Schoolboard focuses on junior high

Rodney B. Wilson Junior High School was the focus of the St. Johns Schoolboard's Jan. 7 committee-on-the-whole meeting, held at the Rodney B. Wilson library.

Presenting some of the schools programs to the board were RBW Principal Robert Kudwa, concerned parents Jenny McCampbell and Barb Worrall on volunteer speakers to study halls, Assistant Principal William Brown on RBW's intramural program, Counselors Bud Delavan and Patti Eshenroder on the school's promotion/retention policy and how to pass at Rodney B., and english

and journalism teacher James Fuller on the need for an outside review of the junior high's curriculum.

"I do have a message here tonight, and the message is that there are some positive things happening at the junior high, and these are the people who make them happen," said Principal Kudwa, in his introduction to the presentation after presenting School Superintendent Earl Gabriel with a poster depicting Peanuts characters boosting RBW. "There are really two parts to what these people are presenting tonight," continued Kudwa. "The first part, dealing with Jenny McCampbell, Barb Worrall and Bill Brown, are two situations that when we started out the school

year were frustrating situations, for you people as well as me. What they did was take a negative situation and turn it into the positive." The second part of the junior high school presentation focused on the school's promotion/detention policies for students and the need for curriculum review.

Jenny McCampbell, speaking first on implementing volunteer speakers for 6th grade study halls at RBW, got involved in this program when she found out that "6th grade band and orchestra students got saddled with two hours of study hall a day, two or three days a week." McCampbell's son is in band, as is Worrall's son.

After making com-

plaints about the situation, "we realized that we could turn our problem into an opportunity," said McCampbell. Worrall and McCampbell had previously worked in the elementary schools with the Junior Great Books program and teaching creative thinking, and also wanted to work with the teachers in the junior high school. "But there wasn't a lot of extra time, with class periods of only 48 minutes, and teachers have a whole lot of material to present in that time, until we saw

the study halls as extra time," said McCampbell. "Then we said to ourselves that this was a whole extra hour. We just came up with one thing after another."

Principal Kudwa, the secretaries, and teachers at RBW have all been very supportive, says McCampbell. "We want to do the kinds of things that teachers would like to do if they had enough time, but they don't have enough time to do," said the concerned mother.

Barb Worrall explain-

ed how the program is going to work. So far the program is limited to the sixth grade band students, because they are the only students with 2-period study hall stretches two or three times a week. The study halls are always the first two periods of the day. "Every student can take every class," said Worrall of the way scheduling for the classes is structured and repeated. Classes are attended by choice and are not mandatory,

After 8 years in Brazil, Cindy Beaufore DeAlmeida, who grew up in the Clinton County area and has relatives in St. Johns, has returned to the area.

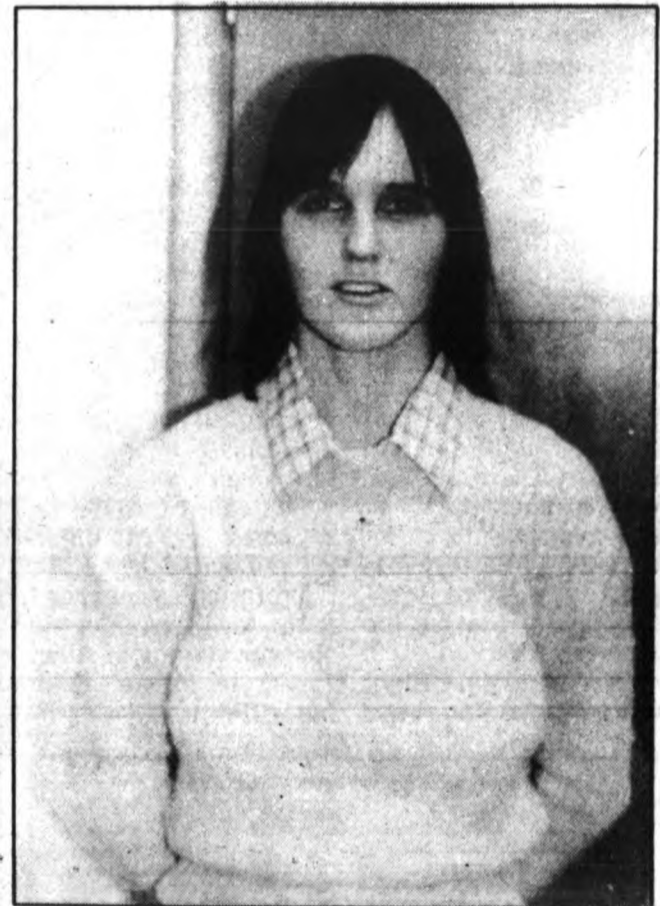
She comes back to St. Johns with her husband Migueias, who has never been to the U.S. and will be working as a dental technician at the Mid-Michigan Dental Lab when it opens up here in St. Johns in a few weeks, and three children; six-year-old Melanie, four-year-old Israel, and 10-month-old Isaac.

DeAlmeida originally went to Brazil in 1973 and '74 as part of the exchange student program when she was attending Owosso High School. She met Migueias then, and kept up a long distance relationship with him through her final year in high school and two years at Michigan State University before she transferred to a college in Brazil, the Faculdade de Educacio de Sao Luis, in 1977. 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P-W sets kindergarten information session

A kindergarten information session for the parents of those children who will be attending kindergarten at Pewamo-Westphalia in the fall is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. Wednesday, January 30, at Pewamo-Westphalia High School. This program is designed to acquaint parents with the information necessary to make their child's first school experience a successful one.

Representatives from the school and the county health department will be on hand to discuss the various readiness skills necessary before entry

into school, proper speech patterning and language use and the immunizations a child must have before entering school. Mrs. Helen Peacock and Mrs. Nancy Marks, the kindergarten teachers, will present the session on readiness and Mrs. Victoria Christensen, speech therapist, will present the session on speech and language. Immunizing your child will be discussed by a nurse from the Ionia County Health Department. In addition, Dennis Toth, Elementary principal, will be present to help answer any questions parents may have.

Murder suspect to fight extradition

First degree murder suspect Michael Ernest Trofatter, 32, of Grand Ledge, could remain in Wisconsin for quite a while, possibly several weeks, says Clinton County Prosecutor Jon Newman.

Trofatter was arrested on a federal unlawful flight warrant Jan. 2 in Spring Valley, Wisconsin. He did not resist arrest. The Grand Ledge man was lodged in the Pierce County jail at that time. Clinton County Detectives Jay Trost and Sgt. Don Kennel flew to Wisconsin Jan. 3 to interview Trofatter and make a positive identification of him as the murder suspect.

The unlawful flight charges have since been

dropped and Trofatter has been moved to the Dane County Jail near Madison, Wisconsin, where he is awaiting extradition.

"Indications are that he wants to challenge extradition," said Prosecutor Newman. In fighting extradition, Trofatter can request a hearing from Wisconsin's governor, and challenge the technical aspects of the charges against him in Michigan. Trofatter also has the opportunity to waive extradition, in which case he would be returned to Michigan immediately.

Trofatter is charged with the first degree shotgun slaying of Allen Pease in Pease' Bath home Dec. 8.

Five county youths in citizenship shortcourse

Five Clinton County 4-H members have enrolled in this year's Citizenship Shortcourse program and will be learning more about local, state and national governments in the next several months, preparing for a trip to Washington D.C. in the summer.

The five teens who are participating in this year's program are: Michelle Hart, daughter of Frank and Diane Hart of St. Johns; Randall Schmidt, son of Randy and Julie Schmidt of St. Johns; Tammy Rossow, daughter of LaVern and Diane Rossow of St. Johns; Matthew VanBeelen, son of Bill and Sherry VanBeelen of DeWitt; and Sandy Thelen, daughter of Alvin and Marie Thelen of St. Johns.

During the next few months, these teens will learn about township government, taxes, the county judicial system, county government and state government. They will spend time talking with government leaders and learning about the roles and responsibilities that elected officials have. These teens will do some individual research and will be taking field trips to the state Capitol, a County Board of Commissioners meeting, and the

Gerald Ford Museum in Grand Rapids.

In mid-July, as the culmination of their project this year, these 4-H'ers will join 4-H members from ten other Michigan counties and travel to Washington D.C. where they will spend the week with 4-H'ers from several other states. Together they will learn about our national form of government. While they will spend a great deal of time in workshops and meetings, they will have plenty of time to visit various historic sites and will also meet each of their legislators.

The Clinton County 4-H Council helps to sponsor the trip but these five youth will be working in the next several months to raise about \$300.00 a piece to finance the trip. Their initial fund raising projects will include preparing and serving a pancake supper for the annual meeting of the Soil Conservation District. They will also be selling Florida fruit this winter as well as M & M's.

Fresh approach for better for weight control

Does 1985 find you with a few extra pounds left over from the holidays? Perhaps you didn't put on holiday pounds but would still like to lose some weight. The new year is a good time to take a fresh approach to weight control.

How do you eat? The first step toward changing a habit is to take stock. In other words, what are your current habits? What, when and where to you eat? What size are your portions? What do you drink during the day and at night? Do you eat while watching television, reading or cooking? The first week of a weight control program should be spent taking stock. Get a small notebook or buy a diet/exercise calendar from a bookstore and each day record everything you eat and drink, and any exercise you get.

Planning your weight loss program. With a week's worth of records about how you eat and exercise in hand, sit down and study what your problem behaviors are.

Possibilities include: too many second helpings; too many snacks; inappropriate snacks; eating too much in front of the TV; and too little exercise.

Whatever your problem is, set a specific,

problem-oriented goal and try to achieve it for a couple of weeks. Your goal should be a small step, such as: walking three blocks every even-

ing; or eating fruit instead of cookies for snacks three days a week.

Most people are not successful at weight loss if they take an "all-or-nothing" approach. Small steps toward changing habits are much more effective. Each week you should allow yourself some "treats," whether they are a candy bar, chips, dessert, or snack foods. Try to limit your treats to four times a week, but plan for them and use them when they are planned. This will keep you from feeling deprived.

Finally, make a date with yourself once each week to review your successes (and lack of successes) for the past week, and plan your ap-

proach for the coming week based on your assessment. Tell yourself when you've done a good job. Too many people only tell

themselves what they

did wrong, instead of acknowledging what they did right.

Two words of caution should be heeded: if you plan to exercise and/or diet, and have more than 10 to 15 pounds to lose, consult your physician first for a checkup; you may wish to lost weight fast, but don't give in to temptation. Weight that is lost at the rate of 1 to 2 pounds a week is more likely to stay off.

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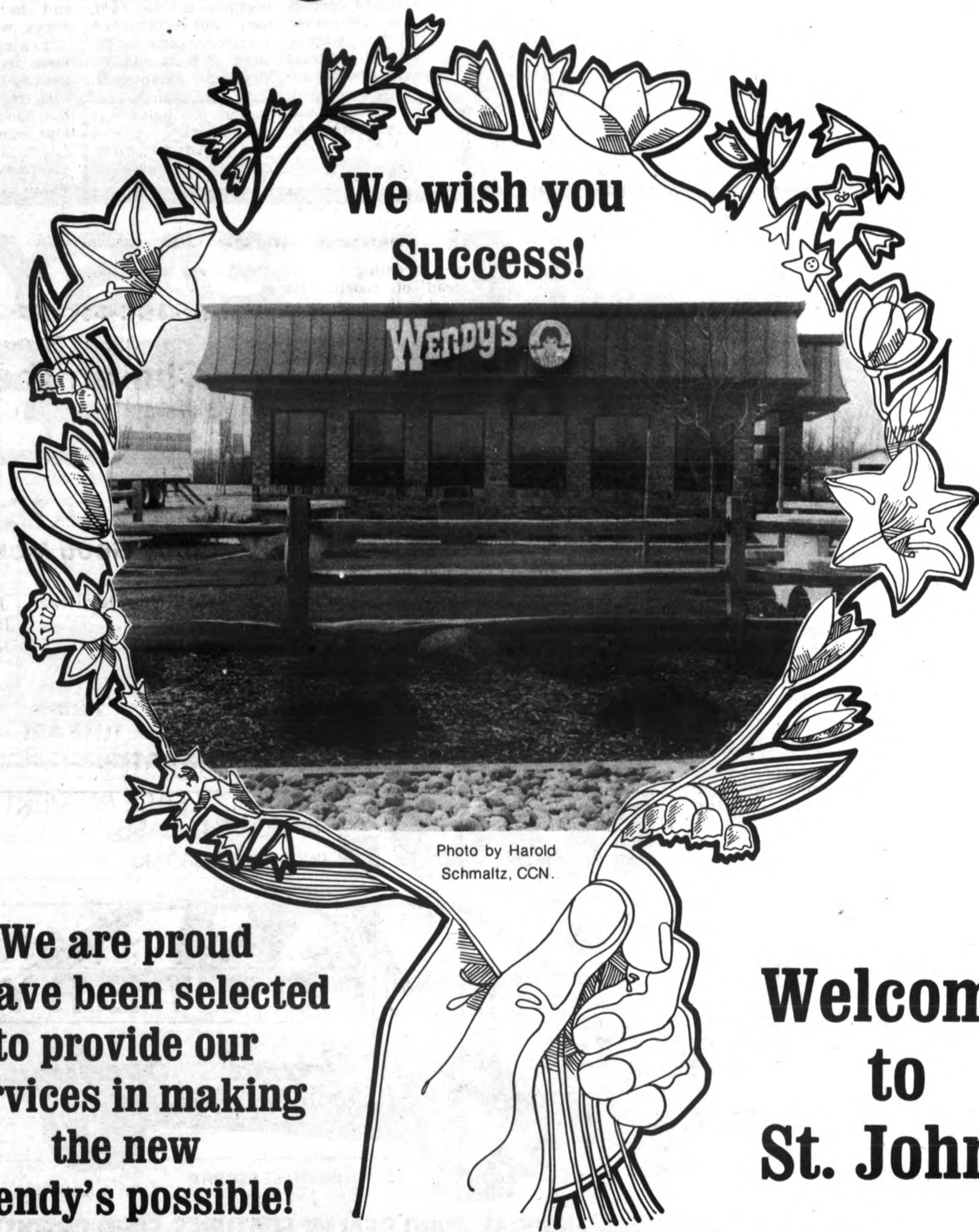

MSU has farmer software

Do you have a microcomputer? Do you use that computer for the farm business? Would you like to use the computer for the farm, but just haven't found the software program that fits? Getting lost in the maze of software is common, but there is finally some help!

Michigan State University has compiled a database for accessing information about commercially available agricultural software for small computer use. The name of this database is AGSOFT. AGSOFT information can be obtained from the county Extension Office. All you do is indicate the type of software you are interested in: dairy, swine, crops, or agribusiness. The agent can then put this information into the office computer and the computer will print out a list of the software available, approximately how much the software cost, who makes it, the companies' addresses and phone numbers, and short descriptions of the software products. The print out is yours to keep and it provides you with a listing of many of the software programs available in just one step.

The information on AGSOFT is gathered through a series of contacts with software companies who make themselves and their products available at various expositions around the country. Industry magazines are also reviewed for any new information, and the database is updated as key information is available. Right now there are over 950 items on the database, representing about 200 vendors. Of course, there is no guarantee that every possible piece of available software is covered, but it does give you a pretty good idea of what software is out there.

So how can you use this database? Well, let us say that you have a computer on your farm that you would like to use to manage your dairy operation, but you aren't sure what software is available. All you need to do is give us a call (224-3288); describe the type of task you are planning on doing with the software and we will let AGSOFT come up with the list. It looks to me as if this

new AGSOFT program will take a lot of the leg work out of software shopping!

Farm Price Index shows small monthly decline

The Index of Prices received by Michigan farmers for all farm products was 124 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending December 15. This represents a 2 percent decline from the November level, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting

Service. Though only a small decline was noted in the monthly index, prices were 10 percent below the December 1983 level. The Index of Prices paid by farmers, nationwide, for commodities and services, interest, taxes, and farm wage rates for December was 164 percent of its 1977 base.

The index was unchanged for the second consecutive month. Declines in the feed, fuels, and fertilizer indexes were offset by the increase in the feeder livestock component. Compared with a year earlier, the index was up 1 percent.

Individual commodities showing price

gains since November were oats, hogs, slaughter cows, steers and heifers. Lower prices were noted in corn, winter wheat, soybeans, hay, calves, milk and eggs. Potato prices were unchanged from the November level. Hogs, slaughter cows,

New UPS station serves town

Clinton County residents who don't want to go all the way in to Lansing to send a package by United Parcel Service or air freight or truck freight can now take care of all their shipping needs at the Spring Street entrance of the F.C. Mason Company.

F.C. Mason has formed a new division, The Mid-Michigan Shipping Service, through an

agreement with UPS. "We felt that there was a need for somebody to supply area people with a shipping service other than the U.S. Mail," said F.C. Mason President Ed Idzkowski. "As far as I know, the nearest UPS service has been in Lansing up until now," says the company President. "It's a real service, and we're not going to make much money, we're going to break even. It's a good service to this area."

Idzkowski came up

with the idea for Mid Michigan Shipping Service shortly before Christmas, when a lot of people were using UPS but there wasn't a UPS station in town. F.C. Mason sends out an average of 50-60 packages a day through UPS says Idzkowski.

The shipping service is located at the Spring Street entrance of the F.C. Mason Company. "It's not just for commercial use, anybody can come in," says Idzkowski.

Nationally, the December All Farm Products Index of Prices received by farmers decreased 2

percent from November to 134 percent of it's 1977 average. Lower prices for oranges, cotton, soybeans, broilers and milk were partially offset by higher prices for hogs, cattle, hay and turkeys. The index was 4 percent below a year ago.

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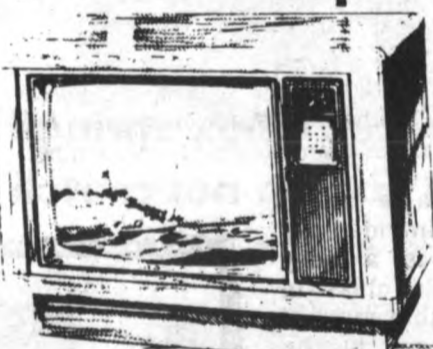
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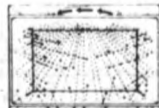

translated scientific papers from English to Portuguese for the local university.

The Brazilian city where DeAlmeida and her family lived, JaBotichbal, in the state of Sao Paulo, has a population of around 75,000, said DeAlmeida. "But it looks like the size of St. Johns. It is much less developed than the cities you have in the U.S." DeAlmeida describes the countryside around JaBotichbal as "something like Ken-

an agricultural town, says DeAlmeida, with sugar cane plantations being the main industry. In fact, the largest sugar cane factory in the world is about ten miles from JaBotichbal.

THE DeALMEIDAS CAME TO THE U.S. in hopes of improving their lifestyle. "We came here hoping to achieve a higher standard of living working in our professions," said Cindy. "The economic situation in Brazil is very difficult, you work and work and work and can

rich control everything, and have been passing down recent economic sanctions imposed by the International Monetary Fund on the country to the lower classes. Although the DeAlmeidas were affiliated with a political party in Brazil, they had no real political reasons for leaving, says DeAlmeida.

Besides the increased economic opportunities in the U.S., with Migueias being hired at Mid-Michigan Dental Labs and Cindy as a teacher's aid in the

Ovid-Elsie Schools, it's also important for the couple that their children learn English. "It's a widely spoken language," says Cindy. "They can go to any city anywhere in the world, and there will always be someone there who can speak English."

So far one of the big attractions of the U.S. for the kids has been the snow here. "They all love it," said Cindy DeAlmeidas. "It started one day at 6 o'clock in the morning and everyone was awake.

Everyone was really excited, they all wanted to go out and play in it. My husband too. He is 28 years old and he's never seen snow. He even likes shoveling it. I told him that would wear off."

The DeAlmeidas are adjusting to a lot after their move, weather, language, new jobs, but one thing they really need some help with is finding a place to stay. "We need a house to stay in until we get something permanent," says Cindy. She points out that house sitting for

a couple wintering in Florida would be a perfect situation. Hopefully by the time the homeowners return, the DeAlmeidas will have found a place to stay. DeAlmeida reminds people who would like their house watched that she does have three small children. She does not want to stay at a residence with a lot of expensive knickknacks that the children might damage.

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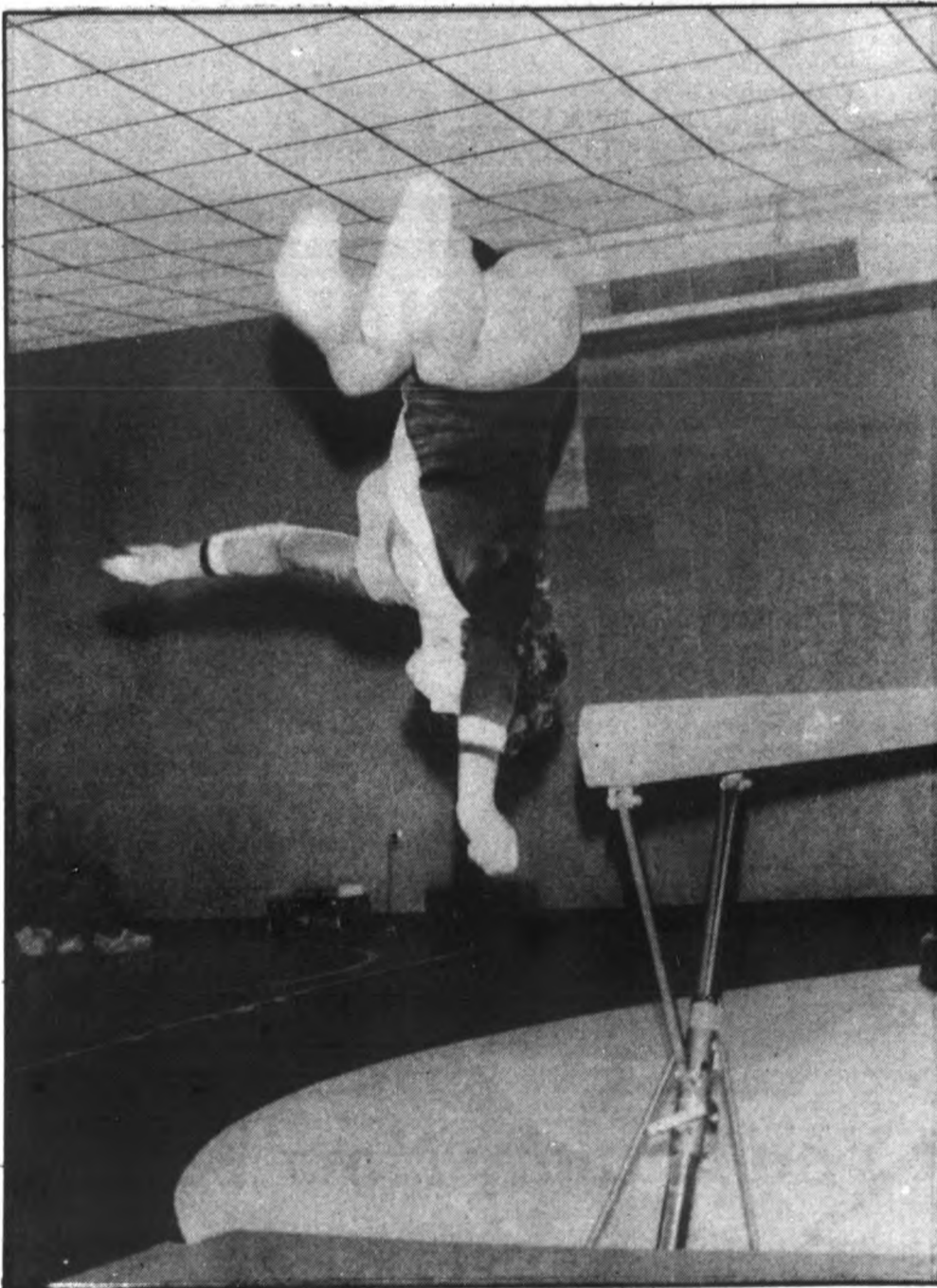

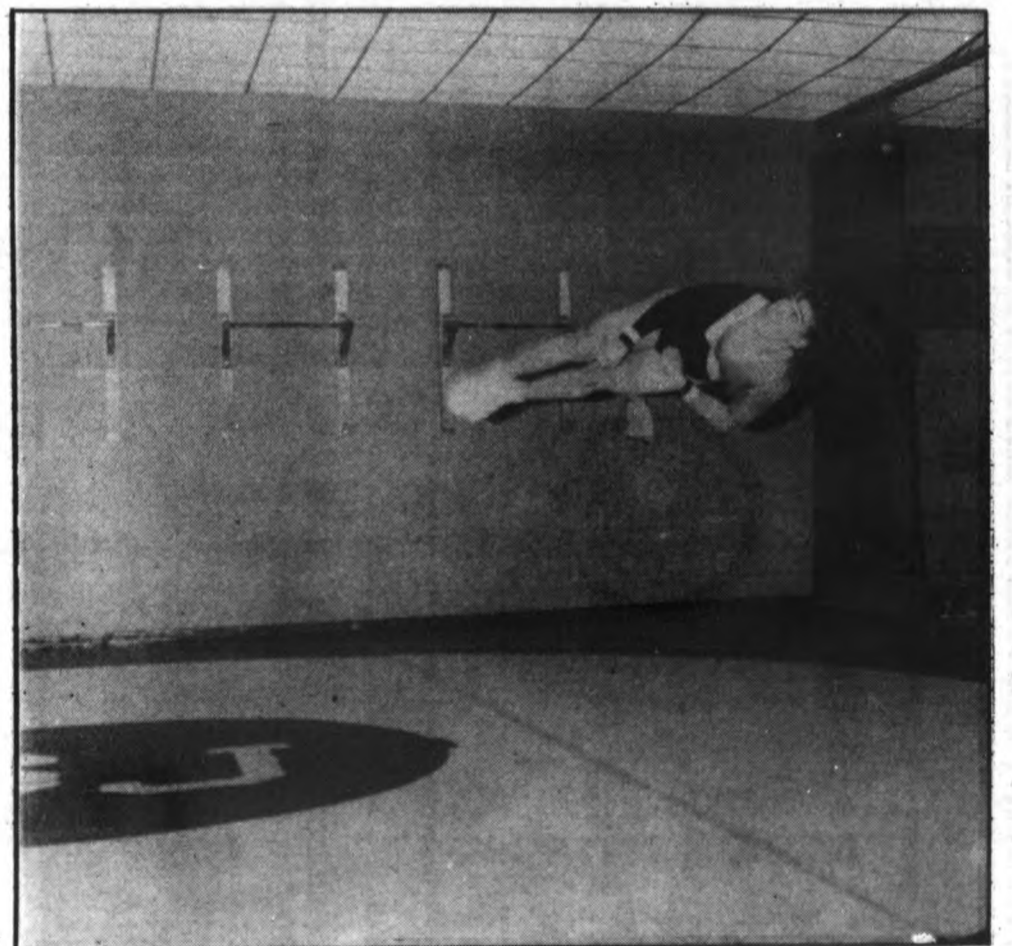

dent in charge of Finances Richard Terres made assumptions for the budget based on the 1984-85 budgeted figures. 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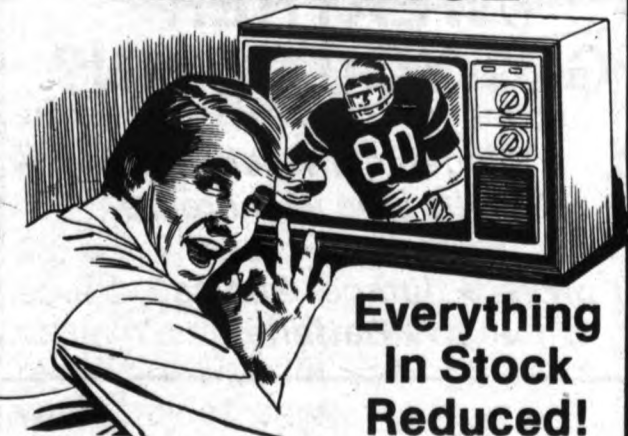

except for music appreciation, which is deemed necessary because all are band students. The supplementary study hall classes last as long as several weeks.

Last week the study hall students were host to talks by the county prosecutor and a judge, and this week they'll be visiting the court house.

Worrall teaches a class called creative thinking. "Creative thinking is a very good activity to help the students stretch their imaginations and creative skills and to problem solve and see that there is often more than one answer to a problem, there are ways to solve things, and we do things like act and play games and do all these things to try to get them to stretch their minds," she says.

Other classes planned for the study halls are introduction to Spanish and mix and match, which mixes art and poetry. Worrall and McCampbell are planning an intro to German, a physical fitness class, and a class where students can meet great

Americans, played by high school students, as well.

Seventy-five to eighty junior high school students are taking part in these programs, say Worrall and McCampbell.

Rodney B. Wilson's Assistant Principal, William Brown, spoke next on the school's intramural program.

"We have a very successful intramural program at Rodney B. and that program has been in operation for about 6 or 7 years," said Brown.

In the previous school year, 1983-84, there were over 1100 total participants in the intramurals, with student

participation at over 50% overall and almost half of the teaching staff involved in coaching or supervising. Twenty-two intramural activities were offered last year. The cost of the program was \$3983.50.

For 1984-85, there wasn't any money budgeted for RBW's intramural program. This school year's junior high intramural program is based on pay-as-you-play fees of \$2 for each activity a student participates in.

Strictly speaking, this practice is illegal, under a 1981 decision from State Attorney General Frank Kelley that it is illegal for a public school

system to charge for athletic participation.

However, Brown pointed out in his presentation that many schools still charge for athletic participation, and that a case challenging Kelley's decision, the State vs. Jackson Northwest Community Schools, is still unresolved and apparently shelved after 2 1/2 years. Brown also made note that the athletic participation in question under the

court's ruling was interscholastic, even though there has been no legal differentiation between intramural athletics, physical education classes, and interscholastic competition.

"This year's program is the result of many of the staff members saying 'hey, wait a minute. This program is successful, it's needed, we're not just going to close our eyes and turn our heads and say we're

money. The way we did that, and I discussed it with the State Board of Education; although many schools do this it's not legal and you can get into a jam. But it's one of the only alternatives. We chose to come up with a fee, commensurate with our needs, of \$2 an activity. This would cover our expenses and provide the money for supervising, and we could maintain the program.

"We had to limit the program, number one because we started late and number two we had to make sure we had maximum participation so it would pay for itself." This year the intramural program started in November and will include only 7 activities.

Brown says that the school is willing to take the risk involved with violating the law because the intramural program is so popular and badly needed.

"Over half of the staff here is either involved with supervising or coaching one of these activities," said Brown of the intramural program. "So if you've got that many kids involved and that many staff involved, you know you've

got a successful program. The primary goal of the intramural program is to get as many kids as possible involved in worthwhile activities regardless of their ability. That's what we're trying to do. We're trying to offer a lot of different activities, after school, that they can involve themselves in. Physical activities, competitive sports, we've even had cards; euchre, bridge, and things like that, in the past, where kids get involved in something

positive.

"We have a lot of kids involved in a good program, and \$2 is not very much to pay for this much time and experience that students are getting in the intramural program," Brown concluded.

Students pay one \$2 fee for each activity, which lasts approximately 2 1/2 weeks.

Counselors Bud Delavan and Patti Eshenroder presented the board with Rodney B. Wilson's promo-


tion/detention policies and the guidance department's "How to Pass at Rodney B." program following Brown's presentation.

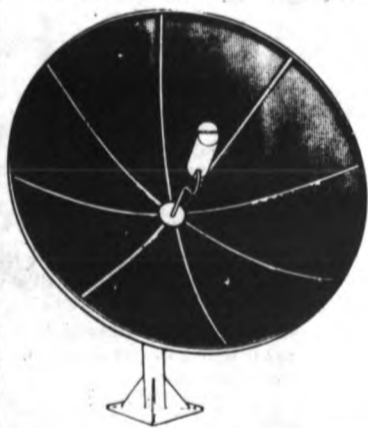

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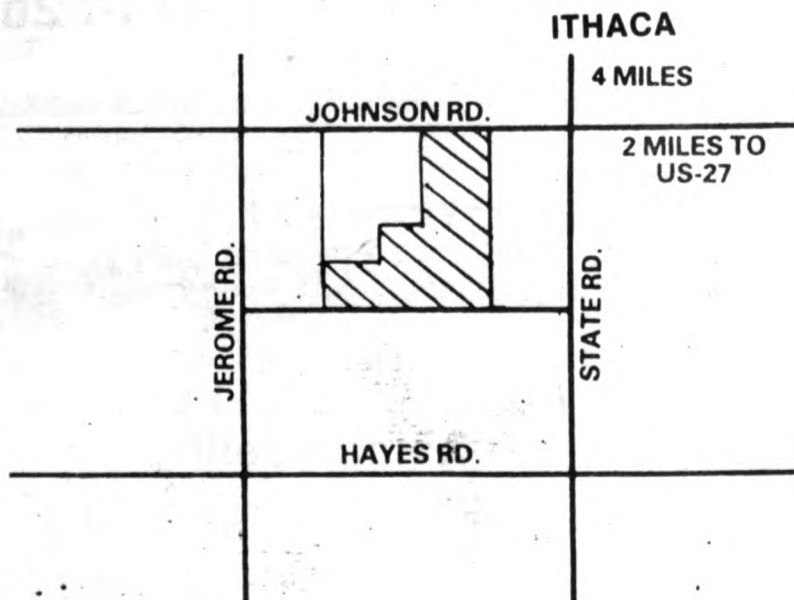

They're planning on staying here for at least two years; time enough for their children to learn the language and "absorb some American culture." If the family stays any longer than two years, Cindy can lose her status as a permanent Brazilian resident. The children are dual nationals with two passports each. "After about a year and a half here, we're really going to have to sit down and make a decision," she says of the family's choice of country.
