Spring Clean-Up

Date set for the clean-up

It is time again to start planning for Spring Clean-Up, which is to run this year from April 29 through May 15.

The annual clean-up program gives people an opportunity to clean up basements, garages or yards and have this trash disposed of by just placing it at the curb.

The program, conducted by the City, has become very popular with the citizens of St. Johns the past few years, according to Diane Edwards, administrative assistant. "The program is only

for residential customers who pay a garbage fee in their summer taxes. No commercial, industrial, apartments or trailer parks are included in this service," said Edwards. "Certain city areas will have an assigned date, and prior to 7 a.m. they must have their trash out by the curb, or it won't be picked up."

A schedule of the areas and times will be published when available.

The program cost the City a total of \$28,980 last year and 2,367 yards of trash (104) loads was hauled to Grangers for disposal.

Robbers to be indicted

The four suspects arrested in connection with the robbery of a

Westphalia bank March 29 face indictment by a grand jury in Grand Rapids, according to Sgt. Don Kennell, of the Clinton County Sheriffs Detective Bureau.

The amount of money stolen is not being revealed by the bank's request. But, according to Kennell, portions of the amount taken have been recovered.

One suspect, Cecil Carmack, 24, who was arrested shortly after the robbery by Michigan State Police, was taken to Grand Rapids April 2.

The other suspects, Gordon Landis, 48, his wife, Robin Landis, age unknown and David Davies, age unknown, who were arrested March 30 in Kentucky, will be transported by U.S. Marshals in Federal custody to Grand Rapids in the near future.

The Maynard Allen State Bank was robbed by two white males, who entered the bank at approximately 10:30 a.m. The pair demanded a teller to give them money. One of the subjects was wearing a ski mask.

The pair allegedly threatened the bank employees and a customer with a young child with a long-barrelled handgun and then ordered them to go

into the bank vault. They were told to stay in the vault for 15 minutes, or else they would be killed.

According to Kennell, police officials received the robbery report at approximately 10:48 a.m. A blockade was immediately set up, with law enforcement officials on the look-out for two white males in a burgundy color Chevrolet.

About one half hour later, two Michigan State Police troopers observed a vehicle fitting the description at the 496-96 location and made a traffic stop. At that time Cecil Carmack, of Kentucky, was taken into custody.

Information received from Carmack led police to the identities of other suspects allegedly involved in the robbery. Officials in Kentucky were notified and early March 30, three suspects were arrested in Pulaski County, Kentucky, by local police and federal agents.

Taken into custody were, Gordon Landis, Robin Landis and David Davies, all of Kentucky,

Schuette favors MX

Congressman Bill Schuette, in a show of support for President Reagan, voted March 28 to build MX missiles.

"Many mid-Michigan residents have contacted me with very persuasive arguments both for and against the MX," said Schuette. "I have carefully considered each and every one."

Three U.S. Presidents, from both parties, have decided that the MX is vital to

our national security, but while we in the U.S. have argued over it, the Soviets have deployed over 600 MX-type missiles."

Schuette continued, "Cancelling the weapon just as we sit down to the bargaining table in Geneva would be a profound mistake. It would have adverse consequences for years to come."


"Max Kampelman, our chief negotiator at the talks, said 'Lack of

funding for the MX would inevitably delay the Geneva negotiations'."

"After weighing all of the arguments," said Schuette, "I am determined that approving the MX would both enhance our national security and convince the Soviets of the seriousness of these talks. Peace is our goal, and bargaining from strength, not weakness, is the way to achieve it."

Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD), is a nationwide organization to help eliminate drunk driving accidents. Clinton County has a high percentage of alcohol-related accidents and fatalities. Fowler High School students have decided to try and change this, so they are starting a SADD group in their school.

SADD was originally started by Robert Anastas in 1981, at Wayland High School, Mass. It began as a series of health programs for driver education students, but it grew into much more. Other students became interested, and it became a school organization.

A "Contract For Life" was created to help involve the parents in the program. Both the parents and the teenager sign the contract to help insure the safe arrival home of each other. This contract in no way condones underage drinking, but its object is to protect teenagers from driving intoxicated and from being a passenger in a car with a drunk driver. Other schools heard about the success

of SADD and now it has spread throughout high schools all over the nation, and even in Canada.

Almost everyone's life has been touched in some way through alcohol, so it's important that all take part in community alcohol awareness. If everyone joins together to help avoid alcohol-related accidents, it could work. The cooperation of students, parents and the community is the most important thing.

Maybe you should, before it's too late for talking. In the near future, an all-school assembly will be held at Fowler High School. Contracts will be handed out at that time for students to take home to their parents. Sheriff's Department Report

Oil brine banished

A new order issued by the DNR phasing out the use of oil field brines for dust control will condemn thousands of Michigan residents on rural gravel roads to summers filled with choking, gritty dust, it was declared today by Earl Rogers, director of the County Road Association.

tion, could be more environmentally damaging to Michigan residents than any possible adverse effects from brine use," Rogers stated.

"The DNR has chosen to wash its hands of an issue without even pro-

posing tests to determine if organics in the brines are naturally biodegraded in road soils and therefore, reasonably harmless. No tests have ever shown brine harms surface water where the dust-retardant has been properly used."

Rogers charged that the DNR's drastic action is being taken in advance of publication of recommendations of the Oil and Gas Advisory Board supporting continued use of oil field brine for roads.

Most Michigan county road commissions have used brine for 30 years to control dust on rural gravel roads. The only alternative is use of more expensive calcium chloride—an alternative beyond the reach of most townships and counties.

"The clouds of choking dust, which will result on many roads because of the DNR ac-

Child Abuse bill introduced in House

submitted by Gary L. Randall, State Representative, 89th District

Statements by children in the "tender years," who have been

subjected to sexual abuse and confided to parents, teachers or other people, would be admissible in court under legislation which I recently co-sponsored in the Michigan House.

The bill would amend the Michigan Rules of Evidence to allow the "tender years" exception to the hearsay rule. Michigan currently does not allow hearsay testimony.

The bill details the circumstances under which statements by children under the age of 12 may be admissible. The remarks must be the first the child made about the sexual abuse,

and they must have been given without coercion. The statements must also have been made as soon as possible after the abuse, unless the delay resulted from fear or

other legitimate reasons.

Such legislation is necessary for successful prosecution of child abuse cases. Sexually abused children frequently do not wish to testify in court, especially if the accused person is sitting a few feet away. It can be terrifying for a young child to have to face the defendant and relate the experience in front of many strangers.

Cases have been lost because parents are reluctant to have their children testify in court. This legislation would permit third-party evidence to be admitted during the trial.

I believe we will see a significant decrease in sexual abuse cases if the law gives child victims every possible consideration during the "tender years."

Tornado aftermath advice given

If a tornado should strike, remain calm. Most tornadoes are short-lived, lasting only four or five minutes and traveling an average of two miles on the ground.

Reports will be broadcast so stay tuned to your local radio or television station. Do not telephone or travel to a disaster area unless you are participating in an organized recovery effort.

Inspect your property, including your car, for damage. Immediately check for electrical problems and gas leaks, and report to utility companies or the fire department if danger is

imminent. Secure your property from further damage or theft; heavy rains often follow a tornado.

Do not go into a building damaged by a tornado until you are sure it is safe and will not collapse.

Use only approved or chlorinated supplies of drinking water. Check food supplies. Food may contain particles of glass or other debris. Discard canned goods with broken seams.

Do not drive unless you kite. Roads should be left clear for emergency vehicles. Debris-filled streets are

dangerous. Avoid loose or dangling utility wire and report them immediately to the power company or the police or fire department.

Food, clothing, medical care and shelter are available at local assistance centers. Listen to your local radio stations for information on the location and hours of the nearest disaster assistance center.

Notify relatives of your safety, otherwise local authorities may waste time trying to locate you.

Try to assist in the clean-up operation, of both your own property and that of friends and neighbors.

If you are a victim:

Do your best to protect yourself, your family, and your neighbors from further damage.

Make certain authorities are notified

that you are a tornado victim.

By thinking calmly, clearly and helping one another, communities can limit the injury and destruction tornadoes cause.

This advice is offered by Clinton County Emergency Services in cooperation with the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

- 3 cups cooked rice
- 3 cups milk
- 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons brown sugar, firmly packed
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped pitted dates
- 1 cup chopped walnuts, divided
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Combine rice, milk, 1/4 cup sugar, butter, and salt in a 2 to 3-quart saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, 20 to 25 minutes, or until thick and creamy. Add dates, 1/2 cup walnuts, and vanilla. Turn into a 2-quart dish. Combine cinnamon with remaining sugar and walnuts. Sprinkle over pudding. Chill. Makes 8 servings.

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Les Jenkins holds an enviable position

If you're a Detroit Tigers baseball fan, you'll probably have to agree that Les Jenkins of Hart and Silver Lake has a most enviable job (if you can call it a job).

He's an usher for the box seats behind and to the home plate side of the Tiger dugout at Joker Marchant Stadium, the home of the Detroit Tigers' spring training camp in Lakeland. He relishes the job...and gets paid \$15 a game for doing it, too.

Working with the Tigers is like having your cake and eating it too. Jenkins is in his fourth season as an usher at the Tigers' spring training games, and he seems to be as much of a fixture behind the dugout now as Lance Parrish is behind the plate.

He's in charge of 81 seats in the section of box seats around the dugout, located on the first-base side of the field. His "customers" are regulars, all season ticket holders who buy the same seats every year, so he knows many of them on a first-name basis.

He likes to chat and joke with them, as is the Les Jenkins nature. And his outgoing personality has gotten him acquainted with many of the ball players, management personnel and broadcasters. He met the Tigers' radio voice, Ernie Harwell, one day while eating his peanut butter sandwich and banana lunch at Harwell's spot in the press box before the stadium opened. Harwell came in, Jenkins recounts, told Jenkins not to get up and instead sat down with a cup of coffee and visited with him.

He's had conversations with George Kell and Al Kaline, and he's helped out Daryl Evans and Lou Whitaker with the autograph hounds who attend the games.

"The other day," Jenkins recounted, "Daryl Evans came out and began signing autographs near the dugout. A mob of kids descended, and Daryl was having trouble handling them all. I told him not to sign anymore, and I made everybody get in a line, and we made a long line up the steps and down the aisle. Then he could sign autographs in a orderly fashion; he was probably there 45 minutes. He'd pose for pictures, too, and I even took some pictures for the kids so they could be

in the photo with Evans."

"After they'd get their autograph, I'd make 'em leave."

Chasing kids out of the box seat section is difficult, Jenkins said. They come down and want autographs and like to take pictures. "We let them stay until the people start coming in, and then we have to chase 'em out."

Once in awhile Jenkins says he runs across belligerent fans, but the occasions are rare, and he's been able to handle the situation subtly without any confrontations. The rest of the people are marvelous, and that's what Jenkins likes about his job.

In addition to the baseball personalities, he's met many other people through his ushering job and it's helped him spot—and be spotted by—many of his friends and acquaintances from Hart and St. Johns. (When I and my daughter Kathy were at Tigers-Kansas City Royals game March 11, Jenkins helped arrange a sit-together in the grandstand for us and four other friends from Hart who came along).

"It's a good location to work," Jenkins said of his box seat bailiwick. "Everybody comes in that way and comes down the first base side first, so I see a lot of people go by. Last year when the Tigers were on TV one game, a lot of the fans held up signs, and I spotted one near me that said 'Hart and Walkerville say Go Tigers.' So I guess you know, I went right up there. I didn't know them but they knew me."

"Now that people know I work there and know where I am, they'll come over and look me up. I see Mike Humphrey two or three times a year, and I've seen Duane Wirrick a couple of times. The other day I met a lady from Wacousta."

"That's one of the things I like about the job—seeing people."

Jenkins is one of a score or more of people working for the Tigers at the spring training camp. Many work as gate keepers and many are volunteers; Jenkins and about eight other ushers get paid \$15 a game.

Despite the fun, it is a job. Jenkins has to show up at the ball park at 10 a.m.; the gates don't open until 11 a.m., and the game doesn't start until 1:30. The first half-hour or so involves repositioning the box-seat chairs, wiping them off and making sure they aren't broken. Then

Jenkins can relax and watch the beginning of the players' workouts. At 11 a.m. the gates open and he has to be on his feet directing his box seat patrons to their seats, shuttling non-box seat ticket holders away and handling a lot of requests about other seats in the park, too. Once the game starts, he can sit down (if there are seats open) and watch the game, too. And he's as prone to leap up and cheer a Tiger home run as is the next fan. He does shy away (he runs) from foul balls coming in his direction.

"It's fun, but if you didn't like baseball you'd be bored to death."

Getting a job was something of a whim, Jenkins had been to a lot of Tiger games at spring training and observed the ushers (mostly elderly men). One time he asked one of them how he got the job and how he—Jenkins—could get one, too. "Just make an application and wait for one of us to die," the guy told me.

The next winter Jenkins wrote to Detroit to inquire and was asked to make an application in Lakeland when spring training started. He did and was initially listed as a sub; "They promised to try me once during the season, but I was told 'Those guys never take a day off.'" Jenkins declined an offer to work seven hours a day selling tickets (they found out he had 41 years of banking experience), preferring to work inside the park.

After one of the games he stopped by the ticket office to purchase tickets for the next game and caught the attention of the Tigers' public relations vice president who had inter-

viewed him earlier. He inquired if there were any openings and, by chance, there was one. Jenkins was told to report for night and day games the next two days.

"They gave me a VIP box on the outfield side of the dugout," Jenkins recalled. "I watched the other ushers; they stood there like their feet hurt, took tickets and pointed out the seats to the people."

"I knew Matland (Lew Matland, the Tiger VP) was watching me, so when somebody came toward me with a grey ticket, I'd reach out, pat them on the shoulder, welcome them, ask how they were, joke with 'em, take them right into the box and tell them to watch out for foul balls."

I did that those two games. Matland called me in and said he wanted me for the Tuesday game and for the rest of the season. He gave me the same boxes I'm in charge of now. That was four seasons ago."

The Tigers play 16 "home" games at Marchant Stadium, and that's a sufficient number for the year for Jenkins. "I never go to Detroit," he said. "I get all the baseball I want down here, and it's closer." He likes night games best because the temperature is cooler and he has his days free.

Being at the ball park as early as he is on game days—three hours before gametime—Jenkins says he gets to have coffee with many of the players and to get personally acquainted with some. "At home seeing them on TV is like watching a high school game, because I feel I know them all."

Taking care of Tiger

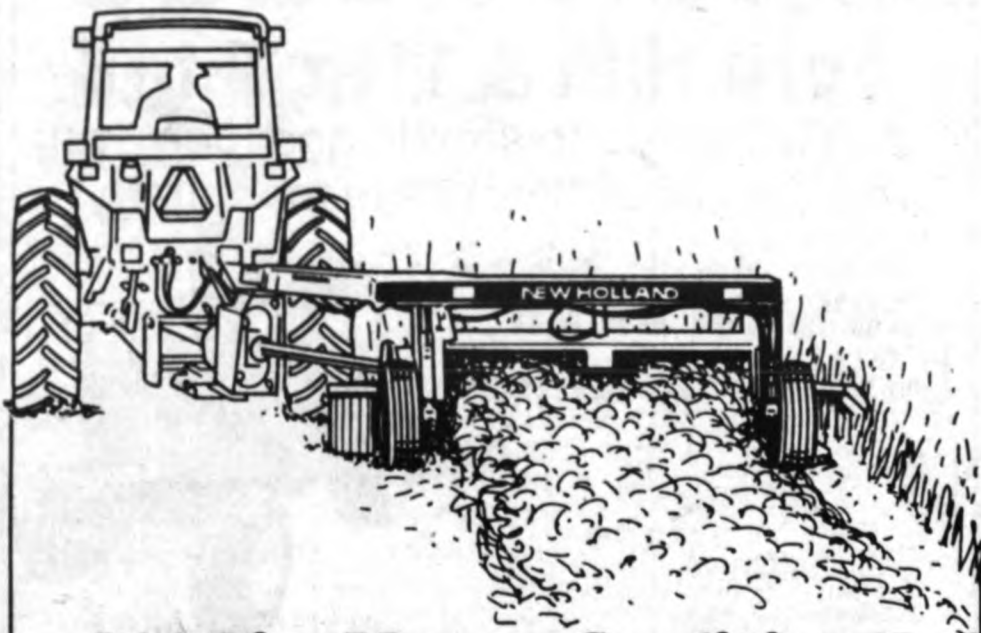

Potato stock rises in March

Michigan potato growers, shippers and processors held a total of 3.7 million hundredweight (cwt.) of potatoes on March 1. This is an increase of 12 percent from a year ago, but 12 percent below stocks on hand March 1, 1983, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Disappearance for the 1984 crop from the start of harvest to March 1 totaled 8.8 million cwt., 35 percent above movement for the same period last season. Disappearance during the month of February totaled 1.3 million cwt. compared to 1.1 million cwt. a year ago. So far this season, 70 percent of production has been

removed from storage compared to 66 percent a year ago. Quality of potatoes coming out of storage remains good.

Nationally, potato stocks were estimated at 117 million cwt. in the 15 major storage states. This is up 3 percent from last year, but 5 percent short of March stocks two years ago. The storage total represents 39 percent of fall production this year compared with 40 percent on hand a year ago. Processing so far this season in the major states totaled 82.0 million cwt., up 17 percent from a year earlier. February processing at 11.3 million cwt. was down 4 percent from last year.

Americans better health by increasing exercise

"Wellness," low cholesterol diets, reduced sodium diets, stress elimination and exercise are the buzz-words of the health-conscious '80s. Americans are jogging, cycling and swimming their way toward unprecedented fitness.

Health professionals are exhilarated. Their warnings about how to prevent such ailments as diabetes, cardiovascular disease and hypertension (high blood pressure) have received robust response. But while well-worn tennis shoes and home exercise equipment might be evidence of current quests for chic, sleek physiques, some scientists must dig deeper for clues about the health status of past generations of Americans. Ironically perhaps, physical anthropologists such as the Smithsonian Institution's Dr. J. Lawrence Angel and his research associate, Jennifer Kelley, examine the skeletons of our ancestors to pinpoint the stresses and benefits of their lifestyles that determined overall physical fitness.

Although the body's structure has not chang-

ed much over the past 25,000 years, not surprisingly "people now are much healthier than past generations of Americans," Angel says. In part, he says, that progress can be credited to advances in medicine that curbed many deadly childhood diseases, to public health policies that have made such ailments as tuberculosis little more than gruesome

memories and to dietary changes and improvements that have given Americans better, more consistent nutrition.

These conclusions may seem a matter of common sense, but Angel's study of skeletal remains from five generations of Americans between 1840 and 1965 provides in-

All of the skeletons dated from the late 18th to the early 19th century.

From written sources of the day, the scientists knew that slaves who worked the forges were better fed than other slaves. Nonetheless, these skeletons confirm the life of hard labor shared by all slaves in this era. For Angel and Kelley, bones with "crests"—the growth of extra bone material to accommodate new muscle tissue developed by backbreaking labor—provide corroborating evidence.

Rickets was suspected in 10 out of 31 skeletons, although Kelley and Angel have no solid clues as to why rickets would have afflicted these people. Stress fractures and other sorts of wear and tear on bone attest to their hard lives. Thus, the anthropological evidence, supplementing written data, lends insight into the lifestyles and occupational skills of a group of Americans one researcher has dubbed "the invisible people."

Results from the Catoctin study showed that males from the sample lived an average of six and a half years longer than the women. Kelley suspects the women had shorter lives because of deaths in childbirth and perhaps because of the higher female incidence of anemia.

At some point in the early 19th century, Angel says, life spans for both black and white women began catching up with those charted for men, probably because of a trend toward smaller

families, hence less childbirth stress. But as Angel notes, "women from the beginning are physiologically tougher than men, while males are more physiologically expensive" than females. That is, men have greater muscle strength, greater food needs and higher blood pressures than women. Modern statistics show that Western women live longer than men.

The brand of physical anthropology practiced by Angel and Kelley has helped to debunk a long-held myth that colonial Americans were much shorter in stature. Angel thinks this misconception might stem from portraits of the day that were painted in a style that makes the subjects appear shorter or from architectural trends that featured low ceilings and doorways. In fact, according to Angel, colonial people would not be noticeably shorter than most modern Americans even though skeletal features show increased stature over time.

The obstacles to good health faced by today's Americans are different from those of our forebears. "Being overweight is the major health problem in the United States," Dr. Artemis Simopolous, chairman of the nutrition coordinating committee of the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md., says.

People today, she says, not only eat the wrong things but eat too much because of habit, stress and boredom. Last year, the NIH supported nutrition research to the tune of more than \$164 million.

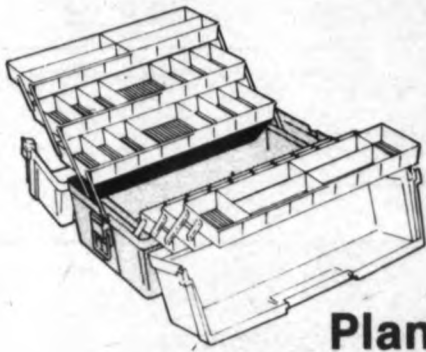

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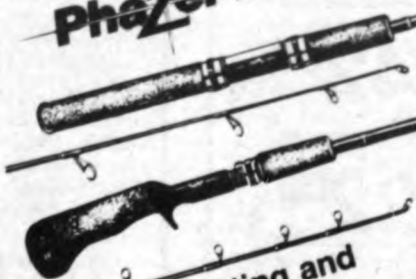

Neuder went over some very important facts about sheep and goats. Some of the topics that were covered were nutrition, pasture management, barn management, routine worming, also vaccination procedures.

Afterwards Neuder took time out to answer the questions that members and their parents had.

Some of the questions asked were:

In pasture management how often should your animals be rotated to new pasture grounds?

Neuder's answer was that animals should be rotated to new pasture ground whenever it is needed so that the animals do not have to graze to close to the ground where the parasite larvae are, this

in turn could become a problem in reinfesting animals.

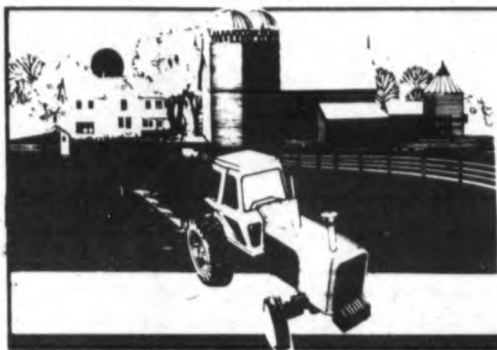
What kinds of wormers should be used for routine worming?

His recommendation was Thiabendazole (TBZ)-a broad spectrum wormer used for strongyles. Very safe and probably the most common wormer. Also, Levamisole (Levasole)-a broad spectrum wormer used for strongyles and lungworms. Very safe and the only common wormer effective against lungworms. But, he also stressed that it was important for each one to consult their own vet for their own personal farm problems.

Neuder talked about how important it is in barn management for young animals to have a good, clean and dry environment because they are most susceptible to infection and parasites.

Afterwards refreshments were served and Neuder and the leaders, Jim Roof and Mike Winn, talked to individuals about their sheep and goat problems and some of their farm management procedures.

National seed contest started

Agriculture will survive

Michigan agriculture will survive the current farm economic crisis with the support of key decision makers, according to Diane Horning, first vice-chairperson of the Michigan Farm Bureau Women's Committee.

That was the National Agriculture Day message delivered to members of the Michigan Legislature and representatives of state government agencies by the farm women during a breakfast meeting in Lansing

March 20.

"It is true that agriculture today is not the dynamic industry it was a few years ago and that we hope it will be again, but let me assure you, agriculture, especially here in Michigan, is not going down the tube," said Horning, who operates a dairy farm with her husband, Earl, near Manchester in Washtenaw County.

"There will be casualties in this severe economic crunch we're currently experiencing and we grieve for those casualties and the trauma those farm families will suffer," she said. "But there will be a majority of survivors and these farmers will continue to work toward the economic well being of their own businesses and of the industry of which they are a part."

"As a very small minority, farmers realize they can't do this alone. They're often at the mercy of Mother Nature and they can't do much about that. They are also often at the mercy of decision makers, those who make decisions that impact on our farm

businesses. We believe we can do something about that, by making an effort to gain understanding of and support for our industry and its needs. That's what Agriculture Day is all about," Horning said.

The farm women and their guests discussed five issues which Horning identified as key challenges for agriculture in the months ahead: the farm economy, Farm Bill '85, the federal deficit and its impact on interest rates, water rights, and animal care.

First celebrated in 1973, National Agriculture Day has been officially recognized by Congress, the president and many state legislators, including Michigan's, as a time to honor the 20% of the nation's workforce that plays a role in producing, processing and delivering food and fiber to consumers here in the U.S. and abroad.

Anyone entering the NCGA yield contest with Custom Farm Seed can have the \$50 entry fee paid by the company as well as receive an additional \$1,000 for a national NCGA title and

\$500 for a first place state finish.

In the CFS waxy corn yield contest, entry forms must be received by Custom Farm Seed at Momence, Illinois with a postmark no later than August 10. Soybean yield entries must be postmarked no later than August 1. Entrants in both contests must be bona fide farm persons at least 14 years old.

Trophies and holiday weekend trips for two will be presented to the winners in each contest. In the waxy corn competition there will be first place awards for irrigated and non-irrigated entries in each of three general maturity zones. The CFS soybean seed yields will be judged in three maturity zones.

Its products are marketed through a farmer and farm supply sales organization in Minnesota, the Dakotas, Nebraska, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, New Jersey, Maryland, and Pennsylvania.

FmHA overtime pay authorized

Farmers Home Administration has been authorized an additional \$30,000 to pay overtime to FmHA personnel to help speed up farm loan processing, according to State Director Calvin C. Lutz.

"These funds, which are in addition to our normal overtime allotment, will help us get more operating loan funds into the hands of farmers in time for spring planting," Lutz said.

"FmHA county supervisors and their staffs in 40 county offices around the state are working as fast as possible to process loans under the FmHA's normal farm loan programs as well as handling the more than 2676 requests for loan reviews under the debt restructuring initiatives. This overtime will help speed up processing of all these loans," Lutz said.

"In addition to the overtime authorization, we have hired 28 temporary employees to help FmHA county offices process loans," Lutz said. "We are completing the hiring of another six temporary

personnel. The Soil Conservation Service, the Extension service and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service have offered several of their employees from around the state to help FmHA in county offices."

"FmHA county supervisors are proving their dedication to helping Michigan farmers continue in farming. So far this fiscal year, they have already approved over 767 operating loans. With the cooperation and generous personnel assistance from other Federal agencies, we are confident that we will complete operating loan applications in time for spring planting," Lutz said.

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Family Focus

This article is the third in a three-part series devoted to the purchase and preparation of fish. This final article covers the elements of successful fish cookery.

Successful fish cookery really depends on one basic rule--DON'T OVERCOOK! Whether you are pan frying a fresh-caught brook trout or baking frozen cod fillets, fish needs only a brief exposure to heat in order to coagulate its protein and develop its flavor. Over cooking toughens and dries out the delicate flesh.

Realizing that many people shy away from preparing fish because it seems tricky, the North Atlantic Seafood Association developed a foolproof oven cooking method, called the Magic 10-Minute Rule, here's how it works:

1. Measure the fish (fillets, steaks, whole fish) at its thickest part.

For fresh fish, allow 10 minutes cooking time (at 450 degrees F) for each inch of thickness.

2. For frozen unthawed fish, double the cooking time, allowing 20 minutes per inch. It is not necessary to defrost frozen fish before cooking unless the recipe specifies.

3. If the fish is being cooked in foil or in a sauce, add an extra 5 minutes per inch.

4. The 10-Minute Rule can also be applied to broiling, poaching, pan-frying and other cooking methods. Whatever method is chosen, the same test for doneness applies.

The fish should flake easily when pierced with a fork at its thickest part and the flesh should become opaque. Fresh or frozen fish can be successfully cooked by almost any moist or dry heat method. When broiling, baking, or barbecuing, brush on a basting sauce, salad oil, or melted butter or margarine to keep the fish moist and flavorful. Here's a review of eight basic techniques suitable for fish cookery:

BAKING-Place the fish in a greased baking dish and season to taste. Bake at 450 F for re-

quired time.

BROILING-Use fish that's at least three-fourths inch thick. Place in a single layer on a greased broiler pan, two to four inches from source of heat. Cook for required time, turning

fish steaks and whole fish halfway through cooking time.

BARBECUING-Grease the barbecue grill and place fish about four inches from hot coals. Cook for required time, basting with marinade or barbecue sauce; turn thicker pieces once.

PAN FRYING-Dip fish pieces into milk or beaten egg, then into flour, cornmeal, or bread or cracker crumbs. Heat about one-

eighth inch cooking oil in a skillet; place breaded fish in a single layer in hot oil and fry on both sides until browned.

OVEN FRYING-Dip and coat fish as for pan frying. Place in a greased baking dish and pour a little melted butter or margarine over fish. Bake at 450 degrees F for required time.

DEEP FRYING-Dip and coat fish pieces as for pan frying (a batter can also be used instead

of crumbs or flour). Heat oil to 375 F in a deep fryer or suitable pan. Fry a single layer of fish at a time in the hot oil until fish is lightly browned.

POACHING-Place fish on rack in large skillet.* Barely cover fish with a poaching liquid, such as seasoned water or court bouillon. Bring liquid to a boil, reduce heat, and cover and simmer for required time.

STEAMING-Pour 2 inches of water into a deep pot and bring to a boil. Place fish on a rack over boiling water; cover and steam for required time. Or sprinkle fish with lemon juice, dot with butter and wrap in foil. Place on a baking sheet and oven steam at 450 F.

*When poaching and steaming, you may first wrap the fish in cheesecloth for easier lifting after cooking.

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4-H Goat project care advice given

Kid care is an important part of your project.

Your does and kids should be kept in warm dry pens, pens should have a bedding of good clean straw to start

with. After your doe has been bred it will take about 150 days to the birth of the kids. Goats most often have twins and the kid will weigh approximately 7 to 9 pounds.

The first milk that the doe produces is called colostrum, the kids need to receive as much as they can. This colostrum is high in protein, minerals, and vitamin A. It also contains antibodies which will help protect the kids from diseases.

Kids can nurse their mothers or they can be hand raised. Nursing is easy, but you must make sure that the doe is producing enough milk for her kids, especially if there are twins. Nursing kids may also be a bit wild, so you may have to spend extra time petting and playing with them.

Many breeders prefer the hand raising method. This will enable you to always know how much milk each kid is getting. You can also control the milk intake. Kids should be raised separately from the adults.

Most kids are fed 3 or 4 times a day for the first week or so. They

are fed 1 to 1½ pints of milk at a feeding. This is placed in a pop bottle with a special lamb-goat nipple on it. While you are bottle feeding the kid you also have time for petting and playing. This gets the kid used to being handled, especially if the kid is to be used for show.

At about two weeks of age the kids are then offered leafy hay and some grain mix. Their milk is now fed only two or three times a day and they receive three pints of milk a day. If a doe doesn't produce enough milk for the kids or if the doe becomes ill the kids can be put onto a milk replacer, preferably a lamb replacer.

At about four to six weeks of age the kids are then fed one quart of milk two times a day and fed a limit of grain mixture of one-half to one pound a day, but offered all the hay they may want.

Between eight and 12 weeks the kids can be weaned if you wish. Kids should always have a good supply of fresh water at all times. Kids that do well should gain from one-fourth to one-half pound per day so that they will reach a

weight of 85 to 90 pounds by the breeding age.

Kids should also have the hoofs trimmed often to help maintain good growth. Poorly trimmed hoofs can result in lameness or sometimes foot rot. Kids also need to be dehorned at about two weeks of age. Bucks kids will have to be castrated also at this time. If you can have a bottle of milk on hand and give it to the kids immediately, they will forget their discomfort more quickly and be ready for some T.L.C.

April begins spring sign-up in 4-H. April also brings the birth of many new kids in the Clinton County area. New born

kids and milking does are an exciting 4-H project for any young person.

The 4-H age has been lowered to age nine this year. The age now being nine is going to enable more young people to become involved in 4-H projects giving them new experiences.

Spring sign up is due in May. 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1985 Dairy tour a big success



1985 DAIRY TOUR SUCCESSFUL-Over 125 people turned out for the Clinton County Dairy Tour April 3. The tour began at the Neil Feldpausch Family Farm, Fowler. Feldpausch runs the 74 grade milk cows and heifers farm with the help of his wife, Rosie and their seven children. He purchased the farm from his father, Sylvester (lower left picture), in 1969.

The tour then continued on to the Kowatch Brother's Farm, Fowler, managed by John and Phil Kowatch. The brothers farm 455 acres of crop land and manage a dairy herd of 127 cows (milking and dry). There is also 185 young cattle on the farm, the care and feeding of which are the responsibility of Leo Kowatch, John and Phil's father.

After lunch, sponsored by Federal Land Bank and Production Credit Association, of St. Johns, the tour continued on to the Nobis Farms, St. Johns. Nobis Farms is owned in partnership between Ken and Larry Nobis. The operation keeps two full time employees, Glenn Pung and John Smith, and three part-time employees, Steve Cook, Doug Miller and Kerry Nobis. The farm consists of 1147 acres of crop land, feed storage facilities, including five Harvestores, and a dairy herd of 184 Holstein cows.

The majority of the people attending the tour are dairy farmers. They want to see how other dairy farmers manage their herds and exchange ideas and information with each other.

Performing a basic equipment inspection before using a tractor improves operator safety and reduces expenses by finding and correcting small problems before they balloon into large ones.

"There are about 10 safety checks operators should make before getting on the tractor to ensure safe machine operation," says Howard Doss, Extension agricultural safety specialist at Michigan State University.

Tires need to be inspected for cuts or breaks in the tread and sidewalls, and tire pressure should be measured occasionally, Doss says. A damaged tire can blow out, throwing the tractor out of control. Low tire pressure causes internal tire damage and premature wear, while overinflation can make operators lose control by causing front wheels to bounce on rough ground.

Make sure tractor guards and shields are in place and keep the platform and steps free of slippery mud or grease. Remember to remove chains and tools from the tractor platform after maintenance work—they can interfere with pedal operation or cause the operator to slip and fall off the tractor.

Fuel and hydraulic lines need to be checked

for leaks and bad connections, Doss says. Fuel leaks are wasteful and a fire hazard. Power steering and control of the three-point hitch can be lost because of hydraulic line leaks.

Hold a piece of cardboard alongside hydraulic lines when looking for pinhole leaks, Doss advises. Many hydraulic and diesel fuel systems develop pressures three times the amount needed to penetrate skin, so operators should never use their hands to "look" for leaks. Seek medical attention at once if oil penetrates the skin, a serious infection or reaction could develop. Safe tractor operation also depends on good visibility, so clean windshields on cabs and make sure wipers function.

With the engine started, test tractor brakes by pressing each pedal, checking for a solid, resistant pressure and an adequate pedal travel distance. Then lock pedals together and check for equal braking ability on each wheel while slowly moving forward, Doss says. Look for steering problems by moving the steering wheel in each direction, watching for the amount of tire and steering wheel rotation. Doss says excessive "play" in the steering wheel should be avoided.

Make sure tractor lights work and periodically check their adjustment. Also adjust the driver's seat to a comfortable position that puts the driver within easy reach of

controls. Finally, occasionally check the working order of the neutral-start safety switch. It keeps the engine from starting when the transmission or clutch is engaged.

Q. I have found my older children offering table food to my 8-month-old son. How do I know when my child is really ready for table foods?

A. The transition from baby foods to family foods occurs in several steps based on a youngster's physical development.

Junior foods, which have more texture and encourage chewing, usually are introduced when a baby begins to develop teeth. For many youngsters this transition is appropriate at 8 or 9 months

of age. The foods should gradually be added to the diet, just as you introduced baby's first solid foods.

Toddler foods are the next step toward table foods. Gerber Chunky Foods for Toddlers™ are mildly seasoned and have bite-size pieces of fruits, vegetables and meats.

Table or adult foods should be introduced gradually, usually during the infant's second year. Remember that table foods may be richer and spicier than youngsters are accustomed to, especially if they have been eating baby foods, which contain no preservatives or added salt.

The best advice is to go slowly, adding one food at a time. In the beginning, think of table foods as supplementing, not replacing, the baby food diet.

Did you know that May 1st is the due date for spring 4-H enrollments in Clinton County? Did you know that nine year olds can join 4-H this spring? Did you know that we're looking for adults who are interested in spending just a few hours a week this spring and summer teaching a small group of young people a particular skill? Did you know that there are over seventy different projects and activities in 4-H to choose from? Did you know that there's a place for you in the Clinton County 4-H program?

The 4-H program is open to all youth who will be at least nine years old on or before December 31, 1985 and who will not yet be twen-

ty. Enrollment for spring programs is now going on and is due by May 1st.

In the 4-H program, young people work in a small group or on an individual basis with an adult or teen volunteer who is willing to share their time and talents with others. Members may pursue interests in a wide variety of areas and at a variety of skill levels.

There is no charge to belong to a 4-H club, although some clubs do collect dues for club activities.

By contacting the Extension Office, you can learn if there are any clubs in your area that offer projects in areas you might be interested in. We can also give you information about join-

ing clubs or about starting a club of your own.

All it takes to start a 4-H club of your own is five or more young people who are interested in learning some new skill and at least one adult who is willing to spend time helping that to happen.

Information about starting a 4-H club in your area is also available at the Extension Office. It really isn't hard to do and while you can have a very large club if you want to, small clubs are just fine too.

If you are an adult who is interested in working with young people, but not ready to start a new club of your own, we might be able to identify an existing club who would like to have you join them as a project leader.

229). I'd also be willing to come and talk to a group of people about the Clinton County 4-H program. 4-H really is the place to be.

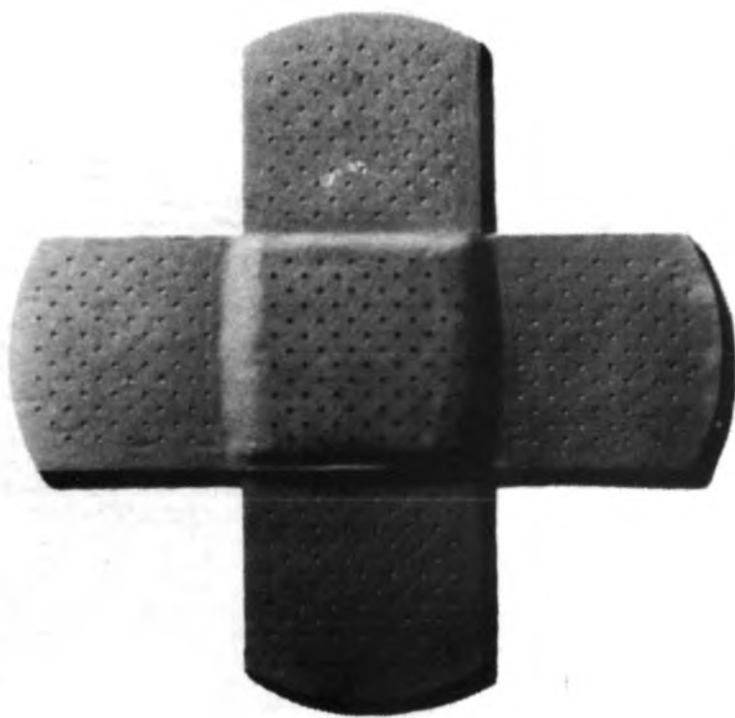

Hybrid Impatiens

The blossoms of New Guinea impatiens are larger than the average impatiens or sultana, but the flower colors are comparable. Colors available are pink, white, rose, lavender and shades of red.

Some varieties of New Guinea impatiens even have variegated leaves colorful enough to draw as much attention as the flowers themselves. Leaves can be pink and green or yellow and green and have different types of markings.

New Guinea impatiens will grow in full sun but prefer partial shade. New Guinea

impatiens have sparse blooms and poor flower color when grown in full shade. This is unlike regular impatiens which thrive in the shade.

New Guinea impatiens are more tolerant of dry conditions than regular impatiens. Wilted plants generally come back within one hour after they are watered.

New Guinea impatiens can be used in hanging baskets, as accent plants or in mass plantings. Don't plant them too close because they will grow to be 18 to 20 inches across.

Shortcut May Ruin Frozen Vegetables

It may seem like a tempting shortcut, but don't skip blanching when preparing vegetables for freezing, says Dr. Nadine Tope, extension foods and nutrition specialist, North Carolina State University.

Blanching is the scalding of vegetables in hot water before they are packaged. It inactivates most of the plant enzymes which cause food to become tough, musty or softened, change its flavor or color and decrease nutritional value.

Blanching will particularly help green vegetables, such as peas, broccoli and spinach, hold their bright color. Only herbs, hot peppers and green tomatoes should not be

blanched before freezing. Underblanching is worse than not blanching at all, because it stimulates enzyme activity.

After blanching immediately plunge the hot vegetables into ice water or spread them on a wet towel in front of a fan. For safety's sake, make sure the fan doesn't get wet. The cooling time should be no longer than the blanching time.

Proper blanching depends on the type of vegetable; use accurate directions. Your county agricultural extension office offers charts and leaflets based on the latest scientific studies of safe canning and freezing methods.

DID YOU KNOW?

If all goods and services were taxed at the same rate as cigarettes, the retail price consumers pay for them would be one-and-one-half times higher, according to R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

In other words, if taxed like cigarettes, a \$10,000 automobile would cost \$15,000, a \$500 television set would cost \$750, and a 40-cent candy bar would cost 60 cents.

Tobacco is one of the most heavily taxed consumer products. Last year, federal and state taxes accounted for 33 percent of the retail price of cigarettes, and these governments reaped a record tax take of more than \$9 billion from tobacco alone.

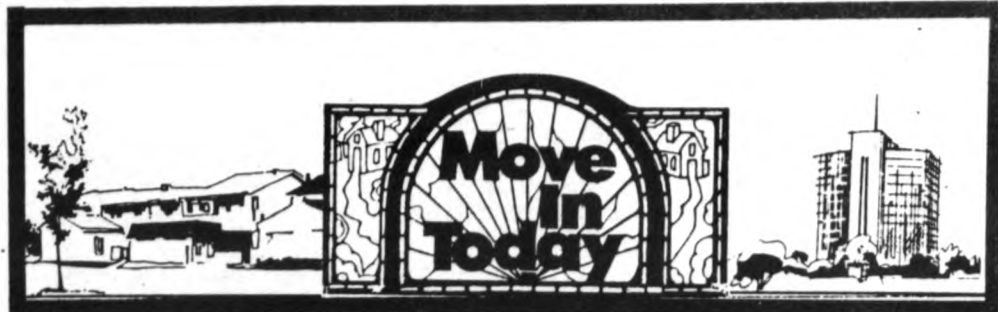

Protecting Children From Polio

For its 80th birthday, Rotary has picked out a present for the world.

It will provide polio vaccine and immunization experts wherever they are needed around the globe.

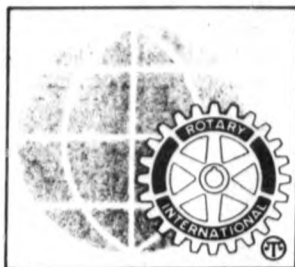
More than 21,000 Rotary clubs in 159 lands will raise \$5 - 6 million every year to pay for vaccine. The Rotary Foundation will send advisory teams, under the direction of Dr. Albert Sabin, who developed the oral polio vaccine, wherever requested to help establish immunization programs.

Although polio is under control in countries like the United States, it still haunts most of the world. The World Health Organization (WHO) reports that 78 million children born every year receive no protection from the crippling disease. Every year, polio cripples 500,000 children and kills 50,000.

Soon after it launched its first national polio immunization project for six million children in the Philippines in 1980, Rotary adopted the goal of helping control polio around the world. It has now started or approved projects to protect 23.5 million children in 16 countries.

To achieve its goal by its 100th anniversary in 2005, Rotary decided it needs to work faster.

Its 80th birthday present is designed to help speed the control of polio. Where feasi-



ble, Rotary's advisory teams will help set up national polio immunization days so more children will be protected sooner. Rotary's present provides both the vaccine and expertise which WHO has said are needed.

Why is Rotary giving a present for its birthday? Its purpose is service to others. In the United States and around the world, Rotary clubs build community centers, sponsor Scout troops, find jobs for the disabled and homes for the elderly. More than 100,000 people have learned to appreciate another culture through Rotary's youth exchange and Rotary Foundation programs.

In its 80 years, Rotary has grown from one club in Chicago to 21,000 clubs around the globe. Last year, there was a new Rotary club every 12 hours.

LAWN LORE

YOU CAN KEEP CRABGRASS UNDER CONTROL

Thomas C. Haliburton once said that only two things were inevitable—death and taxes. Some lawnmowers would say that a third item could easily be added to that list—crabgrass. If you doubt this, take a good look at your lawn. There may be at least one crabgrass plant lurking in it somewhere.

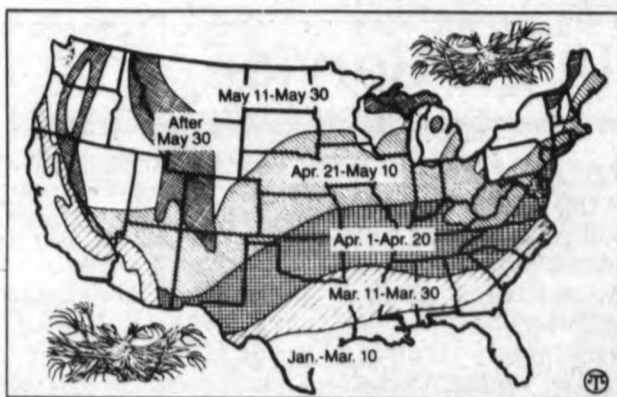

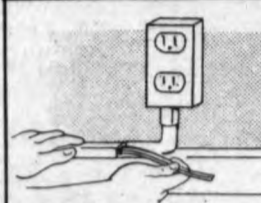
