Under Public Act 232, at least 50 percent of the total voted representing more than 50 percent of the corn production is needed to pass a referendum. Based on returned ballots, the corn referendum failed to pass on both votes and production. The purpose of the Corn Promotion and Development Program was to provide funding for product development, market expansion and research.

"They're probably the team to beat in the conference, right now," Kjolhede said.

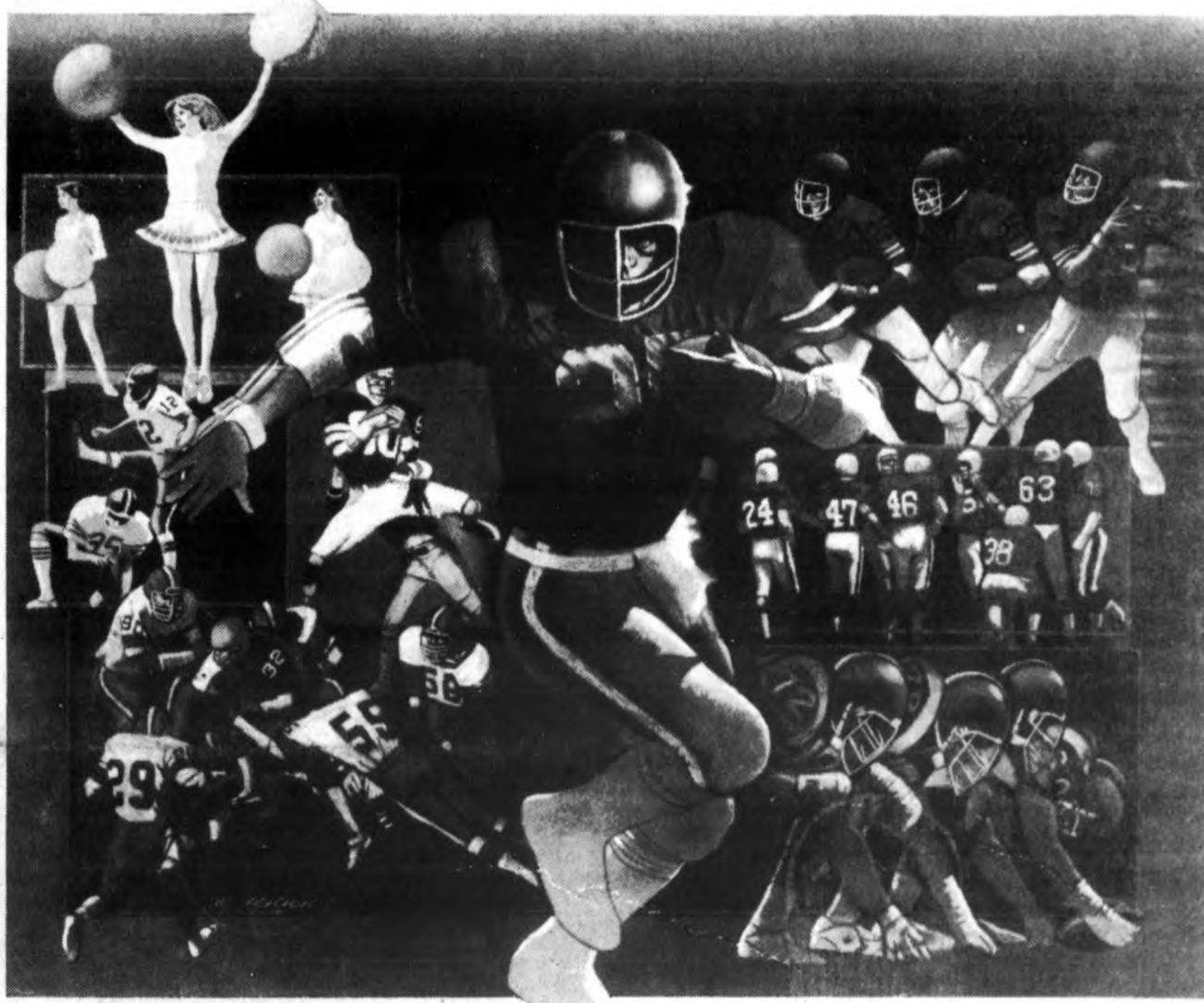
He added that Ionia quarterback Jack Skoog is being scouted by major colleges.

When you have a \$550,000 deficit in your school system budget and the voters turn down the millage down, people start second-guessing decisions that were made.

If you voted "no", you possibly second guess the St. Johns School District board for not opting to cut programs. If you voted "yes", you probably second guess the wisdom of voting "no".

So just for fun, let's second guess the whole thing from the sports angle.

Firstly, it must be established how the school board views sports.

According to Richard Terres, assistant superintendent for business, the school board views sports as "co-curricular."

Now, most people can remember when sports were viewed as extra-curricular. Meaning, that sports were an addition to the basic curriculum, not equal to it.

Realistically, isn't it common sense to believe that sports are extra-curricular. I know, you can quote me reams of studies that indicate the great benefits of participation in sports.

In some respects I agree with those studies. I participated in sports when I was in high school, and I suppose I would do so again. There are lessons to be learned from athletics.

But I believe it is silly to present organized sports as some sort of salvation for our young people. The lessons to be learned in sports can be learned other places.

Teamwork? Come on, young people can learn teamwork painting an elderly person's house, don't give me that.

Discipline? Try studying for four hours, that's good discipline. Bodily discipline, you say? Work your way up to marathoning — it'll cost you the price of a pair of good shoes.

Morality? If you can prove to me that athletics, as they presented today, teach people concrete morality I'll buy you dinner at Wendy's.

Responsibility? There are scores of ways to teach young people responsibility, showing up for practice and doing your bit to help the team just doesn't qualify exclusively.

So now I have just poked holes in the major arguments supporting organized sports as "co-curricular." Am I against sports? Well obviously not, I'm a sports editor. Sports are a good outlet for the energies of young people.

I am against the notion that sports are as necessary and beneficial as, say, math.

However, regardless of how I feel about it, that's how sports are recognized by the school board — "co-curricular."

The second matter to consider is the dollars and cents end.

The deficit is \$550,000. If we abandoned all the organized sports, outside of physical education classes, how much could be saved?

Terres says the savings would be "about \$100,000."

Given all this, my conclusions is —

Sports could justifiably have been cut from the budget, but simple mathematics proves that the action would not have moved so mighty a mountain as the school system's deficit.

Bath Parks and Recreation Director Michael Gray is headed for an uncommon adventure this fall.

He's leading a New England photo tour through his outdoor vacation business, Uncommon Adventures.

He's pooling his knowledge of the outdoors with the expertise of a professional photographer to put together a backwoods trip that will combine hiking and canoeing with on-the-spot photography workshops.

Gray is a veteran leader of such outdoor trips — his most challenging was a 56-day tour through the Alaskan wilderness. He has taught backpacking at Michigan State University and cross-country skiing at the Lansing Ski Area.

Last spring, he traced the route that the people on this tour will be traveling. It goes through northern Ontario, through the Adirondacks in northern New York, through Vermont and New Hampshire, back to Michigan.

He says he always visits a place before he leads a tour there — except for Alaska. "I'm not going to send somebody on a trip to somewhere that I've never been," he says.

"On this trip we'll explore the things that are available — whether photographic, cultural, or edible," Gray says. He has set up a visit with a boatmaker in upstate New York, and hopes to arrange a visit with a cheesemaker in Vermont.

"This will be a vacation you don't have to rest up from afterward," he says.

His outdoor trips are enjoyable for "an individual with an adventurous spirit and a 'go-for-it' attitude. Whether or not he's a beginner is irrelevant. You just

have to be flexible," Gray says.

"I want to make sure these trips are always top flight," Gray says, to explain why he hired the professional photographer for this adventure.

Another area in which Gray monitors quality is the food. An Uncommon Adventures brochure says, "We believe in hearty meals and are willing to go to great lengths to prepare food that is both delicious and healthful...A backwoods trip with a wine list? Why not?"

Gray has had many interesting experiences on his adventures. On one trip, he accidentally punctured his left eye on a sapling, and had to wrap both eyes so he wouldn't use the injured one. "I had to lead seven kids, blind," he says.

On the Alaska trip, the group tied their canoes together to float down the river during the night. All of a sudden, Gray says, a magnificent aurora display appeared in the sky.

One by one, members of the group woke each other up to witness the colored lights in the sky. It happened to be the fourth of July, Gray says, "and that was the best fireworks display these kids had ever seen."

"It's special moments like that that is what it's all about...I think they can happen on any trip," he says.

Gray is still seeking participants for the Oct. 6-12 New England trip. Cost for *everything*, Gray says, is \$370. For more information, call him after 5 p.m. at 332-3609.

He is also leading weekend cross-country ski trips into Leelanau County, Mich., this winter, and a trip this spring into the Everglades in Florida by canoe.

After four drivers in each class moved up, Jon Bottom (Late Model) and Mark Kortz (Pro Stock) won their B-features.

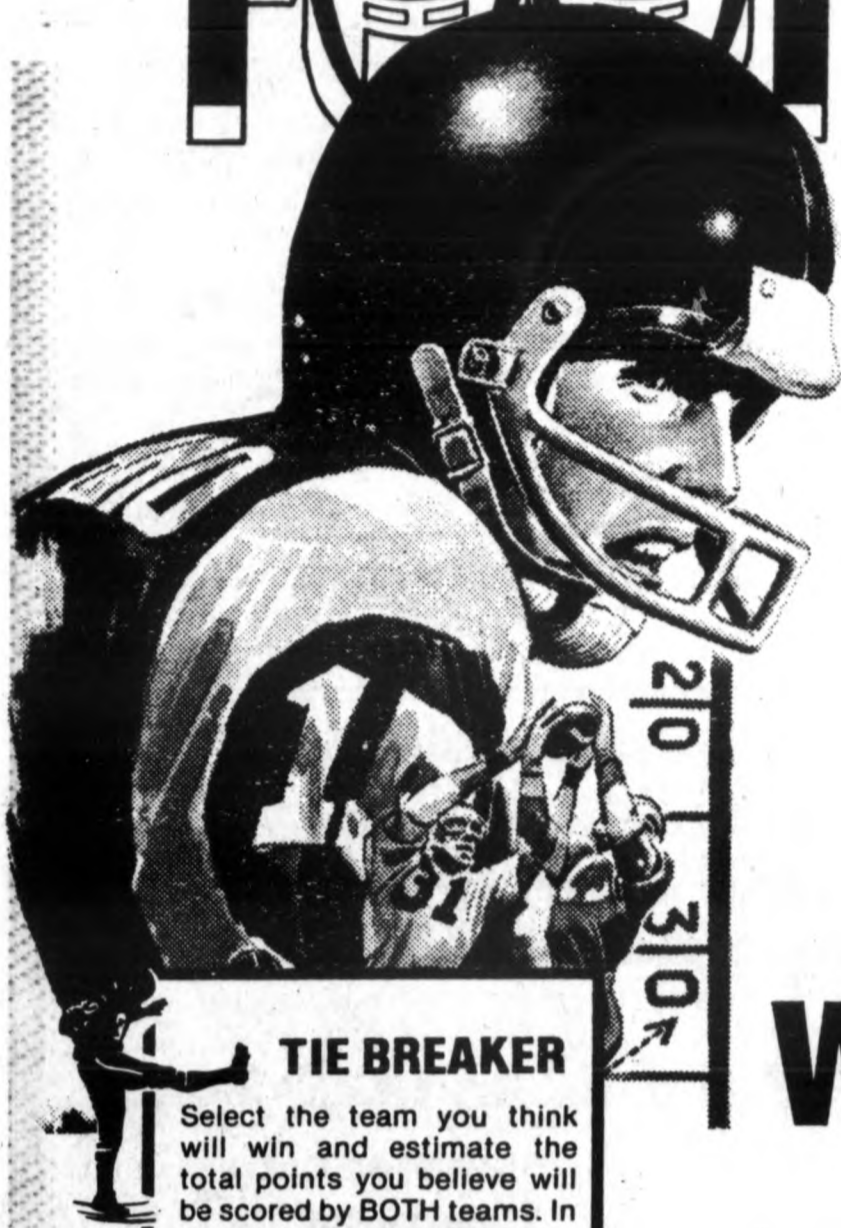
The Powder Puff season championship was held and Robin Thompson took home the top trophy, while Sue Rinard and Tammy Doolittle took trophies for second and third, respectively.

Shangri-La resists 'fancy' label

When John Khavari opened his Shangri-La Restaurant and Lounge on US-27 in St. Johns in July, 1983, he planned to offer dishes that were not

expensive entrees," he says.

Neither of these are true, he says. It is an image he wants to change.

"We are not too fancy

atmosphere to people," he says. "Atmosphere is an accomodation...The object is a good restaurant. The first priority is good food. The second priority is good service. The third is good atmosphere."

So come as you are, he says.

Khavari also argues that his prices are reasonable. In fact, he figures they are about 30 percent lower than comparable restaurants in the Lansing area.

Specials included, the average price of a Shangri-La Dinner is about \$9, he says. Some are under \$9. Some are over \$13.

Even one of the more expensive meals, a seafood buffet on Friday evenings, is reasonable at \$13.95, he says.

"Sure you can go somewhere and see two miles of salad bar," he says. "But how much salad can you eat? I'm offering crablegs, all you can eat."

He points out a Thursday evening special, a "Prime Rib Night," that costs \$7.95. That is top grade prime rib, he says, adding that the restaurant always buys the best available grade of food. Meat prices can vary up to \$2 per pound, he says, and the restaurant buys the best available.

"At no time have we tried to save money on quality," Khavari says.

Then there is the Monday night special. On Monday two people can have dinner and pay for only the least expensive one.

"On Monday two people can eat for \$7.95," he says. "I don't believe I'm expensive."

The bottom line, says Khavari, is that he wants people to try his restaurant out. Try it, he says, you'll



already found in local restaurants and to offer extra attention to the customer. The idea was not to compete with other restaurants in the town but to find his own niche — to add something to the community.

After two years in business the restaurant has found its own niche. The problem is not everybody knows it. While the restaurant is by no means a flop, Khavari does think it has a bit of an image problem.

"Still people think this is a very outrageous restaurant and you have to have a coat and tie to get in...and that we have very

over here," he says. "We are clean. We are nice. We are intimate. We are not a fast food restaurant under any measurement."

"But we are not exclusive. We are casual elegance. And that casual elegance can be enjoyed in jeans or a tie and coat."

Indeed the earthtones, cloth napkins and soft lighting of the interior of the restaurant do create an elegant atmosphere. But that, says Khavari, is not the point. The point, he says, is good food at reasonable prices prepared and served by a staff that pays a lot of attention to the customer.

"I am not selling at

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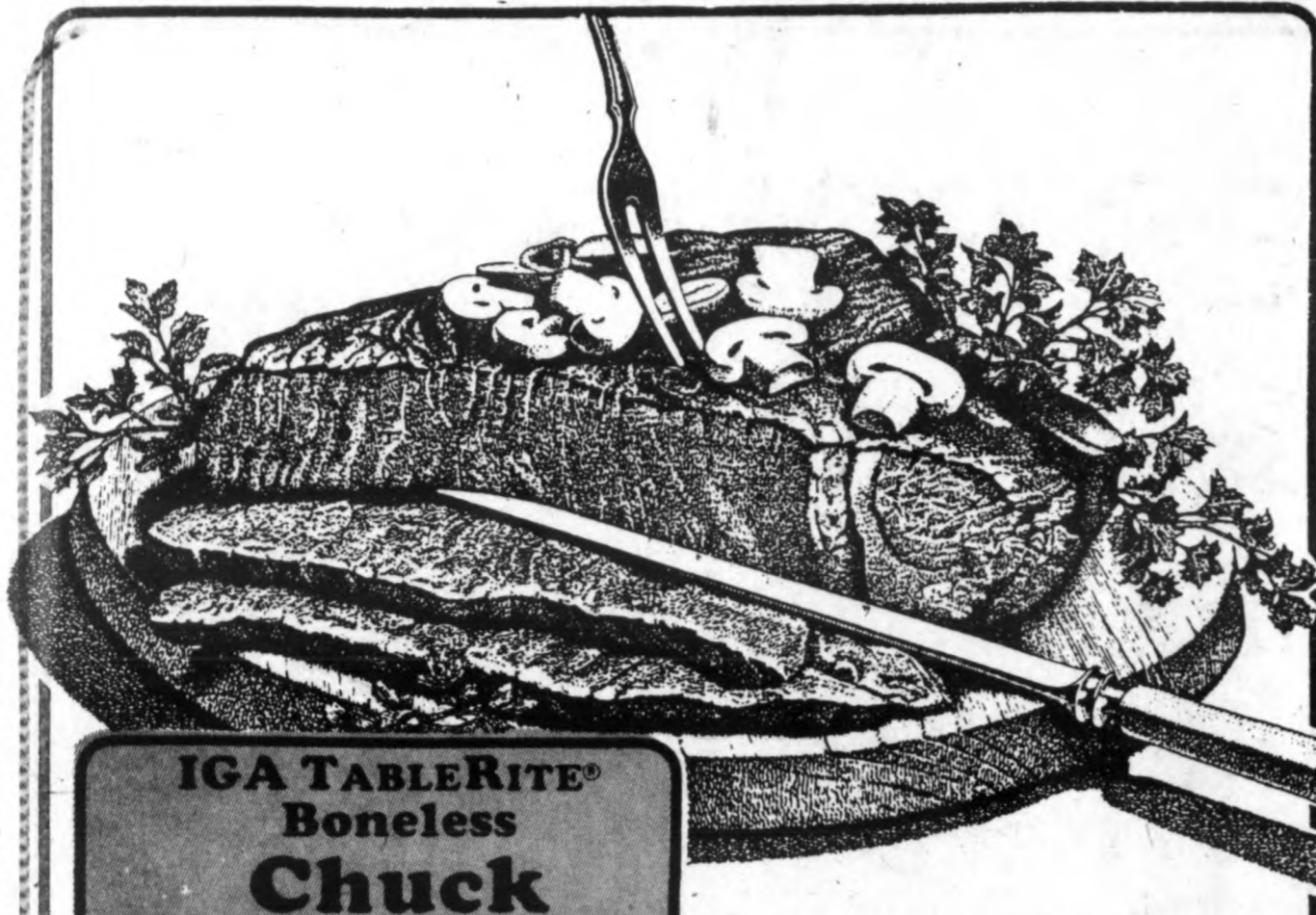

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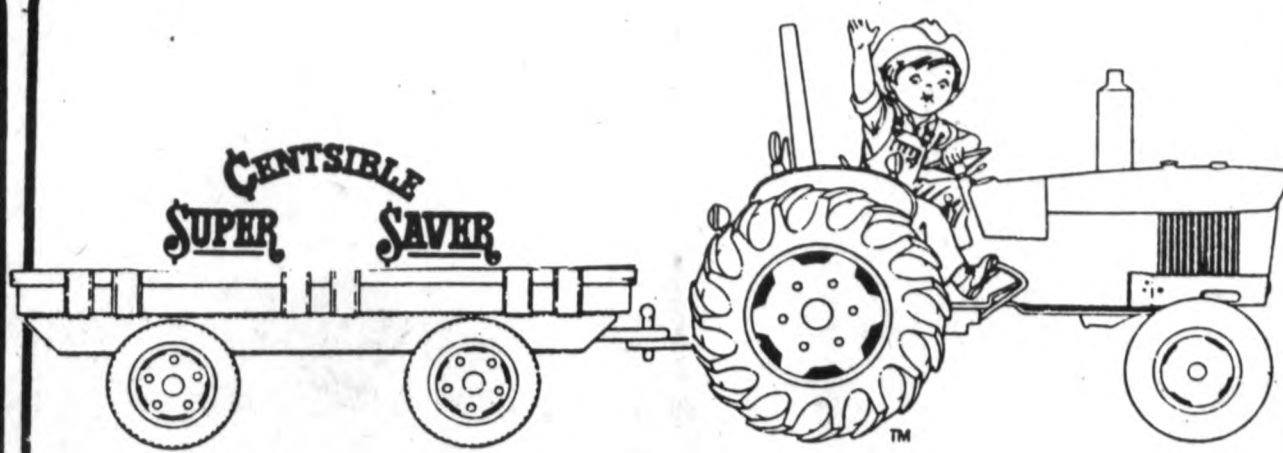

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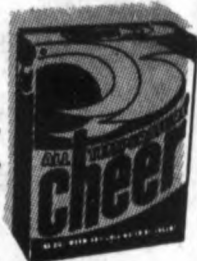

DeWitt woman to walk again following historic operation

Two-year-old Lisa Coleman of DeWitt doesn't understand why her mom sits in a metal chair instead of walking, but it doesn't seem to bother the blonde-haired youngster as she whines for mommy to hold her.

Lisa doesn't remember the terrible car accident that severely damaged her mother Jackie's knees but left her, in her child restraint seat, without a bruise. And she doesn't know that soon, thanks to a revolutionary simultaneous double knee transplant, her mom will be out of the wheelchair and walking again.

Jackie returned home last week from Mount Sinai Hospital in Toronto where she was the first person in North America to receive two knee transplants at the same time.

She says her doctor there, Alan Gross, didn't tell her it was a first until two days after it had been done.

"I DIDN'T KNOW it was a big deal, it was just what I wanted," she says.

Jackie's legs were so damaged from a hit and run accident that caused her car to plow into a utility pole that at first, she and her doctors were afraid they would have to be amputated.

But once that fear passed, Jackie was given three options by her local doctor, George Stillwill, who told her he had done all that he was able.

She could receive artificial knees, which would have to be replaced about every five years, or have her knees fused, which would be a one-time operation but mean that she wouldn't be able to bend her legs at all.

Or, she could visit Dr. Gross in Toronto, who was a specialist in knee transplants. It took her a month to get up enough courage to make that appointment.

"I was discouraged. I really wanted something done. And I knew that if I didn't at least give myself this chance I'd be foolish," Jackie says.

WHEN DR. GROSS TALKED her into becoming one of his transplant patients, she insisted that both legs be done at the same time. She wanted to be up and around and able to take care of her daughter, she told him.

Gross agreed to the idea, knowing it had never been done before on this continent.

The next step was to wait for a donor. He had told her this could take up to a year, since a person approximately Jackie's age, height, and weight with two good knees had to be found.

But fortunately for Jackie, the wait was only three months long. Gross called her at 10:45 p.m. July 16 to tell her a donor had been found and to come to Toronto within 12 hours.

"I got there the next morning and he was chomping at the bit, waiting for me," she says.

Dr. Gross worked on the left leg, which was more seriously damaged, and another doctor worked on the right leg at the same time. The operation took four and a half hours, but should fix her legs permanently.

"IT'S NICE TO KNOW it's basically over," she says, "the pain is already diminishing."

Jackie still has a cast on her left ankle, which after the accident and a subsequent infection was reconstructed. "Dr. Gross said now that I had such nice knees it was silly to have a bad ankle," she laughs.

She will return to Toronto in November for about four weeks to have the cast removed and to go through intensive physical therapy. She'll be walking with braces for about a year and a half, and then should be able to walk independently without any trouble.

As a labor and delivery nurse at St. Lawrence Hospital for two years before the accident, Jackie says her medical knowledge helped her somewhat to understand what was going on, but that same knowledge was scary at times.

"I knew the complications that could occur, and I knew what would be painful," she says.

"I gained a tremendous amount of insight as to what it feels like on the other side of the fence," she says.

"I'm a coward when it comes to pain, but you do what you have to do. I really believe that God doesn't give you any more than you can handle," she says thoughtfully.

Jackie says she tries to dwell on what *didn't* happen instead on what has happened to her since that day in September, 1984 when her car was struck.

"LISA WASN'T TOUCHED, and I know her car seat saved her life. My seat belt saved my life. I could've had to wait a long time to have the operation, but I only had to wait three months. And there was no infection or rejection after the transplant operation," she says.

Right now, Jackie is enjoying the reunion with her daughter and remembering the support from her family, friends, and co-workers during her year-long ordeal that ended with a historic operation.

"I think I'm an extremely lucky human being," she says.
