## Safety concern voiced by Sheriff Haneckow

With a recent rash of snow and ice storms kicking off the new year, Clinton County Sheriff Terry Haneckow reminds winter drivers of several accident reducing safety tips:

--It takes twice the distance to stop a car or truck on a slick highway, as it does on dry pavement. On wet or icy surfaces, drive more slowly; allow at least half-again your usual distance between your car and the car ahead.

--Keep your foot pressure on the gas pedal smooth and even. If you take your foot off the accelerator too fast, your car may go into a skid and you may lose control.

--Your car also may skid if you brake too suddenly or too hard. To stop on slippery pavement, pump brakes lightly while you hold the steering wheel firmly. Steer left or right only when your foot is off the brake pedal to avoid going into a spin.

--On wet roads throughout the year, your car may hydroplane. This is when your tires actually lose contact with the road and ride on the surface of the water on the road. You will feel like your car is slipping. Do not brake! Hard braking can cause you to lose

control. Instead, ease back on the gas until your car sits back down on the road. Then you can go at a slower speed.

--Wet weather also may mean damp brakes, cutting down on their stopping ability. While driving in wet weather, keep brakes dry and useful by braking lightly for several seconds at regular times. The heat this action produces will dry the brake lining.

--Have your brakes checked at least once a

year. This is your surest way to depend on your brakes--just when you may need them the most.

"More than one-third of all vehicle accidents happen in winter," notes Sheriff Haneckow, "and they cause one out of every five traffic fatalities."

Sheriff Haneckow advises that by keeping in mind personal safety in your car--and the safety of others--everyone will have a happier winter season ahead.

## Clinton Memorial commended

MONITREND data is used regularly in budgeting, staffing, and service decisions.

## Between the Bookends

Yes, there is a library in St. Johns and it has been in the same location on Spring Street for thirty-nine years.

We have a five person staff, a Genealogy room, first and second floor library, a childrens' corner, records, magazines, newspapers, fiction, non-fiction, biographies (both adult and childrens), a VCR player, and VCR cassettes for circulation. The annual report to the State of Michigan shows we have over 26,000 pieces of material and a circulation of over 54,000 in 1983-1984.

Our legal service area includes the City of St. Johns, Bengal, Bingham, Dallas, Greenbush, Olive, Riley and Westphalia Townships, over 18,000 people. The library is funded by penal fines (so, if you're going to speed or be arrested, please do it in Clinton County so we get our share), State Aid, Federal Revenue Sharing, and donations from Bengal, Bingham, Greenbush Townships, and our friends in Essex Township.

The governing body is a five person board, Chairman Gary McCampbell, Mrs. Fraser MacKinnon, Mrs. Hugh Banninga, Mrs. Jack Plowman, and Tom Wiseman, who is the liaison between the City Commission and the Library. These people are appointed by the City Commission for a five year term.

We are members of the Capital Library Cooperative, a group of forty-eight libraries in central Michigan, headquartered in Mason, who provide us with many services including an Interloan system.

Our collection is constantly being updated with all types of material from many sources. We subscribe to fifty-six magazines, belong to several book clubs, as well as seeing

several book salesmen and the Capital Library Cooperative book selection each month. If we don't have what you want, we'll try to get it. However, there are times we can't immediately fill a request because over 18,000 people sometimes want the same book, so please be patient with us. We'll never be a large library but we strive to be one of the best.

Do come and see us. With the cold, snowy weather, the library is a warm, cozy place to browse, read, visit with the Staff, or just sit while your body and batteries recharge to cope with the weather and the world.

## IRS offers tax assistance

The old adage, haste makes waste, can be true when it involves tax returns according to the Internal Revenue Service. And it can be costly if you're one of three million Michigan people expecting a refund. When a person waits until the last minute to file a tax return, errors can be made that delay efficient processing of a return. Any refund due to the taxpayer is also delayed when there are errors on a return.

If you're an average Michigan taxpayer, your refund will be over \$800 this year...not something an intelligent person wants to delay. To help cut down on costly mistakes to both the taxpayer and the government, individuals are urged to file their tax returns as early as possible, said Charles A. Parks, IRS district director.

Filing a tax return now, provided all the necessary records are available from employers and financial institutions to complete an accurate return, can

save time and money. The government, too, can operate more efficiently when taxpayers help save processing time. Reading the tax instructions carefully

can cut down on errors also, Parks said.

The IRS offers free assistance to help taxpayers prepare their own returns.

## GI insurance to pay dividend

More than 111,300 Michigan veterans who kept their GI life insurance in force will share a record \$23.6 million in dividends in 1985, the Veterans Administration recently announced.

No application for the annual dividend is necessary, according to Gordon Clowney, director of the VA Regional Office in Detroit. He said each policyholder will receive the dividend automatically in the month of the anniversary date of the policy.

Clowney said the record high dividend was due to high interest earnings on the insurance funds' investments and lower death rates among policyholders.

There are 1,371 World War I veterans in Michigan with current policies. The average amount to be paid to these policyholders nationwide is \$248. A total 91,623 World War II veterans in the state will receive an average pay-

ment of \$241. Korean conflict policyholders--14,018 in Michigan--will receive an average payment of \$187.

Disabled veterans from World War II and Korea who have a special type of GI insurance (Veterans Reopened Insurance) will also receive increased dividends. This year 4,345 Michigan

policyholders will receive dividends which average \$203. Vietnam-era and post-Vietnam-era veterans, who have different insurance programs, do not receive dividends.

Clowney said the state's dividend payout is part of a national record \$798.8 million in 1985 dividends to 3.4 million veterans.

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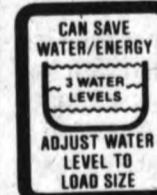
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## New information available on Reyes

In the midst of the flu season, important new information has become available about the development--in teens and children with flu--of Reye's Syndrome, a rare but serious condition that kills 20 to 30 percent of its young victims and leaves many survivors brain-damaged.

The new information comes from a U.S. Public Health Service pilot study of a possible link seen in four earlier state studies between the use of aspirin in treating flu or chicken pox and an increased risk of Reye's Syndrome.

The Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences has reviewed the pilot study and found "strong support" for the link.

Although personnel from the Food and Drug Administration, the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control will continue the study through next winter, the Institute of Medicine advised that the federal government not wait to inform and protect the public.

As a result, Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret M. Heckler has asked manufacturers to remove any recommended use in flu and chicken pox from aspirin-containing products aimed at children--and to add a warning to all aspirin-containing products against use for flu and chicken pox in children and teens.

The pilot study looked at histories of drug treatments and other factors of 29 young people who got Reye's Syndrome last year. Use of aspirin for flu or chicken pox symptoms was the common thread shown in 28 of the 29 (whereas ordinarily less than half the young people with flu or chicken pox would be expected to take aspirin).

U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, M.D., has said that most childhood illnesses are self-limiting and usually don't require medication at all. Doctors often suggest that a child with fever simply be made comfortable with cool compresses.

Of course, physicians continue to find aspirin useful and safe for adult, teen and childhood arthritis and other conditions.

Reye's Syndrome is a rare condition--a few hundred cases a year. It was named in 1963 for an Australian pathologist who described it as a swelling of the brain, combined with

liver malfunction and blood chemistry disorders leading in most cases to death.

Improved recognition and early treatment of the disease has helped reduce the death rate, but still one out of four reported cases are fatal.

It is crucial to take ac-

tion quickly if Reye's symptoms occur--whether or not aspirin or an aspirin-containing product has been used. The first sign is generally persistent vomiting. The young person may be sleepy and lethargic, but still responsive. Within half a day, he or

she can become disoriented, combative and delirious.

Untreated, the teenager or child can go into a coma and die.

Thus, Reye's Syndrome is a medical emergency. A child with Reye's symptoms must

be taken immediately to a hospital, where blood and body fluids can be monitored and a respirator used if breathing fails. Surgery

may be needed, in some cases, to relieve pressure on the swollen brain. Therefore, act promptly if you suspect Reye's Syndrome.

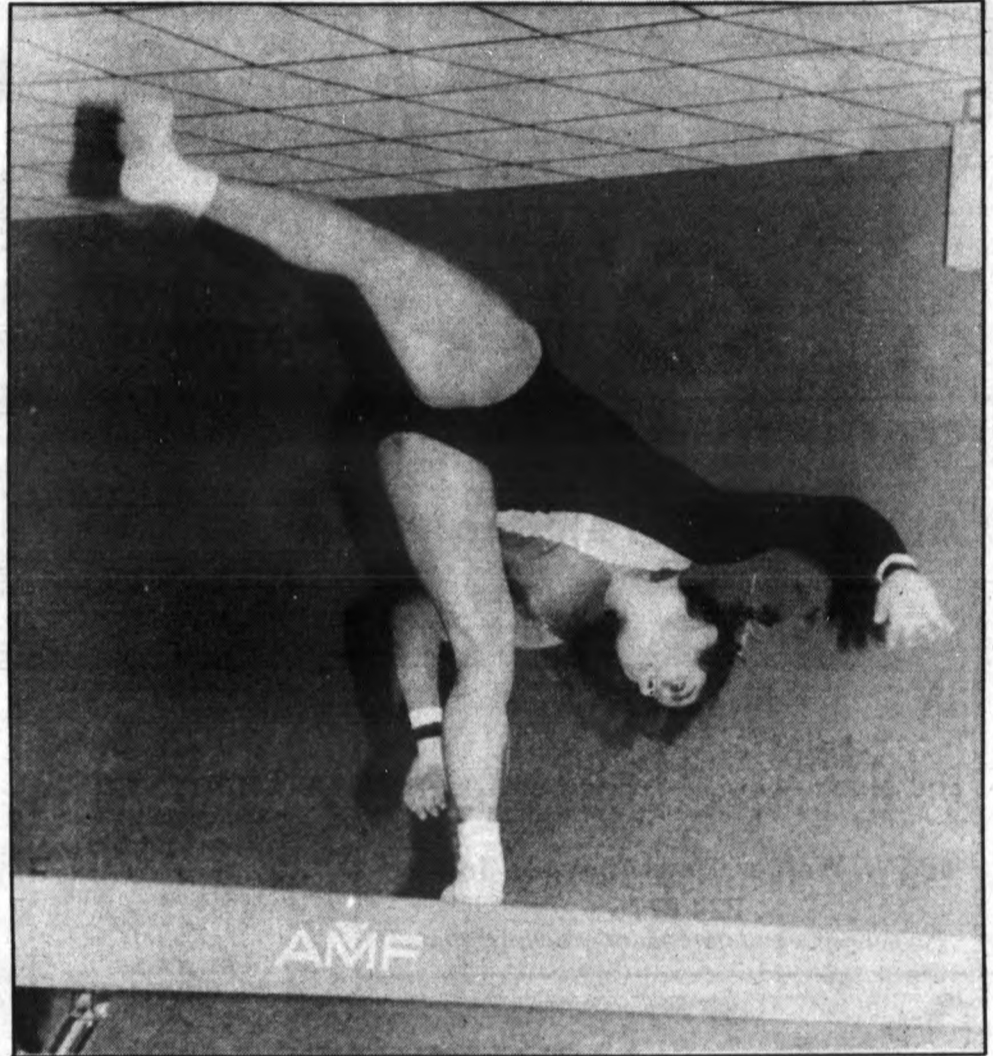

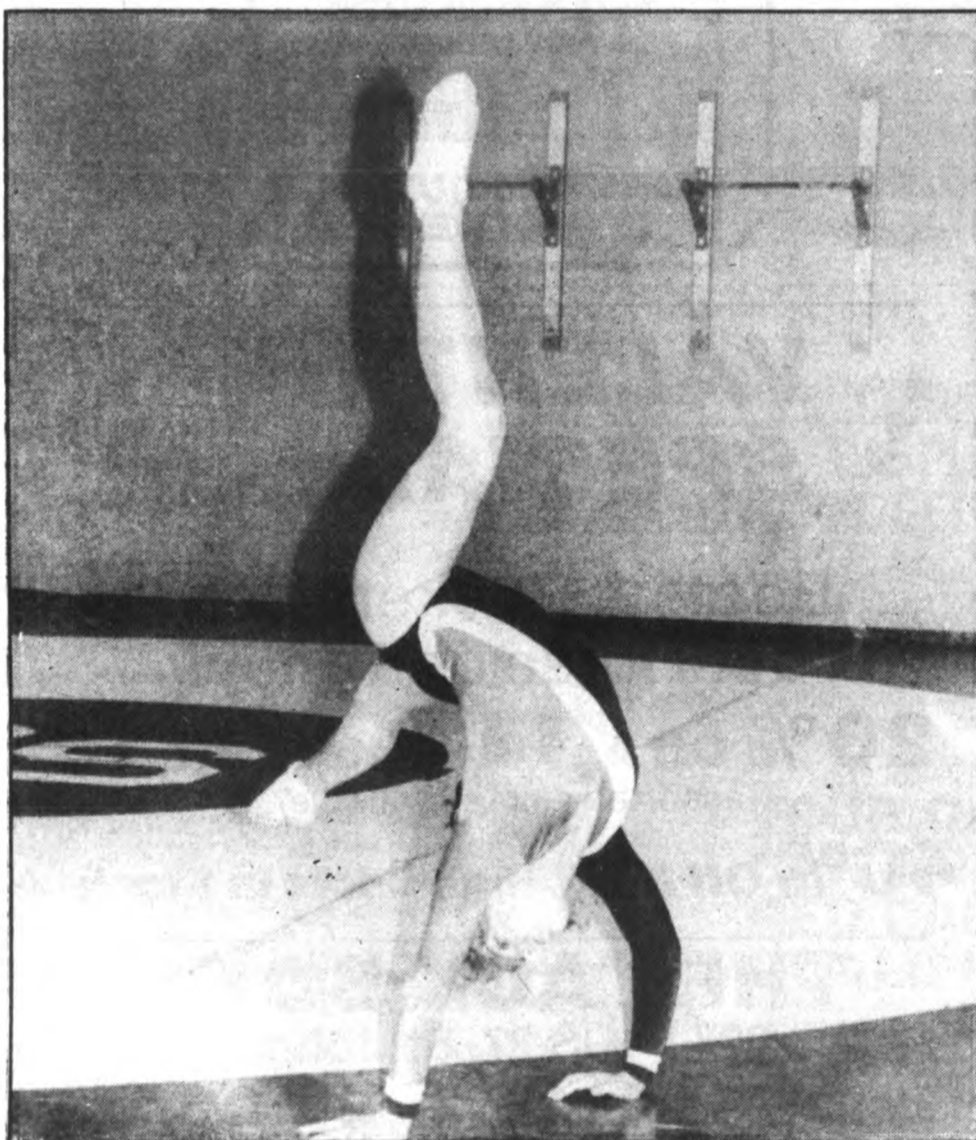


THERESA DESANDER EXECUTÉS A DIFFICULT MOVE ON THE BEAM

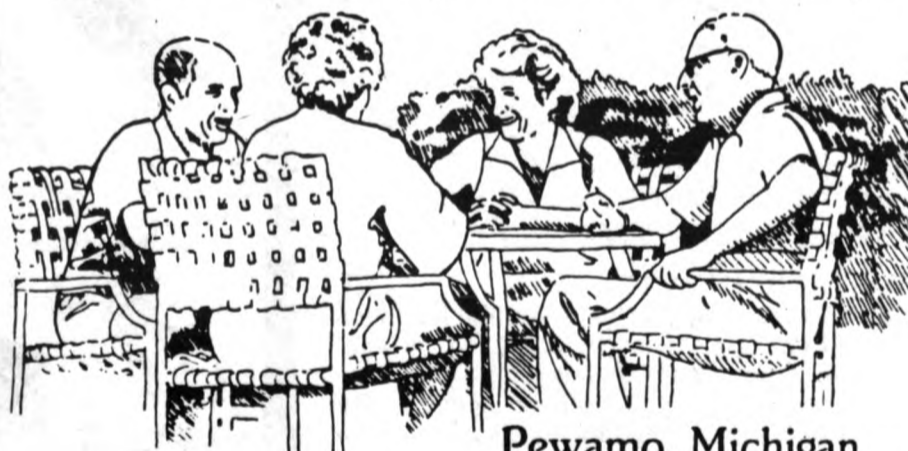

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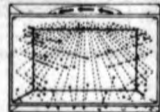

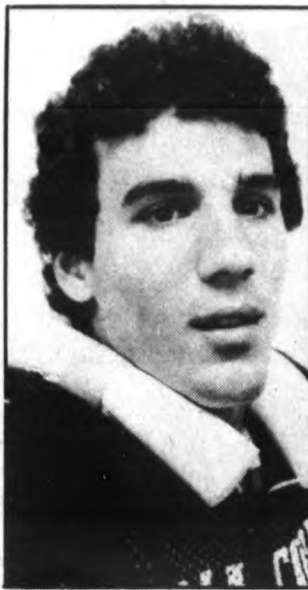

Alma's selection as the United States' representative to compete in the Arctic Bowl caps an outstanding 1984 season that included a

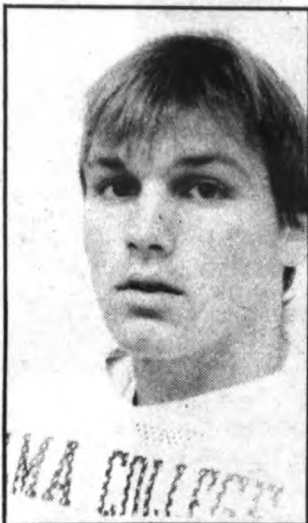
top-20 position in 10 different NCAA Division III football statistical categories. Most notable is the No. 1 position in total offense with an average of 465.1 yards per game.

experience, regardless of major. OU officials say studies have shown that many employers prefer to hire graduates who have completed a successful cooperative education. Some students are parallel co-ops (part time work hours and part time attendance at OU); while others alternate work and study semesters.

## How to detect child Cystic Fibrosis

When is a kiss not just a kiss? When it's used to detect cystic fibrosis. The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has launched a statewide educational project, "Kiss Your Baby," for this week. The purpose of the venture is to alert parents to the symptoms of cystic fibrosis and other children's lung diseases in the hope that early diagnosis and prompt treatment (an essential element in lengthening the life span of children and young adults with CF) will result.

One of the symptoms of cystic fibrosis is an extremely salty taste to the CF child's skin, which can be detected by kissing or tasting them on the forehead. Other symptoms include (1) recurrent wheezing; (2) persistent coughing and excess mucus; (3) pneumonia more than once during childhood; (4) excessive appetite but poor weight gain; and (5) clubbing (enlargement) of the fingertips. Suspecting parents are directed to consult their local physician.

"It is estimated that respiratory problems in

children take up to 70% of a pediatrician's time and are the leading cause of chronic absenteeism from school, said Rev. James E. Falsey, president of the Greater Michigan Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. "Furthermore, cystic fibrosis is second only to cancer in the number of young lives it takes and one-third of the victims of this disease are not yet diagnosed. Because early diagnosis of CF is

essential to longer life for these children and young adults, we have embarked on this statewide campaign to bring this vital health message to the people of Michigan."

Cystic fibrosis is an inherited disease for which there is neither a cure nor control. In CF, a thick, sticky mucus clogs the lungs and airways creating breathing difficulties, high susceptibility to infection, and lung damage. The

mucus may also interfere with digestion by preventing the flow of enzymes into the small intestine, causing malabsorption of food.

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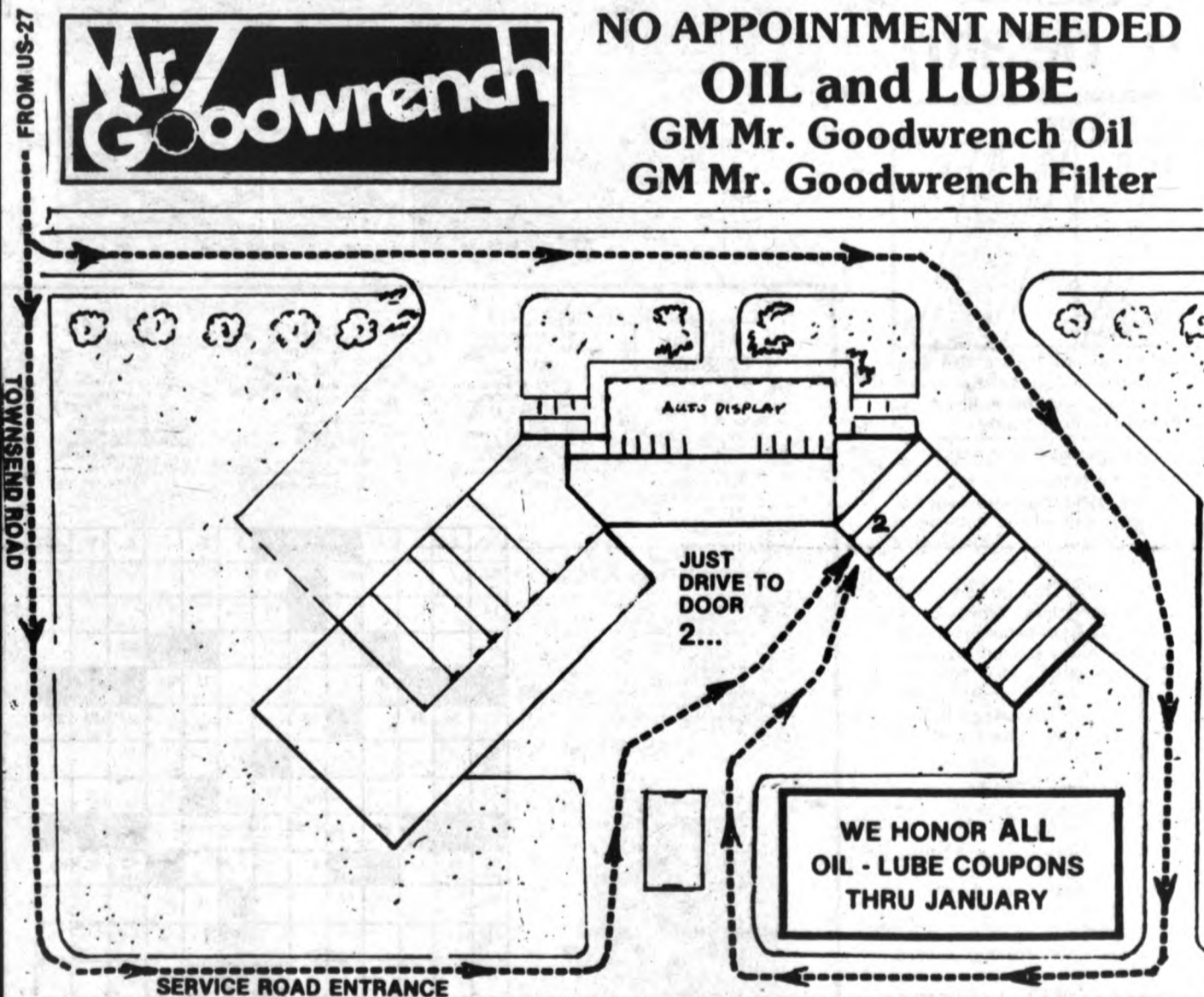
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## Records can make a big difference

Swine operation income can be increased without raising costs by keeping accurate, detailed financial and production records. "We all should agree that records are the backbone of a profitable

environment and management also raise the average number of pigs weaned.

Reducing the mortality rate from birth to weaning to less than 12 percent will have a large impact on opera-

operation and that we must use this information to benefit from the time and effort spent in keeping records," says Jerry Shurson, assistant Extension swine specialist at Michigan State University.

A general measure of the efficiency of a swine operation is the number of pigs produced per sow per year. Shurson says comparing an operation's production records with averaged state performance levels can identify problem areas and help a producer set realistic production and financial goals.

Rebreeding problem--such as disease, an inadequate number of boars or poor environmental conditions--are indicated if the number of litters produced per sow per year is below Michigan's 1983 average of 1.73. If the length of lactation is above 21 days, a producer may not be practicing adequate selection pressure for milk production, or the nursery environment may be less than optimal.

Individual sow records will show the interval between farrowings and the ability to get sows rebred on first estrus after weaning in a continuous farrowing system.

A low number of pigs born alive per sow or per litter may reflect problems in the number of gilt replacements, diseases present in replacements or use of an inefficient crossbreeding system. An average of 16.6 pigs were born alive per sow per year and 9.6 pigs were born alive per litter in Michigan in 1983. The number of pigs weaned will increase as the number of live pigs born grows. Improved milking ability of the sow, increased baby pig weight, and improved farrowing house en-

tion profitability, Shurson says. Financial records will provide information on the optimum feed/gain ratios, feed additive use and diet mix costs. Farrow-to-finish operations should have a feed/gain ratio of about 4.0 or less for maximum efficiency. Studies show producers may be wasting 10 to 15 percent of the feed if feed is seen on the floor. Shurson says feed costs make up about 60 to 65 percent of the total costs for the farrow-to-finish operator. Optimizing those costs can lead to substantial gains in profitability.

A good record keeping system can be an inexpensive and profitable way to streamline operating costs and provide a form of cost and quality control.

## Numbers in households changing

The number of households occupied by a single person is increasing greatly because many people are postponing marriage, or divorcing, and choosing to live alone or are left alone after the death of a spouse.

Most of these individuals are working, which means their dwellings are

vulnerable to burglary when they are away. It can also mean that singles are vulnerable to personal attack while entering or leaving their homes and even while they are alone in the home.

The number of single adult households is not likely to decrease in the near future. Neither is

the crime rate, unless individuals make it more difficult for crimes to be committed. By taking precautions, singles can make themselves and their dwellings less vulnerable and greatly reduce their chances of becoming victims.

Here are some suggestions:

- Install exterior lights at all doors and make sure they always work.
- Install good wide-angle peepholes on exterior doors so you can see who is outside. Don't rely on voices to identify visitors.
- Don't hide an extra key outside anywhere. Leave one with a trusted friend or neighbor.
- Trim heavy bushes around front entry. This reduces the opportunity

for an intruder to lie in wait.

--Make sure windows are completely closed and locked each time you leave the dwelling.

--Leave at least one light burning in your dwelling when you leave for an evening.

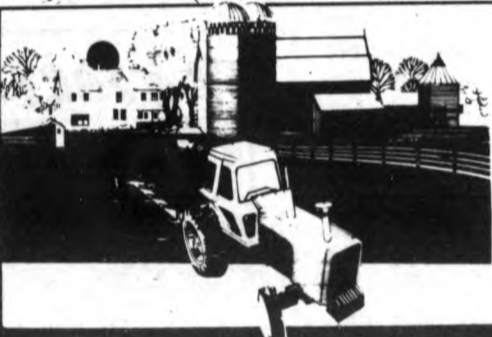
--Never leave a note on the outside of your door.

--Never let a stranger know you are alone, whether you are talking on the telephone or talking to someone at the door.

--If you lose a key, replace the lock.

--When you go out to your car or come home, have your key ready to open the door.

## Time nears for Beef cookoff

If you have an original beef dish that you're particularly proud of, now is the time to enter it in the Michigan Beef Cook-Off. You could win an all expense paid trip to Wichita, Kansas to compete for \$10,000 in national prize money. The top five winners receive gift boxed beef.

To enter, send a typed copy of your best beef recipe (using only chuck, round, fresh brisket, plate, shank or ground beef) to the Michigan Beef Industry Commission, 815 Coolidge Road Suite 307, Lansing, Michigan 48912. Include your name, address, phone number and a brief statement about the origin of your recipe.

Be sure to enter your recipe soon. Deadline for entry is April 15, 1985. Nine finalists will compete at the Michigan Beef Cook-Off, on June 8, 1985, at the Meridian Mall in Okemos. Prizes are: \$50 for first place (plus all expense paid trip for two to the national cook-off); \$45 for second place; \$35 for third; and \$25 for two honorable mentions. Additionally, the first place winner will represent Michigan

at the National Beef Cook-Off, September 24-26, in Wichita, Kansas. Prizes at the national level are: first place, \$5,000; second place, \$2,500; third place, \$1,000; five honorable mentions, \$300.

All recipes must contain a minimum of one pound of beef and not more than five, and each serving must contain at least three ounces of cooked beef. Meat used must be exclusively beef. Cooking time cannot exceed four hours. The recipe must be specific, with no use of brand names, and must state the number of servings and approximate preparation time. All entries become the property of the Michigan CattleWomen, Inc.

Contestants must be 18 years old or older, with non-professional food status. Any person who has owned one or more head of beef or dairy cattle (or who lives in a household where any person has owned cattle) in the twelve months preceding October 1, 1985 is ineligible. CattleWomen or employees of state beef councils or the National Live Stock

and Meat Board are also ineligible.

Recipes are judged according to taste, ease of preparation and practicality, originality and appearance.

The Michigan Cook-

Off is sponsored by the Michigan CattleWomen. The National Beef Cook-Off is sponsored by the American National Cowbelles in cooperation with the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board.

## State sheep inventory holds steady

The January 1, 1985 Michigan sheep inventory, at 110,000 head, held steady when compared with the count of a year ago, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. There were an estimated 92,000 stock sheep and 18,000 sheep and lambs on feed, also unchanged from last year. The 1984 Michigan lamb crop, which is the number of lambs born October 1, 1983-September 30, 1984, reached 100,000 head, up 11 percent from the 1983 crop. There are approximately 2,900 places with one or more sheep

in Michigan. The total sheep inventory was valued at \$7.5 million.

The U.S. all sheep and lamb inventory on January 1, was at a record low total of 10.4 million head. This represents a 9 percent decline from the 11.5 million head a year earlier. The value of the inventory was about \$638 million. The 1984 U.S. lamb crop was 7.8 million head, down 5 percent from the 1983 lamb crop. Texas, California and Wyoming, the top three states in sheep numbers all showed inventory declines during the past year.

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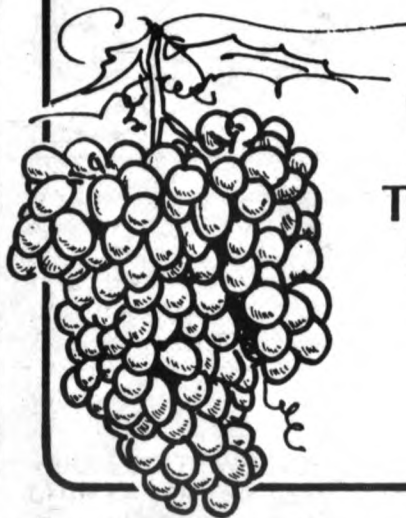

## Timely tips for plant care

Winter is the pits for house plants. Low light, low temperatures and low humidity indoors often combine to slow or stop growth, make plants grow leggy or drop leaves, or go brown around the edges. Add overwatering or too much fertilizer and you have a recipe for major house plant problems.

Lee Taylor, Extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University, says low light is at the root of most house plant woes. Michigan's short and often cloudy days simply don't provide enough light for most plants to do any more than maintain themselves. Those that do grow tend to produce long stems with few, widely spaced leaves. Plants that put on a flush of new growth during the summer may drop much of their foliage in an effort to try to adjust to reduced light. The result can be a straggly, pathetic-looking plant that's just barely hanging in there.

If you're still watering your plants as if they were growing vigorously, you're compounding the problem by subjecting plants to overwatering stress. They're not growing very much and aren't using much water. If they've dropped a lot of leaves, they aren't even losing much by way of transpiration from the foliage. As a result, the soil stays waterlogged for some time, and roots may be dying. A plant with dead roots can't take up water and may wilt as if parched. More water, of course, is not the solution. What plants need is more light.

Artificial light is the obvious answer, Taylor points out. He recommends 12 to 16 hours of supplemental light per day, from fluorescent tubes rather than incandescent bulbs. Fluorescent lights provide a great deal more light for the same input of electricity, and they are cooler, so plants are not likely to cook if placed too near them.

Though special plant growth lights are available. They are not necessary, Taylor notes. An ordinary fluorescent fixture with a combination of cool white and warm white tubes in it is sufficient, and less expensive.

Plants placed on win-

dowsills to get as much natural light as possible will be injured if foliage touches the cold window glass or if the windowsill is so cold that

roots are chilled or frozen. Closing curtains or blinds and cutting plants off from the room's heat at night may expose plants to killing temperatures.

Most house plants do nicely in the winter at temperatures in the 60's or even lower, Taylor notes. Cacti and succulents are essentially dormant and tolerate temperatures in the 50's and even 40's. Even such tropical plants as philodendron, Chinese

evergreen, dumbcane, African violets and crotons can survive if temperatures fall no lower than 55 to 60 degrees F.

Tropical plants are the ones most likely to be damaged by low humidity, a chronic problem in homes and offices in winter. Plants often respond to dry air with browning of foliage edges or tips. Grouping plants in areas of the house that tend to have somewhat higher

moisture levels--such as the kitchen, laundry area and bathroom--using a room humidifier or placing plant pots on a tray of wet gravel may prevent problems from low humidity.

Even plants grown under light may not be growing vigorously, Taylor says, so he advises against fertilizing during the winter. Under the best of circumstances, fertilizer

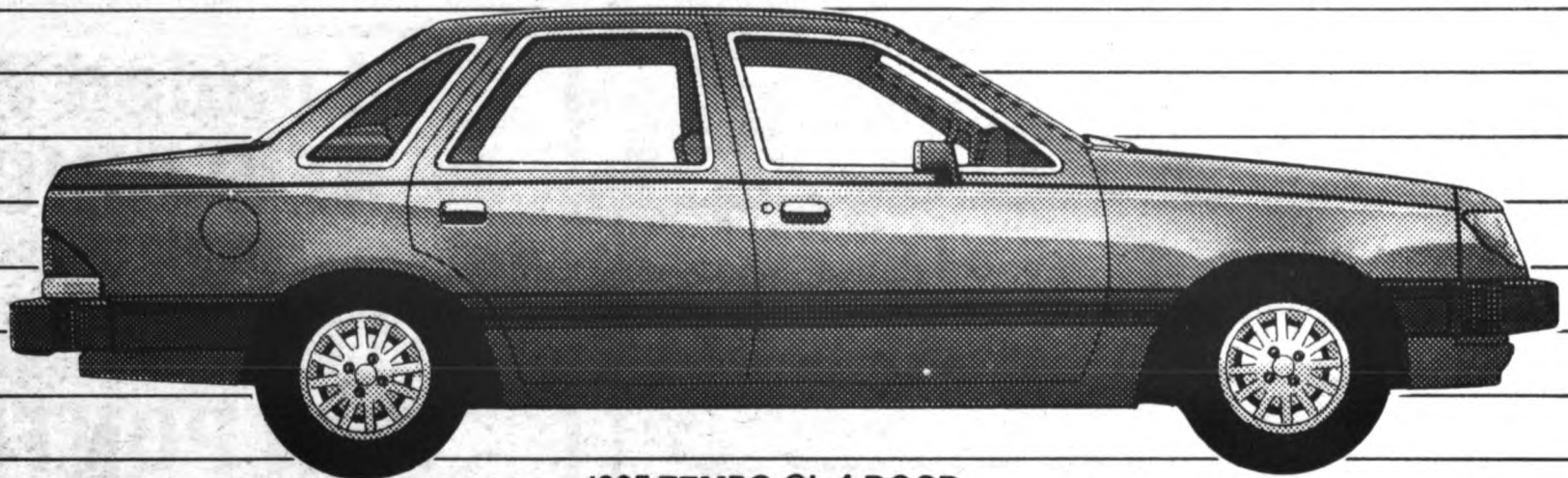

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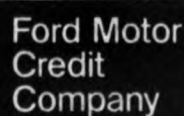
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## Feed grain producers given tips by Ag chief

"Feed grain producers with maturing 1984 crop barley, corn and sorghum regular loans may place their crops in the farmer owned reserve," Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block said recently.

"Producers with 1984 crop oat regular loans may place their crops in the reserve if the oat reserve is not in release status when the regular loan matures," Block said. "The oat reserve is currently in release status. Current provisions--a storage rate of \$.265 per bushel for corn and barley, \$.20 per bushel for oats and \$.4732 per hundredweight for sorghum and no reserve minimum--will apply."

USDA had said it would review the size of the reserve before the regular 1984 crop loans matured. "Because some barley and oat loans will begin to mature on February 28, an announcement on reserve availability must be made now," Block said.

"With this action, it is not likely that the feed grain reserves will reach 1 billion bushels before 1984 regular loans begin to mature," Block said.

Farmers will not be permitted to convert existing and maturing feed grain reserve loans into the current reserve. The trigger release level will be \$3.25 per bushel for corn, \$2.65 per bushel for barley, \$1.65 per bushel for oats and \$5.54 per hun-

dred weight for sorghum. Interest is charged on reserve loans during the first year in the reserve. No interest is charged after the first year, except

during certain release periods.

Producers should contact the Clinton County ASCS Office for further details.

salts may build up in the soil in plant pots, burning roots and damaging foliage that rests on crusty pot rims. The potential for salt buildup is even greater when plants are growing poorly or not at all and not taking up nutrients from the soil.

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## Production increased in 1983

An increase in production from 1983 was noted for all of Michigan's field crops, except corn for silage, soybeans, and dry beans. Harvested acreage for 1984 increased for all crops except spearmint, which remained the same as last year. Yields for most crops were below the previous year due to the dry weather during the growing season, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Yields for sugarbeets, other hay, potatoes and spearmint were above last year. Overall, harvest progress was normal for corn, but lagged behind normal for soybeans and sugarbeets.

Corn for grain production during 1984 increased 33 percent from the previous year. The increase in production is attributed to a 46 percent increase in harvest acreage following last season's PIK (Payment in Kind) program. Yields averaged 84 bushels per acre, 8 bushels below last year and the lowest since 1978. Potato production at 15.1 million hundredweight (cwt.) is 26 percent higher than last year. This is the largest crop since the 15.3

million cwt. produced in 1938. Excellent quality was reported statewide. Sugarbeet output is pegged at 2.1 million tons, a 7 percent increase from the previous year. Overall yields and quality were good for the 1984 crop. Alfalfa hay production was up 17 percent. This increase is attributed to alfalfa being seeded during the sum-

mer of 1983 on PIK acreage withdrawn from crop production. All other hay and spearmint production increased 30 percent and 6 percent, respectively. Soybeans, dry beans and corn for silage were the commodities that displayed decreases in production. Soybean

(Continued from page 6B) production at 32.1 million bushels dropped 5 percent from last season. Soybean yields were 5.5 bushels below last year. Yields were reduced by dry conditions during the growing season. Drybean production at 4.2 million cwt. was 8 percent below the previous year. Planting delays and hot, dry weather during the season reduced production to the lowest level

since 1957. Corn for silage output at 4.4 million tons was 11 percent below last year.

Nationally, production of corn for grain in 1984 was estimated at 7.65 billion bushels, up 83 percent from last year's drought-stricken and PIK program crop, but down 7 percent from the record high production in 1982. Soybean production at 1.86 billion bushels is 14 percent more than the 1983 crop.

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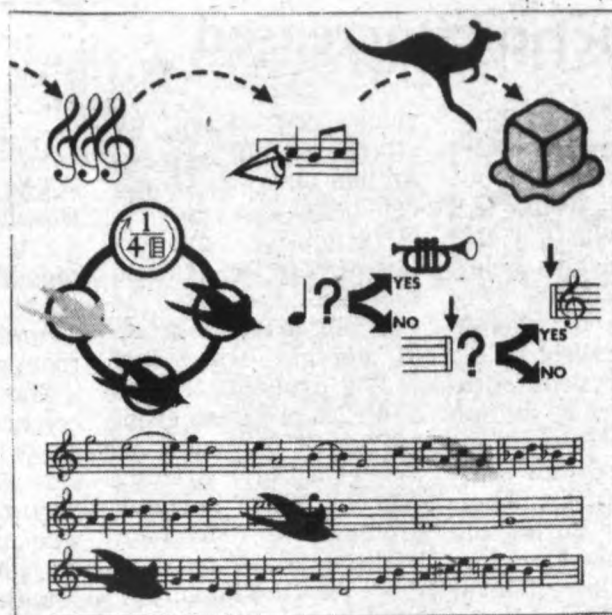
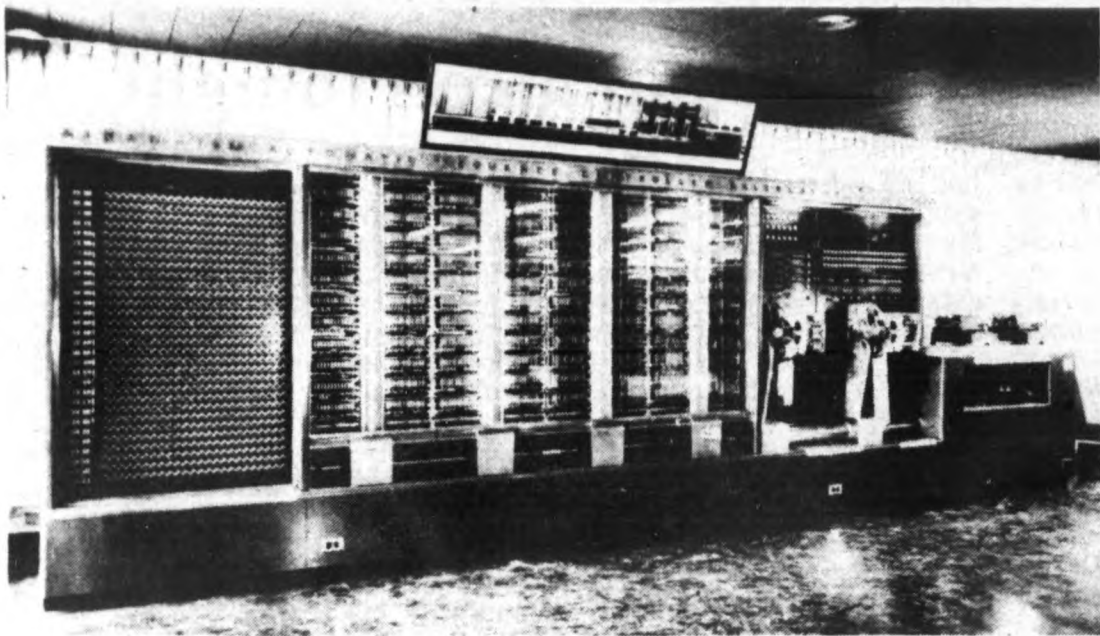


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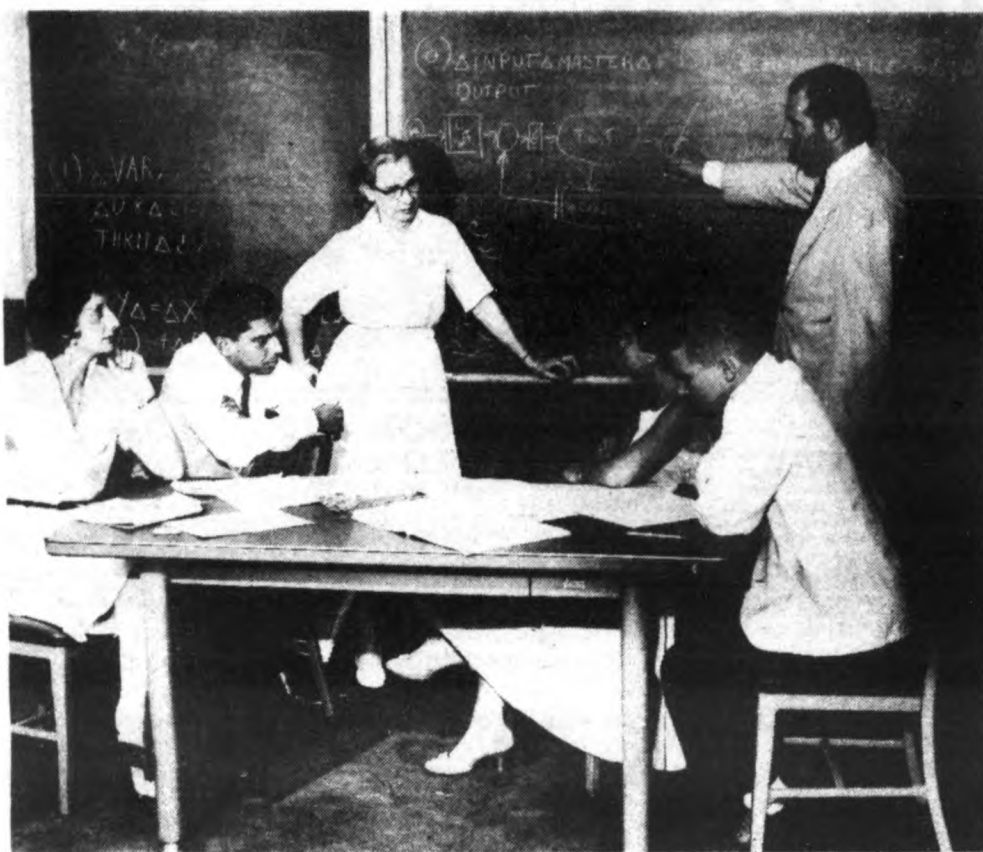

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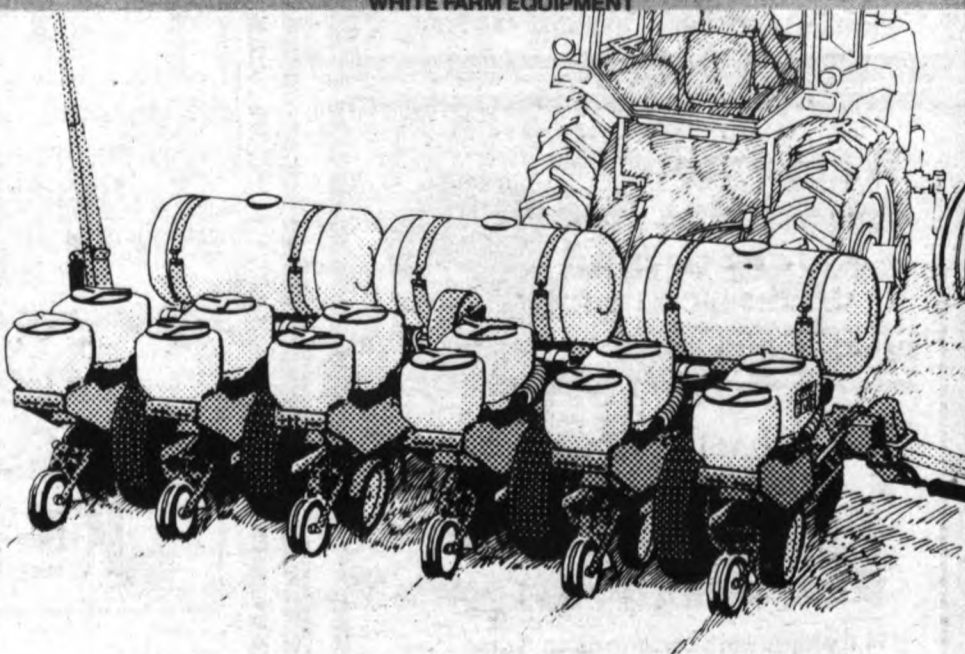
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# Help Your Heart



## Check your blood pressure

High blood pressure can cause stroke, heart attack, kidney damage and more. It can shorten your life. But high blood pressure can be treated and controlled with your help.

Everyone has blood pressure. Without it, the blood couldn't circulate in our bodies. Blood pressure in your arteries changes from day to day, even from moment to moment. It goes up when you get excited, and down when you rest or sleep. These changes in pressure are perfectly normal.

What is high blood pressure? In some people, certain arteries may clamp down. This makes it harder for blood to pass through, and pressure builds up as a result. If it goes too high and stays that way, it is called high blood pressure.

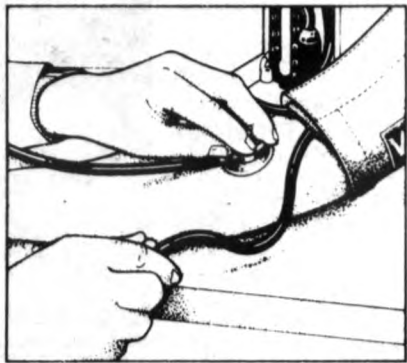
We still don't know what causes most high blood pressure, but research scientists are working hard on the problem. While they don't have the final answer, yet, they do have some important leads.

If your parents have had high blood pressure, there is a good chance you have it or will develop it. And if you have it, your children may develop it. Children should have regular blood pressure checkups just like adults.

**Help your heart!** Have your blood pressure checked at least once a year. It's the only way to find out if you have high blood pressure. There usually are no early signs to warn you. That's why high blood pressure is called the silent killer.

Call your doctor, clinic or nearest health center to make an appointment to have your blood pressure checked. A rubber cuff, something like a bandage, is wrapped around your upper arm. The cuff is filled with air until it squeezes the artery in your arm. Then the air is slowly let out of the cuff. At the same time, a doctor listens with a stethoscope as the blood rushes through your

artery. He also watches a measuring gauge which tells him your blood pressure.



If you have high blood pressure, it can be treated and controlled. But it takes two to do it: you and your doctor. By cooperating with your doctor you can live a long and normal life.

Your doctor may prescribe pills. Keep taking your medicine as long as he says you should. Your doctor may also put you on a low-fat, low-salt diet. If you are overweight, it's important to lose the extra pounds and keep them off. The extra weight puts a strain on your heart. Smoking cigarettes does too, so don't smoke. Your local chapter of the American Heart Association has information on how to stop smoking and on high blood pressure.

#### Coffee Glazed Fruit Tart

##### Tart

- 1 recipe frozen puff pastry or pastry crust
- 1 (4-ounce) package vanilla pudding & pie filling
- 1-3/4 cups half & half or light cream
- 1/4 cup Tia Maria
- 2 cups assorted sliced fresh fruit

##### Glaze

- 1/4 cup Tia Maria

- 2 teaspoons cornstarch

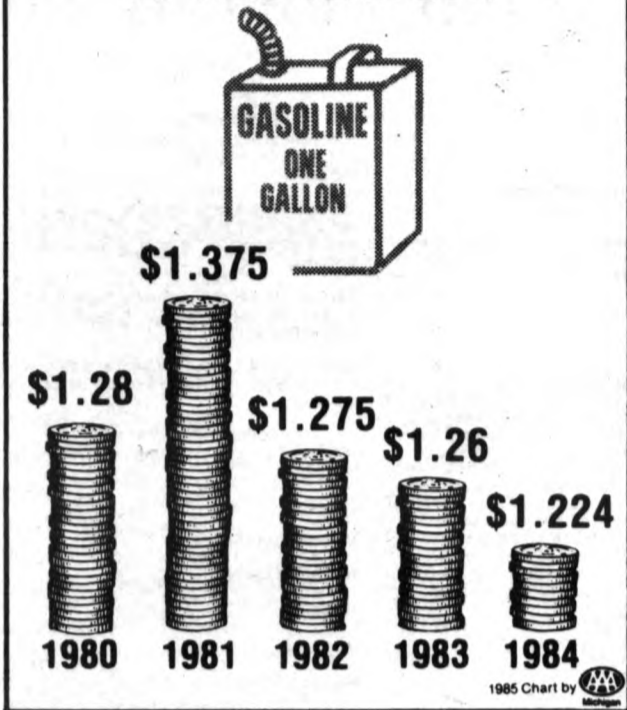

### STATE'S YEAR-END PRICE AT FIVE-YEAR LOW



The average December price of self-serve no-lead along Michigan's major roads fell to its lowest year-end level in five years. The Automobile Club of Michigan's "fuel gauge" survey shows self-serve no-lead ended the year at \$1.224, 3.6 cents below the 1983 price and 5.6 cents less than in 1980. The overall reduction occurred despite a 2-cent-per-gallon state gasoline tax increase in January last year. Major causes for last year's drop include abundant gasoline supplies and more fuel-efficient vehicles.

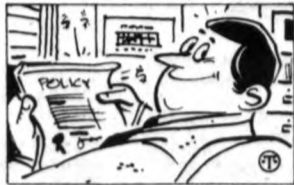
