16th annual

Riley schedules Feb. 23 fundraiser event

The 16th annual Riley Elementary School Carnival will be held Feb. 23 this year at the school. Carnival hours are from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. The school is located at Pratt and Lowell roads in the southwest quadrant of the St. Johns School District.

Some of the high points of the carnival include:

--The annual raffle. Seven cash prizes will be drawn, the top prize being \$350. Tickets are three for \$1; you need not be present to win.

--A special raffle of a Cabbage Patch Kid. Tickets are 50 cents each at the Country Store. Buy them during the carnival; you need

not be present to win.

--Eighteen different games for children of all ages. Everybody wins something every time, and winners of stuffed animals are frequent.

--Food served in the gym. The menu includes sloppy joes, pizza, hot dogs, chips, pie, pop, coffee, popcorn.

--A badge-making machine is new this year. Have a button made for you, or design your own. Bring a snapshot, perhaps, that can be cut into a two-inch circle.

--Cake walks run continuously throughout the carnival.

--Door prizes are announced frequently over the public address

system.

--The Country Store, a carnival feature, sells cookies and other food items, some crafts, used books--and Cabbage Patch Kid tickets.

The carnival is a project of the Riley Elementary Parent-Teacher club. About 20 active parents, teachers and PTC officers, with the help of Riley principal John Arehart, organize the carnival and muster the more than 100 volunteers needed to run games, sell tickets, serve food and set up and clean up before and after the carnival. Many more contribute food items.

"The volunteer spirit is alive and well here at

Riley," said PTC president Dick Lehnert. "Without it, a project like this could not survive." Riley's carnival is the only elementary school carnival in the school district.

Money raised is used to buy computers, playground equipment, landscaping materials

and other items and to support field trips, art performances and other curriculum-enrichment activities.

Other groups also use the carnival to raise funds. Money raised in the kitchen is used to support the softball program that draws nearly

100 Riley students each spring.

The Brownies and the Boy Scouts raise money by candy and balloon sales at the carnival. The Cub Scouts run the coatcheck as a service project to earn badges.

"It's worthwhile, and it's fun for everybody," Lehnert said.

Little Caesar's, the Michigan Liquor Control Commission. The restaurant has plans to expand and

Shultz was arraigned on two counts, conspiracy to commit armed robbery and felony firearm. Bond was set at \$50,000 by district court judge, Jeffrey Martlew. Shultz currently is in the county jail.

According to May, one of the men knocked on Hahn's door, asking to use the phone because he had car trouble. Hahn let him in and when he turned back to the door there were two men wearing ski masks. Economic dairy climate to be revealed

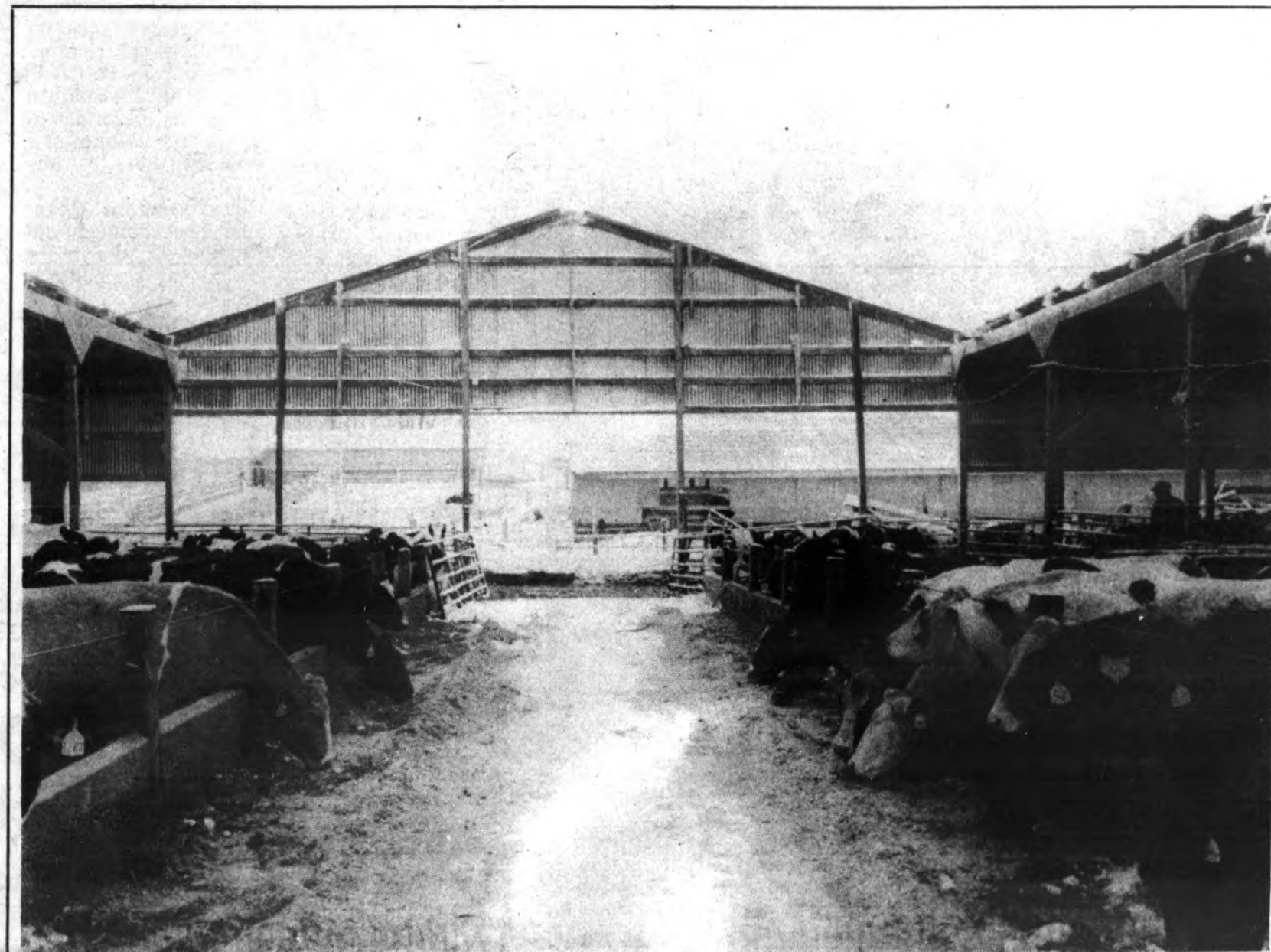
Few years have held more uncertainty for Michigan's dairy industry than 1985 does, and area dairy producers will need a keen perspective on economic conditions to maintain a stable business.

Producers can sharpen that perspective during a special meeting Feb. 28 at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 115 S. State St. in Ionia. The program runs from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The session is part of the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service program, "New Economic Realities in Michigan Agriculture," a series of 13 meetings being held throughout the state.

"The dairy meetings are part of our effort to equip all farmers in Michigan with information that will help them find solutions to complex economic issues facing their operations," says Frank Brewer, assistant director of Extension for agriculture and marketing programs.

The meeting will forecast the economic climate that dairy producers can expect during the next several years and detail the kinds of assistance that will be available to farmers from Extension

Farmer's Week name undergoes change

Farmers' Week and Natural Resources Days at Michigan State University, March 18-23, has been renamed Agriculture and Natural Resources Week.

The change, says Tom Thorburn, ANR Week coordinator, better reflects the increasing diversity of the educational programs being offered during what has become one of MSU's major winter outreaches to state residents.

"This move is in keeping with the evolution of the 70-year-old event, which began as a series of institutes that trained farm leaders in seminars held in 67 counties," Thorburn says.

The seminars mirrored earlier efforts in 1875 to extend research results to farmers. The popularity of this effort and subsequent program expansion moved the series to campus in 1914, where it was structured under the name of Farmers' Week, Thorburn says.

"ANR Week will allow us to continue to provide the kind of educational programs that will most benefit the state's agriculture and natural

resource base," Thorburn says.

"This year, for example, a sizable portion of ANR Week will focus on the beneficial relationship of recreation, tourism and agriculture -- part of the effort to diversify Michigan's economic base," Thorburn says.

This program expansion is not coming at the expense of the more traditional agricultural programs.

"Like those who participated in the

seminars held in counties during the 1880s, farmers can still learn about new livestock and crop production practices," Thorburn says. "That's the policy of ANR Week -- it maintains its roots while reaching new audiences in the best of the land-grant tradition."

Details of the more than 200 sessions offered during ANR Week are in a free guidebook available from all county MSU Cooperative Extension Service offices.

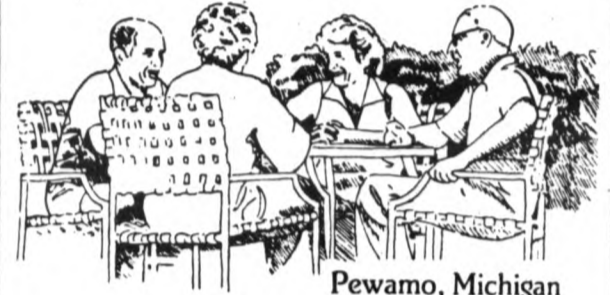

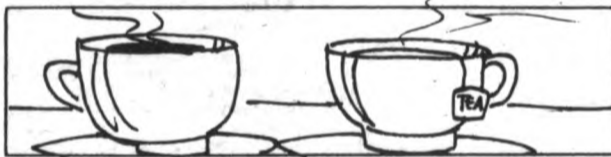

Even more predictable than the late February snows are the notices to Michigan home owners from the township, village or city where their property is located, listing the official current assessment for that property. The assessment is the method for measuring

the value of property. In Michigan, property is currently assessed at 50 percent of true cash or market value. The assessed value then becomes the base for calculating the amount of tax paid on that property. Taxpayers who believe that their annual

property tax assessment is too high can appeal the assessment.

The first step is to contact the local assessor to find out exactly what information you need to gather to appeal the assessment.

The next step is to go to the local board of review. This appointed board, composed of members of the community, is empowered to change assessments to make them "relatively just and equal." Property owners should make the appeal in person. The board begins

hearing assessment appeals on the second Monday in March.

The final level of non-judicial appeal is the tax tribunal. It needs to receive written documentation of the reasons for the appeal.

ORDINANCE NO. 27

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT THE BASIC FIRE PREVENTION CODE, TOGETHER WITH SUPPLEMENTS THERETO AS PUBLISHED BY BUILDING OFFICIALS AND CODE ADMINISTRATORS INTERNATIONAL, INC., AND AS AUTHORIZED PURSUANT TO THE STATE STATUTE, MSA 4.559 (1) (A), KNOWN AS THE FIRE PREVENTION CODE. THE VILLAGE OF FOWLER ORDAINS:

Section 1. Adoption of Fire Prevention Code. There is hereby adopted, for the purpose of prescribing regulations governing conditions, hazardous to life and property from fire or explosion, the basic Fire Prevention Code, 1981 Edition, together with the 1982 and 1983 supplements thereto, as published by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc., 17926 South Halsted Street, Homewood, Illinois, 60430, save and except such portions as are hereinafter deleted, modified, or amended herein.

A complete copy of this Code, and supplements thereto, are available for public use and inspection in the office of the Village Clerk.

From and after the date on which this Code shall take effect, the provisions of said Basic Fire Prevention Code and supplements thereto shall be controlling within the limits of the Village of Fowler.

Section 2. Enforcement. The Code hereby adopted shall be enforced by the Chief of the Dallas Township Fire Department and those persons designated by him and serving under him.

Section 3. Definitions. Wherever the words "name of jurisdiction" are used in the Code herein adopted, those words shall mean the Village of Fowler and its prescribed jurisdictional boundaries. Wherever the words "name of state" are used, they shall mean the State of Michigan.

Section 4. Amendments Made in the Code Hereby Adopted. The Code hereby adopted is amended to the extent that when any statute of the State of Michigan, or any ordinance of the Village of Fowler shall impose greater or more stringent requirements, the more stringent or more restrictive requirement shall apply; that no ordinance of the Village of Fowler setting forth less stringent requirements shall be operative, the more restrictive requirements of either document being deemed to apply.

Section 5. The within Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force twenty (20) days after its adoption.

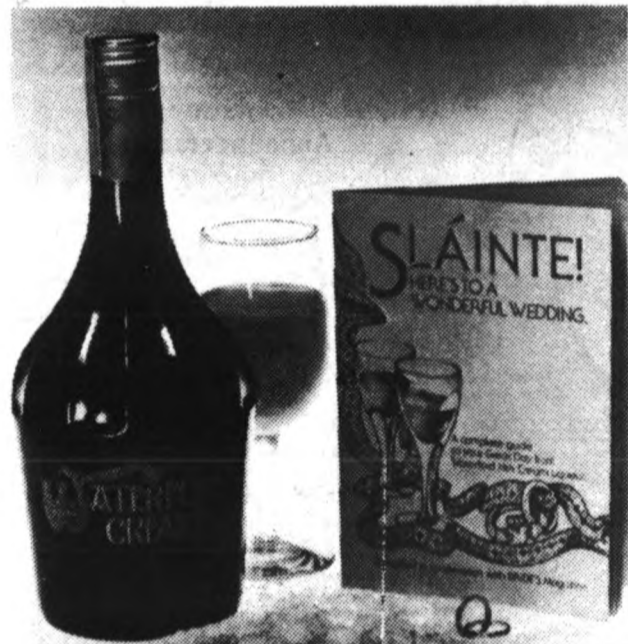

"Tying the knot" with a gold ring

Marriage — it's back in style! And with the increasing numbers of couples heading to the altar, a trend toward heavier carved gold wedding ring styles has developed, in keeping with the renewed consumer emphasis on quality and lasting value, according to the Gold Information Center.

Although most Americans typically purchase 14-karat (14K) gold wedding bands, a recent "upgrading" to higher ring karatages, particularly 18K, has also been observed. (Note: 24K is pure gold. Eighteen karat is 18 parts pure gold alloyed, or mixed, with six parts other metals; 14K is 14 parts pure gold alloyed with 10 parts other metals.)

Another significant development: The majority of married men in America under the age 30 currently wear wedding rings, unlike many of their fathers. Today, nearly 90 percent of new grooms receive a wedding ring, compared with virtually 100 percent of their brides.

Gold wedding ring styles: traditional to contemporary

Classic and updated wedding ring styles abound for those intending to "tie the knot." Unmatched gold bands for the bride and groom are often preferred over matching his-and-her ring sets, yet both options are readily available.

The past few years have ushered in the acceptance of two-tone and tri-color rings of gold, as well as satin-finished and sandblasted matte surfaces which offer interesting color and texture alternatives to polished

yellow gold bands.

Texture also comes into play through the inventive use of wrapped wire, woven and braided gold, twisted ropes and ribs. For the rugged Western look, there are gold nugget patterns and rough bark finishes.

A range of contemporary rings features reflective, diamond-cut patterns of shimmering-surface treatments achieved through intricate etching or Florentine work.

There are highly-polished bands comprised of dimensional planes or faceted angles; clean, tailored geometrics; and sculptural, freeform bands, often sold with interlocking engage-

ment rings, nicknamed "engagement" rings.

For those preferring a more retrospective look, there are wedding rings of gold which incorporate a sentimental antique pattern, stone accents or granulation.

Favorite classics include carved and embossed florals in yellow or multi-colored hues, the traditional yellow gold circlet and the popular trilogy ring of interlocking yellow, pink and white gold bands.

For the purist, wedding bands of pure (24K) gold are now offered by some trend-setting jewelry stores around the country.

Stylish suggestions for contemporary weddings

Wedding traditions are blend of old and new

Today, more than ever, traditions are what weddings are made of. Yet, in the 1980s, tradition takes on a whole new meaning. Not only is it a sense of retaining the customs of the past, but also one of incorporating the values and ideals of the present, thus blending traditions in the making with traditions of old.

Though the days are past when Early American newlyweds drank a brew of sack posset and hot spiced milk to give them energy for the night ahead, also gone are the wedding ceremonies of the 1960s and '70s when time-honored customs and values were tossed to the wind.

Young couples of the '80s have found a comfortable place somewhere in between. While keeping what they find best and most beautiful of past traditions, they add to their weddings personal touches that express their individuality.

For example, today many brides have both father and mother walk them down the aisle so that both parents may enjoy the pleasure and the privilege of "giving away" their daughter.

Other changes in the typical "old-fashioned" wedding include changing ritual phrases such as "love, honor and obey" and "man and wife" so as to be more in keeping with today's ideal of equality.

In present-day ceremonies you'll more often hear

"love, honor and cherish" or "husband and wife."

Today's ideas of equality are also bringing the groom more into the limelight. Until recently, all eyes were focused on the bride on her "big day" with the groom himself often feeling like a spectator.

Today's groom, however, is taking on all sorts of new responsibilities such as helping to pick the wedding site, choosing china patterns, addressing invitations and writing thank-you notes. Some men even wear engagement rings and have showers thrown in their honor.

The question of who pays for the wedding has also been affected by the present day attitude towards equality.

Traditionally, the bride's parents took on most of the expense, but now there is a definite trend towards the groom's family sharing a larger portion of the bill.

Though some of this chipping in reflects the economy, it is also a sign of our times. We no longer consider the bride's parents to be "marrying off" their daughter. Instead, the wedding is seen as a celebration of the joining together of two people.

With fewer of the old-fashioned "rules" of etiquette applying to today's weddings, creative additions to make the occasion unique are unlimited.

They range from substituting carrot cake for the traditional white sponge cake, to honoring the bride or groom's heritage by serving slices of Italian cheese-cake or Irish fruitcake.

Music may be as unique as having bagpipes play as the newly-married couple leave the altar. Or, the couple may decide to have a girl instead of a boy act as ring bearer.

The choices are many, "right" being determined only by whatever combination of past and present most pleases the bride and groom, and their families.

Pre-wedding planning can be stressful, too

As anyone who has gotten married can tell you, the months leading up to a wedding can be a time of stress as well as happiness. There's just so much to think about and do!

You need to find ceremony and reception sites, to choose just the right clothes, to make sometimes touchy decisions about who will be in your wedding, to furnish a complete home for your life after the wedding — and all this while you're having the inevitable doubts about getting married in the first place.

Calming the jitters

While wedding jitters are about as common as weddings, there are ways to make sure the anxiety doesn't get out of hand. BRIDE'S Magazine has these commonsense suggestions:

- Don't be afraid to admit you're upset. Tell your partner what's bothering

you, whether it's a serious question about your relationship or a relatively trivial worry that you'll go blank when it comes time to say your vows.

If you try to keep the stressful feelings to yourself, you'll only transfer them to something else, getting overly irritated at a late train, or a run in your stockings. Take positive action whenever possible: Sign up for a pre-marital workshop. Practice reciting your vows in front of a willing friend.

- Share the wedding responsibilities. If you're the bride, don't assume you have to do everything yourself. This idea is old-fashioned, as well as exhausting. Ask your fiancé to join you in picking out a catering hall and registering for gifts. He can write a share of the thank-you notes, handle all the honeymoon arrangements.

- Keep a calendar of everything you have to do. This

kind of master plan gives you the secure feeling that you're not forgetting something crucial.

Also gather any business cards, fabric swatches or magazine clippings you accumulate all together in one place — either a wedding planner made for this purpose or a simple manila envelope. Organization has the magical effect of reducing anxiety to a manageable level.

- Have a system for each task. Say you're doing your invitations. First, see if the task can be broken down into steps. (You have to address the envelopes, stuff them, seal them, and stamp them.)

Then, decide how you'll tackle each step: how long it should take and who will do it. Next, set a completion date (invitations should be mailed six weeks before the wedding). Finally, take action by setting a time and a place to begin.

- Pace yourself — don't plan to scout for reception sites the same day you have a report due at work. You'll make it through those pre-wedding months if you promise yourself you won't tackle more than one major job a day.

- Guard your health. Don't let a hectic schedule keep you from eating right, or often enough. You'll feel even more jittery from the weakness that results from a drop in blood sugar. Be sure to get enough rest and exercise too.

Sleep-inducers

Did you know that exercise increases the body's level of norepinephrine, a substance that gives you a feeling of calmness and well-being? If sleep eludes you at night because you have too much on your mind, try the time-tested soothers: a hot bath, warm milk, or a back rub.

Bridal headdress: a mix of customs

When a bride is considering what to wear on her wedding day, the question of what to place on her head is one of her most difficult decisions.

Today's bride may not realize that whatever type of headdress she chooses, she will be representing a mix of tradition and origins throughout the world.

During the late 1800s in the United States, the type of veil or hat the bride wore was determined largely by her role in society.

Veils and wreaths were a part of the bridal wardrobe almost exclusively in the early 1800s, while hats grew more fashionable later on.

The importance of the headdress was so great that, according to wedding photos from that period, more money may have been spent on the headpiece than on the dress itself.

Veils varied greatly in the expense and quality of the lace used, with machine made lace becoming more popular in the 20th century.

Large hanging veils, actually covering the face of the bride, date back to when the groom did not see his intended until after the ceremony.

The late 1800s also brought a unique style of veil: divided down the front, off center, as if to resemble curtains.

Using a wreath to hold the veil in place was a fashionable variant with orange blossoms and jasmine used most frequently for floral decorations.

Many well-preserved Victorian and Edwardian wreaths were constructed

with delicate wax flowers. Silk, cotton wool and cotton materials were also popular alternatives for the floral wreath.

In other countries, a variety of colors, fabrics, textures and even precious jewels were used for the bridal crown, or headdress.

An interesting interpretation of this comes from Hungarian folklore, which says the bridal crown or coronet signifies that the bride is indeed queen for the day, with an unquestionable right to her crown.

In the Ormanysag county of Baranya, Hungary, the bride wore a hood of bright red artificial flowers, covered largely with pearls, silver dangles, and paillettes. Fluttering long streamers of ribbon were apparent with every step.

The customs of bright and ornate wedding styles began in the Scandinavian countries.

In Norway, a wedding was always an occasion to display special finery. In the case of the Norwegian headdress, the bride had her choice of two distinctly different styles of crowns.

Even today, the Norwegian bride still has two crowns from which to choose: the "church" crown, with its virgin significance, and a more ordinary crown.

The church crown dates back to early Christian days and was used largely as a protest against lax morality.

The crown is decorated with silver and gilt, chains and dangles which shine and jingle as the bride moves. It may be worn only in a

church ceremony, and is placed on the bride's head by the minister's wife.

The more ordinary crown is worn in any other ceremony, and is far more simply designed, made of myrtle or colored paper with gold leaf ornaments.

In Finland, the popular headdress was a combination of the two crowns from Norway. It is a large crown constructed with colored paper and artificial flowers.

The famous Voss bridal crown is made of silver with hanging jewels. Often, the bride's hair did not match the lustre of the crown, so a wig of fine gold thread was used.

Today's brides more closely follow the traditional Swedish bride. She would wear a headdress made of a piece of fine linen.

Meant to frame the face, a small circle at the back of the head is made of wood, covered with linen coming up over the head, pleated and fan shaped.

Wealth also played a large role in the bridal crowns of Dutch women. A wealthy woman marrying into equal wealth would wear a crown of silver adorned with jewels, while the less fortunate bride would wear a coronet of pasteboard with embroidered silk.

An interesting note interjected here would be the unknown origin of the English veil.

It has been noted that what is now one of the most striking parts of the bridal outfit may have been little more than a milliner's substitute for flowing tresses or a mere variation of the gar-

land which medieval brides wore.

During the reign of George III, both wreath and veil fell completely out of vogue, only to be replaced by the unveiled face, which was considered to be more striking and natural.

During the 1800s in Turkey, the Jewish bride would also wear no veil. Instead she would wear a wreath, made of artificial and natural flowers and wormwood, intertwined on her head, which she carried like a

crown.

In 1766, European Jews were made to dress more simply, discarding their jewels and fancy clothes in an effort to retain their heritage. The one exception to this self-imposed dress code was for the bride, whose headdress was made of gold or silver and wrapped with flowers.

Bridal headdress origin in Germany varies from region to region. In the Black Forest valleys the headdress was large and deco-

rated with hundreds of glass balls and beads. In the more traditional Buckenburgh, the headdress was also large, but with an emphasis on flowers rather than beads.

On a final note, the historic tradition of Polish weddings had an entirely different twist, with the men wearing the most elaborate costumes. Their hats were decorated with floral sprays, and their coats and trousers were elaborately embroidered and rich with leather finery.

Men play larger role in home entertaining

"The key to successful entertaining is not to overdo it when you're first starting. For example, instead of holding a dinner party for 12 guests as your first celebration, invite a few couples over. That way you can gain experience with a small group and gradually progress to holding larger affairs," Ms. Kolator adds.

When selecting fine china and crystal, it is important to choose items with long-lasting value, and not just trendy items. "Most couples want to invest in furnishings of lasting quality for their first homes, and fine tableware is one of these."

Fine china dinnerware patterns that continue to be popular with newlyweds range from elaborate floral sprays, etched gold bands and oriental motifs to delicate white on white with precious metal bandings.

"Patterns on Lenox's Cosmopolitan shape are particularly popular with brides and grooms because of their romantic design motifs, soft fashion colors, and updated yet classic styling," Ms. Kolator says.

Also, one of the most popular fine china patterns among newlyweds today is a design created by Lenox

over 60 years ago, according to Ms. Kolator.

The pattern is "Autumn," a formal raised hand enameled design with colorful baskets of fruit and floral bouquets. It is one of 10 patterns on Lenox's Presidential shape. Each of the four Official White House services created by Lenox and used by U.S. Presidents since 1918, are also on this shape.

For a coordinated tabletop

Crystal stemware should also be coordinated with the china pattern. When selecting stemware, important things to look for are clarity and brilliance, most evident in hand blown lead crystal. Ms. Kolator notes.

Once the newlyweds are established in their first home, they should realize that fine china and crystal are not just for special occasions.

"Many young couples are afraid to use their new tableware except when entertaining guests. But it can be used for all occasions because fine china really is remarkably durable. It should be enjoyed on a regular basis, instead of just sitting on

the shelf," Ms. Kolator adds.

Tablesetting hints

When planning any celebration in your new home, Ms. Kolator says that the tablesetting should always reflect the personality and creativity of the newlyweds:

- Be imaginative with color in coordinating crystal with china. For informal settings, highlight one of the colors in the china pattern with blue, brown, gold, rust or green crystal water goblets and wine glasses.

- As an alternative to fresh flowers as a centerpiece, choose personal mementos such as souvenirs from trips or favorite books help up with attractive bookends. Also, fresh fruit and vegetables in a wicker basket will enhance the table.

- Select cloths in pastel shades that coordinate with colors from your china or crystal patterns. Or choose a cloth with a small, all-over print or plaid which will create a country look for your table.

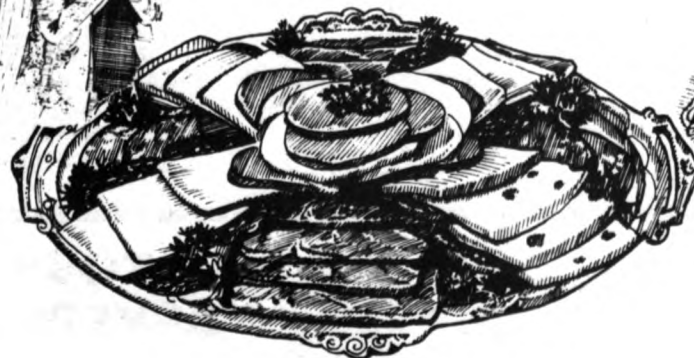

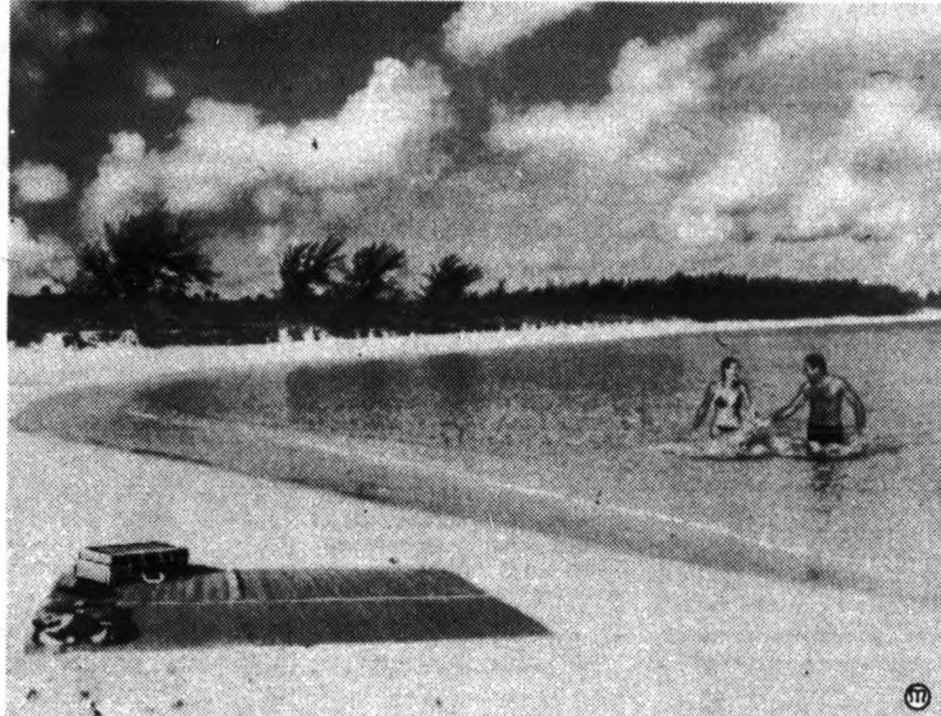

This sparkling, effervescent wine, (*le Champagne*) produced only in a small region (*la Champagne*) just outside Paris, creates a mood of gaiety at a shower or engagement party.

It adds brilliance to a wedding reception, makes an elegant toast to the bride and groom, and fosters a mood of festivity at a bon voyage party en route to a honeymoon hideaway.

A sip of the bubbly is the ideal accompaniment to a candlelight supper for two at the end of the wonderful day. It can also properly be served at an intimate wedding breakfast on the following morning.

Giving Champagne from France to the newlyweds solves many of the difficul-

ties involved in selecting an appropriate wedding gift.

There is no size problem. It can be shared equally by the newlyweds or with guests. There's no fear of duplication, since a young couple can never have too much. And it can be put aside to be served on special occasions.

A Champagne gift can vary from a bottle to a case according to your pocketbook. Or you can make a dramatic presentation with a single large bottle. Champagne is available in the magnum (2 bottles), jero-boam (4 bottles) methuselah (8 bottles) or salmanazar (12 bottles).

What Champagne should you select? According to the Champagne News and Information Bureau, if you want to start at the top consider vintage Champagne or *cuvée spéciale*.

These deluxe wines are

easy to recognize. Vintage Champagne bears the year on its label and a *cuvée spéciale* comes in a fancy gift package that often contains a replica of an eighteenth-century hand-blown Champagne bottle.

If you want to scale down a bit, try a nonvintage brut. It is the most versatile Champagne, a blend of 20-30 wines, and it can be properly served as an aperitif, throughout a meal, and at any time of the day and night.

Rosé Champagne, which is considered the wine of lovers, is ideal for wedding ceremonies, bridal toasts, and *tête-à-tête* dinners. For gift giving, think of rosé (pink) Champagne on Valentine's Day or the couple's first anniversary.

To serve Champagne properly, follow a few simple steps: chill the bottle well in a bucket of ice and water for 30 minutes.

Open the bottle by removing the wire muzzle, grasping the cork firmly with one hand. Then turn the bottle, not the cork: the pressure inside the bottle will help ease the cork out with a soft, gentle pop.

Serve the king of wines in tulip or flute glasses that show the wine at its best (the saucer-shaped glass is wrong for Champagne because it dissipates the bubbles quickly).

To store Champagne, keep it on its side in a dark cool place. The wine will keep its freshness for about five years.

Deliciously different...

Desserts are delight of bridal shower buffet

Weddings are very special occasions, and every bride likes to be feted with a bridal shower beforehand. Some lucky brides are asked to attend more than one bridal shower, so it's not always easy for the hostess of the shower to come up with a menu that's different but delicious. Here are a few suggestions.

Ease of entertaining

One of the most flexible ways to serve bridal shower foods is buffet-style. By offering a variety of sweet and savory foods, everyone can taste the kinds of dishes she likes. Of course, a selection of dessert items is always good to include on the menu.

An ideal dessert for a bridal shower buffet is Lemon Blueberry Mousse. The light, lemony filling is made with gelatin, sweetened condensed milk and whipped cream. It's poured into a springform pan lined

with convenient pound cake slices.

Topping it off

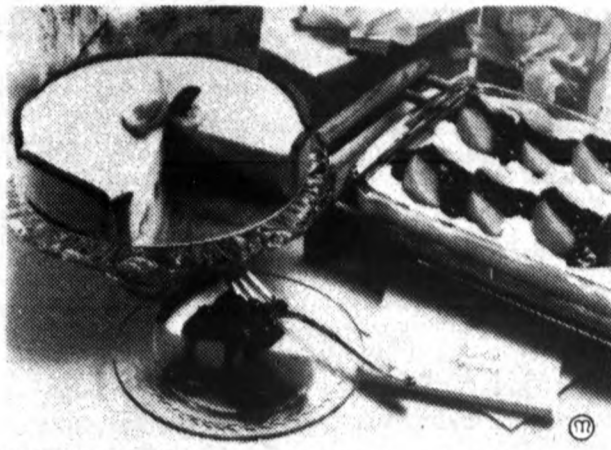
Individual pieces are served with a Hot Blueberry Sauce, which is spiced with a touch of nutmeg and cinnamon. Another good choice for the buffet table is Peach Melba Squares.

The easy-to-make filling goes into a 12x7-inch pan with vanilla wafer crumbs on the bottom. Peach slices and a red raspberry sauce top the individual squares.

PEACH MELBA SQUARES

(Makes 12 to 15 servings)

- 1/2 cup margarine or butter
- 2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs (about 60 wafers)
- 1 (3-ounce) package peach flavor gelatin
- 1/2 cup boiling water



LEMON BLUEBERRY MOUSSE and peach melba squares, made with sweetened condensed milk, are light desserts for a bridal shower buffet.

- 1 (14-ounce) can Eagle® Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk (NOT evaporated milk)
- 1/4 cup ReaLemon® Lemon Juice from Concentrate
- 3 tablespoons cocktail sherry, optional
- 1 (29-ounce) can peach slices, drained (reserve 12 slices for garnish, chop remaining slices)

- 2 cups (1 pint) whipping cream, whipped
- 1 (10-ounce) package frozen red raspberries in syrup, thawed
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch

In medium saucepan, melt margarine; stir in crumbs. Pat evenly on bottom of 12x7-inch baking dish; set aside. In large bowl, dissolve gelatin in water. Stir in sweetened condensed milk, ReaLemon and sherry; mix well.

Fold in *chopped* peaches and whipped cream. Pour into prepared pan. Chill 4 hours or until set.

Before serving, in small saucepan, over medium heat, combine raspberries and cornstarch; cook and stir until slightly thickened and clear. Cut peach dessert into squares; garnish with reserved peach slices. Serve with sauce. Refrigerate leftovers.

LEMON BLUEBERRY MOUSSE

(Makes 8 to 10 servings)

- 1/2 (10 3/4-ounce) loaf pound cake, cut into 1/4-inch slices
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 (14-ounce) can Eagle® Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk (NOT evaporated milk)
- 1/2 cup ReaLemon® Lemon Juice from Concentrate
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 1 cup (1/2 pint) whipping cream, whipped
- Hot Blueberry Sauce

Line bottom and side of 8-inch springform pan with pound cake slices (cut slices to fit bottom of pan); set aside. In small saucepan, sprinkle gelatin over water; let stand 1 minute. Over low heat, stir until gelatin dissolves, about 5 minutes; set aside.

In large bowl, combine sweetened condensed milk and ReaLemon; mix well. Stir in gelatin and lemon rind. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into prepared pan. Chill 4 hours or until set. Serve with Hot Blueberry Sauce. Refrigerate leftovers.

HOT BLUEBERRY SAUCE

(Makes about 1 1/4 cups)

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 1/4-cups fresh or dry-pack frozen blueberries, rinsed and drained

In small saucepan, combine sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon and nutmeg; gradually stir in water. Cook, stirring constantly, over low heat until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer 5 minutes. Cool slightly. Serve with Lemon Mousse.

Tips on watching the wedding costs

- Know what the average wedding costs in your area are — if your friends will tell you. Though we can give a national figure, prices vary tremendously.

- Talk openly about the possibility of both families sharing expenses. Then, get everyone's idea of how much they think the wedding *should* cost.

- If cash is limited and your guest list enormous, scale down visions of prime ribs and an open bar, rent a hall big enough for everyone and serve cake and punch instead. (The punch can still be spiked!).

- Consider wedding packages that may save time as well as money — packages where flowers, cake, liquor, etc. are included.

- Do work with a budget, but leave a portion of money unmarked to deal

with all the little things that come up (cake boxes for the groom's cake?).

- If you must pare the guest list, agree on a formula that's arbitrary. For instance, no first cousins; no business clients. Apply the rule to both families.

- When working with the bridal shop or salon owner, the florist, the photographer, etc., be very clear about what you want and don't want.

- Don't forget things like tips for the banquet manager, the minister's fee, any church or temple rental, etc. "Nice guys" expect to be paid for their work too!

- Ask how much things will cost; find out answers to the "what-if's" too: What if we want the band to play another two hours? A dozen more four-color prints made?

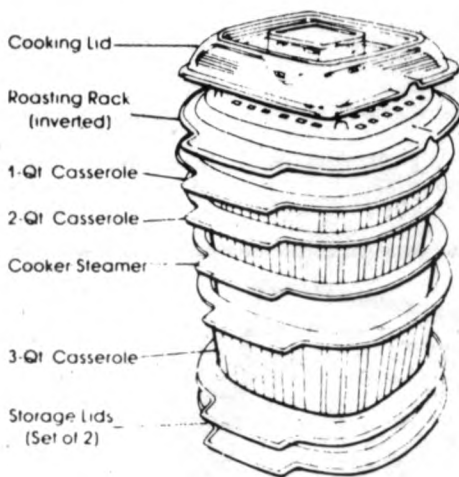

Makeup for the blushing bride or the second-time-around bride

It's a simple reality of our times that more than a third of the population will march down the aisle more than once.

And thinking practically and fashionably, any woman knows that what you wear to look wonderful in white isn't what you should wear to look beguiling in another color.

Stendhal • Paris has tackled the problem of a makeup for both brides. The shades change to enhance the color she wears.

Blushing beauty

For the lady in white, Stendhal suggests that this is the season to wear blushing-rose tones. First, she should use a natural Luminescence shade of liquid makeup.



Then she should dust her cheeks and (1.) the entire eye area with the rosy-mauve Powder Blush called Macao. (2.) Over the lid she'll sweep the plum shade in the Chiraz eyeshadow trio.

(3.) She'll use the soft sun-light shade in the same trio to line a sunburst right down the middle of the eye. Then a second brushful will be used to trace from the center of the eye out to the tip of the brow. Softly smudge away any lines of demarcation. (See the sketch for numbered detail.)

(4.) Line below the eye with Kohl grey Anthracite

pencil and lavishly coat lashes with Black mascara.

Lips wear a rich plum tone #89 lipstick to star in this soft and muted face for the first-time blushing bride.

Second time bright

Since the second-time bride will be wearing color, her face look has brighter accents but a paler background of light transparent Luminescence liquid makeup.

Gobi is the terracotta tone for her Powder Blush and #92 for her fresh terra-

cotta lipstick.

Again the Gobi powder blush also goes all over the eye area to form a lively backdrop for the violet tone in the Shanghai eyeshadow trio.

The shy beige in the trio will shape the sunburst right down the middle of the eye and trace from the center of the eye out to just below the brow.

Below the eye a Kohl blue pencil adds subtle charm, and Lapis coats the lashes. The full effect is vital with a wide-eyed air of sophistication.



THE LOOK FOR BRIDES this season is one of wide-eyed sophistication. Stendhal • Paris projects a ray of light down the center of the eye and sweeps it out below the brow.

Rainbows of roses take on new traditions in wedding bouquets

A recent survey of retail florists by Roses Inc. found that today's brides are choosing roses as the reigning bloom in their bouquets, in a resurgence of formal weddings with all trimmings.

But these brides are combining an old-world tradition with their personal signatures by replacing classic white roses with blooms ranging from yellow to lavender hues, Roses Inc. reports.

Touch of spring

Yellow roses, the traditional symbol of joy and gladness, are popular with spring brides, particularly for morning or midafternoon weddings.

Although many brides prefer to carry nosegays of yellow rosebuds, others are opting for wicker baskets brimming with blooms and trimmed with delicate ribbon.

Pink roses also bring a delicate touch to weddings, with their symbolism of grace and gentility. Florists report that pink roses are especially popular with brides whose fashion themes include taffeta gowns and dainty lace gloves.

Old-fashioned appeal

Sweet-smelling lavender roses go well with both old-fashioned lace and sophisticated silk wedding gowns. Because lavender roses have perfume-like scents, many brides trim veils and headpieces with the blooms for a fragrant touch.



ALTHOUGH TODAY'S BRIDES are returning to classic rose-filled wedding bouquets, they're selecting yellow, pink and even lavender roses instead of traditional white, reports Roses Inc.

Roses Inc. reports other trends in "new tradition" wedding roses, including:

- Coral or orange roses mixed with autumn greenery for September and October weddings;
- Red and white roses combined in a single nosegay to represent unity;
- An armful of long-stemmed red roses, reminiscent of a Miss America

pageant, to replace the traditional nosegay.

It's evident that the nuptial rose today has no color limitations. By working with her florist well in advance of the wedding day, a bride-to-be can choose the rose colors and designs to express the feeling or sentiment most important to her on the most important day of her life.

Women's cosmetic preferences

A new survey shows the savvy woman of the '80s can get along without her lipstick if she has to, but her blush and eye makeup are essentials. Ask any bride!

The '80s woman doesn't spend hours in front of the mirror but she does use many more cosmetics than women of earlier decades. Most say their eyes are their best feature.

The survey focussed on the cosmetic preferences and makeup techniques of trendsetting women and was conducted by Amy Greene of Henri Bendel's Beauty Checkers for the makers of Q-tips, the country's best selling brand of cotton swabs.

A high percent of the 25 million Q-tips swabs produced each day are used for eye makeup application and removal.

If the '80s woman has time to apply just two cosmetics, she reaches for her

blush and her mascara. In the survey, 48 percent opted for blush; 46 percent for mascara. Lipstick/gloss was just a runner-up.

The popularity of eye makeup and lots of it appears to be the cosmetic signature of the '80s woman.

In response to a query about the use of eye makeup products, 91 percent say they use mascara, 84 percent use eye shadow and 67 percent use eyeliner. Kohl is favored by 18 percent.

Seventy-nine percent of the women use black mascara, but their choices of eye shadow colors vary. Lavender, with 43 percent, was the color favorite. Brown, beige and gray each received 30 percent of the vote. When eyeliner is worn, 31 percent choose black; 29 percent use blue.

When applying their eye makeup, more than half (53 percent) of the women sur-

veyed report using Q-tips cotton swabs with their mascara; 48 percent use them to blend eye shadow.

More than half blend two colors of eye shadow; 47 percent avoid messy colors by using cotton swabs as applicators when more than one color is applied. Even more use swabs to remove eye makeup. When a soft, clean eraser is needed, 62 percent opt for cotton swabs.

And do these savvy brides spend hours in front of the mirror? Almost never. In response to the survey question, "How much time do you give to makeup application for street wear?" 61 percent of these busy women said 15 minutes.

Just two percent said an hour. Most, 41 percent, touch up makeup once during the day, 30 percent touch it up twice, seven percent often — but 20 percent never give it a touch-up.
