### Cookbook

**CLINTON COUNTY** "Savor It", the first Michigan 4-H state cookbook sponsored by the Michigan 4-H Foundation, is available for purchase at the Clinton County Cooperative Extension Office in St. Johns.

Over 1200 recipes were collected last spring, 500 of which were selected by the state 4-H staff and the home economists at Favorite Recipes Press in Nashville, Tenn. ## Vote today; Board vows not to quit

### Big turnout expected for millage vote

The Tuesday school millage election was expected to draw a larger-than-usual number of voters, judging from an increase in the number of people who registered to vote in the election and from a dramatic increase in the number of absentee ballots requested.

Absentee ballot requests increased dramatically, said Diane Hazle, a secretary in the St. Johns school business office. Hazle said the June 30 election drew about 39 absentee ballot requests. In September, the election drew about 79 requests, she

said. "We already have about 180 requests for this election," she said.

Voter registration is higher than normal but the increase is not dramatic, said township clerks and the St. Johns city clerk.

"We've had about 30 people register in three weeks," said Riley Township Clerk Rodney Hayes.

Hayes said millage elections usually draw about 15 registrants. Bingham Township Clerk Jeanette Mehney said she has observed an increase of about 25 to 30 more registrants than normal before a school election. She said a number of registered voters checked to make sure they were registered.

"Registrations are up for this time of year," said St. Johns City Clerk Richard Coletta. "It's heavier than normal before a school election."

"There's been a little (increase) but nothing dramatic," said Bengal Township Clerk Alden Knight.

### No change in Board stance

The St. Johns Board of Education refused Nov. 19 a request by the Concerned Taxpayers of St. Johns that the entire Board resign.

The Board also refused a request by the same citizen group that busing be reinstated and then canceled again only if voters refuse the millage proposal.

The requests were made at a crowded Board meeting held in the Rodney B. Wilson Middle School auditorium. At the meeting spokesmen for Concerned Taxpayers repeated charges that the Board's decision to suspend busing before the election was an attempt to "blackmail" voters into voting for the millage increase. The group said earlier this month it would seek the resignation or recall of the Board.

Concerned Taxpayers member

Jim Sickles read a letter at the Nov. 19 meeting in which the citizen group asked for the immediate resignation of the Board and Superintendent of Schools Earl Gabriel.

Board President Peter Apostal said he would not resign. "For those of you who want a recall — go for it," he said. "I'm not going to quit."

Board member Gary Whitford noted that he had at a Concerned Taxpayers meeting earlier this month publicly asked if he should resign and had been given a "resounding no." Since that time, he said, he had received numerous supportive phone calls.

The Board also refused to reinstate busing until after the election.

"I don't feel at this time that it would be beneficial," said Apostal.

Board member Thomas Irrer said reversing the decision would give voters who were not at the meeting the impression that the Board will give in to whatever group happens to be before them at the time.

Whitford, who voted against cut-

ting the bus service before the election, said it would not be appropriate for him to make a motion to rescind an action he had voted against.

Robert Craig, who also voted against cutting bus service prior to the election, said, "You have to understand that the votes are just not there."

A number of residents spoke in opposition to the bus cut and other actions of the Board and the school administration, their remarks often drawing applause.

Also in attendance were residents who spoke in support of the Board's actions. Their remarks also drew applause, although usually not as loud as that following remarks in opposition to the Board.

Essex Township dairy farmer Al Anderson supported the busing cut, saying educational programs, not transportation, should be the priority of the district.

"I think it was an unpopular decision but a good one," he said.

### Local farmer says Blanchard will listen

An agriculture conference held last week in Flint will not change anything overnight but it did show that Governor James Blanchard's will listen to farmers, says a Clinton County farmer who attended the conference.

Earl Barks, a St. Johns farmer and the president of the Michigan chapter of the American Agriculture Movement, says the Governor's Conference on the Future of Michigan Agriculture indicated to him that Blanchard is seeking direction from farmers about what to do about farm economy problems.

"I think he was just plain looking for direction, I really do," says Barks. "I think the good thing about it is that the Governor's putting some emphasis on agriculture. He's looking to the leaders in agriculture to tell him what they can do for farmers."

"To specifically say tomorrow morning this or that is going to hap-

pen — I can't say that," he says.

Farmers from around the state divided into various workshops, says Barks. He attended workshops dealing with international trade, not the workshops dealing with farm issues specific to Michigan.

However, Barks says, many of the workshops at the conference dealt with promoting agriculture in Michigan. He said the conference may have speeded up the opening of a "gasohol" plant in the state.

The plant, located in Alma, was started by a group of farmers who pooled \$1 million of their own money and borrowed another \$7 million, he says. The loan was foreclosed upon, leaving the future of the unopened plant uncertain. The conference may have paved the way for financing by an established gasohol firm, Barks says.

"That's something that could be a reality fairly quick," he says.

Christmas exhibits include a Victorian Christmas tree, one horse cut-

ter, trees of the holidays, the carvings of George Mesh, ornaments of dining, a teacher's Christmas handkerchief collection, dolls of the 1920's, an eclectic doll house, and a 1948 Louis Marx train. Tatted snowflakes and bells will be available for sale.

The museum will be open on Sundays beginning Dec. 1 from 1:00 until 5:00 p.m. and Wednesdays from 2:00 until 8:00 p.m. through Jan. 2.

## Lawyer serves not-so-wealthy clients

Call her a do-gooder. Call her a soft touch. Call her if you have legal problems and not much money to pay for a lawyer.

St. Johns attorney Joan Montgomery probably would not have put it quite that way. She would, after all, just as soon get paid for her work. But when all is said and done Montgomery has proven she is willing to offer her legal services to those who can not afford a lawyer.

As one of three Clinton County lawyers who belong to an agency that matches lawyers with indigent clients — the other two are Bob Bellgowan and Dan Skorich — Montgomery donated a minimum of 100 hours of professional services last year. On top of that she regularly takes on clients who are not exactly indigent but who do not have the kind of money it usually takes to hire a lawyer. For those clients she waives

the usual retainer, or "up front" money, and sets up a monthly payment plan based on what they can afford to pay.

THE INDIGENT CLIENTS are referred to her through Pro Bono, an offshoot of Legal Aid of Central

Michigan. The agency was set up to recruit lawyers willing to donate services in Legal Aid work. Legal Aid, which provides paid staff lawyers to clients whose incomes are below the federal poverty level, sets aside 12 percent of its budget each year to reimburse the expenses — telephone calls and such but not charges for service — of private lawyers who take Pro Bono clients.

Her typical Pro Bono client, Montgomery says, is a woman going through a divorce who does not have her own income. With the break-up of her marriage the woman is typically left on some sort of public assistance, without funds to hire a lawyer to represent her in the divorce proceedings.

"It's very time consuming work," says Montgomery. "I personally give them the same attention I would any other client."

OCCASIONALLY a court will order an employed husband to pay a \$210 legal fee to Montgomery.

"I have yet to collect one," she says. "All of the husbands have skipped town and I haven't been paid."

She doesn't sweat it, Montgomery says. When she takes a Pro Bono case she does not expect to be paid. But she will, she says, try to collect if the husband is gainfully employed and able to pay.

Maybe it is because her Pro Bono clients spread the word that she will represent clients without much money, Montgomery says, that she is often approached by others who do not fall below the poverty level but who can not pay the usual retainer. She takes those cases too, although she encourages some level of payment.

"I TRY TO encourage them to pay something," she says. "I like them to feel they are getting the same service I give everyone else — that they are paying clients."

But why work for little or no money?

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**'Project Secure Child'**

**Kids learn from karate men**

So here you are, just another elementary school kid walking down the hallway, when some bully comes up and bashes you in the face. What do you do?

Get up and bash him back, right?

Wrong. Bob Dearman, a karate blackbelt, told students at St. John's Perrin-Palmer Elementary last week that there is a better way.

"What you do," he said, "is go to your teacher and say, 'I don't know what this guy's problem is, but he can't seem to keep his fist out of my face!'"

If you do this, Dearman explained, the culprit will get in trouble. If you bash him back you will get in trouble.

"You gotta be smart about these things," he said.

DEARMAN and two other blackbelts from the Okinawan Sanchu-Ryu Karate Association were visiting St. Johns schools last week on a special mission called "Project Secure Child." They discussed how to handle a whole range of situations that can make kids feel uncomfortable — from a hallway bully to strangers that say or do things that "give you those butterflies in the stomach."

The blackbelts told the kids that the best thing to do in uncomfortable situations is to attract the attention of someone who can help.

"WE REALLY stress verbalizing and drawing attention," said blackbelt Gary Morgan.

That method includes everything from asking a teacher or a policeman for help, to discussing a bad grade with parents.

"If you can't tell mom and dad that you got a bad grade, how can you tell them a neighbor is abusing you?" Dearman said while discussing the project between sessions with the

students.

To the students Dearman said: "If you think something is wrong, you're right. When these butterflies come you're job is to get rid of them. So you go to mom or dad. The magic thing is that as soon as you talk to them the butterflies go away."

DEARMAN and Morgan showed the kids how to resist being grabbed by a stranger by kicking and yelling — especially yelling.

"The thing is not the words you use, but how you use them," Morgan said.

Morgan said the karate association is a service organization that works with police groups, senior citizens, and school children. The visit last week was arranged through St. Johns Community Education.

## In the House of Representatives Finance committee

The Senate Finance Committee recently approved several bills dealing with such issues as home heating credits and designation of income tax refunds for the state nongame fish and wildlife fund and the Children's Trust Fund.

House Bill 4876 would increase the limit on contributions made to a child-abuse prevention program through income tax checkoffs. The legislation would allow people to designate \$2 or more of their income tax refunds for the Children's Trust Fund. Currently there is a \$2 limit on what a person can designate. At that present rate of contribution, the income tax designation would have to remain in effect for 64 years before the fund became self-sufficient. If passed, the bill would increase the likelihood that the fund could attain self-sufficiency at an earlier date.

The committee also reported a bill that would extend the time period on the designation of income tax refunds for the state nongame fish and wildlife fund. HB 4322 would allow people to designate a portion of their tax refunds to the fund through 1994, unless the fund's assets already exceed \$6 million.

A third bill passed by the committee would increase home heating credits for low-income families that claim credits against the income tax for fuel costs that exceed certain percentages of household income.

The measure (HB 4998) would increase home heating credits for claimants with five exemptions from \$460 to \$480. For those with six exemptions the credit would be increased from \$502 to \$550, plus \$70 for each additional exemption.

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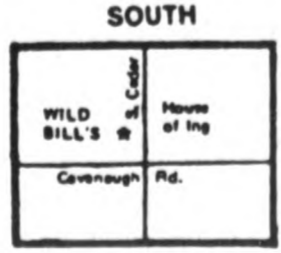
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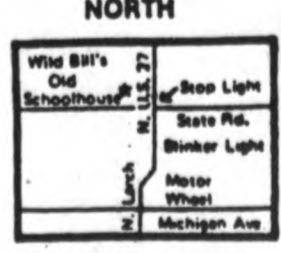
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## 'This kind of blackmail is risky business'

To the Editor:  
The decision by the St. Johns Board of Education and administration to cut the bus service is viewed now by many of us as an act of blackmail.  
The Board's message to us, simply put, is: "Vote favorably on the millage proposal next Tuesday or live forever without busing. And, by the way, we'll make more cuts, in co-curricular activities, if you vote no."

This kind of blackmail is enormously risky business. And because it is so risky, the Concerned Taxpayers of St. Johns Committee, of which I'm a member, has decided to seek the resignations of or recall the school board members. The board should not involve itself in this kind of terrorist activity. They have kidnapped the buses and are holding them for ransom.

That is what makes it risky. Will the voters say yes to the millage increase in the face of blackmail? I hope they will say yes, and I think the Committee's plan — to punish the terrorists later — is a practical one.

It allows the voters to say yes to the millage increase without feeling they have given in completely to blackmailers.

My view is that we must vote for this millage because a school district of 220 square miles cannot be effectively and safely operated without bus service.

I believe the school board and the administration knew this when they canceled busing. There was a certain juvenile gleefulness in the manner in which it was done.

For that reason — the manner in which this was handled — the Committee was asked by those who created it and attended the two mass meetings to look into the feasibility of recalling the school board, some or all, or seeking their resignation.

The intention is to elect a new board that will stand up to and control the school administration as it is elected to do. It is widely felt that Superintendent Earl Gabriel is the person responsible for hatching the blackmail scheme. It is anticipated that a new board would not renew Gabriel's contract; he is regarded as unsympathetic to the people and the problems of this sprawling, rural school district.

## Tell the truth, lobby for state aid

In the Nov. 12 issue Mr. Terres told us that the school district only gets \$673 in state aid per student. That is what I stated in my last letter: the Board and Terres don't tell us the truth. In September Terres told us we got \$2377 in state aid.

Also in Mr. Terres letter of Nov. 12, he stated that inflation has been over 50 percent in the last five years. Inflation has been about three percent per year.

If the school board and administrators in the State would put some effort into lobbying the state legislature to improve state aid, they might get someplace.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** In response to this letter Assistant Superintendent for Business Rick Terres said the \$2,377 figure represents income per student from local tax dollars and state aid combined. The \$673 represents only the state's share of the \$2,377 per pupil.

Confusion may result from the fact that the \$2,377 figure represents "total membership formula" revenue, a phrase that could understandably be mistaken to mean "state aid."

Terres said he based his figures dealing with inflation on the National CPI Index and the Headley Amendment. Those sources, he said, show the following yearly inflation rates: 1979: 10.7; 1980: 11.3; 1981: 13.5; 1982: 10.4; 1983: 6.1; 1984: 3.5; 1985: 4.3.

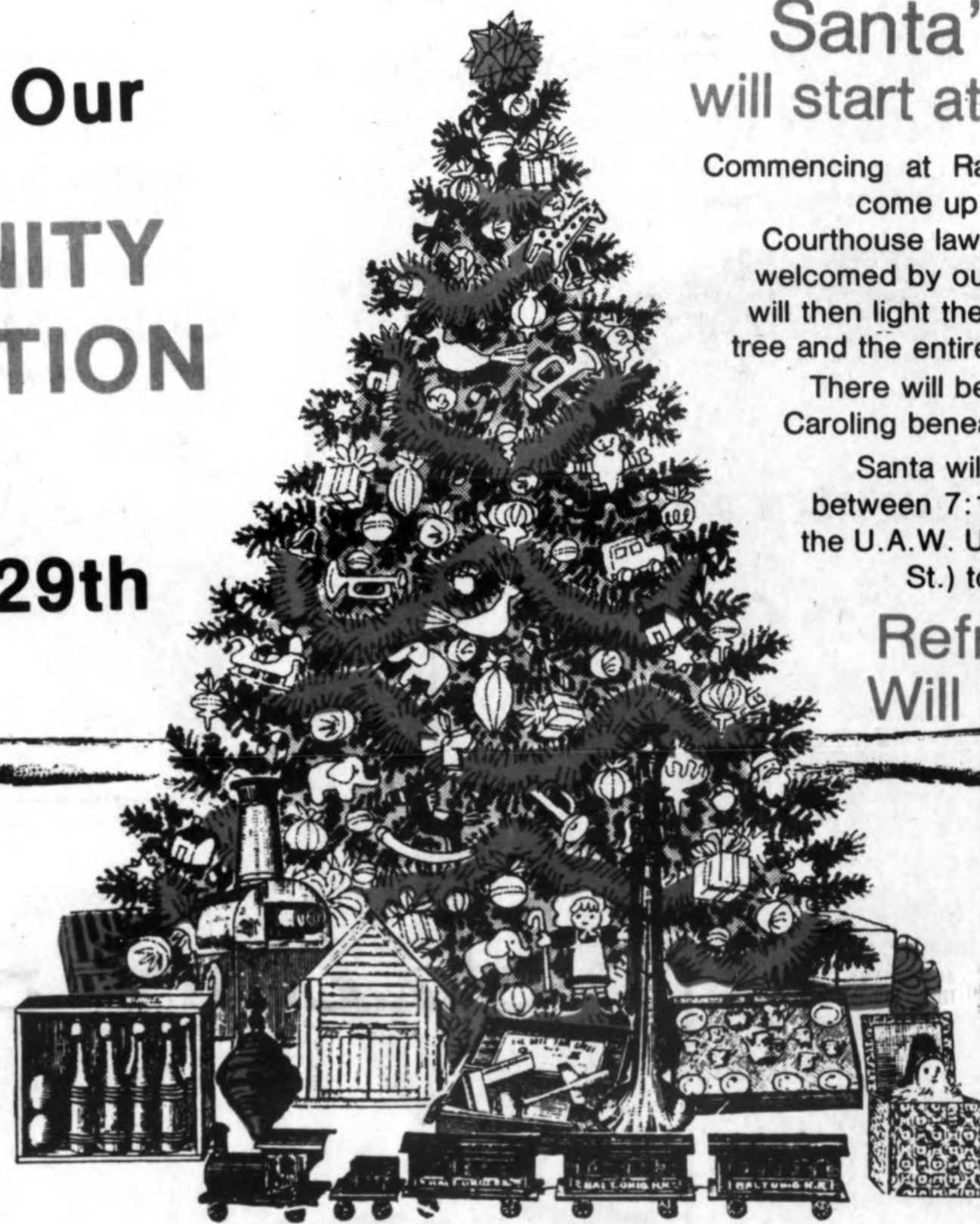

## Family focus

### Leftover turkey

Soon Thanksgiving will be over and all that will be left are the dirty dishes and leftover turkey. Well, don't worry about the turkey. You can quickly turn that cooked meat into a variety of delicious casseroles. By just layering a pasta, such as rice, noodles or bread crumbs, a vegetable, such as broccoli or cauliflower, the turkey and a covering sauce, such as a mixture of cream soup, cheese and milk, you can make some beautiful meals.

A word of caution to remember is that the cooked turkey should be refrigerated within two hours of removing the meat from the oven if you want to use the leftovers. Why just two hours? Because bacteria that can cause food poisoning can multiply to dangerous levels on perishable food left at room temperature for longer than that. It is also important to take out all of the stuffing from the turkey as soon as you remove the bird from the oven.

How you store the leftovers will also be important in preventing bacterial growth. Large quantities should be divided into smaller portions and stored in several small or shallow covered containers. That's because food in small amounts will get cold more quickly. The food then should be used within the next three to four days. If you cannot use all of the meat in that time

you can freeze it. Frozen turkey can safely be kept for one month. Just be sure to wrap it in freezer paper or heavy duty aluminum foil and date it. Otherwise, the turkey will become tough and dried out.

Listed below is just one of the "make-a-casserole" combinations you can put together and be proud of serving to anyone.

#### TURKEY-BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

- Six servings, about 1 cup each  
Calories per serving: about 425
- 4 ounces uncooked noodles (about 3 cups)
  - 10 ounce pkg. frozen broccoli spears
  - 2 T. butter or margarine
  - 2 T. flour
  - 1/2 t salt
  - 1/4 t dry mustard
  - 1/8 t pepper
  - 2 cups milk
  - 1 cup processed cheddar cheese, shredded (about 3 1/2 ounces)
  - 3 cups turkey, cooked and diced
1. Cook noodles and broccoli as directed on packages, drain.
  2. Melt butter or margarine; stir in flour and seasonings.
  3. Add milk slowly; cook, stirring constantly, until thickened.
  4. Remove from heat; add cheese and stir until melted.
  5. Dice broccoli stems, leave flowerets whole.
  6. Place noodles, broccoli stems, and turkey in an 8x8x2 inch baking dish.
  7. Pour cheese sauce over ingredients in baking dish.
  8. Arrange broccoli flowerets on top, pressing them in to sauce.
  9. Bake, uncovered, at 350 F (moderate), for about 25 minutes or until bubbly.

"Our cannons of ethics dictate that we contribute time," she says. "I felt I should contribute...I'm guess I'm just a do-gooder."

"I think most lawyers do 'pro bono' work but they do not do it through an organization and they don't call it 'pro bono.' I think lawyers as a whole are community minded people."

Here she makes a plug for the Pro Bono organization.

"Pro Bono has a difficult time because there are not enough at-

torneys on the list willing to do the work," she says. "They will do pro bono work but they are not interested in being organized."

IN HER OWN case, she says, she did not realize when she started with Pro Bono that the organization will pay for some expenses incurred as well as providing secretarial services. Once she discovered that, she says, donating her time cost less money.

Montgomery is a former St. Johns School teacher. She started law school at age 36, beginning her prac-

tice as a lawyer three years later.

She grew up on the east coast in a low income neighborhood, which, she says, besides leaving her with an ingrained distaste for cockroaches, may have something to do with willingness to take low income clients.

"I guess my background may have something to do with it in that I see my background in them," she says.

Montgomery also serves on the board of directors of both Pro Bono and Legal Aid, as well as serving as president of Clinton County Big Brothers/Big Sisters.

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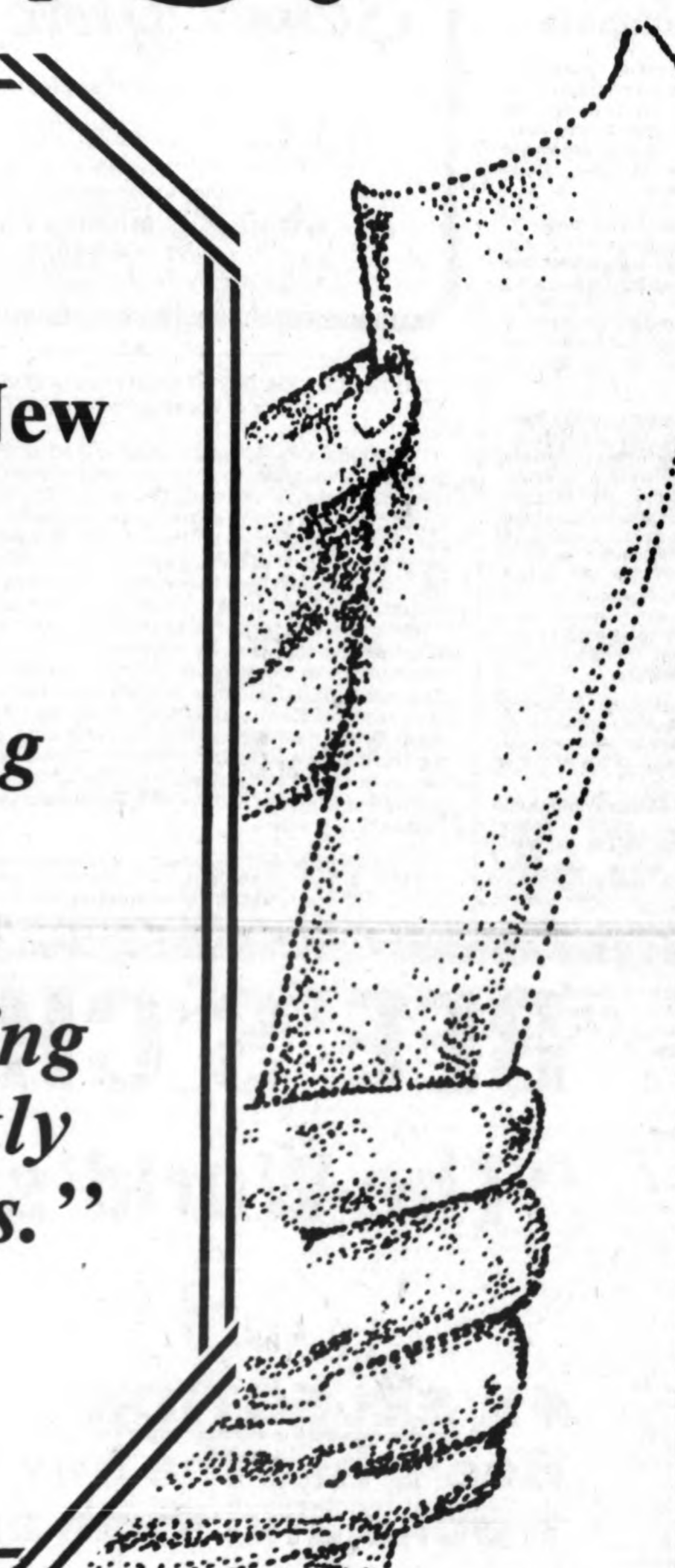

## Ask Bill Schuette

### Foreign agriculture

Bill Schuette



Who do you think gets a \$47 million, zero-interest, 50-year loan from the U.S. government for agriculture: the American farmer, or the People's Republic of China? Unfortunately, the answer is not the American farmer.

Absurd as it may seem, these are the types of credit terms available through the World Bank and other international financial institutions of which the U.S. is a member. While we subsidize give-away credit terms to countries like communist China, our own farmers are squeezed out of the credit market entirely.

Not only is the availability of such loans unfair to our farmers who need credit, but it also undermines our farm exports. As foreign farm products subsidized by American taxpayers enter the world market, our share of the market shrinks, our surpluses increase and prices go even further down.

Examples of these loans are plentiful. This year, the World Bank loaned Soviet-dominated Hungary \$80 million for "expansion of exports of processed animal products." Uruguay received \$60 million to increase its farm exports, and Egypt got \$139 million to increase its production of rice for export. This list goes on and on.

There is a growing realization in Washington that we must help our own farmers and industries before

we subsidize our economic competitors. The Foreign Agriculture Investment Reform (FAIR) Act, of which I am an original co-sponsor, will help prevent our tax dollars from being used to undermine our economic competitiveness.

The FAIR Act would accomplish this goal in several ways if enacted. Our representatives in international financing investments would be required to oppose commodity production investments when such commodities were already in surplus on the world market or directly competed with U.S. producers. The FAIR Act would also reduce U.S. contributions to international financing institutions by the amount of U.S. funds that were to countries which subsidize their exports or produce commodities for a surplus market.

At a time when family farms are facing the worst economic times since the Depression, we've got to end government policies which contradict the needs of our own farmers. Our farmers and taxpayers should not be worse off because of our membership in organizations like the World Bank. We must stop raiding the Treasury and giving away the farm to boot.

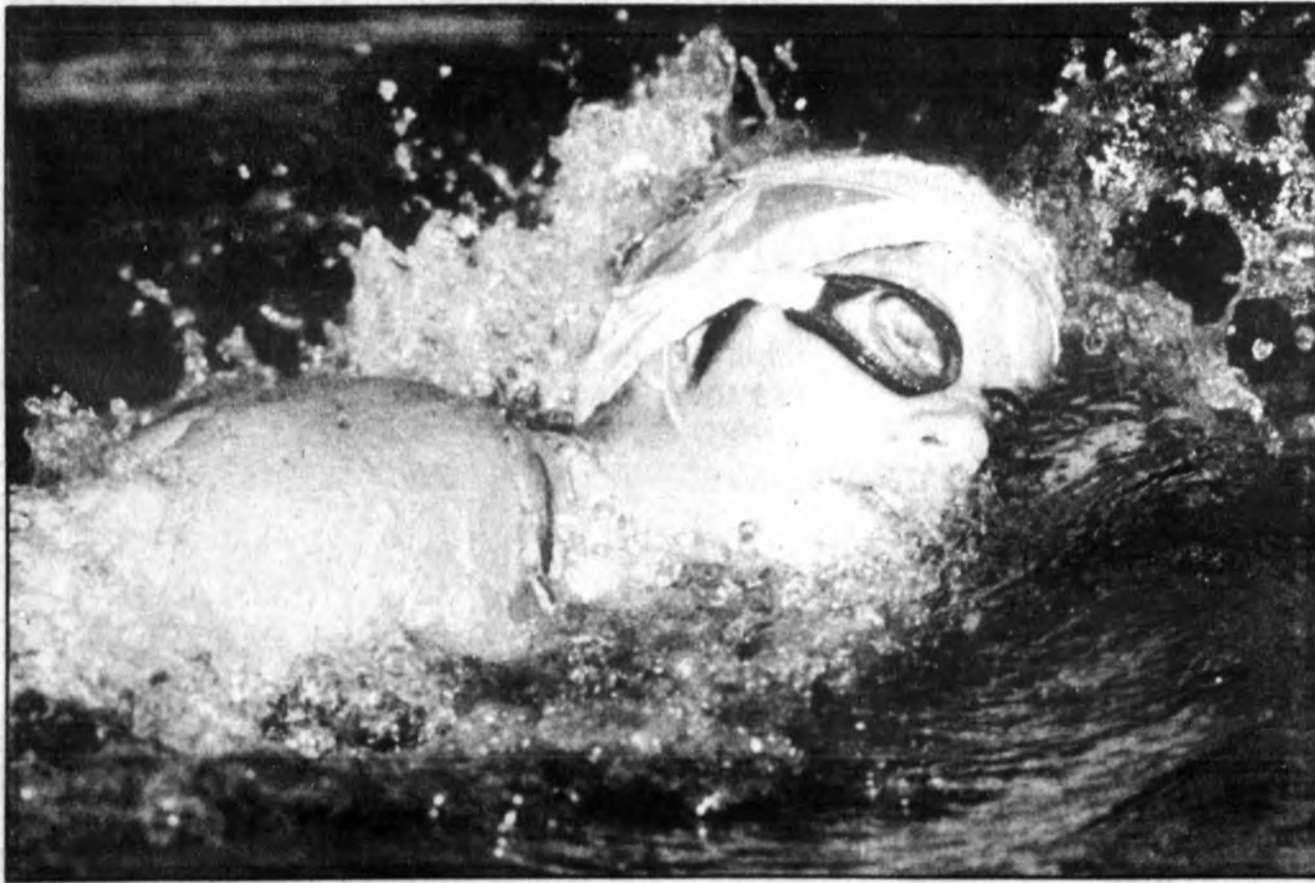

Tina along with four other sophomores added depth to the team helping Spring Arbor finish the season with a fifth place finish in the NCCAA meet.

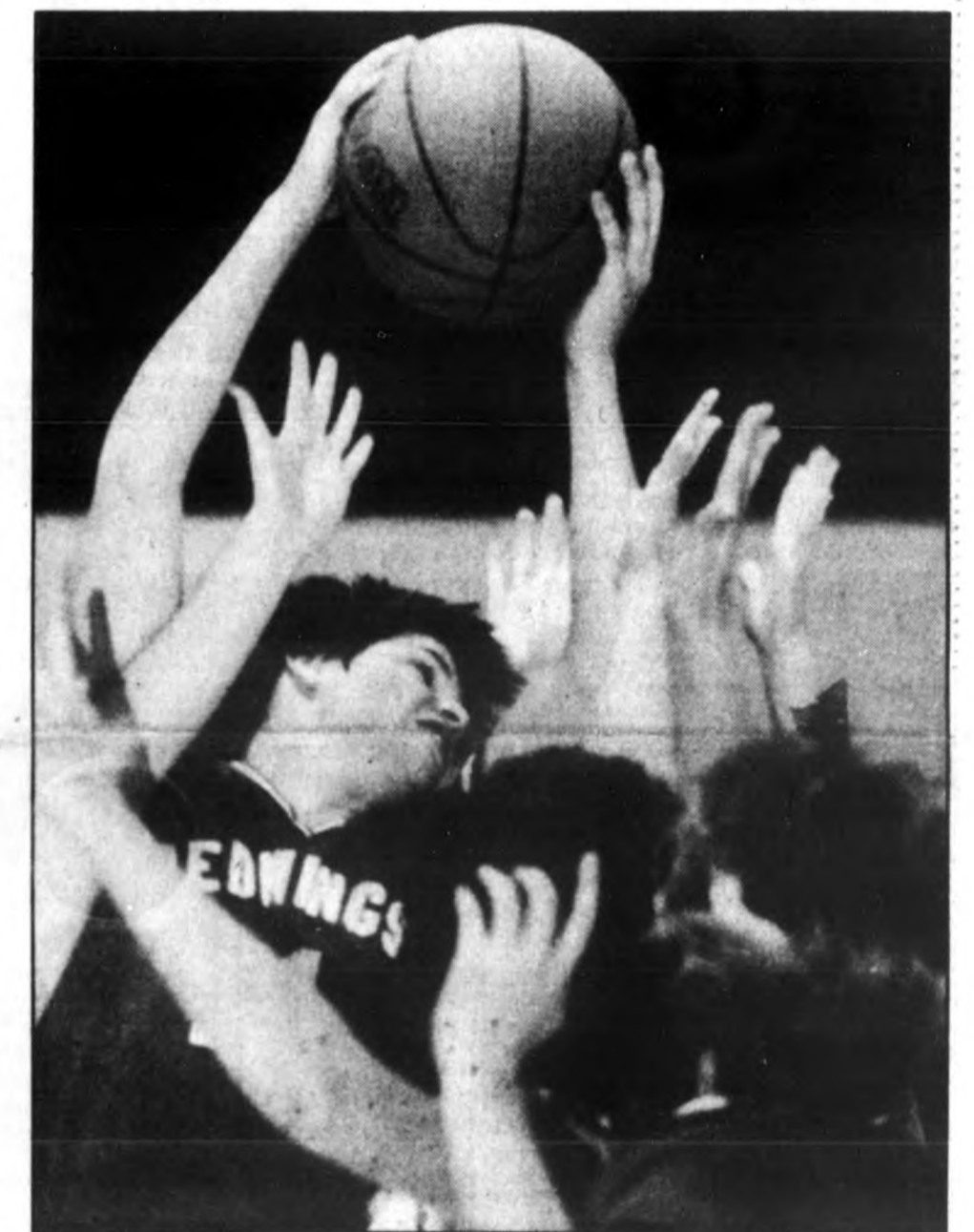
