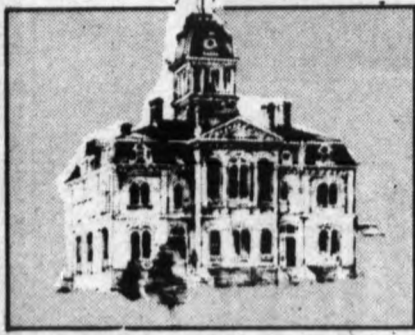

Storm sirens to be tested

With tornado season fast approaching, it's time once again to check the tornado warning system.

The sirens will be sounded for one minute at noon on the first Saturday of every month from April through August.

Storm advice given

People may know how to protect themselves from a tornado while inside but may become confused or panic if a tornado strikes while they are outside or driving in a car.

Should a tornado strike while you are outside, try to find shelter immediately in the nearest substantial building. If no buildings are close, take cover by lying flat in a ditch or depression. Protect your head with your hands and arms.

Never try to drive away from the storm. If you are in your car and cannot find shelter in a building, leave the car and lie flat in a ditch or depression with your arms over your head. Don't take shelter under your car.

This advice is offered by Clinton County Emergency Services, in cooperation with the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Side-streets may be repaired

St. Johns City Commission accepted the request of the Downtown Business Association to pursue the possibility of acquiring more grants

to improve six blocks of adjoining side-streets in conjunction with the reconstruction of Clinton Avenue.

The request was read during the city commission meeting March 25 and concerns Walker, Higham and Railroad

streets.

The commission will have the engineers study the area and

derive preliminary figures on renovation costs. They will also investigate the feasibility

of getting additional grants.

In other business, the Commission was notified by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission that St. Johns Pizzeria, East State Street, St. Johns, has applied

for a license to sell packaged beer and wine for off the premises consumption only.

The Commission can only offer assistance in the Liquor Control Commission's investigation, they can not deny or grant a license.

gress.

The Republican Policy Committee debates resolutions and determines the party's stands in the House. The committee currently is considering MX Missile funding, and next week will hear a classified briefing by the CIA on

Nicaragua.

"This is a tremendous opportunity to get some in-depth work on the issues," said Schuette. "Voting for my midwestern colleagues will add to my knowledge of regional views and needs."

Nuts taste good

Recently, a Japanese woman shopping at a department store in downtown Tokyo stopped to inspect the Michigan products for sale there. I offered her a toasty brown soynut, lightly salted. It was love at first bite!

Soybeans have been cultivated in Japan for at least six centuries. But for the woman, the soynut from Michigan was the newest thing under the (rising) sun. "Oishii!" she said. Delicious!

The woman wasn't the only one to like the soynuts. More than a ton of them were sold during the first three days of the five-day Michigan Trade Fair at one of Japan's largest department stores.

The soynuts, or Super Soys, their trade name, are produced by INARI Ltd., of Mason, a small town just south of Lansing. INARI is an acronym for International Nutrition and Resources Inc. INARI also is (I was told) the Japanese patron god of farmers. A lucky coincidence!

Turning a soybean into a soynut is a neat trick. Len Stuttman, INARI's globe-trotting president, came across his first soynut in 1973; it had been cooked up by a soybean farmer's wife in Nebraska. "It was

good—but not great," Stuttman recalls. "Tough to chew, for one thing."

Nonetheless, Stuttman, who has a degree in biology and formerly worked for the American Soybean Association, thought the soynut had commercial potential. After all, soybeans are super-nutritious, with more protein (and less fat) than peanuts, and easily lend themselves to adaptations in taste and texture. So he set out to produce the perfect soynut—the Super Soy!

"Our process, developed with the help of food scientists at Michigan State University, did the trick," he said. "Our Super Soys are plumped up and then roasted. And that's what makes them super!"

INARI's soynuts—all made from Michigan-grown soybeans—can be purchased plain or fancy—with or without salt; flavored with onion-garlic, jalapeno or smokey barbecue; or enrobed in creamy white yogurt, butter toffee or carob. Watch for them in your food dealer's produce case. They're definitely oishii!

And let's keep making it—and buying it—in Michigan!

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Today's MEDICINES

Recently, two new pain medications, Advil and Nuprin have been advertised on television. What is the difference between these two medications? Are they the same as Motrin?

Advil and Nuprin are two new nonprescription medications both of which contain 200mg of ibuprofen. Motrin, a prescription medication, also contains ibuprofen but in higher strengths of 300mg, 400mg or 600mg per tablet. Ibuprofen is one of several prescription medications that the FDA has allowed to become available without a prescription.

Ibuprofen (the generic name for Advil, Nuprin and Motrin) is effective in decreasing pain and swelling. The nonprescription products are beneficial for mild arthritic pain, muscle aches and pains and menstrual cramps. Ibuprofen and aspirin are similar in their ability to relieve pain and swelling. Both ibuprofen and aspirin are more effective in decreasing swelling than acetaminophen (Tylenol, Datril, Panadol).

Ibuprofen should be taken as directed on the package label only when needed for mild pain relief. If you find you need to take this medication every day or if you do not get relief from the maximum dose, inform your physician or pharmacist.

When should one purchase ibuprofen instead of aspirin or acetaminophen?

Since the cost of ibuprofen is higher and the medications are equally effective in relieving pain, aspirin and acetaminophen should be tried first. If

the pain is not relieved by these medications, then ibuprofen may be tried. If prescription arthritis or pain medications have been tried and not beneficial, it is not likely that ibuprofen 200mg will give more relief. Ibuprofen should not be taken together with prescription arthritis or pain medications, aspirin, or acetaminophen without your physician's advice.

Does ibuprofen have any side effects?

Even the lower, non-prescription dose of ibuprofen may cause some side effects. The medication should be taken with food to avoid an upset stomach. Dizziness, headaches, fluid retention and rashes may also occur. People who get short of breath or asthma attacks from taking aspirin may have the same effect from taking ibuprofen. Pregnant women should consult their physician before taking this medication.

Ibuprofen is a new nonprescription medication that is effective and safe when taken wisely. Wise medication use means being informed about the medications you take. Ask for your family pharmacist's advice before taking ibuprofen or any nonprescription medication.

Milk production decreases from February 1984

Milk production in Michigan during February, at 402 million pounds, was down 7 percent from a year earlier, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. About half of this year to year decline in milk production was due to the 29 day month of February 1984. The

extra day increased February milk production by 3.5 percent last year. Milk cow numbers held steady at 388,000 head, but were down 12,000 from one year ago. Milk output per cow averaged 1,035 pounds, down 50 pounds from a year ago. On a daily basis, milk output per cow increased from

January 1985 levels as milder weather conditions during February boosted milk production rates.

Slaughter cow prices averaged \$42 per hundredweight (cwt.), up over \$2 from a year ago. The value of milk sold during February averaged \$13.70 per cwt. and the butterfat test

averaged 3.75 percent.

U.S. milk production during February 1985 totaled 10.6 billion pounds, down 3 percent from a year ago. February production per cow averaged 977 pounds, 18 pounds less than a year earlier. Total milk cows averaged 10.8 million head, 1 percent less than a year

ago.

Dairy manufacturing production in Michigan produced 3.5 million pounds of butter during January 1985, down 39 percent from a year ago. American cheese production, at 1.9 million pounds, was up 42 percent from a year earlier. Ice cream production reached 2.5

million gallons, up 9 percent from the previous year. Nationally, January production of butter, American cheese, and nonfat dry milk was below a year ago. Production of cottage cheese, dry whole milk and frozen desserts increased from the previous year.

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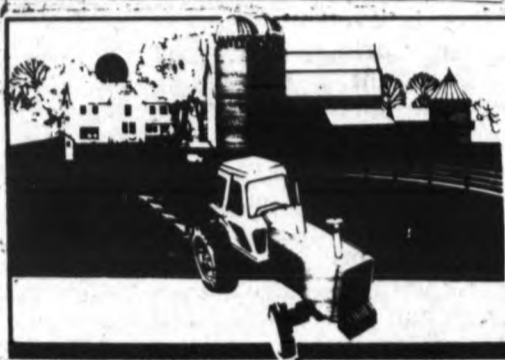
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Farm News

Ormston goes to D.C.

Too many farmers are in a position of having to substitute credit for income, and this is causing severe debt problems for farmers. These repayment problems are causing extreme financial stress for many farm lenders.

That is a message that Lee Ormston, a dairy and cash crop farmer and district board member from St. Johns took to members of Congress in Washington, D.C., March 6-8.

Ormston was among a group of about 30 farmer-directors of Production Credit Associations, Federal Land

Bank Associations and farm cooperatives from Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota and Wisconsin—the largest of the nation's Farm Credit System districts. Stockholders of the Seventh Farm Credit District who visited Congress in March to discuss farm economic conditions in the area.

In those four states, the Farm Credit System has \$12.4 billion loaned out to farmers and farm cooperatives.

"As agriculture goes, so goes the Farm Credit System, because we have 100 percent of our loan funds invested in

agriculture," said Gene Evenson, a Fergus Falls, Minn., farmer, who chairs the Farm Credit district's legislative advisory committee.

The group showed Congress figures that illustrate a 91 percent decline in net farm earnings in Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota and Wisconsin since 1979. Farm assets are also declining in value, with land values dropping by anywhere from 8 percent to 27 percent across the four-state district since 1981.

"We told Congress that income levels and

asset values in agriculture are so low that extraordinary efforts will be required by all parties—borrowers, lenders and government," he said.

"We were not happy that the President vetoed the farm credit assistance bill," Evenson said. "We urged Congress to work with the administration to develop new legislation to provide temporary interest rate relief."

The Farm Credit System directors told members of Congress that government must find long-term solutions to the monetary policies

that are keeping interest rates high and farm prices low.

They also urged Congress to provide better incentives for lenders to participate in federal debt assistance programs by having the government take on a larger share of the risk associated with helping farmers who have financial problems.

Although the Farm Credit System in Minnesota, Michigan, North Dakota and Wisconsin is experiencing increases in loan losses due to deteriorating credit quality, the system has sufficient earnings and reserves for loan losses and, for now, these are preventing loan losses from causing increases in interest rates.

Farm Credit Services, St. Paul, is the Federal Land Bank, the Federal

Intermediate Credit Bank, and the Bank for Cooperatives. Along with Production Credit Associations and Federal Land Bank Associations, Farm Credit Services specializes in credit and related financial services to farmers, ranchers, agricultural businesses and cooperatives in the Seventh Farm Credit District of North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan. Farm Credit Services is part of the nationwide Farm Credit System, which is privately funded and cooperatively owned and directed by its member-borrowers. The Seventh District is the largest of the 12 Farm Credit Districts in terms of member-borrowers and loan volume outstanding.

Farmers ask for simple bill

Representatives from the state's general farm organizations, participating in a recent "agricultural summit" meeting, hosted by the Michigan Farm Bureau, called on Congress to approve a simple bill that would provide 50 percent advance price support loan payments to farmers who sign up to participate in the 1985 farm program.

In a joint statement,

leaders of the Michigan Grange, Michigan Farmers Union, Michigan National Farmers Organization, Michigan Chapter of the American Agricultural Movement, Women for the Survival of Agriculture in Michigan, and the Michigan Farm Bureau, urged immediate congressional action to address the credit crisis faced by many

Michigan farmers.

The farm organization leaders also urged ag lenders to use the recently-amended debt adjustment program that allows lenders to use both an interest rate reduction and principal write-down to secure a loan.

"Lenders should respond to the serious cash flow problems that agriculture is currently experiencing and make

every effort to work with individual farmers to assure that operating capital is available for spring planting," they said.

On March 13, the Farmers Home Administration amended its debt adjustment program regulations for a reconstructed loan to be guaranteed by FmHA by reducing the cash flow requirement by 10 percent.

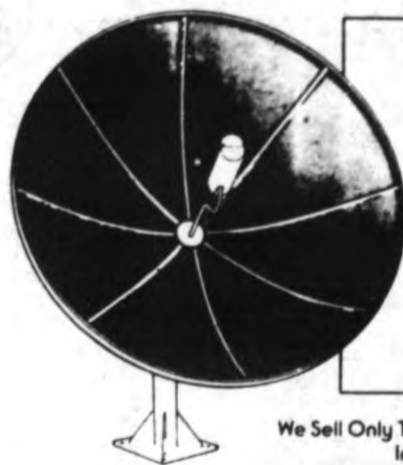

During the lenten season, everyone starts thinking of eating fish a little more often. This article is the second in a three-part series devoted to the purchase and preparation of fish.

When purchasing fish, it is helpful to know fresh and frozen fish may be purchased in a variety of forms. Here are the most common market cuts.

- **Whole Fish** — After these are caught, nothing is done to them before they are marketed. They must be scaled and the head, tail and fins removed before they are cooked.

- **Dressed Fish** — These fish have the head, tail, fins and scales removed. They may be cut into fillets and steaks and cooked.

- **Steaks** — A large

dressed fish is cut into cross section slices about one inch thick, each of which is called a steak. They are ready to cook after purchasing.

- **Fillets** — The sides of the fish are cut lengthwise away from the backbone to form fillets. They are ready to cook after purchasing.

- **Chunks** — A large, dressed fish is cut into cross sections to form chunks which are ready to cook after purchasing.

- **Raw Breaded Fish Portions** — A frozen fish block is cut into portions. These portions are coated with a batter, breaded, packaged and frozen. Raw-breaded fish portions are ready to cook after purchasing.

- **Fried Fish Sticks** — A frozen fish block is cut into portions. These pieces are coated with batter, breaded, partial-

ly cooked, packaged and frozen. Fried fish sticks and portions may be heated and served after purchasing.

Once you determine what market cut you would like to purchase, it is important that you check the fish for quality. Before making any purchase, be sure to check the following:

Fresh fish — Look: The eyes should be bright and clear, the gills should be red and

free from slime and the skin should look shiny. Smell: The odor should be fresh with no strong "fishy" smell. Touch: The flesh should feel firm.

Frozen fish — Look: The fish should have no brownish tinge and no cottony appearance. Smell: There should be no odor. Touch: The entire fish should be frozen solid. The package should be airtight and undamaged.

Pork promotion is planned

The National Pork Producers Council unveiled its advertising and promotional plans for 1985 at the American Pork Congress held in March in Indianapolis.

According to Russ Sanders, assistant vice president for NPPC, pork will be promoted in every major market across the country for the first time this year.

"We expect this additional exposure to revitalize interest in pork merchandising and increase demand nationwide," says Sanders.

Network radio is the backbone of the 1985 campaign. Humorous pork commercials will be heard on more than 2,000 stations representing six networks. The complete plan calls for 28 weeks of radio commercials during news, entertainment and sports programming throughout the year.

The commercials utilize Dick Orkin of "Dick and Bert" fame. In recent times, Orkin is better known for his role in commercials for Time, Inc. and AT&T.

Sanders says Orkin was chosen for his unorthodox style: "Consumers still have a limited awareness of pork. Most people don't realize there are dozens of cuts of pork and dozens of ways to prepare it. Orkin makes these points in an entertaining and memorable way. His unusual approach should give pork the top-of-the-mind awareness it needs."

NPPC will supplement the network radio commercials with four-color, full-page advertisements in magazines like McCall's, Working Mother, People Weekly, Better Homes and Gardens and Gourmet. Combined, these publications reach more

than 18 million Americans, delivering more than 124 million advertising impressions.

Sanders explains the thinking behind this two-pronged approach: "We're counting on radio for the initial attention and awareness we need. But print gives us something the networks can't-space to tell the rest of the story. Magazine ads will be used to distribute new recipes, reinforce pork's positive diet/health attributes and emphasize some of the other benefits".

Outdoor boards, seasonal promotions and case strips, posters and mobiles for pork retailers round out NPPC's campaign for 1985. Cooperative newspaper advertising will also be made available for use by state and local organizations. As in the past, all

materials include the familiar and successful slogan, "America, you're leaning on

Pork".

Says Sanders, "With this year's advertising and promotional lineup,

we are convinced even more people will be leaning on pork in 1985!"

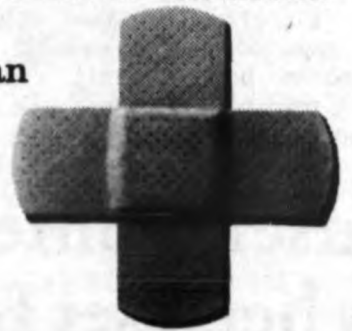

Bill for clean indoor air introduced in house

"The people of Michigan are with us on this issue," said Sen. Jack Faxon (D-Farmington Hills) and Rep. Justine Barns (D-Westland) in introducing a new Michigan Clean Indoor Air Bill simultaneously to the House and Senate today. The bill would provide for smoke-free areas in public places such as schools, stores, offices and other work places, and auditoriums. Smoking would be restricted to designated smoking areas. An almost identical bill, House Bill 5210, was introduced last year, enjoyed heated discussion and fizzled in the House Public Health Committee. During the debate on last year's version of the bill, legislators expressed an interest in finding out how the people of Michigan felt about legislation that would limit smoking in public places. The American Heart Association of Michigan (AHA/MI) and the American Lung

Association of Michigan (ALAM) arranged for a survey to provide that answer. According to telephone interviews conducted by the Institute for Social Research Center, Ann Arbor, 68.5 percent strongly supported such legislation. Nonsmokers' rights legislation even has the support of a majority of current smokers, with 56.2 percent strongly favoring such legislation and 73.6 percent generally favoring it. Among recent ex-smokers, 66.5 percent strongly favored and 81.1 percent generally favored restrictions on smoking. As expected, those who never smoked were most supportive, with 76.0 strongly in favor and 89.7 percent generally favoring this type of legislation. "The death toll caused by cigarette smoking is now at 350,000 people each year in this country, most of those deaths from heart disease, the

remainder from such causes as lung cancer and emphysema," said Dr. Albert Sparrow, Lansing, president-elect of the American Heart Association of Michigan. "The American Heart Association urges legislators to vote for the bill and hopes the Michigan citizens will also urge them to do so," he said. "There is a need to adopt public policy in Michigan that protects all citizens from involuntary exposure to second hand smoke in public places, including the workplace," said Peter M. Pellerito, ALAM president. "The issue here is serious indoor air pollution and not just an issue of whether people should or can smoke. Studies, showing the harmful effects of second hand smoke, including a new one released by the Environmental Protection Agency, are now rapidly accumulating," he said. There is form

evidence that cigarette smoking in various indoor environments raises levels of specific pollutants well above those normally found in everyday situations in the absence of cigarette smoke. These levels often exceed standards for human exposure, where such standards exist. A number of these studies have clearly shown that there are physiological effects of cigarette smoke on nonsmokers. When exposed to cigarette smoke, many nonsmokers experience headaches, or have acute eye and throat irritation responses. Cigarette smoke can trigger episodes in persons who suffer from asthma. The effect of second hand smoke on people with existing lung disease such as emphysema, chronic bronchitis and allergies is especially threatening, as the smoke only serves to make their conditions worse.
