### Telephones

**ST. JOHNS** Telephone customers in the St. Johns area will need to make some changes in their dialing patterns due to a new GTE electronic switching system that became operative on Nov. 1.

All seven digits, not just five, need to be dialed with the new equipment. In addition, calls will not be completed if customers delay for more than 15 seconds between digits.

Familiar sounds such as dial tone and busy signal will be a higher pitch. Callers will no longer hear a "progress tone" after dialing a local or long distance call. That means silence for up to 20 seconds. Callers are urged to stay on the line while the call switches quietly.

The party line code, for persons having party line service in St. Johns, will be eliminated. The seven digit number listed in the telephone directory should be dialed instead.

### Drug free

**ST. JOHNS** A group of St. Johns residents have formed a committee to bring Jevon Thompson to Clinton County. Thompson is "a dynamic individual who promotes an alcohol and drug free lifestyle."

Thompson will bring his message to area students in December. Meanwhile, parents are invited to "Parents Awareness Night" this evening (Nov. 4) at 7:30 at the St. Johns High School auditorium. The speaker will be Richard Beal, an assistant principal of Haslett Public Schools. Beal was interviewed by David Hartman on "Good Morning America."

## \$2 million facility slated to bring 60 new jobs to St. Johns

A restaurant supply company has tentatively agreed to build a \$2 million distribution center in St. Johns that will employ approximately 60 people, said City Manager Randy Humphrey last week.

M & M Restaurant Supply is slated

to build the 55,000 square foot distribution center on an eight-acre parcel in the St. Johns Industrial Park near Clinton Avenue and Walker Road. The company is a supplier of food, paper and operating supplies to McDonald restaurants.

Construction is expected to begin

late this fall and to be completed in the spring.

Jobs generated by the facility will include truck driving, warehousing and office work.

"You couldn't go out and find an industry that's better than this," said

Humphrey.

Humphrey said the Consumers Power Company, the City of St. Johns, and the Clinton Area New Development Organization were all involved in bringing M & M Restaurant Supply to St. Johns.

The distribution center will service McDonald's restaurants from Fort Wayne, Ind., to Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.

M & M is a division of Keystone Foods Corporation, of Bryn Mawr, Penn.

## School board suspends Perry

St. Johns High School counselor Loren Perry, facing a criminal sexual conduct charge, has been suspended with pay until a hearing is held regarding his future employment with the school district.

The St. Johns Board of Education decided Oct. 29 to hold a hearing on charges made by Superintendent Earl Gabriel against Perry.

Gabriel's charges — the substance of which were not released — follow Perry's arraignment Oct. 24 on four counts of second degree criminal sexual conduct. Perry is accused of sexual misconduct involving a 13 to 16 year old male.

Gabriel's charges begin a tenure process by which Perry's future employment status with the school district will be decided. By making the charges, Gabriel is indicating that he believes Perry should be dismissed from employment with the school district.

Gabriel declined to discuss the nature of the evidence he reviewed in deciding to make the charges.

The role of the school board during the process is to act as an impartial body to decide whether Perry should

be dismissed, said school district lawyer Kevin Harty.

Harty said the task of the school board Oct. 29 was simply to decide whether the charges, if true, warranted a hearing on the matter — not to make final decisions on the charges or Perry's employment.

The board went into closed session to review the charges. It then reconvened in public and adopted the resolution to proceed with the hearing and to suspend Perry in the meantime.

According to state law, since the board did decide to proceed, the hearing must be held at least 30 days but not more than 45 days from the date the charges were made.

The board also suspended Perry with pay pending the hearing. Perry had earlier been suspended by Gabriel. However, suspensions of more than a few days require action by the school board, said Kevin Harty, lawyer for the school district.

During the meeting Harty warned board members not to discuss the case with each other or with other members of the community.

Harty also said that Perry, who has the option of a public or a closed hearing, has requested a closed hearing.

## It's final: County tax levy is now 5.8 mills

Clinton County commissioners last week approved a 1987 county budget that is only one percent larger than the budget for 1986.

Commissioners also raised the county tax levy to 5.8 mills for the 1986 tax year, as they have said for several months they expected to do.

This is the first year the county has levied the maximum millage authorized by voters. The tax levy for the 1985 tax year was 5.7 mills. (The budget resolution states that the millage rate was increased .3097

mills. However, 2097 mills is actually the amount the county would have been required to decrease the millage rate had it not held a truth-in-taxation hearing.)

Commissioners adopted a 1987 budget of \$6,593,833. This is an increase of \$65,860 over the 1986 budget.

Commissioners have attributed the need for the increased levy to the end of federal revenue sharing and to an decline in agricultural property values. Federal revenue sharing

once contributed some \$340,000 each year to the county coffers.

Tax on agricultural property provides one-third of county revenues each year. However, agricultural property values declined 11 percent this year.

"We're actually using up a portion of our fund balance," said Roger Overway, chairman of the County Commission.

The budget projects using \$500,000 of the county's fund balance from 1986 as revenue, which would leave a

projected fund balance of about \$100,000 going into 1988. However, the fund balance will probably be larger than that because the county is typically conservative in its projections of revenue, said County Administrator Bill LeFevre.

Even so, he said, the county is each year further depleting its fund balance "in quite large chunks."

Asked if commissioners are "holding the line" on county spending, Overway replied that conser-

vative budgeting for several years have left the county "in an excellent financial" condition.

"This year is not going to be as much of a crunch, in my opinion, as next year is going to be," he said.

"We didn't actually cut anybody," Overway said of the county's workforce. "But we didn't add anybody either."

Commissioner Richard Hawks commended county department heads for helping to contain costs.

The budget resolution adopted by commissioners also includes salary increases for county officials. The County Clerk's salary was increased from \$27,961 to \$29,080; the Register of Deeds' salary rose from \$27,325 to \$29,080; the Drain Commissioner rose from \$26,378 to \$27,434; the Prosecuting Attorney's salary rose from \$41,548 to \$45,495; the Sheriff's salary rose from \$30,682 to \$32,673; and the County Administrator's salary rose from \$30,500 to \$35,000.

In a separate action commissioners approved new salary levels for 110 non-union county employees. Salary levels were increased 4 percent for 1987 and, contingent upon the availability of the necessary funds, three percent for 1988.

## Fowler Lions raise \$1,000 for Quest program

The Lions Club of Fowler presented both Waldron School and Most Holy Trinity School of Fowler with checks for \$500 to cover the cost of the "Quest: Skills for Adolescents" curriculum.

Frank Hufnagel and Phil Tiedt made the \$1,000 presentation on behalf of the Lions Club to Fowler Superintendent Mary Ann Chartrand and Most Holy Trinity Principal Steve Dembowski.

The Lions Club, which co-sponsors the program, raised the money for the schools by hosting a circus during the summer. Individual members attended introductory workshops with administrators and encouraged the implementation of the Quest Program.

The Quest Program teaches skill in decision making, communication and dealing effectively with peer pressure in order to say no to drugs and alcohol. Classroom activities involve discussions, role playing, reading and writing. The program places strong emphasis on service learning — the development of school and community projects that involve students learning by offering service to others. Parents are also actively involved in the program through a series of seminars to assist parents in developing the self-concepts of their children.

The Skills for Adolescents program is being taught in the seventh and eighth grades at both Fowler Schools this year and will be offered to

## Register of Deeds a vital service to county

The Register of Deeds Office is a constitutional office and our services are mandated by law. The Register of Deeds is one of the money-making offices for the county. I became Register of Deeds in 1976 by appointment and have been re-elected three times. During that time (1976-1985), the Register of Deeds Office has turned \$287,355.88 in to the general fund. This is money over and above expenses for the office.

In 1986 alone, our intake through September has been \$112,032.65, with \$48,375.75 earmarked for the general fund.

And I would then give myself some very sensible advice about what to do with a broken transmission.

Dr. Meltzer is a pretty funny guy. Not me, you say. You people are fools, you say. I can quit any time I want, you say. And the spell whispers things only an adolescent will believe. It whispers that when you light a cigarette you are

magically transported onto the top of a horse riding across a snowy landscape lighted blue by the moon and you pause for a moment to draw on your cigarette as the wind blows through your handsome hair.

With adulthood the spell wears off and all you are left with is the tarry gunk on the bottom of ashtrays that makes you wonder what your lungs must look like. You got the shortness of breath. Burns in your clothes. You might die of lung cancer and even if you don't you will spend a considerable amount of your shortened life *worrying* about it.

All smokers know about reformed smokers. Reformed smokers can be a vindictive lot. I promised myself I wouldn't be like that. Adult smokers, do as you like.

But how many smokers actually started smoking when they were adults? Hardly anyone. The next generation of smokers is today riding around on bicycles with cigarettes sticking out of their mouths. Twelve years old. Thirteen years old. Riding around on bicycles smoking cigarettes. I can tell by the serious, self-absorbed expressions on their faces that they are under the spell and they think those little bicycles are horses and Clinton Avenue is a snowy landscape.

Oh well. Now that I got that off my chest I can look at the bright side.

Tomorrow afternoon while I'm crawling around underneath my car trying to figure some way to get it back on the road I will be able to smell the November air for the first time in years and years. I'll take a deep breath. What's a broken transmission when you got the smell of leaves?

## Drains require written request

Clinton County farmers and other residents will have to make written requests for brush control or major maintenance, said Drain Commissioner Arden S. Pierson in an annual report to county commissioners last week.

Pierson said the policy was a response to the excessive rainfall and low commodity prices that have depressed the agricultural economy. With the policy in place, Pierson said, the Drain Commissioner's office will be able to answer questions about why the work and the resulting assessments to property owners were initiated.

The Drain Commissioner's office is also exploring less costly methods of controlling brush and

small trees, Pierson said. He also said the office will seek emergency funding to correct and repair damages from heavy rain-falls in the northern three-quarters of the county.

"It appears that some federal and state funding may be available to restore drainage in the affected areas," said Pierson.

Commissioners questioned Pierson about accounting procedures on a revolving equipment fund maintained by the Drain Commissioner's office. Pierson agreed to provide commissioners with a break down of how much money is in that fund and how it is spent. Currently the information is included in the various drain accounts but not as a separate account.

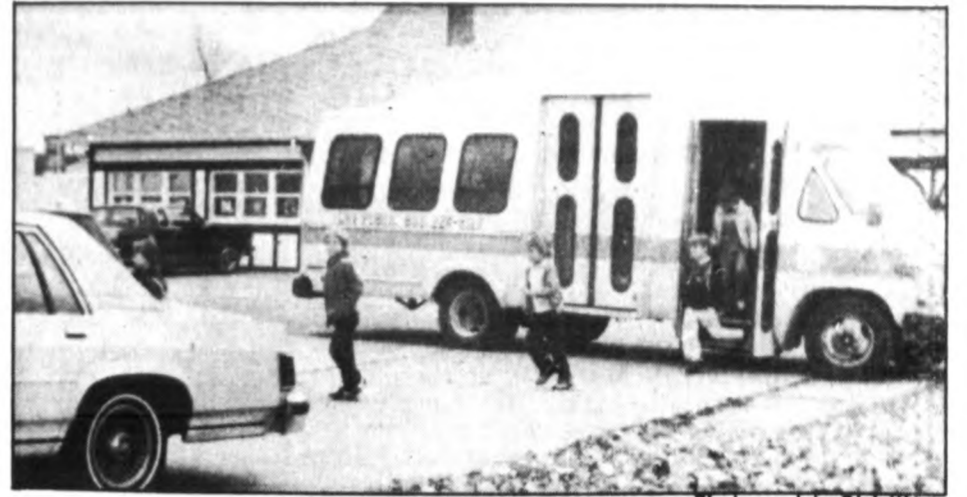
## CRV bus doubles annual ridership

## High school presents "Pinocchio"

The St. Johns High School Theatre Department has announced that "Pinocchio" will be the 1986 autumn production.

Based on the famous story by Carlo Collodi, the play will be familiar in some ways — and in other ways, it won't be.

The familiar part is the basic plot. Upon coming to life with the magical help of the Blue Fairy, Pinocchio decides his ultimate desire is to become a real boy. The Blue Fairy instructs him that this desire can be fulfilled — but only if Pinocchio goes to school, listens to his father and always tells the truth. Pinocchio, however, possesses a "nose" for adventure and soon learns that always telling the truth is harder than it sounds. Unfortunately, unless he learns to behave himself, Pinocchio's dream of becoming a real boy is in danger.

In this case — this is the unfamiliar part — the outcome of the story is uncertain because the stage version, by George T. Latsch, is unique in several ways. Although the basic plot is the same in both the well-known Disney animated cartoon and the stage play, stage director Barbara Markman says, "Pinocchio embarks on several different adventures in the stage version."

Some of the characters are different, also. Don't expect to see Jimminy Cricket on the high school stage. And, says cast member Trish Shoemaker, "Instead of a cunning fox, a clever prowling cat and two lively clowns will appear."

Furthermore, Latsch's account of the Pinocchio story incorporates a rare form of performance known as "commedia dell'arte." Popular in Italy during the Sixteenth Century, commedia dell'arte was an actor-centered, improvised, and fast paced form of performance.

"The play script for the commedia dell'arte originally consisted of a scenario which outlined only the principle action and the actors were left to improvise the dialogue," says Markman.

In the St. Johns High School version of "Pinocchio" most of the dialogue is written and memorized but many of the actions and reactions must be improvised by the actors. Cast member Patrick Niemi says, "This is a challenge to the actors because 'Pinocchio' includes a large amount of broad physical humor and mime."

## SJ fifth graders to have Eagle Village trip

St. Johns public school fifth graders will once again go to Eagle Village at school district expense for a confidence and team-work building program.

The St. Johns Board of Education on Oct. 27 approved a \$9,500 expenditure to fund participation by St. Johns fifth graders in the program, in which the confidence and team-

work are promoted through activities such as horseback riding and rope climbing.

"It's one of the few things offered in elementary beyond basic education," said board Vice President Jeanette Adams during discussion in which board members asked what the status of the program would be if in the

future budget cuts have to be made.

"I think Eagle Village is probably a very good trip," said Trustee Neil Barnhart. "Bit in the future, if we don't have the money, what do we cut, Eagle Village or books?"

Board members said at one time the trip was paid for by student fundraising activities but that once before the district picked up the tab for the program.

In other action: • The board adopted a \$10 million 1986-87 General Fund Budget. The board last September adopted the appropriations budget and levied the millage rate for the year.

• The board appointed members to a School Facilities Committee to take up where the citizens' committee that last studied the Central School left off. Board Trustee Robert Craig said he is pleased that the committee includes people working together who opposed each other when members of the

board were recalled last spring.

• The board denied a request by the City of St. Johns that the city be allowed to construct a small dike along the east and south property lines of the high school to reduce the flow of water over the road.

Board members said approval of the dike could cause liability problems for the school district. Land that would be underwater if the dike was not built might be needed for agriculture projects, said Barnhart.

• The board approved the purchase of a 15-passenger van from St. Johns Ford-Mercury for \$15,998. The board accepted that bid over a bid that was \$198 lower from Country Ford of Owosso.

Family focus

Family stress

This time of year can be extremely stressful to families. The holidays are coming, the weather is temperamental and a lot of work needs to be done before winter sets in. How you react to all this pressure will make a big difference in whether or not you will be able to cope with the stress in your life.

In my column today, I have included some commonly asked questions and answers regarding stress. By becoming more aware of what stress is and how you can fight against it, you will be more equipped to deal with stress when it does invade your life.

**Q. Why are diet and exercise important in being able to cope with stress?**

A. An individual's physical condition and level of fitness will be important in his or her ability to withstand stressful events. People who watch the amounts of fat, salt, and sugar in their diets are less inclined to be overweight or have clogged arteries that lead to stroke or heart attack in situations of acute distress. Exercise "blows out" cholesterol, allows the release of tension, and exercises the cardiovascular system so that it is more effective in its ability to withstand stress.

**What's wrong with using tranquilizers and alcohol to relax? They work.**

A. Dependence on certain substances such as tranquilizers, alcohol, and sleeping pills tends to significantly reduce REM (or dream) sleep. This is when we work out some of our daytime anxiety. When REM sleep is reduced night after night, it will result in more daytime anxiety and increased dependence on these chemicals. There are better alternatives for inducing relaxation.

**Stress is a natural consequence of what these families are going through and can even be helpful in helping them solve the problem. How does a family know if it's coping all right or not?**

A. Families who aren't coping very well will find themselves bickering and nit-picking more than usual.

withdrawing from one another, or becoming more verbally or physically abusive. On the other hand, those who are coping positively will: 1. attack the problem, rather than one another; 2. maintain self esteem, rather than allowing it to be torn down; 3. preserve relationships, rather than tossing them away too easily; 4. handle any anxiety or depression that becomes overwhelming by seeking professional help before it disables them or the family.

*There are a lot of coping "strategies" that people can use in reacting to too much stress. Recognizing that people aren't going to change a lot of their behaviors when they're under pressure, what would be the most important coping strategies for seeing some instant results in stress coping?*

A. Important strategies include: 1. not over-reacting to the problem; 2. eliminating negative inner chatter ("I'll never survive this." "This will never work.") and replacing it with positive self-talk ("I've been through other tough times." "I'm not a quitter."); 3. maintaining routines and networks with other persons; 4. vigorously exercising 30 minutes per day to relieve tension; and 5. getting proper nutrition and enough rest and sleep. These strategies are not solutions to a problem but can enable a healthier reaction, particularly if the stressor will be on-going.

On Nov. 11 at 7 p.m. the Cooperative Extension Service will be holding a seminar entitled, "Taking Charge of Yourself, Your Family, and Your Business." The seminar will be held at Smith Hall in St. Johns.

Communications-Your Key to Success, will be the first class of the evening. Carol Kent, a communications consultant from Port Huron will be teaching this session. Carol is a vivacious speaker who lectures with a lot of practical ideas and real-life experiences. In this session Carol will be dealing with how to make communication skills more effective, so that conflict and stress will be reduced.

The second session will be on "Stress and its Effect on You," conducted by Thomas Helma, of MSU. Tom is an expert on stress management, especially as it relates to the rural community.

Come and learn to recognize your personal stress signals, gauge where your stress overload falls and methods for reducing the amount of stress in your life.

The seminar comes to you free of charge from the Extension Service and local businesses. To register, call the Cooperative Extension Service at 224-3288 by Nov. 7.

## Crowded field of candidates compete for Supreme Court

A questionnaire was sent by the Clinton County News to candidates running for office for the Supreme Court of Michigan. Eleven out of 24 eligible candidates for two positions returned responses to us on questions ranging from state financing of courts to what they considered to be the major issues facing courts.

**Dennis Archer**, 44, of Detroit is the incumbent. He is a graduate of Detroit College of Law and has spent 15 years as a trial lawyer.

Archer believes the Michigan Supreme Court should write more opinions, further reduce the time it takes to publish opinions, and implement guidelines to reduce the time it takes to conclude cases and reduce costs to litigants.

He also feels the courts could be more "user friendly." He cites statistics showing 8 out of 10 residents feel cases take too long, cost too much, and are too complicated. He says the supreme court will solve that problem with the help of trial lawyers and courts.

Statewide financing of courts, where most have always been locally supported, is a current issue facing the system. Archer supports statewide financing and feels it is a critical problem.

**James J. Carras**, 56, of Bay City is a practicing attorney and has been for 31 years. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan.

Carras believes the supreme court is not supervising the lower courts properly and that has resulted in tyranny. He feels more legal issues should be decided by juries and is opposed to gun control laws except where guns are used to commit unlawful acts.

Carras believes that every law-abiding citizen should be allowed to bear arms without restrictions and that the building of prisons will ultimately lead to their use for political crimes.

He feels the only people who should be sent to prison are the violent and dangerous, and that the most important issue facing the courts today is the lack of intellectual honesty in the courts. He is in favor of statewide financing of courts.

**Jeffrey C. Collison**, 30, of Saginaw is a practicing trial attorney. He is a graduate of Thomas Cooley Law School.

Collison says in order to protect the integrity of our appellate system, the legislature must reconsider current election laws.

He says in order to get his name considered for the supreme court, all he needed to do was get an affidavit signed by one supporting individual eligible to vote in the general election, and certify that he is a licensed attorney in good standing.

Collison makes the point that the general public being informed on the general background of each candidate is nearly impossible due to the multiplicity of names on the ballot. He did not specifically express his views on the questions asked.

**Zolton Ferency**, 64, of East Lansing is a practicing attorney and a professor at Michigan State University in criminal justice. He is a graduate of the Detroit College of Law and feels he qualifies for the position through his background, training, and experience in law.

Ferency says the supreme court should encourage private resolution of disputes and strengthen the protection of constitutional rights.

He says that statewide financing would improve court administration and relieve the local taxpayers.

**E. Thomas Fitzgerald**, 46, of Owosso has been a practicing attorney for the last 20 years in both state and

federal courts. He is a graduate of Detroit Law School. Fitzgerald believes the supreme court should use its superintending control to supervise the lower courts and make better use of empty courts to cure backlogs.

The supreme court should see that lower courts follow the law as written.

He is in favor of state financing to help with the backlog of cases and wants to make courts more accessible to the people. He is also concerned with the crime issue and balancing individual rights with those of society.

**James T. Kallman**, 58, of Okemos is an Ingham County Circuit Judge. He is a graduate of Wayne State University and has spent over 25 years as a judge and five years as a trial attorney. He feels he has an understanding of the entire system because of that experience.

Kallman feels the supreme court is becoming more responsive to the needs of litigants, but there is a need to speed up appellate process, especially where conflicts of opinion in the Court of Appeals occur.

He feels the courts should be more restrained in legislative matters, because the three branches of government have a checks and balance system and usurpation by one branch should not happen.

He is in favor of statewide financing for courts and believes that protecting the rights of all citizens in criminal and civil cases, reducing the "paper chase," and common sense decisions in criminal cases are issues facing the courts today.

**James Kelley**, 69, of Monroe is in his 20th year as a circuit judge. He has a law degree from the University of Detroit.

Kelley feels he is qualified by virtue of his 20 years in the law and 20 years as a judge.

He believes that crime is the most important issue facing the courts and that people accused of a crime should be speedily brought to trial and punished appropriately if found guilty. Punishment should be equated with the crime's effect on the victim.

Kelley believes in more restraint in legislative matters. He says that where a social affecting law is proposed, it should be subject to public investigation, comment, and debate, and not arbitrarily court mandated.

He is in favor of statewide financing for courts saying the legislature and supreme court require courts to perform an increasing number of functions at great expense to the counties.

**Stephen P. Korn**, 33, of Southfield is currently practicing law and is a graduate of the Detroit College of Law. He had originally intended to run for appeals court, but was not allowed due to the alleged vagueness of signatures on his petition. He is currently suing the State of Michigan Board of Canvassers.

Korn says he believes the citizens of Michigan have a right to be heard in a fair, impartial, and effective manner. Aside from the legislature, he says the supreme court is empowered to effect rules of procedure to assure the fair and efficient process of the judiciary.

In his role as Supreme Court Justice, he says he would work to assure that those having matters of concern in our system be assured the right to have the matter considered fairly, efficiently, and in a meaningful manner.

**John L. McDonough**, 63, is currently practicing law in Bay City, where he is the city attorney. He is a graduate of the University of Detroit and has been in law for 35 years. He has spent six years as a municipal judge as well as being a trial lawyer and prosecuting attorney.

McDonough believes in keeping politics out of the court system and formulating procedures for more expeditious and concise decisions, based on law and reason.

He sees the legal qualifications and backgrounds of candidates as an issue in this campaign.

**Willard L. Mikesell**, 61, of Charlotte has spent 23 years in general practice. His law degree is from Wayne State and he was Eaton/Barry County circuit judge for five years.

Mikesell believes the justices of the supreme court should be attorneys with extensive trial and judicial background. Decisions should be based on law, not politics.

He says the supreme court is not a legislative body and laws of the legislature should be upheld unless there is ambiguity. Interpretations should be based on law and not politics.

He does not support statewide financing of courts on the grounds it would take the courts farther away from the people.

Delays in processing of cases and decisions based on politics rather than law is seen by Mikesell as an issue facing the courts today.

**Caleb Simon**, 44, of Birmingham is a trial lawyer and feels his 18 years experience qualifies him for the supreme court. He is a graduate of Detroit College of Law.

Simon feels the courts tend to be legislatively and politically oriented and the job of a judge is to resolve disputes. He says the courts need to work on enforcing the law, quickly, and with improved credibility.

He prefers to mix local control with state guidelines

and desires state control only in extreme perimeters. He is not in favor of statewide financing because financing means control.

**James R. Steil**, 61, of Pontiac has spent 17 years as a district judge in the 50th Judicial District and feels this, in addition to being an assistant prosecutor, qualifies him for the position. He is a graduate of the Detroit College of Law.

Steil believes the supreme court administrators office should assist the lower courts with their problems. He does not support involvement with legislative matters and says the courts should do their share in meeting the criminal justice crisis.

He is in favor of statewide financing of courts.

**Candidates also running in the race for Supreme Court Justice** include Henry Clay of Detroit, Andrea Ferrara of Grosse Ile, Robert Griffin of Traverse City, Leonard Howarth of Davisburg, Jerry Kaufman of Huntington Woods, Barbara MacKenzie of Petoskey, Michael Marutiak of Owosso, John O'Hara of Bloomfield Hills, Melvin Paunovich of Brighton, David Raaflaub of Ann Arbor, Dean Robb of Traverse City, and Michael Simon of Southfield.

## Voters to decide three ballot proposals

**PROPOSAL A** would place the Library of Michigan under the direction of the state legislature. If passed, the current direct management of the library by the legislature would be preserved in the state constitution.

Supporters say the plan would protect the continued existence of the library under a branch with direct interest in its operation. Currently, the library is under the authority of the legislature under a 1983 bill and the amendment would allow permanent control. There

is no specific opposition.

**PROPOSAL B** would amend the constitution to allow for the continuous existence of a legislative committee to approve or disapprove of administrative rules proposed by state agencies, in whatever manner the legislature deems appropriate. Administrative rules implement state law.

The proposal would make constitutionally correct, what is already being done, but it was defeated once in 1984.

Supporters say it is proper for the legislature to in-

sure that administrative rules carry out the legislative intent. Opponents say the proposal violates the separation of powers principle and is in violation of the constitution.

**PROPOSAL C** is intended to standardize the process for establishing salaries for all state elected officials. This amendment would transfer the authority to determine the salaries and expense allowances of the secretary of state and attorney general from the state legislature to the

State Officers Compensation Commission.

The SOCC already sets the salaries for members of the legislature, the governor, lieutenant governor, and justices of the supreme court.

Supporters maintain it seems logical to treat the salary determination process in a uniform manner for all elected officials.

## Four candidates in the running for third district Court of Appeals

Candidates in the Third Court of Appeals District were sent a questionnaire by the Clinton County News concerning their background and opinions on statewide financing of courts and major issues facing courts today. Three of four candidates competing for two six-year terms responded.

**Gary McDonald**, 46, of Saginaw is a Saginaw County Circuit Judge. He has spent 14 years on trial court benches in the state. The Wayne State University graduate has also been assigned several times to sit on the Court of Appeals.

McDonald feels that appellate decisions should be consistent and unequivocal so as to provide clear guideposts to the practicing attorney and lower court judges.

He feels that appellate courts should make every effort to process appeals in a timely manner and hopes to further these goals by using his experience in court administration in the areas of budget, docket control, and computers.

McDonald does not feel the supreme court should be involved in drafting legislation through judicial opinions.

He is in favor of statewide financing of the lower court system. He says the cost of properly operating the lower courts has become too burdensome for county government. County governments should be given a voice in the salary structure of court employees, in order to maintain a fair and equitable scale with other county employees.

**David H. Sawyer**, 39, of Grand Rapids is a Kent County prosecuting attorney with 13 years trial experience. His degree is from Valparaiso School of Law.

He feels the courts should be more restrained in legislative matters and more responsive to the public they serve. The court's job is to maintain the rights of citizens by upholding the constitution.

He feels supreme court decisions are still far too liberal and help erode the public support which is necessary to fight crime. He is also not in favor of statewide financing because the farther away control is from the people, the less control they can exert. He believes local control is important.

**Elizabeth Weaver**, 45, of Glen Arbor has been a judge for 11 years and an attorney for 21. She is a graduate of

Tulane University.

She believes the courts need to provide efficient, effective, and timely judicial services by helping to solve the problem of delays in courts and crime in society. She is highly concerned with children and family matters.

Weaver says judges should only interpret and not make the laws. The role of the court is to review, not retry cases. She says the standard set is for fair and just process, not perfection, and that harmless technical mistakes should not be a basis for remand, retrial, or reversal.

On the subject of statewide financing, Weaver says Wayne County circuit and district courts are state funded, while outstate counties must fund courts with local taxes. She feels that outstate courts deserve their share of state dollars for funding.

**Janet T. Neff** of E. Grand Rapids is also running for the elected position, but did not respond to the questionnaire.

Dear Edith: My wife's parents sold us a house with a quit-claim deed and we never understood just what it means. It all seemed too easy, considering we were actually buying a house. We would feel ungrateful questioning them in any way on this, but I have looked up quit-claim deeds in legal reference books at the library and all seem to advise against buying with them.

Do my in-laws get any advantage from selling us the house this way? If we got a divorce, or one of us died, would it make for a problem? Could her parents re-claim the house, or interfere? These questions have bothered us for quite some time. — Mr. A.A.

A quit-claim deed transfers to you whatever ownership your in-laws had. If they were clear owners of the property, you now are yourselves.

## Creative selling techniques can be worth considering

Remember the good old days when buying a home was cut and dry? You found the home you wanted, paid 10 or 20 percent down and then went to the lenders knowing full well that there wouldn't be a dime's worth of difference between any of them on the matter of interest - 6 percent, 7 percent or whatever rate was prevailing at the time.

Then came the big money crunch of the early '80s and a host of "creative financing" techniques - seller carry-back, wrap-around mortgages and, of course, the adjustable rate mortgage. Even though home buying has returned (pretty well) to normalcy, some of the creative financing tools have survived. And, some of them are well worth investigating.

DEAR MR. CAMPBELL:

I'm turning to you for advice because my newly-married son and his wife have been offered a kind of mortgage that I'm not familiar with. He has a good professional job with a bright future. While this Growing Equity Mortgage he is considering sounds like a good thing, I'm not so sure that there isn't a catch in it that is escaping both of us. I'd appreciate your help because you may know how embarrassing it is for a father to have to admit to a son that he doesn't know everything. Is there any catch to this kind of mortgage? — Mr. R. McC., Sacramento, Calif.

ANSWER: Embarrassing, indeed! We can well remember trying to help another son with his arithmetic homework only to find that - while our back was turned - "New Math" had come onto the scene.

The Growing Equity Mortgage (GEM) popped up at about the same time that the Graduated Payment Mortgage did and might be described as the "flip side" of the GEM. Both had a valid use and while the value of the GPM has diminished as mortgage interest rates have dropped so dramatically, the GEM has not only retained its attractiveness, but has actually become even more so.

The GEM that has been offered your son also involves accelerated monthly payments, but for an entirely different reason and with entirely different consequences: Each annual acceleration in the payment goes, not to the lender's interest as the GPM does, but to the reduction of principal and it has absolutely nothing to do with current interest rates.

Here, briefly, is how it works: The lender gives your son a 30-year mortgage at current market rates which, of course, has a specific dollar amount due monthly for principal and in-

terest. At that time, however, your son elects an annual acceleration in his monthly payment - anywhere from 1 percent to 6 percent a year - which remains in effect until it is paid off.

It's customary for transfers between family members to use a quit-claim deed. The process is simple and uncomplicated, and there's no reason to suspect anything out of the ordinary.

Buying from strangers, you'd want a different deed, containing all sorts of promises and guarantees about the seller's complete ownership of the property.

### BROTHERS SELLING HOMESTEAD

Dear Edith: I recently sold my condominium and plan to take advantage of the one-time tax exemption. I am over 55 and owned the place the required number of years.

My brother and I inherited a house several years ago, which he resides in. When we sell that house, will he be allowed to take that over-55 exemption on his half of the profit? I know a spouse can lose the exemption even if they never used it; does this apply to relatives also?

— Dr. D. E.

No, it doesn't.

Spouses sign joint tax returns; you and your brother don't. The fact that you used the one-time tax exemption won't affect your brother's right to it.

The IRS will treat the sale of that homestead as it were two separate transactions. You'll owe tax on your share of the profit. On his half, your brother can use the senior citizen's special home-seller's tax exclusion.

### TAKING IT OFF THE MARKET

Dear Edith: We listed our house with an agency and signed a paper to let them show it for sale for six months. We feel they underpriced our home for a quick sale, as we looked around and found nothing in our price range, or as good as our house for more money. Can we take this off the market, or are we committed for the six months? — S. P.

Unless you were flooded with offers im-

mediately, it isn't likely your place was underpriced. Just the same, you certainly have a right to change your minds. No one can force you to sell your property.

Depending on the circumstances, the broker may claim reimbursement for money (advertising, for example) and time already expended on your listing. The broker might even have a claim for full commission if he or she had already brought you a full-price offer on your terms, or if you later negotiated secretly with one of the broker's customers.

No need to worry about that if you are acting in good faith.

Every cent of that acceleration goes to the reduction of the principal.

How long it takes for this annual acceleration to pay off the mortgage depends, naturally, on

both increment-increase your son chooses and the interest rate. A very casual acceleration - such as 1 percent a year - would be virtually painless but, at the same time, might knock on-

year, but might pay the mortgage off in as little as 10 or 11 years.

For instance, a 30-year, 10 percent, \$50,000 mortgage calls for monthly payments (principal and interest) of \$438.79. If he chose the 3 percent-a-year acceleration, his payments in the second year would rise to \$451.95 and, in the third year, they would be \$465.51. The mortgage, however, would be paid off in just a tad over 16 years, instead of 30. His monthly payments that final year would be \$704.13 and he would have saved himself a full \$50,477 in interest through acceleration.

DEAR MR. CAMPBELL:

Would you advise an elderly couple, 70 and 79, to buy a home? We are "oldy-weds." I have been renting a small condominium (not large enough for two) and, after having had a home, yard, etc., feel that at our age the upkeep of a home and yard would be too much work and every year we live would be more so. My husband definitely wants a house and I realize that renting is "money out the window." We could buy a condo and I feel that would be best for two old folks. I would appreciate your opinion.

Oh, yes, he also wants to travel and is a duck hunter, fisherman, etc. A motor home? No way. — Mrs. H.R.J., Salt Lake City, Utah

ANSWER: I was afraid, at first, that your husband was zeroed in on the idea of keeping bees, growing apples or rotating crops on the back 40 acres. These people are difficult to sell on condominiums.

But, since his only real objection is against paying out rent money, I would urge you to use all of your wiles to talk him out of the house idea and into a condo. I could bundle up and send you a few hundred letters from people your age who are being driven right up the wall with the chores of homeownership - chores that, a few years ago, they loved doing.

## Have you considered a career in realty?

Have you ever considered real estate as a career? As in other professions, not everyone is cut out to be a real estate agent, according to the Palm Springs Board of Realtors. Persons considering such a career should weigh their motivation and personal qualifications before making any decisions.

Answer the following questions as honestly as you can:

— Are you able to live on your financial assets for three months or more, or are you dependent on a monthly paycheck to make ends meet?

— Are you sufficiently disciplined to refrain from spending a large commission check on the premise that you might not see another for several months?

— Would you be discouraged if your closing falls through and the check you counted on didn't materialize?

— Are you prepared to dash out of the house at 10:30 on a Sunday night to present a con-

tract?

— Are you willing to forego a long-awaited evening out or an important social event to obtain that sale or listing you have pursued for so long?

— Are you prepared to have the door slammed in your face as you announce that you are the neighborhood real estate professional "just stopping by to get acquainted"?

If the answers to these questions present you with problems, perhaps you should reconsider. Real Estate is an excellent profession, but like others, it is not for everyone - especially the weak-willed or lazy.

Who, then, is a good candidate for this demanding field? The person who is independent, well organized, hardworking and financially secure. The individual who is willing to work long hours and enjoys making contacts with the public and who can view rejection as a challenge rather than a personal affront.

If this description fits you, then by all means, pursue a real estate career. You may wish to interview some agents or take a real estate seminar at a local college before you begin to study for your real estate license.

A career in real estate is not a hobby or pastime. Real estate professionals devote as many and often more hours to their profession as doctors, nurses and attorneys.

## Agricultural news

### Feeding soybeans

Considering feeding soybeans rather than selling them this fall?

There are several factors you need to consider before making the final decisions. Quality is the primary question. When considering quality we look at the nutritional value of the bean as well as the effects molds may have had on beans. Many beans are reported as being off-colored, shrunken and/or sprouted. Most of these characteristics will not have a very large effect on the nutritional value of the bean. However you should split open some of the beans and take a closer look. If the seed itself doesn't show signs of spoilage, brown spots or off-colored throughout, the nutritional value has probably not been altered.

Mycotoxins (a by-product of mold metabolism) are not typically a problem with whole soybeans, however, this year has not been a typical year. Check your beans for mold. The molds of primary concern, when feeding livestock, are the Fusarium and Aspergillus molds, because of the mycotoxins (fungal poisons) they produce. Fusarium mold will be pinkish, redish-brown, or pinkish-red. The Aspergillus molds may be either black, greenish or greenish-yellow. If you see these molds in your beans, you may want to have them tested at a lab (call the Extension Office for details) or feed them to a small group of animals and observe them carefully for signs of sickness. Hogs are especially sensitive to mycotoxins.

To test feed for the presence of mycotoxins feed the ground, roasted beans to 10 to 12 gilts (not replacement gilts) for one to two weeks. If they quit eating or show signs of decreased intake, the feed is most likely contaminated with vomitoxins. You may still be able to feed it if it is not severely contaminated, by diluting the toxic effect out with non-contaminated feeds in the ration. If the gilts start showing swelling of the vulva or udder development, there is zearalenone contamination. These beans should not be fed to any breeding stock or nursery pigs, but can be fed to growing and finishing hogs.

According to Dr. Bucholtz, dairy and beef producers may notice a slight reduction in feed consumption with some reduced milk production or rate of gain, but usually not serious. Death loss may be possible but not likely. Economically it is about like hay getting rained on, you know it is not as good but you feed it rather than trying to buy more. Roasting or cooking soybeans will not kill any existing mycotoxins.

To feed soybeans successfully you will need to balance the livestock rations according to the nutrient composition of the bean. If you suspect the nutrient composition has been altered dramatically you may want to have a sample tested (call the office for details.) Otherwise you can use book values and balance the ration to the recommended protein level.

Soybean meal: 45.8 percent protein; 2.9 percent Lys.; 1.0 percent fat; 30.4 percent NFE; 77 percent TDN; 6.0 percent C. fiber.

Raw soybeans: 37.9 percent protein; 2.4 percent Lys.; 18.0 percent fat; 24.5 percent NFE; 88 percent TDN; 5.0 percent C. fiber.

#### Feeding precautions:

1. Soybeans must be cooked if they are fed to calves, swine or poultry. Cooking (roasting) destroys an enzyme (tryosin) inhibitor in raw soybeans and improves the value of the protein for these animals.
2. Roasting may also improve palatability of the soys for cattle and increase the amount of by-pass protein.
3. Limit soybeans to not more than 20 percent of the grain mix, or five pounds per head per day to avoid creating a laxative effect.
4. Don't mix soybeans with urea because soybeans contain urease which converts urea to ammonia, causing palatability problems.
5. Grind and mix a fresh ration once a week to avoid rancidity (soys can be fed whole to cattle.)
6. Grind soybeans with other feeds to prevent gumming of feed grinders.
7. Change rations gradually to avoid off-feed problems.
8. Don't feed raw soybeans to animals under four months of age or to monogastrics.

When determining the value of whole cooked soybeans, the rule of thumb is: feed value of one bushel of cooked or extruded beans equals 50 pounds of 44 percent soybean meal and 25 pounds of corn. Therefore, based on 10-15-86 prices in St. Johns the value of whole soybeans can be calculated. 50 pounds x \$0.10/pound equals \$5.00. 25 pounds x \$0.9223/lb equals 56 cents. Total \$5.56 bushel.

Feeding value of soybeans \$5.56/bushel and the price of soybeans is \$4/bushel. The difference represents the amount of money available to pay for roasting, grinding, etc. Whole beans are economical to feed when the market is this low!

## Roehl lines

### Corn mold

Giles Roehl



There have been reports of high levels of blue-eye mold damage in 1985 corn delivered this fall. While the exact cause is not known, it is related to field infestation by molds during wet and warm harvest conditions, aggravated by high grain temperatures during summer storage.

The potential for a repeat of the problem during the coming year is likely. The following points should be considered when managing drying and storage of the 1986 corn crop:

- Follow recommended aeration patterns of 30-35 F for fall/winter storage; grain for spring/summer storage that will not be marketed prior to June should be held at no more than 50 F.
- With diligent management and regular inspection during the storage period, it is possible to hold grain at 40 F year round; in this case the grain will not be warmed up in the spring, and will not be aerated after the initial cooling unless the regular inspection reveals a temperature or mold problem.
- Moisture content after drying will not have a significant impact if grain temperatures are not properly managed; if corn has been infected with mold prior to harvest, drying below 14 degrees will not stop mold growth if storage temperatures exceed 50 F.
- As much as possible, separate the mold damaged corn from other, good quality corn; store mold damaged corn in conventional storage structures for best control of temperatures and storage conditions.

• A regular inspection will help spot problems before they become too serious. Look at the grain for crusting; feel the grain at the top of the bin for moisture accumulation and hot spots; smell for any off odors. For more information ask for AEIS Extension Bulletin 560.

**Corner Garden:** Using firewood to heat your home? Worried about getting "bugs" from the firewood? Some people don't want any of these bugs in their homes no matter how obnoxious they may be. Insect invasion of homes from firewood can be prevented by following these rules.

1. Do not stack firewood in or against the house or other buildings.
2. Bring in the amount of firewood that can be used up in a couple of days. Keep it stacked in the cold portions of the house (i.e. the garage or unheated porch).
3. Do not leave firewood in the house over the summer.
4. Do not treat firewood with insecticides. It is unnecessary and expensive.

## Conservation corner

### A thief

Eileen Gillespie



There is a thief on your land. Now, as you read this, he is lurking in your fields. The thief is wind erosion. Quietly he steals what can never be replaced — your topsoil. Wind erosion is a major problem on 70 million acres in the United States. Windbreaks will keep this thief out of your fields. To protect your land against this intruder, leave existing field borders or fence lines in place and plant windbreaks to control wind erosion — don't let the wind get away with your soil.

Wind erosion — is it really a problem? We need only recall the Dust Bowl days of the 1930s to

realize that it is. Wind erosion is a gradual process that can leave the land in a disastrous state before anyone realizes it is occurring.

One way to control wind erosion is to plant windbreaks that decrease wind speeds. On the leeward side, full protection from wind erosion is provided to an area 10 times the height of the windbreak and gives some protection as far away 20 times the height of the windbreak.

With energy costs skyrocketing, more and more people are looking for ways to conserve energy and are finding that windbreaks are an answer. In some cases, home heating needs can

be reduced by as much as 30 percent with windbreaks.

Dense or multi-row windbreaks on the windward side of a house can shade the home in the summer and reduce winds for energy savings in the winter. They also reduce noise, serve as barriers, control snow drifting, and provide food and cover for wildlife.

Now is the time to start planning for your windbreak. The Soil Conservation District will begin taking orders for tree seedlings next January.

## Two area teams end with wins

# Season finale for '86 football teams

Final regular season games were played by area high school football teams last week, with top-ranked Fowler being the only team not seeing action.

The Eagles, rated number one in region II of the State Class D High School Play-offs, had last Friday off due to a scheduling conflict with Central Montcalm.

Of the remaining area teams playing season finales last Friday, Fulton and Ashley were the sole winners; Fulton topping Ithaca 19-6, and Ashley crushing Tekonsha 31-20.

A review of final games follows:

### FULTON

The score of Fulton's game with Ithaca stood at 19-6 at halftime — and that was all the scoring that would be done in the non-conference contest.

"It was kind of a dull second half," said Pirate coach Leo Rosencrans, "although we did have several scoring opportunities in the final half."

Fulton's first quarter scores came off from pass plays by quarterback Todd Walden. He connected with Tod Koone for the initial touchdown of the game on a 71-yard pass completion. The extra point kick by Koone made the score 7-0.

Walden struck again in the first period on a 22-yard pass to Mike Martin. The point-after-attempt failed, making the score 13-0.

In the second quarter, Don Price scampered in for a Pirate touchdown on a 30-yard draw play, to end Fulton's scoring for the night.

Ithaca's lone touchdown of the game came later in the second period on a completed pass play. The conversion attempt was no good, ending scoring at 19-6.

Walden completed 7-14 passes for 168 yards, Koone had 5 receptions for 122 yards, and Chip Helms was the Pirate rushing leader with 77 yards on 10 carries. Price had 68 yards rushing in the game and intercepted one Yellowjacket pass.

Also snagging Ithaca passes were Scott McCausey and Jan Mahler.

Fulton finishes out the year with a 4-5 overall record, 1-4 in the Central Michigan Athletic Conference.

### ASHLEY

After a rather frustrating and disappointed year for the Ashley football team, Coach Sherm Hendricks' Bears came out of hibernation, taking a high-scoring 31-20 win over Tekonsha.

"It was the best game of the season by far for our team," Coach Hendricks said. "Our offensive linemen played very well, opening up big holes for our backs."

Those linemen include: Mike Turner and Todd Carriero at guard; Russell Klatt and Herb Russell at tackle; ends, Pat Cordray and Art Krull; and center, Ken Johnston.

The holes they opened up allowed Duane Schneider to score three touchdowns in the first quarter on runs of 30, 69, and 5 yards, and one T.D. in the third quarter on a 2-

yard dive.

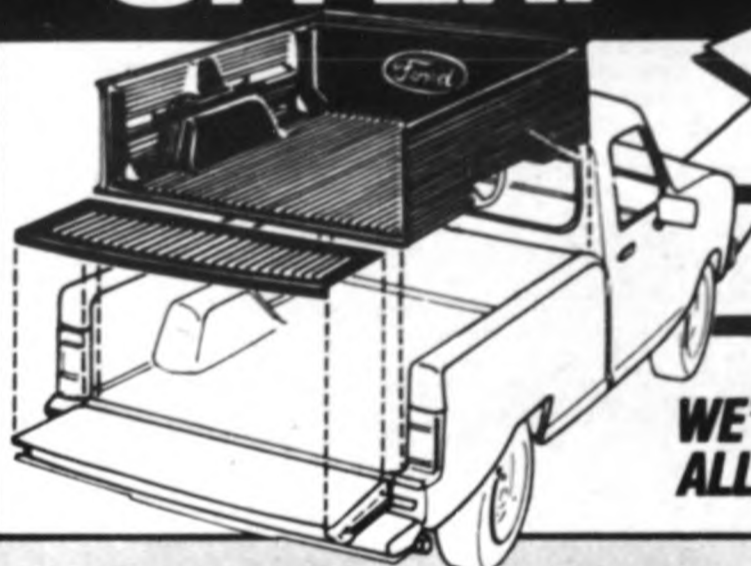

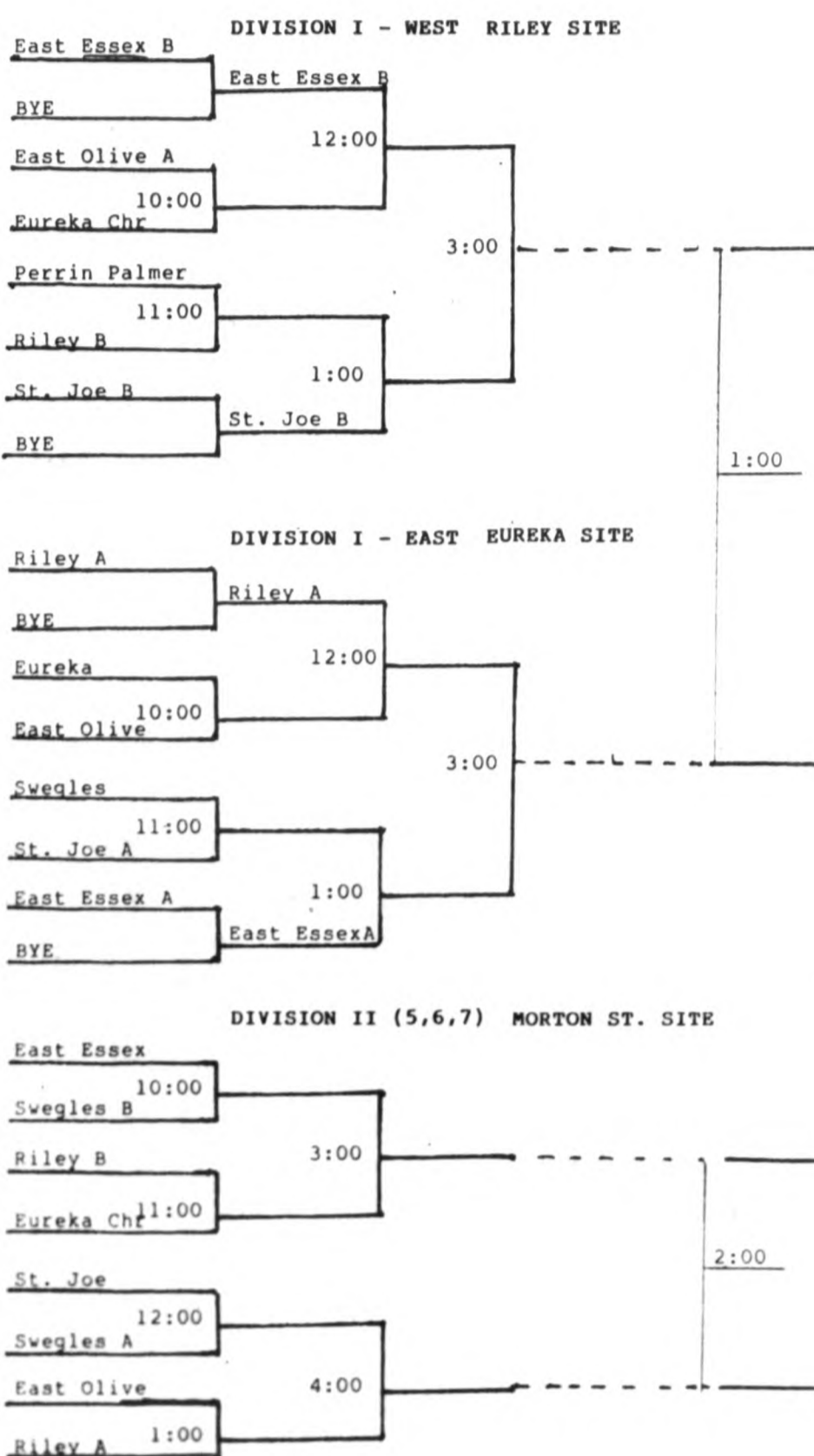

## O-E will rename football field

The Ovid-Elsie Area Schools Board of Education approved the renaming of the Ovid-Elsie football field to the Mark H. O'Donnell Athletic Field at their meeting on Oct. 20. O'Donnell served in various capacities at Ovid-Elsie Schools from 1952-1976. O'Donnell graduated from Norway High School in 1939, and upon graduation, was awarded the Nolte Trophy for excellence in sports and academics. He enrolled at Michigan State College on a football scholarship, but his college education was interrupted by World War II. He served for 3 1/2 years in the U.S. Naval Airforce as a crew member on a B-24 bomber in the Southwest Pacific. After completing military service, O'Donnell returned to college and

graduated from Michigan State College in 1951 with a B.S. degree, and received his M.A. in 1952. He was hired by the Elsie High School, serving in the capacity of their one and only coach, coaching all sports, and also as Athletic Director. The 1953-54 season brought championships in football, basketball and baseball for Elsie teams. During the 14 years that O'Donnell taught at Elsie, his teams had only one losing football season. His teams won four league championships and were runners-up four times in track, as well as being football champions. O'Donnell remained on as Athletic Director and head football coach after Ovid and Elsie merged until 1976. During that interim, Ovid-Elsie won three successive football

championships in 1970, 71, and 72, and was runner-up in 1969. After one year off the football field, he returned as J.V. football coach and later as freshman coach. His varsity record was 140 wins, 73 losses and five ties. Retiring from teaching and coaching on Aug. 1, 1986, O'Donnell was inducted into the Football Coaches Hall of Fame in Ann Arbor in 1983. He will be inducted into the Coaches Hall of Fame at the Silverdome in Pontiac on Nov. 29, 1986. A public announcement of the name change for the high school football field was made during the Marauders' final home game of 1986 on Oct. 31. A formal dedication is planned for halftime of Ovid-Elsie's first home game of the 1987 season.

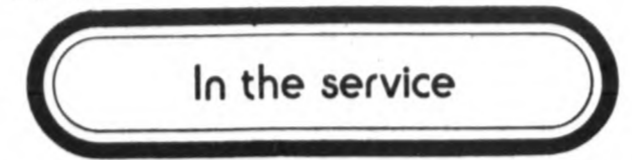
