Vandals destroy vehicles

Early in the morning on May 2, 16 vehicles in three different locations in St. Johns were vandalized, and some vehicles were seriously damaged, according to St. Johns Police Department.

At Bee's Chevrolet-Olds-Dodge, on U.S.-27, six vehicles were

damaged. Vandalism of the vehicles included slashed tires, smashed head and tail lights, punctured gas tanks and taken were hub caps and trim rims.

At the St. Johns School Districts Bus Garage, on M-21, six buses were vandalized. Damage to the vehicles included siphoned gas, broken radios and pulled wires.

Behind the St. Johns High School, four vehicles were damaged, three of which belonged to the school. The vandals slashed tires on all the cars. The front seat of one vehicle was slashed and the instrument panel smashed.

The series of vandalism is still under investigation by the St. Johns Police Department.

Trial date determined

After a preliminary examination at the District Court May 2, Michael Ernest Trofatter was bound over to stand trial for the charge of first degree

murder in Circuit Court, May 13.

Trofatter, of Grand Ledge, is being tried in connection with the shotgun murder of Allen Pease, 35, of 15402 Temple in Bath, Dec. 8.

Trofatter was named as Pease's killer by his

sister, Rebecca Trofatter, who, along with her four-year old daughter, was living with Pease at the time of his death.

Pease was killed by a single shotgun blast to the head after an alleged argument with Trofatter.

Legion to sell poppies on May 16, 17 and 18

On May 16, 17 and 18, the red crepe paper poppy will be offered to the public by the American Legion Auxiliary. This reminder of the sacrifice of countless thousands in four wars is an annual event undertaken by the members of Edwin T. Stiles Unit 153 in St. Johns.

Volunteers from the Unit will once again take part in this nationwide program in memory of the citizen soldiers who gave their lives in the cause of freedom.

Funds collected on Poppy Days are used to assist the needy veteran and his family. It is a self-help program for the Auxiliary's familiar red paper poppy is hand-made in Poppy Shops run by Auxiliary volunteers. In these shops, disabled and hospitalized veterans make the flowers by hand, petal by petal. It is part of a physical and

psychological therapy program by veterans for veterans. These poppies are purchased from the shop by the Auxiliary and offered to the public, not at a price, but for a contribution...a few cents to say America remembers.

This memorial flower was adopted by the American Legion Auxiliary in 1920 and since that time, programs have been conducted throughout the United States each year.

Contributions made on Poppy Days are used by the local Unit to aid

needy veterans and their families in the community and in hospitals throughout the state. All proceeds are channeled directly into the rehabilitation and welfare work for children and youth.

Auxiliary members from Edwin T. Stiles Unit 153 of St. Johns, will ask the public to pause for a moment, put on a poppy, and wear it with pride, remembering the civilian who took an oath to serve his country and gave his life so that America would survive today.

Fowler schoolboard to meet

A special Fowler Public School Board of Education meeting will be held May 13, 8 p.m., to receive the results of the recent Project Outreach Community Survey.

The official report and results will be presented to the Board by Mike Ward, representing the Michigan Department of Education.

Fowler Schools mailed out 670 surveys to residents in the district and received back 322 responses. They have been tabulated and now

the complete report will be presented to the Board.

All residents are welcome to attend this open meeting, hear the report, and then participate in the discussion. This would be an excellent meeting to voice opinions about the operation of the district and hear what others have said. Highlights of the report will be published in an edition of the Eagle Flyer sometime in May.

Prior to the meeting, at 7:30 p.m., there will

be a half hour meeting to explain the millage proposals which will appear on the June 10 election ballots.

At the April 22 board meeting the Board voted to put two millage questions on the ballot. The first will be a 24 mill proposal for basic operations. This proposal includes the 23 mill renewal plus one additional mill for operations. The second proposal is a renewal of the half mill (.5) for high school roof repairs.

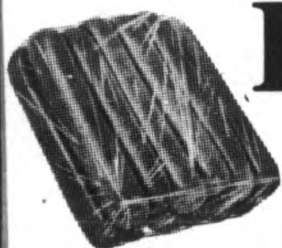

Fowler determines millage proposals

The Fowler Board of Education, at its April 22 meeting, formally adopted two millage propositions for the June 10 school election.

The first proposition will be a 24 mill, one year levy, for basic operations. This proposition will be a 23 mill levy which expired and

one additional mill. The extra mill is needed to maintain the current program, since Fowler expects to lose 40 students from this year's total of 653. The loss of 40 students completely wipes out the anticipated increase in state aid for 1985-86.

The second proposition is a renewal of the

half-mil (.5) levy which is earmarked for high school roof repair. The \$20,000 generated from this proposal will be

combined with \$20,000 from energy funds to insulate and repair a portion of the leaky high school roof.

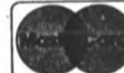

A donation of \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for students (no charge for pre-schoolers) is being asked for the 7:30 p.m. performance, May 9.

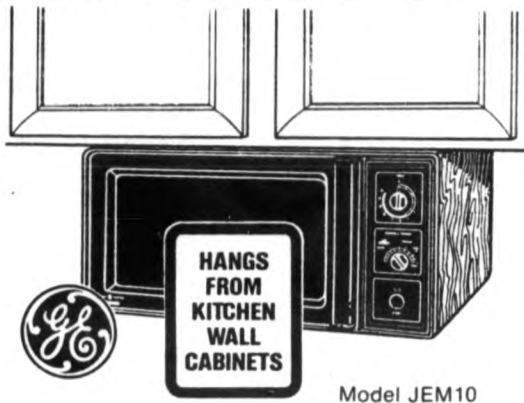

Mushroom picking set for May start

One-half million persons are expected to tramp through aspen stands, forests of hardwoods and meadows this spring in search of Michigan's most delectable fungi—the morel mushroom, according to AAA Michigan.

More than six morel species flourish in the state during the May picking season, but two edible varieties primarily are sought in Michigan each spring. Black morels are most abundant in the nor-

thern half of the state while white morels are plentiful in many hardwood forests throughout Michigan.

Most sources surveyed by AAA expect the mushrooms will appear by the first or second week of May and last through early June. This year's crop is expected to be better than the last and possibly at peak production.

Weather determines the quality of morel growth and this year's

warm and rainy conditions in many areas have been near ideal.

Hunters should learn to distinguish edible morels from poisonous mushrooms which often grow nearby and not to pick them if uncertain. Morels are noted for deep, irregularly spaced pits on a hollow top attached at its base to a hollow stem.

A Michigan Department of Natural Resources guide describes and recom-

mends three types of morels for eating among Michigan's 2,500 mushroom species. It is available free by calling (517) 373-1220.

Help in identifying edible morels is offered at mushroom festivals and Art Fair, May 11-12, Boyne City; Mushroom Festival and Harrison; and Mushroom Mania, May 11-12 and 18-19, Grayling.

Major events are the Mesick Mushroom

Festival, May 4-11; Morel Mushroom Festival, May 11, Lewiston; National Mushroom Hunting Championship, May 11-12, Boyne City; Mushroom Festival and Art Fair, May 11-12, Harrison; and Mushroom Mania, May 11-12 and 18-19, Grayling.

Up to date morel information is available

from local chambers of commerce and festival organizers.

Morel hunters are advised to use scissors or a sharp knife to cut the mushrooms just above the ground. Then, pan fry with butter and eat the tasty morsels as soon as possible after collecting them in a basket or paper bag. Morels stored in plastic bags will spoil quickly.

What is the new drug Panadol?

Panadol is touted as a new aspirin-free pain reliever that was recently introduced into the United States market. However, the main ingredient of Panadol is acetaminophen, which is the same ingredient that is in Tylenol, Datril, Anacin-3 and others. Thus, Panadol really is not a "new" drug, but rather a newly-marketed brand of acetaminophen, which was first introduced in the 1950's.

As many of you know, acetaminophen is a non-narcotic pain reliever (does not contain codeine-like products) and antipyretic (reduces fever). Acetaminophen is considered equivalent to that of aspirin in the treatment of pain and fever.

It is important for patients to note that acetaminophen is now the drug of choice for the treatment of discomfort and fever in young children.

Acetaminophen has not been associated with the increased risks to Reyes Syndrome that aspirin has been linked to.

Although Panadol capsules are not appropriate for children, liquid Panadol and other liquid acetaminophens are available with appropriate child dosages (i.e., Tempra, Tylenol, Liquiprin, and others).

In summary, Panadol is just another brand of acetaminophen, equivalent to Tylenol, Datril and other acetaminophen products. So, if you are comfortable and satisfied with the brand you are currently using, there is no need to switch brands.

Patients are advised to be cautious before using any products promoted in advertising as being "new". Many times it is merely an attempt to re-market a product that has been used for years. However, if you have any questions regarding a "new" medication, ask your pharmacist or

physician. They will be able to answer questions you might have.

Pharmacists participating in the statewide Patient Education Program can also supply you with written information on your prescription medications.

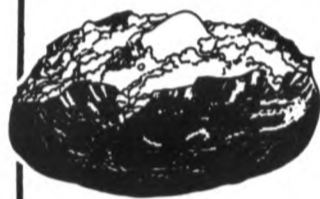



At the present time, our County Jail is authorized to hold up to 42 male prisoners, but since the first of the year, the inmate population has swelled to 60 on several occasions. This has placed a great strain on our facility and personnel alike. Working under these conditions takes an extra special type of person and we salute the dispatch/corrections officers at the Clinton County Jail.

LEGISLATION

During the 1984 legislative term, I introduced a number of bills designed to strengthen Michigan's business community. Among the bills signed into law are:

SB 341--(Regulatory Flexibility) A bill that will give special consideration to small to medium-sized businesses when state agencies establish regulatory standards. The state agency considering promulgating a rule must now study the special impact of that rule on small and medium-sized businesses and develop alternative methods of implementation, if possible, to lessen the regulatory burden for this class of businesses.

SB 812--This bill provides relief for businesses who accept a "bad check" for goods and services rendered. If a bad check is passed, the payee must make a written demand for the amount due. If the maker fails to pay within 30 days, he can be assessed damages double the amount of the check. The judgment shall be more than \$50 and less than \$500. Claims over \$500 are brought for the amount of the check.

SB 816--This bill raises the amount of damages that can be sought in Small Claims Court from \$500 to \$1,000. On January 1, 1986, it will go up to \$1,500. It is hoped that this increase will make it economical for businesses to collect unpaid bills without the legal expense involved with a District Court claim.

SB 344--This bill requires state agencies to provide an economic

impact statement before proposed rules can be promulgated. Such a statement is designed to inform the agency and Administrative Rules Committee of the potential economic impact of administrative rules on Michigan's small business community.

SB 714--The Prudent Purchaser Agreement (PPA) is a new approach to health care financing. This approach allows third-party payers to act as prudent buyers of health care services. The prudent purchasers enter into agreements with health care providers who can deliver quality services economically. It is hoped that this approach will maintain health care quality while reducing the cost of health care programs.

STATE ESTABLISHES FREE ADVERTISING FOR MICHIGAN PRODUCTS

The State of Michigan is pioneering a computer marketplace to enable Michigan suppliers and Michigan buyers to do business

with each other. The computer network is called the Michigan Products Information Exchange, and it will start operations in August with product information from 7,000 small and mid-sized Michigan businesses. Companies can list their products at no cost. Michigan will be the first state in the nation to assemble a computer database and use the latest technology to create new markets for the state's products. (Outside firms will be able to access this information for potential product acquisitions.) Please contact: Interchange Plus, Co., Menominee, Michigan, 49858 or call (906)863-2611.

NEW BUSINESS ATTRACTIONS

125 companies received assistance by industrial agents to locate in Michigan. 73 of those new companies actually opened shop in Michigan during 1984. The result will be an estimated 13,280 new jobs when the facilities are in full operation. The dollar investment is estimated to be \$1 billion.

The highlight is Mazda corporation's decision to locate a \$450 million assembly plant in Michigan will infuse 3,500 to 4,000 jobs into the economy when full production is reached. By 1990, the effects will magnify the construction, autosupply and local service sectors.

TRADE SHOWS

Trade shows can be crowded, hectic and

confusing. But, they are great opportunities for firms prepared to identify valid prospects quickly and get a sales message across. Surveys indicate that within three minutes a sales representative at a trade show will know if he or she is talking to a buyer. The result is a quick and effective buy/sell approach for large volume deals.

In Tokyo, Japan, 27 Michigan companies are taking part in the first one-state consumer products promotion ever held in the Japanese capital. This is an opportunity for Michigan companies to market their products to the sophisticated Japanese shopper.

BUSINESS PEOPLE ARE UP IN ARMS!


...over tough new IRS record-keeping requirements on business use of automobiles. To qualify for an investment tax credit and accelerated depreciation, taxpayers (companies, employees who use their own cars on company business and the self-

employed) must now keep "adequate, detailed records" showing mileage, and the purpose of each business trip in a car. The law previously required only "sufficient evidence", which was subject to broad interpretation. Efforts are now under way to modify or repeal this law through pressure on our U.S. Congressman.

SUMMARY OF THE MICHIGAN SINGLE BUSINESS TAX

The Single Business Tax (SBT) is a consumption-based, value-added tax. This makes Michigan unique among the 50 states in its tax treatment of business. While other states impose a tax on

Congressman Bill Schuette

Congressman Bill Schuette has taken action to protect farm exports from the cargo preference law.

Cargo preference rules require that whenever the government is involved with

export cargo, at least half of that cargo must be shipped on U.S. vessels. A recent federal court ruling expanded these requirements to all blended-credit exports, causing the Agriculture Department to suspend

\$536 million worth of U.S. commodities scheduled for foreign shipment.

"I am cosponsoring two bills to exempt commodity exports from the devastating cargo preference law," said Congressman Schuette. "That law really hurts farm exports.

"Trade embargos, falling prices, plummeting land values, high interest rates and unfair foreign trade restrictions and subsidies have seriously

damaged American farmers. Further trade cutbacks brought about by the application of cargo preference will hurt U.S. farmers even more, and foreign competitors will quickly replace us in the international markets."

Recently Congressman Schuette urged U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter to establish a "level playing field" so U.S. farmers can compete on an even footing with foreign producers.

corporate profits, the SBT is a tax on the value added of a firm, that is, the value of its sales minus what is purchased from other taxable firms. The tax base is arrived at by using the addition method. This means the tax is on the firm's payments to the factors of production, (i.e., interest, wages, and profits). Rent is excluded. The rate is 2.35 percent, however, there are a number of provisions which lower the effective rate.

Since the SBT is consumption based, there is a 100 percent capital acquisition deduction which is taken the year capital is acquired. Depreciation and interest are then taxable.

Some of the important provisions which cause the tax to deviate from a pure value-added tax are:

- 1) the exemption of the first \$40,000 base from taxation.
- 2) the small business-low profit credit which reduces the tax for firms with gross receipts of less than \$6 million and profits less than \$450,000.
- 3) exemption of agricultural activity.
- 4) limitation of the base to 50 percent of gross receipts.
- 5) the labor intensity reduction whereby firms whose compensation exceeds 63 percent of the tax base.

SBT collections are usually about one percent of state personal income, although they were slightly higher in fiscal year 1984. This translates to between \$1 billion and \$1.25 billion per year. The SBT collections go to the state General Fund except for a portion to reimburse local units for giving up the property tax on inventories (about \$170 million in fiscal year 1984).

The President's economic policies, combined with the efforts of business-oriented legislators here in Michigan, will continue to strengthen the position of small business and stimulate its profitability and growth.

I plan to continue to be at the forefront of helping businesses by sup-

porting and introducing fiscally responsible legislation which will benefit us all.

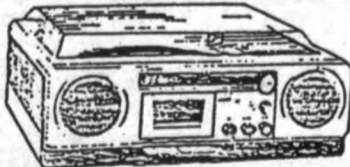

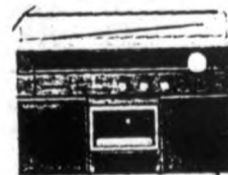

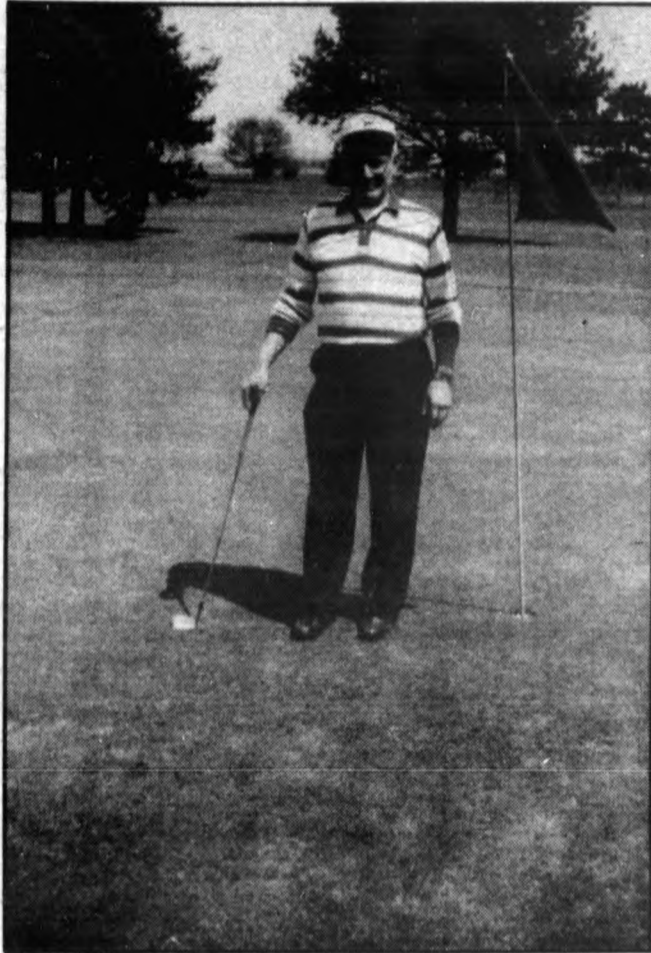

Clinton Memorial Hospital

Cardiac services expanded at hospital

Clinton Memorial Hospital in St. Johns has expanded its cardiopulmonary services with the addition of echocardiography.

"The addition of echocardiography will allow area residents the convenience of the service close to home," explained Jim Gunther, Director of Cardiopulmonary Services at Clinton Memorial.

Echocardiography is an examination of the heart using sound waves

and will show any existing abnormalities of the heart. The exam itself is painless and entirely free from radiation. It is similar to ultra-sound exams performed by the hospital's Radiology Department used to evaluate a fetus, gall bladder and other structures.

The echocardiogram machine is also capable of "doppler evaluation". Doppler allows physicians to evaluate the health of the heart,

arteries, and veins by projecting special types of sound waves into these structures.

Echocardiography services at Clinton Memorial are coordinated through Cardiopulmonary Services and are conducted by the Mid-Michigan Medical Group. Board-certified physicians in the group are also on the Consulting Medical Staff at Clinton Memorial.

The echocardiogram

machine is operated by a sonographer, with the results of the exam interpreted by physicians with the Mid-Michigan Medical Group. A report is then sent to the referring or family physician the same day.

"A lot of the exams will be done on an outpatient basis," explained Gunther. "But, inpatients will also benefit by not having to leave the community for this service."

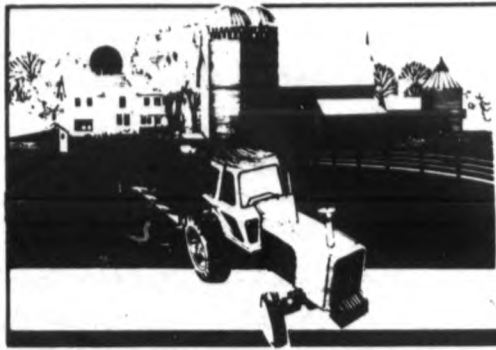

Farm News

Pre-measure acres then plant crops

Before planting spring crops that may be covered by acreage reduction and land diversion programs in 1985, Pete LoDico of ASCS advises farmers to request pre-measurement of their acreages.

"One gamble that a farmer should never take is the loss of program benefits because of failure to comply with acreage requirements," LoDico said. "To be eligible for price support loans, target prices

and other program benefits, farm program participants are required to report actual planted acreages."

Before crop planting time, ASCS will stake and measure any type of acreage, or portions thereof, that a farmer requests. To be assured that program requirements are met, producers must plant within the stakes that are placed when the land is pre-measured.

County farmers enroll 71,135 acres in 1985 farm programs

When the 1985 farm program sign-up period ended April 1, Clinton County farmers had enrolled 71,135 acres, or 63 percent of their eligible wheat and feed grains acres in the acreage reduction programs.

Pete LoDico, Clinton County Executive Director of ASCS, said Clinton County producers enrolled 704 farms in the programs and agreed to take out of production, at least 30

percent of their wheat and 10 percent of their feed grain base acres.

"This means that as much as 11,100 acres of cropland in Clinton County could be idled this year, depending on how many acres of program crops are planted by participants," LoDico said. "The cropland taken out of production must be devoted to an acreage conservation reserve to protect it from wind and water erosion he said."

Crop base acres enrolled in the 1985 farm programs include 51,092 acres of feed grains and 20,043 acres of wheat.

Designed to control excess crop supplies and maintain a level of stocks in line with market demand, the acreage reduction programs offered incentives to farmers to reduce plantings. Program participants will be eligible for price support loans at \$3.23 a

bushel for wheat, \$2.50 for corn, \$2.07 for barley and \$1.31 for oats. They are also eligible for target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.60 for barley, \$1.60 for oats and \$4.38 for wheat.

In addition to the above benefits, wheat participants will be eligible for land diversion payments. These payments compensate farmers for taking land out of production in addition to the acreage reduction requirements," the ASCS official said.

Corn producers get payment

Corn producers who participated in the 1984 acreage reduction programs received deficiency payments for the crop, according to Pete LoDico, County Executive Director of ASCS. Checks totaling an estimated \$1,152,783 have been issued to 438 farmers in Clinton County this month.

Deficiency payments are made when the na-

tional average price received by farmers during the first five months of the marketing year for a program crop falls below the government-established target price for that crop. Nationally, farmers received a weighted average market price of \$2.60 per bushel for corn during the first five months of the marketing year.

LoDico said eligible

farmers received deficiency payments at a rate of 43 cents per bushel for corn. The payments are computed by multiplying the program yield for the farm by acres planted for harvest times the payment rate.

Nationally, ASCS will disburse about \$1.7 billion in deficiency payments for 1984-crop corn and sorghum.

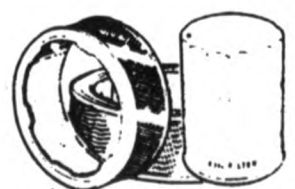

Clover Clippings

Snacking is a popular activity among Michigan young people. According to the Michigan Early Adolescent Survey, completed in 1983, more than 63 percent of the young people surveyed said they made snacks after school or in the evening almost every day.

What kinds of snacks were they eating? Cookies topped the list, with vegetables and cheese at the bottom of the list of popular snack foods. One-third of the youths reported that they snacked on soft drinks. These are not the best choices for snacks that contribute to good nutrition.

Smart snacking is important, especially during early adolescence, when growth is rapid and nutrient needs are high. The nutrients calcium, vitamin A, vitamin C, and iron are often low in a young person's diet. Creating healthful, good-tasting snacks can be easy with a little imagination.

Now might be a good time to try some new, nutritious snacks for your family, while kids are more active with lots of outdoor activities during the spring and summer and may not take time out to eat nutritious meals.

Try these quick,

nutritious, delicious snacks:

Merry-go-Rounds: Core apples and slice into thin rounds. Spread with peanut butter and top with raisins.

Cheesy Corn: Top hot popcorn with grated cheddar cheese for added calcium.

Frozen Juice Cubes: Freeze your favorite unsweetened 100 percent fruit juice in ice cube trays. Insert toothpick or popsicle stick before cubes are completely frozen.

Energy Shake: If calories are not a concern, combine milk, ice cream and a favorite fruit for a nutritious alternative to soft drinks.

Mini-pizzas: Top crackers with a small amount of pizza or tomato sauce. Add your choice of toppings and grated mozzarella cheese. Cook over medium heat in a covered skillet or bake five minutes at 375 degrees until cheese melts.

Agricultural News

The utility company electrical distribution line running through your farm on the familiar wood poles has long been a good friend to the farmer. It has made possible labor-saving machinery that simply would not exist without the inexpensive energy source

represented by the line. According to Norm Reese, Ag Engineering, MSU, these lines have also played a part in many unnecessary deaths.

As familiar as these lines are, it is easy to forget they are there, and that can be a serious mistake in these

days of tall CB antenna towers, aluminum ladders, and irrigation pipes, says Reese. Spring is a good time to recap a few simple rules for operating around electrical distribution lines.

1. NEVER erect an antenna tower near such a line. Be absolutely certain that any towers cannot fall close to the line in case of high wind or erection accidents.

2. NEVER handle irrigation pipe vertically under a line. These sections are longer than the

allowable clearance under such a line.

3. DON'T build structures on the distribution line right-of-way. This agreement is filed in the county land records and is quite restrictive concerning use of the land under and near the line.

4. NEVER use metal ladders near a line. Don't plant trees close to the line. If you have any questions concerning what is safe and what is not around these lines, call your electric utility. They will be more than happy to help.

Price supports for milk fall

On April 1, USDA reduced the support price for milk from \$12.60 to \$12.10 per hundredweight, according to Pete LoDico, County Executive Director of ASCS. The support price was reduced under provisions of the Dairy and Tobacco Adjustment Act of 1983, and the reduction coincides with the termination of the 50 cents per hundredweight deduction required by the 1983 Act.

The lower price support is aimed at reducing excessive dairy supplies, bringing supply and demand into a better balance, and lowering program costs. Even with the reduced support price, the Department forecasts net price support purchases by the Commodi-

ty Credit Corporation for the next 12 months at 9.1 billion pounds milk equivalent.

LoDico said the \$12.10 price could remain in effect until September 31, 1985. However, the Dairy and Tobacco Adjustment Act of 1983 authorizes an additional adjustment in the level of price support on July 1, 1985, depending on estimated price support purchases by CCC for the 12-month period beginning on that date.

The new support price is from manufacturing milk, with a milkfat content of 3.67 percent, and

compares with \$11.82 per hundredweight for milk with a milkfat content of 3.5 percent.

Under the dairy price support program, a price is set for manufacturing grade milk. Most fluid grade milk prices are based on prices for manufacturing grade milk in the Minnesota-Wisconsin milk producing area. Consequently, decreases in the support price will be eventually reflected in lower fluid milk prices at the grocery store as well as for most other dairy products, such as cheese and ice cream.

The program authorizes the CCC to purchase butter, cheese and nonfat dry milk at announced prices to enable manufacturing plants, on the average, to pay farmers on amount equal to the support price.

"From the standpoint of the price support program, the milk surplus is the difference between milk marketings and commercial sales." The ASCS official said the new support price will assure an adequate supply of wholesome milk to meet current needs.

After planting, they are required to report their crop acreages to ASCS.

LoDico said pre-measurement is important in helping farmers decide which land to devote to the acreage conservation reserve and which fields to plant.

The service costs \$15 plus 20 cents per acre and includes measur-

ing, referencing and marking fields with stakes prior to planting. Acres. pre-measured by ASCS are guaranteed for the program year.

Other producer services include measuring total cropland, field or sub-divisions to be planted and land areas for other purposes. Fees vary, depending on the type of service rendered.

Bake Cheese Bread. Mix chicken, almonds, olives, celery, pineapple and salt. Mix sour cream and mayonnaise. Mix 1 1/2 cups sour cream mixture into chicken mixture.

Place 1 Cheese Bread, sesame seed side down, on serving plate. Spoon chicken mixture over bread; top with remaining

Cheese Bread, sesame seed side up. Spread remaining sour cream mixture over bread. Cover loosely with aluminum foil. Refrigerate at least 4 hours but no longer than 24 hours.

- 3 cups buttermilk baking mix
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (4 ounces)
- 2 tablespoons sesame seeds
- 1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted

Heat oven to 400°. Mix baking mix, eggs, milk and cheese. Divide dough into halves; pat each half in greased round pan, 9 x 1 1/2 inches. Sprinkle each with 1 tablespoon sesame seed. Pour 2 tablespoons margarine evenly over each. Bake until golden brown, 20 to 25 minutes. Remove from pans; cool.

SALMON STEAKS FLORENTINE

- 2 pounds fresh spinach
- 4 salmon steaks (chinook or atlantic), each about 1 inch thick
- 6 ounces unsalted butter
- juice of 1/2 lemon
- 4 lemon slices
- salt and white pepper
- cayenne pepper
- 1/4 cup heavy cream

Remove stems from spinach and discard any damaged leaves. Wash spinach thoroughly in several waters, and drain well. Pack it in a large saucepan with only the water that clings to the leaves and cover. Cook over high heat until spinach starts to sizzle. Turn it over with a wooden spoon and continue cooking for 8 to 10 minutes, turning as needed. Spinach should be cooked but not discolored. Turn spinach into a colander and press to extract moisture. Chop in the colander to small pieces and leave to drain further.

Preheat broiler to medium. Dot salmon steaks with 2 ounces of the butter and broil for 6 to 8 minutes. Use a wide spatula to turn steaks over and broil for 6 minutes longer, basting with pan juices now and then.

Melt remaining butter in a saucepan and add lemon juice and seasoning to taste. Keep butter sauce warm. Return chopped spinach to the saucepan, pour in the cream, and heat to very hot. Spoon spinach on a deep serving dish and arrange the salmon steaks on top. Pour butter sauce over the salmon, decorate with lemon twists and serve at once.

- 1/2 cup halved seedless green grapes
- 1 tablespoon slivered orange peel
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- Chopped parsley

In a 3-quart saucepan over medium-high heat, in 1/4 cup hot butter, cook green onions until tender, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, drain peaches, reserving syrup. Add water to peach syrup to make 1 cup. Chop enough peaches to make 1/2 cup; reserve remaining peach slices. Add peach liquid, chopped peaches, pecans and stuffing mix to green onions; toss to mix well. Remove from heat; set aside.

With fingers, separate skin from breasts at one end to make a pocket. Spoon stuffing evenly into each pocket. Pull skin over stuffing; secure with toothpick, if necessary. Place breasts in 13- by 9-inch baking dish. Dot with remaining 2 tablespoons butter.

Meanwhile, in small saucepan, combine orange juice and cornstarch. Over medium heat, heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Add remaining peaches, grapes, orange peel and cinnamon. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low. Simmer 5 minutes.

To serve: Spoon fruit sauce over chicken; garnish with parsley.

Tip: To use fresh peaches, poach 4 peaches. Slice peaches; substitute peaches and 1 cup poaching liquid for canned peaches and their syrup.

- 1 cup (1/2 pint) heavy cream
- 1 T. cornstarch
- 12 canned, drained French button mushrooms (champignons de Paris)

Sprinkle chops with salt and pepper. Place in large skillet and cook over high heat until browned on both sides. Add Calvados and set aflame. Add garlic, orange juice and mustard. Cover and simmer chops until tender, about 1 hour. Place chops on platter and keep warm. Mix heavy cream and cornstarch and stir into pan juices. Stir over low heat until sauce bubbles and thickens. ORDINANCE NO. 358

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE V, ZONING AND PLANNING, CHAPTER 51, KNOWN AS THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

That the Zoning Ordinance, and more particularly, Section 5.197 thereof, dealing with the restoration of damaged structures, shall be amended in the following respects:

Section 1. That Section 5.197 shall be amended to read as follows:

5.197 Restoration of Damaged Structures.

A non-conforming building which is partially destroyed in any manner, or from any cause whatsoever, may be restored provided the cost of such restoration does not exceed sixty (60%) percent if a non-conforming residential use, and if the cost of restoration does not exceed (50%) percent for all other non-conforming uses under this Code. No repairs or restoration shall be undertaken, however, unless started within one (1) year from the date of the partial destruction and is diligently carried on to completion once started. If the cost of restoration exceeds sixty (60%) percent of the cost of replacing the entire structure in residential, and fifty (50%) percent of the cost of replacing the entire structure in all other classifications, such structure, when restored, shall comply with all provisions of the district in which it is located, except that, if it is located on a lot with a smaller lot area, or a lesser width of lot than is prescribed for the District in which it is located it need not comply with the provisions of that District for minimum lot area or minimum width of lot, but shall maintain as a minimum, the lot area and lot width existing previous to the damage to the building or structure.

The determination of replacement cost shall be made by the Zoning Administrator according to the standards adopted by the St. Johns Board of Appeals.

Section 2. The City Commission has predicated this amendment upon recommendation of the St. Johns Planning Commission as a result of the Planning Commission Meeting held March 7, 1985.

Section 3. Except as herein provided, the Zoning Ordinance, being Chapter 51, Title V of the St. Johns Code, shall stand as first enacted or subsequently amended.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

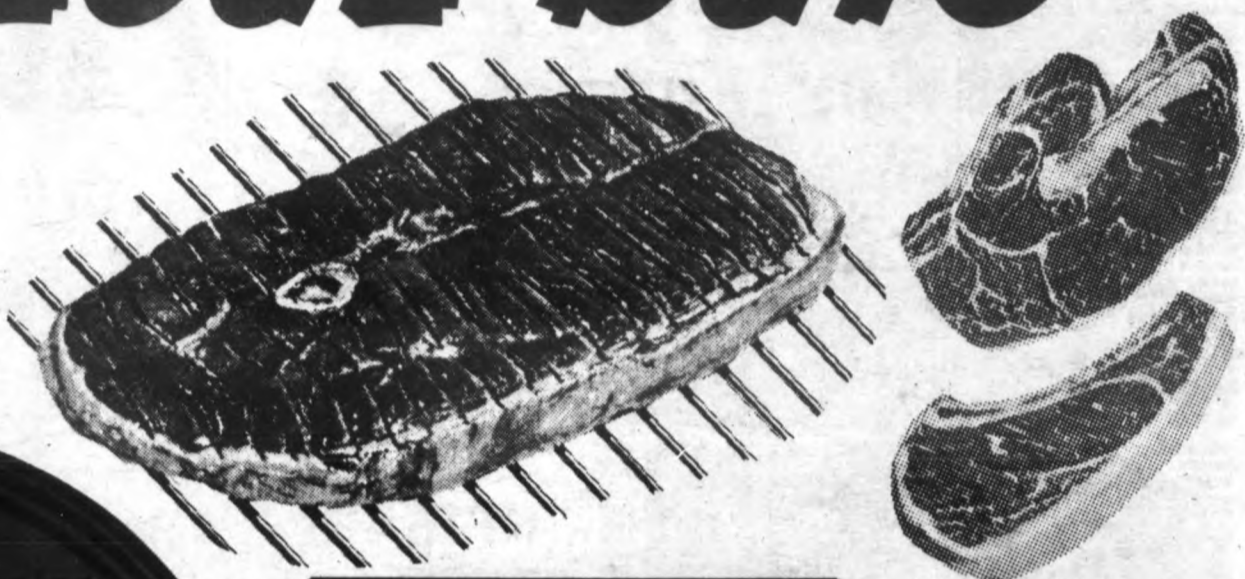

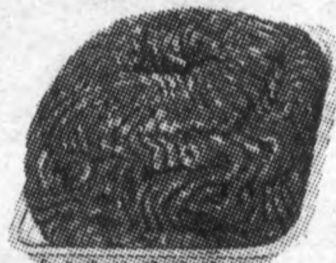
