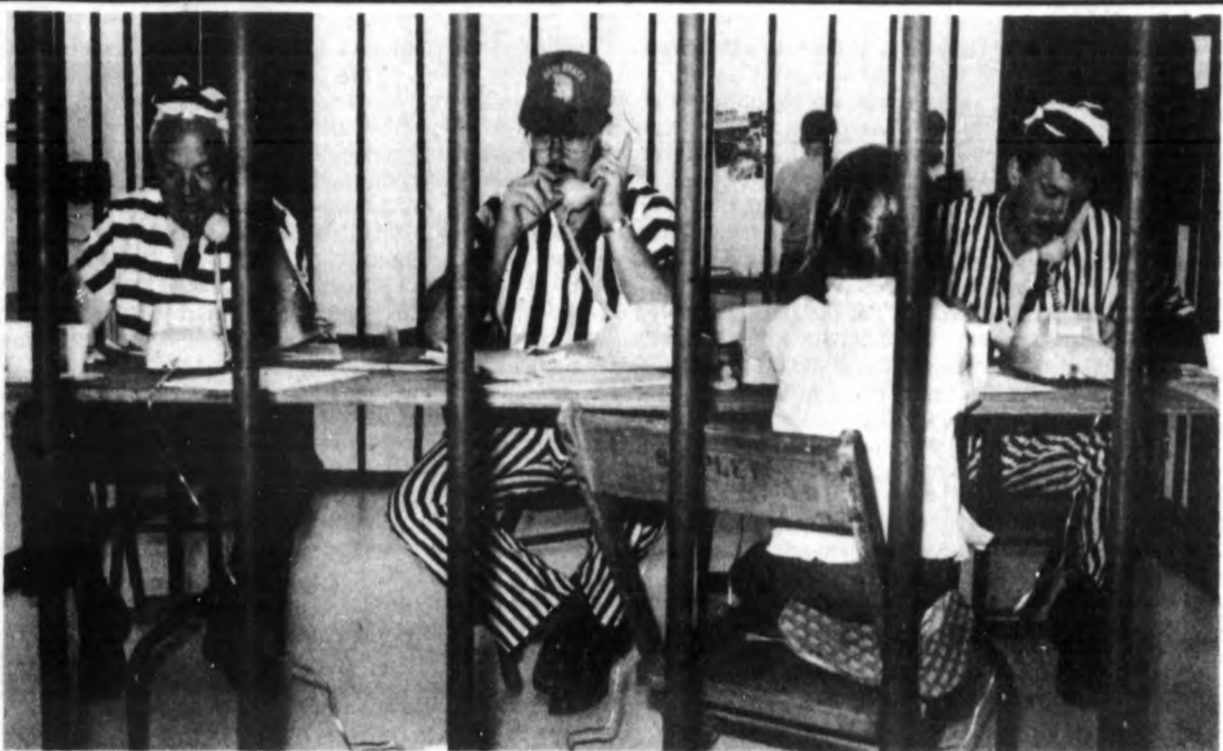

## Great American Lock-Up raises almost \$10,000 in only three days

The Clinton County Chapter of the American Cancer Society locked onto success last week, raising nearly \$10,000 in the Great American Lock-Up at the Southpoint Mall in St. Johns.

About 75 residents of the St. Johns area "went to jail" in the fund raising event, co-sponsored by the St. Johns Jaycees. By telephone from their jail cell the convicts raised \$9,962 in "bail" money — almost double the original \$5,000 goal for the fundraiser and far in excess of a revised \$8,000 goal set when the original goal was reached.

"I was pleased," said Kelly Conway, area representative for the American Cancer Society.

Paul Schuller, president of the county chapter, said 40 percent of the money will be used for cancer research and the rest for education.

Those who were thrown in the clink were for the most part turned in by friends or colleagues who paid \$25 for the pleasure of seeing the prisoners dressed in convict stripes. The charges against the prisoners ranged from jaywalking to being a fan of the wrong sports team.

"They're usually a little ridiculous," said Schuller.

It really did not matter what the charges were through — everyone was guilty, guilty guilty. As a matter of fact, Richard "The Hanging Judge" Carpenter, a resident of Suntree Apartments, routinely informed defendants that "all people brought before this court are guilty until proven guilty."

"I ask them how they plead and if they plead not guilty, I raise the bail," Carpenter explained. "Then I ask them if they have any more to say and if they say anything at all I raise the bail again."

Carpenter began his career as a hanging judge shortly after he

was himself released from jail after raising \$325 on a \$150 bail. His crime was "Racing in a Wheelchair."

Carpenter tried but was unable to convince his judicial colleagues to jail his girlfriend. She had seemed upset at the prospect of going to jail and the court had been inclined to show mercy in her case.

"I would have thrown her in jail anyway," said Carpenter.

While Carpenter discussed his brand of justice with a reporter, Jim Burch, Dan Bowditch and Jerry Mitchell were sitting in the three-person cell busily trying to raise their bail. Their task was not made any easier by the fact that they were jailed on Thursday afternoon after the town had been worked over for three days.

"You know, I'm a nice guy," Mitchell pleaded into the telephone. "I don't deserve to be here. I'm innocent. The judge asked me if I had any more to say and I said one word and blew it."

## Sjoberg challenges seating of Tom Irrer and Bob Craig

One of the leaders of the recall campaign that ousted six trustees of the St. Johns school board from office in April has challenged the seating on the board of two trustees who were subsequently re-elected.

James Sjoberg, recall petition chairman for the Concerned Taxpayers of St. Johns during the recall campaign, said he has filed with the St. Johns schools a legal challenge to the seating of Thomas Irrer and Robert Craig on the board. The two men were sworn into office on June 16, although Irrer's term did not begin until July 1.

Sjoberg said the school district has

30 days to respond to his challenge. If no response is made, Irrer and Craig automatically lose their seats on the school board, he said.

If the school rebuts his challenge — as Sjoberg said he expects to happen — then he will file his challenge in Circuit Court, he said.

Sjoberg also said Senator Alan Cropsey has asked the state attorney general's office to issue an interpretation of the law upon which his challenge is based.

The law states: "An officer who was recalled shall not be a candidate to fill the vacancy created by the recall nor be appointed to fill a vacancy in an elective office in the electoral district or governmental unit from which the recall was made

during the term of office from which the officer was recalled."

Irrer was recalled from a term of office ending June 30, 1986. His election was for a new term beginning July 1, 1986.

"I fail to see how he feels that the term beginning July, 1986, to June 30, 1990, was the term I was recalled from," said Irrer. "The law says you can't return for the term you were recalled from."

Craig was elected to fill a vacancy created by the recall. However, the term for which he was elected is a different term than the one from which he was recalled.

Craig, who was on vacation last week, could not be reached for comment.

## Fowler promotes Chartrand to superintendent of schools

Mary Ann Chartrand will be the new superintendent of Fowler schools, the Board of Education announced last month.

Chartrand has served as principal of the Waldron Elementary and Middle School for the past eleven years.

She replaces James Andros who had been superintendent for the past four years. He resigned to accept the position of assistant superintendent for the Fenton Area Public Schools.

Chartrand was born in St. Johns, the daughter of Marshall and Arlene Davis. She completed her junior and senior high education in Lansing, graduating from J.W. Sexton High School in 1964. She obtained her professional training at Michigan State University, earning a B.A. degree in English education and a M.A. in evaluation, measurement and research design. She has completed her Ph.D. coursework in educational administration.

In 1969, Chartrand joined the staff at Most Holy Trinity School in Fowler, teaching middle school language arts, music, reading, and journalism. In 1973, she became a member of the Fowler Public School

teaching staff, and was appointed principal in 1975.

While principal, Chartrand was active in professional educational associations including the Michigan Elementary and Middle School Principals Association (MEMSPA). She served on the state conference planning committee, the Middle School Task Force committee, was past-treasurer of Region 8, and most recently served as treasurer of the state organization.

She is also a member of the National Association of Elementary School Principals (NAESP), Michigan Reading Association (MRA), Michigan Association of Middle School Educators (MAMSE), Clinton Reading Council, and Michigan (and national) Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development (NASCD and ASCD).

"Small school districts have special problems," said Chartrand. "The foremost problem is providing a quality, well-rounded K-12 program which meets the needs of all students. I see being able to maintain or improve our current high-quality program at a reasonable cost as the

biggest challenge ahead."

"Since the community is proud of its schools and has shown the school district continued support, the key to meeting this challenge lies in preserving this school/community relationship."

## Gas station

ST. JOHNS Beck's Farm Market, on US-27 several miles north of St. Johns, will add a gasoline service station, said company president Ben Beck last week.

Beck said the company plans to offer four gasoline products — regular, unleaded, premium unleaded and diesel — but did not yet know what brand will be offered.

The service station, to be located on property at the south end of the farm market, will be open by Labor Day weekend if the company meets its goal, Beck said. If it does not open by then, it will open sometime later in the fall, he said.

"There's no gas in this area," Beck said. "The people have been putting a bug in my ear for a couple of years now."

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners last week approved a special use permit for the service station.

## St. Johns Mint Festival to be bigger this year

More of everything. That's how the 1986 Mint Festival might be compared to the festival last year.

There will be more food concessions, more entertainment, and more events.

Events new to the festival this year are an outdoor flea market, tours of the St. Johns Post Office, continuous and free entertainment, a dunk tank, a fingerprinting and "Lite-a-bike" program for children, a performance by the Second Time Around Band, a breakfast sponsored by the St. Joseph Altar Society, a children's parade, and "Ugly Dog Plus" contest, a fireman's water ball fight and a raffle drawing with a grand prize of a trip to the Bahamas.

One of the few events of last year that will not be repeated this year is the carnival, which fell victim to the

liability insurance climate. Chamber Director Joann Martis said many small carnivals have disbanded because of insurance problems.

The festival's own liability insurance, the single greatest expense incurred by the festival, will cost 25 percent more than last year, Martis said.

"Insurance is our biggest bugaboo," she said.

(Editor's note: This statement prompted a brief discussion about what a bugaboo is. Nobody knew, but all concerned were confident that whatever it is, it is safe to mention in a family newspaper.)

The arts and crafts fair will be larger, featuring 100 entries as opposed to 80 last year. Even with the greater number, however, all of the available space in the arts and crafts

air have already been filled.

The Mint Festival Parade, also expected to be larger this year, will travel a different route, starting at the St. Johns High School instead of the Southpoint Mall.

"Last year it was an hour and 20 minutes long," Martis said. "This year I don't have any idea, but I know it will be longer."

Festival goers will find restrooms easier to find this year as more portable restrooms have been added.

Last week Mint Festival placemats were fresh off the press. Still to come are 25,000 brochures promoting the festival.

Martis said St. Johns area residents leaving the community on vacations are welcome to take along Mint Festival promotional materials to drop off in the areas they visit.

"Truck drivers will take them on their routes and drop them off," she said.

Volunteers are also needed to work one hour shifts in the information booth during the festival, to help set up for the arts and crafts fair, and to help with crowd control during the parade.

During the festival McDonald's will sell mint shakes in a mint festival souvenir cup and Elias Big Boy will sell chocolate mint ice cream cake.

"Anyone in the community can promote their own business through the festival," Martis said.

Martis said she had recently looked at a photograph of the festival last year that to her was a kind of symbol what the festival is supposed to be: lots of fun for the community. In the photograph a line of parents were watching their children driving in the Big Wheel Race.

"They were all just beaming," Martis said. "That's what it's all about."

## County might sell property in St. Johns to company for youth psychiatric hospital

A parcel of property in St. Johns owned by the county could be the site of a juvenile psychiatric hospital, following approval by county commissioners June 20 of a proposal that gives Rivendell of Michigan a purchase option on the property.

If the private, non-profit company accepts the proposal, it will pay the county \$7,629 for the right to purchase the land by Jan. 2, 1987. The county would keep the money if Rivendell decided not to make the purchase. It would be applied toward

the \$152,580 purchase price if the purchase was made.

The contract also stipulates that the property, located on the southern edge of St. Johns near the corner of Townsend Road and Lansing Street, could be used only for a juvenile psychiatric hospital.

Commissioners Lois Bracey and Walter Nobis voted against approval of the option contract. Commissioners Roger Overway, Earl Lancaster, Richard Hawks, Robert Vandriessen and Glen Webster voted in

favor.

Bracey said she voted against the contract because it could rule out the possibility of using the property for a new county jail.

"At this point I feel we need a new jail," she said. "Years ago that was the property they intended for the new jail."

County Administrator Bill LeFevre said the contract was the county's response to an earlier proposal by Rivendell.

"They had proposed some options

that were significantly more to their advantage than our (proposal)," he said.

For instance, he said, Rivendell's earlier proposal included provisions for the return of the "up-front" money if the company could not get a license to build their facility or if the company decided the property was not right for use as a hospital site.

LeFevre said Rivendell representatives would be in St. Johns this week to discuss the county's proposal.

# Webster to run as write-in candidate

Clinton County commissioner Glen Webster, who last month narrowly missed the deadline for filing nominating petitions to have his name included on the August 5 primary election ballot, will run for re-election as a write-in Democrat.

Webster, who currently holds office as a Republican, said last month he would consider a bid as a

Democrat even though he has traditionally been a Republican. He characterized himself at that time as "more of an independent than anything else." He confirmed last Thursday that he would run as a write-in candidate.

There were no filings by Democrats for the District 1 seat held by Webster. Clinton County Clerk Jane Swanchara said the number of write-in votes needed by Webster in

order to win a spot on the November ballot will not be known until after the election. She said there are several different formulas used to determine the number of votes needed by write-in primary election candidates and that whichever formula yields the highest number of votes is the one that is used in a particular election.

"In no case will it be less than ten votes," Swanchara said.

If Webster is successful in his bid for a spot on the November ballot, he will face challenger Bertine A. Thelen, who filed unopposed for the Republican slot on the ballot. Thelen is a part-time county employee and the owner of a Greenbush Township farm.

## Farmers reminded of soybean referendum

To the Editor:  
I would like to make area soybean farmers aware of the upcoming Soybean Referendum scheduled for June 30 through July 12.  
The ballot will include two questions. One will ask growers if they want the soybean promotion and development program to continue. The second will offer the option of continuing the program but increasing the check-off to one cent/bushel, an increase of 1/2 cent/bushel. For the program to continue and to increase the check-off to one cent/bushel, there must be a simple majority of those voting and of the acreage they represent.  
If passed, this one cent would put Michigan in line with other check-off states. Presently, soybean producers in 26 states pay assessments ranging from 1/2 to two cents. Three states are at 1/2 cent and three are at two cents while the remainder are at one cent.  
More important, passage of the increase would allow

more funds for investing in export market development. It also provides for a refund of assessments.  
The Michigan Soybean Association, a voluntary organization of soybean growers, supports the check-off increase and points out that at the one cent/bushel assessment, a farmer growing 50 bushels/acre is only spending 50 cents/acre on promotion.  
Ballots will be mailed to the soybean producers; extras will be available at the Extension Office.

## Randall seeks re-election to state House

State Representative Gary Randall announced he will seek re-election to the Michigan House.  
Elected to the House in 1978, Randall serves on the House committees on corporations and finance; agriculture and forestry; and Education.  
"I'm very pleased that in the last couple of years the state has been able to assume a greater share in the funding of public education which has helped relieve our dependency on local property taxes," Randall said.  
"However, I believe the state must find a way to support our educational system without relying on

local property taxes."  
The fourth term lawmaker, who also serves as assistant Republican leader, is a member of the Legislative Council and co-chairs the Council's library subcommittee.  
Randall, who has been called one of the most active members of the legislature in sponsoring agricultural legislation, is currently working on legislation that would protect farmers in the event of a grain elevator failure.  
The lawmaker said the state should be working more closely with farmers in developing overseas markets and expanding the export of Michigan crops.

"During my visit to China last December, as a guest of the Taiwanese government, I was struck by the tremendous potential for trade expansion," Randall said. "The state of Michigan needs to further cultivate this relationship."

Randall has introduced a resolution to establish sister-statehood with the Republic of China. This, he said, will hopefully bring the Chinese to Michigan on an agricultural product buying mission.

"Agriculture is just one industry in Michigan that needs help," he said. "State government must renew its commitment to

improving the state's business climate. We need reforms in the areas of workers' and unemployment compensation. Our workers' compensation rate is still significantly higher than the national average.  
"While dealing with problems that affect the entire state, lawmakers must also meet the needs of their local constituents. I consider it a tremendous privilege to serve the residents of the 89th district and look forward to representing them again next term."

I've never been the first to volunteer for anything so it was with some misgiving that I observed myself becoming involved in a project aimed at building a new library. I tend to think of myself as an observer of these sorts of things — write something nice about 'em, sure, but to actually get down in the trenches with these dreamers? Who you trying to kid?

Anyway, a survey of folks in the library service area has been completed. It was intended to find out what sorts of services people hereabouts want their local library to provide. Interpreted with a reasonable amount of caution — we survey takers were all amateurs after all — the survey results would seem to indicate that there is a fair amount of support for the library project.

The question was asked: Are you in favor of improving the library? Seventy-four percent of the people who responded said yes.

Many of the suggestions people gave for improving the library — more space, more books and research materials, more programs for children, space to "spread out" — not only speak to the need for a bigger library, but would also seem to indicate that there is a fair amount of support for the project.

Still, a reasonable amount of caution, as I mentioned before, should be taken when interpreting this

survey. In my opinion, it does not qualify as a truly scientific survey of the sort Louis Harris or other professionals would have been able to conduct. For one thing, we fell short of the required number of responses to the survey — we have 414 responses while our information tells us 600 are necessary for a scientifically valid sample.

The survey is, on the other hand, not a bad piece of work if it is thought of not as the definitive statement about what exact percentages of such and such a group support such and such an item but more as one of several ways of getting a sense of the priorities people have when it comes to their library.

The people working on the project are committed to finding out more about those priorities through a number of different methods — further surveys, for instance, but perhaps more importantly, through encouraging involvement in the project by as many individuals and community groups as possible.

Thus I was concerned when the number of people showing up at library project meetings began to dwindle. At the last meeting — which was itself attended by far fewer people than I would have expected — it was obvious that the project had lost momentum.

How come? I asked.  
"Lo and behold there were all sorts of ideas. What they came down to was this: too much talk and not enough action. People get tired of going to meetings, listening to committee reports, then going home. When people show up to volunteer, they expect to do something.

I don't particularly see this as a criticism of what the project has accomplished so far. One step at a time is required to get things done. On the other hand it looks like the time is ripe to stir up a little more activity.

So beginning this week, the public relations committee is going to shift gears. We're going to put together booths for the sidewalk sale, the 4-H Fair, the Mint Festival. A float for the Mint Festival parade. A puppet show. Balloons. Hoopla.

All of this is going to require people who want to do something. If you get tired of talk and drifted away — come back. It's time to hunker down and have some fun. No idea for publicizing the library project is too wild to consider. The wild the better. Go nuts.

Uh, one thing though — it's all going to start at, you guessed it, a meeting. Tonight, 7 p.m. at the library.

## Max Hogle retires after 30 years of delivering the mail in Pewamo

When Max Hogle on Saturday delivered the mail to Don and Pat Stump he left with more than just outgoing mail.

He also left with some toy "fishing equipment", balloons that had been used to decorate the mailbox and a big sign wishing him a happy retirement.

After serving for over 30 years as Pewamo's mailman, Max Hogle is retiring.

"Be sure to thank all my customers," he told a

reporter who visited Hogle's home on the day he delivered his last piece of mail. "Thanks for bearing with me — I admit to eight mistakes a day. After that I'm not saying."

Eight mistakes is likely an exaggeration. Actually, Hogle has not had an accident in over three decades of driving his 85-mile, 330-stop route six days a week.

Also, there has not been a day on the last five years when winter weather kept him from his appointed rounds. He can remember, though, when his route,

half in Ionia County and half in Clinton County, was much harder to manage in the winter than it is now.

"The road commissions now are much better," he said. "Clinton County has shown a remarkable improvement since I started."

Hogle knows by name almost every one of the customers on his route. As a matter of fact, he has twice intervened when he noticed a customer had not picked up mail from the day before. Once, an elderly woman had been trapped in her barn with a

frozen leg. Another time a man's furnace had clogged up and Hogle found him huddled beneath blankets trying to stay warm.

Both times Hogle got help for the postal customers.

And, says his wife Harriet, he is known for little extras like carrying packages up to the door when it is raining.

But with that behind him what is he going to do now?

"Fish a little bit with my son and grandson," he says. "Then do kind of what I want to do I guess."

County asks feds to forgive debt from Maple River drainage project

Clinton County commissioners have asked the U.S. government to forgive a \$756,820 debt owed to the Farmers Home Administration by the Maple River Drainage District.

The request is intended to avoid increasing the tax burden on farmers and others in the drainage district.

Clinton County recently approved an assessment against individual land

owners and municipal and public corporations to pay the county's share of \$625,000 owed to banks and engineering companies in connection with the abandoned project.

That assessment was estimated to cost farmers in the drainage district a one-time payment of 50 cents to two dollars per acre.

That assessment, however, will not pay for the Farmers Home Administration debt.

Commissioners said if the "Congress of the United States and its various representatives" do not agree to forgive the debt, another assessment would probably be necessary to pay it off.

An East Lansing man was arrested June 19 in connection with a series of breaking and enterings in the Wacousta area.

Scott Russell Sterns, 18, of 334 Evergreen St., East Lansing, was released from custody on personal recognizance bond. He is suspected in five breaking and enterings in the Wacousta area since April.

Sheriff makes annual department report

Speeders beware. That is one message that might be gleaned from the 1985 year-end report presented last Tuesday by Clinton County Sheriff Terry Haneckow to the Clinton County Board of Commissioners.

The report shows that the total number of tickets issued to motorists by the department more than tripled in 1985 compared to either 1984 or 1983.

Speeding tickets accounted for much of the increase. The department issued 1,780 tickets for speeding in 1985 — up from 584 in 1984 and 421 in 1983.

Other highlights of the report:

- The number of prisoners either lodged in the county jail or boarded out to other counties jumped by over 3,000 prisoners from 1984 to 1985. The total for 1985 was

## Late planting, other problems

# Rain creates tough times for county crops

Rainy weather has caused risky delays in the planting of some crops in Clinton County and has created problems for crops already in the ground, said county farm officials last week.

"There are some real concerns out there with low prices and so on on top of this," said Peter LoDico, county director of the Agriculture Stabiliza-

tion and Conservation Service. "Our soils are pretty much at the saturation point," said soil conservationist James Squires.

Among the problems caused by the rainy weather:

- Some crops, such as silage corn and some drybeans, have not been planted because of wet fields.

"There is some ground that hasn't been planted," said Giles Roehl, director of the county extension ser-

vice. "To plant anything, it is getting late."

LoDico said some farmers will risk planting very late and hope for a good fall "because they can't just leave the ground laying there."

"Every day that goes past June 25 it gets riskier and riskier," he said.

- Some crops have been washed out and others are standing in water.
- "A lot of farmers are commenting about the way their crops look

because they've been standing in water," said LoDico. "Of course you don't know what the yield is going to be until you're out there thrashing."

Squires said high moisture levels are also making it hard to get nitrogen on corn crops in the county because the ground is too wet to operate tractors.

"That's going to be a problem also," he said.

- Wheat crops are infested with

head scab, a disease that does not normally show up in the area. The disease multiplies more quickly in the cool damp weather of last month, said county agriculture officials.

"Most of the fields I've observed have some (head scab) infestation," said Squires. "I don't believe I've seen a field that didn't have it."

Glume blotch, another disease, has also infested some wheat fields in the county.

"Our wheat is really sick," said Roehl.

• Rainy weather creates conditions favorable for insects to breed out of control.

"Now's the time to be really on the alert for insects that can really get out of hand with the weather we've been having," said Squires.

"Some warm nights, sunny days — good growing weather," said Squires. "That's what we need."

### Director's News

## Wheat diseases

Head scab is a very important disease to look for at this time. This disease can influence seed quality and can involve mycotoxin problems. Scab infections seen in surveys to date are quite variable, with trace to severe amounts reported. If warm, wet conditions prevail, it may continue to get worse. Infection may result in blasted spikelets and aborted grain or in shriveled, moldy looking grain with a pinkish-orange coloration.

Many of the lightweight "scabby" kernels are blown out of the back of the combine, thus causing yield losses. Less severely infected kernels, however, will remain in the harvested grain. It is these infected kernels that pose the problem with mycotoxins. The scab fungus will not grow when the kernel moisture is lower than 18 percent; therefore infection and potential mycotoxin problems will not get worse after harvest. Mold-damaged grain, however, is more susceptible to storage molds.

Scab is capable of producing several mycotoxins. These toxins are most damaging to animals such as swine, horse, dogs and other animals with stomachs. Mycotoxin problems involving scabby wheat are not common but it would be best to avoid feeding scabby wheat to breeding swine or horses. Toxin analysis can be done at the MSU Veterinary Toxicology Lab or private labs around the state if any suspected seed lots need to be checked.

Seed producers and those saving seed are urged to thoroughly clean their seed lots. If scab infected seed is present, it may be necessary to "turn up the fan" to remove as much infected grain as possible. All seed should be treated with a seed-treatment fungicide. Vitavax 200 with Captan has been shown to be superior to other fungicides in controlling scab seedling blight in the fall.

**Nitrogen** With all the rain, a lot of corn is not getting the nitrogen it needs. It can be applied, however, by air.

Make sure the corn is dry. Spreading 200 to 225 pounds of urea per acre will yield a nitrogen application of about 100 pounds per acre.

**THE CORNER GARDEN** — We have experienced heavy rains in the last few weeks which have left some lawns or turf sites flooded. If the area is flooded long enough, loss of the grass can occur, especially if standing water is shallow and sunshine heats the water sufficiently to injure the grass. Once grass has been injured what can be done? First you need to determine if the crown tissue is still alive. This can be done by looking for green tissue in the crown area.

With good growing weather, new shoots should arise from the crown within a week to ten days. Also, grasses like Kentucky bluegrass may recover from rhizomes or bentgrasses from stolons if these tissues are still alive. Modest fertilization and irrigation will help the regeneration process.

If however, these plant parts are not alive, you should consider overseeding. This can be done with an overseeder which drops seed into slits or grooves cut into the turf or by aggressively cultivating the area with a lawn rake or other appropriate tool and overseeding, followed by dragging with a drag mat or other tool, then lightly cover the seed. In areas where annual bluegrass has been predominant, seeding may not be necessary as adequate supplies of viable annual bluegrass seed should be present. After the cultivation and/or overseeding process, the area should be watered two to three times daily to encourage rapid germination and establishment. Some limitation on traffic is best for successful overseeding.

In those wet areas where excess water is still present because of heavy rainfall, continue to watch for ruts caused by maintenance equipment and scalping where adequate mowing has not been possible.

## Take cover

People need to "take cover" when applying and mixing pesticides. This means wearing a special garment to protect your body from contact with the pesticides.

The type of garment worn depends on the preference of the individual. Though thrift is usually commendable, these people need to realize the importance of investing in a garment that will give them the protection they need.

A spray garment can be a commercially designed overall and hood that can be laundered. These garments sometimes cost as much as \$150. There are also disposable spray garments that cost \$30 to \$40 each, which can be worn and laundered a maximum of four to five times. A protective garment can also consist of a long-sleeved shirt or jacket and pants.

If a farmer does not choose a commercially manufactured garment and opts for his/her own clothes, he/she should be careful to use only one outfit for spraying and not to wear that outfit for anything else. Denim that is 100 percent cotton is best.

Along with the basic spray garment, which should cover the torso, legs and arms, the farmer should wear gloves. They should be long, unlined and washable and be tucked under the sleeves of the garment. Tall waterproof boots are also required. Do not wear anything made of leather, such as watchbands, boots, belts, hats or gloves. Once leather is contaminated, there is no way to clean it.

Protective glasses, breathing devices and something to cover the head, such as a wide-brimmed hat, are also recommended.

Once a person is finished spraying or mixing spray, he/she should remove the garment outside of the home and hose it off. It should be carried

in a plastic container that is not used for anything else. Boots, gloves, hats and other accessories should also be hosed down and washed each time they are used.

The person who has applied the pesticide should wash and shampoo immediately. He/she should never eat, smoke or use the bathroom after spraying until washing thoroughly.

The person who is going to handle and launder the contaminated clothes must also take precautions. He or she should always wear rubber gloves and a plastic apron. The gloves and apron should be hosed down afterwards. If the garment has been highly soiled with pesticides, the launderer should also protect his/her breathing. In the case of clothing that has been saturated with pesticides, the garments should be burned or buried.

## Maggot emergence can be kept to a minimum by proper attention

Almost every year, reports of seed corn maggot injury to field emergence in soybeans and dry edible beans are received, and 1986 is no exception.

However, the problems in soybeans may have been compounded this year because of two weeks of cool, wet weather that recently occurred throughout Michigan. Under such conditions, germination is slowed down, leaving the emerging seed vulnerable to attack throughout a longer time period. Although the problem may occur anywhere, it is usually more serious in soils with high organic matter (muck) and where manure has been applied.

Although it is too late for preventatives or correc-

tive action when symptoms are observed, it is worth noting that emergence problems can be minimized in a couple of ways. The first is by furrow application of

an insecticide at planting time, at a cost of approximately \$8-\$9/acre.

The second preventative measure at minimal cost is by chemical treatment

during seed processing and conditioning. Chemicals registered for use in both soybeans and dry edible beans include Lorsban, Diazinon, and Lindane.

## Prices drop 110% since 1977

The index of prices received by farmers in Michigan for all products as of May 15 was down 110 percent of its 1977 base. This is a two percent increase from April, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. The May price index was six percent below its level a year earlier.

The price index for all crops grown in Michigan

rose two percent from April. The prices of wheat, corn and hay were up slightly. The price of oats fell. Fruit and vegetable prices were mostly unchanged. The livestock and livestock product price index for Michigan rose one percent from the previous month. Substantial price increases of animals for slaughter were partially offset by declines in milk and egg prices. The crop index and the livestock

price index were 10 percent and four percent below their May, 1985 levels, respectively.

The May index of prices received for all U.S. farm products increased 2.5 percent from April to 124 percent of its 1977 average. Higher prices for cattle, hogs, and corn were partially offset by lower prices for wheat, milk and eggs. The index was about five percent below a year ago.

As I drive through Clinton County I notice there are many non-farm homes located on every state, county and township road. Individuals living in these homes love to live in the country — to be the farmer's neighbor.

Many of these modern homes have the garage attached directly to the house. Many, such as mine, have a door leading from the garage to the kitchen. Now, suppose I drive down a road where a farmer has just been hauling manure from the barnyard to the field. Because the operator was not careful a lot of manure was left on the roadway. Very likely by the next morning a not to nice smell will be throughout

the garage, maybe the kitchen or even the entire home.

This potential problem came up at a recent meeting I attended. A concern was voiced that if we are not more careful and clean up the roadways after manure spills, some method may be found that will force the operator to do just that.

In some states manure spills are treated the same as any other litter. The farmers can be fined and still made to clean up the mess! Let's avoid that potential. Let's continue to be good neighbors and keep the roadways clean.

## Rep. Randall sponsors bill meant to help farm transportation safety

State Representative Gary Randall has introduced a bill (HB 5637) to resolve the problem of moving wide farm vehicles on the highway.

Under current law, a farm implement wider than 108 inches is prohibited from traveling on the highway between the hours of sunset and sunrise without a special permit.

This bill would eliminate the need for special permits and would allow farmers to move these implements on the highway. If they travel at night, the implements must be equipped with lights on the side extremities. The bill would also allow them to cross the center line if an obstruction on the shoulder prevents them from keeping to the right.

"As technology develops larger farm machinery, we need to make sure our laws recognize the need for farmers to get to and from their fields," Randall said.

"But we also need to protect the other drivers on our public roads. I believe my bill would do both."

Randall's bill requires that the wide implements have lights on the front and

rear indicating the extremities. The lights facing the front would be amber while the rear lights would be red.

Randall noted that the Michigan State Police have reported an increase in accidents involving farm equipment operating on public roads.

This bill is expected to be taken up in a House committee early this fall.

## Farm ponds can be profitable and fun, but only if they are also safe

A farm pond has many uses. And ponds, like any body of water, attract people. When the two come together there always is chance of drowning.

Ponds are a valuable asset and have many uses. During the past quarter century farmers and ranchers have built nearly a million ponds as part of their soil and water conservation plans.

You may be planning to build a farm pond or you may be one of the farmers who has built a pond with technical help that local soil conservation districts obtained from the soil conservation service. You may have wanted livestock water, irrigation, or fire protection. But your family and friends will want to picnic beside the pond or swim, boat, fish, or ice skate. Your farm pond can be a source of joy as well as profit, but only if it is safe!

Before you build your pond:

- Find out what your community or state laws say about your liability in case of accident or death. You may need to protect yourself with insurance.
- Locate your pond so that it will not get the drainage from barnyards or sewers.
- Decide how you are going to use the water so that the engineer can provide for swimming beaches, guards over conduits, and other safety measures when he designs the pond.
- Have your pond built by a reliable contractor who will

follow the engineering specifications.

During construction:

- Remove all trees, stumps, and brush within the swimming area.
- Remove all rubbish, wire, junk machinery, and fences that might hinder safe boating or swimming.
- Eliminate sudden dropoffs and deep holes in the swimming area.
- When the pond is completed:
  - Mark the safe swimming areas.
  - Place warning signs at danger points.
  - Place lifesaving devices such as ring buoys, ropes, or long poles at swimming areas.
  - Post safety instructions for boating, swimming, and skating.

- Never swim or skate alone.
- Use boats that will float if swamped or capsized.
- Stay out of farm ponds during storms and when spillways are flowing.
- Recognize that farm ponds are hazards to small children.

Other important points:

- Nonswimmers should wear lifejackets in boats.
- All children should be encouraged to learn to swim. The Red Cross, 4-H, and other organizations help with instructions.
- Posters on safe boating, swimming, and skating are available from the American Red Cross and other organizations that deal with water safety.

## Stately birches can be preserved

White birches with drooping or dead tops are a common sight in many Michigan neighborhoods. Victims of a small, elongated, metallic-looking beetle, these trees gradually die back until they must be removed.

Homeowners can fight back with carefully timed sprays of chemical insecticides to kill the adult beetles before they have a chance to lay their eggs in crevices in the birch bark, other sprays to control birch leaf miner (foliage damage by this pest can weaken trees, making them more susceptible to borer attack), and a program of water and fertilizer to keep trees growing as vigorously as possible.

Or they could plant some other kind of tree.

The European white birch and its cutleaf variety are the most commonly planted birches in the home landscape, says Curt Peterson, Extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University. Homeowners like the stark white bark and graceful shape of this imported tree.

Unfortunately, birch borers like it, too. And the tree has virtually no built-in resistance to the pest.

Some native birches, however, are much less susceptible. A survey of a Michigan neighborhood showed that 50 percent of the European white birch trees were infested, while only 30 percent of the gray birch and five percent of the paper birch showed signs of borer activity.

"Because a fairly high percentage of the gray birches were infested, we encourage homeowners to consider the paper birch instead," Peterson says. "Its loose, peeling bark

isn't as white as that of the European white birch or the gray birch, but the tree will last longer in the landscape. And its bark adds interest to the landscape year round."

Rather than decide immediately what type of tree you want to plant — whether it's white birch or something else — Peterson suggests thinking through what function you want the tree to perform in the landscape and then choosing a species accordingly.

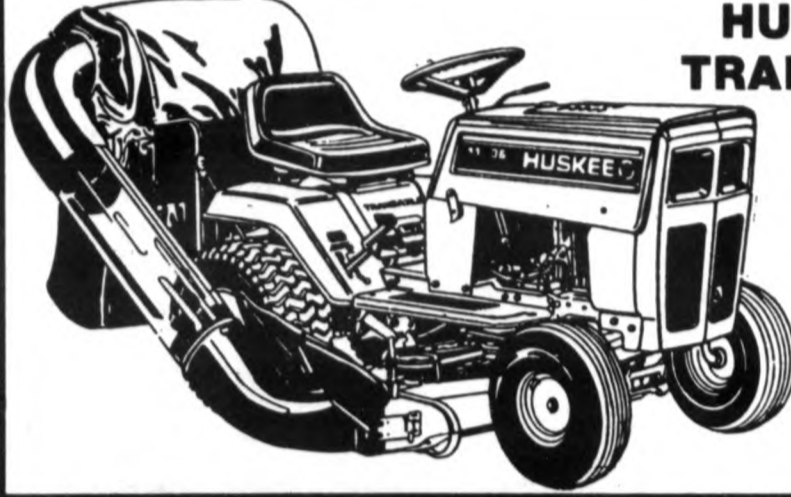

Hollenbeck are unopposed in their respective bids for the 89th District seat in the state House of Representatives. • For the 10th District seat in the U.S. House of Representatives, Republican incumbent Bill Schuette has no primary election opposition. On the Democratic side of the ballot, Don Albosta, who held the seat before losing it to Schuette, will compete with Karl E. Yoder. • Republican candidates for governor are Dick Chrysler, Col-

## Bath to have rodeo but insurance problem rules out usual carnival

Liability insurance problems may prevent Bath from having a carnival at its Community Days/centennial celebration in July, but a rodeo has been added this year and should provide plenty of excitement. Publicity Chairperson Jean Yanna says the Sesquicentennial Committee approached 30 carnivals, but couldn't find one that would come during the celebration July 16-20. Up until last week, the committee thought Elliott Amusements of Mason might provide carnival rides, but because none of

the designated owner/managers were free to be in Bath during the dates needed (a requirement of their liability coverage), Elliott did not sign the contract. Yanna says the committee might still be able to acquire a carnival with small rides for children only. But even without a carnival, the committee has many other activities planned. One highlight is the Flying W Rodeo that will be giving shows on the old football field behind the middle school.

A special show will be held Thursday, July 17 for media and other guests, and the public shows will be held Friday, July 18 at 7 p.m., Saturday, July 19 at 1 and 4 p.m., and Sunday, July 20 at 4 p.m. Tickets, at \$4 apiece (children under six are admitted free), are available from the township hall, Spagnuolo's Party Store, Bath Shop-Rite, Bath Pharmacy, or may be purchased at the gate. However, seating is limited for each show to approximately 2,000 persons.

## Museum raffles grandfather clock

The Paine-Gillam-Scott Museum in St. Johns is raffling off a black walnut Emperor-style grandfather clock. Valued at \$1,000, the clock is six feet tall. Tickets are one dollar each. Send checks to Clock, c/o Clinton County

display depicting the life and times of the county's first European settler; CIVIL WAR, Clinton County's tie to Harper's Ferry and John Brown; and LEGACY, bequeathed from residents of the county.

## DeWitt twp. board approves \$9,000 to install oversized water mains

The DeWitt Township Board approved the expenditure of up to \$9,000 to oversize water mains that are being installed in the Looking Glass Pines development, on the southeast corner of Herbison and Airport roads. To meet the needs of the residences that will be in the subdivision, only 8-inch mains are necessary. But township officials thought the area is prime for further development, and

the larger mains would insure the water system would be available for such need in the future. So the board decided to pay the difference between what it would cost to install the 8-inch mains and 12-inch mains. In other action, the board voted to set up a meeting July 28 between township officials and residents of Dill Road. About 30 of those residents had petitioned the township to get the

road paved, but estimates for that job came in far above what the township could spend. The meeting is to decide if residents would like to set up a special assessment to get the raise money for the project. The township has about \$22,000 to spend on the project, says Clerk Greg Whitlock, but just to gravel and ditch the road will cost \$62,000. Another \$40,000 to \$50,000 would be required after that to pave it.

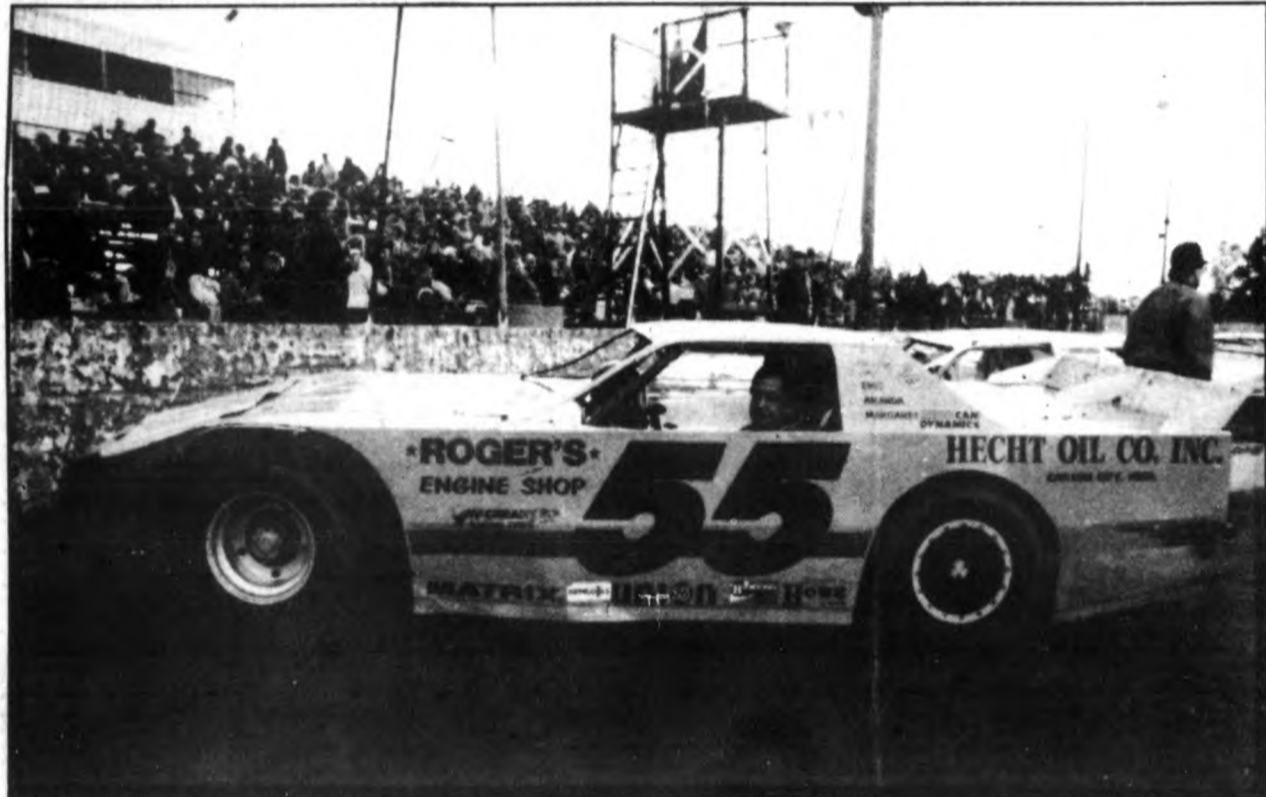
charitable organization. Last year's beneficiary was the substance abuse program sponsored by the Clinton County Sheriff Department.

## Fowler coach enjoys giving extra to local track program

While holding a trophy that he gives away at the end of the track season at Fowler High School, Kim Spulsbury explains the significance of the award.

"I always give out awards at the end of the year and we have this award which is my coaches award," said Spulsbury. "It goes to the person who works to improve even though this person might not be the best person on the team."

The thought is revealing and one more statement helps define Spulsbury.

"The trophy is an extra expense for me but it is worth it," he said.

Spulsbury has been giving of his time at the track for several years and enjoys the role of being the coordinator, coach and clerk for the Grand Ledge Summer Recreation Track program.

Home from school after his first summer of college, the 1973 graduate of Grand Ledge High School talked to friend Jack Rarick about getting a track program started in the Grand Ledge area that would give kids a chance to experience what track is all about.

"We were young and thought we could get this going. So we went out and got the use of the old cinder track," he said. The Grand Ledge track club was born and the two decided to keep it as their project for some time.

In 1977, the track program became affiliated with the Grand Ledge Recreation Department.

A milestone for the program as was the news the following year that the young track impresario was heading off to coach a squad at Hillsdale.

Dale Arbour directed the program through the early 1980s before Spulsbury returned to the area.

Named the girls track coach and the boys and girls cross country coach at Fowler High School, Spulsbury put the position to good use.

"I try to get the word about the summer program out when I talk to the coaches at the various meets and I take a few fliers out and pass them to the coaches," said Spulsbury. "We get kids from all over the area to come to the instructional sessions on Monday night and the meets on Wednesdays."

Teaching is important to a coach and this is ac-

complished during the Monday sessions when he and co-coaches Dave Peake and Denny Myers make the rounds to teach the kids and the adults more about the sport.

When lessons are not needed, the trio look to find something that might improve the already proficient trackman and woman.

But other lessons come up during the meets on Wednesday. One of them is how to lose while finding something positive that can be improved upon.

"We have a lot of kids in the six-grade and under division and we may just have to break that up next year," said Spulsbury. "It's tough sometimes to explain to parents that Johnny may have won his heat but he did not win in the finals because he was a fourth-grader and did not have the same physical development as the sixth-grader who won."

Still, the coaches try to emphasize that learning about what you can do in order to improve on that mark is the most important thing to be grasped.

"Track is a sport for everyone because I guarantee that we can find something that a person can do," said Spulsbury. He remembers back to combing the streets looking for kids to take to the track.

Now, the kids are coming on their own and many are bringing their parents along as well.

That excites Spulsbury. "We couldn't do what we are doing with the program without the volunteers who help us out during each of the meets," he said. As the parents' participation increases, so does the knowledge of the sport.

If excitement soon follows, Spulsbury thinks that only good things can be coming along shortly.

In Fowler, the people are heading to the tracks and the talk of what is going on in the field events and along the banks of the track has picked up.

Spulsbury has been told by several parents that they find track and field to be one of the most exciting things they have ever watched.

The word is being spread around Fowler and Spulsbury seeks to have the same thing happen in Grand Ledge during the summer.

Participants coming from three counties are proof enough that the extra investment of time and energy to track in the area is paying dividends.

## Outdoors Isle Royale

Dick Bradley

Unlike most of my efforts where memory is called upon to share, this time I am seated on the boulder-strewn Lake Superior shore. Rock Harbor lies before me like a blue and aqua gem, stretching 10 miles along Isle Royale's southern shoreline.

We are walking, Shirley Jean and I. But I was called to stop at this place and jot down some impressions. In a moment we will continue to a place called Suzy's Cave, a hike of less than two miles from our housekeeping accommodations.

The trail is beautiful. Such an inadequate word to describe a path where a blaze of flowers bloom beneath a green jungle of cedar, pine and aspen. The wild strawberries, the wild roses, the huckleberries and the thimbleberries all flower here now. For though the calendar speaks of mid-June the climate says May.

We walk to the accompaniment of the constant hum of pollinating bees and the slap of waves against rock. The breeze whispers constant approval of the day. A variety of birds sing out their territorial claims and now and then a squirrel scolds. These are the sights and sounds of this day along the trail.

Only half a mile at present from the only civilization on this island of Michigan magic, we might as well be a thousand miles away. There are 10 times as many moose on this island as people, and many of the creatures do not yet know the fear we have taught them elsewhere. There are foxes along the trails, beavers in the bogs and on the ridges, away from the main trails, wolves. This little 44-mile-long island has been able to maintain an ecological and an animal balance more perfect than any other on earth over the past half century. It is a piece of God's creation that man has done little, so far, to disturb.

While at Suzy's Cave we decide to lunch. The view out over Superior is great. The Cave is little more than a room sized area which was once formed as a seaside phenomenon by wave action. It looks like the remnant of one of the copper mines that first the Indians and then white prospectors worked. As early as 500 B.C. the Indians came from all over the Midwest to dig and gouge the metal from the rocks that contained ore.

In the 1800s the white prospectors worked the island hard for 50 years, but then pulled out because it was not a profitable operation. At any rate, most of the mines have either caved in or been filled in by the

park service for safety reasons.

But the view is superb and the soup, crackers and coffee, some of the best I have tasted. We sip and munch and watch a pair of loons dive and resurface and dive again. A duck comes by, quacking to her only little one. A few moments later and a second bird, this time with four ducklings, makes its way along the rocky shore.

Three inexperienced backpackers stop to talk. You can tell by their unevenly positioned packs that they have not done this kind of thing often. They will learn.

Another couple on an afternoon walk come by and stop. They are toughening up to do some backpacking they say. In a couple of days they will go out.

The sun has fallen a bit, there is more white on the waves and the afternoon has turned cooler. Every beautiful day has got to come to an end I suppose, but we will remember this one and this whole week.

It has been seven years since I have been to Isle Royale but I vow it will not be seven more before I return.

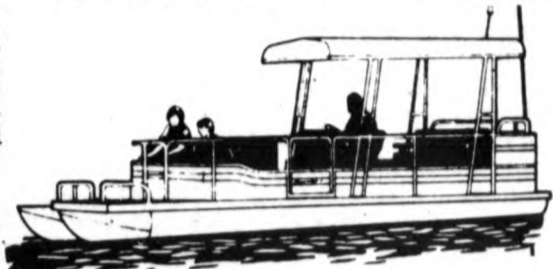

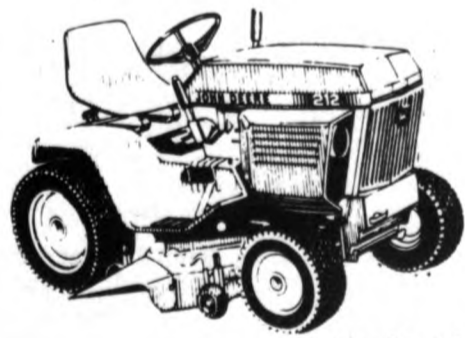

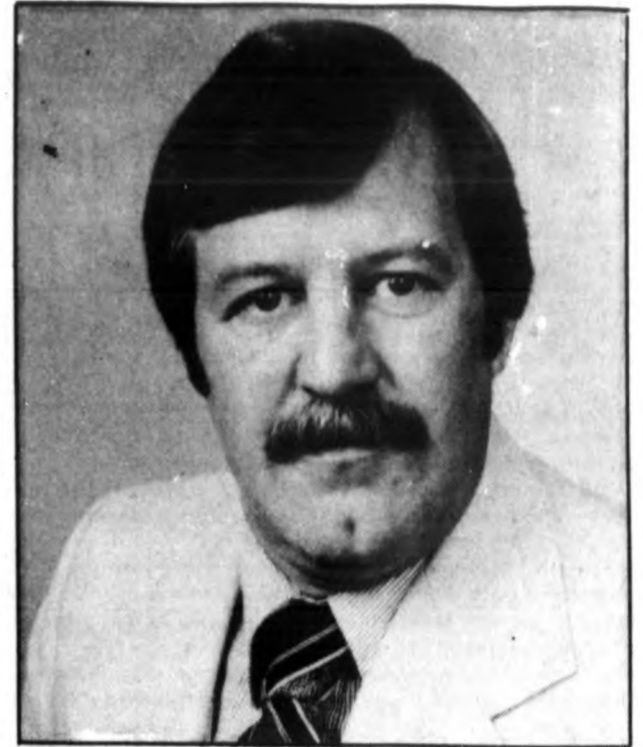
