## Parent questions bus use

Dear Editor:

In this past week as a parent I was faced with a situation that was surprising to me. Monday when the weather was horrible, the temperature 22, wind chill factor 12 below, most north/south roads blown shut, our children were enroute home.

How did your child arrive? Our son and the neighbor boy walked over half a mile thru a corn field, over a creek, thru an alfalfa field, not prepared for the harsh weather, arriving half froze.

What if I told you my son is only in the second grade? I am sure you would not want your child walking in a blizzard like that for no money, regardless the age. That is exactly what I thought too.

I made the necessary phone calls to find out why this happened. My first question was, "Why was I not notified as to what was taking place?" I would have gladly made arrangements to get my child instead of what

happened. I understand the busses are equipped with radios to call the bus garage. Of course, there are only two telephones at the garage and in a situation like this all people could not be notified, I was told. That lead me to believe other busses were having similar problems and other children were facing difficulty getting home.

The biggest question of all, if the bus could not make its regular route, "Why did they not cancel school if the children could not be delivered to their homes safely?"

I initially said I would not make an issue of this, but have had second thoughts. How many other children were routed home differently because of weather conditions. The officials should have cancelled school earlier, or not have had it at all for the day. The roads were already bad in the morning. Where were their priorities?

The bus drivers are having to drive double

runs and are on a tight schedule to meet deadlines. Maybe this is at the heart of why my son was asked to walk, so the bus could keep to its tight schedule?

I have been reassured it won't happen to my son again. I suggest you check into the possibility of your child having to walk if the weather prohibits the bus from making its regular route before it happens to you too.

## Answering service drops school closing service

The St. Johns Answering Service (telephone numbers 224-8933 and 669-8115) has asked that they be relieved of their responsibility of informing the area of school closings. This request has come about because of the exorbitant number of telephone calls they have had, which in turn, interrupts their main function of providing a service to their clients.

St. Johns Answering Service is a profit oriented business and has offered this service to the schools and community free of charge for the past several years. We respect their desire to withdraw this gracious offer. Therefore, they will not be giving out school closing information as of this date.

We apologize to the St. Johns Answering Service for that minority of people in our community who found it necessary to be abusive and sometimes profane when using this service to determine whether our schools were closed. It is unfortunate that a few will deprive the majority of this service.

We will continue to provide school closing information over all the Lansing radio stations, the local St. Johns station and the Family Life Radio station of

Midland, as well as the recorded messages located at the District Office and Bus Garage. The telephone numbers are: 224-4950 and 224-7510, respectively. We strongly encourage you to listen to the radio and be satisfied with this method of communication delivery. It does no good to call in the evenings or when it first starts snowing or blowing. It only delays those involved in watching the storm and preparing to make a decision. Generally, we do not

make a decision to close schools before 5:30 a.m. and we notify the media immediately and place the information on our recordings soon after. We realize that you have to make arrangements for these unscheduled days, but ask for your cooperation and patience in this matter.

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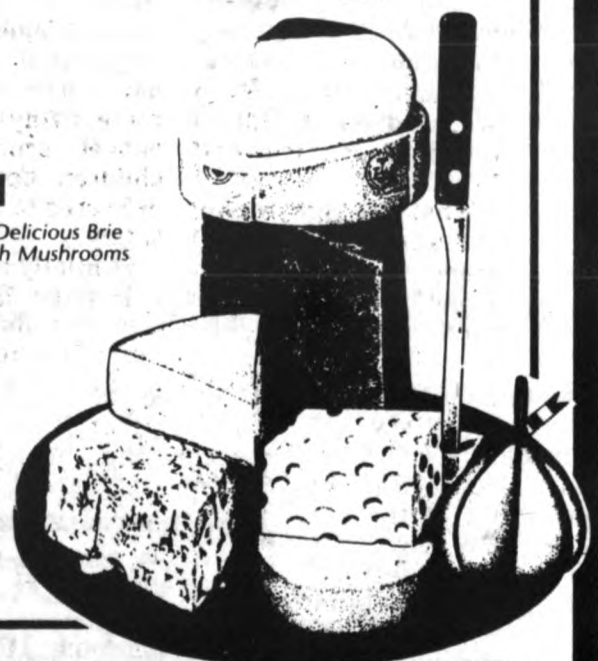
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## First of year ice storm

# Consumers reveals storm stats

According to figures recently released by Consumers Power Company, the ice storm that ushered in the new year in mid and southern Michigan was only the second worst storm in recent history as far as loss of power and line repairs were concerned.

The honor of being the worst utility damaging storm in recent history belongs to the 1976 ice storm. The ice storm of '76 beats our January icing in every category set up by Consumers.

The '76 storm had 1,900 linemen and tree trimmers working to restore power to the damaged areas. This year's storm only had 920 workers involved.

Twenty-four thousand more Consumers Power customers, 300,000 compared to 276,000 this year, lost power in the 1976 ice storm.

The time it took to repair the damages from this year's storm

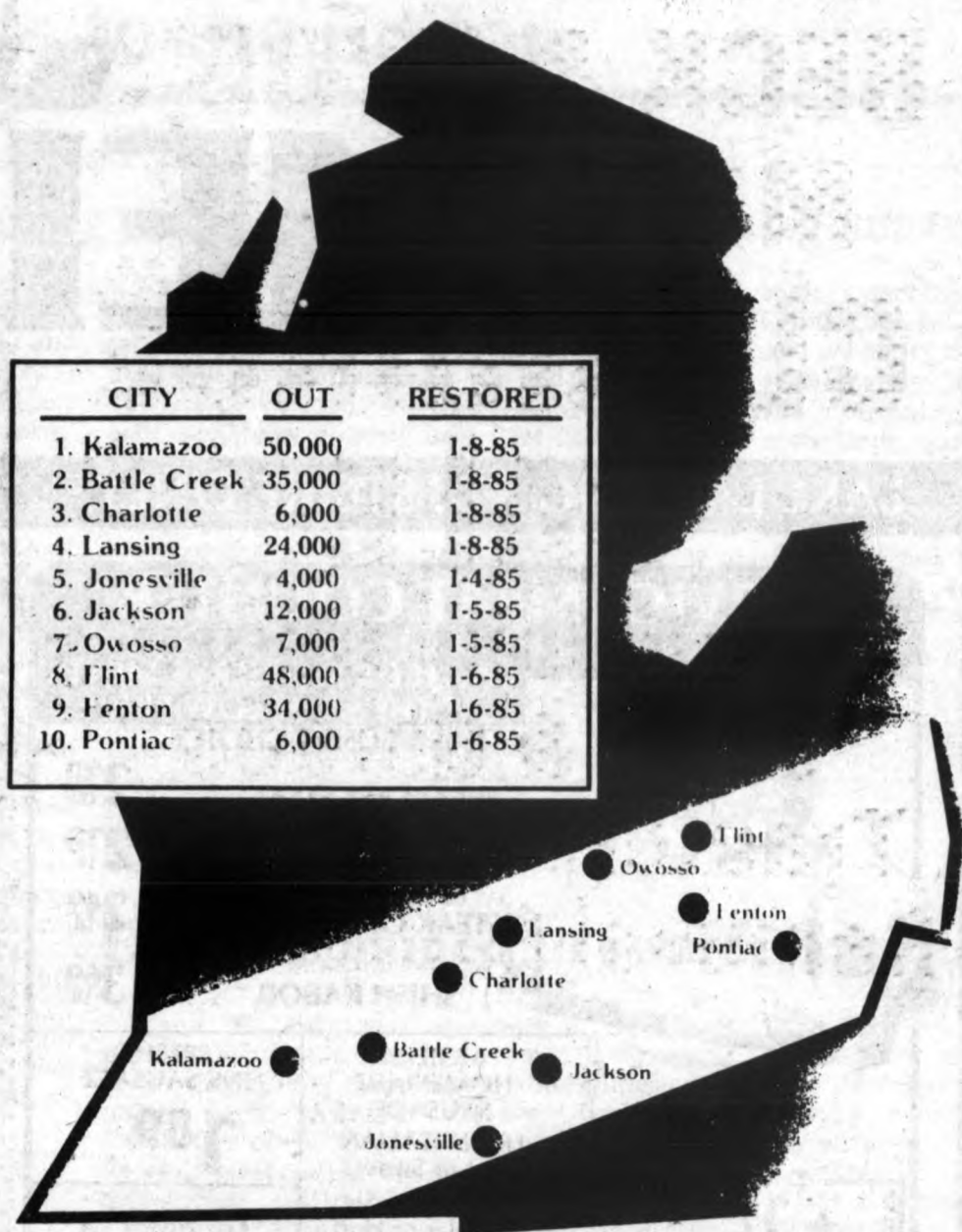
even lasted one less day in their entirety than the big ice of '76. It took Consumers 11 days to make all the repairs during the year of our nation's bicentennial. It took ten to clean-up throughout the affected areas this year.

At the bottom line, the one that really matters according to all the businesses, the total cost of repairs, materials, and man-hours for the '76 storm was three times as much as this year's. Consumers doled out \$5 million-plus to mother nature for this year's icing on the countryside. In '76 the bill was \$15 million. That pricetag for the '76 storm included 1,000 poles and 1 million feet of wire.

In Clinton County, the southern part of the county suffered the most ice damage. Police forces estimated a total of 500 homes in the area went without power for

at least part of the outage, which lasted up to eight days. Bath was hardest hit, with an estimated 300 homes without power. Most of the electrical outages were caused by ice weighing down tree limbs and causing them to fall on wires, according to Robert Crupp, Consumers' public affairs director for the area.

In cities across the state affected by the ice storm, the Kalamazoo area had the most outages, with 50,000 Consumers Customers going without power for up to eight days. The Jonesville-area had the fewest amount of affected customers, with 4,000. Jonesville also got its power returned the quickest, waiting only four days before the area was back to normal. Lansing had 24,000 customers without power, according to Consumers figures.

the hospital underwent a complete facelift after members voted to take on the project in 1984.

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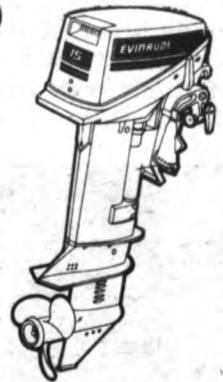
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# Training available through Experienced Workers Institute

Greater Lansing area residents who are age 55 or older can get tuition-free skill training in retail sales and business management through the Experienced Worker Institute (EWI). The program is funded by a federal Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) grant awarded

by the Governor's Office for Job Training.

The training is designed to teach the skills needed for a career in retail sales. Depending on the individual, students complete the training in 8 to 12 weeks. Counseling and placement services are in-

cluded. Classes will start Feb. 4 and Feb. 18, and will be held at the Foster Community Center, 200 N. Foster, Lansing.

Julie Jackson, EWI Director, says the program is a first for the Lansing area in that it offers specific skill

training for older people in a growth occupation with advancement opportunities. "This program recognizes the older person's need for training and career-track employment," Jackson says.

"Older students can invest their time to acquire new skills. The employer investment pays off when they hire a trained, experienced worker."

EWI is coordinating its program with other local JTPA agencies such as Senior Employment Training Service and the Greater Lansing Urban League. The unique feature, however, is the involvement of private sector

employers to provide guidance and supervision with a private sector steering committee. Local business people will be invited to guest lecture classes.

EWI seeks to educate businesses about older workers. "Employers who learn that older people are bright, healthy, reliable and productive develop positive attitudes toward them," Jackson says.

"Experienced workers with new skills

and prospects for a future career tend to be positive 'up-beat' employees. When they are matched with an employer who had good attitudes towards older workers, everyone benefits."

## CACS gives heating bill assistance

With winter here and many mid-Michigan residents facing extremely high heating fuel bills, Capital Area Community Services, Inc. and its Clinton County Senior Citizens Office and Clinton County Community Services Office would like everyone faced with these high bills to know that there may be some help available.

The Targeted Fuel Assistance (TFA) Program is designed to assist low income families in paying their heating costs. To be eligible the family income must be within the following guidelines:

Size.....	Household Income
1.....	.....\$6,225
2.....	.....\$8,400
3.....	.....\$10,575
For each additional household member, add \$2,175.	

In addition to the income guidelines, the individual household must also spend in excess of 12% of their yearly income on heating costs.

The application process is not difficult, but applicants are required to have proof of all income and a current fuel bill. As with many government programs,

documentation is a must.

Persons interested in applying for the TFA program are recommended to call ahead for an appointment and for information.

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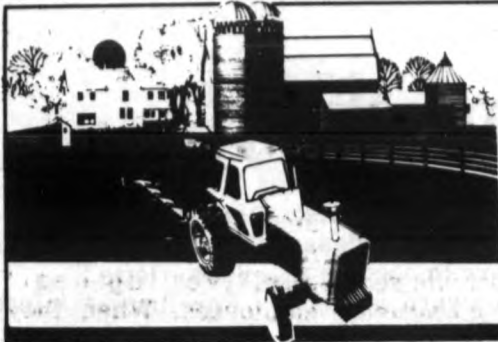
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## Farm News

### Agricultural News

If there's a watchword that should characterize 1985 crop production practices, it's "efficiency." And it begins with the selection of seed that will do the best job in the field.

Agronomists at Michigan State University believe that two of the most efficiently performing oat varieties that farmers can choose for planting this spring are Heritage and Ogle.

"Extensive testing has identified these varieties as among those that will perform best under Michigan's growing conditions," says Larry Copeland, MSU Extension seed specialist. "Growers should always look for the best variety suited for their growing area and for their particular needs."

Heritage oat yields most varieties because of its slightly higher seed weight and greater number of seeds per head. Under good management on good land, yields should range from 115 to 132 bushels per acre. Heritage is a white oat that seems to have a consistently good market. Heritage has good resistance to yellow dwarf virus.

Under good management on good land, Ogle yields from 120 to 138 bushels per acre. Ogle is widely adapted to Michigan growing conditions and is early maturing. It has excellent resistance to yellow dwarf virus. Its only drawback is its yellow kernels. Unless the local elevator has a good market for this variety, it is probably best as a farm-grown feed.

A number of other good oat varieties are available. Mariner is a medium-early white oat variety. It matures about two days earlier than Garry and stands about 3 inches shorter, with better resistance to lodging. It has field tolerance to Septoria black stem and yellow dwarf virus, two of the most important diseases of oats.

AuSable is a large-seeded, late white oat. It combines high yield with high test weight and good lodging resistance. It has field tolerance to Septoria black stem disease and yellow dwarf virus. Korwood is a medium-maturity oat variety with an excellent yield record and good test weight. Its short plant height provides good lodging resistance. Korwood is susceptible to loose smut, so it is important that all seed be treated. Mackinaw is a late-maturing, large-seeded, high-performance white oat. It is one of the better standard varieties in lodging resistance and test weight, with a good yield record. Mackinaw has field tolerance to Septoria black stem but

is susceptible to yellow dwarf virus. Menominee is a medium-tall, late white oat with a good test weight. It has consistently good yield in the Upper Peninsula and is primarily intended for that region. Menominee has resistance to yellow dwarf virus and to Septoria black stem.

MSU conducts oat performance tests every year at several farm locations. Most of the data on yield and field performance are derived from these tests.

Growers interests on data from last year's oat variety trials should obtain a copy of "Oat Variety Performance in Michigan" (E-889). It is available from the county MSU Cooperative Extension Service Office.

Michigan potato growers, shippers and processors held a total of 6.5 million hundredweight (cwt.) of potatoes on January 1, 1985. This is an increase of 20 percent from a year ago, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Disappearance for the 1984 crop from the start of harvest to the first of the year totaled 6 million cwt., 36 percent above movement for the same period last year. Disappearance during the month of December totaled 1.5 million cwt., 25 percent above usage

last year. So far this season, 48 percent of production has been removed from storage compared to 45 percent a year ago. Quality of potatoes coming out of storage is very good.

Nationally, fall potato stocks totaled 174 million cwt. on January 1 in the 15 major storage

states. This is up 5 percent from last year, but 3 percent below two years ago. Disappearance in the major states from harvest to January 1 totaled 129 million cwt., a gain of 8 percent. Processing to January 1 totaled 58.8 million cwt., up 22 percent from a year ago.

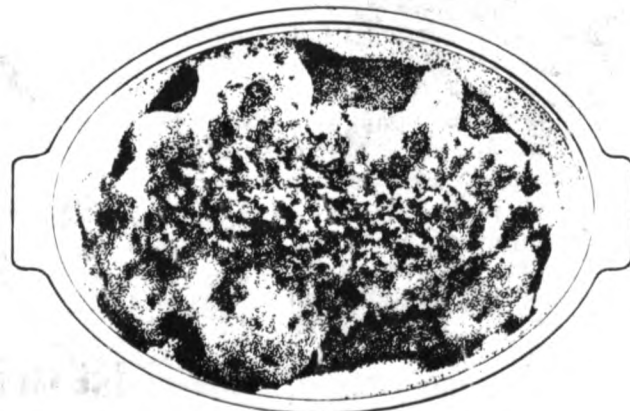
In this class, you will have an opportunity to analyze your strengths and weaknesses and set new goals for your life. The series will let you come away feeling like you have some control over your life again.

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## Family Focus

With the weather from the "Alberta Clipper" just past us, many people are still trying to bring things back to normal. As you take inventory to see if the freezing weather did any damage, be sure to check your stored produce. Many people have found that their canned goods (either home canned or commercially canned) have frozen. If your cans are frozen, check to see if either the seal or the jar itself has broken. If they are not broken, the food is still safe to eat. However, frozen canned foods will not taste as good. Nor will it have the same color, texture, or nutrients. Food that was canned and then frozen tends to be mushy in texture and dull in color. The sooner you eat your frozen, canned produce, the better the taste, texture, color and nutrient level will be.

You may also find that your canned goods curdled when they became frozen. This is common in starchy products. Curdled products usually become normal after thawing and heating. Just be sure to thaw canned foods slowly.

To help prevent your canned goods from freezing again you can move your cans to a warmer place, wrap your cans in paper or shelter them with a rug or blanket.

Many people also had problems with fresh fruit freezing. If your produce froze, allow it to thaw and then extract the juice or divide the fruit into quarters. The juice or sections may be refrigerated for a few days. Of if there is too much to eat, the fruit may be packaged and stored in your freezer.

If you had potatoes and apples in your cold storage, you don't have to worry too much about freezing. The only change you will encounter will be a change in texture. Your produce will be mushy in texture so you may want to limit its use to cooked products.

The final thing which many people have had trouble with is the freezing of fresh eggs. If you have your own chickens, you probably had to gather eggs at least twice a day during this cold weather to keep the eggs from freezing. If you tried gathering the eggs more often and you still came up with frozen eggs, they may not have gone to waste. The eggs are safe to eat as long as they are not cracked.

You will find, however, that the yolk of a frozen egg will be gummy and thick. This change in texture will make the egg unsuitable for

Four-H members who are seniors in high school and who are thinking about attending Michigan State University next fall are eligible to apply for one of six scholarships.

## MMDHD gets \$15,000 grant

The Mid-Michigan District Health Department (MMDHD) was recently awarded a \$15,000 grant from the Office of Highway Safety Planning in Lansing. The grant will be issued over a one year period to provide part-time staff to help county child safety committees in Clinton, Gratiot, and Montcalm Counties. The committees operate the free-loan child safety seat program co-sponsored by the MMDHD. As a result of the grant, the MMDHD will offer programs in 1985 addressing: the misuse of child restraint seats; law enforcement

and car seat safety; community educational programs on child safety; and presentations to schools on traffic safety.

The goal of the child safety seat program is to reduce the number of children killed and injured in car accidents. To accomplish this, the committees are working to see that every child under the age of four, in Clinton, Gratiot and Montcalm Counties, rides protected in a child safety seat.

Restraint seats are offered free of charge to residents of Clinton, Gratiot, and Montcalm Counties with children under the age of four. Once a child outgrows the seat, it is returned so

that others may benefit from its use. The safety seats are purchased at a discount rate with donations from businesses, community groups, and individuals. There is currently a waiting list of families to receive a seat at the MMDHD.

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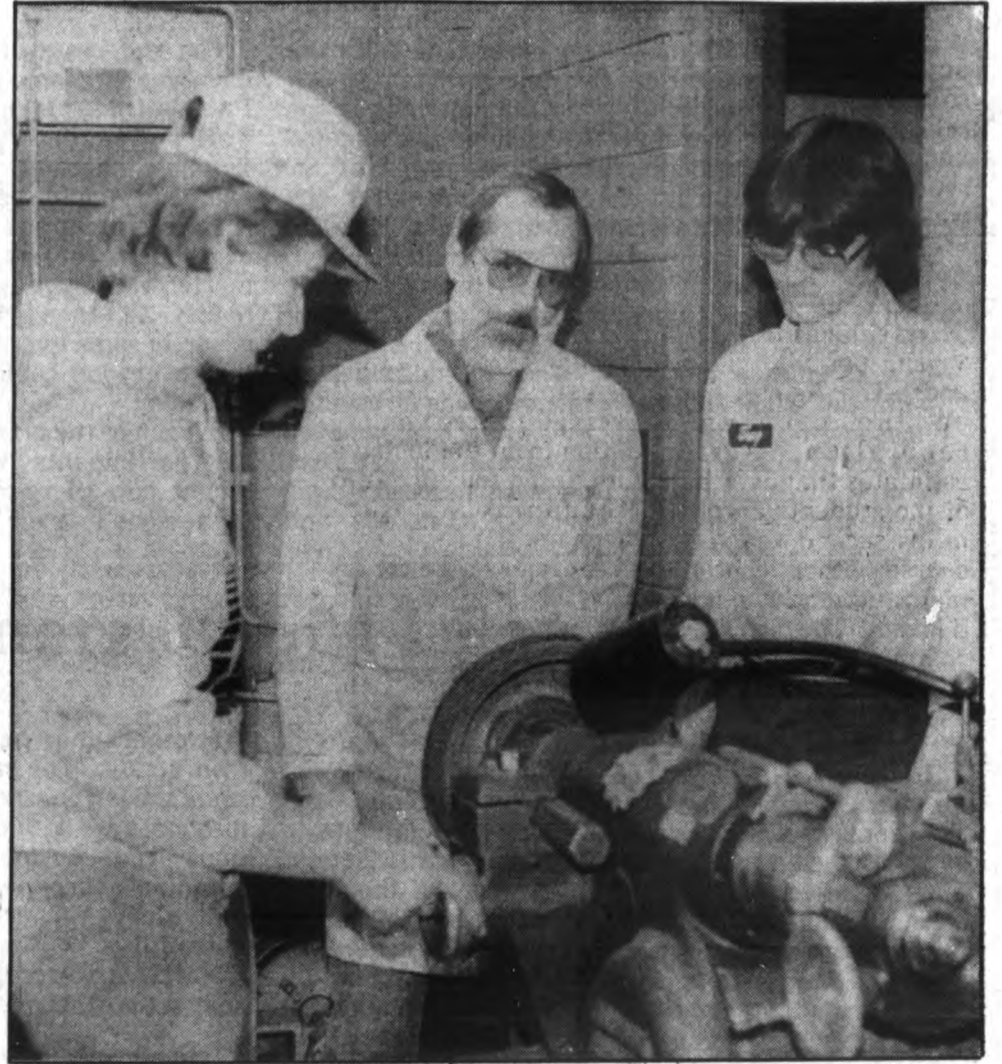

Under the Hoist-Troy LaBar examines the teeth on this car's flywheel as Kevin Price looks on.

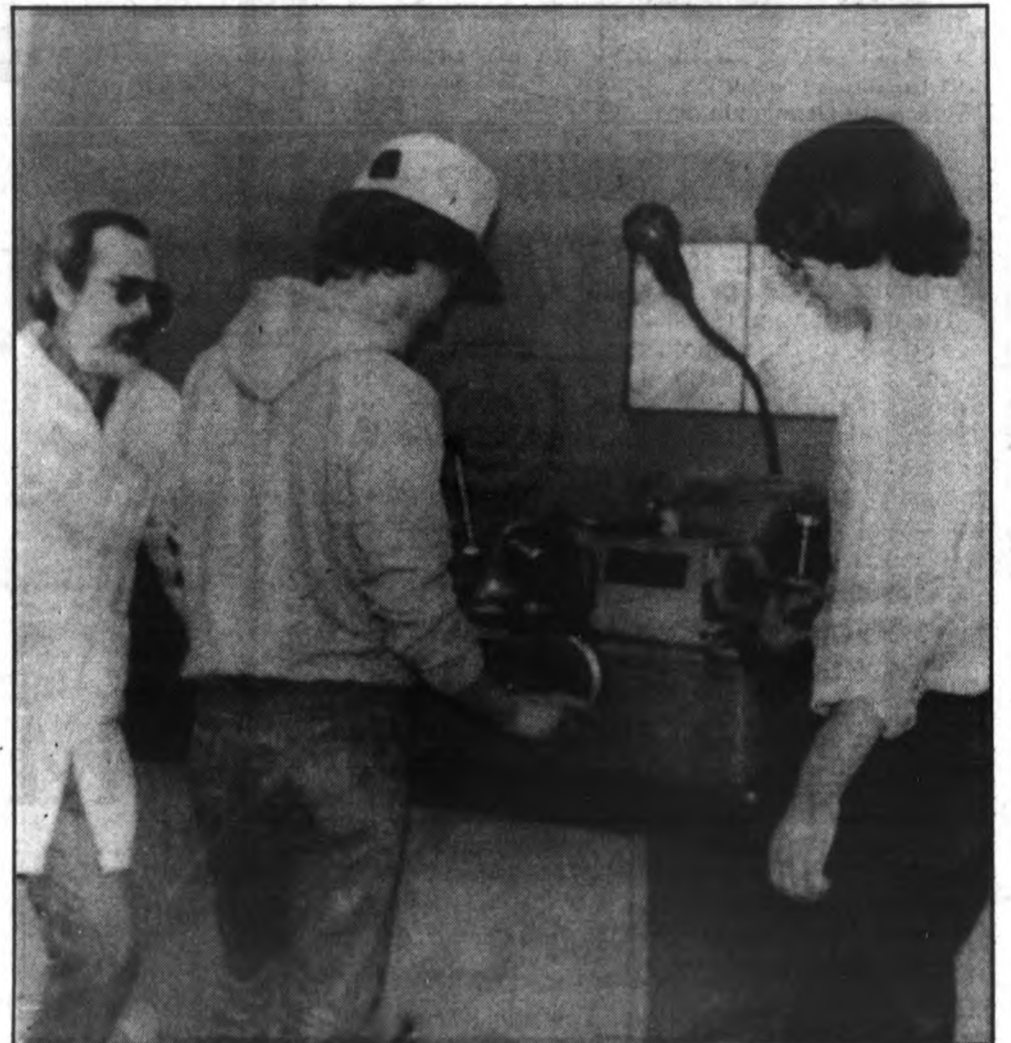


Turning Brake Drums-Kevin Price demonstrates the auto shop's brake lathe, as instructor Larry Button and student Troy LaBar look on.

# Successful placement attests to auto shop quality

"My personal feeling is that St. Johns High School's auto program is very comparable to anything going on," says Larry Button, high school auto shop teacher and developer of the school's auto program, which began in the 69-70 school year.

"I think we have an outstanding placement of our students after a 2-3 year period," Button adds. The figures back up the program's reputation. Button estimates that over half of the students enrolled in his second year auto course either continue their automotive education at trade school or community colleges or go right to work in the auto industry, working not only as mechanics but as auto body repairers, parts men, electrical specialists, or in skilled positions at Oldsmobile. "Many of the past graduates of the program are certified mechanics in the garages and dealerships here in town," says Button.

St. Johns' auto program is geared towards preparing its students for state certification in six of the eight areas Michigan certifies mechanics under, says Button. Those areas are brakes, engine, front end alignment, tune-up, manual transmissions and rear ends, and automotive electrical. The program covers fundamentals but does not spend enough time for students to get certified in the areas of air-conditioning and automatic transmissions. A mechanic needs state certification to repair cars legally in the state of Michigan. Most states have some form of licensing for mechanics.

The certification tests are offered by the school in the spring. "Because there is a charge, some of them take it and some don't," says Button. "A majority pass the test

they take," he says, pointing out that not all students take all the tests.

This year, Button has a total of 55 students in his three auto classes; 15 and 17 in the two Auto I classes and 23 in the Auto II class. Each class lasts for two hours each day.

St. Johns' auto program is actually a three year program, with tenth grade students taking Power Mechanics, which they have to pass with a C average and recommendation from the instructor to go on to Auto Mechanics I. Auto Mechanics II requires a C average or better in Auto Mechanics I and recommendation from the instructor.

Students in Auto Mechanics I learn general chassis service, including lube and oil change, exhaust systems, tire service, suspension service and inspection, and cooling system service during the school year's first nine week period; brake service, including drum, disc, and power brakes during the second nine weeks; engine service, including engine theory, testing, assembly and disassembly, and head and valve jobs during the third nine weeks; and front end systems, including suspension, steering systems, front end geometry, and rear suspension during the fourth nine week period.

Students in Auto Mechanics II learn more in the actual business dealings of auto repair shops. During Auto II's first nine weeks Button covers auto service policies, training available after high school, estimating and flat rates, electrical fundamentals and batteries, and starting systems. During the second nine weeks, Auto II students study charging systems, ignition systems, and tune-up. The third nine weeks are devoted to fuel systems, emission

systems, and employability. Auto II students spend the final nine weeks of the school year studying clutches, manual transmissions, rear axles, and automatic transmissions.

In addition to lectures, filmstrips, and other classroom work on these subjects, both Auto I and Auto II students spend most of the time working on customer cars. "Probably 30% of the time is spent in the classroom with lecture and demonstrations, with 70% in the lab, working on customer cars," says Button.

The customer cars come primarily from students and staff at the high school, says Button. "But some customers have been coming here since the start of the program in 1969." There is a one-to-two week backup of customer cars at the St. Johns student garage, which only charges for parts, not labor.

"I'm very selective on the jobs we take," says Button. "I try and select jobs they need experience on. I don't take every job that customers need done." There are some auto needs that the shop just isn't capable of fulfilling, things like the front wheel drive cars that need special tools to repair them, or car's computer systems, says Button.

The cars are worked on by teams of two or three students, who generally volunteer for the different jobs, although sometimes they are assigned to cars. "We try to run the

place as close to what a student would find in the real world as possible," said Button. "Everything that we do in the classroom, we'll do on customer cars." The shop does not do engine overhauls, however. "Usually when you get to the engine overhaul stage, it's got to the point where the cost is more than the vehicle is worth," says Button.

When a part needed to fix a customer car can't

be found in the shop's \$1500 parts inventory, Button sends a student into town to get it. "We make 3-4 trips to town an hour, it seems like, sometimes," says Button.

The student making that trip is always part of the service manager team. Two or three student teams spend one week as service manager three or four times during the school year at St. Johns. In addition to making parts

runs, the service managers take an inventory of the shop's tools, order the parts, and bill customers. If requested, they can also give estimates for labor on work done.

"This gives students a little bit of responsibility as far as service management," says Button. "They find out what it takes to be a boss in a garage. We're doing this solely for student experience."

## Community ed auto classes also offered

"I think this community ought to be more well aware of what in the world's going on at adult education. They're missing a great opportunity," says Dick Kiel, owner of Kiel's Sunshine Center Drycleaning and Laundromat.

Every Monday night, from 5-10 p.m., Kiel takes part in an adult enrichment auto shop class at the St. Johns High School. Kiel paid \$60 for a total of 60 hours of instruction; five hours a week for 12 weeks.

Besides learning some of the basics of car care and trouble areas to look for in his own vehicle, Kiel estimates that he has saved approximately \$500 in labor costs by being able to do his own repairs right in the high school's auto shop. A friend taking the course along with Kiel has had an even better cash return. "Without a

doubt we've saved him from \$700-800," says Kiel of the repairs they have done to his friend's car.

The auto class, which is offered as both adult enrichment, for which a fee is charged, and for high school completion, for which there is no fee, is taught by high school auto shop teacher Larry Button. "We cover a little bit of theory, but most of it is just on the job training on their own vehicles on things they need fixed," says Button. Having a class for five hours one night a week is more beneficial to the students than having several shorter classes a week, according to Button. "That way we can start a job and finish it in that one evening."

So far, Button's adult auto classes have been small, allowing for individualized training.

The last class started out with nine students, and has five "regulars" who show up most of the time, says Button.

"He doesn't do the work for you, but he makes sure that the work is done correctly," says Kiel of the way Button runs the class.

Button would like more people to get involved in his auto class. "Once they get going, I don't have too much to do," he says.

Kiel will be in the next class. He has already signed up again for the auto shop, where he is working towards becoming a certified mechanic, and will also be learning about home computers when new adult enrichment classes begin in March.

"These classes get the staleness out of people's lives. They get the momentum going," says Kiel.

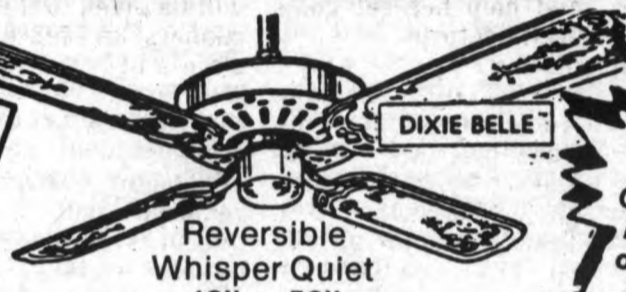
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## Mulling Over The Movies

It's just really hard not to like Beverly Hills Cop, now playing at Cinema III in South Point Mall, once you get into it. And there isn't much real reason not to.

First, Beverly Hills Cop looks just great. When the scene is in Beverly Hills, the visuals have all the slickness of MTV. In Detroit, well, it looks about like downtown

Detroit. Those visuals, especially the mean streets candid shots at the beginning of the movie compared to the land of palm trees and Mercedes Benzes later on, besides looking nice, really have a lot to say in this movie.

Beverly Hills Cop isn't just about how some wilddog detective from Detroit who goes

to ritzy Beverly Hills and shakes up everyone and everything there. It's also about those huge social, class and economic differences up there on the screen. The Big Difference between downtown Detroit and Beverly Hills is great for comic relief, but it's a lot more than just funny.

Getting back to reasons to like Beverly Hills Cop, it's genuinely funny, and genuinely exciting, too. What isn't action and thrills in the movie is laughs, and sometimes (like in the great semi-truck chase scene at the beginning)

it's both. A person can just sit back, relax, and enjoy.

The third and biggest reason to like Beverly Hills Cop is Eddie Murphy. Eddie Murphy is a funny guy; with timing, actions, expressions, voices, the whole shot; and then, unlike some comedians, he can snap right back and do a creditable serious. The scripting of Beverly Hills Cop works all Murphy's talents right in, believably, and really relies on Murphy's finest quality; gutsiness (panache, chutzpah, intestinal fortitude, etc.). Gutsiness is really

what most of the humor in Beverly Hills Cop is based on, whether Murphy is holding the employees of a bonded warehouse in his iron grip as he masquerades as a security inspector or procuring accommodations at a fashionable hotel. Murphy will do anything so things go his way (and they usually do).

There is one reason not to go see Beverly Hills Cop. If excessive profanity offends you, don't see the movie. If you want to show someone how meaningless excessive profanity can get, though, do see the movie. Every other

word being a four-letter one is pretty noticeable at first, but by the end of the movie, they seem to be normal speech patterns. You don't notice. (And that's why swearing a lot isn't nearly as effective as the occasional well-placed and emotionally backed expletive.)

Overall and besides Eddie Murphy's meaninglessly trashy mouth, Beverly Hills Cop is just dandy; lots of laughs, lots of excitement (even grisly shootings). It probably isn't much new to any teenager able to get to the theatre by him or herself.

# Great white featured at boat show

IT IS THREE TIMES THE SIZE OF AN AVERAGE MAN! ITS JAW SPAN IS A YARD WIDE! IS IT A BIRD? IS IT A PLANE? No, it's a deadly 16½ foot Great White Shark weighing an estimated 2,800 pounds. You can only find it at the 1985 Detroit Boat and Fishing Show February 2-6 at Cobo Hall. The show runs through Sunday, February 10.

Caught on August 5, 1983, 10 miles southeast of Block Island off the coast of Connecticut, the beast is a male estimated to be 15 to 20 years old. It is one of the largest of its kind ever caught off the North Atlantic coast. The cast of the deadly beast will be accompanied by its captor Captain Greg Dubrule.

When first spotted by Captain Ernie Celotto, fishing with Dubrule, the giant fish was feeding on the carcass of an even larger 40 foot dead whale. At 4:00 a.m. the morning of August 5, the "Reelin," captained by Ernie Celotto, and "The Seaweed Too," captained by Gregory Dubrule, set out for the capture of the trophy of trophies. The next ten hours were spent waiting until the first harpoon was finally shot at 2:00 p.m. It was at

that moment that the great white shark dove deep into the water pulling with it a 300 foot harpoon line attached to a flotation ball.

The struggle lasted more than five hours and it took two magnum loads of buckshot before man outlasted beast. At one point, the deadly prey surfaced and headed directly toward Dubrule's boat. According to Captain Ernie Celotto, "the fish came out of the water and charged and it was clear that it was after Greg's boat."

Greg Dubrule, the daring young charter boat captain, will be on hand to recreate this dramatic story February 2-6. Dubrule has been in the charter game for 16 years and has won an enviable reputation with his prowess at finding gamefish in the sound and offshore waters for people who charter his

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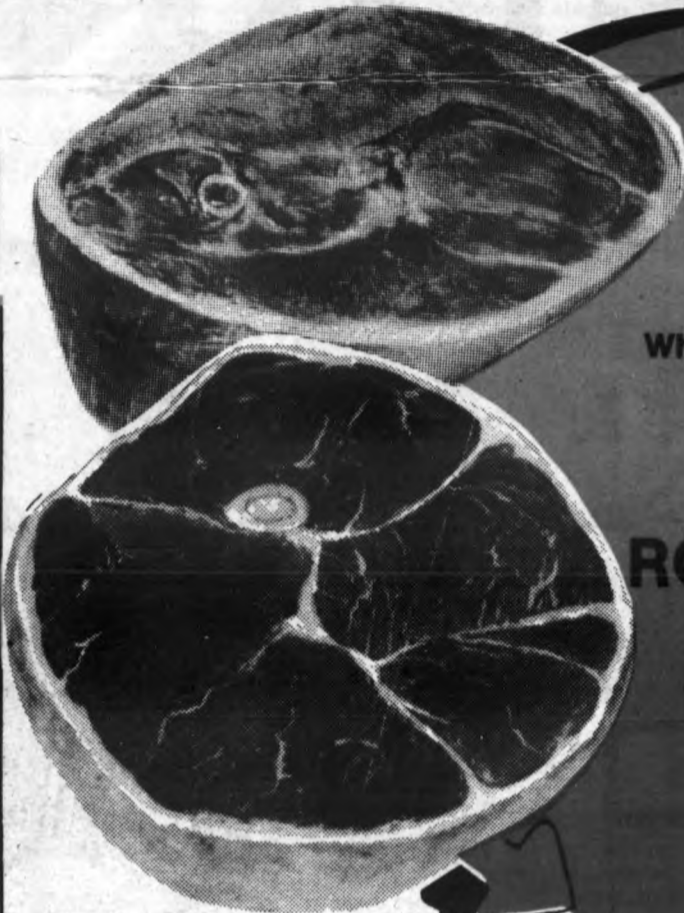
