# Property tax increase proposed

May 13 was the public hearing on the property tax increase proposed by the St. Johns City Commission.

For the last two years the tax rate was set at 9.72 mills, the Commission is requesting to increase the mills to 10.

An increase of \$8.50 per year is proposed for the garbage service fee. A home owner will now receive for his or her \$1.36 weekly fee, the following pick-up services at their home: weekly garbage collection, monthly brush gathering, and the annual leaf, Christmas

tree and spring clean-up drives. Rural residents, by comparison, pay \$2 for just basic weekly collection.

The Commission has not proposed an immediate increase of the sewer or water rates. They will however, closely observe this financial area and be prepared to consider a change if costs rise or consumption decreases dramatically, or if the CPA's this fall, determine during the annual audit that an increase is required to maintain the operation. An increase is expected.

Some of this year's featured project highlights include:  
--completion of the new Firehall.

--completion of the downtown project.

--\$28,000 for street resurfacing.

--\$15,000 for sidewalk replacement.

--\$7,000 for continuation of the curb project.

--a prioritizing of the development of the Industrial Park via the City support of the County's Greater Clinton organizational effort.

The average home in St. Johns will experience an annual net increase of only modest proportion. For example: in 1984 the tax levy was \$347.75, garbage fee was \$62.50; the proposed increase for 1985 will result in tax levy \$359.25, garbage fee \$71. This is a net dif-

ference of \$20 or 4.9 percent.

A public hearing has been set on the proposed 1985-1986 budget for May 28.

Also, the millage rate will be set at the May 28 meeting.

In other business, a partial payment of \$88,608.54 was approved to be paid to Searles Construction Inc. for the completion of sidewalk removal, sidewalk replacement, curb and gutter and catch basin replacement.

The balance due to Searles is \$47,547.61. Since this balance is sufficient to cover all material costs, no waivers have been requested at this time.

# Osgood honored

Bess Osgood, St. Johns, was named Volunteer of the Year for St. Johns Schools during the Volunteer Recognition Night dinner, May 13.

The dinner was attended by over 250 volunteers and the meal, prepared by Katie Aylsworth and her staff, was served by the Board of Education, its administrators and teachers to the volunteers.

The dinner was held to give the administration, teachers and Board of Education members a chance to show their gratitude for all that the volunteers have done for the schools.

Osgood, 87, received a plaque and a gift of a miniature antique school desk honoring her for her 27 years of serving the schools as a volunteer. The plaque was inscribed with the following message:

Bess Osgood came to St. Johns in 1919, as an elementary school teacher. She retired in 1958, the same year her husband, George, retired as the local postmaster.

As a volunteer, Mrs. Osgood has contributed hundreds of hours helping foreign students and adults speak and write English. She has a unique way of communicating with these

students, whether they be Czechoslovakian, Spanish, Laotian, Korean, Portuguese, Italian, French or German. In addition, she has worked with foreign exchange students, migrant students and many others who needed language help. Her "Volunteerism" has had world-wide impact!

Her most recent service has been in helping two Korean students at Swegles School. Not only does she work with the students, on their English skill, but she also assists their families in adjusting to the "American Way" and the St. Johns community.

The St. Johns Schools salutes Bess Osgood as the recipient of their first "Outstanding Volunteer of the Year" award. Her contributions will establish a high standard for what is to be an annual event in our community.

Bess Osgood, we salute you, for you truly represent the motto of Volunteerism: "Dedication, Commitment and Hard Work; for the benefit of others!"

After accepting the plaque and gift, Osgood gave a short speech in which she thanked the community and school for their support.

"I just want to say that I appreciate what our schools and community are doing for our children today," said Osgood.

**Sheriff's Department Report**

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department recently investigated an accident on Wright Road near Walker Road.

It appears that a vehicle driven by Robert C. Kiwala of 286 S. Clinton, Grand Ledge, was south bound on Wright Road when the vehicle left the roadway and rolled over.

There were two passengers in the vehicle, Steven T. Dukes of 11616 Tupper Lake Road, Grand Ledge, and David Lee Yeakey of 317 West Street, Grand Ledge. Dukes was treated and released at Clinton Memorial

Hospital.

Yeakey was pronounced dead at the scene due to injuries received when he was thrown from the vehicle and it rolled on top of him.

No one in the vehicle was wearing seat belts.

The accident remains under investigation.

Terry Sorensen of 220 W. Maple, Elsie, reported that she left her 10-speed bicycle parked on her front porch overnight and it was stolen. The bicycle is a Sears Free Spirit, brown and tan in color, and has no rear fender. The vehicle was valued at \$80.

Grand Ledge Clay Products of W. Jefferson Street in Grand Ledge reported that while they were draining a pit in a gravel pit in Eagle Township, they saw a pick up truck under the water. The truck, a 1980 Ford PU, had been reported stolen from Randall Brown of Pleasant Street in Grand Ledge. The case was turned over to the Grand Ledge Police since they had jurisdiction.

**Advice to educators given**

Teachers who can be replaced by computers--ought to be, according to Merri Warren, professor of education at Aquinas College, Grand Rapids.

Warren spoke to a crowd of over 250 St. Johns School Districts volunteers at a Recognition Night banquet, May 13. Her talk stressed luxuries that educators can live with and can't afford to live without.

"Educators can't afford to become machines, to become automated. Computers can't encourage children to learn the value of knowledge or motivate them to achieve that knowledge," said Warren.

Machines are available to make the teachers job easier, not to replace them.

"Educators need to learn how to use computers and other machine tools to their advantage."

A luxury educators can afford, is to have fun working with fresh minds.

"Never lose sight of what fun young people can bring to your life. Once they are beyond high school, learning becomes 'ho-hum'. But, while they are still young, learning is 'aha-ha!', everything is all new stuff to them," said Warren. "I believe that nothing else could ever replace that thrill of knowing that you were the one to make that 'aha-ha!' happen."

Educators must maintain their sense of

humor.

"When your having a bad day, remember a funny incident to help brighten your day," said Warren. "Comments that kids make on things that to us are common, make volunteering fun."

Another luxury educators can't afford is to try to go it alone.

"Not everyone can know everything about everybody," said Warren. "You should share information, not gossip, but if a student behaves badly on the bus, and is an angel in the

classroom, that information should be passed along, so maybe an underlying problem can be resolved."

"Educators need to learn from each other different methods of success in order to form a team."

Educators can't afford to lose sight of their goals.

"When I recently attended a graduation ceremony, I felt an overwhelming sense of pride in seeing the final product," said Warren. "It's fantastic knowing you've had a part in their education."

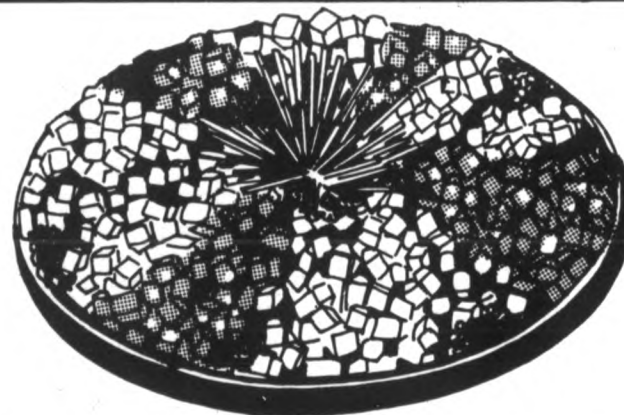

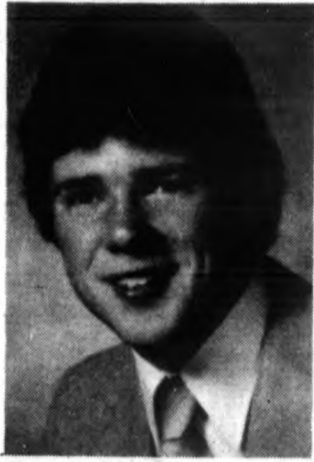

Brent G. Simon of St. Johns received a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering from the University of Michigan on May 4. Simon graduated summa cum laude, an achievement which requires a minimum 3.80 grade point average overall.

Prior to the May 4 graduation, Simon was named a James B. Angell Scholar for the second consecutive year. Individual recognition was given to the Angell Scholars in attendance at the 62nd Honors Convocation held on March 31 in the Hill Auditorium. The Honors Convocation takes rank with the commencement exercises among the important ceremonies of the University year. The University publicly recognizes and commends the undergraduate students in its schools and colleges who have earned distinguished academic records. James B. Angell Scholars are students with an all A record for two or more consecutive terms with a minimum of twelve credit hours of graded electives for each term. Simon maintained an all A record for five consecutive terms with a minimum of sixteen credit hours each term. That accomplishment ranked Simon in the top one-percent of the University undergraduates in March.

For the winter term, Simon received a \$1,000 award through the Amoco Foundation Fellowship. Simon was chosen for their award from among many other outstanding mechanical engineering students whose exemplary scholarly achievements and community efforts were considered. Simon was selected to work for IBM in Lansing as a marketing representative.

Simon is a 1981 graduate of St. Johns High School. He was the class co-validictorian. He is the son of Eugene and Lynda Simon of St. Johns. He and his wife, the former Carrie Stachel, will reside in St. Johns.

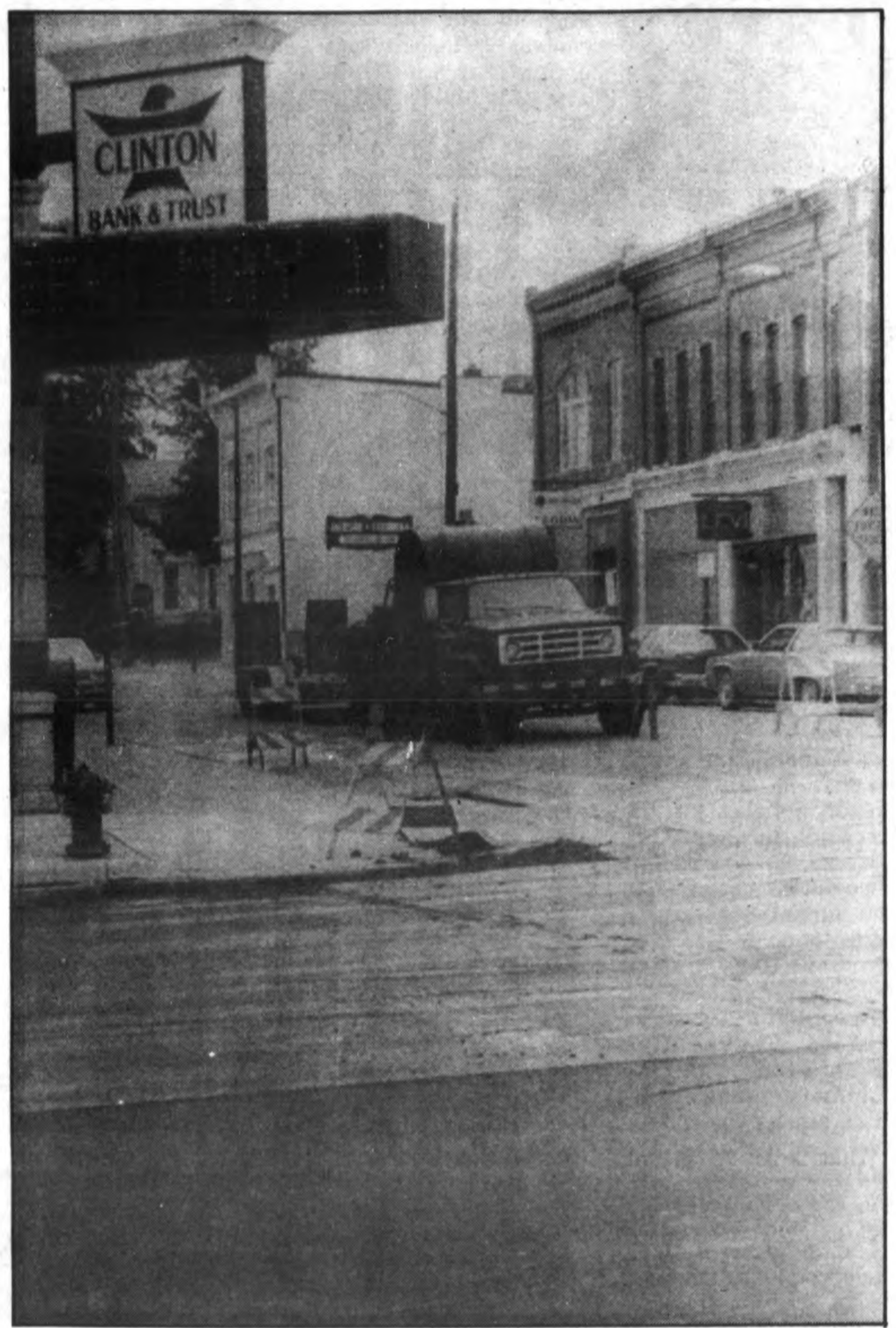
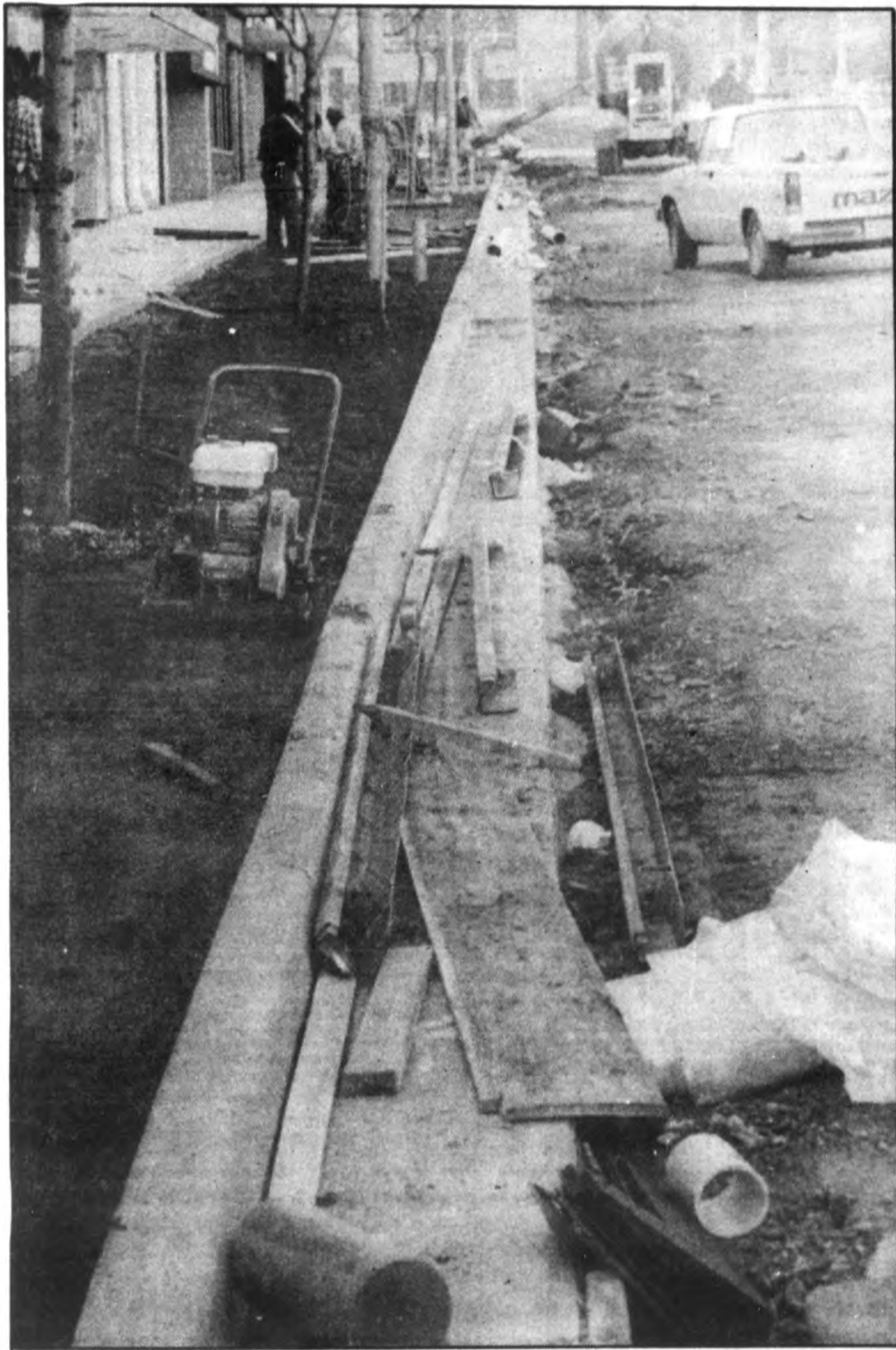

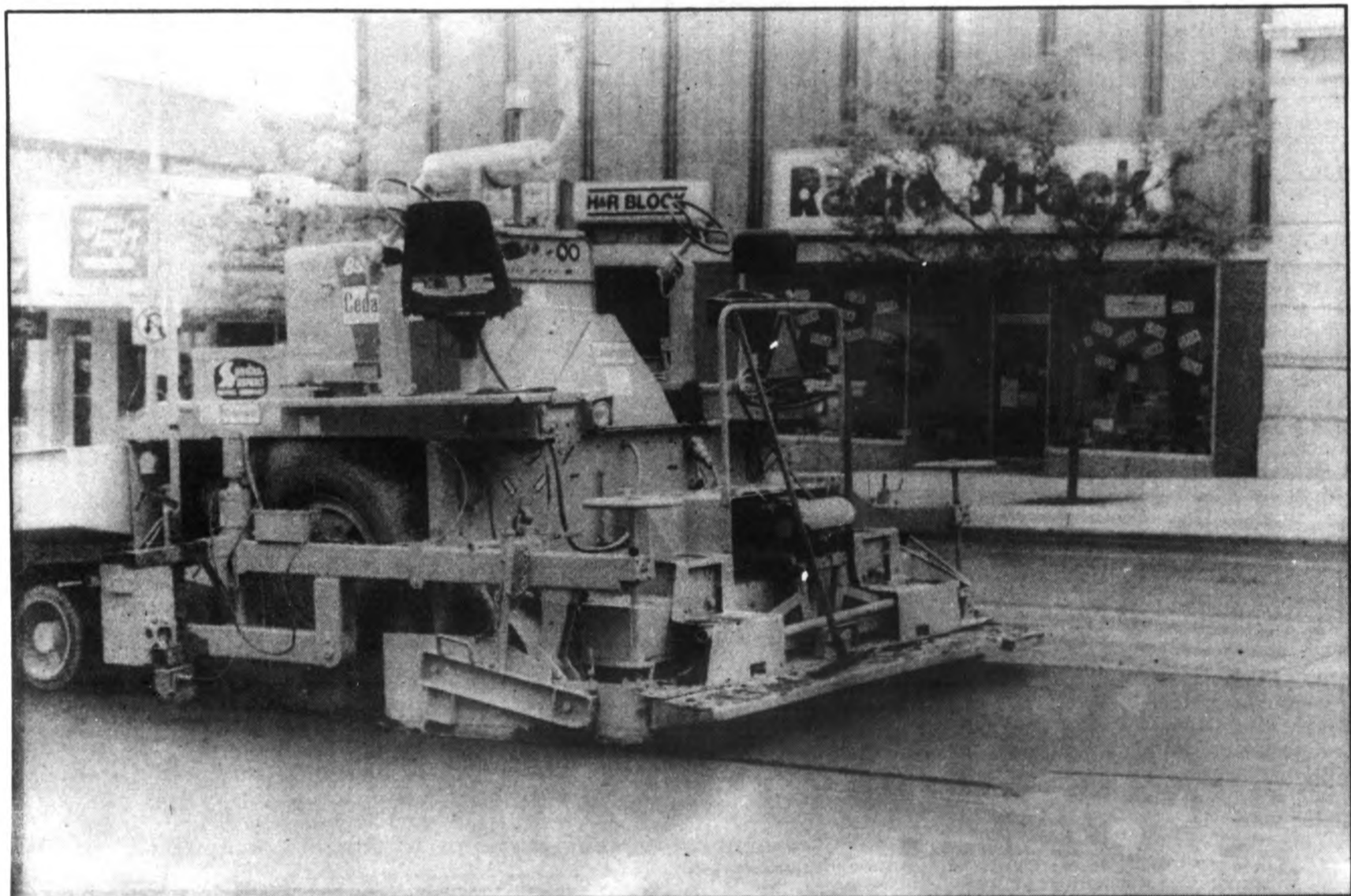

## Farmers plight is teacher's concern

Reprinted from the American Agricultural Movement News

Dear President Reagan, I teach mathematics and computer in a rural private (Catholic) high school. We are the only Catholic High School in South Dakota that is financed by a single parish and are planning to celebrate our 75th year of continuous operation this summer. We have a good school; our discipline problems consist of things like gum chewing and talking. We do not have drugs, smoking, drinking or knives in our school.

I am afraid for the future of this beautiful culture because of the farm crisis. Every week the newspaper is filled with farm sales; good hard-working people forced to sell out. Worse yet, young teens whose only dream was to go into partnership with their dad and later own a little land are saying, "I can't take the abuses my parents are taking." What is America going to do when this generation of farmers have died? You cannot make a good farmer overnight!

Don't tell me that they have overproduced when we see the starvation going on all over the world, and worst of all, even in the United States. The farmer did his job, he produced the food. It is the government's job to get the food to its needy people

and to the needy people of other lands.

Two of my brothers have farmed with my father since they quit high school nearly 30 years ago. Now, that dad has retired they are trying to buy a little land. They suffered drought, wind, hail, fire, and floods and still were able to make some income each year until this one. This year's prices were so low that the seed, gas, chemicals, fertilizer, insurance and interest payments on the land were barely met. Don't they deserve an income? This is the first year that they didn't have to pay income tax. They were always happy to pay income taxes. It meant they had made something. Imagine working a whole year, using all of your life investment doing it, and having an income so meager that your don't have to pay any income tax. I believe something is wrong!

The farmers I know are law-abiding citizens who are not interested in becoming rich! Rich! They value the dignity of the farm life style and hope for enough money to keep their operations going, to educate their children and pray that one of their sons will value this life style enough to carry on their tradition so that they may gradually turn over the operation to him. The farmer may wish to own enough land to assure him that he

may always farm and that he will have a comfortable retirement with dignity for himself, and for his wife; hoping the son will be able to gradually buy him out. I have never seen a monument built in honor of a farmer. I repeat, I believe they want only a nice modest living. Don't they deserve that?

At this time in history the greatest problem is interest. What the farmer needs is lower interest for the long term farm loans for the family farm operations. Since 1977 the interest rate at the Federal Land Bank has gone from eight percent to 12 3/4 percent. That is a better than 50 percent increase. The price of corn is only a few cents different in that same period of time. These interest payments are killing the farmer. President Reagan said on TV only four percent of the farmers are in trouble.

Where did he get those figures? I'll bet the banks between the Mississippi River and the Missouri River would disagree with that figure very much. They only farmers I know that are not in trouble are those who by some stroke of luck were able to finish paying off the land, the tractor, the other machines before January 1985, inherit it, marry into it or

sold it two years ago.

Churches of different faiths have gone together to help stock pantries for hungry farm families. It must be very humiliating and unfair, that a farmer who has raised grain to feed hundreds, cannot feed his own family a balanced diet without charity.

I think the practice of allowing non-farming individuals to buy land for a tax shelter should be evaluated. All it does is deny the government its just due in taxes and raise the farm land price to an out-of-reach level for the farmer who would love and care for the land. Why aren't they buying into their place of business and make it the best of its kind?

When I hear talk of allowing big tax dodging cooperations to buy the land, I wonder who will control the price of food? How much different will it be to live here than in Russia? Our present farm system is what makes the United States AMERICA THE BEAUTIFUL, and I'm sure you don't want to change that any more than I do.

This nation is just beginning to feel the chain effect of the farm crisis. Just this morning, I visited a wife of an owner of a little gas station. She said that things are really getting tight

for them. Their customers were farmers who presently don't have enough cash to buy gas to take the little drive to see Grandma on Sunday afternoon. The same was said in the local grocery store. A family drove to Florida this winter and they said they could not believe the standstill in the Heart Land of the United States. They went miles without seeing a car on the road. I travel to my parents' home, 18 miles, every weekend to take my turn caring for my ailing father, and it is scary to go such a long distance with seeing maybe only one or two cars.

Even Scripture (Genesis 41:34-36) tells governments to store up grains that they will not starve in time of famine. Starvation is possible! Look at Ethiopia! I bet they wished they had grain bins filled. Good food will win wars without bloodshed if you use this natural resource properly. I certainly don't believe in abandoning the storage of commodity grains with our present high dollar value and with such limited foreign markets established. We need a supply of food, just as much, if not more, than a supply of weapons.

I hope you can forget which party you belong to and think of what is

best for the farmer and the whole country. I feel both parties have many good people in them, and if they learn to work together, surely they can come up with a good long-lasting farm program without name calling. God be with you in this important legislation! Let it be written in all the History Books of the Land that YOU were there to save the farms for the 21st century for your children's children.

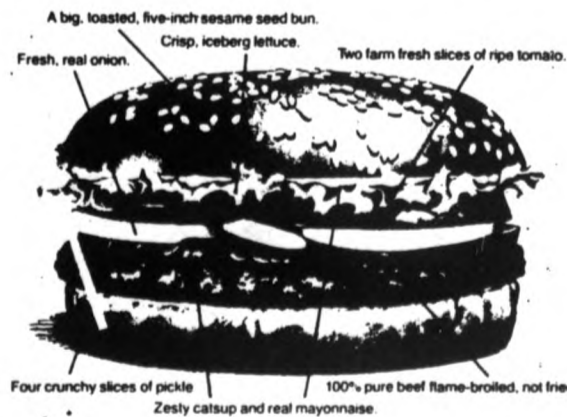

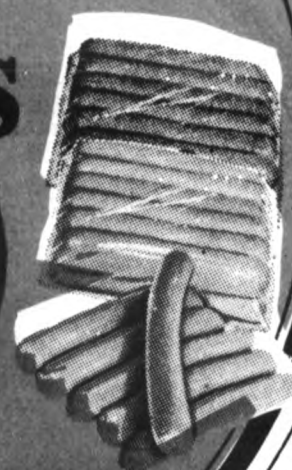

Fifty clubs throughout Michigan sent delegates. The St. Johns Ladies Literary Club, as it was then called, was represented by Mrs. Mary Babcock and Mrs. O.W. Munger. This was held on Federation Day, Tuesday, August 14, 1894. A constitution was adopted and committees formed. At the Federation meeting in Grand Rapids, May 5 and 6, 1895, its membership included 63 Federated Clubs. The first clubs were described as "a group of organized women in every community that can be depended upon to promote what leads to the betterment of life."

The St. Johns Woman's Club indeed promotes the betterment of the whole community as well as its members. Anyone interested in joining in their endeavors are urged to attend any of their meetings which are announced in this local paper.

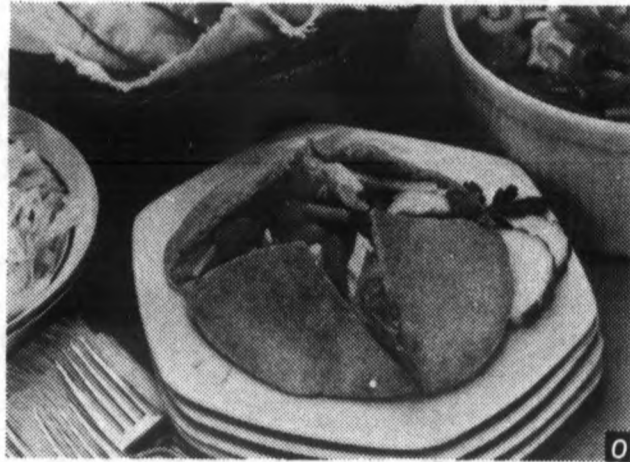

| 1 tablespoon red wine vinegar     | 1 tablespoon cornstarch                                       |
| 2 teaspoons paprika               |   |
| 1 1/2 teaspoons garlic powder     |   |

In a large skillet heat oil until hot. Add chicken; brown well on all sides. Add white wine, 1 cup water, minced onion, vinegar, paprika, garlic powder, rosemary, thyme and black pepper. Bring mixture to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer covered until chicken is tender, about 45 minutes. Add carrots and peppers. Cook until crisp-tender, about 4 minutes. In a small bowl combine 1/4 cup water and cornstarch; add to skillet. Bring to a boil. Cook and stir until clear and thickened, about 1 minute.

In a large skillet heat safflower oil until hot. Add vegetables and seasonings. Saute until vegetables are crisp-tender, 4 to 5 minutes. Add tuna. Cook until hot. To prepare pitas for stuffing, cut a large X on one side of the bread being careful not to cut through to the bottom. Fill pockets with shredded lettuce and the hot vegetables and tuna.

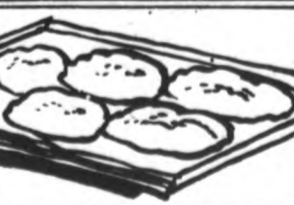

- 1/4 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

In a large heavy saucepan heat 1 tablespoon of the safflower oil until hot. Add popcorn kernels. Cover and shake pan over medium heat until all corn is popped; remove from heat. In a small saucepan combine Italian seasoning, onion and garlic powders, salt and remaining 2 tablespoons safflower oil. Stir over medium heat until hot, about 20 seconds. Pour over popcorn; stir to coat completely. Stir in cheese. YIELD: about 8 cups

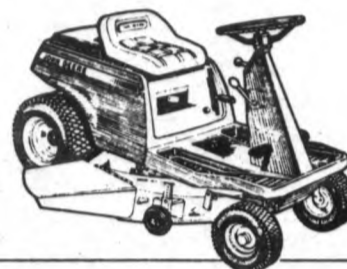

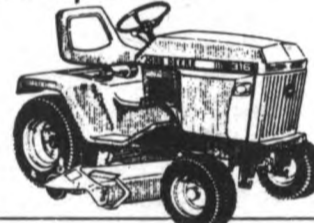

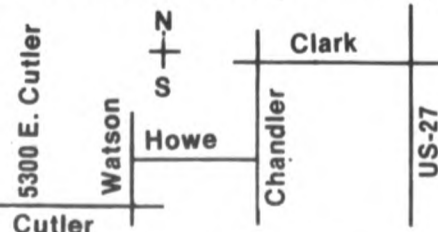

# Potpourri

## GARDEN

### Some Yard Plants Favored by Fungi

Powdery mildew is one of the most common diseases of landscape plants. If you have some of the more highly susceptible plants, the easy way out may be to replace them.

The following plants are likely targets of the fungus-caused powdery mildew:

Crepe myrtle, lilac, euonymus, drooping leucothoe, a number of oaks, roses, some chrysanthemums, and occasionally azaleas, hybrid rhododendrons, zinnias and phlox.

Damage caused by powdery mildew can range from slight to severe. The disease generally occurs in shady areas during the spring and fall when the weather is cool and the humidity is relatively high.

The characteristic symptom of powdery mildew is a fluffy white to light gray fungus growth on succulent stems, leaves, buds and flowers.

Young plants and actively growing shoots are more severely damaged than older

plants, leaves or branches. Infected leaves may be dwarfed, curled or deformed.

Powdery mildew can destroy the blossoms on crepe myrtle.

Small dead flecks in the leaves and defoliation may occur in some varieties of azalea and rhododendron.

Highly susceptible plants, such as euonymus, should be replaced with plants that are not susceptible to powdery mildew. If damage is severe and susceptible plants must be grown, apply Benlate as a foliar spray. Two or three applications are usually sufficient. Follow label directions.

Another fungicide which will control powdery mildew is Karathane. Spray with Karathane every seven days or as needed. Follow label instructions for the rate and list of plants on which it can be used.

Sulfur can also be used as a spray for powdery mildew.

### Shade Areas Present Problems for Grass

When you attack—or re-attack—those bare spots in the lawn this spring, make special allowances where the primary problem is lack of sunlight.

Shade can be a limiting factor in getting a good cover of grass established, suggest N.C. Agricultural Extension Service specialists at NCSU.

If turfgrasses must be grown even in light to moderate shade, you should select those grasses that have shade tolerance. Of the warm season types, zoysia has some shade tolerance. Of the cool season types, Kentucky bluegrass and tall fescue can tolerate some shade.

There are other factors. When dense tree and shrub planting encircle a turfgrass area, wind movement is restricted. This changes the temperatures and relative humidity, and it increases the

incidence of disease. If turfgrasses must be grown under shade, here are some practical steps that may help give your grass a better chance.

—Select the most shade-tolerant turfgrass.

—Selectively remove some trees to let more light in.

—Prune out some limbs in the crowns of trees.

—Raise the cutting height of your lawn mower by 25 to 50 percent when mowing shaded areas.

—Fertilize the grass 1 1/2 to 2 times the normal rate.

—Fertilize the trees deeply.

—Remove leaves and other debris promptly.

—Maintain a soil pH favorable for grass.

—Be prepared to control diseases.

Finally, don't try to grow grass in areas of 50 percent or more shade.

**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**  
BY LAWRENCE W. ALTHOUSE  
**RECOGNIZING THOSE "LAST DAYS"**

Background Scripture: 2 Kings 16 through 17.  
Devotional Reading: 2 Kings 17:34-41.

Norman Cousins' latest book, **THE HEALING HEART** (W. W. Norton) is a marvelous testimony about the spiritual dimensions of his recovery from a very serious heart attack in December, 1980.

But in an epilogue, Cousins closes the book on an ironic note:

*What concerns me is that everyone's health—including that of the next generation—may depend more on the health of society and the healing of the nations than on the conquest of disease.*

#### THINGS NOT RIGHT

When Cousins speaks of "the health of society," he is referring to the moral and spiritual condition of our society and the "sickness" of war and holocaust that looms over our world. If we fail to solve these challenges, he is saying, all the personal health measures in the world will not matter, for the condition of the patient — our world — is "critical." Only a worldwide response to these challenges, says Cousins, can keep the patient from becoming "terminal."

This is a startling, prophetic voice added to many others with essentially a similar message: we must change our world NOW, if it is to survive.

As I read these words I couldn't help wondering how many others would read them and pass on without bothering to pay any real attention to them. Yes, of course we know that our world is facing enormous problems, but, with the

tremendous advances of technology taking place constantly, we find it difficult to think of our own era as even potentially "the last days."

So it was with the people of Israel in the 8th century B.C. It wasn't that they were not warned about their impending destruction. God had sent them one prophet after another, but, when things are

going reasonably well, who listens to a prophet? The people of Israel knew that all was not "right in the world," but they hardly recognized their times as "the last days of Israel"—which they were!

#### CHANGES THAT DELIVER

They, like we, often misunderstood the purpose of

God's prophets. God sent these men, not to pronounce doom on Israel, but to motivate the people to make the changes in their lives that would deliver them from the consequences of the evils in their society: idolatry, human sacrifice and immorality.

That sounds like a description of our society, too. ## BUDDY'S WORKSHOP

### Temporary Repairs Extend Gutter Life

Is there a simple way to repair holes in the guttering? There are simple ways to make temporary repairs. Clean the area around the hole and apply plastic roofing cement around the edge of the hole, and extending away from the hole. You can then lay a piece of heavyweight aluminum foil or a piece of heavy roofing paper (cut larger than the hole) over the opening and spread cement over the edges of the patch to form a seal.

Will a new coat of varnish brighten the appearance of kitchen cabinets?

Varnish will not hide or conceal dirt, grease, or smudges. It would be a waste of time to revarnish cabinets that are not first thoroughly cleaned. This is a time-consuming project, but can be well worth the effort. Paint thinner will remove grease and stains, but work must be done when the kitchen is not being used for cooking, as thinner is flammable. Use clean cloth dampened with thinner and change cloths frequently. Clean drawer pulls and handles with detergent and water. Allow to dry completely before applying varnish.

When it is obvious that nothing is wrong, why do some windows bind?

The tracks in which the window runs up and down may be dry or dirty. Wipe clean with a damp cloth, let dry, then apply soap, wax or paraffin. After lubrication, windows should move freely.

### Congressman Bill Schuette

The "baker's dozen" farm export program which Congressman Bill Schuette has repeatedly advocated was adopted Wednesday by the Agriculture Department.

"This is great news for our farm economy," said Congressman Schuette, a member of the Agriculture Committee. It will make the American farmer more competitive in the world market and help to offset the strong dollar that has paralyzed our ag exports."

The program gives extra commodities to our foreign customers each time they buy American farm products. It will use \$2 billion in Commodity Credit Corporation inventories as bonuses for sales generated in specified world markets through fiscal 1988.

In the past few months, Congressman Schuette has called for the baker's dozen program to be part of U.S. export policy. Most recently, he joined with other members of the Agriculture Committee in urging the U.S. Trade Representative to endorse the concept.

The program will have two basic criteria: first, the initiatives will

be geared to enhancing additional sales for the U.S. in the world market. Second, they will be targeted to markets identified as those which were taken over by competing nations using unfair trade practices.

"It's about time the U.S. moved aggressively to recapture our fair

share of the world market," said Congressman Schuette. "The baker's dozen program sends a strong signal to our competitors that American farmers won't take a back seat to anyone. We are determined to win back our markets, and the baker's dozen is one way we will do it."

## EPA decision to create demands

The EPA decision to remove 50 percent of the lead in gasoline by July 1, 1985, and 90 percent by January of 1986, will create a dramatic increase in the demand for alternatives, octane enhancing additives, to replace lead.

One of the best options to accomplish this is ethanol, which is produced from renewable feedstocks, such as corn. In 1984, domestic production of ethanol reached nearly 500 million gallons, consuming the equivalent of approximately 200 million bushels of corn. The fuel ethanol business has invested more than a billion dollars in production facilities, and

created thousands of new jobs.

The National Corn Growers Association has officially adopted as its top priority the conversion of one billion bushels of grain into ethanol by 1990. Meeting this objective would mean a four-fold increase from current ethanol production levels, and the use of roughly 10 percent of the nation's corn crop in meeting 50 percent of the demand for octane enhancers in motor fuel.

The use of fuel ethanol provides several benefits in addition to the octane enhancing role, not the least of which is a new and significant market for

U.S. produced corn.

Joe Sweeney, president of the Michigan Corn Growers Association committed the state organization's support as well. "What a challenge," he said, "this clearly is the kind of new and expanding market that could really help boost corn utilization, for the long haul."

Sweeney continued, "this opportunity also points out the need for the corn check-off program. Research, development and promotion are all needed to insure the maximum use of corn in this effort!"

The proposed Michigan corn check-off is a voluntary program

of one-half cent per bushel, on corn sold for grain.

A referendum on the program is tentatively set for mid-July.

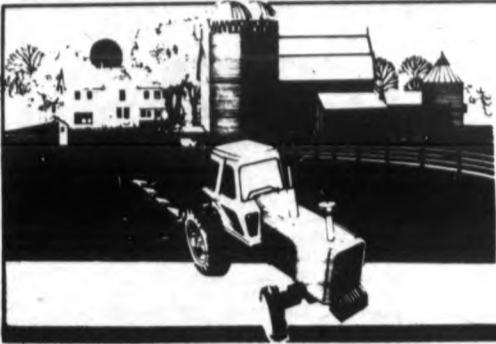

# Farm News

## Rural living

If your home garden is bugged by bugs every year, then it's time you started thinking in advance about what you can do to control insects.

One of your first lines of defense against troublesome insect pests should be to clear the garden surface of any refuse. Residue from last year's harvest left in the garden all winter can harbor eggs, larvae, and insects during the cold months. Then, when the weather warms up, they're ready to start a whole new infestation.

So, pull, burn, or bury leftover plants and residue each fall to discourage an overwintering pest popula-

tion. Overly mature plants or diseased plants left in the garden after harvest also serve as a source of plant diseases. These diseases could be spread by insects to new, healthy spring plants.

By getting rid of plant residue either in the fall or early spring, you'll get the jump on insect and disease control for the entire season. But don't think you've got the problem completely under control after that. Weeds should be removed as long as your plants are growing, all summer long. Not only will weeds compete with your garden plants for nutrients, sunlight and moisture, but they pro-

vide home and nourishment for insect and disease pests, as well.

Another way to reduce insect infestations is by diversifying your planting. Most insects feed on plants belonging to a certain family. So, if you can interplant the favorite host plants with other types of plants, you can minimize pest damage.

By combining cultural controls, such as residue removal, with pesticide applications, home gardeners can achieve a simplified version of Integrated Pest Management. Getting the jump on insects will make your gardening experience this summer a much more enjoyable and productive venture.

## Clover Clippings

"I don't want to talk about it!" How many times have you heard that statement from a young person?

According to Joanne Keith, Extension family and child development specialist, adults need to try to understand why preteens and teenagers sometimes pull back from them and refuse to communicate.

"Early adolescents are going through confusing times," Keith says. "They strive for independence and yet want and need the family very much."

Keith says parents and adults working with adolescents can expect them to be open and willing to discuss their feelings some days and withdrawn and unwilling at other times.

"It's important to keep trying with young people," Keith explains.

"Don't give up. Give the kids room to breathe when they need it, but be there when they are ready to open up."

Keith offers the following suggestions for improving family communication:

--Understand that this "open-one-minute/closed-the-next" pattern is normal among early adolescents. If it is a chronic, continuing pattern, counseling may be in order.

--Keep encouraging young persons to communicate. Let them know that it's okay if they're not ready to discuss something, but that you are there when they are ready.

--Be there when they are ready to talk! Remember that a quality and open discussion is much more important than a clean house or a

finished 4-H project.

--Families are very busy nowadays, so take the opportunity to communicate with each other whenever you are together. Good times for discussions are at the dinner table or while riding in the car or working in the yard.

--The best time to discuss something with a young person is whenever he or she brings it up.

"Adults can watch for 'teachable moments,' though," Keith says. "Bring up topics informally and in a non-threatening way. Try not to confront a child about sensitive issues."

--Remember that children want and need your advice. Try to talk with them and not at them. Kids need to practice communicating and problem solving, and supportive, interested, caring adults are the best teachers. Allow

them to practice working things out for themselves by listening and offering guidance when needed.

The Michigan 4-H Youth Program and the MSU Department of Family and Child Ecology conducted a statewide survey of early adolescents and their parents in 1983 under the direction of Keith and 4-H program leader Leah Hooper. The purpose of the Michigan Early Adolescent Survey was to gain information about the developmental needs, interests and out-of-school activities of the 304 young people surveyed.

When questioned about family communication, a disturbing one-third of the boys and girls said they would talk to neither parent about their friends. Almost the same percentage of

boys said they would talk to neither parent about body changes, and one-fifth of the early adolescents said they would talk to neither parent if they were upset about something.

These findings indicate that there are young people who will not talk to their parents

about some of the most important changes taking place in their lives.

Keith says parents and adults who work with 9 to 14-year-olds can make an enormous impact and contribution to their growth and development by being supportive, interested, and open.



## Agricultural News

**Attention dairy farmers!** With this early spring, the alfalfa may be blooming earlier than we expect, so clip this column and save it for a handy reference.

When it comes to putting up high quality haylage, the little things are what make a big dif-

ference in the quality of your end product. Here is the list of little things you need to do the job right!

1. Harvest early, for every day harvest is delayed past the early bloom stage, the haylage loses 1/2% in digestibility, .7% in pro-

tein and 2% in forage intake by the cattle.

2. Chop haylage reasonably short--the ideal length is 1/4 to 3/8 of an inch. If haylage is chopped too coarse, you won't be able to pack it firmly enough to allow for good storage. If haylage is chopped too fine it loses its "roughage" effect in the rumen.

3. Fill the silo rapidly and pack it well! Bunk silos should be packed until you can no longer see any tire tracks.

4. Use a moisture tester! By testing the moisture of the haylage as you are filling the silo and letting the moisture of the haylage dictate when you start and stop filling, you can theoretically get a haylage with 2-4% better protein content. The moisture level you use is dependent upon the type of silo you are storing the haylage in. (A.) sealed unit 50-50% moisture. (B.) stave or poured concrete silo 50-65% moisture, use the dryer

haylage in the bottom 2/3 of the silo and top with a wetter material to enhance packing. (C.) bunk silo, 55-70% moisture, when putting haylage in at 55%, you must fill rapidly, pack well and finish the top 1/4 with a wet material.

One final comment...don't harvest haylage lower than 40% moisture, your field losses increase tremendously, and don't harvest haylage with greater than 70% moisture.

### Pests early this year

## Check your fields for alfalfa weevil

Alfalfa weevil is with us in abundance! As of Monday, May 13, feeding appears on every field checked but you should check each of your fields since not all fields will have problems even in an outbreak year such as now.

You should cut within a week of finding early feeding or treat if cutting is not possible. After cutting, check regrowth and if 25 percent or more of the tips show damage and the alfalfa is less than six inches tall, treatment should be considered.

If applied by airplane prefer Furadan at one-half pint per acre, but remember the seven day pre-harvest interval. Also Furadan is a restricted use pesticide.

Sevin is also effective by air or ground sprayer used at one and one-half pounds active ingredient. That is the same as one and one-half quarts of 4 F formulation.

Check the label and follow directions.

Yes, timing on most insects and plants are 10 to 14 days earlier than normal this year!

Who's afraid of growing up?

Not the kids who know what they want to do to earn a living, have already had a taste of that profession, and can hardly wait to get into it full time. Not the ones who feel a comfortable sense of belonging in the natural world, seeing its wildness and mystery in themselves.

It's to this sense of competence and joy that the Community Resource Volunteers (CRV) dedicate their spring and summer program. The series of programs, geared for participants from first grade to sixth, is a balance of computer training and natural science, an introduction to creative thinking that integrates elementary robotics, computer assisted design (CAD), music composition, writing with a word processor, photography, astronomy, aviation/aerospace concepts, planetary navigation and nature study.

Sounds like heavy stuff for the young. But the hands-on approach under the guidance of excellent resource people makes it more like play, which, the experts tell us, is the best way to learn.

"And, of course,

nothing succeeds like success," said Bill Richards, CRV director. "When the participants of this program have one positive experience of working with computers or with a group solving some scientific problem, where their own input helps the whole group come to a creative solution--they want more. They get more comfortable with their world and they want to engage with it--this world of electronics and space and concern about ecological systems. They not only begin to think maybe it's okay to be who they are--they get a real appetite for using their minds for original thinking, for making their own contributions. This is what we're working for."

# Potato stocks up

Michigan potato growers, shippers and processors held a total of 1.5 million hundredweight (cwt.) of potatoes on May 1, 1985. This is a 50 percent increase from last year, but 7 percent below stocks on hand May 1, 1983, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Disappearance for the 1984 crop from the start of harvest to May 1 totaled 11.0 million cwt., 25 percent above movement for the same period last season. Disappearance during the month of April total-

ed 1.1 million cwt., virtually the same as a year ago. So far this season, 88 percent of production has been removed from storage compared to 90 percent last year.

Nationally, May 1 potato stocks totaled an estimated 51.6 million cwt. in the 15 major states, a gain of 2 percent over last year, but 10 percent short of May 1983 stocks. Current stocks account for 17 percent of fall potato production compared with 18 percent last year. Processing in the eight major states came to 108 million cwt. this season, up 13 percent from a year earlier. April processing was 12.5 million cwt., up 4 percent from last April.

# Family Focus

With this warm summer-like weather, everyone is thinking about picnics. For most of us, the thought of a picnic brings on mouth-watering images of fried chicken, potato salad, cole slaw, and deviled eggs. But as delicious as these foods are, such traditional picnic fare is often high in fat and high in calories.

This summer, think "light." With a little imagination, your summer picnics can include tempting, nutritious dishes that are low fat as well. Try trading in the fried chicken for chicken rolled in seasoned bread crumbs and baked until golden brown. To lower the fat content of chicken even more, remove the skin from a cut-up chicken, dip pieces in skim milk and then roll in seasoned, crushed cornflakes before baking. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes. The crumbs will form a crispy "skin."

For refreshing, hot summer day accompaniments to the chicken, fill your picnic basket with a variety of

fresh vegetable salads. Cut raw vegetables into bite-sized pieces and toss with a light, tangy dressing made from one cup of tomato juice blended with 1/4 cup of lemon juice and seasoned with pepper and parsley.

Give cole slaw some zip by replacing the traditional mayonnaise dressing with three tablespoons of oil mixed with 1/2 cup warmed vinegar. This makes enough dressing for three cups of shredded cabbage. Season with chopped onion, pimento, dried mustard and celery seeds.

A nice switch from potato salad is a pasta salad with chopped red

or green peppers. Toss the salad with a curry-yogurt dressing or a smooth, light dressing made from cottage cheese blended with buttermilk. These dressings will perk up potato salad, too.

Round out your picnic meal with fresh fruit salad, raw vegetables and rolls or muffins.

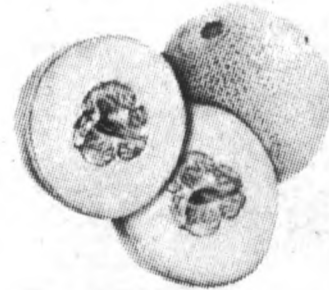

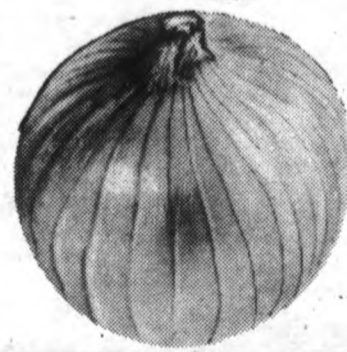
