Care for elderly called growing crisis situation

The difference between the need for in-home services for the elderly and the services available to meet that need has become a crisis. As the population becomes older the problem will get worse unless more funding for services is provided.

This is the consensus among those who provide services to the elderly, including several in Clinton County. They say there are sound humanitarian and economic reasons for providing increased funding for services to older people who want to stay at home rather than in a nursing home.

Many of the services — home delivered meals, in-home health care, housekeeping, home repair, transportation, home companion and respite care — are provided by tri-county agencies with long waiting

lists. Although Clinton County waiting lists are not as dramatic as in some areas, those responsible for providing services to Clinton County elderly agree there is a need for more services — and that waiting lists may not tell the whole story.

FURTHERMORE, the problem will get worse unless more state funding is provided, said representatives of agencies that provide services to the elderly, at a press conference in Lansing last week. According to information provided at the press conference:

- In the next ten years there will be a 25 percent increase in the number of people over 75 years and a 50 percent increase in those over 85 years — precisely the age group with the most need.

- Because of a recent change in the Medicare system, older patients are released from hospitals an average of two days earlier than was previously the case, often still in need of care and often with no other option than to seek institutional care.

SECONDLY, services are sometimes provided whether the providing agency can afford it or not. Archie Tomczyk, who coordinates the Home Health Care Aide program through Clinton Memorial Hospital, said the program is currently over-budget in its spending.

"When we find a patient who is truly in need we go ahead and service them," she said, adding that doing so inevitably will mean the program will run out of money before the end of the fiscal year.

And although there is currently no waiting list for the home-delivered meal program in Clinton County, the county is not immune to the crisis hitting other areas.

"IT JUST MEANS at this particular moment we are meeting the needs," said Tomczyk. "It doesn't mean that tomorrow, when we get five more referrals that we won't have a waiting list."

At the press conference last week the Tri-County Office on Aging, along with other aging agencies from around the state, announced a proposal, called "Elder Aid," that would provide an additional \$20 million each year in state funding of services to the elderly. The press conference last week was intended to rally public support for the proposal.

"We're hoping the public will talk to their representatives, senators, and the governor," said Roxanna Peterson, executive director of the Tri-County Office on Aging. "The only place we know to turn is the state, and the state has said the elderly are not a priority."

The thrust of the program would be to assist the elderly to remain in their homes rather than moving to nursing homes. This would allow the elderly more comfort and independence than a nursing home can provide, said Peterson. Secondly, it makes economic sense to make services available in the home, where they can be provided more cheaply than in nursing homes, she said.

Mark Stapelman, administrator of Hazel I. Findlay Moanor in St. Johns, widely considered the best quality nursing home in the state, while not agreeing that in-home care is ultimately cheaper than that provided by nursing homes, agreed there is a need for increased in-home service to the elderly.

"There need is distinct from and over and above the need for nursing homes," he said.

He said the more services are available to elderly people who are capable of living in their own homes, the more space there will be available in nursing homes for those who really need nursing home care.

"We still have a waiting list and it's growing every day," he said.

- Requests for home services for the elderly in Michigan doubled from 70,000 in 1981 to 146,000 in 1986.

- In the tri-county area there are currently 100 people on waiting lists for in-home services. In Clinton County there are eight people waiting for help with household chores and about the same number waiting for health care service.

Waiting lists, however, do not include those who inquire about services but who do not follow through when they discover help will be slow in coming. Pauline Baert, coordinator of the Clinton County Senior Citizen Outreach and Transportation Center, said she sometimes provides such callers with the names of those available for hire for in-home services.

"For those who can afford it," she said. "That is often a problem for many of them."

Seniors help seniors in volunteer program

Although professionals in the field say it is going to take money to care for the growing percentage of elderly people who make up our population, there is always a need for volunteers willing to donate their time.

Most agencies that provide services to the elderly use a combination of paid staff and volunteers and when funds run short volunteers are priceless.

In some cases it is a matter of the elderly helping the elderly and helping themselves in return. One agency that has put out a call for volunteers is the Senior Companion Program, a program sponsored by Catholic Social Services and funded by the Department of Mental Health. The program consists of low income volunteers, aged 60 years and up, who are paid a stipend for serving older adults who have mental health needs.

"In addition to tangible benefits, such as stipends, meals, transportation and insurance, these individuals are provided with an opportunity to

share their life experiences, as well as a lifetime of coping and problem solving skills," says Ann Bridgeland, director of the program.

The clients are chronically mentally ill adults aged 60 years and older, as well as disabled adults aged 45 or older. Each volunteer is assigned a particular client. Senior Companion Program staff and other agencies that serve older people assist in formulating activities for the volunteers to perform, based on the needs of the clients.

"We serve a particular population with mental health needs," says Bridgeland.

Volunteers are given 40 hours of training before beginning their assignment. Once they start, transportation and meals are provided.

Bridgeland says a training session is planned for the last week of January. Those interested in finding out more about the program may call her at 482-9558.

Schools try to save money

The St. Johns Board of Education on Dec. 16 approved two measures intended to hold the line against rising insurance and data processing costs.

In one action the Board voted to invest about \$10,000 in an insurance pool being formed by the Michigan

Association of School Boards (MASB). The pool is designed to hold the line against sharply rising insurance costs in Michigan and provide an option for school districts in case other insurers can not be found.

The \$10,000 is the contribution of the school district to a pool of "start up" money for the insurance plan. The MASB asked state school

districts to invest three dollars per student. Richard Terres, assistant superintendent for business for St. Johns schools, said he expects the money to be returned to the school district within one year.

WHEN THE INSURANCE pool is established, participating school districts will be able to choose from property and casualty coverage through the MASB plan or through commercial insurers. The pool will provide school districts with an option for coverage if other insurers can not be found, Terres said, noting that some Michigan school districts have not been able to purchase property and casualty insurance coverage.

Terres also said he anticipates in-

Ask Bill Schuette

Farm bill

On December 18, the House passed the 1985 Farm Bill. The bill, the result of negotiations between the House and Senate, was passed by the Senate on the same day, and now awaits the president's signature to become law.

This farm bill is not everything that it could be, and if it were written for mid-Michigan, it would be different in some respects. But this legislation maintains income bridges to farmers and their families who are suffering great economic stress.

For that reason, while meeting with the President on Dec. 17, I urged him to sign the 1985 farm bill. The decisions we in Congress make have a rippling effect throughout not only our economy, but the world as well. I told President Reagan that times are tough in farm country and that there is a great stress on the farm today. We need solid farm legislation so that producers can make long-range plans and continue to earn the income that is so badly needed.

Here are some features of the bill:

- It freezes target prices for almost three years. Target prices represent income bridges to farmers, and cannot be lowered in this time of stress among farmers and their families.

- It provides farmers who wish to leave dairy production with the opportunity to do so with dignity and a chance to get started in something else, thus reducing the dairy surpluses that have depressed the market and cost the government a great deal. This

whole herd buyout is very, very popular in farm country.

- It freezes the dairy price support next year, giving farmers the opportunity to adjust to future price fluctuations.

- It leaves our sugar program untouched while insuring that taxpayers do not have to pay for the program.

- It contains innovative new programs, such as the bakers dozen or bonus bushel idea to increase our commodity exports and put more dollars in farmers' pockets.

- And, it mandates the most far-reaching conservation program in the history of agriculture, including the sodbuster and swampbuster, to prevent the destruction of highly erodible land and wetlands, and the conservation reserve, for many years to come.

No one in the House would argue that this bill is the whole answer to problems faced by farm families. It is the product of intense competition, competition between ideas advocated by individuals who sincerely believe that their approach is the right course for agriculture into the 21st Century. As the result of compromise and consensus, it reflects policies that most of the disparate elements of American agriculture can endorse.

General assistance

Legislation has been introduced in the Michigan House that is designed to curb the influx of people from other states who want to collect higher general assistance welfare payments in Michigan.

Under this new bill, which I co-sponsored, if a person applying for general assistance has received public assistance from another state within the previous 60 days, that person shall receive, for the first six months of eligibility, an amount equal to the amount received in that state if it is less than the amount paid to residents of Michigan.

This legislation will not affect applicants who have been receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) from other states because the at-

torney general said that since AFDC is partially funded by federal monies, it would be unconstitutional to limit those benefits.

Nor will this legislation affect Michigan residents who are currently receiving general assistance.

DSS officials project an estimated \$300,000 savings for fiscal year 1986 if this legislation is enacted quickly.

DSS officers named to county board

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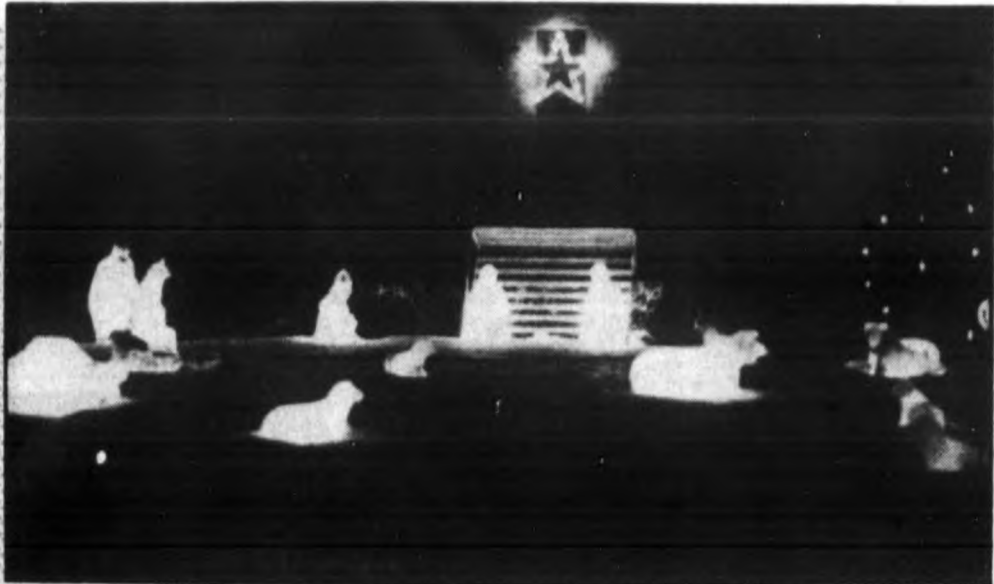

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Family works to remove scars of child abuse

Another chapter of the book is finished, but there's a long way to go until one Bath family reaches the end.

Mary Harte's former son-in-law was recently sentenced for criminal sexual conduct charges against her two grandchildren that go back seven years. But that long-awaited step in her family's case hasn't altered her zeal for an organization she started, Grandparents Against Child Abuse.

"It's not going to change anything. The trauma is over for us, but other people's problems are still going on...our problems are still going on. My granddaughter is in an institution, my grandson is still having problems dealing with it, and sometimes I wonder if my daughter is going to make it," Harte says.

Her daughter, Jan Wildt, mother of Harte's two grandchildren that suffered the abuse, says she believes they've finally hit the bottom of the barrel and that things from now on, although not easy, will be a little better for her and her 10-year-old twins, Michael and Kim.

Now that the case is finally out of the courts, she says she is going to speak out whenever she can about her experience. Not only will she use Grandparents Against Child Abuse as a vehicle to help others, but will also speak at meetings sponsored by Reach Out and the Michigan State Police.

She wants to tell people the agony of seeing her family ripped apart. She wants to relate those conflicting love/hate emotions toward someone who you once lived with but has now turned against you. She wants to tell people not to be so trusting, not to overlook suspicions just because you're married to someone.

"Don't be too willing to take excuses. I carry a lot of the guilt for what happened to my children, because I was so much in love with my husband, I wouldn't believe what was going on. I could always attribute what happened to another cause," she says.

"But the kids will have this with them for the rest of their lives," she says.

Kim is in an institution now to help her deal with the abusive situation that she has known since she was a young girl. Michael lives at home and attends school. He is also seen by a therapist.

When the children sat down at Harte's old typewriter to compose a letter to Santa Claus when Kim was home for Thanksgiving, their request to the man in red surprised even their family.

"Santa, if you can bring our family back together again and help all the other children that are going thru abuse to find someone that cares to help them thru it too. And if you could just put a stop to the abuse altogether, if you asked everyone to help, they'd listen to you, Santa. Please!!!" reads the letter in part.

Stopping abuse is not an easy task. The occurrences of criminal sexual conduct with children across the nation is increasing dramatically.

In Clinton County, Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen says that approximately 40 percent of the criminal cases he sees involve sex crimes. Two years ago, he says, the number was more like 5 percent.

Prosecutor Jon Newman agrees that the cases have increased greatly. In 1984, his office prosecuted 10 persons for criminal sexual conduct with children (under 16). In 1985, there have been 26 cases so far.

"That doesn't give the whole story either, because there are cases in the probate court that involve CSC with children as well," he says.

"It's emotionally draining to prosecute those cases, because you look at the children and your heart goes out to them and you want to hang the guy. But you have to bargain so as not to traumatize the children any more (by having them testify in court)," he says.

In the majority of cases, Newman says, his office has successfully avoided putting the child on the witness stand. The Wildt children did not have to testify.

The kind of evidence the prosecutor seeks in such a case is medical and psychological experts to corroborate what the children say. A recent Court of Appeals decision has helped greatly, he says, because it allows in certain circumstances the attorney to introduce statements that the child made to a therapist as

evidence.

"But where we charge someone for crimes against one victim, there are usually other victims over the years," Newman says. Not only that, but he believes there are a great number of victims that "you can't attach numbers to" — unreported cases of child sexual abuse.

In Clinton County, the Friend of the Court is often involved in such cases, trying to determine the validity of alleged child abuse in homes. The Wildts claim a lot less damage would have been done if the Friend of the Court would have terminated the visitation rights of Michael and Kim's father when their mother finally realized what was going on and reported it. "We got no help from the county. They didn't believe us," Wildt says.

If investigating and prosecuting criminal sexual conduct cases involving children is difficult, so is presiding over them in the courtroom. Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen was involved in the Wildt case.

"These types of cases have special problems associated with them," he says.

In trying the alleged criminal, the judge has to see that the defendant has a full, fair opportunity to give his side of the story, and is convicted or not convicted on the basis of evidence and not emotion, he says.

"You have to protect him from being convicted just because the charge is so horrendous," he says.

On the other hand, he says, the judge has to protect the children from unnecessary harassment, and create an environment where they feel free to tell their story.

In sentencing the defendant in a child sexual abuse case, Tahvonen says the factors of punishment, deterrence, and rehabilitation "lead to pretty harsh sentences."

"Most people can't think of a crime more deserving of punishment than child sex cases," he says. "And the

court needs to impose significant sentences to deter others not to do it."

Trust fund aims at prevention of abuse

The Clinton County Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect released the following information last week:

Over 40,000 Michigan children were reported abused or neglected last year; over 8,000 were sexually assaulted. Many agencies help these children after they are hurt. The Children's Trust Fund works to stop child abuse before it occurs.

The Children's Trust Fund is a non-profit organization established by legislation in 1982 to fund community programs across the state. These programs consist mainly of:

- Latchkey programs that provide safe after-school supervision for children of working parents.
- Drop-in centers for parents in stress.
- Pari-natal training for new or expecting parents.
- Children's plays that teach how to avoid unwanted touching.
- Public education programs.

"We clearly know, for example, that latchkey children are neglected and abused at a much higher rate than supervised children," says CTF Executive Director David Mills. "We also know that children who are aggressively trained to halt those who seek to sexually abuse them can often prevent transgressions from taking place."

Special legislation allows the Children's Trust Fund to collect donations from the Michigan State Income Tax return. Those who receive a refund on their state taxes can donate by simply filling in the amount they wish to contribute on the CTF line on their tax form.

Donations to the Trust Fund are used to maintain and expand all eligible programs. To date, \$460,000

has been committed to 80 prevention programs throughout the state.

"The immediate and long range social problems created by child abuse leave marks on families perpetually — unless and until they can be successfully reached," says Mills. "And reaching these families prior to incidents taking place is what the Children's Trust Fund is all about."



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
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

Farm Bureau holds annual meeting

Bureau chief argues for foreign aid

Michigan Farm Bureau President Elton Smith argued for continued U.S. aid to developing countries on the grounds that as poor nations prosper, so will our nation's food and agricultural sector.

In his address to the State Farm Bureau Annual Meeting, Smith said farmers have a vested interest in the future of developing countries because more than 80 percent of the new consumers born in the next two decades will be citizens of those countries, which he called agriculture's "brightest future markets."

Smith credited the Farm Bureau with a major role in the development and passage of P.L. 480, the "Food for Peace" program in 1954.

"When properly integrated into national foreign assistance programs, P.L. 480 can help foster development and assist in short run relief," Smith said. "History shows that P.L. 480 has greatly assisted in the development of commercial markets for U.S. agricultural products."

Smith also listed tax reform as an issue to be addressed by farmers and specifically singled out the investment tax credit.

"Investment credit is an important and often vital element in agricultural tax shelters," Smith said.

Delegates vote

Speaking in support of the resolution, several delegates said that the position statement, which will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation policy development committee as a recommendation, would provide the organization with flexibility to have input in the farm bill.

THE DELEGATE body reaffirmed its support for

reactions to the dairy section of the bill. The conference version for dairy provides for a gradual price support adjustment based upon Commodity Credit Corporation purchases, accompanied by an 18-month whole herd

buyout program funded by a 40 cent per hundredweight producer assessment.

"**WE ARE** pleased with the price support formula, but the decision by the conferees to assess producers is a big disappointment."

Tracy made his remarks at the MACMA annual meeting held in conjunction with the annual Farm Bureau Meeting in Grand Rapids.

"You cannot run your farms or your marketing cooperatives by continual-

ly spending more money than you take in — and neither can the federal government," Tracy said. "Farmers have had to pay a high price because of the current budget deficit. It's helped keep interest rates high, it's reduced our export markets, and it's mortgaged the futures of our children and our grand-

children."

Tracy said farmers need a new farm bill this year and that decisions being made by Congress could influence the course of American agriculture for years to come.

"Farmers need stability and consistency in farm policies," he said. "They need the tools to respond to the flow of the marketplace, and they need the incentives to shift their resources accordingly."

In other action on national issues, the delegates passed a resolution calling for several specific tax reforms including limiting the use of investment credit for farm capital expenditures as a deduction against farm income.

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"Farmers need stability and consistency in farm policies," he said. "They need the tools to respond to the flow of the marketplace, and they need the incentives to shift their resources accordingly."

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"However, the credit has created economic distortions which have led to increased investment by individuals seeking favorable tax treatment on non-farm income."

"Although the impact of current federal income tax provisions on U.S. agriculture cannot be measured precisely, the direction of their impact seems clear," Smith said. "Federal income tax policies have exerted upward pressure on farmland prices and helped to concentrate farmland ownership with high income farmers and non-farmers, as opposed to beginning farmers."

"The current tax code has encouraged the substitution of capital for labor and supported growth trends in the number of very small farms and very large farms at the expense of medium-sized family farms. This has increased supplies and lowered prices for some farm commodities. Farm Bureau's goal is a tax policy that will promote private initiative, economic growth, equity and simplicity."

Weed control

"Merry Christmas to all my readers. For Christmas this year I will give you some new solutions to an old problem, WEEDS!

Controlling quackgrass in no-till corn fields when the corn follows an old alfalfa stand can be a major problem. The recommended treatment of 2-4-D, followed by Atrazine and Paraquat does a good job of controlling alfalfa and other broadleaf weeds in no-till corn, but when quackgrass is also a problem, the addition of a small quantity of Round-Up significantly increases weed control.

This is important to producers who wish to rotate corn fields to other crops. A full rate application (four pounds per acre) of Atrazine has at least a two year carry-over, so producers must plant corn another year to prevent injury to other crops.

A recent MSU study, by Zollinger and Kells, found that the use of Round-up provided greater quackgrass control than high rates of Atrazine, with the added advantage of no carry-over problems to the next growing season.

Another common problem is velvetleaf control in soybeans. Velvetleaf can be controlled nearly 100 percent in soybeans with a new herbicide currently under review by the Environmental Protection Agency. This is a significant improvement over control offered by currently available products.

"The performance of the new herbicide, Command, was compared with that of the commercially available herbicides, and it was found to be the most effective at controlling velvetleaf in soybeans," say crop and soil science graduate student Kurt Thelen and Extension Weed Specialist Jim Kells, both from Michigan State University.

Michigan farmers responding to a survey said velvetleaf is the worst weed to control in soybean fields. Even under the best conditions and with multiple applications, conventional herbicides give only a 80 to 90 percent control. At an application rate of ¼ pound per acre or higher, Command gave almost complete velvetleaf control, Thelen says.

Better results in controlling the weed were also obtained by using a standard herbicide tank mix and adding as little as a ¼ pound of Command per acre, Thelen added.

If approved by the EPA, Command could be on the market by spring.

For MSU recommendations on herbicides, pick up the "1986 Weed Control Guide" from the Cooperative Extension Service.

Milk production increases

Milk cows in Michigan produced 450 million pounds of milk during November, up eight percent from one year ago, according to the Federal/State Michigan

Agricultural Reporting Service. Milk production per cow averaged 1,130 pounds, up 65 pounds (six percent) from the previous year. Milk cow numbers averaged 398,000 head, un-

changed from last month but up 7,000 from one year ago.

The value of milk sold in Michigan averaged \$12.80 per hundredweight during Nov., down \$1.60 from a

year earlier. This preliminary price reflects the total value of milk at the dairy plant or receiving station before deductions are made for hauling charges and other marketing costs. Slaughter cow prices averaged \$33.00 per hundredweight, down five percent from the previous year.

Nationally, November milk production totaled 11.6 billion pounds, a record high for November and 10 percent above November 1984. Production per cow averaged 1,035 pounds, up 62 pounds from a year earlier. Milk cow numbers, at 11.2 million head during November, were up three percent from last year. Milk cow numbers have now increased for ten consecutive months.

Dairy manufacturing plants in Michigan produced 4.1 million pounds of butter during October, up 12 percent from one year earlier.

Potato production stays even

Fall potato production in Michigan during 1985 was estimated to be 12.1 million hundredweight by the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. There were 44,000 acres harvested, the same as last year. The state average yield, however, fell from 285 hundredweight per acre in 1984

to 275 hundredweight per acre this year. Yields were cut in several localities by excess moisture in fields. About 60 percent of the fall potato acreage is irrigated.

Stocks of potatoes held by growers, shippers and processors on Dec. 1 are estimated at eight million hundredweight, the same

as stocks a year ago. Disappearance of potatoes from the start of harvest to December 1 was 4.1 million hundredweight, down from 4.5 million hundredweight last year.

December 1 potato stocks in the 15 states making stock estimates were estimated to be 234 million hundredweight. That is 16 percent above Dec. 1, 1984. Of the total stocks in the 11 major states, 76 percent were russets, 21 percent were whites and three percent were reds. Disappearance from harvest to Dec. 1 in the 15 stocks-estimating states was 107 million hundredweight compared with 102 million hundredweight last year.

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Michigan farm union holds convention

The Michigan Farmers Union at its 48th annual convention earlier this month, called for specific provisions for the 1985 Farm Bill now under consideration by a Congressional Agricultural Conference Committee.

In a letter to the congressional committee, the organization asked that:

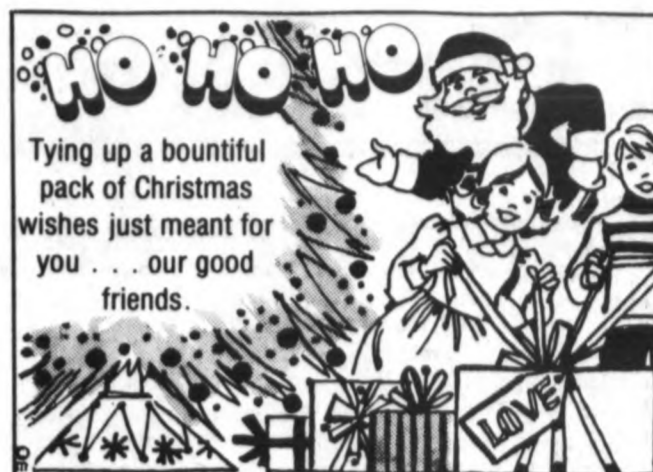
- Under no condition should current target prices be reduced for 1986 or any year after;
- A provision for farmers to call for a referendum to vote for mandatory controls for all basic commodities;
- The discretionary authority of the Secretary of Agriculture to reduce loan rates should be eliminated;
- The price support and diversion program of the dairy section should be retained and price differentials between various milk marketing orders should be eliminated;
- The current soybean rate of \$5.02 should be retained.

"Anything less than these provisions would make the bill unacceptable and, quite frankly, useless to farmers," the document said.

The convention adopted a resolution supporting the Michigan Sesquicentennial celebration. A 1986 Policy Statement for Michigan Farmers Union was developed by the delegates.

Speakers included Paul Kindinger, Michigan Director of Agriculture; James Anderson, Dean of Agriculture, Michigan State University; and Honorable Robert Bender, State Representative from the 88th District.

Delegates attending the convention from St. Johns were James Graham, Clinton Farmers Union president; Earl T. Barks, Sr.; Lester Becker, and Dennis Morrison.



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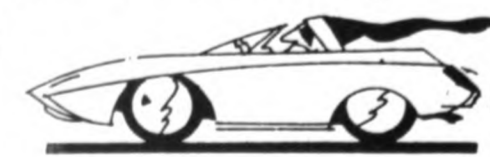

insurance premiums paid by the district to be "stabilized," with the possibility of savings of up to 25 percent, during the first year of the MASA plan.

Terres said the school district has one year to go in its current three year contract for property and casualty coverage. The cost to the district for that coverage is expected to rise 20 to 30 percent next year, he said.

IN A SEPARATE action the Board voted to contract with the Clinton Intermediate School District for computer service currently provided by the Ingham Intermediate School District. The service involves the processing of "student services" data such as records of scheduling, attendance and grading.

The district currently pays \$16,150 to Ingham Intermediate for the service. However, Ingham Intermediate is expected to increase its charge for the service by as much as 30 percent, said Terres.

"Those costs are going up, we have very little control over it, and I'm very nervous about it," Terres told the Board.

Switching to Clinton Intermediate will require the expenditure on \$49,711 for new computer equipment, Terres said in a memo outlining the change. That cost, he said, will be financed through Clinton Intermediate for three years, meaning the money previously paid to Ingham Intermediate will pay for the equipment.

THE CHANGE WILL also involve costs for shipping, forms, furniture and other other costs, the memo said.

After the initial three years, the change will save the school district \$14,000 to \$19,000 per year, Terres said in a Dec. 18 telephone conversation.

Terres said a decrease in the cost of the computer equipment is a major factor in making the change beneficial to the school district.

"The prices and the technology are there now and they weren't four or five years ago for student services," he said.

In other action at the Dec. 16 meeting, the Board:

- approved the \$3,412 purchase of textbooks for ninth and tenth grade basic english classes. The textbooks are a continuation of a series purchased last year for seventh and eighth grade classes.

- accepted a \$5,529 bid from Vandervoort's of Lansing for the purchase of gym mats for the high school gymnasium.

- accepted a \$3008 bid from Home Center Commercial Carpet of Lansing for the installation of carpeting in the high school band room.

- approved the expenditure of \$300 to purchase an enrollment projection service from Stanfred Consultants.

And as soon as she gets used to walking in her cast, Bath residents can expect that she'll be up again, doing everything she can for other people.

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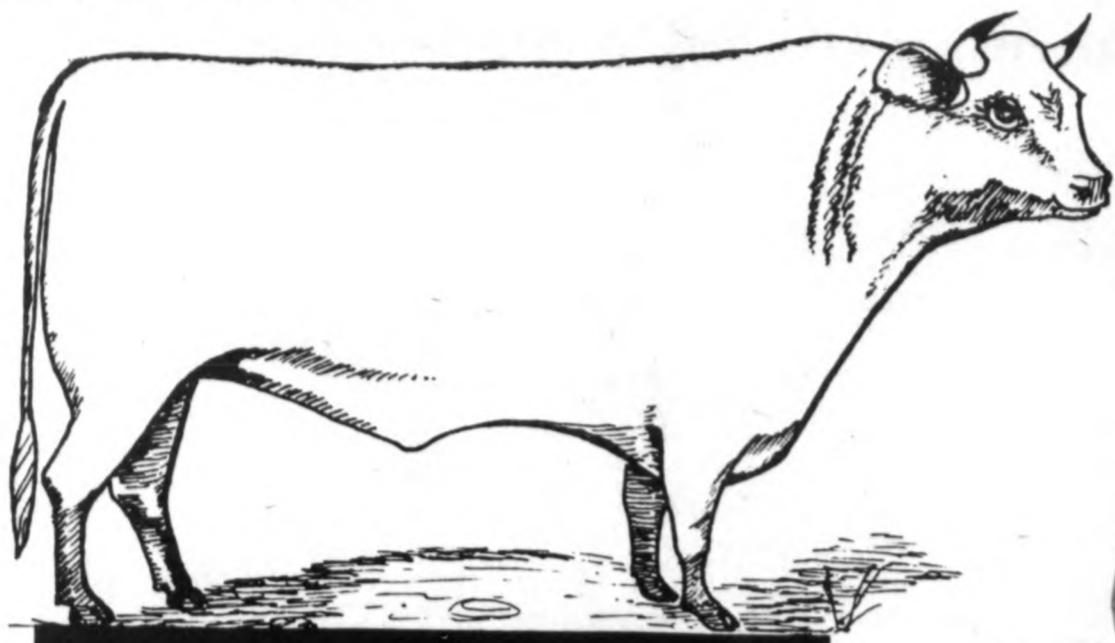

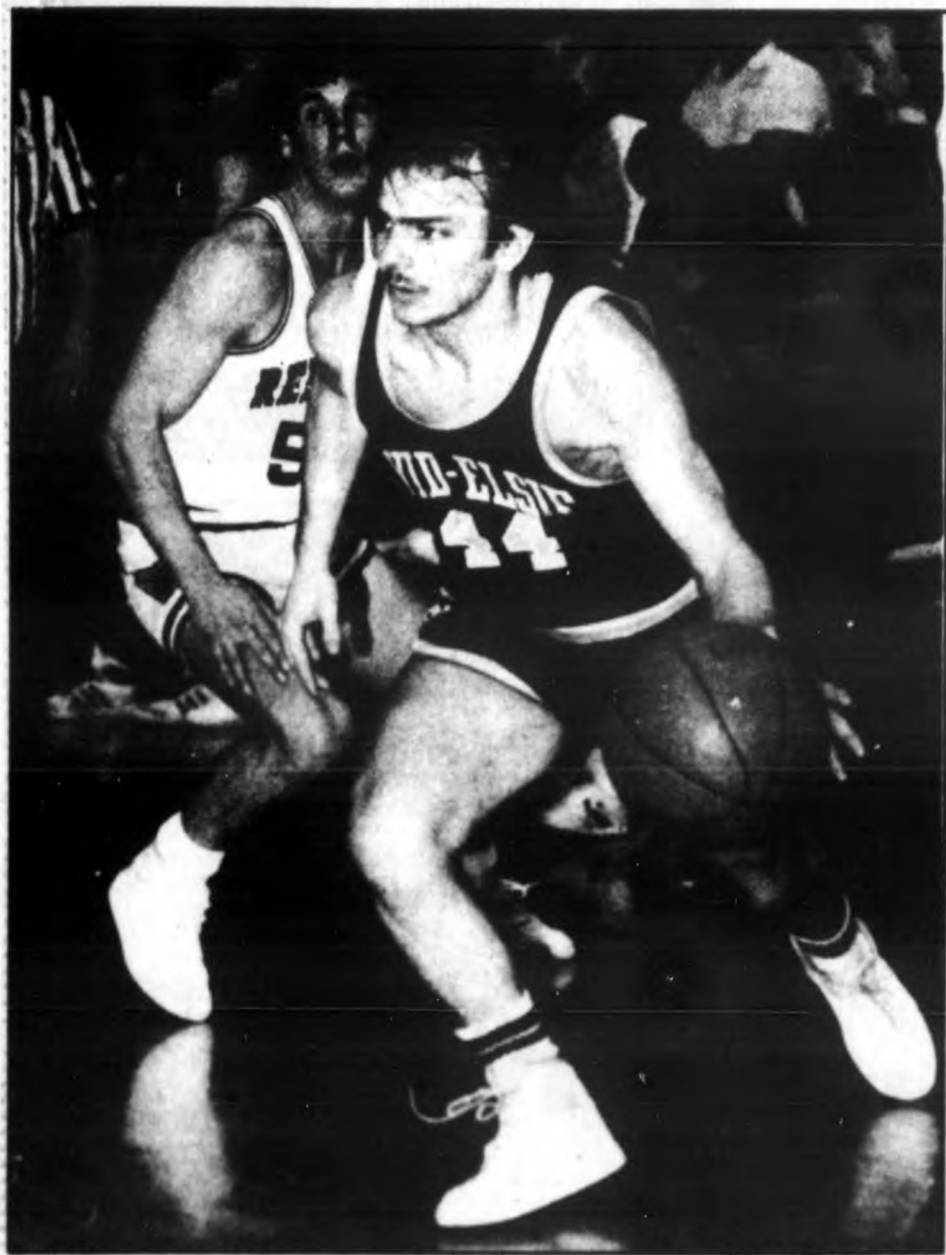

Fulton gets first win P-W still undefeated

Two groups of Pirates met last Friday in a Central Michigan Athletic Conference contest played at Pewamo-Westphalia, pitting P-W against Fulton — unfortunately, only one group could win.

P-W took the game by a score of 55-42, to remain undefeated on the season with a 5-0 record. Fulton stands at 1-4 thus far on the year.

"We were pleased with our defensive play," said P-W coach Ron Kramer. "The play was hard and intense — our press worked well." The fact that P-W had 21 steals on the night seems to point that out.

"They're definitely a very quick team," commented Fulton coach Terry Smith. "We played them pretty even for the first half, but just couldn't stay with them."

PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA was up by only eight points at the end of the first half with the score standing at 29-21. P-W's Pirates more or less blew things apart during the third quarter, however, opening up a 41-27 lead. Kramer had called on 11 different players in that time span; his strong bench allowing him to play a tough pressure defense creating assorted turnovers.

Shooting 64 percent from the line, P-W was "a little better" in the free throw department than in past games according to Kramer. "We still need to work on that though," he added. P-W shot 43 percent from the field, making 23 of 54 shots.

LEADING SCORER for Fulton was Dave Stephens with 18 points. He was followed by Joel Parker with 10 points on the night. Tom Belen led the scoring for P-W with 13 points. Murphy was also selected to First Team All-Conference in the MMB. She led the Redwings in steals with 49, and in assists, dishing off 85 times to her teammates. She had been called "one of the most underrated players in the area," during the season by several coaches.

A MEMBER OF St. Johns' varsity team for two years, Rademacher was second for the Redwings in assists with 72 and in total points, 211. She was named All-Conference Honorable Mention in the Mid-Michigan B league.

Coach Beth Swears picked up her 200th career win this year and saw her team end the season with the best record of any girls b-ball club at St. Johns — 19-2. Swears received an "Honorable Mention" notation from the Lansing State Journal as coach of her Class A team. She guided her club to a 52.9 points per game average, 42.5 season field goal percentage, and 47.8 season free throw percentage. Her Redwing team outrebounded their opponents 31.8 to 21.3 per game.

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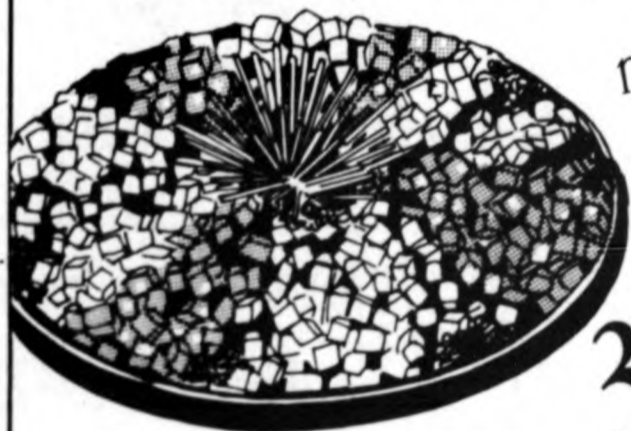
