City saves money

The St. Johns City Commission accepted a bid for the Spring Clean-Up that will save the city over \$6,000 from 1984.

Bids were accepted on two options. One was cost per load, with city crews doing the loading. The second option allowed for the contractor to furnish all the manpower, equipment and disposal charges, including disposal of appliances and metals.

The cost factor of option one is too varied, because it is so hard to determine the number of loads that will be hauled away. Last year, 104 loads were hauled to Grangers landfill in Lansing costing the city \$34,916.39.

Option two removes the cost variables from the city to the contractor by setting a specific dollar amount being paid, no matter how much, or how little trash is being disposed. This option will also free-up the city crew and equipment for other jobs.

The low bid of \$28,280 for option two was submitted by Searles Construction, Inc., 2265 W. Parks Road, St. Johns.

In other action, the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce was granted permission to place a Mint Festival Banner along State Street in front of the Courthouse, from the end of April through the end of the Mint Festival, August 12.

They also gave permission to place Mint Festival flags along Clinton Avenue using the existing poles. The city also decided to purchase an "I Support the St. Johns Mint Festival" support sign to be placed on the front door of City Hall.

Permission was granted for Poppy sales in St. Johns to the VFW Post 4113, Lady's Auxiliary and the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 153, on May 16, 17 and 18.

The poppies are

assembled by disabled veterans in hospitals. All money collected is spent on veterans in V.A. Hospitals in the Clinton County area and their families.

The city commission also passed Ordinance No. 358 concerning non-conforming use under the zoning ordinance. This will allow restoration of a damaged building, if cost of restoration does not exceed 60 percent of the structure, in a residential non-conforming use.

The commission also approved the establishment of an Industrial Development District for the St. Johns Industrial Park.

This designation will allow a property tax break to be applied for on any new industry locating in the City Industrial Park. If the tax break was applied for, separate hearings and determinations would be made for each applicant.

Volunteer banquet date set for May 13

The St. Johns School system's Volunteer-Of-The-Year will be announced during a special dinner at the St. Johns High School Cafeteria, May 13, at 6:30 p.m.

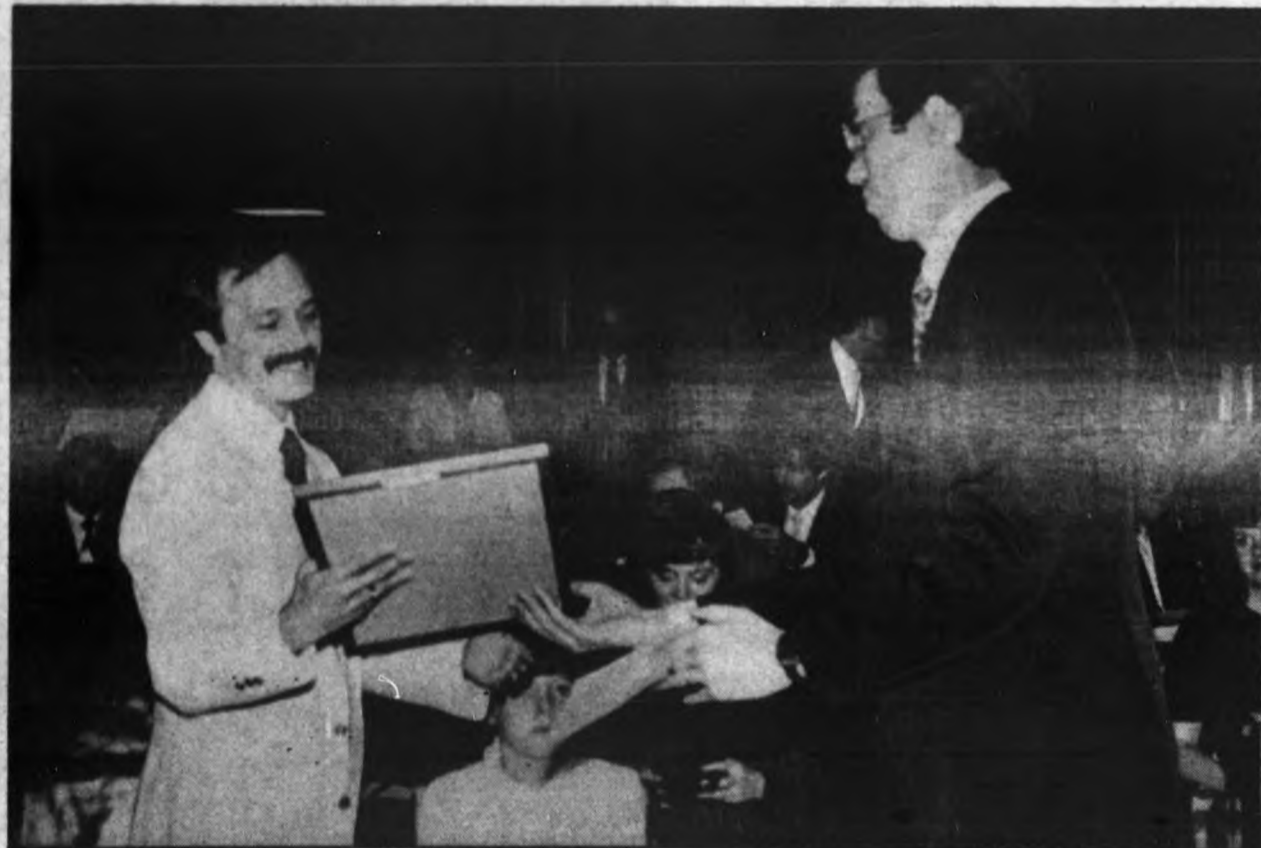
The dinner will be invitation-only for the over 400 volunteers who help the schools by donating time, money and materials to the many special projects that happen during the year.

This year the volunteer-of-the-year was selected administratively. Next year, there will be criteria set up for the selection process.

Sheriff's Department Report

A four-wheel drive vehicle caused \$100 worth of damage by driving through a wheat field belonging to Marvin Fedewa, Taft road, Pewamo.

Fedewa stated to sheriff's deputies that at about 12:30 a.m. on April 14 he observed what he believed to be a Ford Bronco in the field, possibly blue in color with loud exhaust and lights on top of the vehicle.

Gayle Chipchase, 4950 Wilcox, Holt, reported she was chaperoning a group of Girl Scouts at

Mill Run Cabin (Girl Scout Camp) when damage was done to her personal vehicle.

Chipchase's van and her husband's Volkswagen had eggs splattered on them and an antennae torn off. Also gas caps and valve caps were removed. No damage estimate was given. There are no suspects at this time.

Deputies also investigated a larceny at the home of Danny Dennis, Wacousta road, Eagle.

Dennis reported that someone had taken two

chain saws from his garage. One was a red Homelite chainsaw, 14-inch bar, model XL14, valued at \$120. The second saw was a brown Montgomery Ward chainsaw, 16-inch bar, valued at \$75.

This case remains open pending further investigation.

During the past week Sheriff's Deputies handled a total of 121 complaints. Some of which included: six malicious destruction of properties; two alarms; five breaking and entering's; 10 property damage accidents; seven reckless driving complaints (most of these are complaints about three-wheelers!); five littering; 10 suspicious vehicles or activity; five larcenies; one assault and battery; and one joy riding.

There were 32 people lodged into the county jail this past week, 15 of whom were charged with drunk driving.

Speed laws enforced

Your Sheriff's Department has received a Federal Grant thru the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning in the amount of \$25,000.00 for a 55 mph Enforcement Program.

We went after this grant after a recent study showed that 67% of the drivers in selected areas of the county were exceeding the 55 mph speed limit. We know that speed is by far the greatest killer on our highways today and coupled with drinking drivers, the problem is compounded immensely.

In 1984, there were 10 fatal accidents and 246 personal injury accidents in Clinton County investigated by your Sheriff's Department.

The number of fatal accidents were a 42% increase over 1983 and the number of personal injury accidents were a 5% increase. Property damage accidents, 625, were up 6% over 1983.

During the next eight months, the Deputy Sheriffs of Clinton County will be reducing the percentage of speeding motorists from 67% to 40% or better; increase the hours of 55 mph enforcement patrol by at least 28 hours per week; increase the number of 55 mph citations and traffic arrests by 75%, compared to the 1984 base year average; reduce speed related traffic accidents in target areas by 35% as compared to the 1984 base year average; and increase the number of operating under the influence of alcohol or drug arrests and traffic citations by 90% as com-

pared to the base year average of 1984.

During the course of this program, we will increase enforcement to maintain Michigan's compliance with the National 55 mph requirements. This will help reduce the number of accidents, deaths and injuries in Clinton County.

This program will also make the Deputy Sheriff's of Clinton County more visible, which will in turn help in deterring crime and aid in other problem areas.

In line with this beefed up program of increase enforcement, you will begin to notice a new look about your Sheriff's Deputies. We hope you will like the change; we believe it tends to upgrade our public image in a most professional manner. We welcome your comments and thank you for letting us serve you.

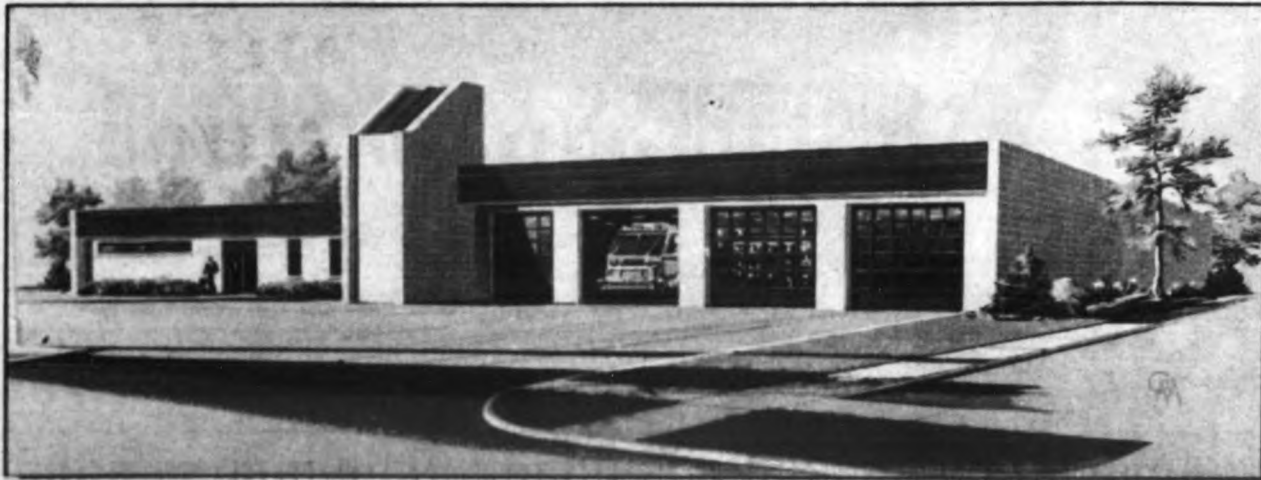

One of the projects that the Unit uses the proceeds from the sale is for the annual Christmas "department store" held at the district's Veterans Hospital in Saginaw.

"All the Units in the district purchase a certain number of Christmas presents. For example, last year we purchased approximately 30 blankets. All the gifts are set up on tables in one area of the hospital, then veterans can come down and select gifts for themselves and their families. We then wrap the gifts up and mail them, if the veteran can't deliver it himself," said Mishler.

A similar program runs for Mother's Day. The veterans can select a card and a scarf, or a card and a handkerchief. The Auxiliary pays for these items, and postage, out of poppy sales, also.

In addition to these programs, the Auxiliary

also has scholarships available through the school system. Also, they have an essay contest for 8th graders on Americanism every year.

"This year we had 87 essays entered in the contest, 500 words or less, on "Liberty, what it means to me". Jodi Culp won first place, Jeanne Whittaker, second place and David Cleavland earned third place. The first place essay was sent on to the district contest. The winner's of that contest will be announced in June," Mishler said.

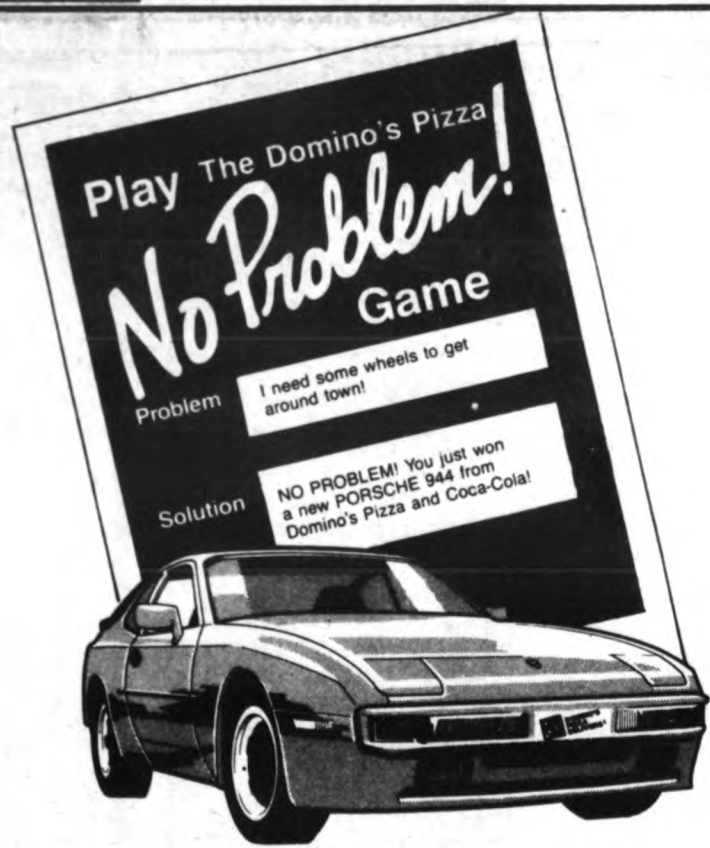

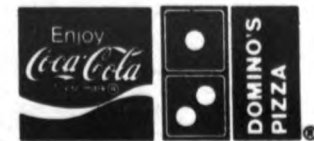

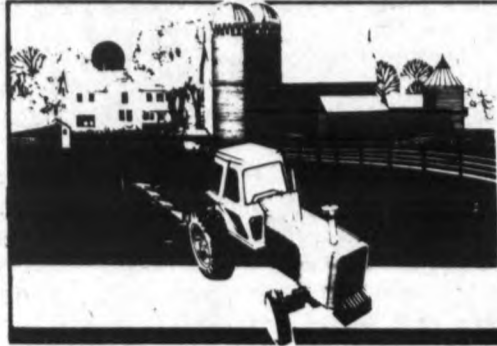

Haying and Grazing act approved

Clinton County has been approved for Haying and Grazing on Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) for 1985 crop year. This request by the Clinton County ASC Committee was approved by the Michigan State ASC Committee because of:

1. Unfavorable conditions during the 1984 growing season that substantially reduced normal production and pasture development.

2. Above normal use of hay stocks during the winter of 1984-1985 because of severe weather conditions and lack of fall pastures.

This approval of Haying and Grazing of 1985 ACR will:

A. Alleviate current shortage of hay.

B. Allow producers to replenish depleted hay stocks.

C. Alleviate shortages of hay and pasture that may occur during the remainder of the 1985 crop year.

To be eligible to participate producers must:

1. Sign a register at the County Office.

2. Designate the ACR acreage on a photo.

3. Record intended use of ACR: **Grazing**-By a producers own livestock, or by another producers livestock. **Mechanical Harvesting**-For feeding producers' own livestock, or for feeding another producers' livestock.

The County Office will verify ACR eligibility before County Committee will approve registered applicants.

The following are conditions of special Haying and Grazing of 1985 ACR:

To remain eligible for program benefits, participants who request grazing or mechanical harvesting of approved cover on 1985 ACR shall not:

1. Remove cover to the extent that acreage is not adequately protected from wind and water erosion.

2. Permit grazing or mechanical harvest of

wildlife food plots or wildlife habitat.

3. Charge for the value of growth pastured off or mechanically harvested when used by another producer.

4. Graze or mechanically harvest cover established with ACP funds until the growth is well established.

Protection critical in chemical use

Few chemicals used on the farm at this time of year are more dangerous than anhydrous ammonia. A moment's carelessness can result in permanent injury.

"The most abused safety factor is failure to wear gloves and goggles--the minimum in personal protection--when transferring anhydrous ammonia," says Howard Doss, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service Agricultural safety specialist.

Several factors make anhydrous ammonia a potential personal threat: its extremely

cold temperature, which can freeze skin tissue on contact; its caustic nature, which can burn skin; its attraction to moisture (this means anhydrous ammonia will be readily attracted to lungs and eyes); and the extreme pressure under which it is stored. Even a pinhole leak can be a serious hazard.

The goggles should completely cover the eyes and be tight fitting. Ordinary glasses will afford little protection. The gloves should be designed for handling anhydrous ammonia. Never use ordinary household or work gloves. Purchase proper

Although there are no mosquitos yet, mosquito season is fast approaching. If you haven't had your horses vaccinated for Eastern Equine Encephalomyelitis (EEE), you should contact your veterinarian as soon as possible to have this done. Vaccination of your horses before mosquito season begins is strongly recommended because the vaccine takes 10 days to 2 weeks to become effective.

What is EEE? EEE is a mosquito-transmitted viral disease of horses, mules, donkeys, and ponies. It also infects man, birds, reptiles and other mammals.

The bird is considered the chief wildlife reservoir from which the virus is picked up by insects, mainly mosquitos during blood feeding. The virus multiplies in the mosquito. Infected mosquitos then transmit the virus to man and horses while feeding on them.

The horse and man are considered the end host for EEE. This means that the concentration of virus particles

in the blood stream of the infected horse and man are quite low, making it highly unlikely that a mosquito will ingest the virus. This indicates that there is very little danger of transmission of EEE from horse to horse or from horse to man by way of mosquito bite. The mosquito must bite an infected bird or small mammal first.

When the virus infects a horse, it invades the brain tissue and spinal cord, and disrupts their function. The horse experiences a rise in temperature, becomes depressed and develops a poor appetite. The horse then has trouble eating and drinking and typically becomes uncoordinated before going into convulsions and either dying or requiring euthanasia.

The most effective means of control is preventative control. This includes vaccinating the horse for EEE prior to the mosquito season and employing an effective mosquito control program.

Webster Industries from Massachusetts will provide a \$1,000.00 to a 4-H member in a food preservation project who plans a career in nutrition, food service or a related field.

Two \$1,000.00 scholarships toward a career in agriculture, home economics, or a closely related field are being provided by the American Animal Breeders Association.

The recipients must be high school seniors or freshmen in college who have completed one year of 4-H work in a rabbit project.

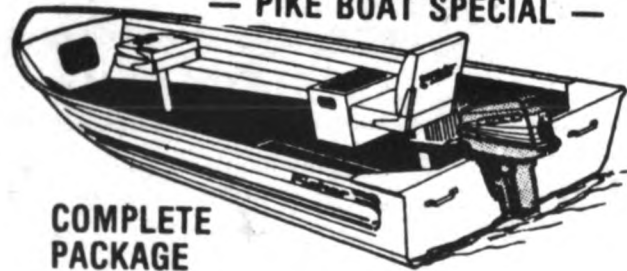

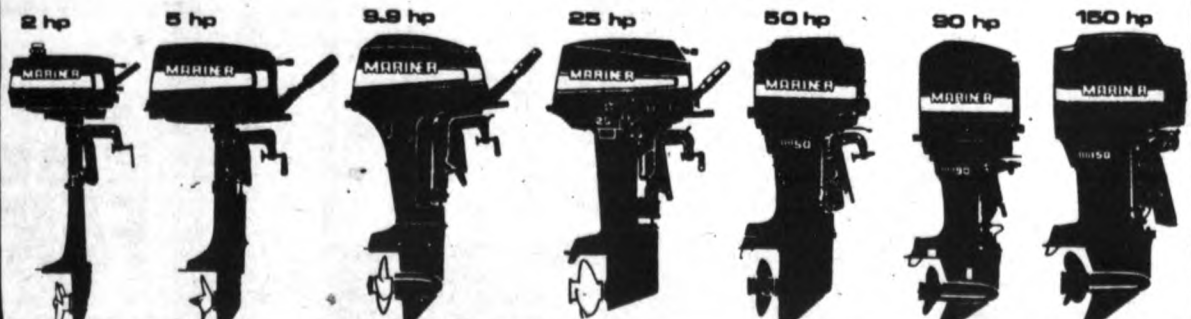

water, the water should be changed daily. Carry a small plastic eyewash bottle filled with water in a shirt pocket for immediate use in case of a blast of anhydrous ammonia in the face.

If liquid ammonia touches the skin or eyes, the affected area should be immediately and continuously flushed with copious amounts of water for at least 15 minutes. Use only water for first aid treatment—do not apply ointments or powders to the affected area.

"If any kind of an accident with anhydrous ammonia occurs, the individual should not delay in seeing a doctor. I know of at least one farmer who inhaled anhydrous ammonia and did not get medical attention. Today, that individual's lungs are so filled with scar tissue that he is dependent on

an oxygen bottle and is no longer farming," said Doss.

The anhydrous ammonia nurse tank and the field applicator should be checked daily.

Nurse tank leaks are most likely to occur at breakaway connectors, the shut-off valve, the bleeder valve, the safety valve, the transfer hose, the quick-release valve and the applicator hoses.

Replace hoses that have surface cracks, bubbles, soft spots or bulges, and hoses that have been kinked or flattened. If any of the components on the applicator or nurse tank have been damaged or fail to work properly, replace them with equipment or parts that are designed for anhydrous ammonia. Do not attempt to make temporary repairs. If the proper replacement

parts are not on the farm, get them from the anhydrous ammonia dealer.

It is not unusual for the applicator tubes to get plugged up. Always treat them as if they contained pressurized ammonia. They often do.

Each time the nurse tank is filled, check the liquid level gauge and pressure gauge. The gauges should be working properly and be consistent in their readings. Do not use nurse tanks with faulty gauges. Faulty gauges are usually repaired or replaced at the anhydrous ammonia supply facility.

Whenever anyone is applying anhydrous ammonia, co-workers and others should be informed of that person's schedule. In order that they can stay clear of the spraying operation.

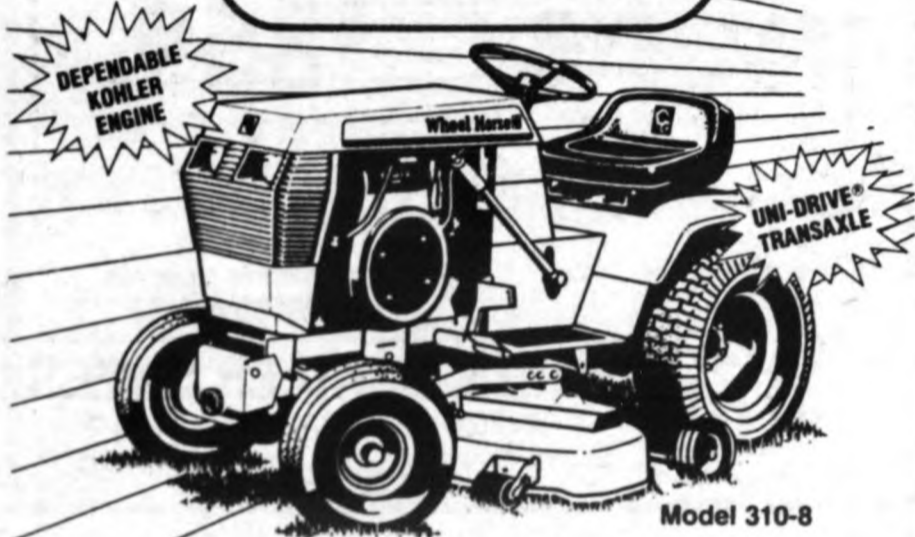

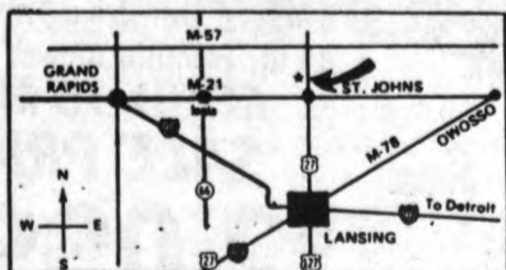

Stay cool in summer's heat

Family Focus

Before you rush out and buy an air conditioner to battle an unexpected heat wave this summer, check around your house to see what things you can do to make yourself cooler and more comfortable without air conditioning.

Every household can keep cooler inexpensively by opening windows and doors only during the coolest part of the day and by shading closed windows during the day.

Cutting the amount of time you run hot water for showers, use stove ovens or burners, or turn on television sets or lights can also decrease the heat produced in your home and increase comfort.

However, if you've tried these suggestions and you still feel that your family needs to invest in an air conditioner, take the concept of "investment" seriously. Investing more money initially in a more efficient model can save money over time because of lower electric usage.

How do you find out what models are more efficient? Check the labels. Every room air conditioner carries a yellow Energy guide label that contains an Energy Efficiency Rating (EER), which rates how much heat a conditioner can remove in an hour for the watts of electricity it uses.

The EER is determined by dividing the watts of electricity into the amount of heat removed. The EER will be

higher for more efficient units. For example, a model with an EER of 8.8 and the capacity to remove 10,000 BTUs of heat per hour from a room would use 25 percent less electricity than a model that could remove the same amount of BTUs but has an EER of 6.6

If you feel you must use your air conditioner frequently, investing in an efficient model (higher EER) can cut operating costs. Operating the unit efficiently will also help keep electric costs down. Set the thermostat no lower than 78 degrees F, and follow manufacturer's instructions for care, cleaning, lubricating and changing filters to keep your air conditioner running efficiently.

Be sure you select a room air conditioner that is the correct size for the job it has to do. One that is too small won't remove enough heat and one that is too large won't remove enough humidity and may make the room feel chilly and damp.

You can get information from your dealer on how to estimate your cooling load based on such factors as room size and construction, orientation to the sun, and other influences on the amount of heat likely to be produced in the room.

If you're thinking of buying a central air conditioning unit to be connected to furnace ductwork, your dealer can also help you calculate the cooling capacity you

need and choose the most efficient model for your home.

Check the wiring needs of a unit and compare these needs with the available circuits in your house. You may find that you need to have heavier wiring installed for a large capacity unit. If the unit requires as much as 1,500 watts, it may have to be on a circuit alone. Install the unit carefully, following manufacturer's instructions, and make sure there are no air leaks around it. By following these tips, your air conditioner will be an investment that will keep you satisfied for years to come.

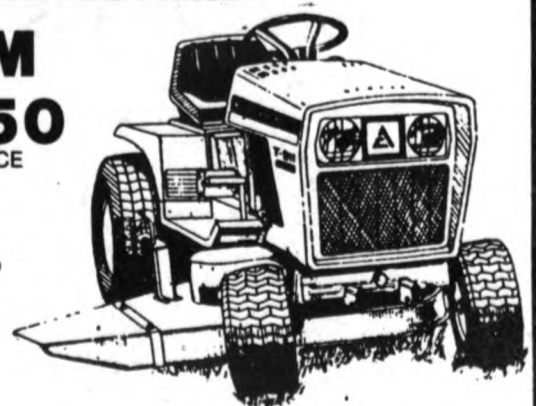

Agricultural accidents can be costly in more than one way

During periods of financial strain, farm managers need to make an extra effort to minimize hazards and risks that can lead to accidents and huge medical bills.

"An accident that prevents someone from working is costly, especially on a farm," says Howard Doss, Extension agricultural safety specialist at Michigan State University. "The costs of an accident to a family member in care and lost work could push a family over the financial breaking point, especially if the one injured is the primary operator," he says.

Accidents are more likely to occur when people are under stress, because they tend to be distracted by their problems and not concentrating on what they are working on at the moment.

Costs due to accidents can add up quickly, Doss says. In one case, a 12-year-old boy lost an arm in a piece of farm machinery. The resulting costs for the hospital stay, surgery, rehabilitation and other incidentals totaled \$143,559 one year later.

If the accident had necessitated hiring

replacement labor, farm modifications in response to a permanent disability, or lost wages, the total cost of the accident would have been even higher.

In the best conditions, these huge expenses could plunge a family into debt. But when a family is already under financial pressure, these costs could lead to bankruptcy, Doss says.

To avoid this situation, all possible measures should be taken to reduce farm hazards and risks. Make sure every family member and hired laborer knows and follows all of the proper farm safety procedures, and never allow a child to try a job he/she is not ready or able to do.

Doss says having family health insurance is mandatory, no matter how financially strapped the operation is. Health coverage can provide the necessary cushion to keep the farm afloat if an accident should occur.

Identifying potential farm hazards can save operators from injuries that are costly physically and financially.

"Reducing risks and hazards is the first step toward preventing farm accidents," says Doss.

To begin, farm owners/managers need to identify all of the potential hazards on their farm by listing the risks, existing or potential, to which farm workers are exposed. This inventory includes hazards involving the use of farm equipment and facilities and exposure to dangerous situations, Doss says.

For example, a farmer could list driving the tractor on a public road, places and situations where animal bites or kicks are possible, or a health risk due to crop spraying.

The next step is to rank each hazard by severity and frequency, Doss says. Then, starting with the top priority, look for ways to reduce or eliminate these risks.

In some cases, a hazard can simply be removed. For example, a major cause of farm accidents can be eliminated by never allowing a second person, especially children, to ride on a tractor, Doss says.

When an accident hazard can't be totally avoided, managers should seek ways to

minimize risk. Performing regular machine maintenance, using a slow-moving vehicle emblem on tractors when driving on public roads and not working when fatigued are all ways of reducing the likelihood of an accident.

Changing work habits is another way of cutting accident risks, Doss says. Often operators use procedures they know are not the correct or safe way of doing a task, but they have always done it that way without getting hurt. Though operators may

have avoided an accident so far, those shortcuts do increase the possibility of injury, he says.

Protection from some farm hazards consists of wearing proper safety gear and following recommended safety procedures.

Sport fishing safety tips are important to follow

Safety.
Now that the sport fishing season has opened in Michigan, it should be the first thing on anglers' minds.

As Michigan's one million-plus licensed anglers move out on the state's lakes and streams, Michigan United Conservation Clubs (MUCC) reminds them to plan ahead, employ common sense, use the right equipment, and above all, remember the rules for safe fishing.

Jim Wood, MUCC southern field representative, says danger is one of the last things that sport fishermen think about when preparing for a trip, but "they should be aware that danger exists and plan accordingly."

Wood says rapidly changing weather conditions pose the greatest danger to anglers whether they fish from a boat or wade close to shore. He recommends that fishermen pay close attention to condi-

tions and move to safety at the first sign of threatening weather.

"When the wind picks up and you see the sky darkening, move quickly to get off the lake or out of the river," Wood cautions. "If you're wading, get out of the water immediately. If you're in a boat, get to shore as quickly as possible, beach the boat in a safe place, and move to an open area away from trees, fences, or other tall objects. If you see lightning, lie flat until the storm passes."

Falling overboard and drowning is another danger faced by anglers, but according to MUCC northern field representative Ray Rustem, the danger can be cut significantly if anglers observe a few simple rules.

"Anglers should always wear a life jacket, buoyant fishing vest, or other flotation device no matter where they are fishing," Rustem advises. "Even

if the person cannot swim, the flotation device will keep his or her head above water until the angler can be rescued or reach safety on his or her own."

Rustem advises wading anglers to secure their waders with a belt around the waist to trap air and prevent water from rushing in if they should fall. He cautions wading anglers who do slip under the surface to remain calm and avoid fighting the current.

"Many people think that if fall in the water with waders you will sink like a rock. You don't. If you stay calm you will float right to the top, every time," Rustem says. "Once you reach the surface, try to stay vertical and begin a slow, steady breast stroke until you reach shallow water or shore."

Since cuts, bruises, and other injuries are common in outdoor activity, MUCC advises

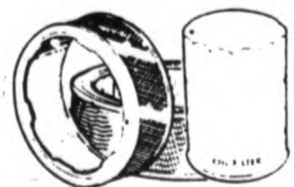

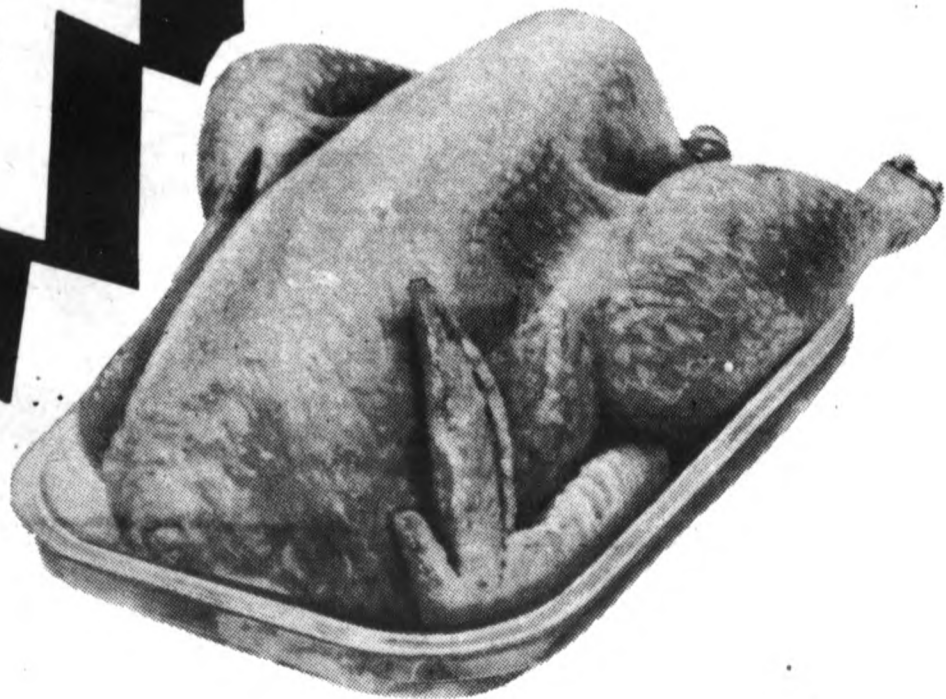

(Continued from page 7B) anglers to include a well-stocked first aid kit when preparing for an outing. In addition to the standard first aid items, the kit should include antibiotic cream and isopropyl alcohol to clean and dress wounds.

Wood says anglers often puncture their fingers or hands on fish fins when handling their catch. Because the outer coating of fish bodies is mildly toxic, the injured area can become sore and in-

flamed overnight. "If you cut your finger or hand while handling fish, wash the area immediately," Wood advises. "Apply alcohol or antibiotic cream to the injury and wrap it with a bandage to prevent infection."

(Continued from page 13B) when a fish is landed, thrashed in an attempt to escape, and the hook becomes imbedded in the angler's flesh. The MUCC staffer advises anglers to carefully remove the hook from the lure and follow a simple procedure for removing the embedded hook.

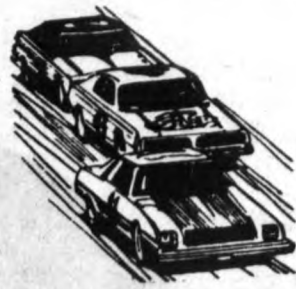
"Begin by placing a loop of 30-pound test line over the bend of the hook and wrapping the

line around your hand. While holding the injured area steady, push down and back on the eye of the hook and give a quick hand jerk on the line. The hook should come out of the same hole it entered," Wood says. "Apply an antibiotic cream and cover the wound with a bandage."

Wood says if the hook is embedded near an eye, the lure should be carefully removed.
