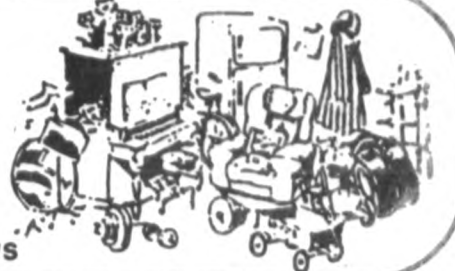

## It's another success!

Perhaps the rain just didn't feel welcome. It tried in the morning and was chased away. By the time it returned for a brief tantrum later in the afternoon it was too late and too brief to put a damper on the 1986 St. Johns Mint Festival.

Except for that afternoon cloud-burst, the festival went off without a hitch thanks in part to blue skies and sunshine that prevailed most of the weekend.

"Fantastic," said Chamber of Commerce Director Joann Martis, as she watched Czechoslovakian Dancers from Bannister's Z.C.B.J. Lodge perform in the closing hours of the festival. "I've had some comments from people about bringing back the life of the community, working together...There were very few hitches."

Martis estimated there were triple the number of spectators along the

route of the Mint Festival Parade this year compared to last year. The number of who attended the festival was difficult to pin down but Police Chief Lyle French offered 8,000 as his best guess.

Whatever the numbers, several of the people at the festival remarked that the festival had improved in its second year.

"Vendors commented that not only were people viewing, but they were buying more," said Martis.

She added that vendors, accustomed to setting up their booths on asphalt parking lots, appreciated the shade trees and green grass of the courthouse lawn at the center of the Mint Festival.

"It seemed to me there were more vendors, more things to see," said Lynn Koger, of St. Johns, who had worked at the bingo tent during the festival.

"I think one of the big hits was the chocolate chip mint ice cream," said Martis.

One vendor was Gloria Dortman, of Midland, who was selling crafted

refrigerator magnets from her booth. She said she was here last year for the festival and that business had definitely picked up this year.

The festival, she said, went off without a hitch — "Other than the rain, but of course nobody can control that."

"It as all well-received," said Jack Frazier, second chairman of the Clinton County Republican Party. He was referring to his party's booth that had been set up in the midst of the festival.

What was his favorite part of the festival?

"The Clinton County GOP booth, naturally," said Frazier.

Al Dickens, of St. Johns, was standing near the Paine Gillum Scott Museum. Asked his opinion of the festival, he said he found it bigger and better than last year.

"I was here last year and I can see how much bigger it is," he said. "I think they laid it out better around the courthouse. There's more room for folks."

"I think it is something that will continue to grow for the town," he continued.

Sunday evening the festival was drawing to a close but two lucky people still had some festival left to claim. Somewhere in the world are Mint Festival buttons numbered 1898 and 1396. The owners should contact the Chamber of Commerce at 224-7248 to collect their \$50 Savings Bond prizes.

## Election: tie in Bengal; Dillingham wins ballot spot

Kenneth Miller and Gerald R. Rossow both garnered 49 votes in Bengal Townships primary election last Tuesday.

The tie will be broken by a drawing early this week that will determine which of the two candidates for township trustee will have his name on the general election ballot in November, said Clinton County Clerk Jane Swanchara.

Bengal voters also picked incumbent Arleita Schafer to run as a Republican on the general election ballot for township clerk. The vote was 63 for Schafer and 40 for Alice Hicks.

County Commissioner Richard Hawks will run for re-election to his District 5 commission seat during the November election following his 332 to 209 vote victory over challenger Cleo S. Friend in the primary election last Tuesday.

Friend had challenged the incumbent for the Republican slot on the

## Cropsey endorses two candidates

Alan Cropsey, who gave up his seat in the Michigan Senate in an unsuccessful attempt to gain a seat on the Michigan Court of Appeals, has endorsed two candidates for the two open seats on the court.

"I'm concerned," said Cropsey. "Two of the four candidates have very strong union backing. I do not want the judiciary to become the tool of the labor bosses."

"(Gary) McDonald and (Janet) Neff both have very strong union

backing." He said he endorses David Sawyer and Elizabeth Weaver for the court.

"Sawyer in particular I think would make a fine jurist," Cropsey said.

He added that Weaver has a particularly strong juvenile court background.

Weaver, Sawyer, McDonald and Neff will compete in the November general election for the two appellate court seats.

which drew 14 percent of the county's registered voters, are as follows:

• Sen. Alan Cropsey, DeWitt, and Clinton County Circuit Court Judge Randy Tahvonen were both unsuccessful in their bids for the Michigan Court of Appeals.

Cropsey garnered 2,515 votes and Tahvonen 2,713 county votes. They were the top vote winners in Clinton County, but garnered only about 9 percent of the vote each statewide.

The primary election narrowed the field of candidates for two seats on the court. Winning spots on the November election ballot were Kent County Prosecutor David Sawyer, Leelanau County Probate Judge Elizabeth Weaver, Saginaw County Circuit Judge Gary R. McDonald, and East Grand Rapids lawyer Janet Neff.

Rep. Fred Dillingham of Livingston County won with 12,621 votes the Republican slot on the ballot for the November election to the 30th

Michigan Senate District seat.

Rolf Peterson, DeWitt, another candidate for that office, garnered 3,035 votes. Archibald Maine garnered 1,193 votes.

Dillingham will face Democrat Patricia McAvoy, who won the Democratic slot on the general election ballot with a 3,567 to 1,980 victory over David Thayer.

The 30th Senate District includes Livingston, Shiawassee, and Clinton counties.

• Don Albosta defeated Karl Yoder 16,947 to 2,342 votes to represent the Democratic party in the November race for the 10th U.S. House of Representatives seat.

He will face incumbent Republican William Schuette. Schuette had no opposition in the primary.

The 10th House district includes portions of 18 central Michigan counties, including the majority of Clinton County.

## Patsy Coffman invites arrest to pursue a vision of peace and justice

"I have a vision of shalom," says Patsy Coffman. "Shalom isn't just peace. It's peace with justice. And the arms race is unjust."

Coffman, who lives with her husband and son in St. Johns, is explaining the motivation behind her participation in a protest against nuclear weapons Aug. 6 at the Wurtsmith Air Force Base in Oscoda. Coffman was one of 98 demonstrators who were detained for six hours after they intentionally trespassed on the property of the base.

"It's a theft from the poor," she continues. "Forty thousand children die daily because of the arms race."

Those deaths, she believes, are the result of governments diverting meager resources to the purchase of arms. Her convictions, she says, are not political — they are religious.

"The reason I went to Wurtsmith — the word protest means 'to speak for' — was to witness to the love of God and the sovereignty of God. Having faith in the bomb is a form of idolatry."

At the demonstration, which was preceded by a four day religious retreat attended by United Methodists and Catholics, 300 protesters held a silent vigil across the street from the base. Coffman was among those who chose to invite ar-

rest by crossing the property line.

It is the second time she has conducted an act of civil disobedience. She was arrested on Easter one year ago for taking part in an similar protest at the Williams International plant in Walled Lake. The plant manufactures engines for cruise missiles.

The demonstration at Wurtsmith was occasioned by the 41-year anniversary of the bombing of Hiroshima. Coffman, when asked if that bombing was morally wrong given arguments that it shortened the war and thus saved a greater number of lives, says, "Killing people is never the answer."

She says no one can really say what would have happened if nuclear bombs had not been dropped on Japan. She says the bomb was dropped on a civilian population, and that in any case the second bomb dropped on Japan could not be justified on any grounds because there were intelligence reports that Japan was ready to surrender after the first bomb was dropped.

And self-defense is never a justification for killing, she says. "That to me is the first sin," she says. "To say 'I'd kill another person to save myself.'"

AN AVOWED "pro-lifer," Coffman's beliefs are also expressed in her stances against alcohol and abor-

tion candidate decides to wage a write-in campaign.

Recently she was among the most vocal opponents of granting a liquor license to a local restaurant.

As for abortion: "I don't even believe in abortion when the mother's life is at stake," she says.

Her belief, she says, is that being a Christian means accepting your own death if the cost of living is another

human life.

"If you've given your life to someone and you're willing to die — then they can't kill you," she says.

DESPITE THE uncompromising nature of her beliefs, Coffman says, she is not intolerant in practice — "The point is for everybody to be at peace with each other."

She has friends who do not believe abortion is always wrong yet she can work together with them in protest of weapons. As for Christian's who voice strong support of the military, she says, she might be diametric opposition to their attitudes toward the military, but she can work together with them in resistance to abortion.

"I believe they have a different understanding of the nature of Christ," she says when asked about Christian whose beliefs do not preclude the use of weapons. "I believe the nature of Christ is love. And I believe the bomb is a secular ideology. I believe love is stronger than hate."

The enemy, says Coffman, is not the Soviets.

"Even Jesus's disciples misunderstood who the enemy was," she says. "They thought it was the Romans. I understand the enemy to be hatred, fear, and oppression."

A member of the Pilgrim United Methodist Church, where she helps raise money for missionary work,

Coffman says not all of her fellow parishioners agree with her attitude toward, for instance, civil disobedience.

But even those who disagree with her are not intolerant, she says — they accept the disagreement peacefully.

## Hospital plans program for latch key child

With increasing numbers of women entering the workforce and a rise in the number of single-parent households, more and more children fall into the category of "latch-key kids."

In response to the concerns of "latch-key families," Clinton Memorial Hospital will host a special teleconference on Aug. 20 from 7-9 p.m. in the hospital conference center.

The program will include a self-assessment test parents can take to help them determine if their children are prepared to be latch-key kids. Faculty will also provide suggestions parents can use to find alternative care arrangements for kids who are not quite ready for the latch-key experience, or to encourage those children who thrive as latch-key kids to get the most out of the increased in-

dependence and responsibility they enjoy at home alone after school.

Additional topics include general safety guidelines; preparation tips and recipes for healthy, easy, and safe snacks; suggestions toward identifying and fully utilizing existing after-school care resources; and a proven process for organizing and implementing appropriate, affordable, adult-supervised care programs

if none already exist.

Called "Latch-Key Families: Ensuring a Positive Experience," the program combines an hour-long teleconference for adults with a simultaneous session of program-related activities and instruction for children. A demonstration/summary session will follow for both adults and children.

Registration fees apply toward the cost of receiv-

ing this special satellite teleconference. They are: single adult, \$8; couple (one adult and one child or two adults), \$12; family (two adults and one or two children), \$18. Space is limited. ## Roy Pelkey, of DeWitt, dies in Indiana traffic accident August 3

Roy Pelkey, 37, of DeWitt was killed Sunday, Aug. 3, in an accident which occurred in Indiana. His wife, Marjean, 35, was seriously injured in the mishap and remains in the hospital at the University of Illinois.

Police say the accident

resulted when a vehicle went out of control and crossed the center median on I-94 near Chesterton, Ind., striking the west-bound motorcycle being ridden by the Pelkeys.

Services for Pelkey were held on Saturday at the

Gorsline-Runciman DeWitt Chapel.

Marjean Pelkey, a police dispatcher and secretary of 10 years for the DeWitt Police, was in serious condition at press-time. She was transferred to the University of Illinois

hospital on Aug. 4.

It was at first feared that she might be partially paralyzed, but authorities say she is able to move her hands and both legs now, and is responding to questions with head movements.

## DeWitt gets set for ox roast, salute to veterans on Aug. 16

The 40th annual Ox Roast will be "really special" this year, according to Booking Agent Linda Hodges, as it includes the unveiling of a special plaque listing the names of those from DeWitt who made the "supreme sacrifice" in any war since World War I.

This year's Ox Roast features a salute to the veterans, and many vets will march in the parade, which begins at 10 a.m. According to Hodges, the parade will have over 50 units and immediately before the parade, flags will be passed out to the kids watching, so they can salute the vets.

The ceremony honoring the war dead and dedicating the plaque is set for 1 p.m. at the Memorial Building on W. Washington Street.

Hodges says the Ox Roast is the event of the year in DeWitt, with all proceeds going to the Memorial Association for the upkeep of the building. Lee Hodges is the acting president of the association. Hodges describes the Memorial Building as "something that belongs to the people."

IT'S THE "HUB" of the community, with many of the non-profit groups meeting there for free. At this time, the city council is even meeting in the hall while construction goes on at its permanent location.

Paybacks come during the Ox Roast when all of the groups help out to support the building. The hall is also rented out for parties and receptions with money from those events going for the upkeep on it.

Money from this year's event, which usually totals about \$10,000, will go to provide some new tables and chairs, floor resurfacing, and the eventual need of a new roof.

This year's Ox Roast will also feature rides and food uptown, the beer tent at the Memorial Building sponsored by St. Jude's Ushers Club, and a game tent sponsored by area scouts.

Contests include the cake walk, with Dolly Madison Cakes as prizes, roll-a-score, teddy bear pitch, pop bottle game, lollipop tree, and duck pond.

HODGES SAYS THE prizes are usually just sent randomly by a company specializing in events like this, but

this year, she has specially ordered the prizes to have things "the kids would really like."

Bingo will be held at the Memorial Building "until the money runs out," beginning at 11 a.m. There will also be a progressive pot of gold lottery running throughout the day with prizes starting at \$200 and going up to \$1,000.

A dance is scheduled for the evening's activities. Sponsored by the DeWitt Newcomers Club, the dance features a disk jockey and goes from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

An Art-in-the-Park will be held at the Riverside Park. Being chaired by Mary Huntley, the event will feature more than 40 arts and crafts booths from DeWitt and the surrounding area.

This year the art fair will have food and drink booths, chaired by Gary Gillespie and Vi Pennington, available on the grounds. Entertainment will last all day and acts such as Bob McCloy and his guitar and the Sweet Adelines are scheduled to perform.

The DeWitt Cooperative Pre-school will have a "creative capers" for the kids, to give mom and dad a chance to rest. Located at the park, activities will include games and face painting.

This year's Ox Roast will also be special to Linda Hodges because it is her fourth and maybe her last. She has also done the parade for seven years and feels it is time to step aside and let someone else take over the reins.

If dill isn't one of the 17, you don't know what you're missing. In the United States dill pickles rank high as the best friend a sandwich ever had. Dill seed is not only good for pickles but also pickled beets, salads, sauerkraut, green beans, stews, fish, chicken, breads, eggs and of course cucumbers.

Botanically, dill is known as Anethum graveolens, (which is easy enough for me to say, with a book in front of me). Though it was first discovered in England in the 16th century, it is not used in that country's food today as much as it is elsewhere.

Both dill seed and weed, which are the dill leaves, are almost always sold dried in the whole form. An annual plant of the parsley family, dill is native to Europe and Asia and has been used for centuries.

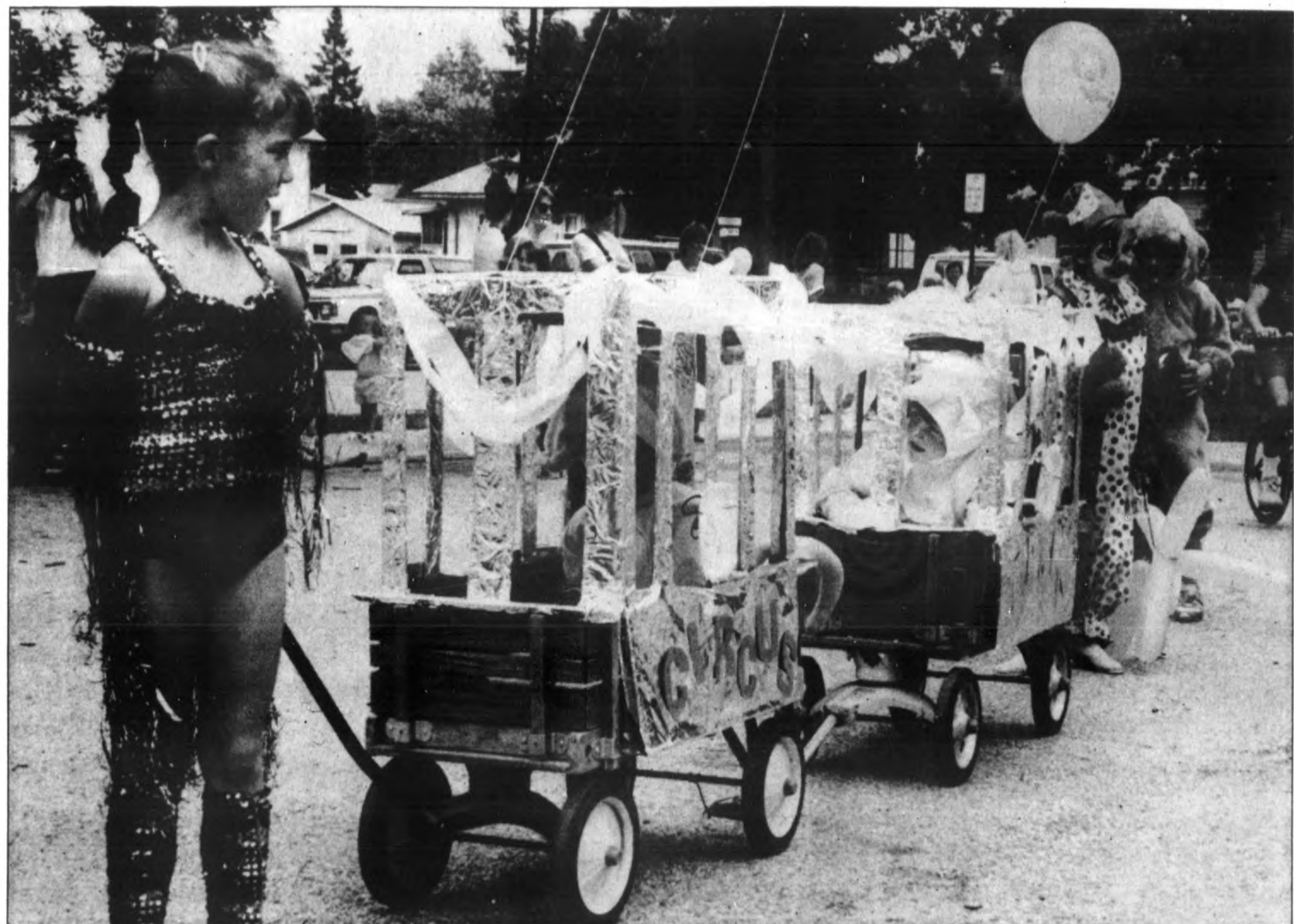

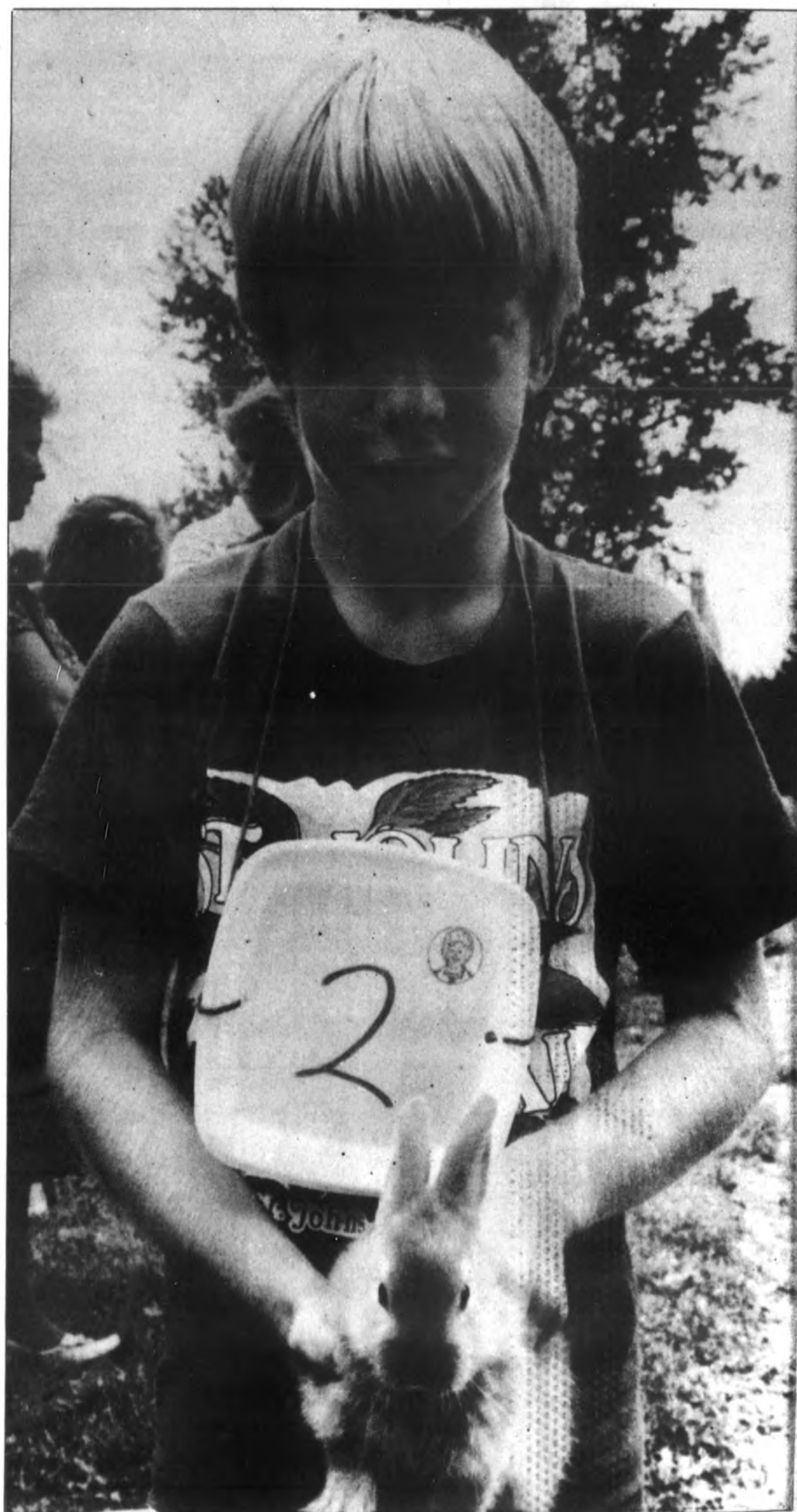

## 1986-87 BUS ROUTE INFORMATION

The 1986-87 bus routes are listed below. For the most part they are the same as last year and being driven by the same driver. The school starting and dismissal times have also remained the same, so the majority of students can plan on being picked up at the same time as last year. To be on the safe side, the first week of school everyone should allow at least 15 minutes extra time in preparation for the arrival of the bus.

As you review the bus route, you may find that the bus doesn't travel your road, in which case you will have to see that the students arrive at the corner nearest their home where the bus will be picking them up and dropping them in the evening.

Developmental Kindergarten and Kindergarten pick up and delivery is at the door of the student's home. If the kindergarten is not on the a.m. or p.m. route, students in other grades in that vicinity will be asked to find their own way to or from the corner stop.

We will not be sending notices to those who have to get to corners, so read the routes carefully. The driver will also be asking students to group at various stop locations on a main route of travel to reduce stops and make shorter run times.

All routes reflect the intent of the rules and regulations of the State of Michigan regarding the transportation of students.

### Rider Safety

The drivers will be handing each rider a copy of the bus rules of the St. Johns schools. Take time to review them with your youngsters. A few things are extremely important:

1. Watch for cars and other vehicles at all times, don't rely only on the red flashing lights of a bus for total protection. It is a law that all vehicles must stop when the red lights are running and the bus is stopped.

2. Walk at least 15 feet in front of the bus when crossing the road so that the driver can see you at all times and at least 25 feet to the side of the bus before the bus pulls away.

3. Do not go to your mailbox until the bus has left the area and you can safely see all moving vehicles.

These three areas cause the bus drivers their major concerns for your student's safety.

## Director's News

### Alfalfa

Giles Roehl



#### Alfalfa Seeding:

Remember the following steps to a successful summer alfalfa seeding: 1. Like and fertilize properly. 2. Plant between July and mid-August. Once we're past Aug. 20, the chances for winter-kill increase substantially. 3. Band seeding, with fertilizer below the seed (or in small amounts with the seed) can give faster early growth. 4. Use a pre-plant herbicide like Eptam or Genep and be prepared to use 2,4-DB post emergence if broadleaves come through. 5. Use 12-16 pounds per acre of seed. Refer to our new "Alfalfa Variety Recommendations" bulletin E-1098 for a list of the performance and characteristics of all the major brands.

Below is a summary of varietal choices for short and long term stands:

**Short-term stands** (2-4 years, moderately hardy or hardy) — Acclaim, Advantage, Apollo, Apollo II, ARMOR, Big Ten, Blazer, Challenger, Cimarron, Classic, Decatholon, DeKalb 120, DK135, Drummer, Duke, Endure, Enduro, Epic, Expo, Funk's G-2815, Funk's G-7730, Futura, Hiphy, Husky, Iroquois, Magnum, Milkmaker, Obneida, Peak, Pioneer 526, Pioneer 531, Pioneer 532, Saranac, Shenandoah, Thunder, Trident, Trumpetor, Vancor, Voris A-77, WL 312, WL 313, and WL316.

**Long-Term stands** (Five years or more or pasture, hardy only) — Appolo, Blazer, DeKalb 120, Duke, Epic, Funk's G-7730, Hiphy, Iroquois, Oneida, Peak, Pioneer 526, Pioneer 531, Pioneer 532, Thunder, Vancor, Vernal, and WL220.

The hay is loaded on trucks, donated to the project by Steel Case Manufacturing Company, Grand Rapids, hauled back to Grand Rapids where it is loaded on rail cars and delivered to the areas in the South East that are in the greatest need.

#### Agricultural Water Management Field Day:

The MSU, Department of Agricultural Engineering is hosting a water management field day at the Bannister Water Management Project site, Aug. 19. The 39-acre subirrigation/subsurface drainage research site is owned by Moore Seed Farms and is located one-fourth mile south of Bannister on Barry Road in Gratiot County. The research is into its second year. Research objectives are to find ways to improve subsurface drainage and subirrigation designs and to determine the most effective management techniques for the subirrigation of corn and soybeans.

Visitors are welcome any time with guided walking tours at 9:30 and 11:30 and 1 and 2:30. For more information, contact Theresa Perkins at the Department of Agricultural Engineering at 353-3523.

#### Wheat Seed for '87:

Joe Clayton, Extension Plant Pathologist indicates that 1986 weed harvest with a test weight in the mid to high 50's can be used for seed of the 1987 crop.

Clayton indicates that seed should be slurry treated with Vitavax 200 or Vitavax plus Capton. A planter box treatment will not be adequate for the seed pro-

duced this year, slurry treatment at a reputable seed treatment is very important to get total seed coverage. If you are not sure of germination, the use of a rolled up wet paper towel with 100 seeds, (ragdoll), will give you an indication of your seed germination.

#### Corner Garden:

One of the mysteries of gardening is determining when melons are ripe. Here are some tips that seem to work most of the time but the best advice is to practice, practice, practice.

Muskmelon are ripe when the stem falls off the fruit easily. If the stem does not slide off the melon with but slight pressure the fruit is not ripe and should be left in the garden. The background color under the brown netting should be cream colored or tan and not green.

Watermelon are more difficult to pick at the peak of ripeness. The reliable clue is to look at the spot on the melon that is touching the ground. As the melon ripens the spot changes from white to yellow. Watch the spot on large melons and when the color has stopped intensifying the fruit is close to ripeness.

This same clue can be used when buying watermelon in the store. Do not "plug" or cut holes in watermelons to see if they are ripe. Sap beetles will be attracted to the injury and will eat the melon before you get a chance to. Here are other clues that are sometimes suggested but may not be as useful. The tendril on the vine, closest to the stem of the watermelon fruit is close to ripeness.

A small leaf called a "spoon" on the stem dries up when the fruit is ripe. Ripe watermelon have a rough skin when ripe that can be detected by rubbing your hand over the fruit. And, of course, the time honored thump with a finger. I must be tone deaf; they all sound the same to me.

**Oak sapling test can reveal depletion of pond oxygen**

This is the time of year when fish pond owners keep their fingers crossed. Hot, hazy days and occasional severe thunderstorms aggravate conditions which can lead to oxygen depletion in ponds and fish kills. Pond owners might be able to rest easier or be better prepared to fend off disaster if they have some idea of summer oxygen conditions in their ponds.

Try this. Cut an oak sapling and remove the branches, leaves, and bark. Drive it into the bottom in the deepest part of your pond with the top sticking out of the water. Pull it out after an hour or two and examine it closely. The distance from the mud mark to the top of the wet mark represents the depth of the pond. Dark staining toward the bottom of the pole represents the cold "bad water" containing no oxygen and abundant oxygen-demanding organic materials. The unstained section shows the depth of the warmer "good water" with plenty of oxygen.

Ponds which have a high volume of "bad water" or which stain indicator poles nearly to the surface when left overnight are at "oxygen risk." Such ponds should not be fertilized and the "bad water" volume should be reduced by installing a larger pipe over the stand pipe so that overflow water is taken from the bottom of the pond.

## House approves \$45 million bill for food and farm programs in 1987

The U.S. House approved a \$45 billion spending bill for food and farm programs for fiscal 1987 last week. Congressman Bill Schuette, a member of the Agriculture Committee, voted for it.

"The bill restores a long

list of programs the administration had sought to cut or eliminate, including rural housing programs, the Cooperative Extension Service, rural water and sewer development loans and grants, nutrition aid for women, infants and

children, school lunch programs, the ASCS, soil conservation, 4-H, and rural electrification loans," says Schuette.

"I am a strong supporter of these programs," Congressman Schuette told the House. "American

agriculture is going through one of the most difficult times since the Great Depression...this legislation is positive news for farm families."

The bill was sent to the Senate on a vote of 329 to 49.

New rulings on Synovex-C and Ivomec will make their use more convenient for livestock producers. Synovex-C implants have been cleared for replacement heifers, says Dr. Harlan Ritchie, Beef Cattle Specialist, Michigan State University. On June 13, the FDA approved the growth implant, Synovex-C, for use in beef replacement heifer calves. All heifer calves can now be implanted with Synovex, starting at birth, without regard to their eventual use (breeding or slaughter). After weaning, re-implanting with Synovex should involve the use of Synovex-H, which delivers a higher dose of active ingredients than Synovex-C.

In granting the approval, the FDA noted that the research presented showed there was no reduction in final pregnancy rate among heifers that had received one of the following treatment regimes: (1) Implanted at 45-95 days of age with Synovex-C; (2) Same as

### Prices drop one percent

The Index of Prices Received by farmers in Michigan for all products as of July 15 was 109 percent of its 1977 base according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Statistical Service. This is a one percent drop from June. The July price index was five percent below its level a year earlier.

partially offset by lower prices for corn and wheat. The index was 1.6 percent below a year earlier.

The price index for all crops grown in Michigan fell five percent from June. The prices of corn, wheat, and oats tumbled. Fruit and vegetable prices were mostly unchanged. The livestock and livestock product price index for Michigan rose three percent from June. Big jumps in hog and egg prices were partially offset by a decline in the milk price. The crop price index and the livestock price index were 15 percent below and five percent above their July 1985 levels, respectively.

The July Index of Prices received for all U.S. farm products increased 2.5 percent from June to 124 percent of its 1977 average. Higher prices for hogs, cattle, broilers, and eggs were

treatment one plus re-implanted with Synovex-H 120 days later; (3) Same as treatment two plus re-implanted again at 244 days from the start. Pregnancy rate for these three treatments was 98 to 100 percent. However, it should be noted that the onset of puberty was delayed by 60 to 90 days in the two treatments that were re-implanted with Synovex-H. Age at puberty among the heifers implanted once with Synovex-C was equal to untreated control heifers.

According to Steven Rust and Harlan Ritchie, Beef Cattle Specialists, MSU, Ivomec (ivermectin) is an anthelmintic which is effective against many internal and external parasites. Previously, it was available only through veterinarians. However, as of mid-July, it will be available over the counter to use in swine and cattle.

When using any medications or growth stimulants for cattle, be certain to read and follow all label directions. If further information is needed on their use, contact your veterinarian or the County Extension Office.
