## St. Johns Rotary sponsors fireworks raffle

The annual fireworks display in St. Johns, one of the biggest in the mid-Michigan area, needs more support from the community if it is to continue. The St. Johns Rotary Club is asking the community to buy raffle tickets the club will sell at various business locations around town. Tickets will be sold on July 13, 14, 20 and 21 during business hours. "Because of increased expenses, particularly insurance, we really need the community's support," says

City Manager Rick Coletta, who is president-elect of the Rotary. Coletta said the only way the city could get insurance for the firework display this year was to hire Illinois Fireworks, a company that will conduct the display. Insurance is included in the package provided by the company. THE TOTAL expense to the city for the package is \$4,522. That is \$750 more than the amount paid last year for the fireworks display. The Rotary Club picks up the entire bill for the

display. The Rotary raffle tickets will sell for \$2 each or three for \$5. Prizes will be awarded at the fireworks display. The grand prize is \$300; second prize is \$200; third prize is \$100; and fourth prize is \$50. "Proceeds will pay for the fireworks display and other community projects supported by the St. Johns Rotary Club," says Coletta. The St. Johns Fourth of July celebration will run from July 1 to July 3.

The carnival will be run again this year by the Schmidt Amusement Company of Stanish. The carnival will be set up in the St. Johns High School parking lot. On July 1 or July 2, carnival-goers can pay \$6 to use all the ride from 1 p.m. until 11 p.m. Individual prices will be charged on July 3. The fireworks will begin at dusk on July 3. The best place to view the fireworks is from the high school football field.



## Race between friends?

# Webster considers bid as Democrat

Clinton County Commissioner Glen Webster, who narrowly missed the filing deadline to have his name included on the August 5 primary election ballot, is considering a bid as a write-in Democrat. "I've always been a Republican, but I guess I'm more of an independent than anything else," he said. Webster said he has not yet decided

if he will run. If he does decide to run as a write-in Democrat, it could mean a general election race between himself and Bertine A. Thelen, a part-time employee in the county clerk's office, who filed as a Republican for the seat. Thelen and Webster are friends who had discussed her filing for the primary before she filed. Thelen said Webster had been undecided at that time about whether he would run for re-election.

"We had an understanding that I would run in the primary," said Thelen. "It would have made a good deal of difference if he had said 'I am going to run.' I would not run against him if I knew he really wanted to run." Thelen said she will not drop out of the race before the primary election even if Webster decides to run as a write-in Democrat. She said she does not presently know if she will continue her candidacy if it comes down

to a general election race between herself and Webster. Thelen, besides her part time work in the county clerk's office, owns a farm worked by her son in Greenbush Township and has been involved in numerous volunteer projects. She is a former Michigan State Police employee. Webster was elected District 1 county commissioner in 1976. He owns a farm in Greenbush township. District 1 includes Essex, Duplain and Greenbush townships and a por-

tion of Bingham Township. With one exception, all other Clinton County Commission seats were filed for by incumbents running unopposed. The exception is the District 5 seat, consisting of Bath Charter Township and Precinct 3 of DeWitt Charter Township. Incumbent Richard Hawks is being challenged by Cleo S. Friend Sr. for that seat. There were no Democratic candidacies filed for any county or township offices.

## Bengal Township's where the action is during the Aug. 5 primary election

Bengal Township voters are the only voters in the county who face a choice of candidates for township office in the August 5 primary election this year. Two Republican candidates have filed for township clerk and two have filed for township trustee. The filing deadline for the primary election was June 3. Bengal Township voters will also be asked to renew for two years a one-mill property tax levy for road maintenance and bridge construction. ON THE primary ballot for township clerk are Arleita M. Schafer and Alice Hicks. They are Republicans. Arleita Schafer, the incumbent, was appointed township clerk last month when Kenneth Miller resigned. (Miller served in the post for a three month period following the resignation of Alden Knight. Alden

Knight resigned following charges that his wife, Marilyn Knight, the deputy township clerk, had embezzled township funds. The term expires Dec. 31, 1988. Election law requires an election to fill the vacancy when more than two years remain in the term.) Schafer works as a deputy clerk in the Clinton County Register of Deeds office. Alice Hicks, who is opposing Schafer in the primary, owns a farm with her husband and son. She is a 17-year 4-H leader and has served as township chairperson for the American Cancer Society. INCUMBENT Kenneth Miller will be challenged for the township trustee position by Gerald R. Rossow. Miller, a farmer who has served a total of five years as a township trustee, was elected to the office he currently holds for a term expiring in 1988. However, another election is required because he resigned to serve a temporary appointment as township clerk and now serves as a township trustee by ap-

pointment. Miller will be challenged on the primary ballot Gerald C. Rossow, a farmer. Rossow was a member of the Bengal Board of Education before the district was annexed to St. Johns. Miller and Rossow are Republicans. There were no filings by Democrats anywhere in the county. On the primary ballot for other township offices: • Republican Larry L. Ott is unopposed in the primary for the office of Duplain Township Clerk. • Republican John Schlarf is unopposed for the office of Essex Township Trustee. • Republican Gary Hyde is unopposed for the office of Greenbush Township Trustee. • Republican Carolyn J. Stillwell is unopposed for the office of Ovid Township Clerk. DeWitt Township voters will be asked to renew two mills for four years. One mill is for the fire department and one is for the police department.

## County DSS sponsors a 'Thoughts for Food' day

You've heard of "Food for Thought." Now it's time for "Thoughts for Food." That is the theme of a "Bake Sale and Fun Day" sponsored by the Clinton County Department of Social Services on Thursday of this week. Included in the event will be a dunk tank, a drawing, children's games and clowns. The object of the event is to collect canned food for the needy of Clinton County. In fact, for several of the events — the dunk tank and the drawing, in particular — the price of partici-

tion is a single can of food. The drawing prize will be a free car wash, donated by Bee's Car Wash. For the dunk tank event, patrons who can spare a single can of food will have a shot at dunking DSS employees. McDonald's has donated sundaes as prizes for the children's games. All of the food collected will stay in Clinton County. The event will be held Thursday, June 12, from 9:30 a.m. until 3 p.m. in the parking lot of the Clinton County DSS office on US-27 in St. Johns.

## Local idea hits the big time

"It started out several years ago," says Charles McCann, owner of the McDonald's of St. Johns. "I found this empty sand pail on the beach." That discovery inspired the DeWitt resident to think up one of McDonald's most successful promotions. This year a portion of the money generated by the promotion will be donated to children's charities. McCann's idea was to package McDonald's Happy Meal in small sand pails. He did a little research and found that the price of the pails would be only a few cents more than the usual Happy Meal premium.

And the pails were just the right size to hold a Happy Meal consisting of a hamburger or three-piece Chicken McNugget, french fries and a soft drink. He thought he had a winning idea but the national company was harder to convince. The company rejected the idea when McCann first proposed it. Sand pails did not have enough collectibility for a promotion geared to repeat sales, the company said. McCann, who was about that time elected president of a McDonald's operators association, found that other owners were enthusiastic about the idea. The next step was to convince the national advertising board that the pails would be a hit. "I carried this bucket around

with me for several meetings," he recalls. The idea was finally approved for a three week test in Boston. McCann also put in a three-week supply in his St. Johns store and watched it sell out in about half that time. The promotion, centered around a Special Olympics theme, was used nationally in 1984 — and McCann won McDonald's promotional idea of the year award. From May 30 to July 6 this year the Happy Pail promotion is being revived. Five different pails are available with summer themes depicting vacations, picnics, beaches, and treasure hints.

A portion of the sales prices will be donated, locally to the Ronald McDonald Houses of Detroit and Ann Arbor, and nationally to Ronald McDonald Children's Charities (RMCC). Established in 1984 in memory of McDonald's founder Ray Kroc, RMCC funds a variety of projects for children and their families. The organization directly supports the Ronald McDonald House program. The 100th such house, used as a "home away from home" for the families of children who are hospitalized with serious illnesses, will open this fall. McCann owns McDonald's in Owosso, Portland and Alma, as well as the one in St. Johns.

## City approves 1987 budget

The St. Johns City Commission adopted June 2 a 1986-87 budget proposed last month by City Manager Randy Humphrey. The only change made in the budget before approval was the addition of a \$5,000 expenditure to support the Tri-County Metro Narcotics Squad. The impact of the budget on the average homeowner in St. Johns consists of a .22 mill increase in the tax levy and a \$5 increase in the yearly fee for garbage collection. The two increases amount to an average increase in city tax bills of \$10.50 per year. Additionally, Humphrey has warned that city streets could suffer in the next few years if revenue is not found to replace federal funds that once paid for street repair. In order to contribute to the Tri-County Metro Narcotics Squad, the city "did an analysis of areas of (the city police department) budget which will be underspent for the year," according to a city memo. "This estimated year-end budget excess will be plenty to fund the City allocation of the Metro Squad..." the

memo said. The total city property tax levy is 14.59 mills.

## Dispatch problems minor, correctable

To the Editor:

It is true that dispatching problems could cost lives! Thank God that Clinton County does not have such problems.

The problems that we do have are generally small in nature and when they are brought to our attention, we get together and correct them.

Dispatching involves teamwork and communication skills that are sometimes months and years in the making and this is in addition to formal and on-the-job training. It is unfortunate that the Clinton County Board of Commissioners had to have a "special" meeting because Bath Township Supervisor Richard Brook was unhappy over the way our dispatch handled a complaint and then was further unhappy over the resolution of that complaint by the sheriff.

Your sheriff was not invited to attend either of the two meetings regarding the alleged "tales of woe" concerning the Clinton County Sheriff's Department dispatch service, but if invited, would have attended.

It is my opinion, however, that these meetings should never have been public. Problems between governmental agencies, and especially between public safety officials, should not be aired publicly. Public confidence should be maintained and by airing our linen in public, we cause more harm than good. Problems between governmental officials are best resolved in private, with minds open to resolving differences. There are always two sides to a story, and each should be checked into before hasty decisions or namecalling takes place. We owe it to our public.

# Road Commission steps up repairs

Low interest rates and oil prices prompted the Clinton County Road Commission to purchase ahead of schedule 40,000 tons of asphalt for resurfacing primary roads in the county.

Mike Novach, superintendent-manager of the county road commission, said the purchase would not usually have been made until 1988 but that low interest rates and low oil prices (oil is a major ingredient in asphalt) mean the county can "do a few more roads for the same amount of money" if the purchase is made now.

The exact savings is unknown but Novach said asphalt is down one dollar a ton from a year ago.

Twenty-two sections of county primary roads are slated for resurfacing. Some roads will be widened to 22 feet if possible.

Novach said the work, scheduled for completion late this summer, will not interfere with other scheduled road work.

- Wright Road, from Howe Road to Chadwick Road.
- Airport Road, from Howe Road to Pratt Road.
- Chandler Road, from Alward Road to Green Road.
- Round Lake Road, from Chadwick Road to St. Clair Road.
- Wacousta Road, from I-96 to Clark Road.
- Turner Road, from State Road to Clark Road.
- State Road, from US-127 to Brown Road.
- Chandler Road, from the south county line to State Road.
- Upton Road, from State

- Road to Stoll Road.
- Price Road, from east.
- Chandler Road to one mile east.

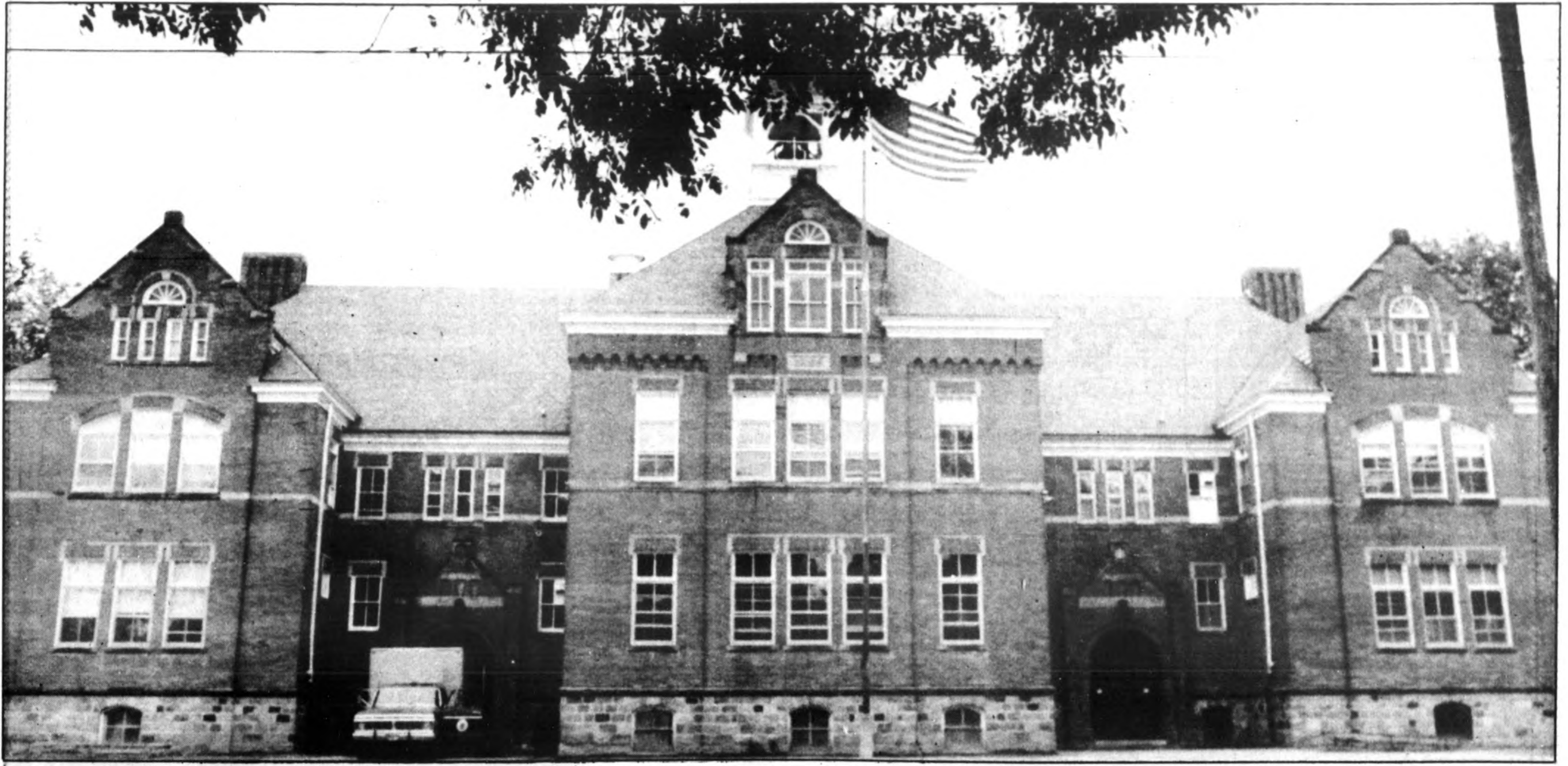

# An era ends for old Central School

## 'Last day' had a special meaning

It was the last day of school. For 100 years the spring day has arrived when the doors of Central School burst open and the students rush out into the long summer of freedom. But this year "the last day" had a special meaning. This year the doors of Central closed behind the departing students for the last time.

Only a few months after the 100th birthday of the school, a state fire inspector ordered the building closed unless expensive repairs were made. The final decision rests with the school board. But preliminary reports coming from architects hired by the school district and from a citizen committee suggest that the building will be torn down.

The passing of the old school was commemorated last Monday by the Central School Parent-Teacher Organization. Games, races and a picnic were held for the students, followed by an awards assembly at which nearly all the students were given a gift.

The P.T.O. also made a gift of a drawing of Central School to Principal Roger Feeman.

On Wednesday, as Central students made their way out of the building for the last time, Feeman displayed the drawing to a visitor. He picked up a red "Central School" banner, also a gift.

"That's a keeper," he said.

Feeman was first assigned to Central in 1959 and taught there until 1968.

"When I first started here there was talk even at that time about what to do about Central," he recalled.

After leaving the school for a number of years, Feeman returned to Central in 1981 and has served as principal since then.

"I guess it's with some misgiving that I see us closing Central," he said. "It's a landmark in the community and it served the community well... But I do think the time has come to lay it aside and move on."

"You're so busy at the end of the school year that you don't really think about it," said Carol Johnson, a kindergarten teacher who has been at Central for five years. "But it is sad."

Gordon Hyler, the father of one of Johnson's students, watched as the kids in the class looked at pictures dur-

ing the last few minutes of school. "Not too happy," he said when asked how he felt about the closing of Central. "I went to school here myself."

Hyler recalled being a student in Feeman's science class in 1964. He had been happy, he said, when his own child started at Central.

"There's a lot of people in the community who graduated from Central when it was a high school," said Feeman. "There's a lot of feeling from that group of people. We have people who graduated from here in 1929 who are still very much with us."

Second graders Jeremy Kigar and Jeremy Simpson were among a handful of students who stuck around after school to help their teacher, Shelia Rehmann, begin packing for the move out of the building.

They listened as their teacher explained to a visitor that she had taught at Central for only a year but that that had been long enough to develop an affection for the old building.

"It's going to be hard to leave it," she said. "But, as they say, life must go on. Right guys?"

"Right," said Jeremy Kigar and Jeremy Simpson.

"I don't want to leave this old building," said Jeremy Kigar. "It's been a lot of fun."

Pat Pioszak, a 17-year teacher at Central, is retiring this year. As the building became quieter with each passing moment, Pioszak was surrounded by small cluster of students from her own second grade class and some older students who had stopped in to say good-bye to their former — and obviously a favorite — teacher.

"It's really a nice building," said Pioszak, between hugs from departing students. "I hate to see it close."

"They won't tear it down," said one student.

"I hope not," said another.

"Historical building," said another.

"Good-bye Mrs. Pioszak," said another student, heading toward the door.

"I'm very sad to see it close," said Margaret Yurek, who has been the secretary at Central since 1969.

"There's been a lot of memories here."

Outside, the school buses had left and a few students were disappearing down the street. Brightly colored chalk drawings decorated the sidewalk. The American flag stirred silently on the pole in front of the building.

It was the last day of school.

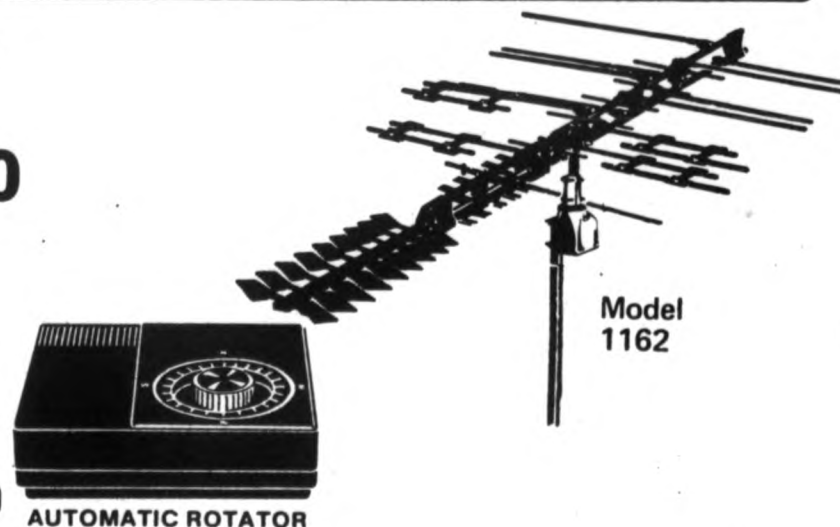

## Director's News

### Crop scouting

Giles Roehl



Have you scouted your crops lately? Scouting is the term used when the entire field is walked in a systematic manner to determine if weed, insect or disease pest are present.

Now is the time to be on the lookout for such pests as black cut worms in soybeans, corn and other crops (a severe infestation has been reported in Monroe County). However, don't look for just the black cutworm. When conditions are favorable for one species, they are usually good for all cutworm (and Army worm) species.

In corn, cutworms are normally located under the surface of the soil, near the base of the plants. Control measures are indicated when five percent or more of the plants show cutworm damage. Apply insecticides in a band over the plants. Apply in the evening when practical. Non-restricted chemicals such as Larshan, Sevin, Savit, Dylax or Proxal may be used. Restricted chemicals Pydrin, Payoff, Arnabush and Pounce are also approved.

## Acreage reports will protect crop bases

Pete LoDico, executive director of the Clinton County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said all farmers should file an acreage report whether they participate in the 1986 commodity programs or not to protect their crop acreage bases.

"By certifying crop acres, farmers establish documentation for future acreage bases as well as eligibility for different benefits if they decide to participate in farm programs," he said.

LoDico said it is very important for farmers who are participating in the 1986 programs to file an acreage report, because without it they are not really participating.

"We must have the report in order to determine the level at which producers are eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other program benefits," he said.

Farm program participants are required to report crops and acreages planted, the uses to be made of these crops, and cropland acres to be devoted to the acreage conservation reserve. When farmers report to the county ASCS office, they can review aerial photographs of their farm and pinpoint

the fields in which the crops are grown. This information is then documented for program compliance and crop

acreage bases.

Final certification date for program crops in Clinton County is July 1, 1986.

## Agricultural news

### Pasture rental

Marilyn Loudenslager



If you have pasture to rent, or graze cattle on someone else's pasture, a rental rate has to be established between the two parties.

According to Dr. Harlan Ritchie, MSU beef cattle specialist, pastures are generally rented on the basis of one of four methods: 1. charge per animal for the entire grazing season; 2. charge per acre for the entire grazing season; 3. charge per animal per month; 4. charge per pound of gain.

Perhaps the most extensive and reliable of pasture rental surveys is the annual one conducted on the bluestem grazing area by the Kansas Department of Agriculture. This year (1986) the reported average lease rate per head for cattle under 700 pounds is \$45.40 for the season, which usually runs six months, from mid-April to mid-October. Cattle under 700 pounds are allocated 4.2 a/head. Therefore, the charge per head per acre would be: \$45.40 divided by 4.2 a/head equaling \$10.81.

Assuming six months of grazing, the charge per head per month would be: \$45.40 divided by 6 equaling \$7.57. The bluestem acre leasing rates are down 17 percent from 1985 and are the lowest since 1978.

The most recent USDA survey data (1985), indicate that pastures in the lake states ranged from \$19 to \$23 per acre for the season. If the average seasonal carrying capacity is 1.5 to 2 acres per animal, the seasonal rate per animal would be \$28 to \$46. However, we must remember that carrying capacity of pastures varies greatly throughout the north central region. Furthermore, these figures are often based upon asking prices instead of actual lease arrangements. Therefore, they may be biased upward.

In a 1980 survey of pasture lease rates in Missouri, Dr. V.E. Jacobs, University of Missouri Farm Management Specialist, reported that the range was \$4 to \$9 per cow-calf per month. Although a new survey has not been conducted, Dr. Jacobs recently sug-

gested that current lease rates are likely lower than the 1980 rates.

When grazing land is leased on the basis of charge per pound of gain, the going rate appears to be 25 cents per pound. For example, the cost for 200 pounds of gain would be \$50.

Over the years, several "rule-of-thumb" formulas have been developed for determining pasture rental rates on an animal unit per month basis. One animal unit is defined as 1000 pounds of bovine weight.

The five percent damage requiring treatment also holds true in the soybean fields. Evening application, when possible, will give the best control. Use chemicals such as Larsban, Savit, Sevin, Larvin or restricted Pydrin for control by applying in a band over the

plants. Slugs are also causing some damage, especially in no till fields. Treatment for slugs in soybeans is indicated where 1/4 or more of the small plants show feeding. Apply treatment in the evening or if practical, at night. Corn may also be damaged by slugs feeding. Treatment is indicated

when 1/4 or more of the small plants show slug damage is occurring. Again apply in a band directly over the plants in the evening or night. Call the office for more control information. **THE CORNER GARDEN:** Some of my iris blooms are beautiful, hope yours are too. However, if some of your iris plants didn't bloom, now is the time to check to see what caused the problem. Dig up some

of the non-blooming rhizomes (bulbs). If they are soft and rotten, they are probably infected with iris borer. In the spring these plump, pint caterpillars hatch out of eggs laid on foliage in the late summer or early fall of

the previous year. Then they bore into the rhizomes.

A soft rot usually enters with them and reduces the rhizomes into a putrid mush. To avoid these problems, a thorough clean-up of foliage in the fall

should remove most eggs. In difficult situations, apply Sevin or Malathion spray to new growth next April. *Giles Roehl is the Director of the Clinton County Cooperative Extension Service.*

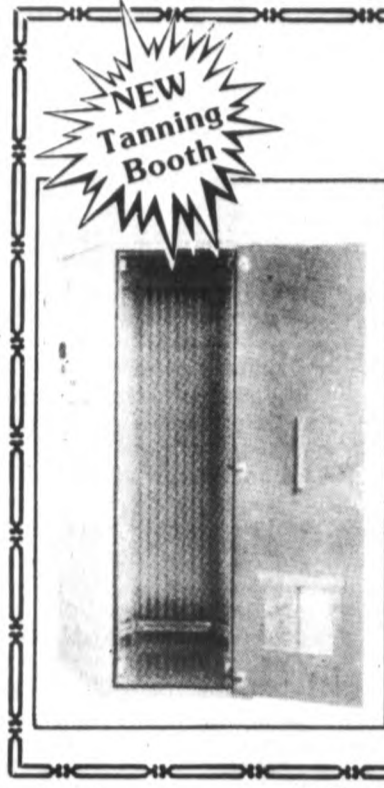
1. Number animal units times average hay price per ton times quality factor equals rate per head per month. The quality factors are: 22, lush; a 1000-pound cow with a 250-pound calf grazing fair to good pasture when hay price is \$50 per ton: 1.25 animal units times \$50/T times .15 quality forage equals \$9.37 per month. 2. Price of hay per ton divided by 8.5 equals rate animal unit per month. Using the same cow-calf pair and the same hay

price as above: \$50 divided by 8.5 times 1.25 equals \$7.35 per month. 3. Price of corn per bushel times 2.2 equals rate per animal unit per month. Using the same cow-calf pair and \$2.50/bushel corn price: \$2.50 times 2.2 times 1.25 equals \$6.88 per month.

Another rule-of-thumb that has been used is that seasonal rental rate should be equivalent of four to six percent of current market value of the pastureland. For example,

if the estimated land value were \$400 per acre: five percent of \$400 equals \$20 per acre for the grazing season.

As you can see there are many ways to determine a rental rate for pasture. The final rate used must be one agreed upon by both the landlord and the renter. Study the above options carefully and use the one that most suits your situation. *Marilyn Loudenslager is the Agriculture Agent for the Clinton County Cooperative Extension Service.*



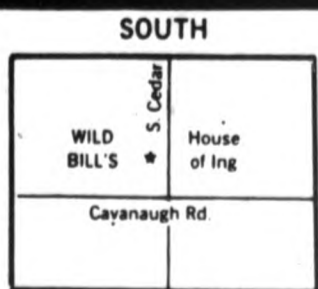

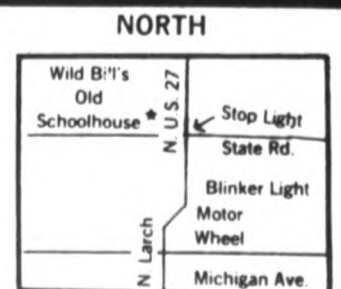
